Clark's third attempt passes

## Magistrates vote proposed landfill site down

After two previous tie votes on motions to withdraw the county's application for a landfill from the state, a third motion finally passed.

At Tuesday's regular monthly meeting of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court, a motion by fifth district magistrate Joe Clark to withdraw the application was passed unanimously by the other

four magistrates. County Judge-Executive Bob Jasper, who had voted against withdrawing the application on the other two previous occasions, told the court members that he wanted to hold off on such a vote in order to keep the state off the county's back. Jasper did not vote on Clark's motion at all Tuesday.

Jasper said that, if the application was withdrawn, the county would be without a plan for

their garbage disposal, and state law requires such a plan by December of 1985.

Nevertheless, each magistrate voted "yes" with third district magistrate Alex Albright and fifth district magistrate Donald Rowe saying that they had gone and looked at the site, and that although they were not engineers, they did not think the site was suitable at all for a landfill.

"I wouldn't put my hogs down there," said Joe Clark, and Albright asked, "have you been down there and looked at that site, Judge?"

The county has spent over \$21,000 on the project which is on the shelf now, and Livingston area residents, who have opposed the landfill from the start because of its potential threat to their water supply, are looking at the latest action with caution.

"We are very pleased with what happened here today, but we are going to be watching very close to make sure that the permit is indeed withdrawn," said Danny Hitton of the Southeastern Rockcastle County Concerned Citizens. During the meeting, members of the group had at least two tape recorders in the court room, and many of the residents were waiting for copies of the minutes from the County Clerk's office Tuesday afternoon.

In making his third withdrawal motion in four meetings, Clark told the court members that "these people don't want it, and the county can't afford it."

Magistrate Donald Rowe told the court that "the site that he had previously looked at and was told that the landfill would be built on was not even the right site.

While the proposed landfill site is on the shelf, the Signal learned last week that the site which was approved in October was turned down three years ago in the John Y. Brown administration because of the cost to the county of bringing the site up to the state's standards.

The site would have been located just off U.S. 25 near Pine Hill, on the property that was owned by Linda and Emmett Foster.

## Cotton, Prewitt captured in Winchester by state police

Two local men that escaped from the Rockcastle County Jail a few weeks ago have been apprehended.

According to Kentucky State Police at the London post, Gerald Cotton, 27, of Mt. Vernon, and Jeff Prewitt, 23, also of Mt. Vernon, were arrested Tuesday morning in Winchester.

Police said that neither Cotton nor Prewitt offered any resistance when police entered the apartment where the two men were lodged over a pool hall on North Main Street.

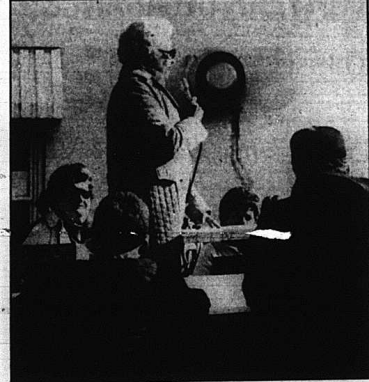
Both men have been held in the Pulaski County Jail on an order from Rockcastle County Circuit Judge Dan Venters. Venters placed the men in Pulaski County because of security reasons, according to state police.

Kentucky State Police Detective Ernie Boggs had conducted an extensive investigation into the jail break and is the officer in charge of the case.

Both men will be arraigned in Rockcastle County Circuit Court later this month, according to records on file in the Clerk's office.

Bonita Dale Carter, the 13-year old juvenile who was reportedly with the two men for much of their time from justice, had apparently returned home several days ago and has been put in the custody of her father, according to state police.

Cotton was awaiting a preliminary hearing under a \$20,000 bond on several charges at the time of his escape, and Prewitt was already serving time for a conviction.

## It will be impossible to license car without proof of insurance after first of year, deputy clerk says

A new state law which goes into effect on January 1st will make it impossible to license a motor vehicle in the state of Kentucky without proof of liability insurance, and the existing law will be broadened to ensure that all taxes on the vehicle are paid.

Rockcastle County Deputy Clerk David Bales said Tuesday that after the first of the year it will be illegal to issue registration on any motor vehicle without prior seeing proof of insurance on that particular vehicle.

Proof of insurance stickers which motorists have been required to attach to a rear window will no longer be any good. It simply won't be possible under the new law to buy a license plate for a vehicle without satisfying the County Clerk's office that it is insured.

A spokesman for the Property and Casualty Division of the State's Department of Insurance said the minimum liability policy will be required for acceptance by county clerks for vehicle licensing purposes. The minimum since July 13th of this year has been \$25,000 on each person, \$50,000 total for each accident, and \$10,000 property damage for each accident.

A law already in effect is aimed at halting a common practice of not paying property taxes on a motor vehicle, and the collection net for that law will be tightened in the coming year.

In the past, many persons didn't bother to pay tangible

personal property taxes on their vehicles, and in most cases the amount was too small for the sheriff to make more than a token collection effort. Some motorists even licensed their cars in another county, knowing full well that they wouldn't be forced by the sheriff of a neighboring county to pay a delinquent tax bill.

Effective this year, motorists in Rockcastle County are required to pay county, state, library, health, agricultural and school taxes on vehicles being licensed. A similar collection net applies in all 120 counties.

Also, insurance companies are required by law to furnish policyholders on or before January 1st written proof (a card) that the company has in effect an insurance contract providing security in conformity with KRS 304.29. The law even sets the size of the Proof of Insurance card—2 1/4 inches by 3 1/2 inches. Slight variations are permitted.

On the card must be the name of insurance company and the state Department of Insurance three-digit code number, name of the insured, effective date of the policy and policy number, year, make or model and vehicle identification number.

But, suppose someone decides he or she will skirt the law and take advantage of some insurance companies' leniency which allows a motorist, short of cash, to purchase liability insurance for three months. He then takes his Proof of Insurance card to the County Clerk to get his car license plates and then lets the liability insurance contract expire.

According to the new law, it won't work.

Here's what happens according to the Department of Insurance.

Every insurance company shall, within one week following the end of its account month, send to the Department of Motor Vehicle Regulation a list of all persons insured by them whose policy was terminated by either cancellation or non-renewal, and the list is required to include a

description of the vehicle.

The Department of Motor Vehicle Regulation, upon notification from an insurance company of cancellation or non-renewal, shall immediately initiate the insured of the company's action and that the insured has 10 days to show proof of insurance to the county clerk.

If the evidence of insurance is not provided within 10 days, the county shall notify the County Clerk.

The court members voted unanimously to help out the city on the grant with an estimated donation of over \$1,000 for the trucks and labor.

Charles Mullins Land Surveyors and Shivel Construction Company have already pledged donations in labor of \$450.

Attorney for prosecution, according to Bales.  
Penalties for motorists who violate provisions of the law include a fine of not less than \$500 or more than \$1,000, license plates suspended for a year or until proof of insurance is furnished to the satisfaction of the commissioner of the Kentucky Department of Insurance, or revocation of operator's license in accordance with KRS 186.560.

"The new law will be a benefit to insurance companies because everyone will have to have insurance," said Bales, "but it would also cause a lot of companies to take risks that they would not normally take in order for people to get their cars licensed."

#### A SOUP-ER MEAL IDEA FOR WINTER

During cold winter months, nothing is quite as tempting and satisfying as a big bowl of hot soup, served as an appetizer or an entree in combination with sandwiches or other foods. Soups are also an economical way to serve a meal and a good way to use leftover foods.

There is no limit to the number and variety of soups. Soups generally go into three categories: thick, clear soups such as broths, bouillons and consommés; thin, light, delicate soups such as bisques, cream soups and vegetable broths; and thick, hearty soups or chowders made from meat, poultry, fish and/or vegetables.

The blender will be handy for processing vegetables for cream soups and the pressure cooker speeds up cooking fresh or leftover meats for the hearty soups.

Some soups need the addition of a thickener to give the soup more body. Either cereals or flour may be added. When adding cereals, such as barley, rice or oatmeal, bring the soup to a boil, make the addition, then reduce the heat again to simmer. Raw cereal should be stirred into the soup for the last hour of cooking.

While nothing compares with homemade soups, quick, good soups can be made by starting with canned soup as a base, and

adding your own touches.

Different flavors of canned soups also can be combined for tasty combinations. One such combination is: 1 can condensed beef noodle soup and 1 can condensed tomato soup mixed with 1 cup can of water and 1 "soup can of milk and heated.

Make your own cream soup, starting with a thin white sauce: Melt 1 tablespoon fat in a double boiler, add 1 tablespoon flour and one-half teaspoon salt and stir until smooth. Add 1 cup milk and stir until thick for one cup sauce.

The cream soup is prepared by using 4 cups of the sauce and 1 cup of cooked vegetable, meat or fish. The vegetable may be pureed or diced. If soup must stand before serving, cover and hold over hot water.

For a wintertime favorite, vegetable beef soup, you'll need:

- 3 pounds beef shank or soup meat
  - 2 1/2 cups tomato juice
  - 1/3 cup chopped onion
  - 4 teaspoons salt
  - 2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
  - 1/4 teaspoon chili powder
  - 2 bay leaves
  - 1 pound can tomatoes
  - 1 cup diced celery
  - 1 cup sliced carrots
  - 1 cup diced potatoes
  - 1 small can whole kernel corn
- Combine meat, tomato juice, onion, seasonings and 6 cups water in soup kettle. Cover and simmer 2 hours. Cut meat from bones in large cubes. Strain broth and skim off excess fat. Add meat and vegetables. Cover and let

simmer 1 hour. Yields 8 servings.

Good soup accompaniments include crisp crackers that have been spread lightly with butter and baked at 375 degrees F until delicately brown. Toast strips may be made by trimming crust from bread slices, spreading the slices lightly with butter and cutting into strips. These may be sprinkled with grated cheese or paprika before toasting in a 300 degree F oven until brown.

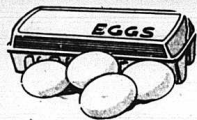

## The Two Covenants

I believe that much of the religious confusion in the world today comes about because of a failure to differentiate between the Law of Moses and the Law of Christ. God said that His Son is the one we are to hear today with regards to salvation (Heb. 1:2; Matt. 17:5). Jesus took the old covenant "out of the way, nailing it to his cross" (Col. 2:14), and established a better covenant upon better promises (Heb. 8:6).

Listed below are just a few of the many variations between these two covenants which should help us to clearly distinguish one from the other and determine which of the two are applicable to us today.

No one who claims to be following Christ wants to resurrect animal sacrifices or the Levitical priesthood. They understand that these things were a part of the Law of Moses. They also recognize Christ Himself as our sacrifice, far superior to that of animals, and that He is our High Priest. In spite of this knowledge, many today do resurrect instrumental music in worship, knowing that they must revert to the Law of Moses to find justification for it. They will immediately turn to the Psalms of David, the Chronicles, or some other Old Testament book for their "proof text." Inconsistent, isn't it?

To seek justification by the Law of Moses is to make Christ of "none effect," and will cause one to "fall from grace" (Gal. 5:4). We can no more be justified spiritually by the Old Covenant today than we can be justified legally by a 75 mph speed limit. Whereas that was once the speed limit, it was repealed when the 55 mph speed limit was established. Likewise, the Law of Moses was repealed when Jesus established His New Covenant (Heb. 8:7, 13; 9:12; 10:9). The "last will and testament" of Jesus became effective AFTER His death (Heb. 9:16-17). Incidentally, the thief on the cross died before the new covenant came into effect and baptism was not required under the Law of Moses to which he was subject. That should answer the question so often asked, "what about the thief on the cross - he was saved and he wasn't baptized?"

There was a time when God spoke by Moses and other prophets, and those Israelites who lived during that era will be judged accordingly. Today, He speaks through His Son (Heb. 1:1), and it will be by the words of Jesus, not Moses, that we who live on this side of the cross will be judged (John 12:48). HEAR YE HIM!

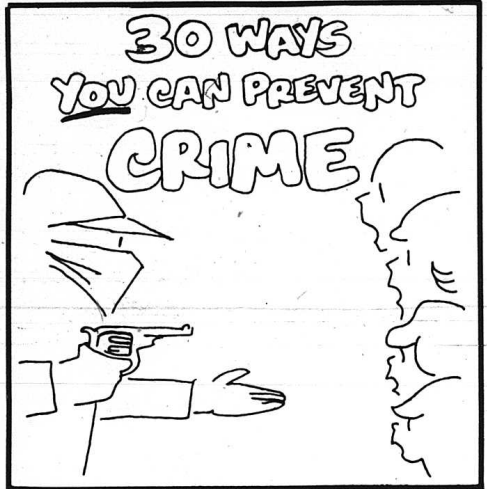

The 1985 ACP-LTA program sign-up period available to the Rockcastle County farmers will be Dec. 10, 1984 through Jan. 10, 1985. Any Rockcastle County farmer interested in participating in the 1985 ACP-LTA program should contact the Rockcastle County ASCS Office immediately. ACP-LTA is a federally assisted cost-sharing program emphasizing the identification and solu-

tion of soil, water and woodland conservation and pollution problems on agricultural lands and encourages energy conservation. The basic objective of Long Term Agreements (LTA) is to treat a specific delineated area that has been identified with critical soil and water farmland problems. Through the use of an approved conservation plan, a combination of selected conservation practices

best suited to the particular needs of each individual site are applied with respect to the primary use of the farmland under contract. Farmers and ranchers are eligible to receive cost-sharing up to 70% of the actual cost of the conservation practice performed. These practices are to be maintained by farmers and ranchers for a period of 5 to 10 years after the completion year of the practice

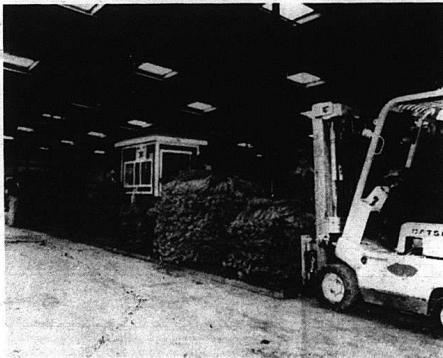

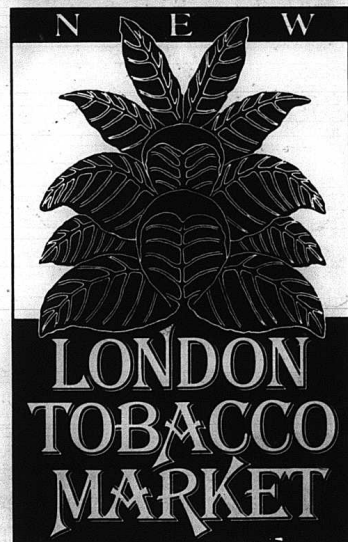
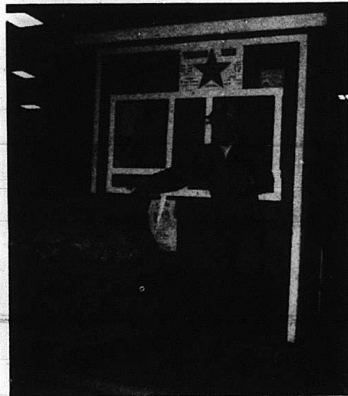

# CARE program will aid drought-stricken Ethiopia

CARE, the international aid and development organization, signed an agreement after a year of negotiations with the government of Ethiopia under which CARE will provide both food and financial assistance to the drought-affected people of Ethiopia.

The agreement was signed at the Ethiopian Mission to the U.N. by Dawit Walde Giorgis representing the Government of Ethiopia and Dr. Phillip Johnston, the Executive Director of CARE. "CARE estimates that it will provide 50,000 tons of food and \$10 million of other assistance to Ethiopia for this emergency," Dr. Johnston said. "Cash resources will be used to enhance the ability of Ethiopia ports to unload ships, to pay for the transportation and distribution of relief food to remote areas of the country, and to improve food storage capacity for the emergency commodities."

Dr. Johnston said that CARE staff arrived in Ethiopia the first week of November. "Our first priority will be to facilitate movement of foodstuffs in the country's areas where they are

most needed. CARE has developed special expertise in working to alleviate the suffering caused by drought and famine which are extensive in Africa," he declared. "For example," he explained, "in 1981 CARE established a logistics operation for the distribution of food in neighboring Somalia, which has a severe refugee problem; earlier this year CARE also set up logistics operations for food distribution in Mozambique and the Sudan, both of which are currently suffering from drought and widespread hunger."

"Also, in response to severe drought conditions and accompanying food shortages in West Africa, CARE will bring a logistics operation on November 1 for the distribution of emergency food in Mauritania," Dr. Johnston concluded.
