**Troop 263 hikes Perryville Trail**

The Battle of Perryville was the most important Civil War engagement fought in Kentucky. In fact, some historians have come to believe that this battle was as decisive as any other during the entire four-year conflict, for it marked a fatal loss of Confederate initiative during 1862. After Perryville, Southern fortunes in the west declined steadily.

Briefly, the picture was this: Lt. Colonel Braxton Bragg, in command of the Army of Tennessee, CSA, launched a coordinated campaign to "free" Kentucky, a key border state. One army of 12,000 men under Maj. Gen. E. Kirby Smith moved northward from Knoxville, and by the end of August controlled Lexington and the central part of Kentucky. Bragg then marched his army of Chattanooga and moved toward Kentucky with the intention of linking forces with General Smith's men, thereby gaining command of the entire state.

During the heated and bloody afternoon, over 6,000 of the Blue and Gray were killed, wounded, or missing by nightfall.

As darkness came the Confederates had done very well: They seemed to have the best position and they had suffered less than half the casualties of the Union forces. Bragg, however, realized that only a portion of the Union Army had seen battle, so he began a midnight retreat to Harrodsburg and eventually to Tennessee. For some reason, General Buell permitted the Confederates to withdraw unmolested, an action that resulted in his being replaced as Union Commander.

"While neither side could claim decisive victory, this battle did mark the end of any serious attempt by the Southerners to gain possession of Kentucky.

Perryville Battlefield Celebration is held every year October 5, 6, and 7th and brings hundreds of campers and hikers from all over the state. Your local Troop 263 spent the week-end camping and hiked the Confederate Trek known as "The Dug Road March" which is approximately 15 miles. Later, the same day, they retraced the Union soldiers route known as the "The Dry Canteen Trail" which is approximately 13 miles.

Sunday afternoon in Perryville the famous battle was reenacted by the First Kentucky (Orphan) Brigade, led by Col. Louis C. Grietti.

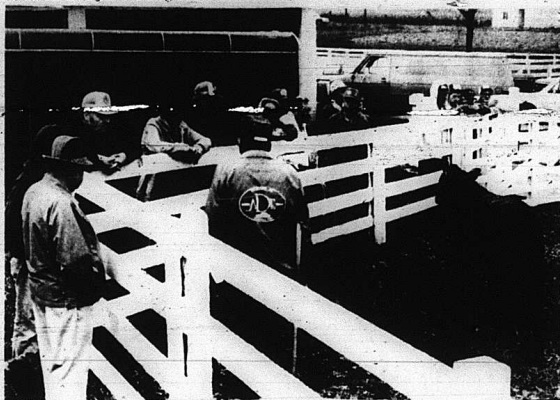

## Doug Pulley is enrolled at Kentucky School for Deaf

Doug Pulley of Rockcastle County is enrolled this year at the Kentucky School for the Deaf in Danville.

This school has the distinction of being the oldest state supported school for the hearing impaired in the nation. It is the fourth school to be established, the first west of the Allegheny Mountains, following the three private schools that were started in the New England area.

The Kentucky School for the Deaf has educated thousands of hearing-impaired children in its

161 years of existence. Beginning in 1823 with 17 children, it now has an enrollment of 335 from across the Commonwealth. Most of the children live in residence halls on campus. The preschool satellite program serves younger children in six regions across the state: Edanger, Pikeville, Hazard, Bowling Green, Paducah and

Danville. The curriculum emphasizes the learning of English, math, social studies and science. Physical education and vocational shops in 12 specialties round out its full program. Extracurricular activities include competitive sports in football, basketball, soccer, swimming and track and field, intra-

mural, clubs, playground recreation, crafts, games, field trips, swimming and etc.

Parents and family are encouraged to visit the school and students may go home as often as practicable.

The school is situated on 170 acres with many modern buildings, an excellent teaching staff and support personnel. Its reputation as one of the foremost schools for the deaf in the nation is recognized by national organizations serving the deaf. Supt. when Revenue Cabinet employees identified 23 companies that collectively owe in excess of \$1 million in unpaid taxes. The nature of the problem is multiplied when the employees concerned file for a refund of excess taxes withheld but never paid to the Revenue Cabinet by their employers. This amounts to a double embezzlement of public funds.

After Revenue identifies these possible violators, the cases are turned over to the Attorney General's office for further criminal investigation to develop evidence for presentation to the Grand Jury.

Gillis added that there are no particular types of businesses which are more subject to the withholding violations involved. The violators represent a cross-section of businesses throughout the state of Kentucky.

The Enforcement Legal Section of the Division of Collections has recently added investigative auditors whose primary duties will be to gather evidence for submission to the Attorney General's office. By increasing this section, the Revenue Cabinet hopes to accelerate review of all delinquent withholding files.

cultural software packages available for computers in the classroom.

# State tentatively approves landfill site near Livingston .....

### Landfill site approved, but county must correct deficiencies

Rockcastle County's proposed landfill site, which is to be located just off U.S. 25 near Pine Hill, was approved by the Ky. Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet. Waste Management Division, last week.

A cabinet hearing officer, J. Gregg Clendenin, filed his report in Frankfort on October 16th which gives the county the go-ahead for the new landfill, if they can meet six requirements laid down in the report.

Clendenin said in his report that, after listening to testimony during a public hearing on July 9 and 10 at the courthouse, it was his opinion that the suit, brought by Livingston area residents, did

not show that the proposed landfill was "more likely than not, if built and operated in the manner proposed by the county's application, to contaminate or adversely affect the City of Livingston's water supply."

However, Clendenin also included in his report the six areas in which the county must further comply before the application will be approved.

The areas include: 1) the operating equipment listed in the application is not accurate. 2) The leachate control system calculations do not take into account the amount of rainfall which falls directly on the filled areas of the landfill. 3) Insufficient monitoring wells provided for in the application. 4) The application does not

include an adequate plan for limiting unauthorized deposit of waste at the landfill. 5) The application lacked financial responsibility information and 6) neither the county's engineer or on-site supervisor has a clear understanding as to who is responsible for supervising the deposit and compaction of the liner in the landfill.

In his two paragraph conclusion, Clendenin wrote that the evidence presented by lawyers for Livingston-area residents failed to establish a basis for denial of the application; but, that the application would be approved by Cabinet Secretary Charlotte Baldwin only if the six deficiencies were corrected to the satisfaction of the Cabinet.

Rockcastle County Judge/Executive Bob Jasper said Monday that he was unsure of the next steps he or the Fiscal Court would take. "We've already spent all this money (\$21,000) and I think

we have a certain obligation," he said.

Local attorney Carl Clontz, who represented the county during the public hearing also said this week that, as of right now, he

has no plans for any other action. He said he had talked to the County Judge about the landfill

but at the present time, he was not planning any more legal action.

### Livingston area residents upset; approve new plan of action

Some 70 Livingston-area residents packed into the lunchroom at the Livingston Grade School Monday night to vote on a plan of action against the county's proposed landfill site.

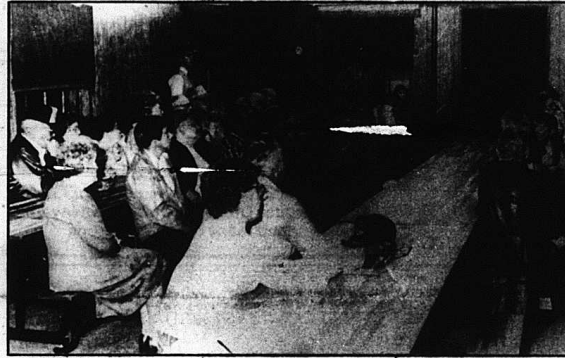
Don Martin, from the Appalachian Science in the Public Inte-

rest, told the crowd of the hearing officer's report and asked for suggestions as to what steps to take next.

Martin said that Larry York, one of the residents' lawyer, was "quite upset" with the decision. "He is going to write the Cabinet

and object to the opinion handed down, but we must come up with some ideas of our own to try and get this thing stopped," Martin said.

The meeting was called because of a state hearing officer's report on the county's proposed landfill site. The site has been approved but the county must correct several deficiencies before the state will issue a permit for them to proceed with the project.

### Hearing scheduled for new home health agency

A public hearing has been scheduled by the Kentucky Cabinet for Human Resources on a proposal by a Rockcastle County agency to begin home health care.

Under the proposal, Appalachian Medical, Ind., Home Health Agency of Mt. Vernon would establish service for Rockcastle and portions of Laurel Counties at no cost of capital funds.

Gary Cromer, part owner and operator of Appalachian Medical said in a story in the July 26th issue of the Signal, that the new Home Health Agency would be completely different from the Home Health Agency now in existence in the county.

Cromer said further that while Appalachian Medical would provide some general nursing facilities, their main emphasis will be on respiratory and physical therapy, a service that is not provided in the county at the present time. (Cont. to 12)

### County will receive grant for new fire truck for western Rockcastle

Residents of Western Rockcastle County can sleep a little easier these days.

Judy Lawless, of the Cumberland Valley Area Development District, said Tuesday that a grant, in the amount of \$35,000 has been approved for Rockcastle County to purchase a fire truck for the Brodhead Volunteer Fire Department.

Ms. Lawless said that although County Judge Executive Bob Jasper applied for the money in July of this year, it would not be released by the district until July of next year.

The CVADD, which serves an eight-county area, helps counties with problems such as getting state funding for needed items such as fire trucks, water lines, etc. Ms. Lawless said that Rockcastle's grant was held up because the CVADD board did not make it a priority for money set aside in fiscal year 1984.

She explained that the Kentucky Legislature sets up the district's budget for each biennium and that money was already allotted to other projects for this fiscal year.

However, Ms. Lawless went on to say that money would be released for the fire truck as soon as the county had advertised for and received bids on the truck.

### Fifth district Democrat rally

On Sunday, October 28 at 3 p.m., there will be a Fifth Congressional District Democrat Rally at Sweet Hollow Recreation Center in North Corbin.

Everyone is welcome and door prizes will be given.

Sen. Wendell Ford will be the speaker.

Judge Jasper said that he was sure the county would advertise for bids in Feb. or March of next year so that they could have the truck purchased as soon as possible. The Judge also said that members of the Brodhead Fire Department would help get the specifications ready for bid applications.

The grant application was made after the Brodhead Fire Department told county officials that they would have to cease county runs in the western part of Rockcastle unless they could get a different truck than they were now using. They made their appeal in the Spring of this year, on more than one occasion, at the county Fiscal Court meetings.

Residents in that part of the county went so far as to organize a committee to help find ways to get a truck. That committee also made appeals to the court in May of this year, which resulted in two motions, both of which were defeated. One motion was that the county borrow the money and buy a truck and the other was that the county borrow the money for a truck if the grant was not approved.

Although the grant has now been approved, Brodhead Fire Chief David Cash said this week that the \$35,000 would not be enough to purchase a truck. "That will get you a chassis, tank and pump," Cash said "and then you will have the equipment. I guess we'll have to get it as we can." Cash said that members of the department figured it would take about \$50,000 to get a truck in operating condition.

The fire chief said that the department would continue to fight county fires as long as they could but that a problem might arise this winter if a fire occurs on a bitterly cold night. He said that it would be difficult to get to a fire in the 1948 open cab truck that the department now uses on county

runs. Cash also said that the department uses a 3/4 ton truck to help fight county fires.

### Rogers' 16 million amendment for Hwy. 461 project defeated in Senate-House committee

An amendment, that would have created an additional 16 million dollars for the Hwy. 461 project, died in a United States House-Senate conference committee on October 11th.

The amendment, which was submitted to the House by 5th District Congressman Harold Rogers (R-Somerset), in June of this

year, originally passed the House by a vote of 297-73.

However, when the amendment, which was tacked onto the Surface Transportation Act of 1984, got to the Senate the going got tougher.

Earlier reports from Roger's

office were that the bill would get through the senate but that it might be vetoed by the President because it was somewhat over budget.

This was not the case as conferees in the House-Senate committee could not agree on

several parts of it.

If the amendment had passed, it would have made the Hwy. 461 project a \$33 million effort because the Commonwealth of Kentucky has already budgeted 17 million dollars in their six year road plan for the project.

### Rockcastle has new state trooper

Rockcastle County has a new Kentucky State Police Trooper. London KSP Public Affairs Officer Gilbert Acciaro, Jr., announced Tuesday that Joseph L. Schenkenfelder has been assigned to the county by the Captain at the London post.

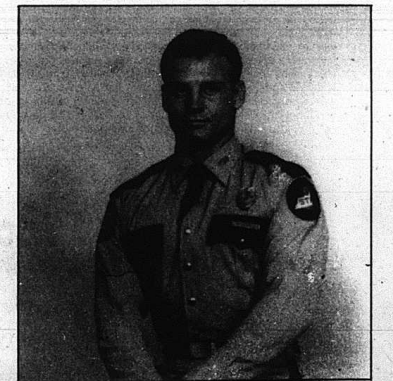
Acciaro said that Schenkenfelder has joined Troopers Jack Lawless and Jimmy Silvers in the county because of Trooper Daryl Presley's illness, forcing him to take sick leave.

The Public Affairs officers said that Schenkenfelder has been working in Rockcastle for about the last two months and will continue to work here for at least another six.

Trooper Schenkenfelder has been at the London post since his graduation from the State Police Academy in December of 1983, according to Acciaro, who said that Schenkenfelder was working in Laurel County before his assignment to this county. The native Louisvillian lives

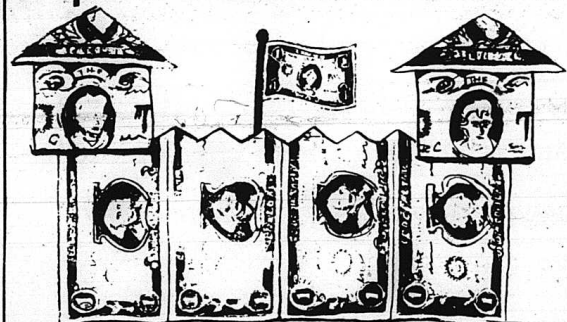

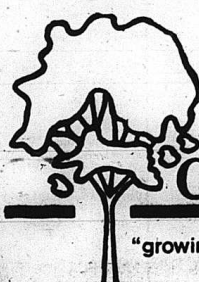

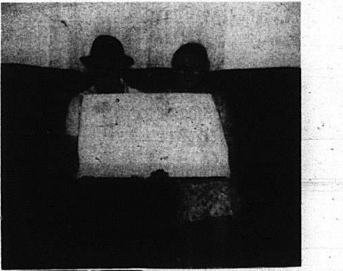
- 1. That the church of Christ is as good as another.

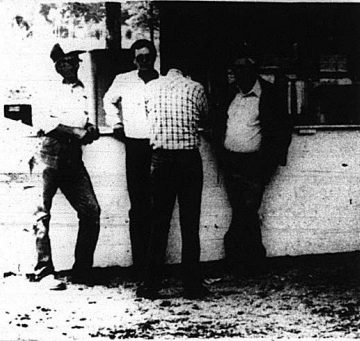

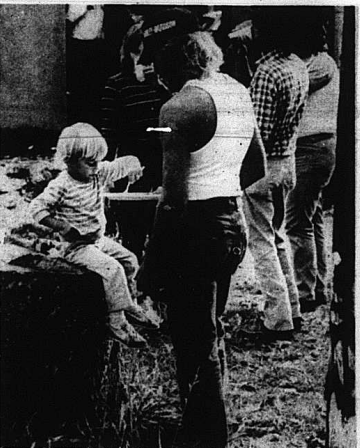

## Johnnie Coffee receives Sentinel Award from Seaboard railroad

Johnnie Coffey was awakened early one Sunday morning in June when the train that went by his house in Wildie made a strange sound.

Coffey discovered that the sound was caused by a broken rail on the track and reported it to the Corbin division of the Seaboard System Railroad. The railroad later awarded him a \$100 savings bond and their Sentinel Award, which was a plaque from Seaboard President Richard D. Sanborn.

The plaque read: "Presented to Johnnie Coffey who reported a broken rail at Wildie, Ky. June 24, 1984 preventing a possible derailment."

"One Sunday morning at 6

a.m. a train went south," said Coffey who retired five years ago from the Bluegrass Ordinance. "It made an unusual racket going over that piece that was broken out and it woke me up. I got up and put my clothes on and went out and found the piece of rail that had broken out."

Coffey wasn't sure what he should do and he first thought of calling someone near Wildie who works for the railroad. Finally, he decided to try to use the railroad phone located several hundred yards from his house.

After giving the chain on the phone a yank it came open and Coffey pressed the Corbin transmitter and said, "Hello, dispatcher."

When the Corbin dispatcher

answered Coffey told him the broken rail was located in front of Wildie Christian Church and that about a 12 inch piece had come off. The dispatcher then radioed a north-bound train to warn it and Coffey sat on his porch until it came by a little while later. The train stopped just where the broken rail and the engineer radioed the dispatcher to get permission to wedge the rail back in.

"They took a sledge hammer to it and it stayed," Coffey said. The train then headed north again, going over the piece about 5 m.p.h. to see if it would hold.

Coffey said two trains went north before a crew from Richmond got to Wildie around 10 a.m. to fix it. The crew cut out a

piece of rail and put coupling joints in it to hold it together.

The supervisors of the railroad who pass through Wildie turned Coffey's name in and told him he ought to get something for reporting the rail. About three months later the Corbin division superintendent, Donald R. Hutson, called Coffey to return him to home on September 10 because he had something for him.

"I kind of thought I might get a little bond or something like that," Coffey said. "I didn't dream I'd get a \$100 bond and a plaque, too." Coffey also got his picture and a story about the event in the September/October issue of the Seaboard System Railroad News, the company's publication which comes out of their headquarters in Jacksonville, Fla.

A break in the railroad doesn't happen very often in Wildie where the track divides the community in two. About four years ago, Astor McNew, who lives several houses down from the Coffeys, reported a broken rail and received a \$20 check from Seaboard.

McNew said he has lived there since 1951 and he and Coffey are the only persons he remembers having to report a broken rail.

Edith Coffey, Johnnie's wife, had got up early that morning and she also noticed that the train was making a funny noise. The couple said that they had lived by the railroad for 27 years and normally aren't awakened by trains that go by and don't stop. By detecting the broken rail they prevented a possible derailment that could have endangered the lives of the crew on the train as well as the persons living in the house close to the track at Wildie.

"What would Coffey have done if he had seen a train coming before he could report the rail? He laughed and said, "I'd have tried to flag it down--I don't know if I could have or not."
