Griffith retains membership in Academy of Family Physicians

Dr. George W. Griffith of Mt. Vernon has completed continuing education requirements to retain active membership in the American Academy of Family Physicians, the national association of family doctors. The Academy formerly was called the American Academy of General Practice.

The requirements call for members to complete a minimum of 150 hours of accredited continuing medical study every three years. The Academy was the first national medical group to require members to keep up with medical progress through continuing education. Because of their board training, family physicians have the "know how" to treat approximately 90 percent of all human illnesses.

The Academy, founded in 1917 and headquartered in Kansas City, Mo., was instrumental in the establishment of the specialty of family practice in 1969. Besides maintaining continuing education standards for its members, the Academy strives to increase the number of family physicians avail-

able to serve the public in the future.

Its continuing education program also provides a major basis for eligibility for Academy members seeking recertification in the specialty of family practice.

FmHA offers more credit for Rockcastle farmers

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) is making changes in its regulations to encourage commercial lenders to help their farm borrowers who are having economic problems by taking advantage of the FmHA's debt adjustment program according to Robert W. Harnsby, County Supervisor.

The debt adjustment program is part of the Farm Credit Initiative announced by President Reagan last September. It is designed to help banks and other lenders reduce the amount of loan payments to a level farmers can afford.

The program allows FmHA to guarantee a portion of farm loans owed to banks and other lenders under certain conditions. FmHA agrees to make up part of the loss to the lender if the borrower

defaults. This government guarantee makes it possible for the lenders to stay with their farm borrowers longer than they could otherwise.

The new regulations will help banks and other lenders cooperate with the program by allowing them to write down interest in exchange for the government guarantee. Previously, they were required to write off a minimum of ten percent of the principal of the loan. When the change becomes effective, they can reduce the loan through interest or principal or a combination of both.

Under another part of the President's Farm Credit Initiative, FmHA is reviewing loans of its own borrowers. So far, in Jackson County, Mr. Harnsby said FmHA has been able to adjust loans for over twenty

P-82 The Mt. Vernon Signal Thursday, March 14 and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) to provide whatever help they can for Farm borrowers in economic trouble. Mr. Horisby said.

FmHA also has selected expert credit teams that will assist farm borrowers if the bank they have loans with has failed. In addition, the agency is cooperating with state and other agricultural agencies and groups to establish a "hot line" telephone service in some areas.

The Agriculture Department is working closely with other federal and regulatory agencies such as the Treasury Department, the Farm Credit Administration, the Comptroller of the Currency

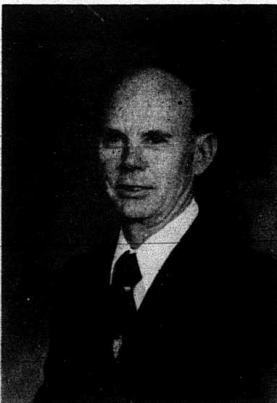

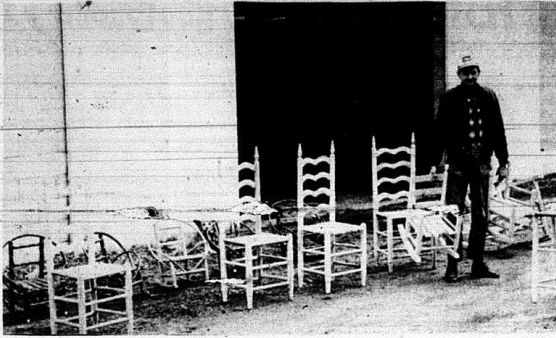

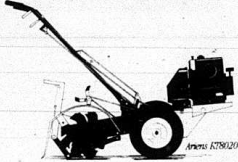

Local man jailed after shooting

A Rockcastle County man is being held in the county jail under a \$25,000 cash bond following a shooting incident in Mt. Vernon Sunday afternoon.

Charles Durham, 26, of Mt. Vernon, was arrested Monday by Rockcastle County Sheriff William Taylor after a warrant for his arrest was issued.

The warrant for first degree assault was issued because Durham allegedly shot Orme Kirby, 23, of Rt. 5, Mt. Vernon, with a .38 caliber pistol, according to Taylor, who said the shooting took place in the parking lot of Settle's Drive-In (formerly Mullins' Drive-In) on Richmond Street around 5 p.m.

The local sheriff said that Durham told him that he shot Kirby after Kirby fired a shot at him.

The warrant for Durham's arrest was taken out by Kirby's sister, Donna Cromer, who lives on Hwy. 70 near Brodhead, according to Taylor, who said it was his understanding that Durham telephoned Mrs. Cromer and admitted to the shooting.

Taylor said the incident was apparently the result of an on-going dispute between the two men. He said that in December of last year, Durham swore out two warrants for Kirby for menacing Sunday's incident reportedly started near Western Auto in Mt. Vernon and moved down the street Taylor said Durham told him that he and Kirby had words near the store and that when he (Kirby), passed by the drive-in, Kirby fired a shot at him. Durham then stopped his car in the parking lot of Buck's Auto Parts and shot back at Kirby.

Taylor said that Kirby ran up the hill to the home of Beatrice Durham, which is located directly behind Settle's Drive-In, where Deputy Sheriff Jim Durham, who is Beatrice's son, took Kirby to the Rockcastle County Hospital.

However, Taylor said that when Trooper Jack Lawless interviewed Kirby at the hospital, he told him that he had not been shot, but it was learned Monday that Kirby was treated for a gunshot wound and released.

Durham was scheduled for a preliminary hearing before District Judge William Cain yesterday (Wednesday), and Taylor said he was told that Kirby was at home recovering from his injuries.

According to records on file in the Rockcastle Circuit Clerk's office, Kirby is out on bond awaiting two different jury trials.

Local county and city governments lose great deal if revenue sharing cut

The threatened halt of federal revenue sharing funds has produced a "doom and gloom" atmosphere in city and county offices where officials are already struggling to make financial ends meet.

Officials generally call the proposal to end revenue sharing disturbing and disastrous, and are asking themselves: What are we going to do?

Conceivably, there could be more holes in the streets, less garbage collection, and a reduction in fire protection, to name three.

Federal revenue sharing funds are targeted for an abrupt halt in the Reagan Administration's 1986 budget. The proposal to end the program September 30 this year - a year before it officially expires - admittedly would leave many Kentucky cities and counties short of funds for services of all kinds, including fire, police and garbage disposal.

Some officials are already in a panic because the proposed end to revenue sharing is made formal by plans to eliminate federal funds for economic development, transportation, public works and other existing programs.

Funds for the program have been constant at \$4.6 billion nationwide for each of eight years. It is the only federal funding which local governments can use

to meet specific community needs. In many cases, the funds are used to provide for services required by federal law such as sewer treatment, clean water, health care and functions for the needy or disabled.

According to U. S. Senator Wendell Ford, "There is no doubt that state and local governments are going to have to find innovative ways to adjust to federal budget cutbacks as the federal budget deficit is attacked. But it is wrong, in my opinion, for the federal government to pull the rug out from under local governments this way."

Senator Ford said "if the revenue sharing program must suffer cuts, they must be part of across-the-board budget reduction rather than an abrupt halt in this one program. And if there is no choice but to end this important program, it must be phased out gradually," he added. "This instant, dramatic elimination of revenue sharing would send shock waves throughout our communities."

Shock waves are beginning to be felt locally.

Rockcastle County Judge/Executive Bob Jasper said the termination of revenue sharing would only make county financial matters worse than they are already.

Treasurer Floyd Owens agreed. "We have two alternatives," he said. "Either cut out

Petition not revealed last week

Mullins actually on ballot for November's election

Another mayoral petition has surfaced at the office of the Rockcastle County Clerk.

It is the petition of incumbent Mt. Vernon mayor Roland Mullins.

The date and time of the petition filing is about 10:20 p.m. Feb. 27, well within the requirements of the State Board of Elections.

When a check was made on March 7 to see the petitions of the mayoral candidates for the November General Election, Deputy Clerk David Bales produced those of Pete Hurd of Mt. Vernon, Billy B. Bussell of Brodhead and Bro. Billy Medley, incumbent Livingston mayor.

Mayor Mullins said he asked

clerk Bales earlier not to reveal the petition and to hold it until he could decide whether or not to seek re-election.

Mullins said he did not want to run again and hoped someone would run who would carry out the various programs underway in the city.

"I asked David to put my petition aside so if I decided not to run I could withdraw the petition before the deadline," the mayor said.

Neither Mayor Mullins nor clerk Bales explained why the petition could not be revealed a week after the deadline for filing.

In city elections a petition bearing 20 names of registered voters living within the registered unit must be filed with the nomination petition.

The whole filing process for mayor got off to a shaky start when at the last minute it was discovered election laws had been changed with the deadline date for filing moved up from August 27 to February 27 for mayors of 5th class cities.

When the discovery was made as the deadline neared, candidates rushed to get their 20 signers and file.

All four filed after 8 p.m. of Feb. 27. The deadline was midnight.

Mayor Ronnie Cash of Brodhead was upset because of not knowing of the change in dates. He was on vacation in Las Vegas when the deadline passed.

He said this week he would not personally mount a written campaign to oppose Bussell.

"I'm unhappy about the way it was all handled, and that I was not made aware earlier about the change in the filing date," Cash said.

He added that any written campaign would have to be initiated by others.

"I have no intention of making any attempt at a written campaign," he said.

Ambulance service gets only \$77.00 grant money

A "grand" total of \$77 is the amount the Rockcastle Ambulance Service will receive this year from the Cabinet for Human Resources.

In making grants to 110 ambulance services, the Cabinet officials reported Rockcastle received the smallest amount. Pulaski County got \$35,854 for equipment and personnel, and Whitley County, \$34,033.

The grants totaled \$1,096,962 and were issued through the Emergency Medical Service branch.

Mike Barr, director of respiratory services at the Rockcastle County Hospital, said the amount of money received by the ambulance service depends on the amount allocated by the county in the general fund budget. None in

Bro. Billy Medley, mayor of Livingston, said the city has received about \$4,670 in revenue sharing funds with most of it going to the police and fire department and some for garbage collection. The city expects to get an additional \$1,500 this year. Livingston has a total budget of \$29,006 for 1985.

Mt. Vernon's total amount received in revenue sharing is \$32,542. The city's general fund budget is \$139,960.

The city allocated \$30,245 in revenue sharing money to the police department, \$500 for Rockcastle senior citizens, \$597 to the Cumberland River Mental Health and Retardation Fund, and \$1,200 to the Cumberland Valley Area Development District.

Mayor Roland Mullins said loss of revenue sharing for Mt. Vernon would represent 25 percent of the budget.

"If we suffer a cut off of funds, there will have to be a realignment of the budget," he said. "We'll have to discuss this between now and July 1."

Town Forum March 21

Sewer renovation project will be bid in 45 to 60 days

If everything goes according to plan, major sewer projects in Mt. Vernon should be bid in 45 to 60 days and the projects completed by the end of the year.

This was reported at a meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night.

Engineers for the projects told the council preliminary work on the projects is about done. They said they did not believe there would be a delay in the projects unless something unusual occurs.

One project is estimated at \$755,000 and includes extension of lines, home installation, and renovation of facilities for some low to \$3,966 in 1985.

Total revenue available for appropriation for 1984-85 is \$29,861 with an actual appropriation of \$29,000.

A breakdown of the \$29,000 shows \$24,000 for streets, \$3,500 for police department and \$1,500 for the fire department. Brodhead's total General Fund budget for the year from tax sources is

inmate at \$1,382,356 and is to renovate the city sewer plant to raise the capacity from 200,000 gallons to 600,000 gallons.

The council agreed to pay \$7,535 to increase the size of a waterline to be relocated by the state near Red Top Restaurant.

The line is being moved to the east side of U.S. 25 from the west side in order to get it out of the way of the soon to be constructed KY 461 bypass. The council decided to increase the size of the line to 16 inches.

Also included in the allocation is construction on a sewer line for use at some future date at a point on Old Brodhead Road. The state is moving a water line in that area for KY 461 and the council decided to have a sewer line laid while the water line ditch is dug.

Referred to the Street Committee for recommendations was a problem ditch line on Terry Street. The committee will also look into a request for a street light near the home of Marshall Bullock.

tion notices because your insurance company is no longer writing business in our area?

Insurance is designed to protect the individual against a large unforeseen loss. It is not a maintenance agreement and it is definitely not designed as a hedge against financial problems. It seems that some people look at property and casualty insurance like a savings account—something that can be cashed in when times get rough. We see it everyday. For example, when the coal slides down the coal trucks turn up stolen, wrecked, or burned; the insurance wires get crossed and the house goes up in flames. Regardless of how you justify this, it is wrong.

So you say, "I agree, but I have never done that." This may be true, but we are not without blame. We allow those who do submit fraudulent claims to get away with it. When the insurance investigator comes around asking questions, we didn't see or hear anything, we don't want to get involved. After all it is not like some thug stealing an old woman's social security check, it's only an insurance company. Folks, it's exactly like stealing from that old woman, because she, too, pays insurance premiums, and they just went up.

When an insurance company obtains enough evidence to deny a fraudulent claim, the insured rushes out and files suit. That is when a jury of 12 of his good, honest, hardworking neighbors rule against the insurance company, almost without exception. Then the insurance company not only has to pay the fraudulent claims but also the legal fees and court costs. Most insurance companies have received enough of this Kentucky "home cooking" in the courtroom to feel that it is cheaper to pay the fraudulent claim in the first place, thereby saving the additional cost of defense. Now a great many insurance companies feel that it is to their benefit to pull out of Southeastern Kentucky altogether. They can't continue to pay out \$2,000 in claims for every \$1,000 they receive in premiums.

You and I are the losers in the long run; we have mortgages and liens which have to be secured by insurance. We will be able to get insurance, but we will have far fewer insurance companies from which to choose. In addition,

those companies which do insure us will charge a premium based upon our area loss history. There is no escaping what we have allowed to happen; we will pay for the fraudulent claims placed by our neighbors.

The insurance companies are not the cause of this problem. The insurance companies are strictly governed by the State Insurance Commission. Ninety-nine percent of the companies that are doing business are honest, reputable, and extremely fair. If a claim is justified, they want to pay a fair amount and they want to pay it as quickly as possible.

Friends, the problem is with you and me, the citizens of Southeastern Kentucky. This problem will not change until we send some signals to the industry as a whole. It will not change until we recognize our collective responsibilities and show a willingness to get involved and administer justice, justly.

EXERCISE PLUS NUTRITION-A WINNING COMBINATION FOR LESS ACTIVE ADULTS

(Second of a series of four articles)

Adults who have not been physically active may well wonder these days if the world has gone "fitness crazy." Everyone from kids to grandpas seems to be running, jogging, lifting heavy weights or otherwise punishing his body.

Last week's article in this special series celebrating March as National Nutrition Month focused on exercise and nutrition requirements for very active adults. This week attention is turned to adults who are generally, less active, but who probably need to get more action into their lives to burn up excess calories.

In the next two weeks, articles will be forthcoming to discuss exercise and nutrition for active young people and less active youth.

Darlene Forester, Extension food and nutrition specialist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, said that although it is not necessary for the inactive adult to jog—and in fact it may not be advisable that he do so—it is important for him to get

some movement into his life.

Instead of diving into a major program that may be too strenuous or buying a lot of expensive, running outfits, the less active adult should consider some practical ways of starting a fitness program.

"Start with one step at a time," she said. "Use a healthy substitute for an eating or exercising habit you want to change."

She added, "For example, instead of having dessert after a meal, go for a walk. Successful fitness programs have shown that walking after meals can be helpful in controlling weight."

Forester suggests finding friends to take walks with and then planning some activity each day.

"As one gets older, it is even more important to become more active to burn extra calories," she said. Increasing activity, even slightly, helps offset the problem of extra pounds creeping on with age due to lowered basal metabolic rate—the rate at which the body uses energy while at rest.

Because of this decreased rate, most individuals will increase their weight even if they do not consume more calories as they age. A good rule of thumb, Forester said, is to decrease calorie intake in food by five percent each decade from about age 25 on. However, if one doesn't choose to eat less, the same thing could be accomplished by burning up five percent more calories by increased exercise.

For many people, the ideal would be to do both, which would provide a controlled weight loss program while improving health conditioning.

The following are some light activities that use up two to five calories per minute: housework,

OIL CHANGE TIME FOR FRUIT TREES

It's time for backyard gardeners to change the oil on their fruit trees. Actually, last year's oil has probably washed away, but it's time to plan this year's application of dormant oil.

This safe-for-humans treatment (the oil is non-toxic) consists of spraying a very light oil, 70 second grade usually, on fruit trees while they are dormant. Timing is important in "dormant oil" applications to kill the greatest number of insects while posing the least threat to the tree.

It is important to understand how oil works, because it doesn't kill insects in the same way most insecticides do. Oil kills by smothering insects, not by poisoning them. For this reason, application techniques and timing are critical. The insects must be entirely coated with the oil, so it is

necessary to spray the tree until the oil begins to run off. Also, the oil will kill only those insects that are on the tree when the oil is applied.

Oil is especially good for controlling scale, overwintering mite eggs and overwintering aphid eggs. Because of the difficulty of controlling these insects, especially scale, application as late in the year as possible is recommended for fruit trees with a history of problems with these insects.

Timing of the application is as much an art as it is a science. As the name implies, the tree should be dormant when the oil is applied because it will kill tender young plant tissue just as it will kill insects. For that reason, the tendency is to want to spray early in the year. However, the later the application is made, the more

effective it will be in killing insects. For that reason, the tendency is to want to spray later in the year.

Another advantage is that warmer temperatures keeps the spray solution from freezing. When freezing takes place, the cracks allow air in and defeats the purpose in spraying.

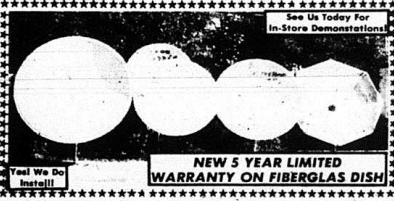





TV special documents problems facing farmers

"American Dreams: Three Faces of Farming," a made-for-TV special which tells the story of American agriculture through the lives of three farmers, will be shown in several viewing areas in Kentucky during National Agriculture Week, March 15-21.

The special will be seen Sunday, March 17, on these stations:
WBKO (Channel 13), Bowling Green, at 5 p.m.; WKYT (Channel 27), Lexington, at 1:30 p.m.; WAVE (Channel 3), Louisville, at 1:30 p.m.; WSIL, Paducah/Harrisburg, at 5:30 p.m.

"The special will help explain to many Americans unaware of the problems facing agriculture just how life is for farmers," said Agriculture Commissioner David E. Boswell. "It also shows their sacrifices and achievements to provide high quality, inexpensive food and fiber for the rest of the nation."

"American Dreams" spotlights the lives of George Stephenson, a former Dallas Cowboy who returned to the family dairy farm; Dennis Day, an Iowa who pioneered ethanol production; and Montana Gov. Ted Schwinden, a rancher.

"Though one in every five jobs in America exists because of agriculture, farm programs are under fire from the federal government to bear the brunt of budget cuts," Boswell continued. "Perhaps the experiences these men relate will show the general public how vital agriculture is and how a healthy agricultural industry mean prosperity for everyone."

The program is presented by Elanco Products Co. and sponsored by the American Bankers Assoc., the Ford Motor Co., Ford Tractor Operations and Stauffer Chemical.

National Agriculture Day was first observed in 1973 as a way to recognize the achievements of the working men and women in American agriculture and explain to all Americans the vital role agriculture plays in their lives.

"The American public is generally not aware of the importance of the farmer to its existence," Commissioner Boswell said. "And because of the inconsistencies of current economic pressures, 200,000 American farmers and ranchers have

been forced into foreclosure, forced to leave their land in the past 4 years. That's 1,000 a week, one every 2 1/2 minutes—2,000 of them have been Kentucky farmers.

"The American farmer is in trouble and his consumer neighbors need to understand that. Perhaps this program will bring some necessary added awareness of what agriculture means to maintain it as the most productive force in this nation."

Cong. Rogers sending annual questionnaire

Congressman Harold Rogers will soon mail out his 1985 Fifth District Opinion Poll to residents of the Fifth District.

The annual survey, which is mailed to every home in the district, allows people a chance to register their opinions on key issues which are facing the 99th Congress.

"I have had such surveys every year since coming to Washington, and I find the results extremely helpful," said Rogers. "The answers I get, along with phone calls and letters, help me understand how my people feel on important issues when they come before Congress. It is also a way for my constituents to understand the kinds of decisions we often have to make when dealing with complicated issues."

This year's survey will include questions on taxes, a freeze on federal spending, coal, tobacco, and restricting foreign imports. "I hope that everyone who receives this survey will take just a moment to fill it out and return it," said Rogers. "It is an important link in the two-way communication between the people of the Fifth District and me."

Cattle and Calf Prices Up

Mid-February cattle and calf prices showed significant strength when compared to the January averages, according to state Agriculture Commissioner David E. Boswell.

Beef cattle averaged \$49.50 per hundredweight at mid-month, up \$2.40 from January and \$3.50 above the average in February 1984.

Calves, at \$59.80 per hundredweight, were \$4.80 above the previous month and \$2.50 above February last year.

Hogs at mid-month averaged \$50.30 per hundredweight, compared to \$49.00 in January.

Half million dollar housing project slated for construction in Livingston

An estimated \$500,000 housing project for the elderly is being developed in an area on the south side of Livingston with a possible bid date in early April.

The project site, which will contain 16 apartment units, is adjacent to the Livingston Baptist Church and is owned by the city, according to Mayor Billy Medley.

Funds for the project will come from the Farmers Home Administration and will be obtained by Livingston Manor Limited, a partnership between John Bruner of London and Jerry Rickett of Corbin. The complex will be a private, taxable development and not public housing.

The land for the project will be purchased when the final allocation of funds is made. If the group fails to build, the land will

revert to the city.

The complex will be two separate buildings, one above the other in a split level entrance. Both will have ground level entrances. One access will be on Lipper Street and the other on Main Street. There will be parking for 32 cars. The area will be landscaped.

The project will contain 14 one-bedroom apartments and two two-bedroom apartments.

Bruner reported the bid date is waiting on final plans to be completed by the architect.

"We hope to have the project underway by the first of May, depending on the financing," Bruner stated. "We have no reason to believe the project won't fly."

Bruner said it is too early to consider applications for resi-

dency.

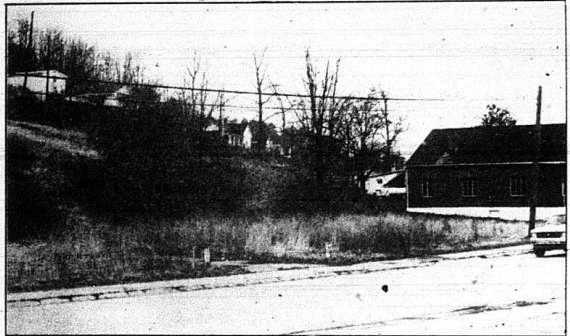
A public meeting will be held at 7:30 p.m. Friday at the Senior Citizens Building at which time Bruner will discuss the project and answer questions.
