Bank Robbery

QUESTION: What is the difference between bank robbery and armed robbery?
ANSWER: There may not be any.

Bank robbery will almost always be armed robbery. Armed robbery will not always be bank robbery.

This question calls for a full discussion of robbery.

Robbery is a theft committed by the use of force.

"Armed robbery" in Kentucky is called Robbery in the First Degree. This is when a person commits theft of anything and any amount—while armed with a deadly weapon or threatens to use a dangerous instrument upon any

person not a participant in the crime.

In Kentucky at least you can still have Robbery in the First Degree even though one is not armed. That is when in the process of committing a theft, a person causes physical injury to another—beat them up with their fists, for example.

Robbery in the First Degree carries a penalty of ten to twenty years in the penitentiary.

Since most bank robberies are committed with a "deadly" weapon or through the threat of the use of a dangerous instrument, then such crime usually falls within that penalty range. As one can easily see, "armed robberies" or Robberies in the First Degree may very well be carried out on victims other than banks however.

In fact, in 1982 robberies of banks made up only about 1.3% of all robberies committed in the United States. Most victims were other types businesses and persons.

Technically speaking, every robbery has to be against a person. There is really no such thing as a "bank robbery" since banks cannot be robbed—people

are robbed. We sometimes hear people speak of their house being robbed.

A house cannot be robbed—people are robbed.

So when we talk of bank robberies, we are really defining the act of employees in the bank being robbed of the bank's money.

Remember, robbery is a crime against persons and has to involve a theft. Assault with a theft is robbery. Theft without an assault is just plain theft, carrying

Second Town Forum held March 21st at the Rockcastle County High School

A follow-up meeting of the November-Town Forum was held Thursday, March 21, at Rockcastle County High School.

A list of the opinions which were given and rated at the November meeting were distributed. Charles B. Parsons, Superintendent of Rockcastle County Schools, recommended that the group see what could be done with these opinions as he felt the people of Rockcastle County and those who attended the November meeting were entitled to some response.

There was discussion as to the immediate direction of the Town Forum. A parent suggested that there needs to be a "cooperative spirit" among the parents, community, school board, administrators and teachers for improvement of education in Rockcastle County.

The group was also told that the schools need to do a better job of selling themselves to the public. This led to the discussion of many projects which the schools are involved in that the public may not be aware of. These were: (1) Financial Aid Workshop provided at Rockcastle High to assist parents in completing forms for financial aid for student's college education; (2) Guidance Committee at Rockcastle County High composed of staff and students to improve self concepts; (3) Students being sent to EKV to compete in the Social Studies Bowl and to Cumberland College to participate in the Math Bowl; and (4) Rockcastle County High will host a ten-county group of students. The Lake Cumberland Academic Conference in April.

Everyone agreed that the schools need to do more public relations such as a school newspaper which would be distributed throughout the communities, provide extra programs, etc., in addition to the current radio program, "Know Your School" on WVK each Saturday by Amanda Napier. Individuals would be needed to search out school news and coordinate programs. Funds would also be needed to implement these projects.

Student apathy toward school

was also discussed and the need to better instill the value of an education in the student. How do we best go about this? This has been and continues to be a real problem.

The need to work more with parents while students are at the elementary level was recommended. Parents may not feel comfortable with coming to schools. Schools need to let parents know that they are welcome.

Referral of students' experiential and follow-up procedure was questioned. It was explained that we now have two

Railroad retirees asked to check their tax payments

Taxpayers receiving Social Security or Tier I railroad retirement benefits should check to see if they are required to make estimated federal income tax payments, according to the Internal Revenue Service. The first installment for 1985 estimated tax payments is due April 15, 1985.

Some taxpayers received taxable benefits in 1984, the first year for the taxation of Social Security and Tier I railroad retirement benefits. Therefore, some taxpayers who did not have to pay estimated taxes in the past were required to pay estimated taxes in 1984 because of the addition of the taxable portion of their benefits to their other sources of taxable income.

For 1984 the IRS is computing the estimated tax liability of Social Security and Tier I railroad retirement benefit recipients as if no Social Security or Tier I railroad retirement benefit amounts were included in income. If the exclusion of these taxable benefits eliminates the penalty for not paying estimated taxes, no penalty will be assessed for 1984, although all tax must be paid.

This waiver of the penalty for not paying estimated taxes in 1984 does not extend into 1985, according to the IRS. Taxpayers receiving taxable Social Security or Tier I railroad retirement benefits or any other income from

which federal income tax is not withheld for, example, self-employment income, interest, dividends, capital gains, or rents should determine their need to pay estimated taxes and do so on a timely basis.

Generally, taxpayers should make estimated tax payments if they expect to owe (after taking into account federal income tax withholding and tax credits) \$500 or more in income tax for 1985, and they expect that total amount of federal income tax that will be withheld from 1985 income will be less than the lesser of: (1) 80% of the tax to be shown on their 1985 income tax return or (2) 100% of the tax shown on their 1984 tax return (if their 1984 income tax return covered all 12 months of the year).

If a taxpayer is required to make estimated tax payments for 1985, payment can be made in four quarterly installments. These installments are due on April 15, June 15, and September 15, 1985, and January 15, 1986. If a taxpayer prefers, the total amount of estimated tax due can be paid on April 15, or if the taxpayer suddenly received unexpected income which will require the taxpayer to begin making estimated tax payments, the taxpayer may make the entire estimated tax payment at that time.

A payment voucher from the Form 1040-ES package should accompany each payment and both should be mailed to the local Internal Revenue Service Center. Taxpayers who make estimated tax payments must use a Form 1040 to file their Federal Income Tax returns.

a much lesser penalty. Interestingly enough, two robberies can be committed against one person.

A motel clerk, for example, who is working late at night, a robber comes in with a pistol and at gunpoint steals the money of the motel from the clerk. At the same time and still at gunpoint, the robber takes the wallet of the clerk. There are two separate thefts by use of force and a deadly weapon, and thus two separate robberies, even though against the same person.

Back to bank robbery. Understandably, this crime is one of the highest in detection, apprehension, prosecution and conviction. That is because that in spite of surveillance cameras in banks and with always a multitude of witnesses, bank robbers hardly ever utilized disguises. And most who rob banks have previous records, making it much easier to trace fingerprints and other forms of identification.

Bank robbery is a Federal offense since the establishment in 1934 of programs providing Federal insurance for private deposits maintained in most of the nation's banks. But, as indicated in this article, it is also a state crime.

Traditionally, bank robberies have been prosecuted in Federal courts. In recent years, however, there is a move back toward allowing the state prosecutors to handle these crimes in the local

courts. The purpose of this trend is free the Feds of the bank robbery business so they can put their time on other matters, and also give the local communities more control over their own crime problems.

Bank robbery sinister as it sounds and as serious as it is, he is not one of our most threatening social problems. There were about 7,000 of them perpetrated in the United States in 1982 and in only about 2.1% did anyone get hurt—much less dangerous than family squabbles. The average dollar loss in a bank robbery was, approximately \$3,300—less than a good size

fender bender. Statistics prove out that bank robbery is a much riskier business for the criminal than it is for the general public. Bank robbers typically receive stiffer sentences than those received by offenders convicted of other high volume offense types. The average sentence is about ten years in the penitentiary.

Bank robberies are almost always "armed robberies." But they are not the most dangerous. Persons mugged on the street, "ma and pa" country grocery stores, and even unsuspecting motorists on the highway are still the most "abuse robbery victims."

Title I celebrates 20th anniversary

April 11, 1985 marks the twentieth anniversary of the signing into law the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965. Title I, now Chapter 1, came into existence at that time and has continued to provide financial assistance to disadvantaged areas. Throughout these twenty years, certain aspects of the program have changed, but the primary intent has remained the same—to expand and improve educational programs to meet the special needs of students.

Title I remedial programs and other support services were first implemented in the Rockcastle County School System during the 1965-66 school term. Mrs. Neural Miracle was then the county school superintendent and Mr. Clyde Linville served as the district's first Title I Coordinator.

Over the years the number/variety of services funded by the Title I Chapter 1 component has decreased due to continued cuts in federal funding. Chapter 1 funding as a percentage of the total budget has decreased over the years.

Today's Chapter 1 program in Rockcastle County concentrates primarily on providing remedial services in the areas of reading

and mathematics for students in grades 1-9.

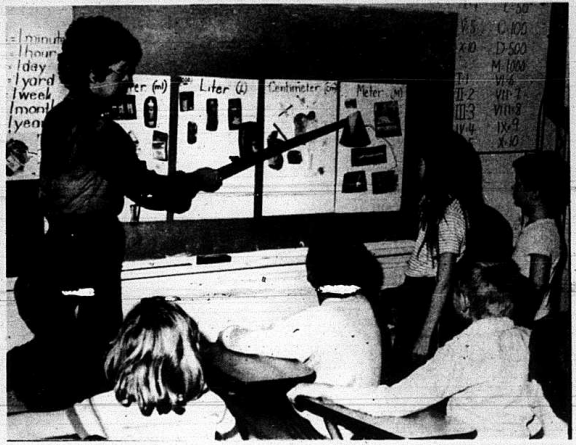
The District Chapter 1 Parent Advisory Council will meet on Tuesday, April 9, at 9:00 a.m. at the Central Office Building on

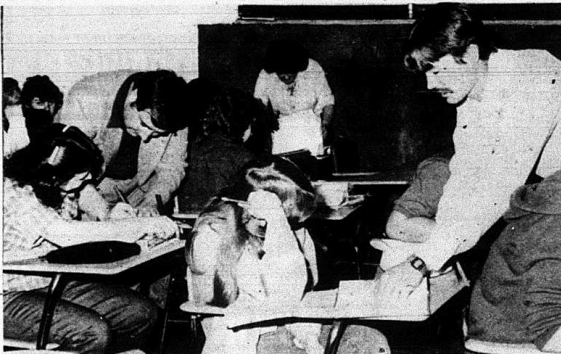

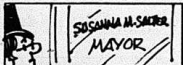

School board votes not to renew coaching contracts at high school

After a thirty-five minute executive session, the Rockcastle County Board of Education voted unanimously not to re-hire the coaching contracts of the Rockcastle County High School head basketball coach and head football coach during their regular monthly meeting Tuesday night.

decision had been made. Mike Appleman, who had led the boys varsity to two consecutive dismal seasons with records of well below 500, was not rehired as a teacher either.

Head football coach David Hansel, whose team won only one game in 1984, was rehired as a teacher and dismissed only as a coach. Hansel, who had been at the helm for two years, led the Rockets to their first-ever state playoff game in 1983.

No discussion concerning the two men was held in open meeting except for the unanimous passing of board member Kenneth Adams' motion.

Appleman came to RCHS from Pendleton County, Kentucky when he was hired to replace Roscoe Denny in 1983. Denny coached three years.

No mention was made during the meeting as to replacements for the two men, and Superintendent Charles Parsons made no com-

ment as to when he hopes to have the two positions filled.

The only comment Superintendent Parsons made before the board went into executive session on the matter was that several parents had been to see him concerning the coaching situations.

According to Superintendent Parsons, Mr. Appleman submitted a letter of resignation to him on Wednesday morning following the Tuesday night board meeting. The

resignation was for the head coaching position and his teaching position, Parsons said.

In other business, the board voted to

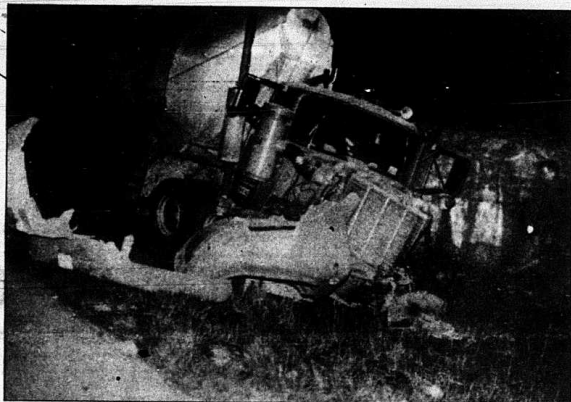

County's insurance premiums raised approximately \$5,000

A \$5,000 increase in county insurance premiums joined the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at its regular meeting Tuesday, but with only one bid submitted, the court had no alternative but to accept the bid.

The annual premium will total \$17,000 and was submitted by Singleton & Associates of Mt. Vernon.

Itemized, the costs are: Comprehensive general liability with a \$500,000 policy limit, premium \$9,525; public officials, \$1,000 deductible, \$1 million limit, premium \$2,188; auto liability, \$500,000 limit, premium \$4,281; and two vehicles (fire truck and dump truck) \$500 and \$100 deductible, premium \$1,598.

Dennie Singleton told the court that insurance costs are rising dramatically in Eastern Kentucky and many companies are leaving the area. He said finding a company willing to write the county policy had been difficult. (See insurance story in this issue).

After considerable discussion, the court approved several sections of county roads to receive work. They include a section of Buffalo Hollow Road, a road near the property of Charlie Lamb; a section of old US 25 near a Conway service station; Denny Cemetery Road; part of the old Somerset

Road near the property of Rldan McFerron, and a section of US 25 near property owned by Jack Hurd and the Pine Hill Pentecostal Church.

Magistrate Tom Denny reminded the court he had asked for road work several times and to date had "got nothing." Denny said in his district he had between 15 and 20 roads that needed work. County Judge Executive Bob Jasper told the court the county is "getting behind" in rock delivery.

Frank Johnson of the Scaffold Care area asked the court to widen and improve a section of Big Sandy Road near Turkey Post Hollow in the Scaffold Care area.

The road in question borders the Big Sandy Gun and Survival Club now under development.

Johnson said the road is one lane and that traffic to and from the club would make the road virtually impassable at times preventing emergency vehicles from using the road in time of need. He also asked the court to install the club fence its nearly 300 acres to prevent children from wandering into the area where gunfire might be occurring.

Eddie Fields, representing the club, assured the magistrates the club property would be fenced before the grand opening of the club on May 4 at which time the club is honoring Clyde Linville.

The court agreed it has jurisdiction over the road, but not

the private club. It also agreed to inspect the road at 1 p.m. Thursday. No estimate was made of how much it would cost to raise the road to acceptable Big Sandy standards.

The court kept the same meeting day—the first Tuesday of each month.

The motion to switch the time from day to night was made by Magistrate Tom Denny, sponsored by Donald Rowe.

All magistrates voted yes. In making the motion, Denny said the change would allow persons who work during the day to attend the meetings.

It was pointed out during the brief discussion that some groups like the State Highway Department might not be able to attend night meetings, but the magistrates decided if the change in time did not prove beneficial, they could always change it back to the original time.

County judge's forum set for May 11 in Livingston

A candidates' forum for Republican hopefuls running for the position of Rockcastle County Judge/Executive has been scheduled for May 11 at 7 p.m. in the Livingston Fire House. The forum is being sponsored by the Eastern Rockcastle Concerned Citizens.

Organizers stress that the purpose of the event is to provide the public with an opportunity to meet the candidates and find out where they stand on various issues. The forum will also provide the candidates with an opportunity to briefly address the public and listen to their concerns.

"This will be the first time ever that the people of Rockcastle County can evaluate the County Judge candidates according to merit rather than name," quoted Ronnie Black, a member of the coordinating committee.

Letters of invitation were sent to all Republican candidates last week. The group decided not to have a forum for the Democratic party candidates since the current County Judge Executive Bob Jasper is running unopposed. Mr. Jasper will, however, be invited as a special spectator guest to the Republican Forum.

As an additional service to the voters of the county, the group is compiling a questionnaire on various issues from the candidates. Their responses will be compiled in the forum program and will also be published at a later date in the Signal.

At the forum, each candidate will be given an opportunity to make a two-minute opening remark. Buzz Carlolitis, the moderator for the event, will then turn the forum over to a panel of

questioners who will quiz the candidates on various issues. Each candidate will be given a chance to answer each of the questions. If time permits, the forum will then be opened for questions for the audience. At the close, each candidate will have another opportunity to make final comments.

County C of C hears official on planning

Revitalizing the Rockcastle Chapter of Commerce will take more than talk. It will take lots of work and financial support if the effort is to be successful.

Brodhead will fix streets torn-up by new sewer lines

Plans to resurface city streets torn up by construction of sewer lines were reported to the Brodhead City Council at its regular meeting Monday night.

The council approved advertising for bids for resurfacing and purchasing blacktop on a per ton basis.

The council instructed Jim Cass, project engineer, to prepare bids to be opened as soon as possible.

Cass told the council the asphalt will be transported and placed on streets as directed by the city. He called this plan better than the city trying to do it.

He also reported the city has about \$34,000 available to blacktop the streets. He said he hoped to have the work done by the middle of May.

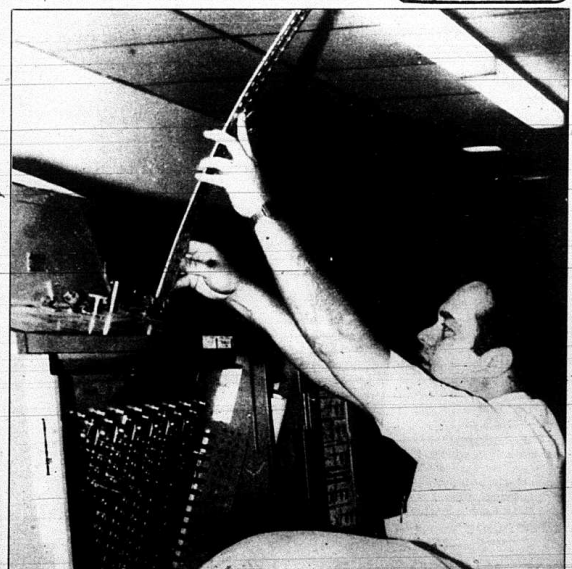
Streets to be blacktopped include Tyree from the old fire

station to US 150, part of Maple Street, West Street, Chestnut Ridge Road from the railroad to US 150, Albright Street and Short Street.

The city will look into the purchase of a water leak detector in order to save the cost of hiring someone to search for leaks. Estimated cost of a detector is about \$1,680 the council was told.

Bryan Bussell, training officer for the Brodhead Volunteer Fire Department, reminded the council a new fire truck should be in Brodhead by the first week of June and advised the council to decide where to house it. The council took no action on a location until a council representative could talk over details with County Judge/Executive Bob Jasper.

The council approved paying the Mt. Vernon Water Works monthly bill. The bill was \$4,712.

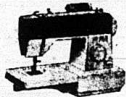
If we are wrong and the person is actually who he says he is, then all he has to do is present himself in our office, establish this, and the letter will be printed.

People who get Social Security retirement or survivor checks and who earned more than the annual exempt amount in wages from a job or in self-employment in 1984 have until April 15, 1985 to file an annual report of their earnings. Bob Anderson, Social Security manager in Richmond, said recently.

The 1984 exempt amounts were \$5,160 for people under 65 of the year and \$6,960 for people

65 or over any part of 1984. In general, a person has \$1 in benefits withheld for each \$2 of annual earnings over the exempt amount.

Social Security uses the annual report to decide whether the person received the correct amount of benefits during 1984. If too much or too little was paid, any adjustment necessary is made based on the annual report.

A special monthly test is used during a person's first year of retirement. Under this test, a person can get a benefit for a month in which he or she did not earn wages over the monthly limit but did not perform substantial services in self-employment. This monthly test can be used only in the person's first year of retirement.


Most people who need to file a report should have received one in the mail. If a person did not get a form or lost or misplaced the one he or she did get, another copy of the annual report form can be obtained at the Richmond Social Security office. The telephone number is 256-5109. The people at the office will be glad to answer any questions. They also have a leaflet "How Work Affects Your Social Security Checks," which contains more information about the earnings test. The annual

exempt amounts for 1985 are \$5,400 for people under 65 and \$7,320 for people 65 or over. A different test applies to people who get benefits because of disability.

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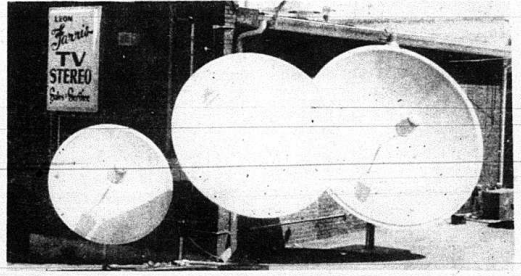

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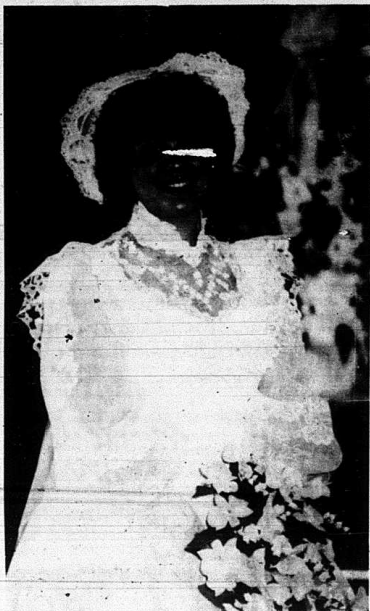

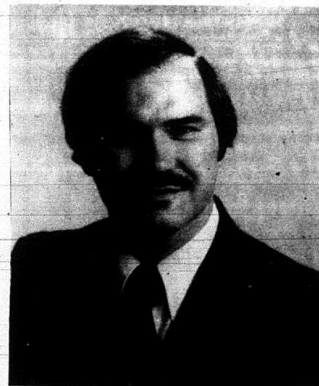

DECORATING EASTER EGGS

The egg's perfect shape has always inspired artists. It has been the palette for one of the most intriguing of folk arts in many cultures.

There is literally no end to the creative possibilities for individual expression on an egg shell. Eggs can be painted or colored with crayons or felt-tipped pens, turned into funny faces, topped with fantastic hats,

trimmed with feathers or sequins or simply dyed in an endless variety of hues. However you decide to do it, decorating eggs is fun for grownups as well as for kids.

Eggs to be decorated may be either hard-cooked or blown out of their shells. The hard-cooked variety is a bit more sturdy for children to work with, while the blown shells are best if you're making an egg tree or want to keep the eggs on display for a considerable time.

If eggs are to be dyed, washing in a mild detergent solution helps to remove the oil coating so that the color adheres more evenly.

Commercial egg dyes are available, especially at the Easter season. Food coloring works, too, but some craftsmen prefer to experiment with their own colors from nature. Eggs simmered in water to cook for 20 minutes with a teaspoon of vinegar and your choice of one of the materials below will produce a shade of the color shown. You'll have to use your own judgment about quantities. This is an art-not-a-science!

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Meetings set on tobacco price support

A series of 10 regional meetings will be held across Kentucky in early April to acquaint tobacco growers with details of a plan for the tobacco price support program.

The plan, which combines price support reductions with a phased draw-down of surplus stocks and a cap on no-net-cost assessments, was worked out recently during negotiations involving R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Company, Kentucky Farm Bureau, the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association and the Burley Farmers Advisory Council. Kentucky Farm Bureau Pres-

ident Ray Mackey says the upcoming meetings may be the "most important in a generation" to Kentucky farmers. Farm Bureau's Tobacco Advisory Committee recently endorsed the plan, and Mackey said the organization will urge its acceptance among growers.

The first meeting in the series is scheduled April 1, at the Western Kentucky University Agricultural Exposition Center in Bowling Green. All meetings will begin at 7 p.m. local time.

Mackey said that a member of the grower organizations' negotiating team will be present at

each of the meetings. Chief spokesmen for the two negotiating sessions held March 7 and 15 in Lexington were Mackey and Lexington attorney Larry Forgy, counsel for the burley growers co-op.

Mackey said the plan will involve considerable sacrifice by tobacco growers, as it calls for a new support price average of \$1.45 a pound for burley, some 33 cents below the existing rate. But he said other features, including the buy-out of pool stocks and a reduction in the no-net-cost assessment from 30 cents to 2 cents a pound, make the package

the most attractive option available.

The meeting will be open to all interested persons. Mackey noted, Large meeting facilities have been reserved for an expected strong turnout of growers and others interested in preserving the tobacco industry.

The meeting for the Rockcastle County area will be Monday, April 8, at Somerset, Pulaski County High School, Multi-purpose Room, at 7 p.m. The school is located 1/4 mile north of Cumberland Parkway, Highway 39 intersection (Crab Orchard Road). MAKE MAXIMUM USE OF SPRING GRAZING SEASON

As pastures begin to turn greener and start the rapid spring growth phase, many farmers are thinking about how to make maximum use of this forage with their cattle. Some pointers for grazing cattle on spring grass from Livestock Extension Specialist at the University of Kentucky are: Do

not stop feeding cattle too soon. Check fences and consider additional fencing. Implement a health and parasite control program.

The average date that Kentucky cattle can gain, depending on nutrients, is April 15, but even this may be too soon, to completely depend on pasture. Cattle that are lactating have very high needs for energy and other nutrients. Immature, high-moisture forages often cannot supply enough energy to allow the cattle to maintain their body weight, supply milk for the calves and rebreed.

This is especially true with first-calf heifers. Continue to supplement the diets of cattle with silage, high-quality hay or 3-5 pounds of grain, and continue to supplement with a mineral mix containing magnesium and phosphorus.

Relative to the second point, the grass is always greener on the

Strip-Cropping reduces erosion

Contour stripcropping can be an economical alternative for many farmers in Rockcastle County because it's less expensive than terracing, is easier to plant and cultivate, and can do a good job of conserving soil. A stripcropping system that is very effective in reducing erosion includes grass strips such as fescue. "Anyone considering converting pasture or hayland to cropland may want to go to stripcropping by planting strips 70 to 100 feet wide and leaving alternate strips in hay. The strips can be rotated by planting crops in the hay strip and reestablishing hay in the other strips. By varying the width of grass strips, a farmer can eliminate short rows and tight turns, use modern equipment, and still conserve soil. This system works

particularly well with alfalfa as the sod strip because of the need to rotate alfalfa about every three to five years. Sod rotations in stripcropping systems are probably the ultimate in soil conservation; even more so when used in conjunction with no-till row crops.

Dairy farmers and others growing silage are taking advantage of the stripcropping method also. Silage crops leave little or no residue, which is essential for no-till farming. By planting silage crops in strips so the entire field is not left bare at any one time, farmers can save as much or more soil than by terracing and with very little cost.

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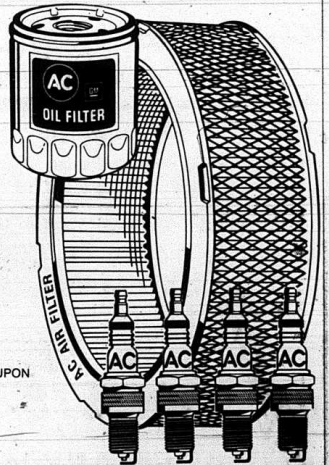



temperary secretary. The group set its next meeting for 7 p.m., May 7, at the bank community room. The public is invited.

Foster told the group the local chapter needs a good organization, and if none is realized, the chapter "will founder from its beginning."

"You must get a set of objectives and a work program," Foster related. "They are the road map to guide your efforts. If you get members, you have to have a specific program. No one wants to put his money where it serves no purpose."

Foster observed that many communities rely on just a few persons to do all the work and promotion in the area, and often times these people tackle too much and spread their work too thin. He advised getting everyone possible involved.

"And you've got to have a leader, a director... You need some kind of office and a staff of one at least, one who knows what the community wants and needs. I have never seen a Chamber of Commerce operate without volunteers. You need a person in charge and have a program that can be sold to the community."

Hunt responded that it would be difficult to have a full time office and director because of lack of funds. He noted there is a possibility of setting up a summer information center for tourists who come to the county.

"There is no doubt you will need a person to run the day by day affairs of the chamber," Foster reiterated. "There is nothing magical about a Chamber of Commerce. Success comes with interest and work."

Glenn Westbrook of London, who is on the tourism staff of the Cumberland Valley Economic Development District, and who attended the meeting, pointed out, as he did at a meeting recently to set up a Rockcastle County Tourist Association, that the county's location on I-75 and US 150, plus the scenic beauty and nearby recreational (Lake Linville) and entertainment (Renfro Valley) facilities gives Rockcastle a decided advantage over many other Kentucky counties.

He stressed that a strong chamber could go hand in hand with a tourist association.

Foster added that "if the chamber is to be successful on a countywide basis, everyone must pull together or nothing will be accomplished."

"Find out what is important to the people of the county and what they consider to be helpful, and I think they will respond," Foster concluded. "Set up your priorities and follow through with them."

He complimented Mt. Vernon's downtown beautification efforts and other programs the city has undertaken.

"But don't stop there," he added. "Go on and plan and bring all the people of the county into the economic and community development of the whole area."

Hunt asked the steering committee to come up with a preliminary organization and program for the next meeting.

Road is about five miles long. The right to the club entrance estimated at about a mile.

A new county fire truck to be housed at Broadhead to serve the western area of the county was the focal point of a brief discussion.

Magistrate D. G. (Alex) Albright told the court the Broadhead Council wanted some type of guarantee from the court, that once the city spends money to house the truck, some future court wouldn't come along and change the location to another area of the county.

No action was taken on the truck, but Judge Jasper said he did not believe any other court would change the location. At least for the court meeting, no action was taken, and the court did not show much of an inclination to take any kind of action in the future.

"I think the language in the grant we received for the purchase of the truck for the Western area of the county, states it is to be housed at Broadhead," the judge stated. "I don't think it can be put somewhere else."

County Treasurer Floyd Owens presented the 1985-86 jail budget. It shows income of \$114,525. Itemized, the budget allocated \$74,720 for personnel; \$39,905 for operations; \$900 for maintenance, and \$3,000 for equipment. The 1984-85 budget was \$114,787.

other side, so before turning cows into spring pastures, check your fences and water gates to make certain they haven't developed new weak places over the winter.

Consider whether cross fences for developing a pasture rotation plan would allow more efficient utilization of pastures.

Finally, work with a local veterinarian to develop a health program. Parasite control is of primary importance at this time of year and remember that pasture

rotation helps control internal parasites. Cattle should be wormed using any of several types of commercial worming products and a program to control face and horn flies should be developed.

Insecticide ear tags work well, although there may be problems with flies developing resistance in some areas. To avoid problems, follow directions carefully, use two tags on all animals, don't put tags in until fly season starts around late May and consider alternating fly control methods.

Women Preachers?

"Women now constitute about five percent of all preachers, growing from an estimated 6,000 in 1973 to about 16,000 today, and seminaries report rising enrollment of female students. The Episcopal Church sanctioned women priests in 1976. In that church, women make up about ten percent of its priests and a third of its seminarians. Over 300 Southern Baptist women already have been ordained, and their number is increasing by about one a week. By the year 2000, the majority of the clergy may be women," says theologian Rebecca Chopp of the University of Chicago Divinity School. (From "U.S. News and World Report," 12/3/84)

We have finally arrived at the place in history where some "intellects" have figured out that what we need in the churches is women priests, elders and preachers. One wonders why it took so long for them to arrive at this conclusion? We have the same Word of God. Nothing has been added or changed. The reason, of course, is that we live in radical times and the "intellects" are bending to the pressure of the times. In other words, they have no backbone!

The title "Equal Rights" is an emotional misnomer. God's word teaches equal rights for all people (Rom. 2:11; Gal. 3:28). That's not the issue. It should be called "Equal Role Amendment." They seek to change the relationships and responsibilities of men and women.

I Tim. 2:11-12 reads: "Let the woman learn in silence with all subjection. But I suffer not a woman to teach, nor to usurp authority over the man, but to be in silence."

The word "silence" in the KJV is rendered "quietness" in the ASV. In 2 Thess. 3:12 this same word (HESUCHIA) is translated "quietness" and is in contrast to "disorderly" in verse 11. Thus it simply means orderly.

Two things are forbidden in I Tim. 2:11-12: (1) A woman's teaching over a man, (2) her usurping authority over a man. To teach over a man simply means she would be in charge of a class or assembly where men were present. The teacher is in authority (Titus 2:15), and women are forbidden to be in authority over men in the church.

It is not wrong for a woman to ask or answer questions in a mixed class so long as she does in a humble manner and does not seek to dominate, to usurp the authority of the teacher. If the teacher grants permission for women to ask questions or make comments, then when they do so, they are not usurping his authority, but are rather in subjection.

It is very obvious that the New Testament does not prohibit a woman's speaking in a mixed assembly. Rhoda did so (Acts 12:5-15) and Sapphira, when asked a question by an apostle, was required to answer (Acts 5:1-11). Please note that Sapphira was stricken dead for LYING, not for SPEAKING. These women could speak in these assemblies without violating I Tim. 2:11-12, because they spoke in such a manner as not to usurp authority over the men, or teach over them. If they could do this, women can do the same now.

God commands women to teach other women (Titus 2:3-4). Hence, a woman can teach a class of women without usurping authority over them. She can teach children also without violating I Tim. 2:11-12, because in so doing she does not teach over man, nor usurp authority over man. Children are not men!

I Tim. 2:11-12 does not forbid women speaking in a public assembly. She may sing (Col. 3:16); confess faith in Christ with the mouth before baptism (Acts 8:37; Rom. 10:9-10); confess her faults or sins (I John 1:9; James 5:16); and say "Amen" to prayer (I Cor. 14:16). However, the passage forbids women to LEAD the singing, LEAD the prayer, or to PREACH in a public discourse. A woman may teach a man in SUBJECTION but never in AUTHORITY (Acts 18:24-26).

God's universal law governing the function of women from the time of the garden of Eden until now has never allowed woman to teach (over) nor usurp authority over man in any way. The reason is given by Paul in these words: "For Adam was first formed, then Eve. And Adam was not deceived, but the woman being deceived was in the transgression" (I Tim. 2:13-14). Thus women preachers are strictly FORBIDDEN in God's word.

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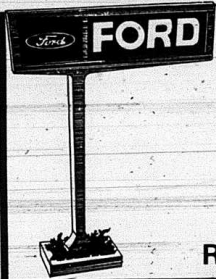

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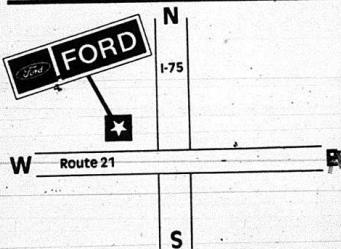

Some insurance companies are moving out of Eastern Kentucky

Insurance companies operating in Eastern Kentucky are finding it more difficult day by day to make ends meet, and many are moving out leaving a void in coverage, or staying and charging higher rates. Some very high.

Particularly homeowners in the highest Class 10 (rural) are paying rates that take a big chunk out of their incomes, or they are finding themselves without a policy with no company to turn to. Problems began to occur for insurance companies in 1984 when the industry paid out more in claims in Eastern Kentucky than it received from premiums and investment income.

Kentucky Insurance Commissioner Gilbert McCarty reported recently that six companies, affecting 11,000 Kentucky policy holders, were "broke" and '91 were on a list for special scrutiny because their financial positions were weak.

The problem for homeowners in Eastern Kentucky is that they have little or no fire protection in many areas, high incidents of arson, and inferior rural roads. All contribute to big fire losses.

"People in the city limits have decent rates, but in rural areas rates are higher than I have ever known them to be," said Arletta Norton of Norton Insurance Agency in Mt. Vernon.

"In fact, I don't see how some people can pay their homeowner policy premiums," she said. "And I think it will be a long time before the rates come down, if ever."

Mrs. Norton said a county-wide fire department would help to reduce rates locally, but she, like fire department officials, believe a countywide fire department is not in the immediate future.

William K. Bullen at Farm Bureau in Mt. Vernon agreed that homeowner policies in rural areas are high with very little chance of coming down soon.

"We (Farm Bureau) are still operating in all the counties and we will continue to operate all over the state," Bullen said. "I'll have to agree, it is difficult for many people to pay the Class 10 rates, especially in these high risk areas."

For the record, Mt. Vernon is in Class 6 on a scale of one to 10 as set by the Insurance Service Office, the official insurance rating group in Kentucky. For example, Class 9 areas have fire departments but inadequate water. Class 10 areas have no fire department, meaning most of Rockcastle, Livingston is Class 9 and Brodhead Class 7.

In addition to fire protection, there is also a problem of arson, regarded by some greedy policyholders in areas where times are hard and money scarce, as a way of selling their property to the insurance company. It's easier than waiting for a buyer, according to insurance officials.

Another problem in high risk areas is with people who are in the market for a house and can't find insurance. Contractors and banks do not want to risk loans and do work for persons whose property is not protected by insurance.

Car insurance rates are, generally speaking, more stable than homeowners insurance, but even these rates show an increase from time to time. Trucks, particularly semi-tractor-trailers, have been hit with major increases, even in Rockcastle. In some areas, the jump in rates amounts to thousands of dollars. In one instance, two trucks went from \$4,000 to \$6,100.

However, the major cause of auto insurance premium increases is found in the cost of the vehicle. Both new and used cars continue to go up. As prices rise, so does insurance rates.

Many Eastern Kentucky residents are finding that paying car insurance, now mandated by law, is a real problem: Many never paid

auto insurance prior to the state mandate. Now they must have insurance when they drive. Some still try to bypass the law and become high risk.

High risk drivers have always been hit with high rates, and they are being hit even harder by insurance companies that know more about what's known in the industry as sub-standard companies, and they "sock it to you," as one auto owner said. Especially hard hit are persons who have been convicted of drunk driving, have had several accidents.

"It's true, if you want car insurance and you are a high risk driver, you are going to have to pay the price and it's high," said an insurance official. "Actually, the companies don't want you, even if they are considered sub-standard companies."

In the rating of cars, Rockcastle is rated Class 6. Not a bad rating, most officials agree.

All in all, no one seems to know exactly how many policyholders in Eastern Kentucky are affected by very high rates, or if rates are much higher in one area than in another. Unlike most states in Kentucky, the rates charged by insurance companies vary. The company sets a rate, the rate is accepted by the Kentucky Insurance Commission, and the amount is added to the customer's next bill.

hopes to have Clyde Phillips, lead guitar player for the George Jones Band, to entertain, if Phillips' schedule can be arranged. There will also be a drawing for a 1985 pick-up truck.

Linville is to be honored for his years of interest in the outdoors, especially fox hunting, and his contribution to wildlife, recreation, and the environment. Lake Linville at Renfro Valley is named in his honor.

The new gun and survival club is to be developed by C & B Development Corp. It will contain 298 acres with a small lake. The club will be a unit of the American Rifle and Pistol Association (ARPA).

When completed the club will have a new clubhouse. The old church and school will be used until the new clubhouse is constructed.

There will eventually be a swimming pool, tennis courts, nature trails, horseback riding, weight lifting, jogging trails, summer cabins, indoor pistol range, outdoor range, rifle range, 18-hole golf course and racquet ball courts. There will be a fox hunting area, fennels, and a survival range. Survival and gun safety techniques will be taught at the club.

William K. Bullen, from whom the land was purchased, said the club will be developed in an orderly and progressive manner, probably over a period of from three to five years. All members of the club must also be a member of APRA.

Bullen said, according to the by-laws of the club, it will be functioning as a competitive structure to promote sportsmanship and the competitive use of fire-

arms: to promote patriotism and educate our members on survival, and how to use firearms in a safe manner; and act as a resort for fun and games and relaxation to our members."

A Master Committee of from 10 to 14 members will govern the club. The initiation fee will be \$100 per family membership fee, and \$50 for single members. The number of members will be limited to 1,000.

Bullen said the monetary distribution of the club indicates construction costs will not exceed 35 percent of the annual receipts and labor costs not exceed 55 percent. Each member of the Master Committee will receive five percent of the net profits of the club, and the remainder will be put into reserve for future distribution to charitable organizations.

I hope soon to put pictures of old buildings on Clear Creek in the Photo Gallery to refresh your memory of times past.

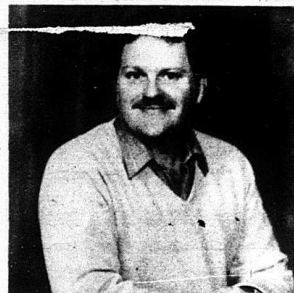
