Ralph Stanley Mullins of Rt. 5 Mt. Vernon has announced his intentions to seek his first ever political office in Rockcastle County.

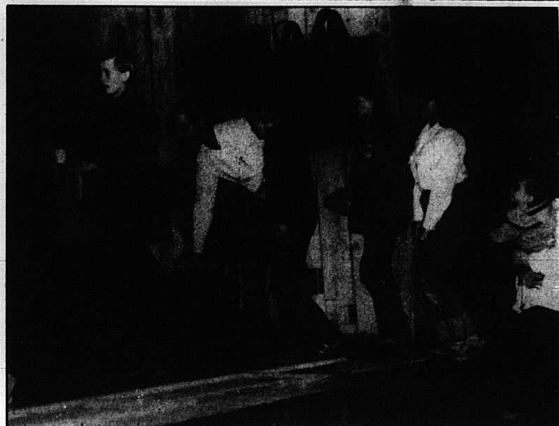

## Roberts family will go to Mexico as Baptist Missionaries

The message on the windows of the Trading Post on Main Street in Mt. Vernon reads: "Mexico Bound: Going Out of Business Sale."

Kenneth Roberts opened the Trading Post in April, 1983 as a means to support his family while he was between pastorates. The business has served its purpose, but the Robertses are ready to start the new year with a new beginning.

The first week of January, they'll begin a year's travel that will take them all over the United States to raise the support needed to finance the missionary work they plan to do in Mexico.

Their ultimate destination is Campeche, Mexico, which is about 300 miles north of El Salvador and 90 miles southwest of Havana, Cuba.

"In October of 1983, I surrendered in a Sunday morning service to go to the mission field," said Roberts. He and his family attend the Bible Baptist Church in Mt. Vernon where Don Stanton is the pastor.

He was sure that it would be wise to send Roberts to the mission field to visit before they officially began raising support. In April, he and his wife, Jealetta, and their son, Kevin, traveled to Tabasco, a state of Mexico, and to Campeche, a state and a capital city.

They were gone for 30 days and stayed with two missionaries already established there. After returning to Rockcastle County, the Robertses began making plans to raise support so that they could return to Mexico and live. In the upcoming year they will visit approximately 150 independent Baptist churches in all areas of the United States to gain support for

their ministry. In the first month alone they will travel to such cities as Little Rock, Ark., Denver, Col., and Dallas, Houston and Amarillo in Texas. The men of the Bible Baptist Church remodeled a van for the Roberts family so they will be able to travel without a great deal of expense.

During their trip to Mexico in April, the Robertses got an idea of the conditions they would eventually live under. Roberts said that Mexico has high unemployment and that the economy there makes it difficult for the poor people. Most of the population makes their living by hard labor, with many working in oil fields and farming.

Others earn money as vendors of fruit and vegetables. There are also people who sell crafts they've made, such as pottery, baskets, leather items and jewelry. Roberts said while there they saw children as young as nine years old who worked every day.

The area around Campeche is swampy and tropical, with the temperatures ranging from 70 to 115 degrees year round. There is rainfall from six to seven months out of the year.

Roberts said his family was treated well by the Mexican people. They've had correspondence from several people they met there who want to know when they'll be back. They have also received requests to preach at established churches.

Roberts isn't sure how long his family will live in Campeche as missionaries: "Right now as far as I'm concerned, I'll be there until I die," he said. "The situation is often unstable there because of an increase in communist efforts to take over the country."

They saw evidence during their visit when 200 Guatemalan guerrillas killed five people in a

refugee camp in a state below Tabasco. Veteran missionaries have told Roberts that churches have disbanded because of communist persecution.

After the Robertses spend a year raising support, they will live in Tabasco for another year to take language training in Spanish. They will be taught by a missionary who can teach both Hebrew and Greek in Spanish. Kevin will also learn Spanish and Jealetta will refresh the three years of Spanish she's already had.

After they complete language school, the family will move to a rented house in Campeche. During their work there, they will establish independent churches which will be financially self-supporting as well as self-governing.

"My purpose is to allow the Mexicans to convert to be able to carry on the work after I leave," said Roberts. They will not supply money to help the Mexicans build churches because the government could come in at any time and take them over.

Since the family will start missions under the authority of the Bible Baptist Church in Mt. Vernon, all their funding will be delegated to them through a family in that church.

Roberts is confident his family will raise the money they need to finance their mission work in Mexico. Because they aren't allowed to accept money from the Mexican people, the money they raise will be used for living expenses. Any other support given will go toward ministry expenses, such as the maintenance of their vehicle, their transportation and the publishing of a monthly newsletter.

Besides building new churches in Mexico, Roberts said he has a second burden which is to

## Clark, Renner file for Judge-Executive

The first in what is expected to be at least 12 in the field has filed his papers for Rockcastle County Judge/Executive subject to May's Republican Primary.

Fifth district magistrate Joe Clark, threw his hat in the ring first, and Mt. Vernon City Councilman Jack Renner was the second one to announce his intentions.

Clark filed his papers in the county clerk's office last Friday and Renner filed yesterday (Wednesday). The two term incumbent magistrate was elected to the Fiscal Court in November of 1977 when he defeated former magistrate Ernest Mason with a write-in candidacy. Mason defeated Clark in the primary that same year when several other candidates were on the ballot.

Clark was not, certified a winner for several months after

the election because Mason filed suit and took the case all the way to the Kentucky Court of Appeals.

In the 1981 primary election, Clark easily defeated his other four republican opponents and went on to handily defeat democrat Earl McNew in the General Election.

The life-long republican has been controversial at times during his seven years on the Fiscal Court and was the main force in the county's recent withdrawal of their

encourage churches in the United States to reach out to the Hispanics living in this country.

He said that the United States has seen a great increase in its Hispanic population and that as far as he's concerned, there has been no real effort to get the gospel to these people. Roberts added that there are 27,000 Hispanics in Kentucky alone.

Why did Roberts decide to go to the mission field? "I was in between pastorates," he said, "and a missionary (from Mexico) came to Bible Baptist and presented the work of his was involved with. The Holy Spirit dealt with my heart about it."

Roberts, 38, has had previous experience as pastor of the Crab Orchard Immanuel Baptist Church where he ministered 4½ years after beginning the church. He started the church under the authority of the Immanuel Baptist Church in Cincinnati, Ohio.

He also served as youth minister at the Twin Brook Hills Baptist Church in Hamilton, Ohio, and at the Temple Baptist Church in Cincinnati. He previously attended the Lexington Baptist College in Lexington, Ky., and the

Temple Baptist College in Cincinnati.

Originally from Cincinnati, Roberts said he was raised in a Christian home. "I entered the ministry because I was called by the Lord," he said.

His wife, Jealetta, 33, has resolved her anxiety about the move. "I'm eager to go back," she said. "I want to try to talk to them (the Mexican people) this time. I was a little hesitant before."

Mrs. Roberts added that since their family had never been out of the United States before they traveled to Mexico this spring, their biggest fear was trying to find their way around Mexico City, the largest populated city in the world.

She also said she was afraid of the iguanas, a large lizard found in Mexico, but that her fears were relieved when she discovered they run from humans.

"They (the Mexican people) kept asking me why I only had one child," she said and laughed. She explained that it's not unusual for Mexican parents to have as many

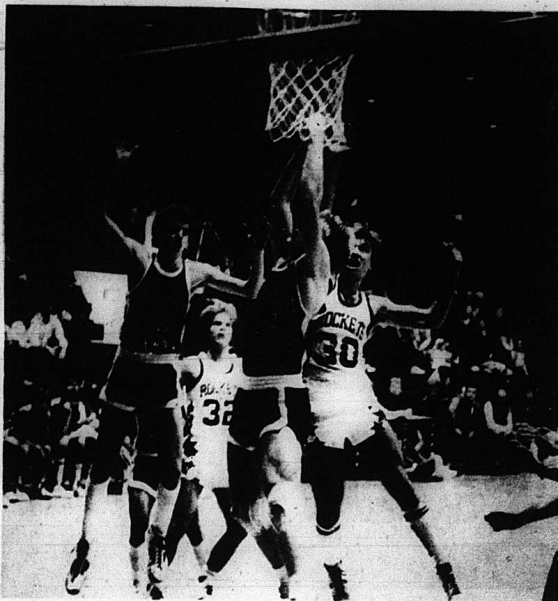

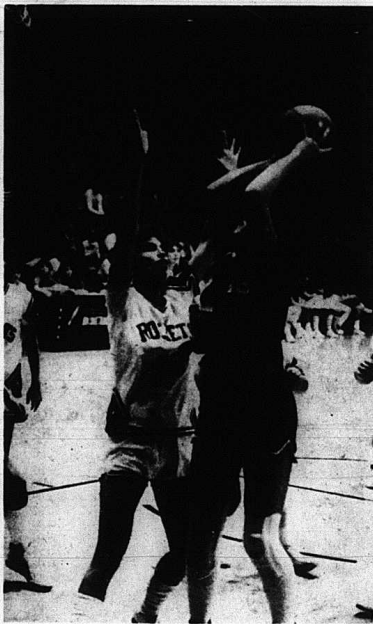
