Tobacco price steady at \$1.88 average

After 5 days of sales, the average price for Kentucky's biggest cash crop is holding steady.

The average across the state on the first day of sales on November 19th was just over \$1.87, and after five complete days of sales, the average price across the state is around \$1.88.

Reports from most of the tobacco markets close to Rockcastle is that the grade of this year's crop is much higher than last year's drought-stricken burley.

Tom Mills, Rockcastle's county agent for agriculture said that most farmers in the county had at least some of their tobacco stripped while others, he said, had already finished and cashed this year's tobacco.

Mills said that he thought most farmers in the county would be done stripping by the first of the year. He said that this year's norm is that most farmers have all of the weight they are allowed to sell and have a better product to offer to the buyers.

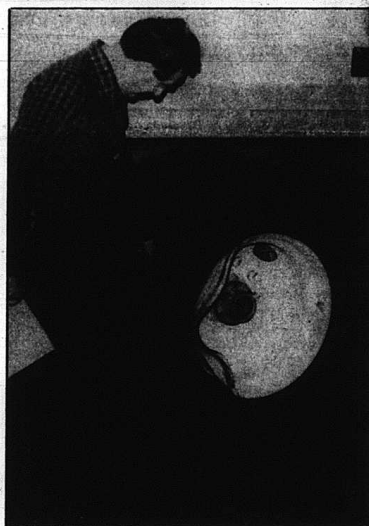
State will resurface 95.4 miles locally

Local woman killed Monday night on 150 near Brodhead

A Rockcastle County woman is dead, the result of a hit and run accident on Hwy. 150 just west of Brodhead.

According to Kentucky State Police reports, Evelyn Sargent, 59, of Brodhead was traveling west on 150 approximately 1/4 mile from Brodhead when her 1973 Monte Carlo was hit by a transfer truck driven by an Atlanta, Georgia man.

The wreck occurred in what is commonly known as the "Doc Payne" curve at 8:45 p.m. Monday night.

Police said that the transfer truck, driven by Hollis Ray Durham, 29, of Atlanta, Georgia did not stop at the scene after it collided with Ms. Sargent's vehicle.

An eyewitness told Brodhead police officer Bill Lawrence that the truck did not stop after hitting the Sargent vehicle, and Lawrence radioed ahead to Kentucky State Trooper Jim Silvers, who stopped Durham in Mt. Vernon.

Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell, who pronounced Ms. Sargent dead at the scene, said that she died instantly of multiple head injuries.

Silvers said Tuesday that he charged Durham with reckless homicide, leaving the scene of an accident, driving while under the influence and hit and run.

According to Pat Brock, a clerk in the Circuit Clerk's office, Durham's bail was set at \$60,000 cash by District Judge Michael Cain. Durham is presently being held in the county jail, and his case will be presented to the Rockcastle County grand jury when it convenes on Friday.

Silvers said that Durham told him that he did not know that he

had been involved in an accident and that he was unaware that he had left the scene of one.

Ms. Sargent's death was the fourth such traffic fatality on Rockcastle County roads this year.

Ms. Sargent was born on August 15, 1925 in Rockcastle County, the daughter of the late Ancel and Maudie Denny Vaughn.

She is survived by one son, Russell E. Durham of Dayton, Ohio; one daughter, Mrs. Alice Janette Butler of Rt. 1, Brodhead; two brothers, Walter and Elmer Vaughn, both of Rt. 1, Brodhead; three sisters, Mrs. Thelma Gregg and Miss Ines Vaughn, both of Rt. 1, Brodhead, and Mrs. Helen Evans of Aurora; 11, eight grandchildren. She was preceded in death by her husband, Paul Sargent.

Funeral services will be held Thursday, November 29 (today), at 2:00 p.m. at the Watson Funeral Home Chapel with Bro. Ronnie Mounts officiating.

Interment will be in the Saylor Cemetery.

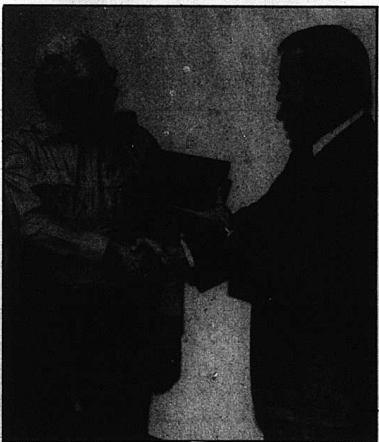

Vernon by the two men and that she did not go on her own. However, police think different.

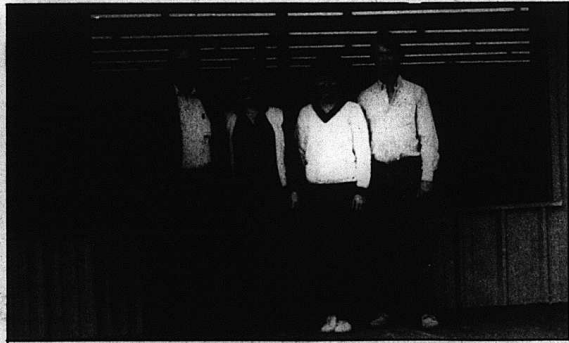
Local authorities as well as a spokesman for the F.B.I. in London say that they are treating the case as a runaway and not kidnapping.

HOLIDAYS BRING DRUNKEN DRIVING WARNING

The holiday season, known for its festive events, also has a darker side: It's the time of year when there is a rise in the number of people killed in traffic accidents. Many of these accidents are caused by drunken drivers.

Christmas and the New Year's holidays put more people on the highways. Because so many people still ignore the dangers of driving drunk, accidents occur. The known "high risk" of the holidays was one of the reasons the 98th Congress designated Dec. 9-15 as "National Drunk and Drugged Driving Awareness Week."

About 42,000 Americans lost their lives in traffic accidents last year. And thousands more were injured, many crippled permanently. The cost of drunken driving to society has been estimated at more than \$24 trillion per year. Of course, the cost of human suffering which resulted is impossible to measure.

On a positive note, the number of traffic deaths over the three-day New Year's holiday last year was the lowest since 1949. But this does not diminish the gravity of the loss of 282 people during that period in 1983.

It is likely that stiffened state and local sentences for alcohol- and drug-related traffic offenses greatly reduced traffic deaths. A law recently passed by Congress is also expected to further help reduce these deaths. Currently drunken driving is the leading cause of death among Americans ages 15 to 24. This new law encourages states to raise their drinking age to 21, a limit Kentucky has had since the late 1800s.

While stiffened laws have helped reduce traffic deaths, greater public awareness must also be credited. It is hoped that publicity resulting from this awareness week will cause the number of traffic deaths over this holiday season to be lower than ever.

The best way to defend against drunken drivers, according to safety officials, is to use safety belts. They also say this would increase the number of traffic accident survivors.

In addition to discouraging friends and family members from driving drunk, it is everyone's responsibility to report drunken drivers they see on the roads to police. Someone's life might depend on it.

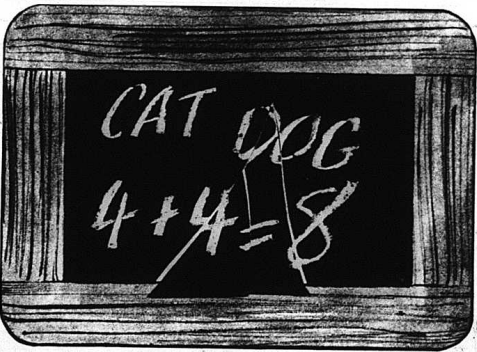

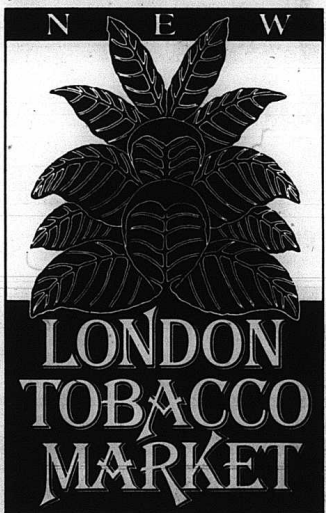
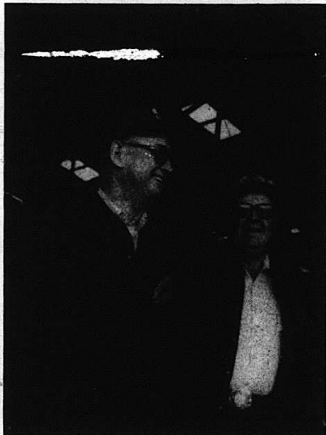

beat until light and fluffy. Add eggs, sweet potatoes, milk and orange rind. Beat with mixer until thoroughly combined. Add flour, nutmeg and allspice to sweet potato mixture with nutmeg. Mix thoroughly until smooth. Turn batter into prepared pan. Bake for 45 to 50 minutes. Let cool in pan 10 minutes. Remove to cake rack. Cook before slicing. Note: If using all-purpose flour, sift 3 teaspoons baking powder and 1 teaspoon salt with flour. Makes 1 loaf (36 1/4" slices). (77 Calories/slice)

Pineapple Cheesecake
1 cup Graham cracker crumbs
3 tablespoons margarine, melted
3 oz. packaged lemon-flavored gelatin

1 cup boiling water
1 1/2 pounds low-fat cottage cheese
2 tablespoons sugar
8 1/2 oz. can crushed pineapple packed in natural juices or light syrup
1 tablespoon starch
2 teaspoons cornstarch

Mix crumbs and margarine, press into bottom of an 8" square pan and chill. Dissolve gelatin in boiling water and cool until lukewarm. Blend cottage cheese and sugar with a hand mixer or fork. Slowly add the dissolved gelatin and mix well. Pour the above into crush mixture and chill until firm. Stir cornstarch and tablespoon of water in a saucepan until smooth. Blend pineapple and its juice into cornstarch mixture and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Cool 15 minutes. Spread cooled pineapple mixture

over cheesecake and chill 1 hour or more. Makes 12 servings. (145 calories/serving)

Barbecued Turkey

2 cups cooked chopped turkey
1 onion, diced
1 tablespoon cooking oil
1/2 cup catsup
2 tablespoons chili sauce
1 teaspoon prepared mustard
1 teaspoon vinegar
1 teaspoon sugar

Cook onion in oil until transparent. Add remaining ingredients. Mix well. Simmer about 20 minutes, uncovered. Spoon into hamburger buns. Makes about 5 servings. (170 calories/serving)

Carrot Squares

1/2 cup margarine (1 stick), melted
1 cup brown sugar, packed
2 eggs
2 cups all-purpose flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup chopped walnuts (opt.)
2 cups finely grated carrots

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Grease a 12X9X2" pan (or two 8X8X2" pans). In large bowl, mix margarine and sugar until blended. Beat in eggs. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Add flour mixture, walnuts, and grated carrots to bowl and stir until blended. Pour into greased pan(s) and bake for 30 minutes. Cut squares while slightly warm. Makes about 2 1/2 dozen squares. (107 Calories/square) If walnuts are omitted, calories are reduced to 94/square. May be frozen.

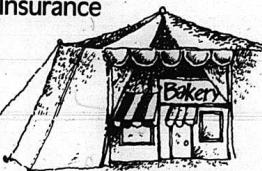

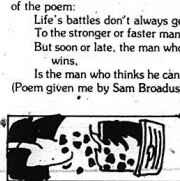

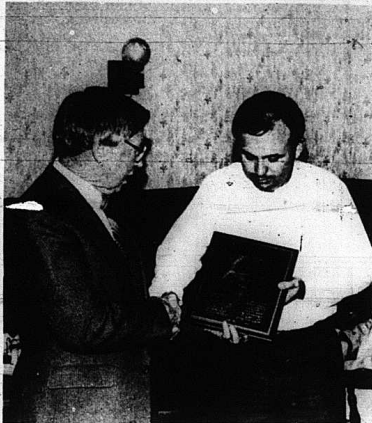

Get First-Calf Heifers On Target Early

Paying attention to important details such as weaning weights, feed rations and breed combinations can mean getting calves sooner and getting more calves over the entire productive lives of heifers born last spring.

Many Kentucky beef cattle producers have weaned spring heifers that are lightweight because of the dry summer. Producers need to feed these spring heifers to get maximum growth this winter so they can be bred by May 1st. We call this the target weight concept.

The target weight approach takes into consideration a heifer's genetic potential, which is influenced by the heifer's breed combination. Knowing that combination, a producer has a good idea of how heavy that heifer needs to be at fresh puberty at 14 or 14½ months old. If producers know each heifer's weaning weight and projects how heavy she should be May 1, then they can calculate the average daily gain and determine the ration balance to meet the need.

The first step in the target weight concept is to have a controlled breeding season, which is a short breeding season and a short calving season. To achieve this, producers need to start off their first-calf heifers right. All first-calf heifers within a group should calve in a short period of time, early in the calving season. Early means about 20 days before the calving season of the main herd, which is February for most producers.

Many producers say that is a cool time to calve and the other cows aren't calving then. But, that is the whole point—we want those first-calf heifers to start calving a little early so the manager can give them more attention. First-calf heifers need to be checked two or three times a day and a couple of times at night when they are calving.

The most critical time in a heifer's life comes right after calving. The heifer is recovering from the stress of the birth, she is still growing, and she is producing milk for her calf. And, most importantly, she has to get bred again for her second calf.

If the first-calf heifers are through calving by the time the rest of the herd begins to calve, then they have more time to adjust to their calves and to get bred back by May 1st. Getting bred back at that time puts the first-calf heifers in sync in terms of producing calves every year for the rest of their productive lives.

UK research demonstrations have shown that feeding cattle according to the target weight concept allows more heifers to reach puberty and to conceive during a breeding season than does feeding all the heifers the same.

For the past two years, a project at the Henderson Settlement, a cooperative farm in Bell County, has resulted in all heifers calving early in the season and being bred back with a high rate of success.

In both years, the conception rate for the second calf has been 90 percent. The normal conception rate for breeding back first-calf heifers has been 50 to 60 percent.

The total cow herd conception rate in the Henderson Settlement demonstration has been 96.8 percent. This shows that the target weight concept principles work and they are important to the total cow herd from a reproductive standpoint.

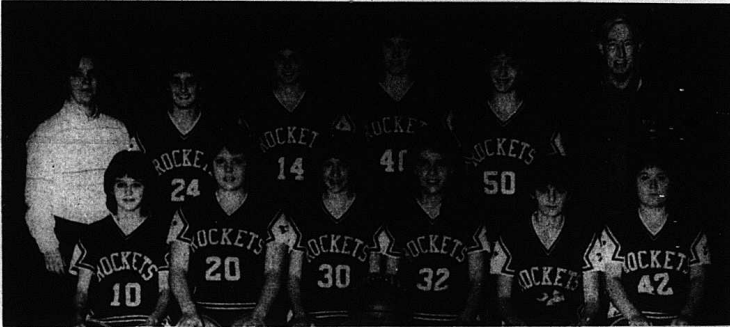

A Lake Linville Critical Area Treatment Project sponsored by the Rockcastle Conservation District and the City of Mt. Vernon is in the process of being completed.

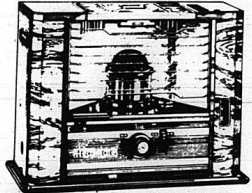
The project which is being carried out through the Cumberland Valley RCD Council, involves both roadbank seeding and tile drainage in the two ball fields.
