### For Our Visitors

The Providence church of Christ will conduct a gospel-meeting Oct. 14-19, with brother J.T. Smith preaching, and we invite our friends and neighbors to attend.

People are sometimes reluctant to visit with a church they know little about because they are a little nervous about what may happen to them. "Will they ask me to stand and give my name? Will someone take me by the arm and try to persuade me to go up front? Will I be singled out to put on the spot in some way which might embarrass me? Will I be pressured to give money?" Perhaps all these questions go through your mind when you consider accepting someone's invitation to go to church with them.

Many churches will pressure you in the ways listed above. The Providence church of Christ will not. When you visit with us, here is what you can expect:

**You Will Not Be Put On The Spot.** Our visitors are warmly welcomed before and after the worship by members of the church. However, we do not ask you to stand, raise your hand, or do other things which may cause you to be ill at ease in front of the congregation. You are not pressured to participate in any way. You may simply observe the service if you wish.

**All Things Done Decently And In Order.** In accordance with I Corinthians 14:40, our service will be orderly rather than rambunctious and confusing. We do not believe in cold formalism, but neither do we engage in disorderly emotionalism. We will sing enthusiastically, pray and listen to the preaching of God's word.

While emotions no doubt will be stirred, they will not get out of control with random shouting, jumping, etc.

**No Collections.** The only time the church takes up contributions is when MEMBERS are asked to give upon the "first day of the week" (Sunday). This is taught in I Corinthians 16:1-2. During any other assembly, such as a gospel meeting, we NEVER take a collection. If you are with us on a Sunday, you will not be expected to contribute if you are not a member.

**Your Questions Are Welcomed.** We are interested in Bible study. Therefore, any question you may have concerning the Bible, we will be glad to consider. Whether your question has to do with doubts about our teaching and practice, or is just out of desire to learn more, please feel free to ask.

**A Simple Appeal.** As he closes his sermon, the speaker will invite any who wish to respond to the gospel to come to the front. However, walking down the aisle is not essential in becoming a Christian. We would be delighted if, after services or later that night, someone notified us that they wish to obey Jesus Christ. Our appeal is that people give up man-made religion and accept the religion of Jesus Christ as it is revealed in the Bible.

## Citizens of Fairground Hill area voice concern over situation in their neighborhood

Citizens in the Fairground Hill area of Mt. Vernon are not happy.

Over 20 of these residents were at the Mt. Vernon City Council meeting Monday night to voice their concern over a problem, or at least a problem for them, in their neighborhood.

According to each of the residents that spoke out, most of their problems started when a pool hall was opened in the neighborhood.

Shafer was also present at Monday night's meeting. One mother, Debbie Bishop, voiced deep concern for her six children's safety saying, "It is not even safe for my children to play in the yard," and added, "I want something done."

Mrs. Bishop told the council of a Saturday night incident which awakened her and her family around 3 a.m. "We heard these screams and a gunshot," Mrs. Bishop said. "We also saw several people vandalizing a pick-up truck and then pushing it over a bank."

Mrs. Bishop said that she called for city police but that someone must have called from the jail and told the crowd gathered that the police were coming. "It took about 30 minutes for police to get there and everyone was gone," she said.

A neighbor of Mrs. Bishop's, Charlie Bussell told the council the same story and said that the problem was getting out of hand.

"When Paul (McFerron, owner and operator of the pool hall) is there, he keeps it down a little bit," Bussell said. However, Bussell added that McFerron was not home this week end but that he had a house full of people. McFerron's home is located adjacent to the pool hall.

"I saw the same thing that she (Mrs. Bishop) saw," Bussell said. "When police arrived, the people were already in Paul's house and had turned off the light," he added.

"The biggest problem right now is coming from Paul's house," Bussell told the council.

Mrs. Bishop said that on the same night, a person flashed a gun

to her nephew who was staying at her home. "If you all don't do something, someone is going to get killed and so help me if it is one of my children..."

Another man told the council that his son had been playing hooky and staying at the pool hall instead of going to school. "He didn't play hooky until that pool hall opened," the man said.

Other citizens at the meeting, most of them elderly, voiced their concern about the situation.

"It is not even safe to get out here in the day time, much less after dark," one lady said.

Another lady asked if there was not a city ordinance prohibiting a pool hall operating a certain distance from a church.

City Attorney Carl Clontz told the woman that Mt. Vernon did not have zoning laws and that no

legal action could be taken from that standpoint.

Another lady, Marie Gentry, presented Mayor Roland Mullins and the council members with a memo from her doctor, Orson L. Arvin, stating that she had heart problems and that the situation at Fairground Hill was causing her great stress and producing health problems for her.

Paul McFerron said that he did not understand why the citizens wanted to close his business when, in his opinion, the pool hall had nothing to do with the problems brought up by the residents of the area.

Mayor Mullins did tell the residents that if any of them wanted to swear out warrants for anyone, City Attorney Carl Clontz would help them do so. He also told them that if any disturbance occurred at Fairground Hill, no matter what time of night, to call him or any member of the council and they would see that a police officer was in the area immediately.

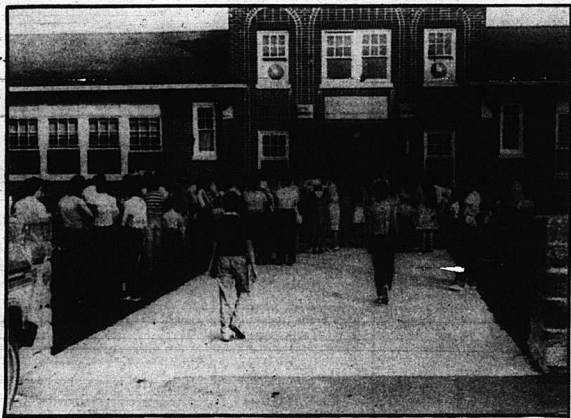

## Two local men indicted Friday by Rockcastle Co. Grand Jury

Two local men have been indicted by the Rockcastle County Grand Jury.

Clarence Kirby, age 24, of Rt. 5, Mt. Vernon was indicted for receiving stolen property valued at over \$100, after police recovered a high-powered rifle from his residence on Chestnut Ridge, according to the indictment.

The rifle, a Maclin 30-30 with a scope, had been reported stolen by Gerald Smith of Preachersville earlier this year.

Kirby, who had already posted \$10,000 property bond in district court on a charge, was released on the same bond by Circuit Judge Dan Venters.

The rifle was recovered on September 24th when State Police conducted a raid on Kirby's residence, looking for marijuana plants. Kirby was also charged with producing marijuana the same day.

Earl Overby, 18, of Livingston was indicted on two counts -- second degree burglary and theft by unlawful taking over \$100.

The two-count indictment stemmed from a September 25th incident in which Overby was reportedly seen leaving the home of Pauline Gray on Carter Drive in Mt. Vernon by a neighbor.

Overby was treated as a juvenile in the earlier case but will be tried as an adult on the indictment charges.

## Home energy assistance applications will be accepted beginning October 15

The Cabinet for Human Resources is making significant changes in the way it operates the federal home energy assistance program this year. The program will begin earlier, the amount each individual household receives has been reduced, and \$4 million has been reserved to help those in greatest need this winter, according to Department for Social Insurance Commissioner Jack Waddell.

"By stretching the money to serve 50 percent more people and beginning the program earlier, we hope to avoid long waiting lines and provide some assistance to all who need it," said Waddell.

Although Congress has not yet acted on the final home energy assistance appropriation, Kentucky expects to receive approximately \$30 million, the same as last year's HEAP allocation.

Both men will appear for an October 20th preliminary hearing. More indictments are reportedly pending.

During the second part of the program, the \$4 million reserved for "hardship" cases will be distributed. Low income households which are completely without heat may apply for hardship assistance beginning January 7, 1985 and continuing through May 31.

All households are eligible for HEAP benefits from both the subsidy and hardship parts of the program. The Department for Social Insurance will discontinue taking HEAP applications in both the subsidy and hardship segments before the projected ending dates, if all available funds are spent sooner.

Kentucky's total HEAP grant will be allocated as follows: 10 percent for the legislatively mandated Home Care for the Elderly program; 13 percent for the Department for Employment Services' home weatherization program; 2 percent, or a minimum of \$500,000, for a pilot project to test retrofitting of gas furnaces to increase efficiency, and 75 percent for direct benefits.

Half of the hardship funds will go to clients who purchase

The Kentucky State Board of Education says that a new building should be constructed to replace the Mt. Vernon Elementary School. The local school board rejected that plan at their September meeting.

However, school Supt. Charles B. Parsons and board Chairman, Dr. K.R. Burdette are considering new ideas on the project.

In a random poll of 40 parents who have children enrolled at the Mt. Vernon Elementary School, 60 percent would prefer to see a new building erected there as opposed to 27.5 percent who want to see the building remodeled. There were 12.5 percent who were unsure whether they would rather have a new building or a remodeled one.

The poll was conducted by the Signal and its purpose was to check parents' reactions to a decision made by the local school board to reject the state's recommendation that the county build a new elementary school in Mt. Vernon instead of remodeling the present one.

The decision came during the September meeting of the school board.

The board members then voted to have Superintendent Charles B. Parsons write the State Board of Education to formally reject their proposal. Parsons had 60 days to inform the state of the board's action.

The poll also revealed statistics concerning three other questions put before those who chose to respond anonymously to the phone interviews.

The second question asked "If you knew an additional local tax would be added to finance a new building would it change your answer to the first question?"

There were 15 percent of the respondents who said it would change their answer, 75 percent said it would not, and 10 percent had no answer.

An additional school tax has already been set by the state for all school systems in Kentucky to 15 cents per \$100 assessed value of real estate and to 15 percent on personal property. But this money will go into the general fund and is not marked specifically for construction, although it may be used for that purpose. Last year's rates were 7.7 cents and 9.6 cents respectively.

The third question put before the first 25 respondents was originally phrased "Do you think parents should be allowed to meet with the school board before a decision about the building is made?"

The question was considered to be misstated since any interested citizen is allowed to attend the school board meetings. The question was then changed to read "Do you think parents should be able to give input to the school board before a decision about the

building is made?"

The Signal feels the respondents knew the intent of the questions to be basically the same, and 87.5 percent of those surveyed answered yes while 10 percent said no and 2.5 percent gave no answer.

The last question asked the respondents whether they felt the present building at Mt. Vernon adequately serves the students' needs. There were 32.5 percent who said yes, 50 percent who said no, and 17.5 percent who didn't know enough about the condition of the building to give an answer.

Several of those polled also volunteered to give additional comments anonymously and these are all-printed below.

"This school building is so old I don't think remodeling will do any good. It needs air conditioning like the high school."

"It's a good building, but I think we need some extra rooms and the lunchroom needs to be modernized."

"I think each classroom up there is overcrowded and that each teacher would agree to that. If they had more rooms I'm sure they could get more teachers."

"I wouldn't mind a little bit more tax if they would turn some of the money in savings and make good use of what they've got."

"I think the parents that have kids in school should be the ones to make decisions like that."

"I think they could get by cheaper by remodeling instead of building a new building."

"It's just this deal about politics in the school system. I think parents and other people should have a say in it besides the one group of people."

"I think all the parents, and grandparents, in the county should feel the responsibility to go to the school board meetings and I wish the meetings were announced in the newspaper and where they will be held."

A person with grandchildren in the school system said, "Taxpayers who don't have children in school even want a new building and a lot of people who don't own property and don't pay taxes still have children in school. Our future lies in the hands of our children. They shouldn't add more outbuildings. They're overcrowded-it's pathetic."

"It is definitely overcrowded and if they're not going to do something about the building they should transfer them (the students) to another school. And they need better restroom facilities."

After reviewing the results of the poll, school Supt. Charles B. Parsons said, "It's a matter of what the people want and what we can afford to pay for."

Parsons added that the school board has not yet formally rejected the state's proposal for a new building and "as far as the non with the state department it's a new building."

He explained that five years ago the state did a facility survey and recommended a new building for Mt. Vernon Elementary. The survey is repeated every five years and when it was conducted again this year the state still called for a new building.

Parsons said the board will "take this (the poll) into consideration," and will not make an immediate decision on whether to build or remodel. He also said the state will make the final decision concerning the building.

Dr. K.R. Burdette, chairman of the local school board, opposed the building of a new school during the September board meeting. He also gave the poll consideration and commented on the situation.

Hiking Merit Badge requires learning the main points of good hiking practices; making a plan for a 10-mile hike which includes map routes, clothing and equipment list, taking five 10-mile hikes and taking a 20 continuous mile hike.

brown. But why?

The principal reason for the leaves turning color is the shortening day length. The chlorophyll that makes the leaves green is the dominant pigment during the summer. But as the days get cooler and the nights longer, the chlorophyll breaks down. Then the yellow and orange pigments that have been in the leaves all along become more apparent.

The red hues come about for a slightly different reason. The cooler temperatures trigger a hibernation mechanism within each tree. This mechanism creates a sort of plug at the end of each leaf stem, in effect cutting off the leaf's circulation. When this plug forms, a certain amount of sugar is trapped in the leaf. It is this sugar that makes the leaf turn red in the cold. It is the plug that also makes the leaf fall from the tree.

All these different events create the tremendous variety of colors. The color depends in part on the variety of tree. In the sugar maple quite a bit of sugar is trapped, creating the brilliant reds. In the beech tree, however, the opposite is true, so the tree stays yellow.

It is normal for most leafy trees to turn color and drop their leaves, but if a tree turns color unusually early, it could be a sign that the plant is unhealthy. The early color is a sign that the growing process of the plant was not completed. The conditions most favorable for a brightly colored fall are bright, sunny, warm days and cool nights. If this kind of weather occurs through September to mid-October, we can expect very good color. If we have an early hard frost, the brown colors will dominate, and if we have cloudy wet weather, the colors will be more dull.

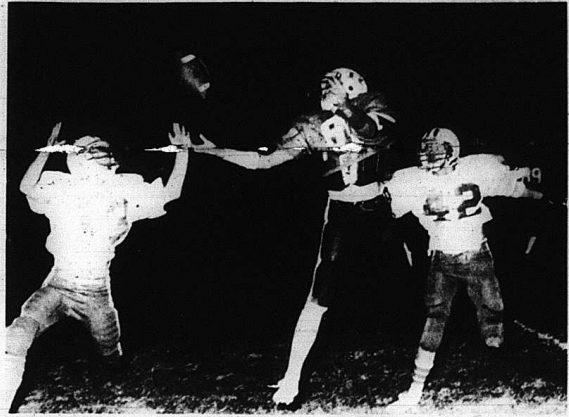

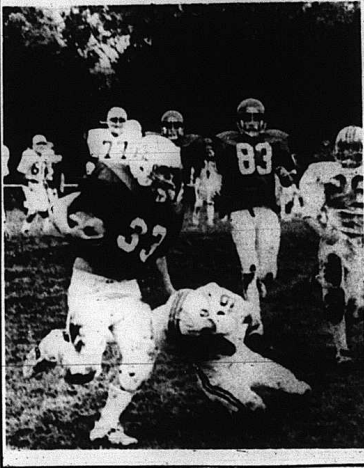




## Rockcastle's J.V. team enjoying winning season

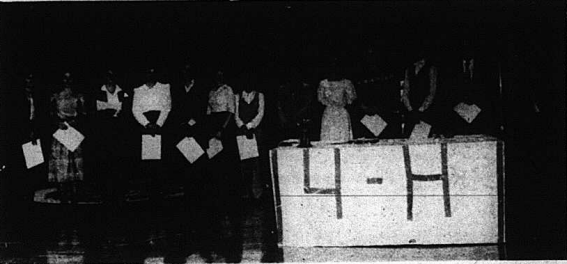

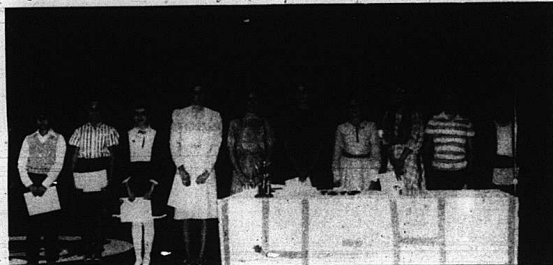

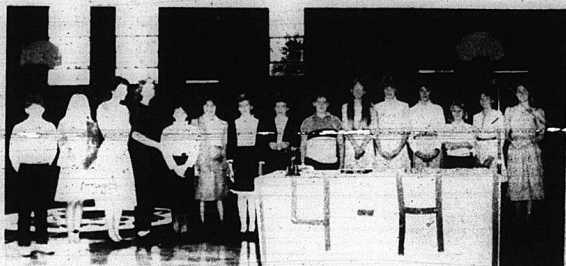

The 4-H program is open to all interested youth between the ages of 9 and 19, whether they live on farms, in the city or in between. The success of the 4-H program is attributed to the nearly 600,000 volunteer leaders who are backed

and contributing members of society. This mission is carried out through the involvement of parents, volunteer leaders and other adults who assist 4-H'ers in learn-by-doing experiences.

## Check out charities before you give

With Christmas right around the corner, charities are busy thinking up ways to tap your holiday spirit and help you with a tax deduction.

Potential contributors can expect to be assaulted with everything from street corner sales to heart-rendering pictures of starving children.

Americans last year gave an estimated \$60.39 billion to a variety of causes, according to the American Association on Fund-Raising Counsel. Almost 90% came from individuals, followed

by foundations and corporations. If you are typical, you gave almost 2% of your pretax income to charities.

As such, it isn't surprising that individuals are the main target for the fund drives of more than 300,000 charities listed as tax-exempt with the IRS. That means wading through dozens of solicitations to separate the worthy causes from those little more than scams.

The first concern, of course, is the purpose of the organization. Make sure you really understand what the programs are and that you believe in those programs. If someone says they are helping starving children, fine, but what they do to help starving children before you write a check.

Financial statements of organizations are complicated and accounting standards are chaotic. Being an informed contributor

takes some effort.

One way is to send for the charity annual report. That should provide a breakdown of its programs, including information on who was helped. If not, specifically request that information. Any reputable charity should be happy to comply.

Another way is to send for evaluation reports prepared by two watchdog agencies: National Information Bureau Inc., 419 Park Ave. South in New York, 10016, and the BBB's Philanthropic Advisory Service, 1515 Wilson Blvd., Arlington, Va. 22209.

Both agencies have standards for charities and publish lists of those that do and don't meet them. PAS's list costs \$1; the NIB list is free. The agencies also prepare reports on specific charities, covering programs and personnel, a financial statement and any divergence from their standards. Each will send up to three reports free.

Of special importance is the share of revenue spent on the program for which the money is raised. PAS says 50% is acceptable, but no more than 35% should go for fundraising NIB says at least 50% for programs. The closer to 100% the better. A check directly to the organization you choose bypasses the fundraiser.

Many organizations raise money through charity balls, candy sales or theater galas. But you should realize that sometimes more would go to the charity if you just made a contribution. The IRS lets you deduct only the portion of a contribution that exceeds the value of the theater ticket, candy or whatever.

"With our finances, there hasn't been anything we can do," he said. "What's got me concerned is that they need some relief over there as quickly as we can give it to them. But another thing I considered is if we build a new building we have to consider the cost of tearing down the old building. We'll have to hash this thing out with the state."

Burdette said that after his statement at the September board meeting he got four or five calls from persons wanting a new building and as many or more from those wanting to see the building remodeled.

"They (the public) need to know the whole story," said Burdette. He then said that an architect has been contacted to give the school board some figures that will compare the cost of

building to remodeling. He said that after the state approves either plan it will take approximately two to three years for the situation to be corrected:

Burdette said, "We had a guy to check on our bonding potential, but we're still paying on the high school." He added that the school system also missed out on state funds given to needy districts several years ago, when the money for the program ran out before Rockcastle County received any.

## Help for farmers coming thru President's farm credit plan

All of the Farmers Home Administration's state directors and farmer program chiefs are reviewing plans to put into action President Reagan's farm credit initiatives to help farmers experiencing severe financial stress. Kendall L. Seaton, FmHA state director for Kentucky said today.

Kendall L. Seaton and James B. Dunsmore, farmer program chief for Kentucky returned over the weekend from a day-long strategy session in Washington with Farmers Home Administration's National Administrator, Charles W. Shuman and other National and State Officials.

"There can be no question about the commitment of the Farmers Home Administration at all levels to put this plan to work to help those farmers with sustainable operations who are caught in a financial squeeze through circumstances beyond their control," Seaton said.

Based on the agency-wide discussion of loan and guarantee details, final procedures for operation will be completed in FmHA National Office in a matter of days. Once any legal questions are

resolved, the agency then will publish the instructions and distribute them to field offices for action.

Under the President's plan, Farmers Home Administration will be able to set aside up to 25 percent -- to a maximum of \$100,000 -- of a qualifying farmer's loan without interest for 5 years.

For farmers in deep financial distress who do not have FmHA loans, the agency can guarantee up to 90 percent of a new loan if their lender is willing to write-off enough of the farmer's debt to put the loan in a secured position and achieve positive cash flow.

The key in both approaches is to restore the farmer to a positive cash flow situation. Essentially that means to restructure the debt and reorganize the farming opera-

tion, if needed, to establish the financial strength needed to meet all farm operations, costs, family living expenses, machinery upkeep, and service all debts.

Seaton said FmHA borrowers will be advised of their eligibility to participate during the annual review of their loans.
