



## Cutbacks in number of football and basketball games

The Kentucky High School Athletic Association has proposed cutbacks in the number of regular-season football and basketball games and other changes in athletic programs in order to limit the loss of school time because of athletic practice or games.

The recommendations came at a joint meeting of the KHSAA Board of Control and the Kentucky State Board of Education on Wednesday (Jan. 2) in Frankfort.

The two groups also discussed the possibility of scheduling state high school basketball tournaments during spring breaks but reached no conclusions. The KHSAA board agreed to study the scheduling issue further and make a recommendation to the State Board of Education, possibly by the education board's March meeting.

Superintendent of Public Instruction Alice McDonald said the two groups had "made some great strides" in working out common problems. Changes are needed, "so we won't be sending mixed signals to students" by allowing athletics to infringe upon teaching, she said.

"What we're after is an overall feeling in Kentucky that academics does rule the school day," McDonald said. "We are looking, not to hurt athletics, but to help academics."

KHSAA Commissioner Tom Mills said some of the proposals, including those related to the shortening of the football and basketball seasons, would meet changes in the association's constitution or bylaws. Those changes would have to be approved by the KHSAA delegate assembly, which meets in April, he said.

Mills noted that the KHSAA has already approved a plan supporting the six-hour instructional day called for by McDonald and the State Board of Education. The recommendations being made by the KHSAA board "will show that we are in agreement with your efforts and that we support you 100 percent," he said.

He said the proposed cutbacks in the number of regular-season games would allow schools to schedule most of their games on Friday or Saturday nights. This change would resolve a concern previously expressed by board members about the scheduling of games on nights before school days, he said.

The KHSAA recommendations would cut the number of regular-season football games, including pre-season bowl games, from 11 to 10. For schools playing football, the number of regular-season basketball games would be cut from the present 24 to 20. Schools that do not play football would be allowed to play 24 regular-season basketball games instead of the present 30.

Under the proposed rule changes, organized football practice in pads could not begin before Aug. 1. Players would be required to have five days of practice without pads before that time to become acclimated to heat conditions. No organized basketball practice would be permitted before Oct. 15.

The KHSAA board also proposed a rule change that would give the commissioner and board authority to suspend a coach, player or member school for violations of sportsmanship. This would permit the association to penalize the responsible individual instead of the whole school program, Mills said.

The two boards also discussed the issue of "red-shirting" or holding back students to give them more years of athletic play or allow them to gain maturity before playing.

James Ratcliffe, chairman of the State Board of Education, asked the KHSAA board to consider a suggested rule change that would make red-shirting an accreditation violation and to report to the state board at its March meeting.

Members of the two boards also discussed issues relating to player eligibility and certification requirements for coaches but made no formal recommendations.

At its meeting on Thursday, the State Board of Education agreed to create a committee made up of members of both boards and representatives of other athletic groups to study and make recommendations on issues raised at the joint meeting and to review the KHSAA bylaws.

In another athletics-related action the board upheld a hearing officer's report declaring Mar

Gentry eligible to play on the Whitesburg High School basketball team. The KHSAA board had ruled that she was ineligible to

play because of an alleged recruiting violation.

The education board also approved a recommendation that

the KHSAA amend its bylaws so the person accused of recruiting could be held responsible, rather than the player.

## Kentucky classes now conform with size limit

All Kentucky classes are now in conformance with the maximum class size limits, officials of the Kentucky Department of Education told members of the Kentucky State Board of Education at its meeting on Thursday (Jan. 3).

In November, education officials reported that 512 classes in 108 Kentucky school districts were in violation of the class size limits. The board directed that any classes not in compliance by Jan. 15 lose funding for the entire unit from the Minimum Foundation Program.

Class size reductions were made outright in many school districts, while others requested and were granted exemptions from the class size limits.

The board heard a report on educational services for the hearing-impaired by the Kentucky Task Force on Hearing and the Deaf. The task force, an advocacy group for the deaf, said there were about 3,000 Kentucky children who had not been "identified, evaluated or placed" in educational programs for the hearing-impaired.

"The state may not be in compliance with federal regulations on educational programming

for the hearing-impaired," task force member Bill Rogers told the board.

Task force recommendations included the establishment of a program to identify and test both students and preschool children to determine any level of hearing-impairedness. The group also recommended the creation of a special evaluation team and a model consulting team to help develop statewide testing and identification standards. Task force members urged that personnel from Kentucky's colleges and universities be included in development of these programs.

Superintendent of Public Instruction Alice McDonald asked that proposals for a pilot outreach program be developed by education officials and presented to the board at its March meeting.

"This is one of the things which I deeply must be addressed by this board and the state Department of Education. An outreach program for these students is greatly needed," McDonald said.

In other action, the board approved the transfer of Lake Joann Subdivision in Pikeville from the Pike County School

District to the Pikeville Independent School District.

The board also approved a regulation to ensure that all school construction in Kentucky be done only in areas above the 100-year floodplain.

Board member Dr. Ann Bardwell reported that work on a creation of a statement of the state board's goal and priorities was under way. Rankings of goals and priorities have been submitted by each member of the board, and a proposed statement of these goals and priorities will be presented to the board at its next regular meeting for approval, Bardwell said.

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
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
## Partnership Agreement

## Brodhead council considers options for housing new truck

A new county fire truck to serve the western area of Rockcastle County will be housed at Brodhead in the near future. Now, to find it a home.

And finding that home will be the responsibility of the Brodhead City Council, and the council discussed its options briefly at a meeting Monday night.

The truck was approved at a called meeting of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Council last week.

The council apparently has two options: "One option has the present Brodhead Volunteer Fire Department office and the City Council chamber moved to a remodeled apartment on the second floor of the Fire Department Building and the first floor offices remodeled for the truck.

The other option is to build an addition on the east side of the building to fire department and city offices.

The councilmen agreed a decision will have to be made soon or the truck could end up in a tent.

The \$409,000 Brodhead sewer project is about 80% complete and the project should be completed by June 30, the council was told by Jim Cass, project engineer.

The project, expected to serve about 30 to 35 families, is in an area called Water Tank Hill and along Highway 1505.

Left to be constructed at a future date, and already included in project money, are lines to a subdivision known as the Proffit property.

Mayor Ronnie Cash reported the Kentucky Department of Transportation will make a traffic survey along U. S. 150 in the city limits.

The city asked the department to reduce the speed limit along the route from 35 miles an hour to 30 miles an hour. The mayor said the city decided on the reduced speed limit because of the business area and the Sowder Nursing Home.

A public notice printed in the Signal by the Kentucky Division of Water, reporting that the city of Brodhead was in violation of regulatory requirements during October, 1984, was explained by Water Superintendent Devalva

Bussell.

Bussell said a monthly report that is required after water testing for that month was not forwarded to the state. He said it was an oversight.

The test results showed some contamination by Caliform bacteria had occurred and was the result of a chlorine deficiency. He said the deficiency has been

remedied.

The state stressed in its advertisement that Caliform bacteria is not in itself considered harmful, but is an indicator that harmful bacteria may have been present in the water during that particular month.

Bussell noted that Brodhead receives its water from the Mt. Vernon Water Works.

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## Collins has new rural secondary program for Rockcastle

Governor Martha Layne Collins has announced the approved 1985-86 Rural Secondary Program for Rockcastle County.

"We have budgeted \$260,400 for maintenance and traffic improvements for 86.8 miles of state roads on this program," said Governor Collins. "This program is essential to ensure the proper maintenance of the state's 11,000 miles of rural roads," she added. Governor Collins said the state will also patch 2.8 miles of KY 328, Bee Lick-Quail Road; 1.6 miles of County Road 5252, Level Green Road; 1.9 miles of County Road 5264, Owens School Road; 4 miles of County Road 5359, Copper Creek Road; and 1.2 miles of County Road 5384, Slaty Branch Road.

State Transportation Secretary Floyd G. Poore said the program is estimated to cost \$325,839 and is being funded with Rural Secondary funds. Secretary Poore noted that the patching projects will be done by state forces and will be worked into the schedule as soon as time permits.

Governor Collins explained that the criteria used to determine each county's budget for the Rural Secondary Program includes land area, rural road mileage and population.



## Filing deadline "Slips up" on incumbents

Mayoral candidates in the three cities in Rockcastle County will be opposed in the November General Election, according to nominating petitions filed with County Clerk Irene Bales.

Deadline for filing for Mayor was February 27. However, city councilmen have until Aug. 27 to file their petitions.

Filing for Mayor of Mt. Vernon was Pete Hurd. Filing for Mayor of Livingston was Billy Medley. Filing for Mayor of Brodhead was Billy B. Bussell.

A change in the filing deadline for this year apparently caught the incumbent mayors by surprise. Mayor Ronnie Cash said he received no notification of the change in filing dates. A check with the Clerk at Mt. Vernon indicated no letter was received by the city. The instructions came from the Office of the Kentucky Attorney General and the State Board of Elections.

An official at the State Board said the information was sent out. "Sometimes these things get misplaced and sometimes they are not read," she stated.

Mrs. Bales said the information was received at her office, but she did not read it closely, thinking it was routine and the dates for filing would be the same as other years.

She added that cities usually watch out for information about their elections.

The information from the State Board of Elections consists of two pages. Page one states "all" candidates in 5th class cities operating under the nonpartisan city primary act. "must file 90 days before the May Primary (February 27 deadline)," but then on a second page it separates 5th class cities out of other class cities and says "candidates for mayor must file 90 days before May Primary Election."

Any other candidate for Mayor will have to run as a write-in.

## School ends June Teacher files charge against school board

A Rockcastle County school teacher has filed charges against the local Board of Education.

School Superintendent Charles B. Parsons notified board members of the charges at their regular monthly meeting Tuesday night.

Mrs. Sue Hamm, a guidance counselor for two of the four county grade schools, brought the charges against Parsons and the Board because she felt she was sexually discriminated against, according to Superintendent Parsons, who said he received notification of the charges by certified mail last Friday.

Mrs. Hamm, who is also the

director of the school district's gifted program, filed her charges with the "Equal Employment Opportunity Commission," according to Parsons, who said the Louisville based organization would turn the case over to the Human Rights Commission for review.

Parsons said in open meeting that he was advised by EEOC to wait and see what the findings of the Human Rights Commission were before the Board hired an attorney in their defense.

Parsons said the Board's attorney, Carl R. Clontz, would handle the matter for the present time, and if it should become a court case, another decision would be made.

On question, the Superintendent said it was his understanding that Mrs. Hamm alleged in her charges that she had applied for Principal and Assistant Principal openings in the school system for the last two or three years and had always been passed over because "she was a female."

Each of the five board members present had no comment on the matter except for Chairman Dr. R. Burdette, who said, "It's a heck."

### New School Calendar

If no more school is called off because of bad weather, Rockcastle County students and teachers will get out on June 6.

Board members unanimously approved the new calendar, which calls for a Memorial Day holiday. Parsons said it was his understanding that Rockcastle would receive 9 calamity days from the

## After much confusion, county accepts truck bid

Things are not always what they seem, and things seemed to be a bit confused on the matter of a bid awarded during the monthly meeting Tuesday of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court.

Focal point was the bid awarded for a new county fire truck for use in the western area of the county to be stationed at Brodhead.

The magistrates amended the minutes of a previous meeting and changed the bid award from one company to another.

Bidding for the truck plus equipment was Allegheny Fire Equipment Co. of Huntington, W. Va., and Summit Fire Apparatus of Fort Mitchell.

Because of what the court called a mathematical error, the wrong company had the lower bid, or did they?

As best can be determined through a check of the bids, Allegheny bid \$56,499 and Summit bid \$56,309, a difference of \$179.

According to records of the initial bid opening, Allegheny declared a five-year warranty. Summit declared a one-year warranty. Summit later amended the one-year warranty to five years.

The magistrates approved the

initial bid on Feb. 28 and awarded the bid to Summit on a motion by Magistrate Joe Clark, seconded by Bill Wren. Donald Rowe voted yes, D. G. Albright voted yes, and Thomas Denney abstained.

In the vote to amend and

award the bid to Allegheny, the motion was made by Judge Bob Jasper, seconded by Bill Wren. Albright voted yes, Denney voted yes, Clark voted no, and Rowe abstained.

The matristates approved the bid to Summit on a motion by Magistrate Joe Clark, seconded by Bill Wren. Donald Rowe voted yes, D. G. Albright voted yes, and Thomas Denney abstained.

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## 103 candidates file for office

There'll be a record number of candidates to choose from when voters go to the polls in the May 28 Primary Election, according to records at the office of Rockcastle County Clerk Irene Bales.

A total of 103 candidates will appear on the ballot. As best as can be determined, that is a record, but only one.

There were 102 candidates on the Rockcastle County ballot four years ago.

Of the 103 this year, only seven are Democrats. They will face the Republican nominees in the November General Election.

In the major countywide offices, four incumbents are seeking re-election, including County

Magistrate Joe Clark, seconded by Bill Wren. Donald Rowe voted yes, D. G. Albright voted yes, and Thomas Denney abstained.

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## Hale, Hasty, Artley, Cummins, Bullock, Jones, Taylor announce for county office

Filing for this May's Primary is over, and a total of seven more candidates have announced their intentions to run.

All seven men will run on the Republican side of the coin and include such hopefuls as incumbent Property Valuation Administrator H. E. "Elmer" Hale and former Deputy Sheriff Clarence "Jibb" Hasty.

Hale, who won in his first outing in politics four years ago, will face Cleith Thacker in May. Hale defeated the late Robert Cromer four years ago when he carried every precinct in the county and won by more than 1,000 votes.

The President of the Mt. Vernon Lions Club is a former building contractor and is the son of former Tax Commissioner Homer Hale.

Hasty, who ran a successful campaign in 1981 with present Sheriff William E. Taylor, joins a field of 10 Republicans seeking that office.

A veteran of the Vietnam War, Hasty served for 2 1/2 years as Taylor's deputy and is presently the county's garbage collector.

Married to the former Brenda Bullock, Hasty and his wife have five children.

The son of Clarence Hasty, Sr. and the late Effie Doan Hasty, he is 38 years old and a native of Rockcastle County and lives in Mt. Vernon.

Former Livingston police officer Charles "Dick" Artley has announced his candidacy for Sheriff and will run with Dennis Marshall as his deputy.

Artley lives on Carter Drive in Mt. Vernon and is married to the former Mildred Mason. They have four children.

Presently unemployed, Artley served as a Rockcastle County Constable in the 1960's.

Dennis Marshall is employed at Berea Hospital and is married to the former Arlene Anderkin.

Making his first attempt at a county office will be James Jones of Rt. 2, Mt. Vernon. Jones has filed for Magistrate in the fourth district.

He joins W. H. Wren and Amos Burdette in the race. The fourth district has the fewest magisterial candidates.

Jones is married to the former Marsha Ponder, and they have two children, Jamie and Amy.

The 1972 Livingston High School graduate is the son of the late Riley and Stella Jones and is self-employed.

Earl C. Cummins, a resident of Rt. 1, Mt. Vernon, has filed papers for the Republican nomination to the office of jailer.

This is Cummins' first attempt at public office, although Mr. Cummins says he has always been interested in community and political affairs, having involvement with the Young Republicans Club, the Rockcastle Jaycees and the local Masonic Lodge.

Cummins, a life-long Republican, resigned from a correctional officers position at the state prison near Danville in order to run for jailer. At present, he is the director of the Rockcastle Ambulance Service.





Pope said, "We're very proud of the fine foster homes we work with in Rockcastle County. We just need more of them and we ask anyone who wants to become a foster parent or simply wants more information to contact us."





### EXERCISE PLUS NUTRITION A WINNING COMBINATION

(This is the first of a series of four articles.)

County and state Extension personnel are celebrating National Nutrition Month during March with the theme of "Exercise Plus Nutrition—A Winning Combination."

Darlene Forester, food and nutrition specialist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, said this national focus on nutrition is a good point in time to remind everyone to be especially aware of the importance of good diet and exercise habits for good health.

"It's also a good time for active adults to become aware of the fact that they do not need a lot of diet supplements," Forester said. "Health professionals and other persons involved in promoting fitness can help by promoting

sound advice on good diets and physical fitness."

Here are some questions of interest to unusually active adults along with answers suggested by Forester.

Q. Do adults engaged in physical activities need special nutrients?

A. Only energy or calories are needed above normal amounts. A balanced diet should consist of the same group of nutrients recommended for all adults. These include protein, fats, carbohydrates, vitamins, minerals and water. It is especially important to remember to replace lost water.

Q. Do active adults need vitamin and mineral supplements?

A. No. Some products labeled as "energy-giving" supplements are expensive, unnece-

ssary. Not usually. The needs are the same whether one exercises or not. A well-balanced diet should include necessary vitamins and minerals in foods. Some people think potassium should be supplemented. However, eating fruits and vegetables rich in potassium is all that's necessary for most people. Persons taking diuretics or water pills may need to check with their physician since these drugs may deplete the body of some potassium.

Q. Are other special pills or protein supplements needed for active adults?

A. No. Some products labeled as "energy-giving" supplements are expensive, unnece-



sary for good health and possibly health risks. Read labels carefully and check with a physician or registered dietitian for advice on specific products. Be pollen-touted as "energizing" is not recommended as a diet supplement. Neither are protein powders which are just an expensive form of a nutrient one normally gets in a regular diet of meat, milk, breads and cereals.

Q. What are some reliable sources of information for adults who want a healthy active lifestyle?

A. Magazines such as "Self, Health, and American Health" contain factual articles with sound information on diet and exercise for the public. Some useful books include: E. Addelman's "The Winning Edge: Nutrition for Athletic Fitness and Performance" and Pete Wood's "California Diet and Exercise Program." One of the more popular books, "Eat to Live: Eat to Win" is NOT recommended. It contains misinformation and most of it is "pseudoscientific" in nature. Most data used to support its recommendations are based on personal anecdotes rather than scientific research.





A 1985 Kentucky trout stamp, don't forget to do so before you go fishing. The 11 1/2 x 2 1/2 stamps, which must be signed and affixed to your fishing or combination hunting and fishing license, are required for all trout angling.

Kentucky trout stamps sell for \$3.50 each, and can be purchased from your county clerk, or from any where that Kentucky fishing license are sold.

If you're a real trout fishing enthusiast, a stamp collector (philatelist) or just enjoy fine wildlife art, you may consider purchasing a signed print of the 1985 Kentucky trout stamp from artist Heiner Hertling. His colorful 6 1/2 x 9" print is mounted with a stamp in a 12 x 14" portfolio which sells for \$88.50 plus \$5.00 for postage and handling.

The signed prints may be obtained by mail from: H:Art Studios, Inc., 3226 Wellington Court, West Bloomfield, Michigan 48303 or ordered over the telephone by calling (313) 360-1068. Cashier's checks, money orders, Visa and Mastercard are accepted.

Hertling's recent works include the '84 Michigan Trout Stamp, and the '85 Colorado Trout Stamp. Entries for the 1986 Kentucky Trout Stamp contest will continue to be accepted until March 15. A copy of the rules and procedures for the 1986 Kentucky Trout Stamp design competition may be obtained by writing: Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, Division of Public Relations, #1 Game Farm Road, Frankfort, Ky. 40601. The public is invited to attend the judging of the entries on Sunday, March 24 at 2 p.m. in the Old State Capitol Annex at Frankfort. A panel of five judges will pick the winner from an expected 100 entries.

Kentucky trout stamps date back to 1971. Revenues from the sale of 1984 trout stamps are still being tabulated," said Lloyd Rules, License Officer for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. Sales have increased through the years from a few thousand in the beginning to 26,192 by 1978. In 1983, 34,102 trout stamps were purchased by anglers throughout the state.

"We have stamps dating back to 1981 still available for purchase by collectors." Rules said, adding that "payment should be made in the form of a check or money order made out to the department." The cost of 1981, '82 and '83

stamps is \$1.00 each; the '84 and '85 issues are \$3.50 each.

Revenue from the sale of trout stamps is used to help finance the stocking of trout from federal hatcheries into Kentucky streams and lakes. The funds, which are paid by anglers, are used to offset the cost of fuel, manpower and transportation.

## Assistance is available in planting trees

Many Kentucky woodland owners would like some assistance in planting trees but don't know where to look. Fortunately help is just next door.

This help can come from the County Extension Agent, who provides out of school training in multiple use forestry, Christmas tree planting, windbreak planting, harvesting, marketing, business management and safety. Or this help can come from the Soil Conservation Service in the form of conservation plans and soils maps of your land.

Other agencies such as the

Agriculture Stabilization Conservation Service (ASCS) can provide cost-share money to help pay up to 65% of the cost of planting the trees. Or a landowner could borrow the money through the Farmers Home Administration.

Technical assistance is offered by the Kentucky Division of Forestry through the Cooperative Forest Management Program. Under the CFM Program state employed professional foresters advise landowners on developing forest management plans including improvement of existing

Whose interest is served? Certainly not the University of Kentucky's.

I believe Rupp's family should have been spared such cheap shots about the Coach's alleged eccentricities and human frailties. After all, the core of Kentucky's rich basketball heritage is set on a foundation put down and made firm over 42 winters by Adolph Frederick Rupp who was wise enough to surround himself with capable staff.

Those who genuinely care about the college game and its lively popularity in the 1980's should recall also Rupp's contribution to it and keep it sacred.

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

fairegrounds at Brodhead for three more years.

Holding the lease are William F. Martin, Bill Gentry, Billy B. Russell and Bryan Buswell.

The date of the original lease was for two weeks during August, 1983 and 1984 with an option to renew for two more weeks in August, 1985 and 1986.

Martin, who made the request to extend the lease, indicated the lessees wanted a longer period of time in order to make repairs and additions of various kinds at the fairegrounds.

Rental payment is \$5,255.55 a year. No mention of a change in that amount was made. Presumably, it remains the same.

At the request of Attorney John Clontz, the court approved payment of \$1,500 to help the Industrial Development Authority with an audit of books and a partial payment on interest on a \$120,000 loan made by the Authority. Clontz said the remaining amount to be paid totals \$70,000.

After considerable discussion the court voted to require county road and maintenance employees to have a signed purchase order to buy parts for county vehicles. Required on the order will be the part number, what the part is, and on which vehicle the part is to be installed.

The county general fund will get about \$15,000 of unbudgeted money from various sources, including Sheriff tax levies, interest investments, mineral severance tax service, finance for Quail Community Park, and national forest receipts for roads.

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
