

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

Jury duty, It's not really that bad

People tend to think of jury duty as a burden of citizenship. Indeed, some think of it as only slightly better than being drafted into the army.

This is the opinion of Circuit Judge Daniel J. Venters, who likes to assure the public that jury duty really isn't that bad.

"Understandably, it's a burden and an inconvenience, but it's necessary if you believe in the kind of freedom we enjoy in this country. Some people think that being involved in a serious crime is something that only happens to others and may not realize how much they would appreciate a fair trial if they ever needed one," he said.

Herbert Coffey from Mt. Vernon has received a jury summons three times and has sat on three different cases in court.

Riddle: "I did not want to have to judge someone-to me it was a very scary thing to have to do. I wouldn't want to serve again, but I wouldn't dread it as much the next time."

Laura Shepherd from Mt. Vernon was called to jury duty for the first time in August and sat on two cases. She wasn't nervous, but she wished she hadn't been called.

"But after I went I was glad I did," she said. "I think it's something everybody should do and you have a better idea of the court system. I don't think I'd mind serving again."

Coffey, Mrs. Riddle and Mrs.

Shepherd are among the almost 100,000 Americans who annually serve as jurors, according to the Summer 1984 issue of Spectrum, a publication of Babcock & Wilcox.

These jurors are paid an average of \$10 a day, which adds up to \$200 million all together. In leaving their regular jobs for jury duty, they cost the nation close to \$1 billion in lost productivity.

Spectrum added that because trial by jury is guaranteed by the Sixth and Seventh Amendments to the Constitution, there are about 300,000 civil and criminal cases heard in 3,000 federal and state court rooms each year in the

'Dee' Huddleston, McConnell bring campaigns to town

The two nominees for United States Senator from Kentucky brought their campaigns to Rockcastle County last week.

Two-term incumbent Democrat Walter "Dee" Huddleston held a political breakfast at the Rockcastle Signal House on Friday morning and Jefferson County Judge/Executive Mitch McConnell attended a Republican Rally at the Mt. Vernon Elementary School on Saturday night.

Huddleston told the crowd of well over 150 people that he was glad to see the overwhelming crowd that had turned out and he praised the Democratic party for what they were doing in Rockcastle County.

He said that he realized it was an "up-hill battle" for Democrats in Rockcastle but that he felt the party was getting a lot done.

The Democrat from Elizabethton predicted re-election to the Senate, calling the campaign battle on to his opponent, Mitch McConnell as being one that would be decided strictly on the statistics.

He used an example in the Senate recently where a conference committee had passed both Congresses' versions. Huddleston said that as the two Houses met, they bring in subcommittees and that he was a member of three of the sub-com-

mittees. Because all three met at the same time, he said he had to make the difficult decision of choosing which was the most important.

Huddleston said that he could only attend one of the meetings as they discussed issues late into the night. "According to my opponent, I did not show up for work two-thirds of the time that night," the Senator said.

The Senator also spoke of various subcommittees such as agricultural and appropriations and said that he had fought hard to ease the tobacco program in Kentucky and he vowed his continued support for the program.

However unusual, the Senator did not speak about the Democratic presidential nominee, Walter Mondale. In fact, at no time during his talk did he urge any of his supporters to also help Mondale.

State Representative Danny Ford of Mt. Vernon hosted a Republican rally Saturday night at the Mt. Vernon Elementary School.

Republican McConnell came to the rally, which was sponsored by the Young Republicans Club, for only a short while but did his second since visit to Rockcastle County since he began his campaign.

Rockcastle has new spouse abuse center

A void in spouse abuse services for the Cumberland Valley Area Development District was filled October 1st when a center for abused spouses opened in Mt. Vernon.

The Family Life Abuse Center, a service of the Christian Appalachian Project, headquartered in Lancaster, has been opened to serve the counties of Rockcastle, Laurel, Jackson, Clay, Whitley, Knox, Bell and Harlan, which comprise the Cumberland Valley ADD. Although the center serves these counties primarily,

referrals are accepted from across the state.

Being one of fourteen centers in Kentucky that shelter women and children from the men who abuse them, the Family Life Abuse Center provides a variety of support services to victims of domestic abuse. In addition to a safe haven, the FLAC provides services such as individual and group counseling, food, clothing, transportation, a 24-hour crisis counseling line, a community education and awareness program

Venters attends Judicial College

Circuit Judge Daniel J. Venters of the 28th Judicial Circuit, attended the 1984 Circuit Judges' Judicial College, held at Lake Cumberland State Park, October 7-11.

The sessions were conducted by state officials, law school representatives, other judges, and legal authorities from out-of-state. Mark Carrigan, director of the National Institute for Sentencing Alternatives, gave a brief national overview of practical suggestions for designing and implementing sentencing alternative programs. Among the alternatives discussed were fines, probation and conditional discharge, shock probation and community service.

George Wilson, secretary of the state's Corrections Cabinet gave a status report on the

population of state prisons and county jails.



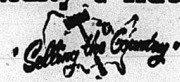

recovery if he or she contributed in any way to the damages. Contributory negligence has been supplanted in Kentucky by the doctrine of comparative negligence in which each person's recovery damages is reduced in proportion to the amount he or she contributed to the cause.

The College offered sessions on a variety of other topics of current interest to judges, ranging from a historical look at no-fault automobile insurance and the Uniform Motor Vehicle Accident Reparations Act, to a discussion of recently enacted state and federal legislation on the establishment

and enforcement of child support obligations. The question of using hypnosis in the courtroom and "A Day in the Life" documentaries, showing a typical day in the life of an injured party, for example, were also discussed in that session on evidence by Dean Robert Lawson of the University of Kentucky College of Law.

The Judicial College is offered each year as part of the state's continuing judicial education program sponsored by the Administrative Office of the Courts. The College is designed to inform the state's 91 circuit judges about legislative revisions, shifts in legal trends and constitutional interpretations.

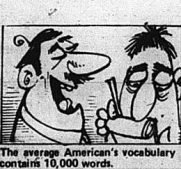

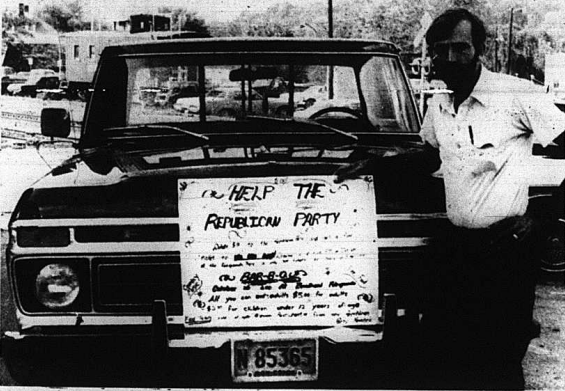

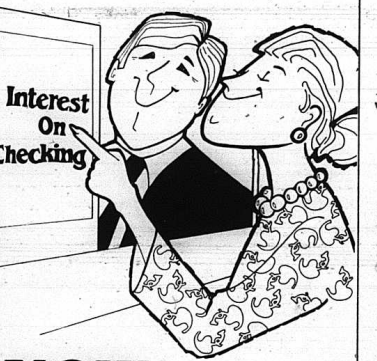

Abney said Monday that the accusation was completely false.

"The night that all that happened, John Bullock was working at the jail and Ray Kirby and his daughter, Kim, who is the pre-trial officer for the county, were also down here," Abney said. "I know for a fact that none of them made such a call."

"One-third of the people in Rockcastle County have scanners and they could have very easily heard what was going on and called up here," the jailer said.

Abney went on to say that police waited on 30 minutes before responding to the call and that when they did, they went from the hospital and turned their sirens on immediately and that residents could hear the sirens all the way across town. Fairground Hill residents at the council meeting confirmed that they could hear police coming several minutes before they actually got there on the night in question.

Bengals go undefeated for second season

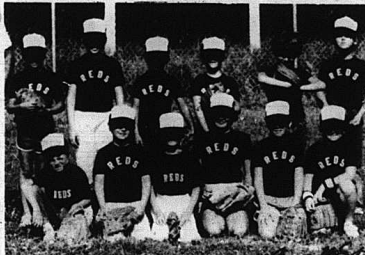
The Broadhead Bengals youth football team completed another undefeated season Monday night, by downing the Roundstone Redskins 14-0.

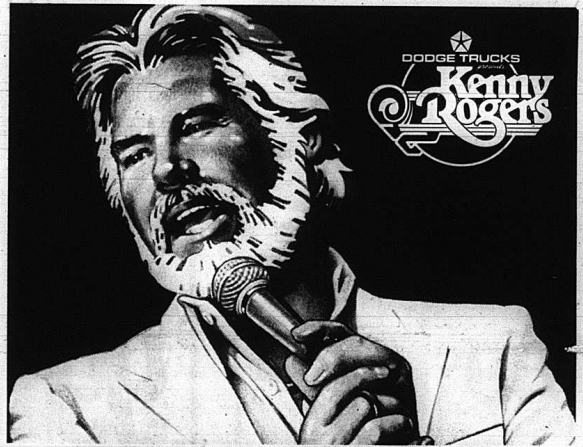

Many first-time jurors are baffled by the system and are unsure of what to expect when serving on the jury. "People that have never been on the jury find it nerve-wracking and they dread it," said Denver Miller, Rockcastle County's Circuit Court Clerk. "It's like a new job. The jury is not that bad, but once you get started it's kind of enjoyable."

Miller's office handles everything from speeding tickets to murder trials.

Citizens may be chosen to sit on three different types of juries: grand, petit and district. In these juries, they will hear both civil and criminal cases. Miller said that in Rockcastle, there's about an equal number of criminal and civil cases each year.

The "Guidebook for Jurors" explained that a civil case is an "individual dispute between two or more persons or corporations and, ordinarily, but not always, is one for money damages."

In a criminal case, the "action is brought in the name of the Commonwealth of Kentucky as a plaintiff" against the person charged with a crime, who is called the "defendant." The petit jury then has to decide whether the person is guilty or not guilty as charged and decide on a punishment in accordance with the Court.

The grand jury meets the fourth Friday of each month, with jurors typically chosen for a six month term. The main purpose of the grand jury is to determine "Whether prosecution (indictment) should proceed against particular individuals." There are 12 members which make up the grand jury.

The petit jury is also made up of 12 jurors whose job is to bring trial the indictments chosen by the grand jury.

The district court only has six jurors and it hears cases that would require a sentence of \$2,500 on down or up to a year in the county jail. Any cases exceeding these sentences will be tried in the circuit court. The district court meets the second and fourth Tuesday of each month.

In Rockcastle, court has traditionally been set for three times a year - in March, May and November. This year's November petit jury will begin meeting on Nov. 5 and run for approximately two weeks.

But, beginning in 1985, Venters will use a new system that allows for the petit jury to meet five times a year with the grand jury sitting once a month.

The old system has a "built-in, automatic delay," said Venters, particularly in criminal cases. "With the new schedule, he hopes to process cases more quickly and cut down the time from indictment to trial to six months or less. This will prevent the courts from becoming so clogged."

Venters said he tries about 1,200 cases a year in Rockcastle and Pulaski counties where he is the circuit judge. Only three or four other judges in Kentucky handle more cases than he does.

Another change Venters intends to make is the way the jury is selected. In the past in Rockcastle, the circuit judge appointed three county citizens to serve as jury commissioners each year. They were paid to go through the voter registration lists until they had chosen 800 or 900 persons at random to serve on the jury for the next year. The names were kept secret until each session of court.

When asked if the selection system was fair, Venters said the suggestion has been in Rockcastle County that certain professions, such as doctors, lawyers, dentists and schoolteachers were excluded from the jury lists.

But he defended the method used by the jury commissioners. "I think it's been perfectly fair in the past and I don't think there has been any unfairness or bias."

The only alternative the law allows to jury commissioners is the use of a computer to choose names at random. The lists can be provided by the Secretary of State's office, which has all of Kentucky's voter registration lists in a computer.

Venters said, "The jury commissioners in the past have done an excellent job, but what this process (with the computer) will eliminate is the appearance of any unfairness."

"The only problem I foresee with the computer is that the commissioners could eliminate those undesirable for the jury, such as the incompetent or the mentally ill."

Venters will use the computer process in 1985 to select the year's jurors, and if there are too many

problems with it, he can go back to employing jury commissioners. Using the computer will save several hundred dollars in the salaries paid to the commissioners.

What does Venters see as the problems with the jury system? "The biggest problem of the jury system, I suppose, is the expense of it. It takes longer to try a case with a jury than just with a judge. "Another problem is that it's an inconvenience and burden on the citizens of the county and it's difficult to ask people to give up, even for a short while, their daily routine."

Denver Miller said that jurors in Rockcastle are now paid \$12.50 a day, \$5 jury pay and \$7.50 for expenses. The state law requires that employers can't penalize employees in any way when they are called for jury duty. Employers are not required to pay their employees while they're on the jury, although some do.

One of the ways the circuit court clerk's office is saving money is by using an answering machine. Jurors can call the office the night before a case to see if it has been dismissed or rescheduled. Then the jurors can make plans for the next day and the court doesn't have to pay them to come in for jury selection.

Persons summoned to serve on the jury are encouraged not to make excuses in order to get out of serving. However, Miller said that in certain circumstances, such as illness or death in a family, jurors are excused for the time required.

Venters said he hasn't had a real problem with people not wanting to serve. "Some say they would rather not be here and I tell them I don't want to be here either, that nobody wants to be here."

If a person refused to serve they could be held in contempt of

court, but Venters considers that an extreme remedy, one that he probably wouldn't use.

Venters said that a misconception people may have about court is that it meets for weeks, but under his new system each jury will only have to serve two weeks, unless there are unusual circumstances. And, the Fridays during the court sessions are used for Motion Days (to set up indictments) so that leaves only eight days that a person might have to sit on a case.

Venters feels that the jury system works because the public has confidence in it and it has a history of several hundred years. "Convicted criminals have to be sent to prison by a jury and innocent people wrongly convicted may have a jury as their best defense. It's (a jury trial) a right that we have as citizens of this country for the protection of us all and with that right goes the duty to serve on the jury when called."

And take heed of the advice given to jurors by Circuit Judge Venters: "They will feel at the end of their case that they have rendered a great service to the

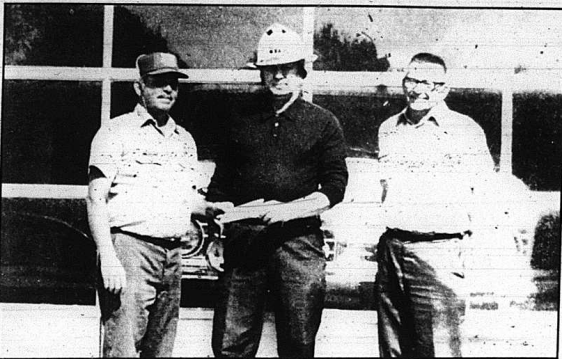

Local PCA will merge with Federal Land Bank this Spring

By as early as the Spring of 1985, customers of the Federal Land Bank in Stanford from Rockcastle County will no longer have to travel out of town to take care of their business.

Cumberland Production Credit Association president Gaylan D. Gossage announced last week that the local PCA office will be merging with the Federal Land Bank of Stanford. Gossage said the decision came at a fourth district farm credit board of directors' meeting on September 19th. The fourth district consists of Indiana, Kentucky, Ohio and Tennessee.

Local PCA office manager Danny McKinney confirmed the move, saying that the Cumberland division of the farm credit district would be the pilot for this program. Rockcastle is part of the Cumberland.

"Right now it doesn't look like anything will change in our

office in the way of personnel," McKinney said. "Maybe in the future we will have to add some people but nothing is for certain."

"One good thing about this merger is that local people won't have to go out of town to get farm credit," he said.

"We will be able to handle long-term loans as well as the short-term loans we now provide," McKinney added. PCA at present only loans money for up to 7 years but after the merger, the

and follow-up services. Case management and referral services assist victims in obtaining legal, financial, child care, housing, educational and vocational services. Referrals are also made for marital counseling and for counseling abusers.

A TV movie, "The Burning Bed," which depicted the plight of an abused wife and which was shown on Monday night, October 8th on NBC caused the FLAC center to receive more calls than usual, according to Brenda White, director of the center.

Ms. White said during and after the movie, the center received about 8 calls from women saying that the movie being shown was a "re-run of their life."

The director of the FLAC also directs the Bethany House Spouse Abuse Center in Somerset and said that calls also picked up at that center the night of the movie.

"We were originally set up to cover a 10-county area in Somerset, but we are only reaching out to two other counties at the present time over there because the center has been filled to capacity since January," she said. The center in Somerset opened last year in October.

Of the center in Rockcastle County Ms. White said that two

families are presently using the facility and that it has a capacity for 20 people.

Ms. White said that on the average the FLAC receives about seven calls per week with the majority of the calls coming from Laurel County.

"Laurel County has a larger population than the other counties served so we get more calls from there," she said. However, she did say that the center had received some calls from residents of Rockcastle County.

For security purposes, FLAC's location is kept confidential. Victims of spouse abuse needing assistance may contact the center by calling (606) 256-2724. Agencies and others wanting to make referrals or secure additional information about spouse abuse or the services provided by FLAC may also call the above number.

Bethany House serves the Lake Cumberland ADD, which

includes the counties of Pulaski, Wayne, McCreary, Russell, Adair, Taylor, Casey, Green, Clinton, and Cumberland. The numbers for Bethany House are (606) 679-8852 (crisis line) or (606) 679-1553 (business line).

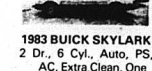

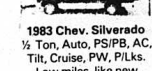

The play is freely adapted from Moliere's *Les Fourberies de Scapin*.

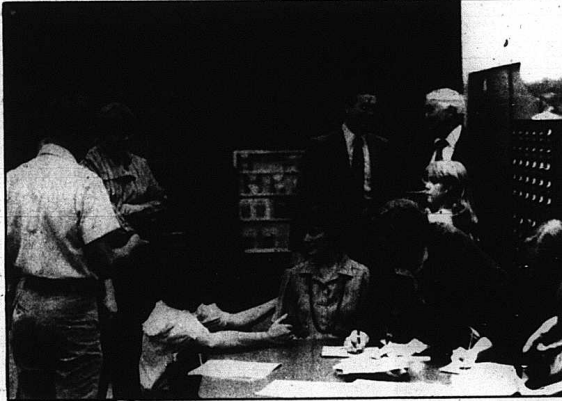
"What we're doing is trying to show the community we can do

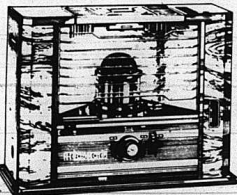

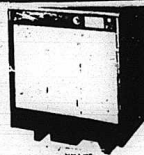
