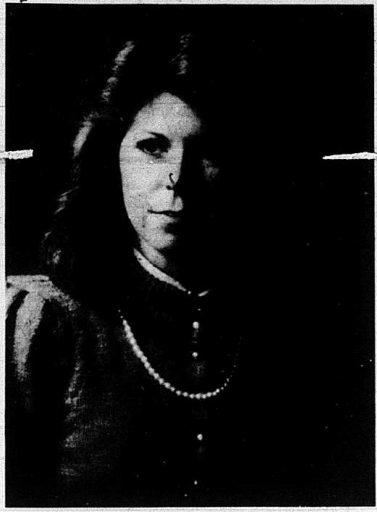

ence titles, an NCAA championship was NCAA runner-up twice and went to the Final Four four times. And UK won an NIT crown too.

But more than all the numbers and victories, Hall saw to it that the school's basketball covenant was kept unblemished in a time when bending of rules and cheating are apparently rampant. And Hall accomplished it with integrity, dignity and adherence to principals. The school, and the state's pride in it, was in good hands.

Joe B. Hall... we owe him much.

And, in the end, Hall made a final honorable gesture. For his mentor, Adolph Rupp, Hall wore a brown sports jacket to his final game against St. John's last Friday.

Now, in more than half a century—55 years—Kentucky has had two basketball coaches. Incredibly, the Wildcats have been to the NCAA Tournament 30 times and own five championships.

Who can carry on? That is to be decided of course, but Hall, in his own indestructible way, has greased the skids, eased the way. I don't recall the coach who said it, but somehow the cleverism uttered 13 winters ago is rendered inoperable today. "I wouldn't want to follow a legend (Rupp)," he said. "But I wouldn't mind succeeding the fellow who followed one."

Hall did what no other coach could have done at Kentucky, succeeded Adolph Rupp. And he

ust, squirrel hunting will not be permitted until Sept. 14.

This change was made because female squirrels are nursing young during late August and early September. A statewide survey of squirrel hunters conducted by the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources revealed that the overwhelming majority of hunters favored a later opening of the squirrel season.

The first phase of the squirrel season will extend through Nov. 7, and the second phase will open as usual on the third Thursday of November and extend through Dec. 31.

Quail, rabbit, grouse and furbearer seasons will open on the third Thursday in November (Nov. 21). The hunting and trapping seasons for furbearers will continue through Jan. 31, the quail and rabbit seasons, through Feb. 16 and the grouse season, through Feb. 28. Bag and possession limits remain unchanged.

The commission also approved a regulation change which will allow deer hunters who have not yet filled their deer tag to take estimates during the gun deer season.

Entrapment

By: Benny E. Ham, Commonwealth's Attorney

Question: What does entrapment mean and is it a valid defense to a criminal charge?
 Answer: Entrapment is, as the word denotes, the "trapping" of someone into committing a crime. Law enforcement officials cannot "trick" or "coerce" people into criminal activity and then turn around and prosecute such people for the illegal misconduct.

More specifically, the Kentucky statute as to entrapment states that "a person is not guilty of an offense when he was induced or encouraged to engage in that conduct by a public servant or by a person acting in cooperation with a public servant seeking to obtain evidence against him for the purpose of criminal prosecution."
 There is a very important qualification to this defense however. The person seeking the protection cannot be otherwise "predisposed" to engage in such illegal conduct and it is not considered entrapment when the police only affords the defendant an opportunity to commit the crime.

We see the defense of entrapment come up most commonly in drug cases where undercover policemen make pre-arranged

buys from the drug dealers. This is normally done through an informant.

The Courts have made it clear that an undercover buy where a police officer hides his identity and even solicits the purchase of illegal drugs does not constitute illegal entrapment. This is simply construed as affording the culprit with an "opportunity" to commit an offense and is therefore not improper. The criminality of an act will generally depend on whether the crime was "pre-arranged" in the mind of the entrapping person or in the mind of the accused.

Since a "predisposition" by the defendant to commit the crime removes the entrapment defense, evidence of prior criminal activity of the accused becomes admissible in the trial where this defense is raised. Normally, the criminal background of the defendant is not allowed to be introduced. But if a person is claiming to have been entrapped into selling drugs illegally, he or she is in essence saying that they were not otherwise predisposed to do such things and that the government agent tricked them into it. Testimony of prior drug sales by the defendant can then be introduced by the state to rebut the entrapment defense.

An entrapment defense has a rather hard road to hold. It must

generally be shown that the defendant was not the type person who normally engage in such illegal activity and that the state, through its agents, hoodlums and maneuvered the defendant into the infraction.

A good example of entrapment would be where the state actually buys the illegal drugs gives them to an informant who in turn has the defendant to sell the contraband back to the undercover agent as a favor to the informant.

The most notable case where the entrapment defense worked was in the prosecution of John De Lorean in Los Angeles for illegal activity in cocaine. There the jury believed that De Lorean had no inclination for such illegal activity until the Federal undercover narcotics agents worked on his desperate financial plight to waltz him into the commission of a large scale illegal drug deal. At least the jury did not believe the "absence" of entrapment "beyond a reasonable doubt."

Hardly anyone can argue with the wisdom of making entrapment a legal defense to a crime. No one likes the idea of the state going out and "creating" crimes and criminals. There is a plentiful supply of malfactors out there as it is without any help from the state.

As long as undercover narcotics officers do their job as they

should, drug pushers will always take advantage of the opportunity afforded to them to engage in illegal trafficking of drugs. The entrapment defense will be of little use to those who are engaged in crime as a business.

Dr. A. R. Chowdhury, associate professor of Industrial Education and Technology at EKV, said the seminar will concentrate on the principles of industrial management, human-resource management, planning, analysis and control of production and/or manufacturing processes.

This workshop is recommended for managers, production engineers, technicians and other key manufacturing personnel involved in production management, he said.

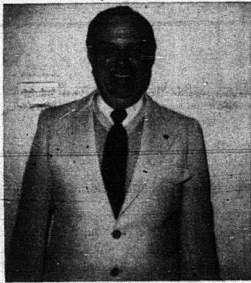

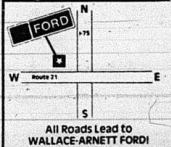

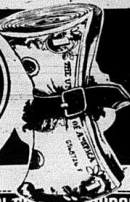

Fire protection in the county is gradually being upgraded, and when the county gets the new fire truck it has on order, fire protection should be even better.

CVADD will help organize county tourist association

The importance of tourism in Rockcastle County was outlined in a talk by Glenn Westbrook of the tourism staff of the Cumberland Valley Area Development District at a recent meeting at Kastle Inn. Westbrook was in the county to advise businessmen and others on the organization of a Rockcastle County Tourist Association.

He told those present that tourism in Rockcastle provides jobs for more than 300 people.

"It is estimated that tourists spend in excess of \$5 million a year in the county and that is of great importance in any county or city," Westbrook stated.

This is the opinion of Brodhead Fire Chief David Cash who, along with Brodhead firemen, will operate the new truck.

To be housed in Brodhead, the new \$56,000 truck, which is to be delivered in a few weeks, will

be used in the western area of the county.

The new fire truck will likely be housed at the present fire station after some remodeling is done to the building.

Two alternatives have been suggested. One is to move the city hall office from the downstairs area to the upstairs and house the truck where the city hall office is currently located. A drawback to this suggestion is the steps residents will have to climb to get to the office.

A second alternative is to construct an addition to the east side of the building to house the truck, or to move the city offices.

A third alternative could be to purchase another building somewhere in the city to house the county truck. Since the department is volunteer and firemen must come to the station when there is a fire, there would be no more delay if the truck was in another building.

City officials have not publicly mentioned the purchase of a second building.

The present truck at Brodhead that is used for county fire calls is a pickup truck with a tank, generator, hoses and ladder. That truck was purchased and equipped by the Brodhead firemen.

Brodhead city has a relatively new truck used only for city calls, and sometimes on request from other cities where a major fire is in progress.

Three escapees indicted

Grand Jury indicts other party involved in shooting incident

The most recent session of the Rockcastle County Grand Jury has resulted in the indictment of at least seven local people and one Somerset man.

A shooting incident on March 10th in Mt. Vernon resulted in the indictment of one local man, but he was not the man that police arrested and charged with first degree assault.

The man indicted was the one who was allegedly shot—Otis Kirby, of Rt. 4, Mt. Vernon, and he is presently free on \$7,000 property bond.

According to the indictment, which was for assault in the first degree, Kirby is accused of shooting at Charles Durham with a handgun in front of "Settles" Drive-In in Mt. Vernon.

Durham, who was arrested for allegedly shooting Kirby, was not indicted last Friday and is presently free on bond.

Kirby is scheduled back in Circuit Court for arraignment on April 26th.

A Somerset man, Clyde Gibbons, was indicted on a three-count charge stemming from two break-ins during September and October of last year. The other

charge is for receiving stolen property valued at over \$100.

Gibbons is accused of burglarizing the home of Bernice Wise in September and the home of Millard DeBorde in October. His receiving stolen property indictment stemmed from a March 3, 1985 indictment in which a mahogany-colored bed, belonging to Bobby and Peggy Mason, was found at his residence.

Gibbons is free on \$7,500 bond and is scheduled for an April 26th arraignment.

Three local men that escaped from the Rockcastle County jail on February 18th have been indicted for escape and assault in the third degree.

The charges stem from the jail break which involved two men, Jeff Prewitt and Gerald Cotton, who had also escaped from the facility in December, and another local man, Bobby Ramsey.

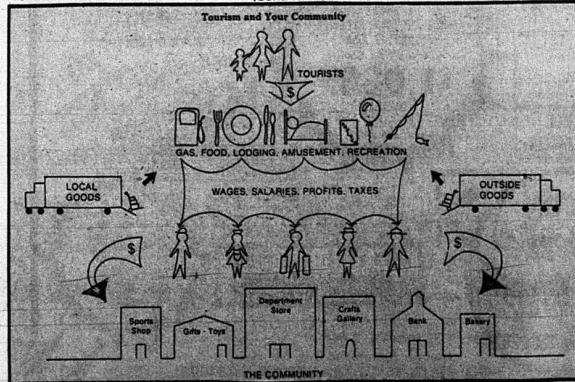
The three men were captured in Harrison, Ohio on February 26th and have been lodged in the Hamilton County, Ohio jail since that time.

As well as the two indictments for escape and assault, the three men were indicted for being persistent felony offenders.

According to assistant Commonwealth Attorney Jerry Cox, when a person is indicted for being a persistent felony offender, it is an additional penalty for being convicted of more than two felonies after the person was 18 years of age.

Cox said that, in some cases, if a person is found guilty of being a persistent felony offender, the time received from a jury would be doubled. In other instances, he said it could mean that a convicted felon must serve as much as ten years before he is eligible for any parole.

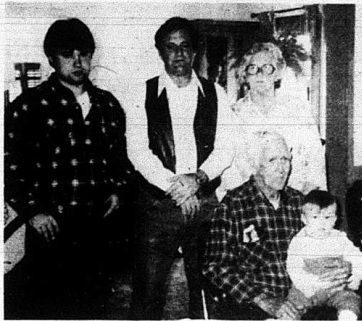

"Nutrition plus exercise equals a winning combination" has been the theme of National Nutrition Month which concludes with this article. The combination is the key to fitness for all people, and in the last three weeks attention was focused on active

This week's final article in the series stresses the need for exercise and good nutrition among less active youth.

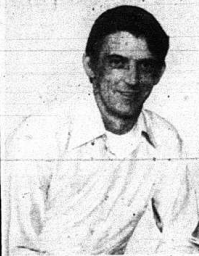

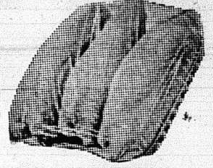

Sponsors sought for 1985 Summer Food Program

The Kentucky Department of Education is seeking sponsors to operate the 1985 summer food program in Kentucky. The summer food program provides nutritious meals to children in needy areas during extended school vacation periods. In most areas, the program operates from May until September. Under the program, meals and snacks are served to children in such places as schools, playgrounds, and parks.

Public schools, non-profit private schools and units of local, municipal, county or state governments may qualify as sponsors of the summer food program in areas where at least 50 percent of the children are eligible for free or reduced-price school lunches.

Residential summer camps whose enrollment includes needy children may also act as program sponsors. Qualified sponsors are reimbursed at set rates for operating and administrative costs of the program.

To be eligible, sponsors must provide continuing service to the community, serve meals on a regular schedule to children or provide meals as a part of an organized program for enrolled children at camps, and show that they are financially and administratively capable of operating the program.

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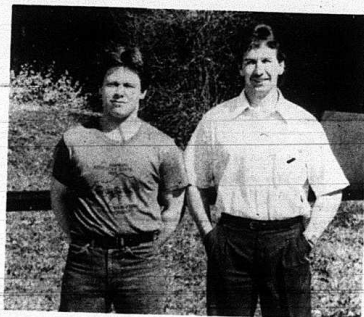

Chief Cox said he believes the departments in the county "do a good job" with the equipment available.
"Most of the men are good men and all ours are taking training," Chief Cox said. "If we all were in a single county department, we'd still have the same manpower."
Although the chief did not say, if there were one countywide department, there would probably have to be permanent, salaried employees, which would call for a considerable increase in county expenditures.
The county would also likely have to have additional fire stations. One would probably be at Roundstone near Roundstone Ele-

mentary School and Wildie where the population is increasing. Another would likely be near Cliff Rock in the southern part of the county.
Currently, there appears to be more pressing financial problems than fires; namely, ambulance service and garbage collection, just to name two.
As Chief Cox indicated: More fire protection would be fine, but it would have to be done as finances permit. That could indeed be a long way down the road.

The Pulaski County line and westward to the Lincoln County line. Communities include Maretburg, Quail, Bee Lick, Ottawa, Spiro, Negro Creek, Copper Creek and Brindle Ridge.
The county also has a fire truck housed at the Mt. Vernon Volunteer Fire Department. That truck answers calls along I-75 from the Madison to the Laurel Counties lines. The department also answers calls in Wildie, Roundstone, Conway, Orlando, Pine Hill, KY 461 to the Pulaski County line and south to U. S. 80.

The Livingston County department answers calls in the eastern section of Rockcastle with its city owned truck, including Mullins Station, Red Hill, Sand Hill, and along KY 1004 to Lamerco.

From time to time the subject of consolidation of county and city trucks into one department with a chief and three assistant chiefs has come up. But most firemen think such a move is a long way off.

"It's not feasible right now, although it is probably a fine idea," was the way Mt. Vernon Fire Chief John Cox put it. "It's a matter of money, facilities and manpower. There is also a problem of water supply. There is not a flow rate high enough to fight a big fire in the outlying areas."

Brodhead wins 2nd place in regional Mathcounts

Brodhead Elementary School won second place in the Regional MATHCOUNTS Competition on Saturday, March 9, at Somerset Community College. They also had two students, Alison Souder and Alan Purcell, who were in the four top-scoring individual competitions. Alan also won first place in the Special Topics Oral Round with Alison taking third place. They will advance to the State on April 20.

MATHCOUNTS is an accelerated coaching program and a series of competitions combined to produce high levels of math achievement in junior high students. It is a cooperative project of the National Society of Professional Engineers, the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics, and the United States Department of Education.

Mt. Vernon Elementary placed sixth and Roundstone came in seventh in the competition. Eleven teams were invited to the regional competition.

These boys and girls are in the Challenge class. They were accompanied to Somerset by Mrs. Sue Hamm, Coordinator of Gifted Education; Mrs. Garrie Hedrick, Challenge teacher and coach for Mt. Vernon and Roundstone teams; and Mrs. Betty Jo McKinney, teacher and coach of the Brodhead team.

All these students are to be commended for their efforts. They left Mt. Vernon at 7 a.m. on Saturday morning for a long day of test-taking (which in no way compares to sleeping late and watching cartoons).

They participated in a forty-minute written round, an individual round, and a team round before lunch at noon. Following the lunch break, the top four individual scorers participated in a Special Topics Round. The students were:

"Tourist Assn. - From Front"

"Indictments-From Front"

When the three men escaped from the Rockcastle facility, Pruitt and Cotton were awaiting transfer to the state penitentiary in LaGrange to serve time for various crimes to which they pled guilty. Ramsey was already out of the state penitentiary on bond and was awaiting a hearing in Circuit Court on a charge of shooting at his father, Russell Ramsey, of Mt. Vernon.

Cox said he did not know when the three men would be returned to Rockcastle County for prosecution because officials in Harrison, Ohio were going to proceed with prosecution against the three men for crimes committed in Hamilton County.

One of the crimes pending against the three men is that of "convicted felon carrying a concealed, deadly weapon." Cox said this charge was made against the three men after authorities found them carrying a homemade knife which they had made while on a work detail.

A February 1981 break-in at the Food Fair Supermarket in Mt. Vernon has resulted in the indictment of three local men.

Kenny Gabbard, of Rt. 3, Mt. Vernon, Larry Joe McNally, of Wildie, and James Swartz, of Mt. Vernon, were named in a two count indictment which charged them with the break-in.

According to the indictment, the three men took several grocery items from the store, including some turkeys, chuckwagon patties and other items valued at over \$100.

A trial date of April 16th has been set for the three men.

Presently, Gabbard is free on \$15,000 bond, while Swartz and McNally are being held in Rockcastle County jail.

McNally has also been indicted for possession of a forged instrument and two counts of theft. According to the three count indictment, he had in possession checks that had been stolen from Willie Coffey, and the checks had Coffey's name forged on them.

He is scheduled for an April 26th arraignment.

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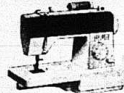

put together a young person can eat a variety of foods, including fresh fruits and vegetables. He will keep fit by engaging in regular exercise. And he will follow good health habits.

How does a less active young person eat a balanced diet and still eat the foods that he likes?

It's not as hard as he might think, Burriss said. "Because no one food can provide all the nutrients the body needs, the young person should eat a variety of foods, including foods made from grains—rice, bread or cereals, fruits, vegetables, milk, cheese or dairy foods, and some meat, poultry, fish or beans."

"There's nothing difficult about eating those foods," Burriss said. "One of those foods can be pizza, because it contains some items from each of the basic food groups. There are many other good foods that can be enjoyed."

"There's something to eat too much sugar, heavily sweetened foods or fat or fatty foods or salt, and to eat only as many calories as needed to keep weight where it should be."

"Energy is needed to work, play and even to breathe," Burriss said. "Your body gets that energy by using food as fuel. When you balance the food you eat with the exercise you get, weight should be about right."

How much food does a normal young person need?

She suggests four servings daily of fruits and vegetables, four servings of breads and cereals, four servings of milk or dairy products and two servings of meat or poultry or fish. "The amount would be one orange, one potato, a half-cup of broccoli or a banana. One slice of whole wheat or white bread or one-half cup of cooked rice constitutes a serving. One cup of milk or yogurt or two ounces of cheese makes a serving in that food group. A serving in the meat, poultry, fish, and beans group would consist of two or three ounces of cooked lean meat, one or two pieces of chicken, a half-cup of cooked dry beans or two ounces of tuna."

Now is a good time for a young person to begin exercising that can be done throughout life, Burriss said. Some of the best ones include walking, swimming, running, bicycling, doing exercises.

"Now with good nutrition and exercise, you'll have a winning combination," she said.

Local library has problem with people not returning their books

Lots of folks borrow and read books from the Rockcastle County Library. Lots of folks don't bring them back.

Herein lies one of the library's biggest problems, according to Mrs. Phillip Davis, librarian.

To stress the point, Mrs. Davis gathered library cards and book identification cards and spread them out on her check-out desk. They made a sizeable pile.

She has an amazing 300 books that are overdue between one year and three years. Most of these could be considered lost. There also are about 300 that are lost.

"It's difficult to collect fines," (10 cents a week per overdue book) Mrs. Davis related. "Many of the overdue books that are returned are put into the outside book return bin and we don't see the people who return them. We send out overdue cards once a month but we don't always receive the amount owed."

Needless to say, "in both lost

books and lost fines, the loss must be made up somehow through other sources, namely the library budget. However, the library does receive various kinds of aid from the Kentucky Department of Libraries.

The library will receive \$41,952 in 1984-85 fiscal year from local tax and state sources. The library budget this year lists \$28,494 for operations. The remainder goes for equipment, books and other items that are, or become, necessary during the year. Any money left over goes into a bank account.

In addition to the \$41,952, the library will receive \$2,978 in state aid; \$1,313 in a book grant from the state, and \$4,419 for Bookmobile expense that is a partial payment from the state. The state Department of Libraries Association sends the library books, this year valued at \$4,152.

The tax rate for the library is 1.1 cents per \$100 property valuation. In 1965, county voters by a 98 percent vote, approved 5 cents on the \$100 for library

purposes, but the amount has been reduced. The amount each taxpayer pays for library purposes appears as an item on their tax bill.

The library has four employees—the librarian, Bookmobile driver, two assistant librarians, and a county worker.

The library opened in 1952 in a room in the Mt. Vernon City Hall through the efforts of Joyce Henderson, John Lair and Clyde Linville. There were two bookshelves and about 200 books.

In 1960 the library moved to two rooms in the basement of the Rockcastle Hotel. In 1974, County Judge Charles C. Carter and the Rockcastle Fiscal Court approved construction of the present library. Gradually, the library is outgrowing its quarters and may soon need additional space.

"We make do at the present time, but there could come a time when we will have to face the problem of additional space," Mrs. Davis said.

In addition to more book space, she said there is a need for

more help, a larger room for events and programs, and a possible change in the meeting place for senior citizens, which needs a building of its own.

The library has some interesting circulation figures.

When the library moved to the new building, there were 18,533 books and pamphlets in the library. That year, 50,759 books were checked out from the Bookmobile and 60,307 from the library for a total circulation of 111,066. In 1981, there was a total of 27,867 books in the library with a total circulation of 72,032. In 1984, there was a total of 27,671 books and a total circulation of 58,773.

The obvious drop in circulation between 1984 and 1981 came about through a change in distribution. The 30 or more schools in the county at that time were no longer furnished books through the library, causing the drop in circulation.

The library purchases its books from one source that allows a 25 percent discount. These books are fiction. The State Department of Libraries furnish non-fiction and technical books free of charge to the library.

If the library does not have a book on a specific subject, it can be borrowed from the State Library in Frankfort. The person wanting the book can use it three weeks. The only charge to the borrower is the return postage to Frankfort.

Who reads most these days? Children do.

What is read most generally? Paperbacks.

"This is actually too bad," Mrs. Davis noted. "People read paperbacks for entertainment. They are not advancing their knowledge. However, our religious books are read extensively." It's not only the books that are important to the community. There are several worthwhile programs.

One of the most unusual is a

class taught to people who cannot read or write. This class has six men, ages 40 to 60, who are learning reading and writing. Teaching the class are Libby Hammons, Bernice Cox, Geraldine Robbins and Shirley Martin. One student reported how

pleased he was when he found he could read his grocery list and the labels on cans.

In another program, Ruby Sayers reads stories and shows films to pre-school children from 4 to 5 p.m. Wednesday. There is a

Bro. Caldwell comes to the church from Harrodsburg where he was pastor at the Calvary Baptist Church.

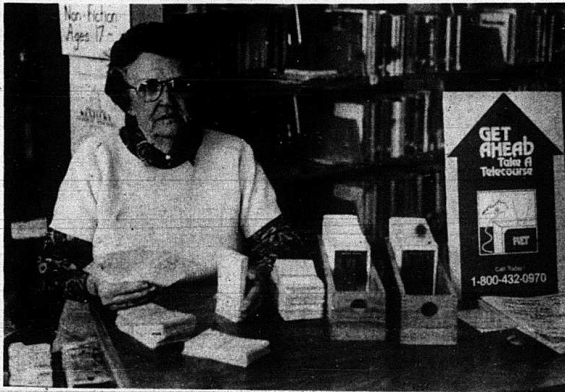
