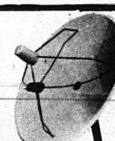

In order to transport our prisoners, the county will have to purchase vehicles equipped with radios and hire extra personnel. The unfortunate relatives of a prisoner will have to travel to another county to visit with them. If the prisoner is a juvenile, the parents will have to travel to Jamestown, Ky. (approximately 75 miles one way) to visit with their child because, at the present time, the Rockcastle County Jail cannot house juveniles. The only county we have a contract with for housing juveniles is Russell County and their jail is located in Jamestown, Kentucky. Round trip to transport a juvenile to Jamestown is approximately 150 miles.

The Department of Corrections has already closed approximately 20 of 25 jails in the State of Kentucky. Our jail does not meet minimum standards. It does not qualify at this time as a 12-hour holdover facility. If the Department of Corrections enforced their regulations, the jail would be shut down tomorrow.

If I am elected your County Judge/Executive, I will have our Fiscal Court meetings scheduled at a time when it is convenient for the citizens of Rockcastle County. I propose having the meetings late in the evening or on Saturday to allow those interested citizens who work an opportunity to attend the meetings and express their opinion about the county government and make suggestions that would enable Fiscal Court to be a more effective government.

If I am elected County Judge/Executive, I intend to see that the Senior Citizens program in Rockcastle County be made even better than it already is. At the present time, the Senior Citizens Center serves and/or delivers 5 hot meals, 5 days per week. I would see that the center serves and/or delivers one hot meal on Saturday and Saturday for a total of 7 hot meals, 7 days per week. I believe we must take care of our Senior Citizens. They are the foundation of this great county.

If I am elected your County Judge/Executive, I will do everything possible to promote more industry in our county.

Also, I have worked in the Courthouse for 7 years. I have observed that some Magisterial districts are not always given their fair share of the road money. This is not right. All districts should have their share of money to fix their roads. I do promise you that, if I am elected, I will see that every district gets its fair share. I feel that this will enable us to have good roads all over the county and not just in a few privileged districts.

I know that there are many handicapped people in Rockcastle County with disabilities that will not allow them to climb stairs. I know that many of you must go to the third floor of the Rockcastle County Courthouse to see the Social Security Representative, to take care of business in the Circuit Clerk's office and to hear trials in Circuit Court. All these require you to climb stairs and, if I am elected County Judge/Executive, I will see that there is an elevator installed in the Courthouse. I will see that access to all the offices in the courthouse is made available for the handicapped citizens of Rockcastle County.

It has been determined that asbestos causes cancer. Our courthouse has asbestos ceilings. We have a law firm in the courthouse that has removed the asbestos from their ceilings at their own expense. This would suggest that they do not want to be sued or to endanger their own health. One law suit of this nature, against the county, could bankrupt this county. If I am elected County Judge/Executive, I will see that the asbestos is removed from the ceilings of the Rockcastle County Courthouse, thus eliminating this health hazard.

This is my platform. In the near future, I am sure all candidates for the position of County Judge/Executive will present their platforms. Study them all very carefully. Compare each of us. The biggest civil settlement in the history of Rockcastle County was finally settled last week by a local woman.

Mary McClure Taylor received a substantial settlement from three companies in connection with the death of her late husband who was killed while putting air into the tire of a City of Mt. Vernon utility truck in June of 1983.

Local attorney Carl Clontz, who represented Mrs. Taylor, said that he could not reveal the amount of the settlement because the three companies that he settled with, Ford Motor Co., Firestone Tire and Rubber, and The Budd Company, requested that he not publicize the amount because of other cases pending.

"It was a fairly substantial amount, and we were quite pleased with it," Clontz said. "It was a situation where they knew we had an excellent case and they didn't want it to go to court, and we were afraid that we might get one or two jurors that didn't appreciate how much money something like this was worth, so

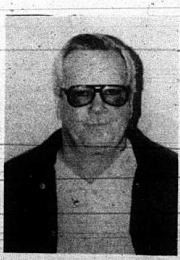

Kirby gets 11 years

**Cotton, Prewitt
sentenced Friday**

Two local men who walked away from the Rockcastle County Jail on November 5th have pled guilty in Rockcastle County Circuit Court, according to Assistant Commonwealth Attorney Jerry Cox.

Cox said Monday that Gerald Cotton and Jeff Prewitt, both of Mt. Vernon, were sentenced last Friday to the State Penitentiary by Circuit Judge Dan Venters.

Cotton received a sentence of three years on the escape charge and a total of five more years for other crimes to which he pled guilty, including assault in the third degree and two counts of receiving stolen property over \$100. He received a total of 8 years.

Cotton was awaiting a preliminary hearing on the various charges when he and Prewitt escaped from jail in November. The two men were arrested about a month later in Winchester.

Cotton and Prewitt escaped from the jail when they told Deputy Jailer Stanley Mullins they needed to use the telephone. Mullins allowed the men out of their cell, and when they were out

they overpowered Mullins and left the jail.

Prewitt was in the County Jail on several convictions, including four counts of theft by unlawful taking, criminal abuse, possession of forged instruments, and theft by deception. He was sentenced Friday to two years in the Penitentiary for his escape from the jail.

A case that was tried in Rockcastle Circuit Court in April of 1982 has finally run its course and the defendants have been sentenced.

The Kentucky Supreme Court upheld the Circuit Court ruling of a case involving Clarence "Bearcat" Kirby and Michael Joe McFerron. Kirby was convicted of rape of a Paducah County teenager in the spring of 1982 and was sentenced to 10 years in the State Penitentiary. McFerron was convicted of aiding and abetting sexual misconduct, and was sentenced to 12 months in the County Jail.

Both men were sentenced Friday by Circuit Judge Lan Venters who also sentenced Kirby

**Brodhead family files suit
against Lincoln coroner**

A Rockcastle County family that was mistakenly informed that two of their relatives had been killed in an automobile accident have filed suit against the Lincoln County Coroner.

Margaret McClure, Edward McClure, Ellis McClure, and Mr. and Mrs. George Spurlin filed the lawsuit in Lincoln County Circuit Court a few weeks ago asking for a total of \$25,000 or \$125,000 in damages.

The suit stems from an October 29th accident on Hwy. 150 near Crab Orchard when Coroner Bobby Martin wrongfully identified the two people killed in the accident as Mr. and Mrs. George Spurlin, long time residents of Rockcastle County and now residing in Lorado, Texas.

According to the suit, witnesses at the scene and Martin thought the two people who were killed in the accident were the Spurlins, but the two victims were later identified as Carl Roysdon and Josephine Brown.

The lawsuit charges that the coroner has a duty to make correct identification of bodies before notifying relatives. Martin notified the Spurlins family that they

had been killed. The suit says that Martin's "conduct" actions, and the violations of his duties were extreme, outrageous, reckless, and wanton and grossly negligent.

The Spurlin family is asking for the award for their deep emotional stress and mental anguish.

Martin, who is seeking re-election, told the Interior Journal last week that the misidentification action was just an honest mistake.

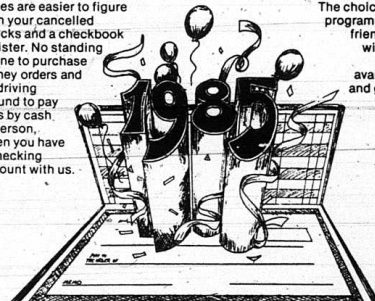

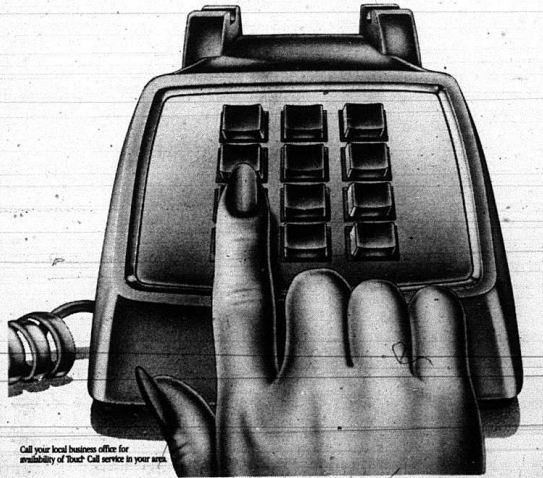

State querying local board over Ten Commandments

The State School Board, Frankfort, has notified the Rockcastle County Board of Education, through its attorney, Gary Bale, to come before the State Board in March, Alice L. Roberts, is asking in removing the Ten Commandment Plaques from the classrooms.

Bale pointed out that the lawsuit would be an expensive one for the Rockcastle County School District and that a local school district could not win the suit since the Supreme Court has already ruled on the matter.

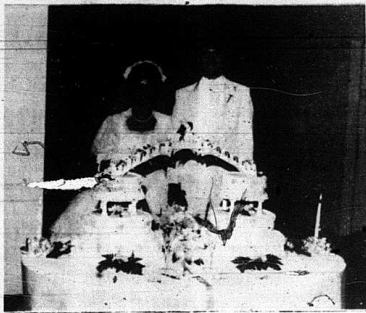

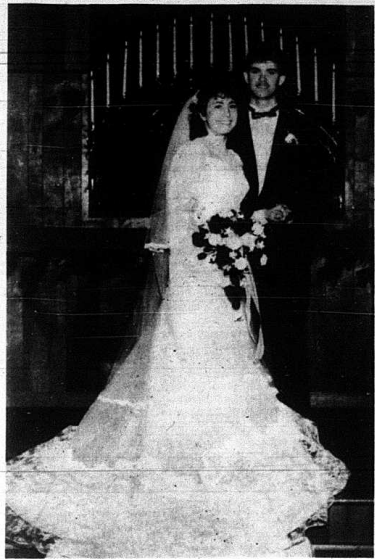

BE CAREFUL WITH CANNED GOODS THAT FREEZE

Consumers should be careful in handling canned foods which have accidentally frozen during the recent frigid weather.

Commercially canned foods should be left to thaw at room temperature, and any which leak should be discarded. Cans should be checked carefully especially around the rim and seam for leaks. If the contents of the can have caused the can to bulge or weaken during the freezing, the can should be discarded. If the can has not bulged nor weakened, the food may be consumed, but should be eaten as soon as possible. Cans

The Mt. Vernon Signal Thursday, January 31, 1985 P-7 should not be allowed to freeze a second time.

In the case of home canned foods, jars should be checked carefully for cracks and even those without cracks should be checked for proper sealage. When frozen, contents may expand; pushing up against the lid breaking the seal. For a safe seal, the lid should be slightly caved after thawing and when tapped with a metal span the jar should produce a high pitched sound. If properly sealed, the food is safe to consume, but as in the case of commercially canned food, the jar should not be allowed to freeze a second time.

To prevent canned goods from freezing, jars can be wrapped in newspapers or covered with blankets or quilts.

Grace and Conditional Salvation

Eph. 2:8-10

The story of God's grace and how we are saved by grace is a thrilling and heart warming story. It is generally agreed that man is saved by grace, and apart from grace, there could be no salvation (Eph. 2:8).

Grace is "good will" loving kindness, favor, contains the idea of kindness which bestows upon the sinner what he does not deserve." (Thayer, p.666).

The emphasis here is upon God's part with reference to our salvation, which is a gift to the sinner.

There is an idea among some people that if salvation is by grace, it cannot be conditioned upon man's obedience to the gospel. Or if it is conditional upon man's obedience then it cannot be by grace. They argue that if one has to do anything (be baptized), then his salvation would be of works, not of grace.

However, the above mentioned scriptures do not teach that we are saved by grace alone. Other verses teach that salvation is conditional. Notice again Eph. 2:8. "For by grace are we saved through faith."

The qualifying phrase "through faith" must not be overlooked; for it is as much a part of the text as is the portion with reference to grace—Salvation for the lost is provided and offered by God's grace; it is recognized and appropriated by man's faith. Thus the text shows that grace is God's part and faith is man's part in salvation.

Some use God's grace as an "insurance policy," when in fact it is an "assurance policy," with provisions. Obedience

nullifies neither grace nor faith, but UNITES them. If one is saved by grace unconditionally, then ALL will be saved because God's grace has appeared upon ALL men (Titus 2:11). If salvation by grace is conditional (and it is), then only those who obey the conditions (terms) will be saved (Heb. 5:8-9).

Faith is belief in God and His word (Heb. 11:1, 3, Rom. 10:17). It is to be exercised by man, for "faith without works is dead" (James 2:26). Faith must be believing and active. Thus faith leads to repentance, baptism and faithfulness in life (Acts 2:37-38; Rev. 2:10). Someone wants to say they BELIEVE in Christ and that they truly have FAITH, but they refuse to admit that obedience has anything to do with their salvation! If one refuses to obey the Lord, he is NOT A BELIEVER in the Bible sense.

As the lesson is applied to us, the sinner needs a blessing which he cannot secure for himself. He needs forgiveness and to be regarded as righteous before God; and the New Testament shows that it is only through God's grace that it is possible to have these benefits.

It does not, make any difference how many things may be required of the sinner by way of "obedience to the faith" (Rom. 1:5). It always remains true that such acts of obedience do not earn or merit salvation; they are simply works of God which make faith perfect (James 2:22).

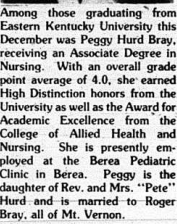

Be Prepared to Renovate Your Pastures—Test Your Soil Early

The harsh winter weather that has been gripping the state makes it hard to realize that only next month you should begin re-establishing legumes in your grass pastures. Legumes can be sown in February because the grass will protect the young seedlings from frost and heaving. Heaving occurs when the freezing and thawing of the soil pushes plant seedlings out of the ground.

But, before you plant, take a soil test to determine lime and fertilizer needs. Soil samples should be taken as soon as the ground thaws because of the two or three weeks required to get the results back. Later in the spring when the rush is on, getting samples analyzed may take a month or more. Many farmers put off taking a soil sample until it is too late to get the results back in time to apply the needed lime and fertilizer.

The most necessary element for establishing legumes is phosphorus, which is essential for plant life and is especially needed in cold, wet soils in winter. Phosphorus can be applied well ahead of planting because it does not leach from the soil. Phosphorus reacts with the soil, which ties it up. But high levels of phosphorus can build up in the soil and still be unavailable to plants because of soil pH.

The phosphorus content in Kentucky soils varies widely because both native phosphorus and phosphorus applied as fertilizer are tied up in soils with low pH. Both naturally-occurring phosphorus and phosphorus applied as fertilizer are more available when the soil pH is between 6 and 7. Liming your pastures will be beneficial in increasing the availability of soil phosphorus. The only way to know if phosphorus is available in your pastures, is to have your soil analyzed.

If you plan to apply for cost sharing through the ASCS, sign-up dates are now through February 15th. The fall sign-up is June 1. July 15. Contact the ASCS office for more information on cost sharing programs.

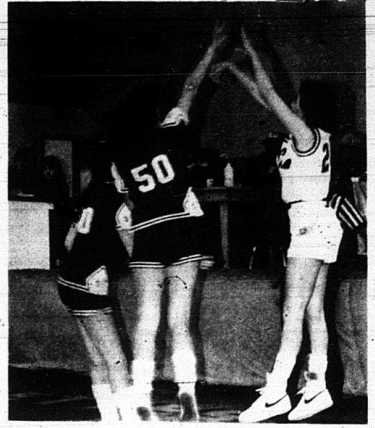

staff members. Employment begins June 1 and generally ends around mid-August.

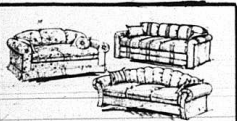

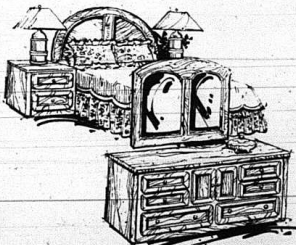
