ships for next year and Louisville will over the limit this year.

If U of L should land Payne, well, (wow!) for Cardinal fans. The best recruiting season in the school's history. And if you're a Louisville fan-even if you're not-Couch Denny Crum is looking at Show Time. It's like rock 'n' roller Jerry Lewis is used to saying: "It's time, Baby! Time to get it get it on." Check the road to Dallas, call a Holiday Inn in the Big D.

The Cardinals all-star roster brings to mind buzz words like "playing time" and "how ya gonna keep 'em happy, Denny?" Now that U of L recruiters have delivered so handsomely Crum is on the spot.

It's time Baby! Ah, Denny. Time to show what a much ballhoofed coach can do with an all-star team.

With six of its first eight players in 1984-85 returning and 10 returns altogether, the Cardinals have (officially) added the following artillery:

6-2 Kevin Walls, 44.8 pts., 4.4 reb.; 6-7 Avery Marshall, 20.2 pts., 11.4 reb.; 6-8 David Robinson, 13.1 pts., 11.2 reb.; 6-8 Tony Kimbro, 27.3 pts., 14.2 reb.; 6-4 Keith Williams, 16.9 pts., 6.5 reb.; 6-9 Pervis Ellison, 27.0 pts., 19.0 reb.

A little addition tells us that U of L will replace Manuel Forrest and James Jeter's combined 15.4 points and 5.8 rebounds with 147 points and 67 rebounds.

Consider too, that redshirt senior All-American Milt Wagner is back along with senior-to-be Billy Thompson who led the Cardinals in scoring (15.1), rebounding (8.4) and assists (4.2) last season.

What have your got, Jerry Lee?

"It's time, Baby! To get it on."

And DennyCrum might just as well stuff in his Cardinal red jacket pocket the speech we all know he is writing today. Goes something like this: "Yes, we've signed some pretty good players for next year, and we have some pretty good talent coming back. But you're talking about a lot of inexperience here. And Manuel Forrest and James Jeter meant so-o-o much to our ball club as leaders. And this is a tough league."

And so on... and so forth.

Meanwhile, U of L fans will laugh and chuckle and nudge each other all the way to the local Holiday where they will make reservations for Mar 29-31, 1986 at one of several Holiday Inns in Dallas.

Ironically, as cycles in basketball dictate, in 1985-86 Crum will find himself in the same predicament that Joe B. Hall faced in 1977-78. Win! And nothing less will do.

Best recruiting crops

Who had the best recruiting season in college basketball? According to talent scout Bob Gibbons "I would say North Carolina, North Carolina State and Louisville."

Comment: But not that order. North Carolina's crop is headed by can't missers Jeff Lebo and Kevin Madden and NC State has lined up 6-7 Chuckie Brown, 6-6 Kenny Poston and 6-9 Charles Shackelford; but Louisville got the best and most of the talent this year.

Tony Kimbro is an excellent prospect. Avery Marshall is a "we try harder" type. Good role player prospect. David Robinson needs a year or so to mature to the college level. Pervis Ellison won't be a prolific scorer, but has the instincts to be a brilliant defensive player. He needs 30 pounds.

Louisville's "most effective" signee, I think, is 6-2 Keith Williams. A Jerry Eaves-type playmaker, Williams can be flashy, but knows how to play smart basketball. He takes only good shots and plays a team game.

Around the state

Owensboro Apollo prize Rex Chapman, who has said he wants to play close, to home, may be leaning to the University of Kentucky, now that Sutton (I like big guards) is the coach and Louisville is guard rich. Word is that Chapman will attend at least two summers camps this year-UK's and Kansas.

Wayne Chapman, Rex's father, an assistant coach at Kentucky Wesleyan, is interested in "moving up" and reports are that Wayne has already gotten "package deal" overtures from some colleges, but has remained adamant that he will not "deliver the kid" for a job.

According to a source close to UK coach Eddie Sutton is reported to have looked at a map of Kentucky recently and asked an aid, "show me a city where support for UK is strongest."

The reply: "Close your eyes and put your finger someplace."

Comment: Eddie needs to make a "Goodwill Tour."

Incidentally, reports are that Sutton will not allow his players to appear at speaking engagements around the state until after they've completed their eligibility because he is reported to have said, "It's too tempting an opportunity for them to get into their pockets."

College Basketball

After what happened to Tulane University, it was suggested in this space a few weeks ago that it was just the tip of the iceberg. "Unfortunately, that's absolutely right," a college assistant coach told me last week. "There's more cheating going on now than ever. And there's an even greater problem that hasn't been addressed yet."

What's that?

"Cocaine, and the availability of it on college campuses, and to student athletes, is rampant," he said.

On-breaking-NCAA:

"Of the 64 teams in the NCAA Tournament this year, 31 of them cheat," said Bob Gibbons who works closely with college recruiters. "But Howard Garfinkel disagrees with me on that one. He says it's only 28."

U of L banquet

Louisville wrapped up its basketball season with one more distinction last week. The Cardinals 19-18 won-lost extended the school's nation-leading record of consecutive winning seasons to 41.

Metro Conference note-West Virginia University is the top candidate to replace Tulane as a conference member.

Comment: If WVU does join the league it promises to be a "spicy series" when the Mountaineers tangle with Louisville since it will reunite two old coaching antagonists-Gale Catlett (when he was at Cincinnati) and Denny Crum.

UK banquet

At the Wildcats basketball banquet Kenny Walker got the MVP award. The 6-8 junior topped the Southeastern Conference in scoring and rebounding (22.0 ppg and 10.2 rpg). It was the first time a player has made the SEC double since Bernard King (Tennessee) in 1977.

Other UK awards: Best defensive player-Winston Freshman leadership-Ed Davender; 110 percenter-Walker; Scholarship award-Bret Bearup; Fewest turnovers-Bearup; Christian athlete award-Roger Harden.

All-NBA rookie team

The 1985 National Basketball Association All-Rookie Team as selected by the NBA head coaches was released last week. Chicago's Michael Jordan and Houston's Akeem Olajuwon tied with 22 votes. Sam Bowie, Portland received 18, Charles Barkley, Phila-

delphia, 17, Sam Perkins, Dallas, 15, Otis Thorpe, Sacramento, 8, Alvin Robertson, San Antonio, 7, Vern Fleming, Indiana, 3, Tim McCormick, Seattle, John Stockton, Utah and Kevin Willis, Atlanta received one each.

in 1975. Sagarin, a computer programmer at IU who has his ratings published in "USA Today," has been rating college teams for the last 11 years. According to his latest print out behind the two Indiana teams and Georgetown at No. 3 all-time, Sagarin rates North Carolina '84 (Sam Perkins, Michael Jordan) at No. 4, and Michigan State '79 (Earvin "Magic" Johnson) No. 5.

Kentucky's 1978 NCAA title team ranks No. 8 and UK's '75 club is No. 13. The 1977 Kentucky team (Jack Givens, Rick Robey et al) that finished 25-4, is 17th, Louisville 1983 (Rodney McCray, Lancaster Gordon) all rank 19th. Sagarin's computations are based on relative difficulty of schedule in conjunction with margin of victory.

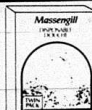

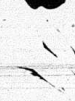

Taking the law into your hands

Citizen's arrest. That term has a good ring to it. It smacks of the good old American virtues of concern, involvement, and action.

But the ordinary lay person had better know what he is doing before trying to place people under arrest.

First of all, the basic question.

May an ordinary citizen who is not a law enforcement officer place another person under arrest and take them into custody?

A private citizen may make an arrest only when a felony has, in fact, been committed and he or she has reasonable grounds to believe that the person being arrested has committed that fel-

ony. There is no citizen's right to arrest anyone for a misdemeanor.

And whenever a person is arrested, they had better have committed a felony or the arresting person could be in trouble.

Two examples will suffice. A convicted felon has escaped from the Kentucky State Penitentiary and the general public has been alerted to this as well as given a description of the escapee.

Along with this notification is information about the person's criminal record. A farmer sees the inmate crossing his field and grabs a shotgun and places him under arrest and takes him into custody.

This is a clear example of a valid citizen's arrest.

Then there is another case. You are traveling through

officer only has to have reasonable grounds to believe that the person arrested has committed a felony. It does not require that the person to have, in fact, committed a felony as long as the law enforcement officer has acted in good faith. A private citizen, on the other hand, would be in trouble unless the person arrested has in fact committed that felony.

There is one important exception to all this. It has to do with shoplifting.

A person who either operates or is an employee of a business may take another person in custody if he or she has probable cause to believe that that person has stolen items from that business. That entrepreneur may take the person into custody and detain them in a reasonable manner for a reasonable length of time. They can call the police and hold that person until the law enforcement officers arrive. That is true even though the person may not have in fact been shoplifting—if the merchant acted in good faith and with probable cause.

It's crucial to recognize that this citizen's right to arrest for a misdemeanor is only for the merchant. Another shopper in the store cannot exercise it even though they may have witnessed the theft. They must report it to the store employee.

None of this should be confused with the right of every citizen to defend his own life or the lives of other people as well as his own property and the property of other people. That gets into a completely different area of the law.

Generally speaking, it is best for the ordinary citizen to leave the arresting to law enforcement officers. Everyone should still get involved in gathering valuable information to assist the officer in catching the culprit.

And of course there are times when a citizen should come to the

aid of persons who are being physically assaulted. In this instant, protecting the victim is much more important than arresting the guilty party. That important principle should always be remembered. Consequently, once the assailant has been beaten off, only the best trained and physically fit citizens should give chase

down the darkened alleyway. And if the culprit is not armed and no serious injury is inflicted upon the victim, it is just a misdemeanor and the well intended and pursuing citizen cannot legally make an arrest anyway.

Being our brother's keeper is one thing. Playing policeman is something else.

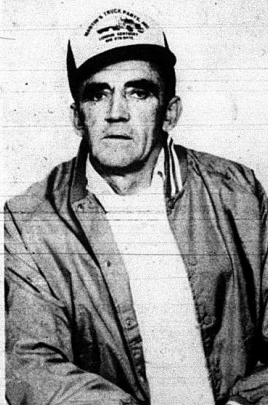

TOWN on a beautiful Sunday morning on your way to church when the person riding in the car in front of you throws a bag of garbage right on the church lawn and speeds away. You follow the car and when it pulls over at a local gas station, you place the person under arrest for littering.

That is an illegal citizen's arrest because littering is a misdemeanor. The proper course of action would be to simply take the person's license number and report it the following day so that an arrest warrant can be issued.

The big difference between a private citizen and a peace officer is that the latter may arrest individuals in obedience to a warrant or without a warrant when a felony or misdemeanor is committed in his presence or when he has reasonable grounds to believe that the person being arrested has committed a felony.

Note three major differences between the authority of a peace officer and that of a private citizen when it comes to making an arrest. First of all, arrest warrants issued by courts only authorize law enforcement officers to make arrests.

Secondly, a peace officer may arrest a person who commits a misdemeanor in his presence whereas a private citizen cannot. If the individual littering on that Sunday morning had been seen by a law enforcement officer, then arrest could have been made there by that officer without a warrant.

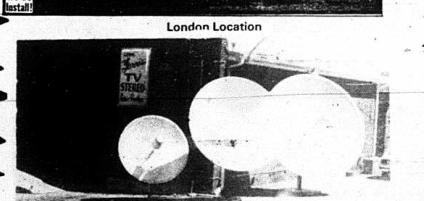

Two more inmates escape from county jail

The last six months have not been too pleasant at the Rockcastle County Jail, and last Friday morning was no exception.

For the third time in that six-month period, two more inmates escaped from the jail.

Rocky Boswell, of Mt. Vernon, and David King, of Auburn Hill, Michigan, escaped after they ripped an air-duct out of the ceiling and crawled to an outside wall where they tore out another air-duct.

Boswell was awaiting trial on several charges in Rockcastle Circuit Court, including being

Rockcastle man dies in freak auto accident

A Rockcastle County man was killed in a one-vehicle accident last Saturday night around 10 p.m., according to Kentucky State Police.

Jerry Dean Morgan, 20, of Rt. 3 Crab Orchard, was dead on arrival at the Rockcastle County Hospital, according to Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell.

Dowell said that Morgan died of a depressed skull fracture.

According to State Police, Morgan was driving his 1962 Dodge truck on the Gregory Road, 1 1/2 miles north of Mt. Vernon, when the brakes on the truck failed and it struck an embankment.

The impact of the crash caused Morgan to be thrown from the truck which rolled over the

upper part of his body.

A passenger in the vehicle, Lora Cromer, of Pulaski County, was not injured in the accident.

Morgan, who was a maintenance worker, was a 1982 graduate of Rockcastle County High School. His death was the first fatality recorded on Rockcastle County highways this year.

Morgan was born on June 30, 1964 in Rockcastle County, the son of Jerry Morgan and Joann York Morgan.

He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Joann York Smith, of Rt. 3 Crab Orchard; his father, Jerry Morgan, of Mt. Vernon; his step-father, William Smith, of Rt. 3 Crab Orchard; four brothers, Eddie Dewayne Morgan, of Mt. Vernon, William Smith, Jr., of Rt. 3 Crab Orchard; his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Ora York, of Mt. Vernon; and his paternal grandmother, Mrs. Sally Morgan, of Mt. Vernon.

Funeral services were conducted Tuesday, April 23, at the Dossell & Martin Funeral Home by Bro. Arnold Pingleton. Burial was in the Saylor Cemetery.

Pallbearers were Scott Johnson, Jerry Singleton, Michael Bullock, John L. Hunt, Paul Holliday, Gervis Sutton, and Mark Singleton.

Corrections Cabinet says local jail in "Limbo"

[Editor's Note: This is the first of a two-part series on the Rockcastle County Jail situation.]

What exactly is the status of the Rockcastle County Jail?

"I guess you could say it is in 'limbo' at the present time," said Cheryl Roberts of the Kentucky Corrections Cabinet in Frankfort. Ms. Roberts heads the department's county jails division.

"Right now, the Rockcastle County Jail is in a 'full-time' facility because they don't meet state requirements," she said.

Ms. Roberts said Tuesday that the local jail would be inspected within the next month to see what the present condition of the jail was and to see what, if any,

improvements had been made over the last year.

"If the jail is in a bad state of affairs, and if no improvements have been made by the Fiscal Court, our department would be forced to take action," she said.

Ms. Roberts said that since about 1983, her department had stringently inspected the county jails in Kentucky and had closed over 25 jails for not meeting state standards.

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court has made some improvements to the facility, and more are scheduled. However, the court let a contract on the jail to New-Way Security of Harrodsburg almost 8 months ago, and the work is still not finished.

The Corrections Cabinet official said that "things have to be in

pretty bad shape for us to close a county jail." But she said further that it has to be obvious to us that some effort is being made by local governments to meet the required standards.

Ms. Roberts said county jails are inspected once a year and the jails across the state that are still open are making an effort to get their jails up to standards.

Local Jailor Henry Lee Abney said Tuesday that even when all worth of improvements was completed, there would still be many requirements that the local jail did not meet.

He listed some of the things that the state requires of full-service jails that Rockcastle doesn't, and won't, have: a waiting room, visiting room, off-

ice, booking room, medical examination room, detoxification room, conference room, outside recreation, inside recreation and a strip room.

Ms. Roberts said Tuesday that if Rockcastle hoped to keep a full-service facility, they would eventually have to meet all of the requirements, including the above ones. She said her department usually allowed a few years for counties to complete that process. Improvements were made on at least a yearly basis.

She went on to say that there were three alternatives to a full-service jail: 1) A 96-hour hold-over facility. This is where counties are allowed to keep prisoners for that length of time before they are transferred to a full-time facility. 2) A 12-hour hold-over facility. She said that prisoners are allowed to stay in the county jail for a 12-hour period before they have to be moved. "This type of jail would probably be the most feasible for a county that did not have many prisoners from day to day. The requirements for a 96-hour facility are almost as strenuous as those for a full-time facility," she said.

The third option, Ms. Roberts said, would be for the county to close the jail completely. She said if that happened, the jailer's position would not be abolished, but his pay would be cut from \$28,000 a year to \$12,000. He would become the custodian for

the courthouse and would be a bailiff for the court. She said that if the jail remained open in any

capacity, there would be no change in the jailer's present pay.

"All I can say for sure is that

Rockcastle's jail is still open, and there is no immediate plan to take any action to change that situa-

tion," she said. "But that could all change after the inspection next month."

Local man charged with assault after shooting

A Rockcastle County woman is listed in satisfactory condition at a Lexington hospital following a shooting incident at her home Monday night.

Rosa Lee Jasper, 45, of Mt. Vernon, was taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital and later transferred to Central Baptist Hospital in Lexington after she was shot once in the hip with a rifle at close range, according to Kentucky State Police Officer Gary Lane.

Lane, who is investigating the shooting, said that Ms. Jasper's ex-husband, Wayne Jasper, 47, also of Mt. Vernon, had been charged with assault in the first degree after Ms. Jasper told him (Lane) that her ex-husband shot her.

The KSP officer said that Wayne Jasper apparently forced his way into Ms. Jasper's home on Carter Drive in Mt. Vernon around 9:30 p.m. He said Ms. Jasper was holding a door shut and that her ex-husband apparently fired one shot through the door and hit Ms.

Jasper in the left hip area.

Lane said it was his understanding that Mr. Jasper then fled the scene. The officer said Mr. Jasper was arrested around 11:40 p.m. and lodged in the Rockcastle County Jail.

According to court records, Jasper filed a \$25,000 property bond at around 1 a.m. Tuesday morning. He is scheduled for an April 29th preliminary hearing.

Hurd resigns from police force

Mt. Vernon Chief of Police Ronnie Hurd resigned his position effective June 1 during a council meeting of the city council Monday night.

The meeting was called specifically to take further action on the city's water and sewer project, but other items were added as the meeting progressed.

In a letter to the council, Hurd wrote that "personal hardships brought on to myself and family because of this job, have forced me to take this action."

He said it was "difficult to perform effectively" in the position under current circumstances.

"Since it seems unlikely the situation will change, I can see no alternative," he added.

The council voted unanimously to accept his resignation. Hurd has been a police officer since August 26, 1980.

The resignation leaves the city with four police officers, Tyree Gray, Jr., Frank DeBorde, James Thompson and Joe Howard.

The council approved a two-week leave for Officer Gray beginning May 16. He is a candidate for sheriff in the May primary.

The council also voted to take applications for a police officer to replace Hurd, and another for a part-time officer for patrol during the summer at Lake Linville. He will also be used by the city where needed.

Parking tickets are being issued as requested by the council, officer DeBorde reported. He said he issued 16 tickets on Saturday. A crack-down on Main Street parking was started at the request

of the council after a recommendation by the Mt. Vernon Local Development Corp. at an earlier meeting.

Police will also enforce the campaign poster ordinance passed in 1981, and the council told DeBorde to have officers take all campaign posters off trees, utility poles and other structures within the rights-of-way of public streets and highways in the city. Posters, other than campaign, are not included in the ordinance.

Under the ordinance, placing of each advertisement or poster constitutes a separate offense which carries a maximum fine of \$25.

The council will take bids on leasing the Lake Linville boat dock. The present lease expires May 1.

Local Development Corp. will hold public meeting

An invitation for a public meeting at Spout Springs is being extended by the Mt. Vernon Local Development Corporation for Friday, April 26, at 8:00 a.m.

The invitation is especially for all Mt. Vernon Civic organizations and anyone interested in the promotion of the Spout Springs area as a historical site for Mt. Vernon.

It is believed that Mt. Vernon was started in the spring around the year 1790 and a move has been started by the L.D.C. group to make a Mini Park at the site, and the L.D.C. is looking for ideas on how to develop and finance the site development.

The grounds around the spring has been cleaned, trees cut

and grass sown and the City of Mt. Vernon, which owns the grounds, is willing to turn the site over to any local organization to develop.

The springs are the site of the town's first water system, supplying water to the courthouse and jail, and also the site of the town's first swimming pool, the first tannery, the first commercial slaughter house, and could even be called the first flea market, as when the early settlers came to Mt. Vernon to shop, they hitched their horses near the spring while they shopped, traded knives, guns, dogs, sampled a little Kentucky brew and swapped stories.

Coal exports help all of us not just our coal counties

If you live in Greensburg, Campbellsville or Edmonton, you may think that coal (and coal exports in particular) are of no interest to you at all. In your counties, tobacco and agriculture are kings, with textiles not far behind.

But when you look at how coal

affects our entire state's economy, it is easy to see how wrong that impression can be.

Coal impacts your electricity rates. Coal sales mean an increased tax revenue for Kentucky; to build roads and schools in your county. And coal means jobs, jobs for our state that help create jobs in your town, wherever you live in Kentucky.

This week, as I travel to the Netherlands to speak before European coal buyers and American coal sellers meeting at the Hague, I am representing not just our coal areas in eastern Kentucky, but all of us who live and work in the state.

As Chairman of the House Task Force on Coal Exports, I firmly believe that increasing our exports of coal is vital to coal's future. We need to find new markets for coal and to develop those we already have.

In my speech to the U.S.-European Coal Conference, I stressed how our nation is working every day to improve our coal sales climate. Three problems have prevented us from increasing our sales, but each of those problems is on the way to being solved.

The first problem is the lingering effects of the worldwide recession of several years ago. Coal use fell as industries reduced production and energy consumption declined. But thanks to our economic revival here in the U.S., we are beginning to see the rest of the world's economy grow once again.

The second problem is the high value of the U.S. dollar. This overvalued currency hurts all our exports, coal included. It makes our price less competitive with other coal-exporting nations like South Africa, Australia and Poland. Here again, the problem is being worked on by the Congress, as we work to reduce the federal deficit. I am confident that we will bring down those deficits, and with them will come interest rates and the overly-priced dollar, making coal trade much easier.

The third problem is one that affects not only coal but also anything else shipped by rail. Our high railroad rates are adding millions of dollars in costs to our export coal, extra dollars that help make us uncompetitive again.

Here again, though, we are tackling the problem head-on. My legislation to reduce rail rate increases, the Consumer Rail Equity Act, will help make our rail rates more fair. This will help many benefits. Not only will it help hold down shipping costs for coal, but it will also mean lower rates for all of us who use electricity. And it will also help shippers of agricultural products or other commodities which move by rail, by preventing price gouging on non-competitive rail routes.

Those of you who live on our eastern coal counties already know how important coal is to Kentucky, and how much coal exports can help our local economy and our entire nation's balance of trade. But for those who live elsewhere, this effort to sell more American and Kentucky coal is still important.

All of us benefit from lower electric rates, increased exports and an improved coal economy. I am hopeful that this conference I am attending in the Netherlands will be a catalyst for more sales to Europe, so that all of us can share in these benefits.

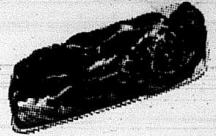

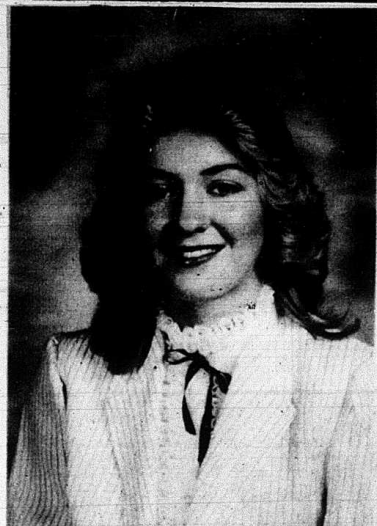

DOES YOUR WILL

NEED UPDATING?

How long ago did you write your will? Do you have a "letter of last instruction" to help your survivors handle arrangements in an orderly manner following your death?

Chances are that it's time to update your will because of changes you've made in your life.

Chances are also good that you've never had a letter of instruction to answer questions such as: Is burial or cremation appropriate? What kind of memorial service would you prefer? Did you have an agreement to donate your body or any organs to a medical school or transplant bank? Who will handle your financial affairs? Where are the insurance policies and other financial records kept?

Most people should consult an attorney about updating their

will if any of the following things happen: moving from one state to another; marriage, remarriage or divorce; birth or adoption of a child; death of a major beneficiary; retirement; major changes in investments that warrant a different strategy for saving taxes; or just changing your mind about a beneficiary, executor, trustee or guardian.

Although a letter of instruction is important, it should not be confused with a will! Unlike a will, the letter of last instruction is not a legal document. It is not a substitute for a will.

You might think of it as a security measure which assures family members or friends that they know your wishes upon death. It may keep loved ones from having to make costly decisions when they may not be able to think clearly.

Any information you feel is important or beneficial to your survival can be included in the letter. The letter might include names and addresses of those to be notified when you die. Include your father's and mother's name for the death certificate. List the location of the will, birth certificate or evidence of birth, marriage license, Social Security card, certificates of automobile ownership, deed to home ownership or other personal papers. Include a list of all checking and savings accounts and list the location of insurance policies, safe deposit boxes, and any stocks and bonds.

Give the location of the burial plot along with funeral and burial instructions. You may wish to include any special burial benefits to which you are entitled such as veterans burial benefits, lodge or fraternal benefits.

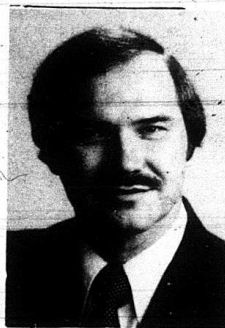

Process for allocations of USDA commodity foods

USDA commodity foods are allocated by the state to the Cumberland Valley Area Development District for the counties of Bell, Clay, Harlan, Jackson, Knox, Laurel, Rockcastle and Whitley. Based on the State's allocation, the Area Development District makes an allocation to each of the eight counties. The quantity of foods each county receives is based upon the individual county's poverty level figures from the 1980 census. Since quantities are not sufficient for each county to make a distribution every month, foods are allocated to four counties every other month. For example, Rockcastle, Laurel, Knox and Bell counties were allocated foods during the month of April. Whitley, Jackson, Harlan and Clay counties were allocated foods for the month of May.

Cheese is received every month. Other items are not. The additional items may only be received every third or fourth month, sometimes further apart. Those items are butter, honey, meal, milk, flour and rice.

Since freezer space is not available in all counties, many

counties are forced into a situation where they cannot accept butter for their county. Due to this, the Area Development District has had to cancel all shipments of butter for the summer months. Bell and Clay Counties still report an ending inventory of butter from previous shipments. This means they will give out butter for the next month or possibly two months. These counties have been able to secure donated freezer space for storage.

Ms. Judy Lawless, CVADD Coordinator, reports that the Area Development District never receives such items as peanut butter, canned meat products, etc. These items are, however, received by the schools, jails, and possibly through some day care facilities in the eight-county area. These items are not for distribution into individual households, and are not available through the Area Development District for the counties.

Established September 26, 1970, the KWFF is supported solely by donations and contributions from business and private individuals. In 1984 there were five scholarship applicants. 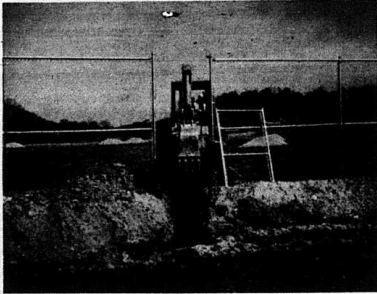


Lake Linville project to be completed soon

A land drainage and seeding project currently being installed in the ballfield above Lake Linville will be completed soon. The project is a measure sponsored by the Rockcastle County Conservation District, Soil Conservation Service and the City of Mt. Vernon. The project began during the fall of 1984 and was not completed because of wet weather. Construction is scheduled to be

completed during May, 1985. Approximately 3500 feet of drainage lines are being installed to alleviate wet conditions in the ballfield area. Phase 1 of the project was completed during the fall of 1984. Approximately 4 acres of roadbanks surrounding the lake were seeded and established in grass to stop soil erosion. The City of Mt. Vernon employees are providing assistance in the project as well as others throughout the community.

'85 Burley crop underway; 3.7 cent price rise proposed

As spring advances and efforts continue to save the 45-year-old tobacco program, the usual seasonal work is going forward to produce another burley crop, the cash mainstay of farmers in this area.

Reports from over the burley states received by the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association indicate that plantbeds are all seeded and plants are up and growing, in most sections. A burley price support average of \$1,788 per pound is being proposed for the 1985 crop, in the U.S. Agriculture Department recommendations issued last week. This would be up 3.7 cents over the past two years when the support was frozen at \$1,751 average. As usual the USDA is seeking public comments on this year's proposal, with May 17 fixed as the date for final determination.

of the support level.

The Secretary of Agriculture has set the burley No-Net-Cost assessment at 30 cents per pound for the 1985 season. This would bring the average down to \$1.48 per pound returns to farmers on their 1985 marketings.

About 14 per cent less acreage in burley is estimated for 1985 as compared with last year along with the ten per cent quota reduction. The 1985 basic quota (national) is 525 million pound, and USDA economists say the effective quota could be 537 million, down 22 per cent from last year.

Final results of the 1985 crop marketings show another 160 million pounds were grown, as shown by the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association, based at Lexington, Ky., and about 40 million by the Burley Stabilization Corp., Knoxville, Tenn. The two burley cooperatives now have approximately 600 million pounds

on hand from the '82, '83 and '84 crops.

The only sales activity in pool stocks for many months has been the purchase of half a dozen hogheads last winter from the 1982 crop tobacco, says Alvin R. Beckley, executive secretary-treasurer of the Burley Association. However, he adds that samples from the 1983 crop leaf have recently been sent at the request of some buyers.

Efforts continue to save the burley program by negotiating with companies and through Congress. Apparently the program has been spared from a five-year phaseout by the Federal government, and tobacco leaders are hopeful of final agreement on a plan to solve surplus, get imports down, and lower price-support levels along with No-Net-Cost fees.

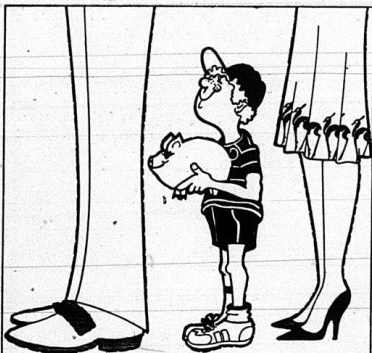

We would like to bring to your attention a matter of great importance. It is a sorry shame when a person cannot be left in peace and quiet in his or her own home to enjoy a quiet conversation with friends or neighbors. The people of Rockcastle County are all subjected to such harassments as the ones mentioned above. Ever since I, Robert Newcomb, and my running-mate deputy Griffin, filed our candidacy for sheriff, we, and our friends, have been arrested, harassed and insulted by Sheriff Taylor, as well as the Kentucky State Police.

On Saturday, April 13th, my home, Gary Griffin's, and that of Phyllis Mills' was subjected to a thorough search by several city and state police officers. Reason given was for being accused of selling alcoholic beverages. Gary's home was searched, there was not one can of beer or even an empty whiskey bottle found. No arrest was made. My home was searched and 26 cans of beer were found. Reason for this was several of my friends and relatives were sitting around and talking over a few beers. No arrests were made. Phyllis Mills, our very good friend, and Gary's girlfriend, was also intruded upon. In each case, we were all very embarrassed and made to feel like criminals. Two weeks ago, Gary was going from his home to the grocery store when he was pulled over by two state police officers, Schenkenfelder and the new officer, Gary Lane. He was asked for his driver's license which he provided and he was told they were suspended. Gary was then placed under arrest and searched and his car was thoroughly searched. He was incarcerated in the Rockcastle County Jail. His license was not suspended. In fact, they had been issued the previous week. The case was thrown out of court. It was a clear case of false arrest. These are only a few complaints of harassment against us. This leaves me, and quite a lot of the citizens of Rockcastle, wondering if everytime a person wants to run for office as a candidate will they have to be treated as badly. I think this action is a farce on the actions of the Ky. State Police and Sheriff William Taylor.

Tax Course Available To High School Students

After 30 years of modifications to reflect changes in the tax system and the changing needs of teachers and students, the "Understanding Taxes" program is better than ever, according to the Internal Revenue Service. This year, "Understanding Taxes" is enriched by a new film series, "Tax Whys: Understanding Taxes," developed in a cooperative effort by the education, telecommunications and economic education agencies serving the 50 states and the District of Columbia.

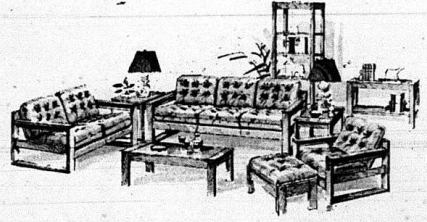

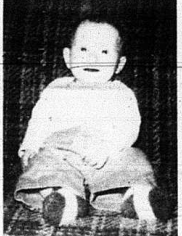

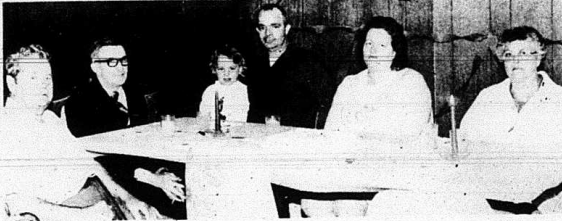

Bass fishing activity was light casting crankbaits, spinnerbaits and flippin' worms in shallow, brushy areas. The lake was clear, stable at summer pool and 73 degrees.

BARREN: Moderate fishing activity was reported by Officer Donald Depp. Crappie were being taken over submerged cover in old creek and river channels in 4-10 feet of water. Bass fishermen experienced moderate activity casting crank and spinnerbaits and flippin' jigs and rind along brushy banks. Tailwater activity was very slow for crappie and white bass. The lake was clear with some color in streams upriver, rising, 15 1/2 feet below summer pool and 68 degrees.

NOLIN: Officers Sammie Rentro and James Shipp reported heavy fishing activity for crappie around stumpy points, stickups, shallow banks and creek channel dropoffs. Bass success was light to moderate on crankbaits around rocky points and shallow flats. Tailwater activity was heavy for trout. The lake was clear to murky, rising, 13 1/2 feet below summer pool and 70 degrees.

ROUGH RIVER: Officer Harold Belt reported moderate to heavy fishing activity for crappie 2-10 feet deep. Bass were moderate off points using crankbaits, jigs and rind. Light tailwater activity for trout and crappie was reported. The lake was clear, rising, 12 feet below summer pool and 68 degrees.

TAYLORSVILLE: Creel Clerk Don Morgan and Officer John Wells reported very heavy fishing activity. Bass were being caught casting crankbaits, spinners and jigs around stickups in 2-6 feet of water. Dept. of Education has funds for special education

The problem is one of basic economics: Demand exceeds supply.

The state Department of Education has money to offer local school districts for special education units—classroom instruction for children with handicaps. However, while the demand for such units has gone up, the amount of money to pay for them has gone down.

To accommodate as many local school districts as possible and make appropriate services available to handicapped students throughout the state, department officials have developed a new method for allocating available resources. They call it a "fair share" money-management system.

Lois Adams, associate superintendent for the department's Office of Education for Exceptional Children, said this week in Frankfort that the system became necessary when local districts applied for more money than the department could provide.

"In the past, some local districts were in a good position to use the resources available from the state for special education programs and services," Adams said. "The pool of state resources was stable for many years, but that pool became smaller when the 1984 Kentucky General Assembly found it necessary to trim funds representing 100 special education units and earmarked part of the remaining funds for home instruction."

"The 'fair share' distribution takes effect next school year. Allocations will be based on a formula that considers several factors, including the number of disabled children to be served by each local district and the kinds of services needed to meet their needs and satisfy state and federal requirements," Adams said. The amount was similar to a system used successfully by another department office faced with high demand for limited resources.

"We can no longer give every district what it asks for," she said. "What we can do is try to stretch some limited resources as far as they will go and as equitably as we know how."

Adams says 92 of the 178 districts applying for special education units can expect no change in their allocations next year, while 55 will receive increases and 31 will receive decreases in state funding.

She added that the new distribution process would be applied over a period of three to five years to prevent major program disruption in large districts and allow for growth in smaller districts that have been receiving "significantly less than

their fair share" of special education dollars.

"Federal law requires that every student identified as handicapped must be provided a free, appropriate public education program," Adams said. "Reaching that goal will require give-and-take cooperation and a close look at the most appropriate use of state and local resources."

IRS office may solve persistent problems

Taxpayers who meet delays or red tape in solving their federal tax problems can get help from the Internal Revenue Service Problem Resolution Program (PRP) office, the IRS said.

There is a PRP office to help Kentucky taxpayers who have already had unsuccessful contacts with the IRS. People in the PRP office have the authority to cut through the red tape and handle problems promptly. The taxpayer generally deals with one person and is kept informed of the case's progress, according to the IRS.

The most common problems brought to the PRP office are complaints about missing refunds, mixed up social security numbers, incorrect billings by IRS, or mistakes by the taxpayer.

Besides solving taxpayer problems, PRP tries to prevent them by discovering flaws in the system. For example, PRP has helped reduce the time to process amended tax returns.

Problem Resolution should not be used as a substitute for normal procedures, the IRS said, because almost all problems can be resolved before they reach PRP. PRP cannot be used to appeal the decisions of a tax examination, but taxpayers with a persistent tax problem will find PRP willing and able to help, the IRS stressed.

Rockcastle students ready to take KEST

For the first time, Kentucky students in grades K-12 will be taking the Kentucky Essential Skills Test in the areas of reading and mathematics. The KEST is a component of the state mandated testing program. In the spring of 1986 the KEST will be expanded to include the areas of spelling, writing and library/reference. The teaching of identified essential skills (and ultimate testing of) is part of legislation passed by the 1984 General Assembly. The state also mandates testing of 3rd, 5th, 7th and 10th graders in the language, spelling and reference areas. Students will be administered the CTBS (Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills) in those areas. The Rockcastle County School System goes beyond the minimum

testing requirements and annually tests all students (not just the mandated grades) in all basic areas. This allows for more continuity in evaluating the progress of individual students, individual classes and individual grades at both the school and district level. The week of April 22-24 has been designated for administration of the KEST and the CTBS in all Rockcastle County Schools. Rockcastle County High School students will be tested on Tuesday, April 30, and Wednesday, May 1. Students absent on those days will be required to complete the tests on designated make-up days. Parents can check with the elementary principals in regard to specific dates within the individual schools.

- The testing program plays a vital role in the total educational process. Data accumulated is used to:
- (1) Measure knowledge gained in a particular subject area.
 - (2) Measure the general potential of individual ability.
 - (3) Assist in designing appropriate programs for the succeeding year.
- It is very important that every child be in attendance on the testing dates. Parents can assist the testing effort by promoting the following recommendations in regard to student preparation:
- (1) Get a good night's sleep.
 - (2) Eat wisely - a good breakfast is important on testing mornings.
 - (3) Wear comfortable clothing.
 - (4) Feel confident that you will do well.
 - (5) Listen carefully to all directions.

Propaganda sheet distributed

Posters put up in county say Catholics linked to Nazis

The Roman Catholic Church and Nazism are hand in hand in a conspiracy to control many aspects of American life, according to posters that have appeared in several Kentucky cities in recent days, including Mt. Vernon. The anti-Catholic posters were plastered on at least two known county locations on a billboard near the Rockcastle County Health Department and on windows of abandoned Belly Acres Restaurant near the Rentfro Valley Interchange of I-75. The posters have been placed mostly on signs, posts, and vacant buildings by those believed to be supporters of Arkansas evangelist Tony Alamo. They recently appeared in Lexington at the Final Four basketball tournament of which three of the final teams were from Catholic universities - Villanova, St. John's and Georgetown. In the past several days the posters have appeared in London, Corbin, Somerset, Danville, Elizabethtown, Mt. Sterling and Patsburg.

Four teams of two or three men were arrested recently in Chattanooga, Tenn., Jefferson City, Mo., Portsmouth, Va., Wildwood, N.J., and Pulaski, Tenn. for putting up the posters. Tony Spence, an editor of the Tennessee Register, a Catholic weekly newspaper, said, "They drive into town late at night and put the posters on abandoned buildings. By the time the posters are discovered, they've gone on to the next town."

"We have no idea who is doing it, but we'd like to find out," said Bill Rigney of the Danville police. One poster is titled "Hitler Sings!" and links Adolph Hitler and other Nazis to the Roman Catholic Church. "The vicious Nazi party growing in the United States is nothing more than Catholic action led by Catholic Jesuits," the poster states. Another claims the pope and the Vatican control a variety of news, communications, government and criminal organizations. According to press reports, in a telephone interview with Alamo, he refused to say whether the distributors were following orders, but added, "I agree with the poster 100 percent," and said he would help the alleged distributors pay court costs.

The Diocese of Covington, which comprises 57 central and eastern Kentucky counties, issued a statement: "The people of the Catholic Diocese of Covington, like people of any faith, are both angry and sad when their beliefs are distorted and misrepresented. We would (Cont. to B2)

It is particularly gratifying to us when local volunteers give their time and energy to help us in this effort."

hope that when a person is tempted to accept these false statements as true, he or she would call the local Catholic school or church to try to get the question answered by someone who is in a position to know."

Of the groups arrested, at least one was a resident of Alma, Ark., headquarters of the Tony and Susan Alamo Christian Foundation, which has been described by Anti-Defamation League spokesmen, Michael Schwartz, as a cult with businesses worth more than \$25 million.

The Alamos founded their group when they began preaching on Hollywood's Sunset Strip in 1966. They later formed a commune in Saugus, Calif., and then moved to Arkansas, according to Schwartz.

Alamo, who is 50, has said that his real name is Bernie Lazar Hoffman and that he is a Jew converted to Christianity. A former singer, he recorded a hit song titled, "This Ol' House," the spokesman said.

The league accuses Alamo of brainwashing his followers and forcing them to work for little or no pay in foundation businesses unrelated to religion. The U.S. Labor Department has sued the foundation for not paying a minimum wage, and the case is before the Supreme Court.

"This year they are going heavily into the rural South, where this stuff can pose a significant danger," said the league spokesman, Michael Schwartz. "There might be some people willing to believe it because they've heard this kind of thing before."
