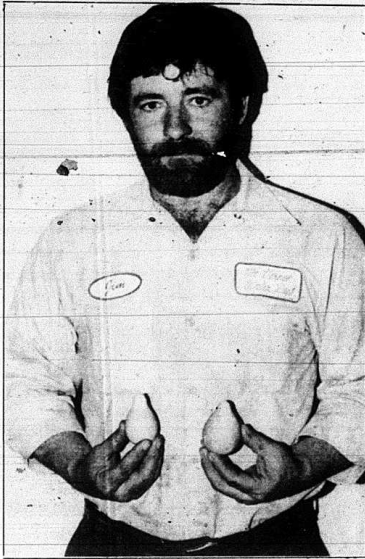

Re-elected to the Board were James M. Cook of Eubank and Dewey Shepherd of Harrodsburg. They join the following directors who are serving unexpired terms: Clay A. Colson, Brodhead, Henry Cecil, Lebanon; Omer Colvin, Campbellsville; Raymond Delk, Albany; Ray Hammons, London;

and Jack Sawyer, Monticello.

Of the group, Clay A. Colson was elected Board Chairman and James M. Cook, Vice-Chairman.

As associate directors, they will work with the association president on short and long range planning. They will form policies which are reflective of those plans and other regulations established by the nationwide Farm Credit System. In addition, they will periodically review and monitor the association's credit standards and financial condition.

The South East Kentucky Federal Land Bank Association is

a farm-owned financial cooperative which provides long term credit to over 2,600 farmers in 25 south east Kentucky counties. The association's outstanding loan volume is over \$130 million dollars.

uncle Edd and Aunt Bluffie Abney McGuire, when the family moved from Madison Co. Here he took up life farming, all a young man could do.

He joined our social life, such as we had then. There were apple peellings, bean stringing parties, any excuse for the young folks to have fun at a neighbor's house. Horseback rides, wild grape hunting in the woods were part of the fun. Then it was noticed that Howard could always be found in that part of the crowd that Jim Wolfe's pretty daughters, Hazel and Lizzie, were around.

Suddenly all the young men were rushing away to the industrial cities of the north to get a start on their future. Howard went too, for a time, but returned to marry Hazel.

The Linvilles moved to Indiana to farm and spent several years up there, but Rockcastle was always in their minds, so they returned to settle in Mt. Vernon. Hazel taught in the elementary school there and Howard took up work in the State Highway Dept. He became prominent in the politics of Rockcastle.

Once I told him that I had always wanted to be a Ky. Colonel, and he said, "If you want to be one....." But I felt I hadn't done enough in Rockcastle to be so honored, and, we let the subject drop.

The Linvilles retired from active life where they had raised their children. Mary Lou and Jimmy, and saw them grow into lives of their own.

Howard and Hazel settled down to quietly live out their life span as allotted by God. But it was

not to be, for Howard developed an illness that would gradually take his life soon. This was meant to be. Hazel was always by his side with loving kindness and consideration when I stopped by to see them and Howard seemed to enjoy my joking remarks.

I went to see him at the nursing home one day. He waved me a last goodbye. Seven days later he was gone from this earth and it seemed such a short time back to our young days on Clear Creek. In reading the Berea Citizen, I found that there are eight towns in the United States named Berea. One each in Arkansas, North Carolina, Ohio, West Virginia.

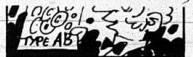
Combining Walnut and wildlife

Combining walnut and wild life plantings can bring profit and pleasure to landowners.

Wildlife food plants and cover are scarce in many areas. This is a

major reason for decreasing numbers of quail and rabbit for the hunter's game bag and a frustration for those who enjoy the presence of wildlife. Our black walnut supply for gunstocks and fine furniture is also rapidly dwindling. Black walnut is by far the most valuable of our native trees. Good quality walnut trees for this adventure into game and walnut farming, although they are quite expensive. Having several game levels plots scattered over a tract of land will produce more quail or rabbits than one large planting and the walnut-trees wouldn't care. It would be desirable, though, to have at least one half acre in each planting. Walnut trees do care about the type of land; they grow into good timber

trees only on good deep soil so put them on the equivalent of good corn land if good timber is expected. Who is Coach Sutton?

Kentucky's new basketball boss spent 11 seasons at Arkansas and what follows are some things about the man who will succeed the man who succeeded a legend

as seen through the eyes of a reporter who covered Razorback basketball.
Sutton's best friend is his wife of nearly 27 years, Patsy.

Mrs. Sutton was academic advisor for Arkansas teams, but "she won't be involved with the team (at Kentucky)." Sutton said two weeks ago. "Patsy did a great job as academic advisor, but she doesn't know anything about the Xs and Os of the game."

At Arkansas basketball banquet last week Sutton told Razorback fans that "Patsy is my number one assistant, always has been and always will be."

Sutton was popular in Arkansas. In 1979 he was named the state's Man of the Year by the "Arkansas Democrat" newspaper.

Sutton debuted his much talked about "perm style" in 1980.

Included on his "most admired men list" are Thomas Jefferson and Indiana coach Bobby Knight.

When Sutton told UK fans, "I like big guards," two weeks ago he was not exaggerating.

"Eddie built his (winning) reputation with big, quick backcourt players," an Arkansas sportswriter said last week. "In his offensive philosophy the forwards primarily have played defense and worked the rebounding boards."

Comment: For one season at least Kenny Walker will change that.

To date, Sutton has five former players in the NBA and four of them are big guards. They are: Sidney Moncrief (Milwaukee), Ron Brewer (New Jersey Nets), Alvin Robertson (San Antonio) and Darrell Walker (Knicks).

Comment: By contrast, Joe B. Hall has six former UK players in the NBA and only one is a backcourt player, Kyle Macy (Phoenix). The five big men are: Sam Bowie (Portland), Melvin Turpin (Cleveland), Chuck Aleksinas (Golden State), Rick Robey (Phoenix) and Dan Issel (Denver).

Louisville sweepstakes?

U of L's basketball program looks like the sweepstakes winner in the chase after the prep crop for 1985. Coach Denny Crum would never admit it, of course, but Tony Kimbro's commitment to U of L last week translates into these things:

When the experts who do report cards—Ken Mink (Knoxville), Bob Gibbons (Lenoir, N. C.), among others—tally up who signed how much talent, Denny Crum's list may be the best this year.

Kimbro's commitment

brought to four the number of newcomers to the Cards roster for next year. And Mr. Basketball has the potential to be one of the best in U of L history.

Louisville's others are: 6-7, 210-pound Avery Marshall. 6-8 David Robinson. Spindly, but talented. Needs a year to mature.

And 6-4 guard Keith Williams. I believe he will become an exceptional college guard.

As of this writing Louisville was still in the running for 6-7 Kenny Payne of Laurel, Miss. and 6-9 Purvis Ellison of Savannah, Ga.

Both Payne and Ellison had Louisville at the top of their lists, but the University of Kentucky, Mississippi State and U of L were courting Payne, while Georgia Tech and Indiana were wooing Ellison.

One problem for Louisville, however, is scholarships. Technically, since four players leave the U of L roster this year and have already been replaced, Louisville has reached its NCAA limit of 15 basketball scholarships.

Under NCAA rules, however, scholarships are renewable on a year-to-year basis, so hypothetically if the Cards got a "yes" from Payne or Ellison, then somebody currently on the U of L roster will not have his scholarship renewed.

If that happens, the man on the bubble could be Robbie Valentine.

Considering the Cardinals' returnees and recruits, U of L will be a preseason favorite to win the Metro Conference next season.

Because of the quality (and

quantity) of its talent for next season, Crum's team will belong in America's top eight.

That's right, top eight, maybe higher. However, because the Cards finished 19-18 last season, it may be three weeks into next season before Crum's club climbs into the top eight.

Looking ahead Bob Gibbons, talent scout from Lenoir, N. C. projects that 7-0 Felton Spencer of Louisville Eastern is "in the bag" for U of L.

At Kentucky

With a new coach who has his own recruiting turf and contacts, it is virtually impossible to tell who or if UK will add to its line of one-6-8, 215-pound Irving Thomas. But Thomas has excellent potential.

A UK spokesman said last week that Eddie Sutton will very likely use two of three available scholarships. Kentucky hopes to sign Payne and 6-4 Lance Blalock of Houston.

Considering the returning talent, don't shed any alligator tears for Eddie Sutton.

Kentucky may have used two scholarships by the time you read this, but UK may be looking harder at next year's crop anyway.

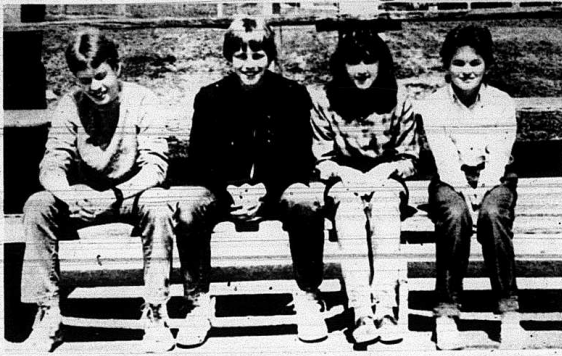

A new view of Americans 85 years old and older

All of us recognize that Americans are living longer. But probably many of us do not realize that the number of persons age 85 and older is growing at a faster rate than any other age group in our society.

Today, we have approximately 2.6 million Americans in the 85-plus age category. According to a projection of the United States Census Bureau, the number of Americans in this group will nearly double to 5.1 million by the end of this century. And by the year 2050, the Census Bureau

expects us to have an amazing 16 million Americans over 85. If that happens as predicted, our oldest Americans would comprise 5 percent of our total population.

Until recently, very little research was devoted to studying the economic status, living patterns, and health care problems of people over 85. This is partly due to the fact that the burgeoning of our oldest population segment is a fairly recent phenomenon. The 1900 census, for example, recorded only 123,000 Americans who had reached or passed the age of 85.

Questionnaires have been received for Judge's forum

In preparation for the May 11th County Judge's Candidates forum, the Eastern Rockcastle Concerned Citizens have started to compile answers to a questionnaire sent to the candidates earlier.

Ronnie Black was very pleased with the cooperation shown by the candidates. Responses have been received from seven of the ten Republican hopefuls with one more in the mail. Two candidates have not replied as of yet. Should the group receive the other responses by Monday, an effort to include these will be made.

The results of the survey will be compiled and distributed to the

public at the forum and published in the Signal. The group will indicate "no response" after each question—for those who do not respond.

ERCC also announces it will be conducting a telephone survey of registered voters within the next two weeks. The group hopes to poll between 10 and 15 percent in each of Rockcastle's 5 voter districts. The group will assess citizen's concerns about the issues in the upcoming election. Organizers would like to encourage those

who are polled to please cooperate so that the major issues will be addressed by the candidates.

Now for the first time, researchers are finally focusing more attention on the oldest of our old. Dr. T. Franklin Williams, "director of the National Institute on Aging, reports that NIA is now spending \$800,000 a year on studies of our over 85 population, and he expects the funds devoted to this research to be doubled next year.

Our oldest Americans are being studied partly to understand more clearly their needs and attitudes, partly to provide clues to aging that may benefit younger generations.

Representative Claude Pepper, Democrat of Florida, who will celebrate his 85th birthday on September 8 and is still one of the U. S. Congress, told reporter Glen Collins of "The New York Times": "We know more than we ever knew before, but we still don't know enough. We do know that we must prepare to accommodate increasingly large numbers of elderly people in our society."

Although nearly one fourth live in institutions, principally nursing homes, it is encouraging to note that more than half (54 percent) are still living in their own homes as independent house-holders. It should be mentioned, however, that they frequently have children or other relatives who live nearby and provide various kinds of support, and that eleven percent of the over-85 population lives with their children.

It is not so surprising that many of those 85 and older are poor. In 1983, the most recent year for which figures are available, 21.3 percent had incomes below the official poverty level.

Only 4 percent of the income of the oldest of the old comes from earnings. Although it is estimated that approximately one third of them have assets such as savings and property, the great majority of the very old rely on Social Security benefits as their chief source of income. Hence any curtailment of those benefits can be particularly painful to them.

The principal cause of death among the very old, according to "The Times" article, are heart disease and stroke, with pneumonia and Alzheimer's disease being significant contributing factors.

Clearly, there is a need for government business firms, health care providers, insurance companies, and older Americans to join in

devising programs that would spread and minimize the grave financial risks of long-term care, making longer life a bonus worth

looking forward to. (Carl F. "Cv" Brickfield is the

Fiscal Court votes to pay \$10,000 more on local jail

Authority has been given to County Judge/Executive Bob Jasper to execute a note for \$10,000 at the Bank of Mt. Vernon for continued renovation of the Rockcastle County Jail.

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court approved the authority at a called meeting last Wednesday.

A payment of \$8,000 for renovation work had previously been paid to the contractor, New-Way Security of Harrodsburg, as part of the \$28,380 project.

The fiscal court pays the contractor and is reimbursed by the state. Work is expected to be completed in early June.

Work being done includes a self-contained emergency power exit system; wiring in the jail area other than conduit; replacement of various doors and locks; bullet-proof windows; changes in the kitchen area, including a vent to the roof; lamps and fixtures; intercommunication system; two water closets; key cabinet; 22 mattresses and covers; 22 pillows and five blankets.

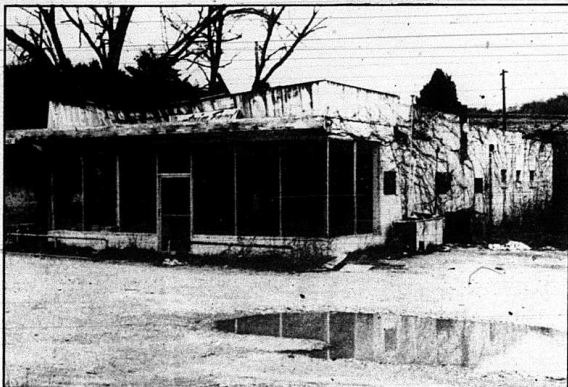
Clyde Linville will be honored

Belly Acres Restaurant

Old Renfro Valley "In place" is very slowly falling apart

For years it was the "in place" for folks who liked home cooking and socializing with a tidbit of gossip thrown in to spice up the "taters" and beans.

For a restaurant, it had the unbelievable name, Belly Acres, a name known far and wide that even added to its popularity. No one ever admitted they got a belly ache at Belly Acres.

Built in 1947 by Luther C. Ward, better known as fiddler Smokey Ward, and his wife, comedian Little Eller, both entertainers on the Renfro Valley Barn dance, Belly Acres was a meeting place for clubs and a gathering place for Renfro entertainers and of course, tourists who stopped to marvel at the name and ask: Why?

Smokey was always glad to tell those who asked. When he started to build the restaurant, he

was fussed at and complained to by almost everyone at Renfro Valley, which had the only restaurant in the area, and wanted to keep it that way. He told an acquaintance, "They all bellyached about it so much I just named it Belly Acres."

On a weekend night, familiar entertainers of the time were often heard a-pickin' and a-singin' just for the fun of it—Homer and Jethro, to name two. It's been said even Red Foley sang a song there one night just to please a pretty girl from Pennsylvania.

During the "reign" of Smokey and Little Eller, Belly Acres flourished, especially when Friday rolled around. A table wasn't always easy to find. When gardens were in, everyone wanted fresh green beans and tomatoes. Everyone who was anyone always ordered the hot cornbread.

John Lair finally came to eat with the rest of them.

Smokey and Little Eller "held court" at the restaurant until July 31, 1950 when they sold it to Lloyd M. Brennan, who kept its popularity on a high level until it was purchased by D. A. Robbins and Clarence Frith of Brodhead, who kept it until March 9, 1961 when it was sold to M. E. (Jack) Albright of Brodhead.

Smokey left Renfro and moved to Virginia where he still lives in Martinsville.

Those who never knew Jack Albright and family missed a pleasant association. Small of stature and knowledgeable about everything and everybody in the county, Jack enjoyed Belly Acres and its clientele, whenever they were. He was often seen late in the evening, after the customers were gone, sitting near the large front windows with one leg on the end of a table watching the movie playing on the big screen at the drive-in theater across the road.

When he was asked what was playing, he usually said it didn't matter, and the fact that he couldn't hear the movie didn't matter either.

He once said, "I just like to watch. I like to guess what's going on."

With him at Belly Acres to

Livingston Mayor upset because fire rates are not lower

It was an unhappy Livingston Mayor Billy Medley when he learned recently that having a fire department doesn't automatically mean lower insurance rates.

In a story on county fire departments in the Signal on April 4, it was pointed out Livingston is rated nine on a scale of one to 10 in the Insurance Service Office (ISO) charts.

ISO is a rating service that is used by insurance companies in Kentucky to set rates. Mt. Vernon is six on the scale and Brodhead seven.

The nine rating, according to the ISO, means a city has a fire department but an inadequate water supply.

"We believe we have plenty of water to fight a fire in the city," the mayor said. "In fact, we could supply twice as much as we're supplying now. If we didn't have enough water, the Cumberland Valley Area Development District wouldn't have approved letting us build a housing complex."

According to ISO officials, several things go into a rating

made by that organization. An inadequate water supply is only one. Another is schooling for firefighters, department meetings and other items.

"We feel good about our water supply," Mayor Medley declared. "My concern is that with such a low rating we just don't get much of a break on our insurance. And we look bad to the public. We've been done very badly in the past on our water."

The mayor said that the ISO came to Livingston a long time ago and found that the city didn't have enough water hydrants.

"We know this, and in time we will install hydrants as our money will allow," he explained. "Other than that I think we have a very good water supply and fire department."

The Livingston Water Works has 139 customers, the mayor reported. The water department pumps about 20,000 gallons daily. Its total capacity in the city holding tank is 72,000 gallons.

The city gets its water from the "boils," an artesian-type well that is located beside Roundstone

Local unemployment rate jumped to 9.3 in February

The unemployment rate in both Rockcastle and Jackson counties jumped during February, with Jackson leading the way by nearly three percentage points, according to an announcement by the Cabinet for Human Resources.

In Rockcastle, the unemployment rate jumped from 9.1 percent in January to 9.3 percent in February, or 2.8 percent.

Jackson jumped from 13.1 percent in January to 15.9 percent in February, or 2.8 percent.

In Rockcastle, 6,816 persons were employed and 695 unemployed out of a labor force estimated at 7,511 in January.

In Jackson, out of a labor force of 4,174, a total of 3,629 were employed and 545 unemployed.

In other surrounding counties, all reported a jump in unemployment: Madison by .2 percent, Pulaski by 4 percent, Lincoln by 3 percent, Laurel by 2 percent, and Clay by a big 4.5

percent. In the entire Cumberland Valley Area Development District, unemployment rose from a revised rate of 10.8 percent in January to a preliminary rate of 11.8 percent in February.

The monthly sample of claimants of unemployment insurance benefits showed 26.2 percent had worked in manufacturing; 25.3 percent in mining; 16.2 percent in construction; 14.8 percent in trade and 11.8 percent in services.

Statewide, 70 Kentucky counties reported higher unemployment rates in February than in January. In 41 counties the rate decreased between January and February, while in nine counties it remained unchanged.

Compared to February 1984, 29 counties reported higher rates, 87 counties had lower rates, and in four counties the rate was the same.

Almost two-thirds of the state's counties reported rates above 10.0 percent in February. 75 counties reported double-digit rates, compared to 76 in January.

The statewide unemployment rate for January and February was

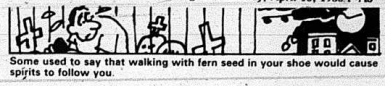

RESISTANT HORN FLIES
CAUSE PROBLEMS IN KY.

Cattle producers who have been using synthetic pyrethroid impregnated ear tags for control of horn flies around cattle may have solved one problem and created another... the development of resistant flies.

The ear tags, introduced to kill horn and face flies, were highly successful when first marketed a few years back. However, producers soon discovered that the annual application of the tags lost their effectiveness with horn flies in as little as two years of consecutive use.

Dr. Chris Christensen, a University of Kentucky entomologist, said the tags kill all but the most resistant flies that somehow

Seminar planned for high school teachers at Berea

The Foxfire Approach to Experiential Curricula is designed for secondary English teachers. Local student wins in History competition.

William Brown, of Rockcastle County High School, has won second place in the world history individual competition of the second annual Eastern Kentucky University History Bowl.

Brown, a senior, won an EKV Presidential Scholarship worth \$250 per semester and a \$100 U.S. Savings Bond.

Entrants could choose to take a test in American history or world history. The examination consisted of two parts, a section of 75 multiple-choice questions and an essay section.

On both the American history and world history tests the multiple-choice section covered the entire range of the subject, while the essay extended only over the past 200 years.

Team Championship awards were also presented to the teams having the highest combined scores.

The competition, held at EKV April 15-16, was sponsored by the EKV Department of History.

New government regulations affect Medicare patients

Area Hospital and your physician is concerned about how new government regulations affect health care delivery to Medicare patients. Through this and future articles, we will investigate and, hopefully, provide a better understanding about how these changes involve not only your hospital stay, but other health care alternatives.

One new requirement is that your doctor, upon determining that you require hospitalization, must now receive "preadmission authorization" from a government agency known as the Kentucky Peer Review Organization (KPRO). The KPRO authorization is handled by the hospital and your physician. Rest assured that emergencies are admitted immediately and handled with your best interest in mind.

The most significant difference is the method of payment for health care by the new Federal Medicare program which is now in effect in most hospitals nationwide. Since the federal government pays much of the health care costs of the individual, it has been seeking ways in which to reduce those costs.

Their method of reducing costs is based on a patient classification system developed in 1975 called "diagnostic related groups" (DRGs) into which all hospitalized patients principal diagnoses can be assigned. The federal government then calculated an average cost for 470 different diagnosis related groups based upon geographic location of the hospital, and whether it is in a rural or urban setting. Thus, the hospital is then reimbursed by Medicare based on a predetermined amount for the principal diagnosis given by the patient.

More simply stated, a flat fee is paid according to your illness regardless of how many days that you stay in the hospital...the number of tests that you may have or the type of medications or treatment plan that your doctor may order. An example might be pneumonia. Medicare will only pay \$2950 for patients age 70 or 70 plus regardless of the complications.

To keep costs in line with Medicare reimbursements, your doctor may even recommend that some of your tests and/or treatments be done on an outpatient basis. Even certain surgical procedures are more likely to be done on an outpatient basis. These decisions are always made with your personal health needs as a prime consideration.

In the event your doctor feels you should be admitted, there are some other changes you may observe since you were last hospitalized. Your diagnostic tests will be given sooner after you arrive. In some cases, you may be asked to arrive for admission in the morning rather than the afternoon, thereby reducing your stay time while affording the same quality care. There will probably be more occasions when your nurses invite your family to observe and even participate in your care, if that care will need to be continued at home when you are discharged.

While there have been many changes in government regulations affecting the way we provide hospital services, your physician and the staff of Berea Hospital will continue to ensure the quality health care that our tradition is built upon.

Mr. Mullins has served this region and the state in the field of

mental health/mental retardation since 1969. He has been Executive Director of the Cumberland River Mental Health/Mental Retardation Board since 1971 and has served as President of the Kentucky Association of Regional Programs for the past two years.

When was the Church Established?

In Matt. 16:16, the apostle Peter stated the established fact that was to become the foundation rock of Christianity; that fact being that Jesus is "the Christ, the Son of the Living God." Then said Jesus, "Upon this rock I will build my church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it. And I will give unto thee the keys of the kingdom of heaven..." (Matt. 16:18-19). "Church" and "kingdom" are here used interchangeably, thus they are one and the same institution. When the church was built, the kingdom was established.

For the sake of illustration, suppose I decide to build a motel in Mt. Vernon. I select the site upon which it is to be built and choose someone to manage it for me. I might take the potential manager to the site and say, "Upon this site I will build my inn, and I will give unto you the keys of the Motel of Mt. Vernon." He would have no difficulty understanding that: (1) One business establishment was to be built; and (2) he was to be the one to open it. He would also know that it was to be my motel and that my wishes were to be executed. The very same kind of language is used in our text. "Church" describes the institution as the "body of Christ" (I Cor. 1:18) and, "kingdom" refers to the form of government that is to rule it. The church is an absolute monarchy with King Jesus having all power (Matt. 28:18) as his head (Eph. 1:22-23; Dan. 7:14). Simple, isn't it?

"Will build" in verse 18 establishes some future date. The church was to be built after Jesus spoke these words. That, of course, eliminates the theory which some have that it was established during the personal ministry of John the Baptist. John had already been beheaded by the wicked King Herod at this time (Matt. 14:1-10). But when was it built?

In Acts 2:47 we read: "...The Lord added to the church daily those that were saved" (ASV). This is the first record we have of anyone's being in the church. Obviously, the church had been built by this time. Sometime between Jesus' statement in Matt. 16:18 and Luke's statement in Acts 2:47, the church was built. But when was it built?

Going back to Matt. 16, we find that Peter was to have the

"keys of the kingdom of heaven." "Keys" are the means by which entrance is obtained into something that is "locked up." Thus until Peter used those keys, there was no way one could enter the kingdom or church. If we can establish when he used the keys, we will know when the church was built.

Since the gospel is the power of God unto salvation (Rom. 1:16), and it is the saved who are added to the church (Acts 2:47), we necessarily conclude that the "keys" Peter used was the gospel. The gospel in its fullness (the death, burial and resurrection of Christ - I Cor. 15:1-4) was first preached on the first Pentecost following the resurrection and ascension of Christ (Acts 2). The gospel contains facts to be believed (Mark 16:16) and commands to be obeyed (2 Thess. 1:8). Hence, those who believe the gospel and obey it are taking advantage of the terms of entrance the "keys" which Peter used which, they are added to the church and, at the same time, are translated into the kingdom (I Cor. 1:13). This happened first to the Pentecostians in Acts 2 - the day upon which the church was established. This was in 33 A.D., fifty days after Jesus' resurrection.

We have already established the fact that the church is the body of Christ (I Cor. 1:18); that the church and kingdom are one and the same thing (negating the premillennial theory that the kingdom is to be established at some later time); that belief and obedience are required for one to be saved, and that the saved are added to the church. If you believe the gospel (Mk. 16:16) have repented of your sins (Acts 2:38), are willing to confess that Jesus is the Christ (Rom. 10:9-10), then all that remains for you to enter the kingdom, the body of Christ, is baptism. "For by one Spirit are we all baptized into one body" (I Cor. 12:13). You will then have all the blessings, privileges, and the hope that all citizens in this great kingdom enjoy.

SPRING SALAD DRESSINGS

SUBJECT: Facts About Our Court System

Dear friends,

As your County Attorney for the past 3 1/2 years, a part of my responsibility has been to try cases in the District Court. The types of cases prosecuted by the County Attorney in the District Court are limited to those involving a loss of property that is less than \$100 in value, traffic, and other similar type offenses.

Other cases such as homicide, robbery, burglary and most breaks (in which the loss of property is \$100 or more in value) are assigned to the Circuit Court and the Commonwealth Attorney for prosecution.

When a person comes before the District Court, he or she has the choice of pleading "guilty" or "not guilty." If the person pleads guilty, the judge will then impose a penalty as prescribed by law, and a jury trial is made unnecessary.

If the person pleads not guilty, he or she is entitled to a jury trial, and the jury will determine their guilt or innocence. Most persons who appear before the District Court plead guilty and do not ask for a jury trial. However, the right to a jury trial is an important safeguard of our legal system, and it is available if the person requests it.

In future issues of this newspaper, I will be discussing other areas of the law that may interest you.

As your County Attorney, I am striving to serve you well, remembering always, that the office belongs to you the people, and that you have only allowed me to operate it for you and on your behalf.

2 tablespoons honey
1/4 cup fresh lemon juice
1/2 teaspoon salt

Combine all ingredients in a pint jar with a tight-fitting lid. Shake until well mixed. (If the honey is at room temperature, it will dissolve faster.) Makes 1 cup dressing.

Serve with bibb lettuce, fresh strawberries, and sliced avocado.
Serve with leaf lettuce or fresh spinach, orange slices, chopped red onion and toasted sunflower seeds.
Serve over pineapple rings filled with melon balls and blueberries.

Raspberry-Yogurt Dressing

1/4 cup red-raspberry jelly or jam, seedless preferred
1/4 cup burgundy wine
1 cup red-raspberry yogurt
1 cup mayonnaise


In small bowl, combine jelly and wine. Stir to dissolve jelly. Add yogurt and mayonnaise. Stir to blend. Makes 2 cups dressing.
Red-wine vinegar may be substituted. Use 2 tablespoons only.

Serve with fresh pineapple, banana slices and red raspberries.
Serve with melon slices, green grapes, and walnuts.
Serve with strawberries, blueberries and grapefruit sections.

Mediterranean Salad Dressing

1/2 cup bottled Italian Dressing
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1 small clove garlic, minced
1 tablespoon grated Parmesan cheese

Combine all ingredients in small bowl. Stir with wire whisk until well blended. Makes 1 cup dressing.
Serve with romaine lettuce, artichoke hearts, ripe olives and cherry tomatoes.
Serve with sliced tomatoes, sliced red onions and green peppers.
Serve with a mixed green salad garnished with cherry tomatoes and almond slices.

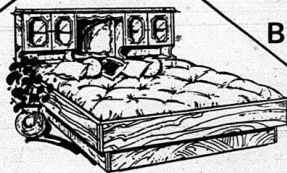
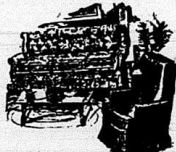

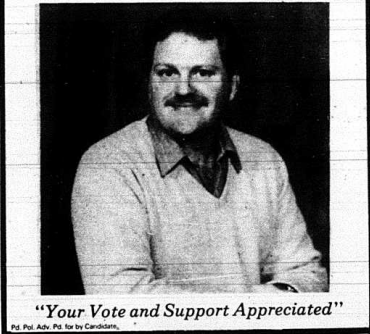

actually operate the restaurant, especially after the death of his wife, Virginia, were his son, Jack, and daughter-in-law, Betty. The apples of his eye were not on the menu, they were his grandchildren, Jack-Milford and Virginia Alice.

Former patrons still remember the piano practicing of Virginia Alice when she was learning to play and the whistling of Jack Milford as he rode his rocking horse like a cowboy.

If there was one thing Jack Albright worried about in those days, it was the route 1-75 was going to take when it was built, and later, where the interchange ramps would be.

"I don't want to be all fenced in," he said. "That worries me."

He didn't have to worry. When the interstate was completed, he found himself in an ideal location.

You might say, the call of the West was heard by Jack, who was by then becoming more and more incapacitated by a heart problem. So on November 22, 1969, the Albrights sold the property, packed up household items and youngsters, and moved to Arizona where they still live. Jack died sometime later.

Buying the restaurant property was the Appalachian Oil Co.

meaning James M. Renfro of Flat Lick in Knox County, and others. Owner at the time of a 76 gasoline dealership, and into coal, Renfro still owns the property.

Shortly after purchase, the restaurant was leased to Ole Joe Clark of Renfro Valley and his wife, Jean.

It was an ideal place for Ole Joe to be. He could visit with the Renfro Bandmate patrons and mingle with his local friends. It remained a hospitable and friendly place, with Jean doing the cooking and Joe doing the public relating.

The Clarks gave it up in the early 70's and moved to Berea where they now make their home.

Since the Clark's tenure, Belly Acres has been unused and empty-an eyesore, residents of the area say, with windows broken, the roof sagging, and the area littered and weed clogged. The tall 76 sign towering over the area is rust covered and faded. The only customers now are rats, snakes and other "varmints."

"It's a sad sight," a nearby resident said the other day. "It's the first thing tourists see when they come off I-75. It's their first impression of Renfro Valley."

Recently there has been talk of possible condemnation as a health hazard or asking the Rockcastle Fiscal Court to complain to the owner about its deplorable condition.

But Belly Acres is not alone in its delapidated appearance. The service station across the road is fast joining the ranks of the uninhabitable.

Someone said recently, "Wouldn't it be nice if the owners of the two properties would upgrade them. The area really would look so much better."

Creek. In recent months, the city has been the focal point of a protest over the location of a garbage disposal landfill off U.S. 25 south of Pine Hill. Some residents claimed the landfill is in the drainage pattern that would take water runoff into Roundstone Creek and on to the boils where it would contaminate the water supply.

Despite the protest, the state approved a permit for the landfill. It was first approved by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court, then finally rejected by the court.

Mayor Medley said because of the hearing on the landfill, "we stood a good chance of losing our water."

He said he thought the hearing could have left the impression on the public that Livingston's water is not good, and the water "degraded."

"I mean propagandize, by just saying the drainage from the landfill could go into our water supply making it unusable," he said.

"But on the amount of water we supply and our fire department, we believe we have a good supply and the men think the department is a good one," the mayor continued. "And we find it hard to believe we would be penalized in insurance rate."

Arletta Norton at the Norton Insurance Agency in Mt. Vernon said if Livingston was unhappy with its rating the council should contact the ISO and ask what the city could do to upgrade its rating, and ask for a re-evaluation.

The mayor also reported that an earlier water-contamination problem has been corrected. The Kentucky Department of Water notified Livingston water users in an advertisement in last week's Signal that "some contamination occurred" in the reporting period of December, 1984 by Coliform bacteria, which is not considered harmful to humans, but is an indicator that some kind of harmful bacteria may have been present at that time.

"I am sure this has been corrected," the mayor stated. Many cities face the Coliform

bacteria problem from time to time, and in some cases, it is a matter of accurately reporting water testing.

At a meeting of the Livingston City Council, the council voted to purchase uniforms for new city policeman John McReynolds and to repair some of the city's sidewalks.

9.7 percent. Nationally, the comparable rates were 8.0 percent in January and 7.8 percent in February. The rates aren't seasonally adjusted.

Eight counties, including six in the Bluegrass area, reported rates below 6.0 percent in February. Woodford County reported the lowest rate, 3.8 percent, followed by Scott, 3.9 percent; Fayette, 4.0 percent; Trimble, 4.4 percent; Bourbon, 5.0 percent; Madison and Oldham, each with 5.4 percent; and Jessamine, 5.7 percent.

interest in the county and things to do; and agreed to consult with others in the CVADD about development of a country music museum at Renfro Valley.

The Rockcastle association will take those ideas to a meeting of the CVADD tourist department next week at London for approval of the brochure and museum.

Glenn Westbrook of the CVADD tourism staff told those present the county association should explore ways to let tourists know what the county has to offer, "so they'll come from other states, stop here, and want to return."

"I know all of you have ideas of what is important in the area, and you should do everything possible to promote what you have to offer," Westbrook said.

He stressed the importance of approval of representatives from the eight county area who could take the ideas directly to Gov. Martha Layne Collins.

"It's much more effective if all eight counties agree to support you in your efforts," he added.

He said such points of interest as Renfro Valley, for entertainment, and Lake Linville, for water sports and fishing, should be two things that should be promoted.

"People from other states and cities are looking for a rural setting," he continued. "Many live in the rush of city life and want another viewpoint. They can find much to their liking in Eastern Kentucky if they agree to do it."

The next meeting of the Rockcastle association will be May 7 at the Pizza Hut.

Seven counties, including six in eastern Kentucky, reported rates above 20.0 percent. For the second month in a row Letcher County reported the highest rate, 24.4 percent.
