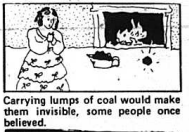

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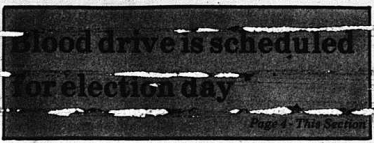
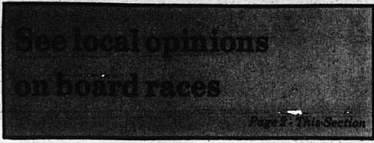

## Court accepts Sheriff's tax settlement

If you have been wondering where your property tax bill for 1984 is -- wonder no more. In a special called meeting of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court last week, magistrates voted to accept Rockcastle Sheriff William Taylor's settlement thus making it possible for him to send out the property tax bills for 1984. Taylor told the court that he owed them \$5,023 and presented them with a check in that amount. Tax bills are about six weeks late this year, because the Sheriff had been unable to collect the state's required total of 92%. The Sheriff's secretary, Michelle Robinson, said Tuesday that their office still had not collected the required amount but that the state had certified to because this year's bills needed to go out. Mrs. Robinson said the Sheriff had collected just over 90% of last year's taxes.

## School board races are main reason for 600 new voters

Election time 1984 is here and the time for decision is now. In past presidential election years, the focus for local politicians was on their presidential candidate but, this year, things are different. Only 5 percent of the voters in Rockcastle County went to the polls in the May Primary but local party heads are predicting a large turn-out for the General Election. Rockcastle Deputy County Clerk David Bales said this week that over 600 new voters have registered in the county since the Primary with an overall gain of around 400 voters, because, Bales said, approximately 200 voters were taken off the books. The Deputy Clerk attributed the gain in voters to the presidential race and to the two hotly-contested school board races. Of the 490 new voters, 340 of them registered in the two districts that have school board races, according to voter registration statistics on file in the clerk's office. In the precincts of Brown, North Brodhead and West Brodhead, which comprise the Second School Board District in the county, 195 more voters have registered since the May Primary. In the precincts of Conway, Roundstone and East Mt. Vernon, the Fifth School Board District, 145 new voters are on the books, leaving only 69 new registrars for the rest of the county. One other school board member is up for re-election -- Mrs. Edna Cameron in the Climax and Orlando precincts, however, she is unopposed and only 17 more voters registered in these two precincts. In the second district where the largest new voting block registered for the General Election, incumbent school board member of 18 years, Willie Taylor, will face newcomer to politics, Mrs. Shirley Long. In the 5th District, 16-year veteran of the school board Kenneth Adams will face Jack Wren, a Baptist minister and president of the Roundstone PTO. Some observers think that this year's General Election will have one of the largest voter turn-outs in the history of the United States and the Deputy

## School board cited by state over asbestos removal at Brodhead elementary

The Rockcastle County School Board has been cited by the

Kentucky Department of Labor, Occupational, Safety and Health program for violations that occurred during the removal of some asbestos material at the Brodhead Grade School. OSHA officials released the findings of an investigation, conducted at the school on August 17th, at which time they were looking for any asbestos related violations. The three count citation, released by the department, was listed as serious and involved the kindergarten room in the old agriculture building at Brodhead. The citation was issued because:

- A) The maintenance supervisor was not using a Type C, continuous flow or pressure-demand, supplied air respirator while removing asbestos insulation from an overhead duct in the kindergarten room.
  - B) The maintenance supervisor was not provided with and required to use special clothing such as coveralls or similar whole body clothing, head coverings, gloves and foot coverings while removing asbestos insulation from the overhead duct in the room and C) monitoring for air-borne asbestos fibers was not conducted during the asbestos removal from the overhead duct in the room by maintenance personnel.
- According to Michael Salyers of OSHA, the citation must be posted at or near the location of the violation for a three-day period or until the problem has been corrected and the school board must pay a fine of \$630 to the state. However, Salyer went on to say that the school board could contest the violation and fine.
- According to Brodhead School principal Tom Payne, the problem in the room was corrected a few weeks ago when the remainder of the asbestos in the room was removed by London Associates of Greenville. Rockcastle School Board Chairman Dr. K.R. Burdette submitted the following letter in regard to the citation by OSHA: "The Rockcastle County Board of Education has made an all out effort to rid its schools of asbestos materials. All asbestos materials pose a threat to the health of students or staff has been removed and the rooms have been properly tested and proven safe. An innocent act on the part of our maintenance personnel has resulted in a citation and fine by the Occupational, Safety, Health Association (OSHA). OSHA standards require workers to wear respirators and protective clothing while working with materials containing asbestos.

## Town Forum set for Nov. 15

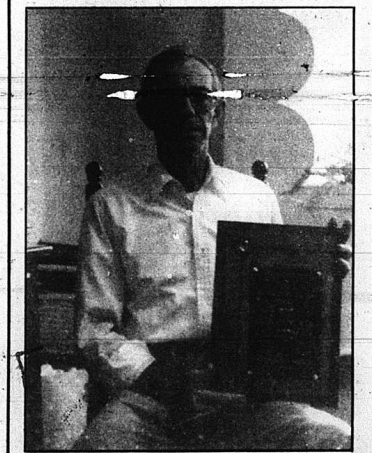

The state's Pritchard Committee for Academic Excellence has chosen to sponsor the Town Forums to be held throughout Kentucky on November 15th. The main purpose of the forums is to provide for expressions of opinion about what the public schools should be doing. The forums have been designed with a format which will allow as many people as possible to speak. At the same time, the format limits argument or extended debate on any particular issue.

The forums are the first step in an ongoing process of dialogue about quality education within each locale, and are a starting point from which will grow discussions and activities of many kinds on the local level. It is expected that many communities, relying on local resources, will continue the work begun by the forum. Full expression of opinions are encouraged at the forums and will accomplish several additional purposes as well. First, the forum should increase awareness of the need for improvement in education. Second, it should raise levels of concern about educational issues. Third, the forum should increase commitment to working for educational improvement. Fourth, the forum should broaden the base of participation and meaningful involvement in local efforts aimed at educational improvement. The forum should also be seen as the beginning of a statewide network of citizens concerned about quality education. To further this goal, and to ensure that the meetings are as worthwhile as possible, and are perceived as such, a publicly distributed report will summarize the results of the forums. Sponsors recognize that the purposes and intended outcomes of the forums are ambitious, especially given that there is a wide range of opinions and concerns about the public schools, and that only a limited amount of time can be scheduled for such a forum. Over the past few weeks, several people have taken the opportunity to express themselves concerning the Rockcastle County School System. Some have been complimentary, while others have been critical.

I have worked in the school system here for several years and I think we have good schools in Rockcastle County and we are trying our best to make them better. As you know, Rockcastle County is not a wealthy district, but by good management, we have been able to accomplish many positive things for our schools. For example:

- 1) Our test scores are up - Last year we out-ranked 46 other districts in the state. We out-scored 16 county districts in the 5th Congressional District, including Laurel, Lincoln, Clay and others.
- 2) Even though our drop-out rate is better than many other counties, we have started a drop-out prevention program this year.
- 3) Our attendance rate has always been at, or near, 90% average. A new program to improve attendance should put us well above the state average next year.
- 4) We have kindergarten programs at all elementary schools, with class size well within the proper pupil-teacher ratio.
- 5) Gifted and Talented programs have been expanded and are in their second year of operation.
- 6) New classrooms have been added at Roundstone and Livingston to relieve overcrowding.
- 7) New Fire Alarm-Heat Detector systems have been installed at Mt. Vernon, Brookhead, Roundstone and Livingston Schools.
- 8) A new baseball field has been built at RCHS.
- 9) More money has been made available for teaching supplies.
- 10) A computer lab has been installed at RCHS; and computers have been purchased for the elementary schools' curriculums.
- 11) The curriculum at RCHS has been expanded to include French as a second foreign language.
- 12) The elementary counseling program has been expanded and meets all state requirements.
- 13) Our buildings, even though some are old, are well kept, clean and safe.
- 14) Our school bus fleet is up to date, well maintained and safe.
- 15) Asbestos has been removed before it became harmful; all classrooms have been tested and proven safe.
- 16) The school board has approved a School Improvement Program, which should significantly increase test scores over the next few years. Mr. Bige Towery is in charge of the program and many aspects of the program are under way.

The list of accomplishments could go on, but you can see we are making progress. Regardless of what local critics may say, our school system is recognized statewide as being a good and progressive system.

We will continue to operate our schools with dedication and integrity.

More than 350 of Kentucky's future leaders will participate in a "varsity sport of the mind," this year when "KET Scholastic Challenge" airs for Kentuckians. On Thursday, November 1, at 7 p.m. (ET), 12 noon (CT), six Kentucky high schools will compete for the championship in this academic quiz show which tests the proficiency of students in history, math, english and science.

"KET Scholastic Challenge" is now entering its third season, was developed by KET to help operate increased interest in education in Kentucky. Producer Sally Jackson, who has been with the program since its inception, says, "It is extremely gratifying to see these bright, young Kentuckians who are bucking the odds as far as Kentucky education statistics are concerned. On November 6th, 1984 be sure to vote for the candidate of your choice - and give a pint of blood. Blood donations are crucial for transfusions due to accidents and surgery in Rockcastle County and the Central Kentucky area.

The Rockcastle County Home-makers will be sponsoring the 3rd and final drive for 1984 on Tuesday at the Bank of Mt. Vernon from 10 a.m. - 7:30 p.m. The first two drives of the year fell far short of their goals to achieve blood assurance for Rockcastle County.

Each citizen is reminded that their unselfish donation of a pint of blood is needed to provide continued coverage for themselves and their families throughout the next year.

Kentucky's 5th District Congressman Harold Rogers (R-Somerset) is also up for re-election and many think that his chances for re-election are even better than Huddleston's. Rogers will face Democrat Sherman McIntosh of Williamsburg in his bid for a third term.

There are three other local races on the ballot, and only one candidate for each: Danny Ford, 80th District State Representative, is unopposed in his bid for a second term. Ford was elected in 1981 and has served the district for three years and two General Assemblies. This election is for a two-year term. Ford represents all of Rockcastle and portions of McCreary, Pulaski and Lincoln.

District Judge William T. Cain, who was appointed to fill the unexpired term of now Circuit Judge Daniel Venters, is also unopposed as is Livingston Mayor Bro. Billy Medly, who was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Bobby Wilson, who resigned. Medley is running for Wilson's unexpired term which ends in January of 1985.

One constitutional amendment question will also appear on the ballot and voters should be aware of it - the question of whether Kentucky Sheriffs should be allowed to succeed themselves. This question will appear on the ballot in the far right-hand corner.

In the 1981 General Election, the Governor's office and all state-wide offices were grouped with the Sheriff and the amendment was defeated by more than a 2 to 1 margin across the state.

Senator Walter "Dee" Huddleston's office released figures last week of a poll they had conducted across the state, which showed that the amendment had a very good chance of passing this fall.

One note of interest - there are seven other Presidential candidates on the ballot in the state of Kentucky besides President Reagan and challenger, former vice-president Walter Mondale.

Remember, this year's election is next Tuesday and the polls open at 6 a.m.

There is only one voting booth

Clerk said that he thinks that this will hold true in Rockcastle as well.

But, Bales said that in the county election, 3 years ago, about 5,362 voters turned out in Rockcastle for a percentage of just over 65%. He said that, in his opinion, turn-out will not exceed the 1981 totals this year. "County election years are always the largest voter turn-out and I don't think that the turn-out this year will exceed 1981," Bales said. However, he went on to say that absentee ballots requested thus far have exceeded the number requested in the 1981 county election.

One race that local party workers will be watching closely this year is that of United States Senator.

Two-term incumbent Walter "Dee" Huddleston (D-Elizabethtown) is facing Republican Jefferson County Judge/Executive Mitch McConnell. Experts say that McConnell has little, if any, chance to unseat the popular Huddleston but local Republican County Chairman Alonzo McCollum is optimistic. "If Mitch can carry the 5th District (of which Rockcastle is a part) by 25,000 votes and he wins in Jefferson County, he has got a good chance," McCollum said at a recent Republican rally.

## USE YOUR FREEZER FOR PRECOOKED FOODS

Make that vacant space in your freezer work for you. Freeze prepared and precooked foods for emergency meals for planning

parties and dinners for the holidays ahead. Quantity preparation of food saves future hours in meal planning and preparation.

Points to keep in mind when freezing cooked foods:

1. Freeze only high quality foods. Freezing does not improve the product.
2. When deciding whether to freeze a food before or after baking, consider not only the quality of the product, but also the economy of the fuel.
3. Use reliable recipes and standard measuring cups and spoons.
4. Avoid overcooking of foods in preparation for freezing. The cooking will be completed when steams and casseroles are reheated for serving.
5. Fresh potatoes become mushy and grainy when frozen in liquid. Cook and eat at the time you are reheating steams and casseroles.
6. Hard-cooked egg whites toughen upon freezing.
7. Fats separate from sauces and gravies, but usually recombine after reheating. Use correct proportion of fat, flour, and liquid for best results.
8. Mayonnaise will separate when frozen; salad dressings will not.
9. Quick cooling of the food immediately after it is cooked stops the cooking and so helps keep the natural flavor, color and texture of the food. It also retards or prevents the growth of bacteria that may cause spoilage.

## USE YOUR FREEZER MORE EFFECTIVELY

Cooked foods lose flavor quickly and should be used within two weeks to 2 months. Be sure to serve within this time. Freeze amount of food needed for one meal. Do not refreeze foods once it has been thawed.

Packaging is important for a good product. Wrap foods in a moisture-vapor proof freezer wrap - waxed side in, or use plastic freezer boxes, freezer bags, or glass jars. Leave enough head space to allow for expansion, excluding as much air as possible.

Keep inventory of frozen cooked foods. Label each package for product and date stored. Keep inventory at freezer of what is in it and check the inventory when you

Almost any food that is cooked and frozen commercially can be frozen in the home freezer at 0 Celsius.

# Rockets end season with 46-20 loss to Knox Central

It was probably the most heart-breaking loss of the season for the Rockets, although the 46-20 scores wouldn't exactly indicate that. But, the heartbreak part was that of the 7 touchdowns scored by the Knox Central Panthers, 5 of them were the result of either a Rocket fumble (2) or interceptions (3). Another came after a fake punt by the Panthers. Only one was the result of a sustained drive.

Of course, it didn't help matters that senior center Troy Williams, senior lineman Tim Roberts and junior tackle Raymond Miracle, three key players, had to watch the final game from the sidelines because of injuries. Williams and Miracle in the Cawood game and Roberts because of a knee injury in the Wayne County game.

The Rockets threatened early in the first quarter after two runs by senior Garry Fain for 37 yards, put the ball on the Knox Central 47 yard line. Johnny Poynter then gained 8 for the Rockets and Mike Bryant picked up 5 yards to make it 3rd and goal on the 4.

Sophomore quarterback Brian McGuire then tried to hit wide receiver Alan Hammonds in the end zone but the ball was underthrown and a Knox Central defender was there to pick it off and run the ball back 100 yards for the first TD of the game.

After an unsuccessful drive by the Rockets, Knox Central began their next drive from their own 46 and, early in the second quarter, the Panthers scored their second touchdown on a pass into the end zone from the 13 yard line. The extra point attempt was good and the Panthers led 14-0 with 11:39 remaining in the second quarter.

The second disaster of the night then overtook the Rockets as, on their first play from scrimmage, following the kick-off, a Rockets' fumble was covered by the Panthers on the Rockets' 39 and, on the next play, the Knox

Central quarterback found his man open for the third Panther score with 10:30 left in the half. The kick for the extra point was no good.

Poynter was called on three times straight on the Rockets' next series but to no avail as the Rockets had to punt the ball away on 4th and 7. Knox Central took the punt and, following a clipping penalty against Knox Central, began their series on their own 38.

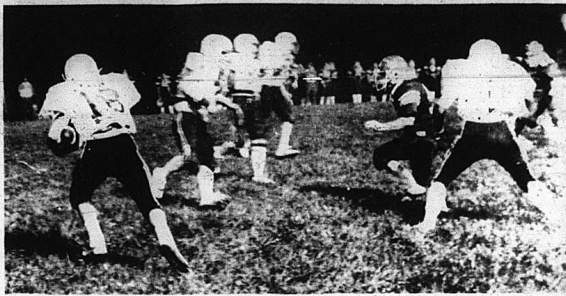

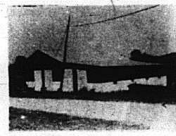

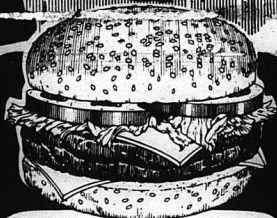

Scapino is a follow-up to the council's successful summer musical *Once Upon a Mattress*.

"There are people in the county who do enjoy this sort of thing and after this summer the county is now learning that anything labeled 'presented by the Rockcastle Council for the Arts' is going to be top quality and is something not to be missed," said Allen Pensol, the play's 29-year-old director.

## Local school system sets priorities for winter

When the snow begins to fall in Rockcastle County this winter, the state transportation crew will be out to clear the roads, said State Transportation Secretary Floyd G. Poore.

To help motorists plan their winter driving, the Transportation Cabinet has announced which roads will be cleared first.

The roads are cleared as soon as precipitation becomes significant. Crews set out with salt or pines to clear the top priority roads first. The priority system is based on the traffic carried by the road.

Top priority roads include interstates, parkways, urban ex-

pressways and other state roads with exceptionally large volumes of traffic.

Second priority roads are state primary roads, bypasses and roads with slightly less traffic.

State secondary roads, rural secondary roads and other routes with equal traffic fall into the third category.

Remaining state roads are cleared after these categories have been treated.

The Somerset district office is responsible for clearing the roads in Rockcastle County.

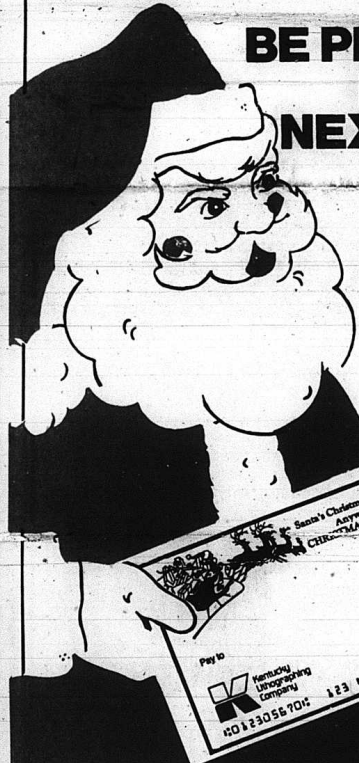
Motorists can plan their trips more safely by using top priority roads whenever possible during bad winter weather.

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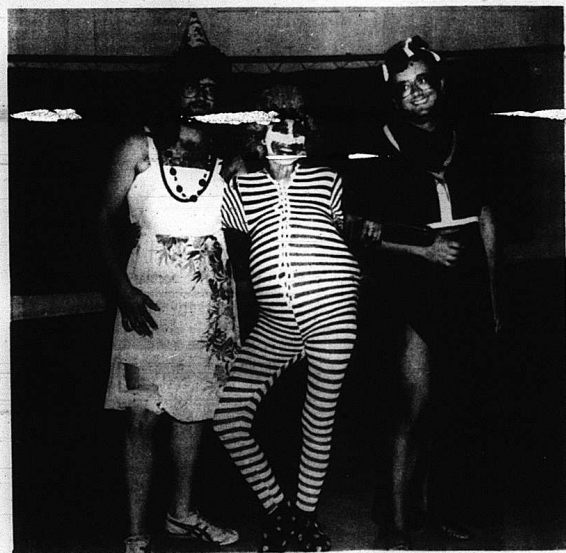

I. Notice is hereby given that a public hearing will be held by the Rockcastle County Senior Citizens, Incorporated. The hearing is to be conducted Monday, December 3, 1984, at the Rockcastle County Senior Citizens Center at Mount Vernon, Kentucky. The hearing is to be conducted for the purpose of considering a project for which Federal operating, capital and administrative assistance under Section 18 of the Urban Mass Transportation Act of 1964, as amended, is being sought, generally described as follows:

### A. Description of Project

(1) The Rockcastle County Senior Citizens, Incorporated proposed to expand their transportation service to all of Rockcastle County starting January 1, 1985. The service will be a semi-fixed route, demand responsive service open to the general public.

(2) The Rockcastle County Senior Citizens, Incorporated is located in the Public Library Building in Mount Vernon, Kentucky.

(3) The transportation service project cost is \$21,100 in Federal funds and \$7,075 in local funds. The local share will be provided by Title III and the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court (linking).

"No persons, families, or businesses will be displaced by this project."

The proposed project will not have a significant environmental impact upon the urban/service area.

The project is in conformance with comprehensive land use and transportation planning in the area.

The project will take into consideration the special needs of the elderly and handicapped. The applicant will comply with Federal Section 504 regulations concerning the non-discrimination on the basis of handicap.

II. At the hearing, the Rockcastle County Senior Citizens, Incorporated will afford an opportunity for interested person or agencies to be heard with respect to the social, environmental and economic aspects of the project. Interested persons may submit orally or in writing evidence and recommendations with respect to said project.
