

# '85 ACP sign-up ends 2-15

The Rockcastle County ASCS Office has announced the first 1985 ACP sign-up period as being Jan. 1 through Feb. 15, according to James E. Brown, Chairman of the Rockcastle Co. ASCS Committee.

Mr. Brown stated that practices available to the farmers of this county include seedings, water conservation and forestry practices. A more detailed list of the practices available for this period is available in the county office.

One program available to farmers with strict stipulations is the \$1.15 No Till program. This program is only available to farmers who have not used this method and have not received cost-sharing for this practice in prior years. Estimated cost-sharing for the No Till practice is \$10.00 per acre, with the Soil Conservationist overseeing this practice.

Seedling practices: oak, new seedlings and renovations, must

first have a current soil sample in the County Extension Office before signing an ACP-245 form. Request for Cost-Sharing.

Mr. Brown further stated that since Rockcastle Co. is under the new variable cost-sharing method, all requests will be evaluated at the end of the sign-up period and only those practices which obtain the most conservation such as to the saving of soil will be approved first. Cost-sharing amounts recoverable by participants can be as high as 75% of the actual cost of the practice under this new variable cost sharing method.

All requests must be filed and approved by the ASC Committee prior to the starting of work pertaining to the practice.

Participants receiving approvals of ACP-245's are urged to carefully read the ACP-245 request form and to do the work according to the instructions contained therein. Special attention should be given to the extent approved block of the approved

ACP-245 as this could differ from the extent requested.

Mr. Brown urges Rockcastle County farmers interested in applying for ACP cost-sharing practices to bring their soil samples to the county agent's office and sign the ACP-245 form as soon as possible. Remember, Feb. 15 is the deadline!

## State proposes tough school law

Kentucky State Law KRS 158.650 to 158.740, as amended in the last legislative session, of Senate Bill 202, the Educational Improvement Act, has mandated a program of improvements in education as a whole. A part of this plan deals with attendance, which

states that all districts in the state of Kentucky will make every effort to achieve an annual percent of attendance 96% or better.

The school district will be deemed in a satisfactory range if its attendance for the year is between 93.5% and 96%. The district must include in its Master Educational Plan a specific goal focused on improving attendance until it reaches 96%. The goal shall include process and objectives which establish specific action that systematically move the district toward achieving 96% or better.

Ky. State Law, KRS 159.220 states that any child who has been absent without a valid excuse for three (3) days or tardy on three (3) days, is a truant. Any child who has been reported three (3) times is an habitual truant, and allows a local school district the right to have issued a warrant and a cash bond set for the child's parents or guardians. A trial or hearing date will be set in the district court. A conviction of truancy can lead to a fine, jail sentence or both depending on the individual case.

The Kentucky Department of Education and the State Superintendent of Public Instruction are, both advocating a tough new policy of taking more cases to court for trial in order to improve attendance.

To obtain and keep 96% of annual attendance, children must not be allowed by their parents or guardians to miss school unless it is absolutely necessary and then kept to a bare minimum.

In the future, local school districts will have no alternative but to have a warrant issued and a court trial set for those that allow their children to miss school excessively without a valid reason.

The annual percent of attendance for the Rockcastle County School District in the 1983-84 school year is as follows: Brodhead Elementary, 95.6%; Livingston Elementary, 96.4%; Mt. Vernon Elementary,

94.6%; Roundstone Elementary, 94.1%; Rockcastle County High, 91.1%; District average, 94.06%.

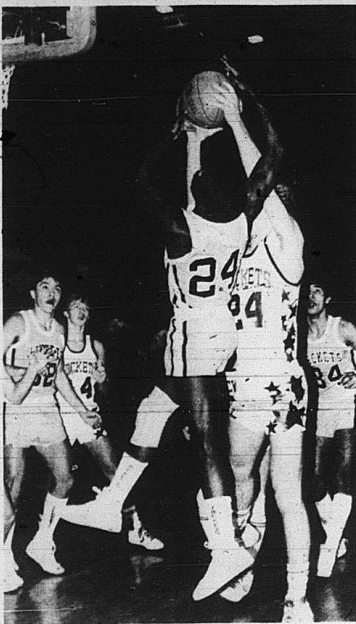

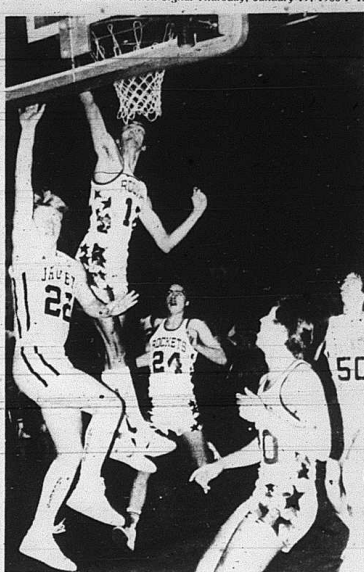

"I wouldn't want another project like that myself," he said. "but this company has recently built two of these projects in Bardstown and Tompkinsville and have said that things are running smoothly in up there. They think there is a need and a market for this project in Mt. Vernon, and I do, too."

"I am out and around a lot of these other towns, and Mt. Vernon is an up-and-coming community and I can see why they think there is a market here." Mayor Mullins told Ford.

"We probably need a project

like this, but people that it will affect have a right to speak out," the Mayor said.

Councilman Les McVey also voiced skepticism about such a project, saying that many members of the community were against it because of the trouble that has been caused in other projects in town.

Council members told Ford that they wanted to meet with a representative of Warren Realty and they wanted some guarantees before they put anything in writing.

"I'm not signing nothing until I know for sure about this thing," Councilman Tolle said.

Beasley and Abney are making their first attempt at office, and Burdette is making his second.

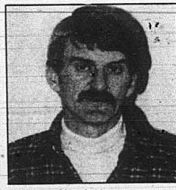
Burdette ran in 1981 in the Fourth District, finishing third behind W. H. Wren, who won the seat, and Charles Lamb.

**Council is "Cool"  
to housing complex**

The question is whether the Mt. Vernon City Council will grant water and sewer for a moderate-income housing project which is to be built within the city limits of Mt. Vernon. Local realtor and auctioneer Sam Ford asked such a question during Monday night's regular monthly meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council.

Members of the council did not warm up to Ford's idea and told him that they would like to schedule a public hearing on the matter.

Ford, who was representing the Warren Realty Company of Shepherdsville, Ky., told the Council that the project was to be composed of 24 units, 8 two-bedroom and 16 one-bedroom apartments, and that no family making less than \$12,500 per year would qualify for the project. "I'm not signing anything saying they can have sewer up there until I get some guarantees that this thing will not turn into a problem like we've already got at some of the other housing projects," Councilman Ernie Tolle said. "I think we should have someone from Warren Realty meet with us and guarantee us that this project will stay simply for the moderate income people," he said. "We've got enough of the fighting kind," he went on to say.

Each of the six council members expressed the same sentiments, with councilmember Richard Mullins saying, "We've got enough fly traps around here."

Mayor Roland Mullins said that he realized the need for such a project if it was handled as it was "set up to be, but that he also thought residents that the project might affect should have some say about it.

Mullins told Ford, "There is a lot of public sentiment against any kind of housing project in town, and these councilmen are on the spot. They have already had people to see them, wanting them to put a stop to it."

"If Warren Realty can guarantee you all that this project won't be a low-rent project, will you all okay the sewer thing?" Ford asked.

He got no response to that question and told the council that

there had never been anything done in Mt. Vernon without criticism and that there never would be, but that they should do what is the overall best thing for the community as a whole.

Ford agreed with the council that Mt. Vernon did not need any more low-rent housing projects.

## Let's Keep an Open Mind

There comes a time when people should sit down and decide what is best for a community. One of those times appears to be now.

A somewhat sticky situation is brewing over the possibility of another housing complex to be built in Mt. Vernon. Skepticism about the complex, for people with moderate incomes, is obvious among several residents living near the proposed site of the project. This is understandable because of the trouble that many residents have experienced from two of the five complexes already in Mt. Vernon.

However, we should look at the good a housing complex for the moderate income families would do in Rockcastle County and while some problems have arisen from two projects, three of them have caused no problems whatsoever. And, we feel that this would be the case with the newly-proposed 24-unit complex.

To qualify for the apartments, families must make at least \$12,500 per year and they can't make over \$18,000. With this kind of limits, problems such as those that have surfaced at the low-rent projects in the county should not occur.

We realize that people will think that, if the project were being built near our homes, we might feel differently about it, but we have seen pictures of the proposed complex and understand that two, recently built in Bardstown and Tompkinsville, are operating without problems.

However, the fact is that people upon the income levels of \$12,500 and \$18,000 don't have a chance when it comes to housing in this county. Mortgage rates keep them from owning their own homes. F.H.A. puts the income limit at \$11,500 and there are hardly any good homes or apartments available to rent.

James Noe, who owns six apartments located above his auto parts store in Mt. Vernon, said Tuesday that all six of his apartments stay empty most of the time, awaiting a waiting list.

Delmer Vanzant, who has four apartments for rent just south of Mt. Vernon, said essentially the same thing Tuesday. "My apartments stay rented and there is always a list of at least 9 or 6 people who want them," he said. Vanzant said that the list would be longer but that most people finally give up and try and find something else. Noe and Vanzant said that they were called almost daily about their apartments.

The Mt. Vernon City Council has said that they would like to schedule a public hearing on the matter, and all that we ask is that you keep an open mind.

### SAFETY TIPS FOR HEATING WITH KEROSENE

Proper use of a kerosene heater can take a big bite out of your monthly heating bill, but no one will care how low your bills are if your house burns down.

Energy conservation specialists with the UK College of Agriculture have some ideas on how the homeowner can safely use the economical, portable kerosene heater.

More and more people are using these useful small heaters not only in their homes but also to help heat garages, basements and workshops. Handled properly, they can reduce home heating bills. Handled improperly, they can burn down a house.

The first step to safely using a kerosene heater is to select one that produces the amount of heat required for the area it will be used in. Buy a heater that has been tested and labeled by a nationally recognized testing laboratory as meeting safety standards.

Never use gasoline in a kerosene heater. Even small quantities in the heater tank can cause a fire. Use only kerosene that is certified 1-K grade just because kerosene looks "water clear" doesn't necessarily mean it is that top grade.

Always store kerosene outside of the home and out of the reach of children in approved containers clearly marked "KEROSENE" to avoid possible confusion with gasoline. Do not use kerosene heaters in a closed room. A well-ventilated area reduces the chances of toxic gases building up in the room.

For example, always open the

door to the room with a kerosene heater so that the air can be exchanged with the rest of the house. In addition, if the home is well-insulated and tightly sealed with windows blocked, a window should be opened slightly to provide fresh air while the heater is in use.

Those using kerosene heaters should be aware that some people are very sensitive to pollutants produced by the heaters. People with asthma, respiratory or heart disease may be especially sus-

sceptible to these toxic gases. In addition, some individuals may become more susceptible to cold or flu infections after prolonged exposure to these gases.

Here are some other tips to remember when using kerosene heaters:

Set the wick according to manufacturers directions. A low setting can cause high internal heater temperatures and pose a fire hazard.

Do not leave the heater (Cont. to 15)

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

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

### Cooperative Extension Service

## 1984 in Review

The Rockcastle County Cooperative Extension Service is a unique cooperative agreement between the USDA, the University of Kentucky and Rockcastle County. Its mission is to extend education in agriculture, family resource management, community improvement, and leadership with the principles of "helping people to help themselves." The extension service today delivers unbiased new technology and information in four program areas: Agriculture, Home Economics, Youth Development (4-H) and Community Development. This three-way agreement has a 70 year history with the enactment of congress in 1914 and the Kentucky General Assembly in 1916.

Presently, three agents as University of Kentucky employees, advise and administer the Extension programs in the county. These programs are planned and often conducted by the people of the county. Tom Mills is the County Extension Agent for Agriculture. Martha Brown is the County Extension Agent for 4-H and Cheryl Witt is the County Extension Agent for Home Economics. All three agents have responsibilities in 4-H and Community Development as well. The Expanded Food & Nutrition Program is a federally funded program also supervised by the Home Economics Agent, Margaret Owens has been serving as a

Do not move the heater, remove the fuel tank or refuel the heater when it is operating or hot. Do not overfill the tank. As the heater burns, kerosene warms up and expands. The air space in the fuel tank is designed to ensure safe operation.

Do not place a heater closer than three feet from combustible materials such as upholstered furniture, curtains or drapery, cardboard or wood. Do not use it in areas where flammable liquids are stored or in use.

nutrition aide in this program for seven years. The agents are located in the Cooperative Extension Service office on the 2nd floor of the courthouse in Mt. Vernon. The telephone number is 256-2923. All programs and services provided by the Cooperative Extension Service are available to all persons, without regard to race, color, national origin, sex, religion, age, and handicap.

During 1984, the agricultural extension programs included a Dairy Herd Improvement Records Program with four farms participating and a technician, Billy Cameron, providing assistance. Short courses, newsletters, and Beef Management projects have been conducted to assist the beef producer. Demonstrations on corn yields, johnsongrass control and forages have been held. Recommendations were given to 129 farmers on forage varieties, soil control, and soil fertility. Information was also provided to farmers in pepper, strawberry and sorghum production, as well as other commercial vegetables.

4-H projects have shown a significant growth in the past years. Over 1850 youth in Rockcastle County were involved in the 4-H program during the past year. Activities they participated in include 4-H Camps, variety shows, speech contests, demonstrations, fashion shows, fair exhibits, 4-H Week, American Heritage Conference—land and vegetable judging, and community pride. All of these activities have shown increases in participation during the past year. New activities which were begun during the past year are horse and dairy judging. 4-H project groups are held for electric, foods, clothing, woodcraft and dairy projects. Classroom projects are also conducted by leaders and teachers. Over 154 volunteer leaders are involved in the 4-H program. 1984 brought a special emphasis on the history of 4-H as 4-H in Kentucky celebrated its 75th year.

The Home Economics program involved 88 families in the Expanded Foods and Nutrition Program, over 200 Extension Homemakers Club members in 9 clubs, and 197 persons participating in special interest workshops. Emphasis has been placed on leadership in Extension Homemakers resulting in members
