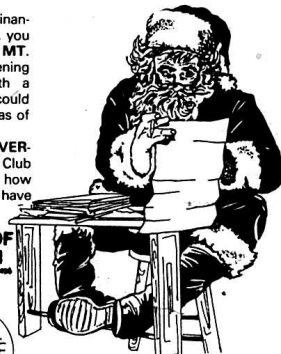

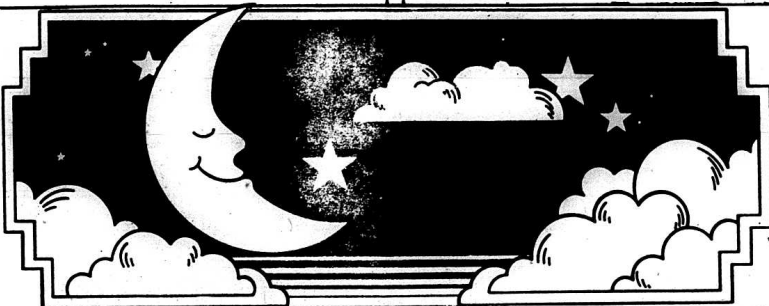

Local attorney files suit against county

A local lawyer has filed suit against the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court.

William D. Gregory, a Rockcastle County attorney-at-law and former County Attorney, has filed a suit asking for a judgement in connection with a county road that runs behind Gregory's Motel and to his home near Renfro Valley.

Gregory says in his suit, which was filed in the Circuit Clerk's office last week, that a decision by the Fiscal Court on November 7th of this year to reopen the road in question was illegal and was an harassing act on the court's part.

The road had been closed by the Fiscal Court on May 7, 1979, and Gregory asks in his suit that the May 7th decision be made binding and require that the Fiscal Court cause no further harassment in the matter.

According to the suit, Gregory is petitioning the circuit court to make the November 7, 1984 decision void and of no force or effect.

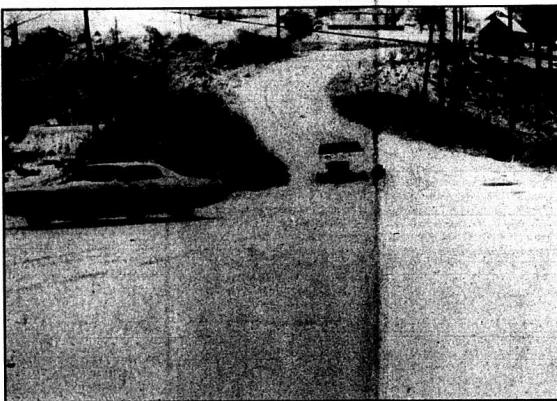
In the suit, Gregory states that he and his wife, Mary T. Gregory, built their home in the general area of the road and that they use the road as their yard and driveway.

The Gregorays built their home after the road was closed.

At the November meeting of the Fiscal Court, William Gregory's dad, David, asked that the road be reopened because, according to David Gregory, he owned some land on both sides of the road.

The Fiscal Court voted unanimously to reopen the road and to have an electric fence, which reportedly belonged to William D. Gregory at the time, taken down.

A civil suit shows only one side of the case.

Two residents arrested in Madison for illegal possession of marijuana

Two Rockcastle County residents were arrested in Richmond last Wednesday night and charged with felony counts of possession of marijuana.

Gary Kirby of Rt. 5 Mt. Vernon, and Julia Blackburn, also of Rt. 5, were arrested by Richmond City Police who were acting on a tip from local authorities.

Rockcastle County Sheriff William Taylor said that his office received an anonymous tip that Kirby and Blackburn were transporting marijuana to Ohio. The Sheriff said that he notified the Berea Police Department and the

Richmond Police Department, but the Berea police missed Kirby and Blackburn.

According to a spokesman in the Madison County Circuit Clerk's office, both Kirby and Blackburn are scheduled for a January 5th preliminary hearing in Madison District Court.

Police in Richmond said that when they arrested the two

Rockcastle Countians, they found 19½ pounds of marijuana in their possession.

Both Kirby and Blackburn are free on bond according to police who said that Kirby was charged with two felony counts of possession of marijuana with intent to resale, and that Blackburn was charged with one felony count of

County rejects proposal for resurfacing roads

Although withdrawing the county's application for a landfill at Pine Hill was the main item of business to come from last week's regular monthly meeting of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court, several other topics of business were discussed and acted on.

Harry McKnight of the State's Bureau of Highways presented the court with the state's proposal for the allocated road funds for 1985 for Rockcastle County.

McKnight told the magistrates and the judge that \$330,506 had been allocated for the county to maintain the roads for next year by the state.

"\$260,430 will be used to maintain the state roads which leaves around \$80,000 to be used to resurface part of a state road," McKnight said. "We are propos-

ing that the extra money be used on Ky. 328 from the Pulaski County line to Ky. 618 approximately 2 miles and 8/10."

McKnight then told the magistrates that they could make suggestions to the state for the resurfacing, and he would pass the

Grand Jury indicts fifteen during recent November session

The most recent session of the Rockcastle County Grand Jury has resulted in 15 indictments, ranging from reckless homicide to trafficking in marijuana.

The Grand Jury handed down the reckless homicide indictment after a November 26th traffic accident on Hwy. 150 near Brodhead.

Hollis Ray Durham, formerly of Crab Orchard and presently a resident of Atlanta, Georgia, was indicted in connection with the accident which claimed the life of a local woman.

Evelyn Sargent, age 59, of Brodhead was traveling west on 150 around 8:45 p.m. when her Monte Carlo was hit by a transfer truck driven by Durham, according to police reports, who said that Durham did not stop after the accident.

Besides the reckless homicide indictment, Durham was also indicted for leaving the scene of an accident and driving under the influence.

Durham is free after posting a \$10,000 bond.

Clarence "Bearcat" Kirby, of Rt. 5 Mt. Vernon was indicted after police found over one pound of marijuana in his possession on October 31st, according to Kentucky State Police Detective Ernie Boggs.

Kirby was indicted for trafficking in marijuana as well as for receiving stolen property valued at over \$100 on October 18th, according to the indictment on file in the Circuit Clerk's office.

Kirby is free on \$20,000 bond.

A Livingston man, Billy Gene Burke, 41, of Rt. 5, was indicted for receiving stolen property valued at over \$100 when police found several firearms in his possession on November 9th that had been stolen from Paul's Discount in Somerset.

Burke is free on a \$12,000 property bond.

A Mt. Vernon man, Alton Rocky Boswell, was indicted on two counts, 1st degree burglary and receiving stolen property.

The two count indictment stemmed from a July 15th incident in which Boswell was seen entering the home of Willis Joe Bussell of Mt. Vernon.

According to police, Boswell was also seen carrying several household items from the residence.

Boswell is presently being held in the Lincoln County jail on other charges.

A September stabbing incident near Livingston resulted in an indictment against Gary Sturgill of Livingston.

According to police, Sturgill stabbed Robert Earl Newcomb, 31, of Livingston, at the home of Gary Griffin. The indictment, which is for 1st degree assault, was handed down after State Trooper Joe Schenkenfelder presented the case to the Grand Jury.

Schenkenfelder said in an earlier statement that when he arrested Sturgill, he too had been stabbed, but it was self-inflicted. Sturgill is presently free on a \$8,000 property bond.

Dwayne Elden Spires of Rt. 3, Berea, is free on a \$10,000 property bond after he was indicted on two counts by the Grand Jury. Spires is charged with second degree burglary and theft by unlawful taking over \$100.

The charges stem from an October 17th incident at the home of Cora LaPorrin and Patricia Hickey when Spires reportedly entered their home and stole items including a violin.

Herbert Leslie Burton of Brodhead was indicted on the same two charges as Spires, but the charges involved a different home. Burton is charged with second degree burglary and theft by unlawful taking over \$100 for entering the home of his mother, Anna Mae Lovett, of Brodhead on October 6th.

Her mother, Mrs. Lovett has petitioned the court to drop the charges against her son. The charges have not been dropped as of yet.

Burton is free on a \$10,000 bond.

Lion's Club, had said that they would help in the planning and paying for the event.

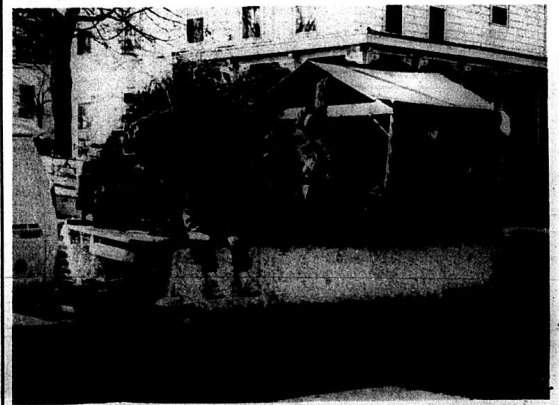
"A club our size with only about 10 active members has a hard time raising enough money, each year for this event, and the last three years we have been falling short of the needed money."

At the time the indictment was made against Michael De-

Why was the sheriff so determined to get Michael DeBord and not even make an effort to get the driver of the car that James Northern was killed in? Ricky Bussell has only had to spend time in jail for public drunkenness, and he was driving the car the Northern man was killed in.

I don't see that there was justice in this case. If there were indictments for two people, then why weren't they both tried? Could it be because Ricky Bussell could have proved Michael DeBord was not guilty? I think the people who wear our badges should wear them in good faith and not use them against someone because of personal grudges they may hold.

Dear Editor:

To the people of the best state on earth, Kentucky. No place on earth was ever won by so brave people, men and women who came through Cumberland Gap on wagons and oxcarts, and down the Ohio River on rafts. I have been over most of the world, there's no place so beautiful as Kentucky. You can go ten or fifteen miles any direction and find a different scenery or grow so wide a variety of flowers, fruits, trees, etc.

One thing is wrong, however. Many of our beautiful songbirds are near extinction.

When I was a young lad, there was hollow fence post, fence rails, etc. for many hole nesters. There were a hundred birds then, for every one today. That's why we now must use all kinds of poison sprays to grow our food. We only back at that time used a little Paris green on potatoes and occasionally some wood ashes on cabbage. Every boy had a birchouse especially purple martins that eat only flying insects especially mosquitoes and flies.

People's milk cows didn't have to use a lot of energy fighting flies.

The worst enemy of our beautiful hole nesting birds are the filthy starlings. They gang up when they find the nest of the Red-bellied Woodpecker and the flicker, throw out the young birds or eggs, take the nest, and raise more filthy starlings.

The starling was brought here from England in 1886. By the mid-thirties, they had reached Kentucky. They are now sold from the Atlantic to the Pacific. They are carriers of typhloplasmosis, fatal to human beings. It causes hardening of the lungs.

I am 77 years old. I work every day making all kinds of birdhouses and feeders which I sell very near cost. Most purple martin houses have each compartment near air tight. The young get very hot, one third fall and push each other out. Mine are vented and this loss never happens. Anyone wishing to make their own or to sell, come by and I will show you how. The inside is one-eighth inch masonite and so made you need no nailing.

About 8 or 9 years ago, I sent a similar letter to every editor in Kentucky. I believe every one except Danville printed it. These two counties now have more starlings than the other counties combined. I beg of you, please help save nature's beautiful and valuable birds.

I have never perfected a trap to catch them. It can be made for about \$7.00. I will have plans made and give for free to all who will make a trap if a few people are interested.

Why, because they (the cable companies) don't like satellite TV because it hurts their independence. It just seems like they don't like to give people a choice.

SANTA'S SHOPPING STRESS

"Buying something for someone you love" was listed by 57% of 35,000 women answering a McCall's poll on money in 1977 as the thing about money which gave the most satisfaction. This ranked first among all the uses of money. When asked "Where would you cut down (on expenditures)?" cutting down on gifts for loved ones did not even rank high enough to be listed.

Given these two facts, it is a sure thing you who read this article will receive a great deal of satisfaction in this holiday season, giving, as always, all you can.

That doesn't mean that Christmas shopping is easy or stress-free. Another poll showed that fewer than 1% enjoy the process of shopping. Especially for working women, searching for just the right gift during hectic evening hours when stores are crowded and fatigue levels are high is a trial. "It's a real pain in the neck," according to one reader.

Unrealistic expectations of children, even after they are grown, is a weight carried by many parents. It is the nature of love to give, and at times all of us have given beyond the limits of wisdom for our situations or even our children's welfare. 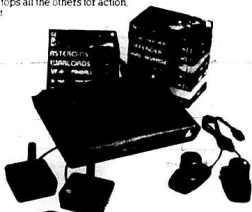

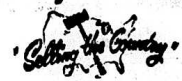



Tobacco support drop could effect thousands of families

The future of the many thousands of small family farms is a major worry of burley leaders, who are anxious over threatened ending of the tobacco price support program or drastic changes in it.

Joe McDaniel, president of the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association, emphasized this concern at a recent hearing conducted by the Kentucky Legislative Research Committee, at Lexington. He called for an immediate appeal to Congress on behalf of the growers.

"It is the small family farm enterprise, the backbone of the business (farming)," he said, "for whom an appeal can most effectively be made."

Burley, which is grown in fourteen states on over 300,000 farms is essentially a small farm enterprise, said the Burley Association official. And he cited USDA figures showing that 79 percent of a recent national quota of 614 million pounds was grown on farms having quotas of 10,000 pounds down to 1,000 pounds, or less.

The Burley Association, representing several hundred thousand members, favors a return to price supports based on parity, as provided by Congress in 1938. That law has been amended several times, and the Association wants it changed back to the original act.

McDaniel offered three proposals:

(1) Have Congress amend the law to remove the limit on quota reductions, "giving the Secretary of Agriculture the power to reduce the quotas over 10 per cent as conditions may warrant, after consulting with the tobacco leadership."

(2) Have Congress give the Secretary of Agriculture authority to adjust the 90 per cent parity support to a lower rate, allowing the support price to be more competitive with foreign-grown tobacco.

(3) We urge the national administration to get a handle on the spiral of cheap, foreign-grown tobacco coming into this country. We request that a quota be placed on imports, allowing the farmer the opportunity to profitably stay in business.

Regarding lowering of the price-support level, McDaniel told the committee: "This cheap offshore tobacco is threatening the life of the tobacco program. No doubt price is the chief factor in causing this influx of foreign tobacco. The evidence is conclusive—the highest priced tobacco is going under loan."

"This November 1984 the producers find themselves encumbered with a huge supply of burley tobacco under loan, and the

prospect of perhaps 250 million pounds more of the current crop added to this burdensome surplus.

"About 13 years ago there was not enough foreign-grown tobacco in this country to warrant separate publication of the figures. But as of January 1983 there was in the hands of domestic dealers and manufacturers over 282 million pounds of foreign-grown burley. Today they (the manufacturers) are using about 500 million pounds of burley—ten years ago 560 million."

In its recommendations the Association asked that farm quotas be allowed to remain with the land, and added: "They constitute a substantial part of the land's value, and of the tax base thereof, with the exception of non-agricultural land, airports, subdivisions, etc."

As for leasing, the Association favors leaving it to private negotiations, and the cost not to be considered a legitimate cost of production. Any future cut in quotas, added McDaniel, should be applied across the board to large and small quota-holders at the same rate, with the same procedure followed in increasing quotas.

"It is also the view of this Association that production control and price supports are economically sound and workable," said McDaniel, "if the laws of supply and demand are painstakingly adhered to and managed properly. The dilemma the burley farmer finds himself in today is the result of straying too far from the law of supply and demand, largely through no fault of his own."

"Some way has to be found to keep tobacco from going under loan rather than in the channels of trade. The biggest problem is the low-quality 1983 crop of 216 million pounds—and not one pound has been sold. The No-Net-Cost fund will have close to \$100 million in it. Nine cents per pound is being collected on the 1984 crop. This 9 cents will probably be raised to insure no cost to the taxpayers. We need time to work out this serious problem."

"After the 1984 crop is sold there will be enough excess burley tobacco under loan to supply the trade for an entire year, without another pound being raised."

The Association statement included assurance of that group's continued support of the University of Kentucky's Tobacco and Health Institute. It also said that imported tobacco should be under

the same regulations as domestic tobacco in the use of chemicals and grading.

Charles is the first student to receive the award which was made by the Christian Citizenship Committee of the Dewitt church. The committee said it made the award because it shares Berea's commitment to equality and interracial education. Charles was chosen as one who exemplifies these values.

A graduate of Rockcastle County High School, Charles is an elementary education and religion major.
