Joe B. Hall's legacy.
For the second time in 55 years, the torch that lights the way for the University of Kentucky's basketball program has been passed along, And it can be safely said here that Joe B. Hall leaves it on (at least) the same forly elevel, where he found it, near the top of college basketball.

In Hall's 13 years as UK coch, he was saddled with Adoliph Rupp's ghost and was bedeviled by critics from border to border. But he remained steadfast and sustained the high traditions

that UK fans have taken for granted. The man from Ken-tucky's heartland knew, if some of of his detractors did not, that a level of excellence established during the Rupp years could be carried on, maybe even improved

ways. Hall's regime eclipsed the grand record set forth by Der Baron in his 42 seasons at UK. Ir paron in nis 42 seasons at UK. In numbers, Hall's 13 teams won 297 games-three out of every four times they played. The Wildcats wen eight Southeastern Conference titles, an NCAA champion-ship, was NCAA runner-up twice and went to the Final Four four times. And UK won an NIT crown

But more than all the numbers and victories. Hall saw to it that the school is baskethall covernant was kept unblemished in a time when beenling of rules and cheating are apparently rampant. And Hall accomplished it with integrity, dignity and adherence to principals. The school, and the stafe's pride in \_\_\_\_\_\_ was in good hands.

And, in the end, Hall made a final honorable gesture. For his mentor, Adolph Rupp, Hall wore a brown sports lacket to his final game against St. John's last Friday.

Now. in more than half a century-55 years-Kentucky has had two basketball coaches. Incredibly, the Wildcats have been to the NCAA Tournament 30 times

to the NCAA Tournament 30 times and own five championships. Who can carry on? That is to be decided of course, but Hall, in his own indestructable way, has greased the skids, eased the way. I don't recall the coach who said it, but somehow the cleverism

said it, out somehow the cleverism uttered 13 winters ago is rendered inoperable today. "I wouldn't want to follow a legend (Rupp)," he said, "But I wouldn't mind succeding the fellow who fol-lowed one."

Hall did what no other coach could have done at Kentucky, succeeded Adolph Rupp. And he



## Entrapment

By: Benny E, Ham, Commonwealth's Attorney Question: What does entrap-ment mean and is it a valid defense to a criminal charge?

. Answer: Entrapment is, as the word denotes, the "trapping" of someone into committing a crime. Law enforcement officials cannot "trick" or coerce people into criminal activity and then turn

into criminal activity and their turn around and prosecute such people for the illegal misconduct.

The Courts have made it cleafs that an undercover buy where a police officer hides his identity and even solicits he purchase of illegal drugs does not constitute illegal entrapment. This is simply construed as affording the culprit with an "opportunity" to commit an offense and is therefore not migroper. The criminality of an act will generally depend on whether the scriminality and construed as a predisposition by the defendant to commit the crime removes the entrapment defense; so the defendant to commit the crime removes the entrapment defense; evidence of prior criminal activity of the accused becomes admissible as in the trial where this defense is raised. Normally, the criminal background of the defendant is not allowed to be introduced. rebut the entrapment defense . An entrapment defense has a rather hard road to hold. It must

generally be shown that the defendant was not the type person who normally engage in such lilegal activity and that the state. through its agents, hounded and maneuvered the defendant into the infraction.

A good example of entrapment would be where the state actually buys the illegal drugs, quest hem to an informer who in turn has the defendant to sell the contraband back to the undercover agent as a favor to the informer.

a legal defense to a crime. No one
likes the idea of the state going out
and "creating" crimes and criminals. There is a bountful supply of
milefactors out there as it is
without any help from the state.
As long as undercover narcoties officers do their job as they

should, drug pushers will always take advantage of the opportunity afforded to them to engage in illegal trafficking of drugs. The entrapment defense will be of little use to those who are engaged in crime as a business.


The new fire truck will likely be housed at the present fire station after some remodeling is done to the building.

#### OHIO SAVINGS CRISIS SHOWS KENTUCKY EDGE

The financial crisis of Ohio savings institutions has caused many Kentuckians to fear for their own deposits. However, a Kentucky law already requires that each sav-ings and loan in the state have federal insurance on its

deposits.

Deposits of Kentuckians in state-chartered savings in-stitutions are safe. They are backed by the federal govern-ment because of a law passed in 1972 when I was governor. We enacted that law to prevent a panic such as the recent

We enacted that law to prevent a panic such as the recent one in Ohio.

The Ohio drama is being called the biggest crisis state financial institutions have seen since the Great Depression. It was triggered by the failure of Home Stan Savings Bank which had much of its of the Home Stan Savings Bank which had much of its choldings were backed by the Ohio Deposit Guarantee Fund, but were not federally insured. When Home State was closed, it virtually depleted the guarantee fund, casting a cloud over it. The panic resulted when depositors lost confidence in the ability of the fund to guarantee money sitting in other savings institutions it backed throughout the state.

The savings institutions were closed until the situation settled, with hopes that they would obtain federal insurance. Because the institutions were not federally insured, they also were not subject to many federal regulations that might have prevented the Home State collapse from occurring.

In addition to pointing out Kentucky's advantages, I hink this unfortunate situation demonstrates the need for standardized regulations financial institutions. While too much regulation can hamper competition, we must ensure that there are ample checks and balances to guarantee our fairth in savings institutions.







### Local library has problem with people not returning their books

Lots of folks borrow and read books from the Rockcastle County Library. Lots of folks don't bring them back.

them back.

Herein lies one of the library's biggest problems, according to Mrs. Phillip Davis, librarian

ing to Mrs. Phillip Davis, librarian. To stress the point. Mrs. Davis gathered library cards and book identification cards and spread them out on her check-out desk. They made a sizeable pile. She has an amazing 300 books that are overdue between one year and three years. Most of these could be considered lost. There also are about 300 that are lost. "It's difficult to collect fines." (10 cents a week per overdue book) Mrs. Davis related. "Many of the overdue books that are returned are put into the outside book return bin and we don't see the people who return them. We send out overdue cards once a month but we don't always receive the amount owed."

In 1960 the library mowed to two rooms in the basement of the Rockeasile Flotel. In 1974, County Judge Charles C. Carter and the Rockeasile Fiscal Court approved construction of the present library.

Gradually, the library is outgrowing its quarters and may soon need additional space.

"We make do at the present time, but there could come a time when we will have to face the problem of additional space."

Mrs. Davis said.

In addition to more book space, she said there is a need for

a larger room for programs, and a nge in the meeting more help, a larger room for events and programs, and a possible change in the meeting place for senior citizens, which needs a building of its own.

The library has some interest-

The library has some interest-ing circulation figures. When the library moved to the new building, there were 18.533 books and pamphlets in the library. That year; 50,759 books were checked out from the Book-mobile and 60.307 from the library

were checked out from the Bosismobile and 60.307 from the library for a total circulation of 111.066; in 1981, there was a total of 27.867 books in the 1810 state of 1981, there was a total of 27.867 books in the 1810 state of 1981, there was a total of 27.873. 
