WINTER WARM UP NEEDED FOR COLD WATER WASH

Water heaters are big energy burners, accounting for about 15 percent of the total energy used in many homes. You can conserve hot water, and energy, by doing part of your laundry with cold water.

However, the temperature of your cold-water wash actually varies with the seasons.

It can go as high as 80 degrees F. during hot weather and drop to 40 or below in winter. Eighty degree water will feel cool to the touch because it's well below body temperatures.

Clothes do come cleaner at the higher temperatures. So if you've been washing some loads each week with a cold-water

detergent and are becoming disenchanted with the results, you should warm up the water by switching to the "warm wash" setting during very cold weather. Leave the control on "cold" for rinsing all loads.

IT'S STILL COLD

On most washers, the "warm" setting provides a mixture of half hot and half cold water. That means that the water heater is set at 120 degrees and the water from the cold faucet is 40 degrees, the resulting mix will be about 80 degrees. Technically, this is still a cold water wash.

Classes with care the "temp" you launder this way. For instance, underwear, towels, diapers, sheets, white and colorfast cotton shirts will usually come cleaner in hot water. You need hot water for heavily soiled things like oily or greasy work clothes, too.

You can usually count on a satisfactory cold-water washing for blankets, bedspreads, permanent press and polyester knitted fabrics, bright or dark colors in different fabrics, many lightly-soiled garments, and woolens.

Some types of stain-bleed, egg, milk will come out in cold

water, where hot water will absorb excess water. Dry flat, away from sun and heat. (Tumble dry if label okay, this practice.)

Sports Shoes Many can be machine washed on gentle cycle with cool water. If the manufacturer says they can be machine-dried, put a few towels in with them. (Hint: White tennis shoes will stay that way longer if you spray them heavily with starch when they are new.)

SPECIAL WASH PROBLEMS SOLVED

Down Coats Check care label for washable notation. Set wash on gentle. Fill with cool water and cup liquid cold water detergent. Agitate the mix. Add the garment making sure snaps are fastened. Submerge garment squeezing out air. When wash cycle is over, remove garment from machine, without wringing or twisting. Place in dryer with two bath towels and one clean pair of tennis shoes (Why? Because they "kick" the down into place!). Dry for 1 1/2 hours on a gentle, medium heat cycle. Remove and hang on rust-proof hanger till completely dry.

Sweaters and Sweater Dresses (Acrylic or synthetic) Make sure buttons are buttoned and garment is turned inside out. Wash on gentle cycle with liquid detergent and cool water. Roll garment in towel to

Lexington man pleads guilty to lesser charges in kidnapping case involving local man last year

A sentencing date of February 28th has been set for a Lexington man who was charged with the kidnapping of a local man.

Gilford Hatton pled guilty to lesser charges of assault and theft of government property in exchange for charges of kidnapping and the use of a firearm to commit a felony being dropped last Wednesday in U.S. District Court before Judge Scott Reed.

The charges stemmed from a July 30th incident in which Hatton kidnapped two of his co-workers at the Bluegrass Army Depot in Richmond. One of the men was Walter Shepherd of Mt. Vernon.

Police said that while Hatton was on his way to Lexington where he fled, Richmond Police began pursuing him and, on two occasions, Hatton stopped his car, got out and fired shots at the officers. One officer was slightly injured by glass fragments from the windshield of his car.

Hatton was arrested after wrecking his car on Richmond Road near Jacobsen Park in Lexington.

The assault charges stem from Hatton's attacks on Shepherd and Fields and the theft charge stems from the theft of their M-16 rifles, according to police.

Court records indicated that Hatton told Judge Reed Wednesday that he was contemplating suicide the night of July 30th and that when he got to work, he loaded his M-16 rifle fully intending to kill himself, but, according to Hatton, he was surprised by Shepherd and Fields.

Police said that Hatton also registered 0.20 on the blood-alcohol test. 0.10 is considered legally drunk.

Hatton could receive up to 15 years in prison and could be fined up to \$8,000 when he is sentenced.

District Clerk and forth," he said. "Rockcastle and Laurel County would never get to hold the District at our places," he said.

Parrett said that Rockcastle County was chosen to move because it borders Laurel and Pulaski and is in the outer edge of the 13th region.

The meters. He said Wednesday that Brodhead did not have any water because the holding tank at Mt. Vernon was near empty.

According to Powell, he was having to pump 24 hours a day to keep up with the county's needs, and Tuesday night that wasn't even enough. He did say, Brodhead got their water back on late Tuesday night.

Powell said the reason there was a water shortage was that many lines had broken and many people let their water run continuously so it would not freeze.

Swinney is married to the former Glenn Doan and they have two children, Willie, 13, and Halev, 11. He is the son of Joe



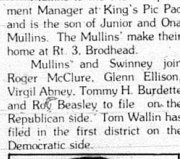

Snow, bitter cold strike Rockcastle

Frozen and busted water pipes, dead batteries, and power failures are all adjectives that can be used to describe the effect that the past weekend's weather has had on Rockcastle Countians.

A record low was set on both Saturday and Sunday nights when the mercury dropped to a bone-chilling 18 degrees below zero, according to local weatherman Bud Cox, who said that he checked his records for the last 15 years and the '18 reading tied the low for the period which was set last year on the same day of the year.

"I don't remember it, but that is what was in the book," Cox said. "I double checked it and it was correct."

The local funeral director went on to say that a total of 4 inches of snow fell last week and, coupled with the below zero temperatures, weather conditions were treacherous.

At least one family's home was destroyed by fire during the same period, according to Cox, who is also assistant Fire Chief for the Mt. Vernon department.

He said the fire occurred around 1:45 a.m. Tuesday, and that by the time the Fire Department reached the scene, the entire home was completely engulfed in flames.

The water situation has been no better. Brodhead Water Superintendent Devala Bussell was out Tuesday night trying to find out why the Brodhead area had been without water since 11 a.m. Tuesday. According to his wife, Bussell had experienced some problems with a couple of

water line breaks. Mrs. Bussell said their main concern was not having water in the event of a fire.

Mr. Vernon Water Superintendent Matt Powell said Monday that he and his men had been working day and night since the cold spell hit and he did not see any let-up in sight.

Powell said that only a few breaks in the water line had occurred on city-owned lines but that several people's water lines had frozen between their meter and house and that city crews had been busy just turning off water at

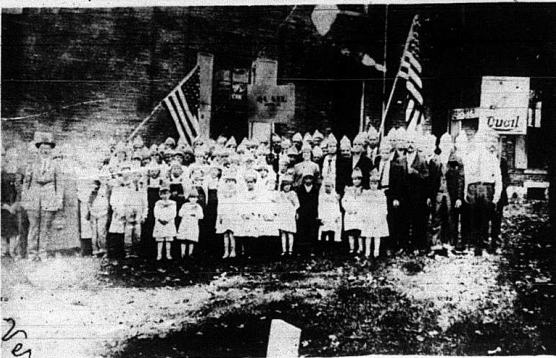



4-H News

4-H IN THE COMPUTER AGE

Computers have been rapidly growing in popularity. A lot of children, as well as adults, have gotten computers for Christmas. You may be wondering what computers have to do with 4-H. In keeping with the changing times, 4-H now offers a computer project.

It's not so different from other 4-H projects. Like other projects, it's free and it provides a learning experience for 4-Hers just as the beef or dairy projects do. It offers 4-Hers a future benefit. 1981 statistics indicated that there was one computer terminal for every 48 jobholders in the United States. With all of our computer interest, that number may well be one in a few years. People not familiar with computers will be at a disadvantage in the job marketplace.

The 4-H Computer projects can not only give 4-Hers the opportunity to learn to operate a microwave, but also the opportunity

to examine careers associated with computers.

No attempt is made in the 4-H computer projects to create professional programmers. Some 4-Hers have not actually enjoyed working with computers but have continued because they perceive the information to be helpful in their futures. Other 4-Hers have loved it and have become computer buffs.

Each of the computer projects involve a different aspect of microcomputers. Project I, Learning About Tapes and Diskettes, teaches 4-Hers how the parts of the computer function, how to operate a computer keyboard, how to do calculations on a computer, how to take care of cassette tapes and diskettes, how diskettes and cassettes store information, and how to load and run programs from the cassette tapes and diskettes.

Computer Project II, Learning About Programming, teaches 4-Hers to type commands, write programs, run programs, and to change short programs. Then, Computer Project III, Beginning Programming, teaches 4-Hers to plan a program and develop their own program.

Information in each project progresses in small learning blocks, allowing 4-Hers to work through the project at their own speed. The project books are in workbook format with questions and answer blanks throughout. The projects aim to develop an awareness of computers and an

Ky. Division of Forestry Forest Fire Data for 1984

The Kentucky Division of Forestry recently completed the forest fire data for 1984. Rockcastle County suffered 26 fires which burned a total of 412 acres. A total of 5 cases were prosecuted for violations of the Forest Fire Laws. Most of the fires in Rockcastle County were due to careless debris burning and arson.

"The fires in 1984 cost a total of \$1,640 to control," stated Forest Ranger Steve Bullen. "However, the greatest loss is due to loss of quality in fire damaged trees. Rot due to fire damage can easily cause a loss of quality equal to 75% of the tree's potential value. This loss, plus the loss of value added to the local economy accumulated over a 75 year

rotation, can approach \$2,000 per acre of woodland burned. The cost of controlling fires and the loss of value added to the local economy affects everyone, not just the landowner.

Ranger Bullen reminds everyone that, although the official Spring Fire Hazard Season does not start until March 1, it only takes 3 or 4 days of warm weather to create a danger of wildfires in January or February. For this reason, the law requires that any outdoor burning be adequately cleared around, and that the fire be attended until it is completely out.
