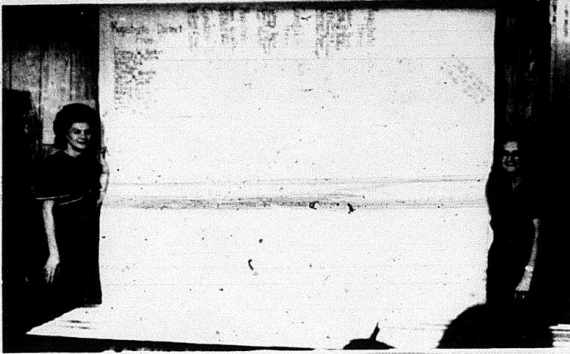

'Foster Story' will tour Japan in Fall

The strains of "My Old Kentucky Home" will echo in the theatres of Japan this fall when "The Stephen Foster Story" makes its first international tour. The outdoor musical's full

remain in Japan for an additional week making promotional appearances.

Arrangements call for five performances in two Tokyo theatres and two performances each in the cities of Osaka and Nara, according to Bert Ballard, the show's general manager.

Promotional appearances are scheduled for other Japanese cities and cast members will be appearing on Japanese radio and

television and visiting Japanese schools.

Ballard explained that the tour is the culmination of more than two years of discussions between the Stephen Foster Drama Association, which produces "The Stephen Foster Story," and Kentucky Fried Chicken-Japan, who is sponsoring the visit.

The Japanese tour is undoubtedly a tremendous boost to "The Stephen Foster Story," according to Ballard.

In preparation for the fall tour, Ballard said an advance team from Bardstown will be leaving for Japan on May 17. That team will include himself and the show's top directors.

gories comes reckless homicide. Here the reckless misconduct is again not an intentional killing but such negligence which takes the act into the criminal range of proscribed conduct. This offense is closely akin to manslaughter in the second degree—the only difference being the amount of negligence involved. Some shootings in hunting may fall within this measure of criminal liability.

Of course the penalties imposed under each of the offenses will vary depending upon their seriousness. In Kentucky, murder carries a sentence of 20 years to life, and under certain aggravating circumstances, the maximum penalty may be death. Killing for hire, multiple killings, murder committed in the course of a rape, kidnapping or robbery, and the murder of a prison employee by an inmate are all examples of the circumstances surrounding a murder which elevates the homicide to a capital case possibly justifying the death penalty.

Ten to twenty years in the penitentiary is the range for manslaughter in the first degree, while second degree manslaughter carries five to ten. Lastly, reckless homicide may extract a sentence of not less than one nor more than five years in prison.

The unlawful taking of another human being's life is probably the oldest crime known to man. Even the Biblical law recognizes the varying degrees of seriousness from a cold premeditated and deliberate killing to those committed under less culpable circumstances. Our criminal laws have followed this pattern down through the years.

Most unlawful killings, interestingly enough, take place within the family, environment or at least involving "friends." Here again people who have recurring dealings with each other are the ones most likely to establish those relationships out of which, the causes of homicides arise—jealousy, drinking together, and heated personal arguments.

Thus, as one can readily see, homicide crimes may occur under vastly varying circumstances and carry a wide range of penalties. The difference, as far as our criminal law is concerned, will hinge on the state of mind of the killer.

Crimes of Homicide

COMMONWEALTH COMMENT

QUESTION: What is the difference between murder and manslaughter?

ANSWER: Like most other aspects of our criminal law, the difference between murder and manslaughter is a matter of degrees.

In Kentucky at least, there is no such thing as murder in the first degree. We only have murder—one category. That crime is defined as the intentional causing the death of another person, and while not acting under the influence of extreme emotional disturbance for which there is a reasonable justification or excuse.

Moving down the scale to the next highest crime of homicide is manslaughter in the first degree. That is simply the intentional

taking of another person's life, but while acting under the influence of extreme emotional disturbance for which there is a reasonable justification or excuse. This is the killing in the heat of passion type of crime and is most often found in such circumstances as mutual combat (bar room brawls), enraged jealousy, or in other situations where a person simply loses all control of their senses and there has been no premeditation or prior planning of the victim's death. This crime in some states may be called "murder in the second degree."

The third most serious crime of homicide is that of manslaughter in the second degree. This type of misconduct moves into the area of wanton or grossly negligent behavior. Deaths caused by drunk drivers on the highway is an example of this crime.

Lastly in the homicide cate-

Troop 263 News

Troop 263 of Rockcastle County recently went hiking the 10-mile Buffalo Trail in Frankfort.

The early settlers described the Buffalo Trace as being a hundred feet wide and the dust as being several inches deep; in some places the hooves of the buffaloes had worn the ground down several feet. This "Trace" or "Buffalo Trail" was made by vast herds of buffaloes traveling to and from the blue grass fields of Scott, Woodford and other parts of the blue grass country and Drennon Lick (Springs) in Henry County. This road "Trail" crossed the river at Leestown and it was so well marked and worn that it can be followed to this day; in that early day it bore evidence of having been traveled for hundreds of years by thousands of buffaloes in their search for salt. People in the early days hid themselves beside this trail to get what meat they needed, as deer and other animals also followed this trail. The trestle which the Frankfort and Cincinnati Railroad Company built across this trace "Buffalo Trail" is 156 feet high and 800 feet long.

The average 10-mile trail hike takes about 4 1/2 hours to complete but this particular trail took much longer as this is a historical trail.

As your County Attorney for the past 3½ years, a part of my responsibility has been to try cases in our District Court. The types of cases prosecuted by the County Attorney in the District Court are limited to those involving a loss of property that is less than \$100 in value, traffic, and other similar type offenses.

Other cases such as homicide, robbery, burglary, and most break-ins are assigned to the Circuit Court and the Commonwealth Attorney for prosecution. Mr. Jerry Cox, of Clontz & Cox law firm, serves as Commonwealth Attorney for Rockcastle County under Mr. Ham of Somerset.

When a person comes before the District Court, he or she has the choice of pleading "guilty" or "not guilty." If the person pleads guilty, the judge will then impose a penalty as prescribed by law, and a jury trial is made unnecessary.

If the person pleads not guilty, he or she is entitled to a jury trial, and the jury will determine their guilt or innocence. Most persons who appear before the District Court plead guilty and do not ask for a jury trial. However, the right to a jury trial is an important safeguard of our legal system, and it is available if the person requests it. Jury trials are regularly scheduled in our District Court, the last one having been held only a few weeks ago.

As your County Attorney, I have treated you with courtesy, dignity and respect. I was your friend before I asked for your vote, and I will be your friend when the voting is over.

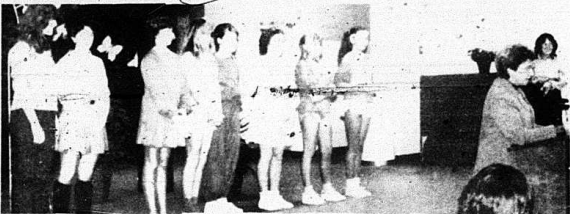

mechanics of staging the show. All the Japanese shows will be given indoors.

Ballard said the Japanese will be building a complete set similar to the one the show uses in its Kentucky theatre. The set will be moved to the various performance sites. All the show's hand props and elaborate costumes will be transported to Japan.

Artistically there will be few changes in the production. "They want it just as it is performed here," Ballard said.

He added that about 15 minutes—mostly dialogue—will be cut from the show's script. "We're not sure of the exact format, but we will use that time for some additional music and perhaps audience participation, like a sing-along," he said. All nine performances will be exactly two-hours long.

Ballard said interest in a tour of Japan developed because Stephen Foster's music is well known in Japan. Children study it in school, and KFC-Japan uses "My Old Kentucky Home" as the background music for its television commercials.

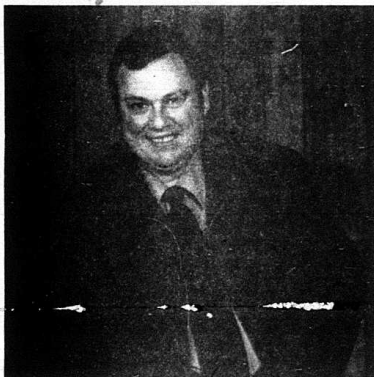

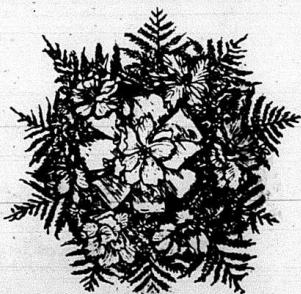

The public either forgot, or wasn't interested, in attending a public hearing on how the city of Mt. Vernon could best spend Local Government Economic Funds next year.

At least, no one showed up to offer suggestions or ideas to the council when the hearing was held Monday afternoon at city hall.

For that matter, only one councilman attended, Joe Martin. It was agreed, the time, day and the day of the week had a lot to do with attendance.

Andy Meadors of the Cumberland Valley Area Development Council, who was to discuss the business, apologized to the council, explaining he should have chosen a more appropriate time for a hearing, probably at night.

At stake in the hearing was not a lot of money and the city will get it anyway.

The annual allotment for Mt. Vernon for 1985-86 is \$3,152. The city still has \$4,667 of the same fund left over in this year's budget. The amount left can be added to the new allotment.

Under state regulations, the council is authorized to spend 70 percent of the new funds for about anything it finds necessary and useful. The other 30 percent is earmarked specifically for "coal haul roads." If a city does not have coal haul roads, and Mt. Vernon does not, then the 30 percent can be added to the 70 percent for use as the council sees fit.

"What we wanted at this meeting was oral and written comments from the residents of the city on how the money could best be spent," Meadors stated.

"In other cities we get all kinds of ideas and suggestions. However, the council has the final say. But it's always a good idea to get resident suggestions."

Meadors said it was not required that the council as a group attend the hearing.

"It can be an administrative job," he continued. "So the council doesn't have to be here. But the impact should be passed along to the council, for its consideration and information." There was none.

Another public hearing with more money involved will be held during the June 10 city council meeting. Originally scheduled for 1 p.m. May 27, the meeting date was changed so the council and residents could attend.

At that hearing, the council will report on how it plans to spend \$15,719 in Municipal Aid Road Funds during the 1985-86 fiscal year. The funds are specifically for use on city streets.

The city still has \$12,833 in those funds to carry over from the current year making the total available \$28,552 in 1985-86.

Meadors said the city should have its street projects listed so it could report them at that hearing.

Municipal Aid Road Funds come from state gasoline taxes. Also at the June 10 meeting, the council will hold its first hearing on the 1985-86 city budget. Persons interested are invited to attend.

Brodhead city council presented with petition

It was a time for putting business on hold for the Brodhead City Council when it met in regular session Monday night.

Douglas Brock presented the council with petitions bearing 203 names requesting that the council allow Austin Brock to remain in the apartment on the second floor of the city hall/fire department building.

The council notified Austin Brock to move by July 1 so the council could use one of the two second floor apartments for city office and chamber members. Douglas Brock lives in the other apartment and was not asked to move.

The council plans to remodel the first floor, taking out the office area and turning it into a bay to house the new county fire truck that is to be delivered possibly in June.

Brock told the council he believed it would be better, and save the city money, if the council moved the office and meeting room to the old jail building owned by the city and allow Austin Brock to remain in the apartment. The two tenants paid the city a total of \$2,875 annual rent in 1984. Douglas Brock said he planned to move if Austin Brock had to vacate the apartment.

Expecting the petitions, the council was ready with a few figures of its own, presenting an itemized accounting of apartment (Cont. to A-14)

Two seriously injured in wreck at Renfro

A Rockcastle County man is listed in critical condition and another local man is in poor condition following a two-vehicle accident on U.S. 25 at Renfro Valley Monday night.

Tony Chasteen, 21, of Rt. 3 Mt. Vernon, was flown from the Rockcastle County Hospital by Skycare Monday night to the University Humana Hospital's burn unit after he was reportedly burned over 90% of his body.

According to Kentucky State Trooper Jim Silvers, Chasteen was driving one of the two vehicles involved in the accident which occurred about 6:35 p.m.

Silvers said according to witnesses at the scene, Chasteen was traveling south on U.S. 25 toward Mt. Vernon when he pulled out to pass another vehicle, driven by James Cromer. The KSP officer said that Chasteen's vehicle, a black Ford pickup, apparently pulled into the path of the vehicle driven by Kenneth Abney, 55,

Rt. 3 Mt. Vernon.

The two vehicles hit head-on with Chasteen's truck, then hitting the Renfro Creek bridge, overturning and catching fire. Silvers said.

Abney's vehicle, a 1964 Chevrolet, came to a stop at one end of the bridge where several local people pulled him from his car. Chasteen, who was pinned in his vehicle momentarily, was also pulled from his burning vehicle by local residents.

Abney was taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital where surgery was performed on broken bones. As of Tuesday afternoon, he was listed in poor condition.

A passenger in the Chasteen vehicle, Gary Sizemore, of Jackson Street in Berea, was apparently not injured and refused treatment at the Rockcastle County Hospital, according to Silvers, who said that no charges had been filed to date in connection with the accident.

As of 5 p.m. Tuesday evening, Chasteen was listed in critical condition in the Louisville hospital.

Fiscal court sets salaries; changes time of meeting

It took the Rockcastle Fiscal Court just 35 days to decide it didn't want night meetings after all. So the court changed the meetings back to daytime at its first regular night session Tuesday.

At the last meeting on April 2, the court voted to hold meetings at 6 p.m. on the first Tuesday of the month to allow more "people to attend."

It voted to change the meeting time back to the old time of 9 a.m. on the first Tuesday.

As it turned out, there wasn't a marked difference in the number of persons who attended the night session, only about 40.

It was not the first time a change in meeting time had been voted by a court. On June 30, 1976, the time was switched to 7 p.m. Then one week later, July 6, 1976, the court changed the time back to 9 a.m.

A check of Kentucky Statutes at that 1976 meeting revealed the county judge sets the meeting time at his discretion. Then judge, Hubert Thacker, and the court switched the time back to 9 a.m.

For those who attend Fiscal Court meetings, it doesn't matter a great deal when the court meets, most visitors say. The audience can't hear very much anyway, except Magistrate Tom Denney, who sometimes stands up and talks to the audience to stress a point. The magistrates sit with their backs to the audience and very little they say can be heard by visitors. And since County Judge Executive Bob Jasper has a naturally low voice, most of the business of the court is lost to the audience.

For those who couldn't hear Tuesday night, the court set salaries for the next four years (1986 through 1989) as required by law.

For the year beginning in January 1986, salaries stay at the present level for all but the County Court Clerk's office where employees will get a 4 percent salary increase.

The court also elected a deputy clerk to the office staff at a salary of \$7,700 a year. Under the clerk's new salary schedule, the chief deputy will receive \$11,929, the first deputy, \$11,301; second deputy, \$10,171; third deputy, \$8,413; and the fourth deputy, \$7,700.

Clerk Irene Bales reported state auditors suggested a clerk be added to her office staff because of

the amount of work that must be done. She said the work will increase as time goes by.

Other salaries remaining at the present level include: radio dispatcher, \$600; county treasurer, \$8,820; magistrates, \$6,000; coroner, \$2,400; three deputy coroners, \$50 each per month; road superintendent, \$5.06 an hour for eight hours; plus two hours a day for bookkeeping; truck drivers, \$3.75 an hour; grader operator, \$4.75 an hour; mechanic, \$4.50 an hour; and laborers, \$3.75 an hour.

During the meeting, Floyd Owens was re-hired county treasurer for a two-year term beginning back on July 1, 1984.

The court raised the dump fee to be paid at the Lily landfill to \$800 a month for three months at the request of Clarence (lib) Hasty who has a contract with the county for garbage collection.

Hasty had been allocated \$15 a load by the county up to a maximum of eight loads a week, or at most \$480 a month.

The court went into executive session to discuss the garbage proposal in private. When it returned the magistrates set the \$800 dump fee allocation.

Magistrate Donald Rowe chose not to participate in the executive session calling it illegal. He said he believed an executive session can only be called under Kentucky law for personnel matters. The garbage proposal was a financial matter.

The court approved a resolution endorsing Mt. Vernon Plastic Corporation's plan to obtain \$5,520,000 in Industrial Building Revenue Bonds to acquire, con-

struct, renovate and equip an addition to the present plant in the Rockcastle Multi-county Industrial Park west of Mt. Vernon.

The company plans to enlarge the building and add production machinery. The company now makes plastic lids for cups. After expansion, it will make the plastic cups. The new facilities will eventually double the number of employees at the factory which now has 120, according to company officials.

The county will in no way be obligated for the bonds. The county is simply saying it approves the expansion and the bonding the company plans to initiate.

In another action, the court authorized Judge Jasper to borrow \$2,000 for the Rockcastle County Senior Citizens organization to bring the group's allocation to a promised \$4,000, if the money can't come from some other source. The group will use the money for meeting, transportation of its projects. It had already received \$2,000.

The court added Zanzett Cemetery Road to the county road program.

Indictment Dismissed

An indictment in Rockcastle Circuit Court against a Somerset man has been dismissed.

Clyde Gibbons had been charged with two break-ins during 1984 in Rockcastle County and was indicted in February by the Rockcastle Grand Jury.

However, a source close to the case said that false information had been supplied to the Grand Jury concerning the case and that all charges have been dismissed.

Local man murdered near Brodhead home

A Rockcastle County man has apparently been murdered.

Rockcastle County Coroner Billy Dowell said Wednesday that Virgil Lee, 73, of Brodhead, was found dead near his home Monday afternoon, and he is ruling the death a homicide.

Dowell said that an autopsy in Louisville Tuesday revealed that Lee had been struck in the head with a blunt object and that he had been dead since approximately last Saturday.

The local coroner said that Lee, who lived alone just east of Brodhead near Rose's One Stop

Market, was found lying about twenty feet from his residence by Brodhead resident Gint Brock.

Dowell said Brock apparently went to check on Lee because no one had seen him since Saturday.

Kentucky State Police Detective Ernie Boggs has been assigned to the case and said Wednesday that robbery was the apparent motive for the murder.

Boggs said no arrests have been made in the case. Lee's body is at the Dowell & Martin Funeral Home where arrangements are incomplete.

Teachers, Take Note...

Dear Editor:

A recent bulletin from the Kentucky Teachers' Retirement System was a real revelation to many teachers and former teachers. Some teachers may have overlooked this information, so I am hoping you will repeat it for those who missed it, and to encourage teachers and former teachers to protest this legislation to their legislator. The information follows.

The 1984 General Assembly approved two measures that led to the transfer of moneys from the Teachers' Retirement System and 46 other state agencies to the State's General Fund. A new statute, KRS 48.315, was created that allows the General Assembly to provide in a budget bill for the transfer of agency funds. This statute also suspends during the period of a budget bill any existing laws that may prohibit such transfers of moneys. In short, the statutes that protect the KTRS funds were suspended during 1984-86 and the budget bill for these two years was amended to transfer \$285,500, each year, from KTRS to the General Fund.

On June 6, 1984, the Attorney General filed a lawsuit requesting that the courts set aside certain legislative actions that permitted the fund transfers. On January 18, 1985, the Franklin Circuit Court ruled that the fund transfers were valid. KTRS is advised that the Attorney General plans to appeal the lower court's ruling to the Kentucky Supreme Court. The legal process will probably take several more months to complete and the courts will be requested to delay any fund transfers until a final ruling is obtained. The KTRS Board of Trustees has endorsed the Attorney General's actions as they relate to KTRS funds. If the Attorney General's suit is not successful, the KTRS Board has indicated that it will take whatever legal steps are necessary to protect the funds of the System.

The KTRS is also concentrating its efforts on getting KRS

48.315 amended in 1986 to remove the General Assembly's authority to transfer funds of the System. On January 3, 1985, Senator Nelson R. Allen of Greenup County prefilled a bill, BR 58, that would repeal the section of the 1984 law that permits the transfer of KTRS funds. While this proposal cannot be voted on until the General Assembly convenes in 1986, it is encouraging to have an influential member of the Legislature to step forward with a positive effort to protect the trust funds of the KTRS members. KTRS members should encourage their legislative representatives to support BR 58.

I believe this endangers the retirement fund and that the legislation should be repealed.



CONVICTION RATE?

Here's the Rest of the Story

My opponent says he has records that show a 77.66% conviction rate in District Court. Even if true (I've asked but he won't show me the records) this is **very misleading**.

The vast majority of cases in District Court involve people charged with speeding, public intoxication, etc. These people plead guilty and pay a fine. (The County Attorney is never involved in these cases). The conviction rate that truly reflects what has happened in District Court is the number of convictions in cases when people plead not guilty. What has happened in these cases?

The Rockcastle County District Court records show that since August 29, 1984, not one person, who has pled not guilty and asked for a jury trial, has been convicted in District Court, even though 112 cases have been assigned for trial. Here is what has happened in court:

- On October 23, 1984, a case was tried, and the defendant was found not guilty.
- On February 28, 1985, a drunk driving trial was started, but the jury was dismissed because of MISCONDUCT OF THE COUNTY ATTORNEY.

SINCE AUGUST 29, 1984, THE TRUE CONVICTION RATE IS ZERO.

When cases are continued time and time again, witnesses get tired of coming to court and the cases get so old the judge dismisses them. There cannot be effective law enforcement unless these cases are prosecuted. I will do that.

Retirement project gets underway at Bobtown

A living center for the elderly and the handicapped is underway near Bobtown. Last Friday, New Hope bought 74 acres from Mr. and Mrs. Harold Berger.

A living center for the elderly

and the handicapped will be constructed on the site, according to Jim Wyker of Berea, founder of New Hope. The plan for living quarters, includes a community hall (to be built later) to which

some eight clusters of neighborhoods will be attached. These neighborhoods are to have five living units, or apartments, on each side of the hallway, all on one floor.

The design calls for two bedroom, one bedroom, and efficiency units. Some clusters will be on the level of the hall so that wheelchairs can operate without inclines or steps. A temporary hall will provide space for mealtime gatherings, a home health center with a skilled nurse, an office, and child care for children of workers.

Wyker said that construction, health, and food costs will probably be low since these services are built into the operation of New Hope. In general, workers on four crews provide labor instead of funds and seniors provide money in lieu of work.

When washing curtains, hang within a room from left to right. The first one gets one stitch with colored thread; the second gets two stitches, etc.

If you're washing curtains of different fabric lengths, they can be threaded properly. Or use small safety pins.

If you're rehanging curtains on a rod with a missing snag proof cap, just substitute a rubber finger cut from a worn out rubber glove. There's less danger of snagging fabrics if both curtain panels are placed on the outside section of the rod first. Then extend and hang the rod and slide one panel over the inner section.

Drapery hooks will be easier to insert into the heading if you use the diaper pin trick. Simply stick the sharp point into a bar of soap and then they'll stick smoothly through the heading.

If you have tie-back curtains and your window wears a shade, just raise the shade to the desired level and use it as a guide for placing tieback hooks.

CARE OF CURTAINS AND DRAPERIES

Whether you're installing new curtains and draperies or simply cleaning your present ones, here are some home care advice to make your job quick and easy.

Often, ready made curtains and draperies come folded. When they're hung, it takes awhile for the creases to hang out. If the fabric is made of cotton or if the instructions say "drip dry," you should try misting with water from a spray bottle.

When the curtains dry, the folds will disappear. Don't mist drapery headings, however, since the stiffening may relax as well and destroy the pleats.

To fresh dusty curtain panels which are also labeled washable but don't really need washing, place them in the dryer. Add a damp towel and a sheet of fabric softener and run the dryer for a short time. This technique works best for curtains because pinch pleats may soften.

Before removing drapery hooks for cleaning, mark the hook location on the back of the heading with a small spot of nail polish. It also helps to mark panels as they

Fishing Report

At most of Kentucky's major lakes, bass are going on the nest to spawn, and statewide fishing was generally good during the May 4-5 period covered by this report. The lake-by-lake rundown, as reported by conservation officers or creel clerks at each lake, is as follows:

KENTUCKY: Creel clerk Don Fortenberry reported moderate to heavy fishing activity for crappie on minnows and jigs at 10-13 feet, and light to moderate fishing activity for bass, with anglers casting plastic worms in 1-4 feet of water over grassy and brushy areas. The lake was clear to muddy, stable, one foot below summer pool and 68 degrees.

BARLEY: Moderate fishing activity was reported by creel clerk Norman Brantley with crappie being taken on minnows in 7-14 feet of water. Bass were being caught in embayment headwaters on spinnerbaits, and catfish over rip-rap along bridges and marina breakwaters. The lake was clear and stable at summer pool, and 72 degrees.

BARREN: Officer Donald Depp reported moderate fishing activity with bass being caught early and late on surface lures and plastic worms off points. Crappie were being caught in 12-20 feet of water by drifting minnows. Crappie and catfish were being caught in the tailwaters. The lake was clear, rising, 13 feet below summer pool and 68 degrees.

NOLIN: Officer Sammie Renfro reported heavy fishing activity with crappie being taken on minnows and jigs over stickups in 10-12 feet of water. Bass were being caught by casting crankbaits over points and stickups. Tail-water activity was heavy for trout. The lake was clear, rising, eight feet below summer pool, and 75 degrees.

ROUGH RIVER: Officer Harold Belt reported moderate fishing activity for bluegill on worms and crickets. Bass were being caught on surface lures along all types of banks and points. The water was clear to murky, nine feet below summer pool, rising and 70 degrees.

TAYLORSVILLE: Officer Joe Bland reported moderate fishing activity with bass being caught on black jigs and spinnerbaits in 2-5 feet of water around stickups. Bluegill were being caught by still fishing worms and crickets, and in the tailwaters, activity was heavy with anglers catching bluegill and crappie. The lake was clear to murky, stable at summer pool and 71 degrees.

HERRINGTON: Heavy fishing activity was reported by officer Charles Gooch and creel clerk Bill Pinkston. Bass were being caught by casting crankbaits and worms early and late, and at night over medium depth banks and points. Crappie, white bass, and a few limits of hybrid rockfish/white bass were being caught on minnows and jigs. The lake was clear, stable, four feet below summer pool and 67 degrees.

GREEN RIVER: Officer Buddy Loy reported moderate to heavy fishing activity with crappie being caught over stickups in 10-20 feet of water on minnows. Bass were being taken on plastic worms over points and dropoffs. Crappie and bluegill were being caught in the tailwaters. The lake was murky to clear, stable, three feet below summer pool and 73 degrees.

CUMBERLAND: Light to heavy fishing activity was reported by officers Randy Wilson and Fred York. White bass were taken at night along rockwalls and points in 20-30 feet of water. Walleye were being taken on nightcrawler/spinner combinations over flooded willows and mud banks. Black bass were being caught by casting surface lures along shoreline cover in embayments. Moderate activity was reported for trout in the tailwaters. The lake was extremely clear (20 feet visibility), stable, seven feet below summer pool and 68 degrees.

DALE HOLLOW: Officer Marvin Edwards reported moderate fishing activity. Bass were being taken by casting topwater lures and drift fishing large minnows off medium sloping banks. Bluegill were being taken on crickets and worms over submerged cover and off steep rock walls. The lake was clear,

stable, three feet below summer pool and 70 degrees.

LAUREL: Light fishing activity was reported by officer Bob Delph. Bluegill were being caught on worms and crickets over stickups. The lake was clear, stable, one foot below summer pool and 69 degrees.

CAVE RUN: Officer Mike Gilliam reported moderate to heavy fishing activity. Bass were being caught casting crankbaits over heavy cover, in timbered embayments, muskies were being taken by casting jerk baits. In the tailwater, fishing activity for crappie was moderate. The lake was clear to murky, rising, one foot below summer pool and 64 degrees.

BUCKHORN: Moderate fishing activity was reported by officer Billy Joe Napier. Bass were being taken in shallow water on plastic worms, and catfish on night crawlers off mud banks. Some crappie, bluegill and muskies were being caught in the tailwaters. The lake was clear to murky, at summer pool, stable, and 68 degrees.

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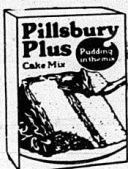

In 1984 showing the city spent \$226 for painting; \$345 for roof repairs; \$192.83 for supplies and apartment upkeep; \$1,901.02 for coal; \$11.43 for personalized documents for accounts; and \$429.45 for water and sewer bill payments, for a total of \$3,105.73.

The council agreed it lost money, but put a final decision on the apartment "oh hold" for further discussion.

The council then voted to advertise for bids on remodeling the first floor of the city hall to house the fire truck and instructed city Attorney Jerry Cox to draw up the necessary legal documents to bid the project, estimated earlier at about \$7,500.

Two local contractors, J. C. Newland and Lawson Whitt, came to the meeting with cost estimates for the remodeling, but councilman D. A. Robbins insisted the council bid the project, questioning the legality of awarding the job to a contractor. The city attorney agreed.

The council also put on hold a request by a London garbage disposal firm (D & D Disposal) that it be allowed to make a weekly house to house collection of garbage in Brodhead.

The firm's representative told the council garbage pickup would cost \$6 a month for each house, but on questioning, the representative reported he had made a survey and only about three out of 50 questioned appeared to be interested. He said the \$6 could possibly be added to the monthly water bill.

Garbage in Brodhead is now taken to a central truck where it is collected by Clarence (Libb) Hasty who has a contract with the county to collect garbage. He does not charge.

The suggestion sounded much easier than it turned out to be. Attorney Cox told the council he believed the city would have to issue a franchise for collection and advertise for bids. Secondly, an ordinance would have to be drawn to allow the garbage cost to be added to water bills, and a public hearing would have to be held concerning the ordinance.

The council was also reminded the county garbage disposal question is expected to be re-evaluated before the end of the year by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court which is under orders from the Kentucky Legislature to come up with a garbage disposal plan by Dec. 31 or possibly face a \$1,000-a-day fine. The plan that will finally be approved by the county and state might include garbage disposal for Brodhead.

"Anyway," as one councilman put it, "nobody will pay for garbage as long as that county truck sets here in the city."

Mayor Ronnie Cash told the representative from London the council would discuss his request further and contact him in a few days.

It is our practice, as it has been for years, to make loans for any worthwhile purpose. The criteria for farm loans is no different than it is for any loan.

So, while others may be hesitant to make farm loans, we'll continue to make funds available for our farm customers whenever it is possible for us to do so.

I have been asked by several citizens how I am going to handle and respond to the calls that come into the Sheriff's office and here is my answer to them.

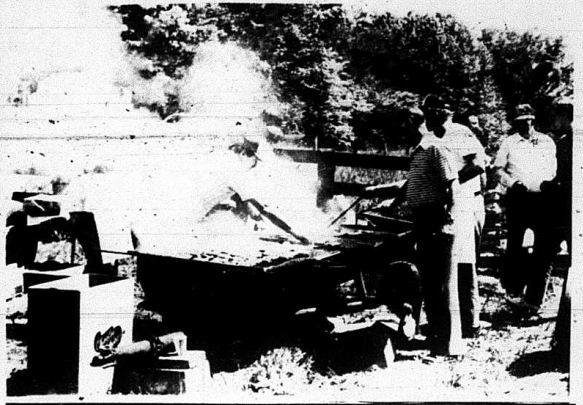

Report from Washington

Congressman Hal Rogers

We are making important progress in our goal of developing a better life for all our rural Americans, including those here in the Fifth District. During the past two weeks, I have been pleased to be associated with two new projects which will mean a brighter future for thousands of Kentuckians, and symbolize what can be done when people put their minds to it.

The first project is a new Kentucky Mountain Farmer Cooperative, which has been set up in 8 eastern counties and is based in Lee County. This program has already enlisted hundreds of farmers to begin a vegetable co-op, which for its first year will market cucumbers and peppers through a Georgia company.

This program will use some state seed money, added to contributions of time or money from local businesses, farmers and others to create the co-op. Each farmer in the 8 county area has pledged \$100 per acre to help start the project, which hopes to expand next year with additional crops and more farmer participation.

For people living in these 8 counties (Lee, Owsley, Jackson, Estill, Leslie, Breathitt, Wolfe and Powell), this farmer-coop has excellent potential for supplementing the tobacco income those farmers already have. This diversification project is similar to one I am also working on with the University of Kentucky and the U.S. Department of Agriculture, which would look at even larger agriculture diversity programs. We need to increase our farmers' incomes, and ag diversity is an excellent way to do just that.

The other groundbreaking which holds great promise was held in Wayne County, where a \$2.5 million development of a statewide 4-H Leadership Center will be built.


All of us in the Fifth District know the value of the 4-H program in guiding and molding our youth. This facility will assist that effort greatly, through training programs for new adult and teen volunteer leaders. By increasing the number of volunteers for the 4-H program, we will hopefully see even more than the 227,000 Kentucky youngsters already involved in 4-H being able to participate.

This new Leadership Center, to be built at the site of the 4-H camp near Jabez, will include a conference center, dining facilities, and eventually two dormitories. Literally thousands of Kentuckians from all around the state will be coming to this Center for leadership training, where they will learn how to communicate important rural values, like citizenship, hard work and a love of farming.

Both the Kentucky Mountain Farmer Co-op and the 4-H Center have one thing in common: a desire to improve the lives of the people of the Fifth District and Kentucky as a whole.

As your congressman, my responsibility includes assisting our local communities in developing these kinds of projects, and in looking for funding where possible to make them happen. I am committed to the economic development of the Fifth District, and pledge to continue to work on similar projects where we can make a real impact in the lives of thousands of our neighbors.

BANGS VACCINATION NO LONGER OPTIONAL

As of July 1 of this year all cattle in Kentucky must be vaccinated against brucellosis, or Bangs disease. Cost of the vaccination will be paid by the state if done on the farm.

The administrative regulation, recently adopted by the Kentucky Department of Agriculture states that as of July 1, 1985 all female bovine animals between four and

10 months of age which enter the Commonwealth of Kentucky for feeding or breeding purposes must be vaccinated.

Animals going to a state or federally approved market or directly to slaughter or spayed animals clearly marked with a "spayed" brand are exempt. Animals moved for exhibition purposes only are also exempt since they are already covered under existing regulations.

Further, the regulation states, all cows born after July 1,

1985 and between the ages of four and 10 months at time of sale must be vaccinated before they can return to a farm-in Kentucky, regardless of whether that sale takes place at a livestock market or by private treaty.

Procedures for vaccination under this regulation will be similar to existing procedures. Eligible animals must be vaccinated between four and 10 months of age and identified by a vaccination tattoo in the ear and an official vaccination ear tag. The

registration tattoo in registered animals will take the place of the ear tag. Vaccinations must be done by licensed, accredited veterinarians, or Department of Agriculture technicians and vaccinations must be reported to the State Department of Agriculture.

There are a number of good reasons for reducing the rate of brucellosis in Kentucky. The sim-

ple fact that it can be transmitted to humans should be reason enough, but the fact that some surrounding states require that entering cattle be vaccinated may be what prompts some producers to get their calves vaccinated. Kentucky ships about 50,000 heifer calves to Illinois each year. Producers should act now to

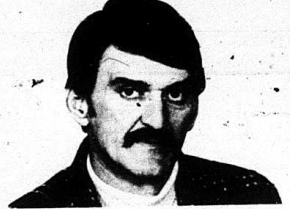

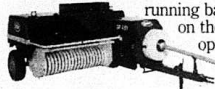

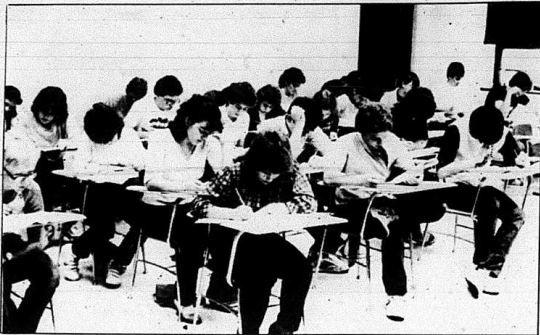

If producers wait until the animals are marketed, they or the buyer will have to pay for the vaccination. Also, if the cattle are over-age for vaccination, that means they could not be sold except to slaughter or to a state that doesn't require vaccination.

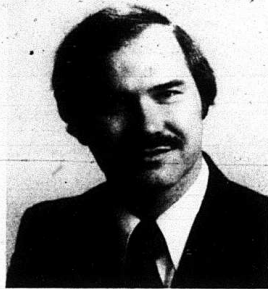

Voting locations announced for May's Primary election

Voting locations for the May 28 primary election have been announced by Deputy County Clerk David Bales.

Bales also discussed the mechanical voting machines saying they were designed by humans with "the fullest degree of integrity and accuracy, and designed with protection against all attempts to corrupt."

Voting districts, voting precincts and voting places are as follows:

District 1-North Mt. Vernon is in the city hall; North Brodhead, in old city jail.

District 2-West Livingston, adjacent to George Pridemore's Grocery; West Mt. Vernon, first floor of the courthouse; South Mt. Vernon, second floor of courthouse.

District 3-Bullock, building behind Blue Springs Church; Brown, building behind 'Bales Grocery on KY 70; West Brodhead at Brodhead Senior Citizens Building at the fairgrounds.

District 4-Conway, next to Ellis Kidwell Service Station; Roundstone, office of Northern Rockcastle Water District on U.S.

District 5-Oriando, basement of Curtis Vanzant Grocery; East Mt. Vernon, building in parking lot between Production Credit Association and Cox Hardware; East Livingston in Livingston Fire Department.

Polls open at 6 a.m. and close at 6 p.m.

In discussing the voting machines, Bales said "for many years now the voters and even politicians have had and do have many suspicions about the mechanical equipment. It was suspected before the use of the mechanical monsters, the election was won or lost at the counting room, not at the polls. Now, perhaps, many believe the election is won or lost by the mechanical deviations of the machine. The mechanical machine was designed somewhat like the old Linotype machine. No one, other than the person who used it day by day, really understood how it worked. It just worked. It simply meant if you hit an "A," you always got an "A." So soon everyone realized that if a word was misspelled and an "O"

appeared, everyone knew it was human error, not mechanical." He reported some of the questions that still arise: (1) You can tell how someone voted? (2) You can fix the machine so when you vote for Joe, John can receive the vote? (3) The people setting the machine can set it to produce any results they want? These seem to be the most

common suspicions. Let's attempt to supply answers to these questions.

"The only way you can tell how someone voted is if everyone voted the same way," Bales continued. "If in a General Election only two people voted, and they voted differently, you definitely cannot tell how and who

voted for what without asking the voters. Remember, all candidates and questions have their own counters. When you vote for any candidate, just the candidate's counter increases. The public counter on the front only shows how many people come in the machine. It is not connected to any candidate's counter."

The machine also has a protective counter on the side which is never reset. It also keeps

up with how many people enter the machine, not how they vote, because it is not connected to any candidate's counter either.

"Now, by signing your name, some people believe that at that time the Election Officers can tell how you vote," Bales said. "Remember, your signature, by law, only identifies you as a legal voter and the Party you represent."

Wrong. At least it isn't so for University of Kentucky assistant Jerry Eisaman.

"We're allowed to recruit, get out and see some kids during the month of May," Eisaman said last week. "So we'll be spending some time on the road. Then in June we usually begin breaking down some film on future opponents."

Eisaman is in his 20th season in coaching.

"I still love it," he said.

UK basketball

According to a UK official last week coach Eddie Sutton has "said no but one or two speaking engagement" requests this summer, because he's moving his family, has two weeks of (basketball) camps scheduled as well as several clinics.

The official added, "I told coach Sutton it (a speaking engagement) would only take about five minutes and then he could open it up for questions, but he didn't want to do that way."

Comment: I think Sutton is

making a mistake, missing an opportunity to firm up support for his basketball program, by getting out in the state to meet members of his constituency, diehard UK fans. After all, hotshots don't last forever and considering how much money Sutton is making, he has an obligation to Kentucky fans it seems to me.

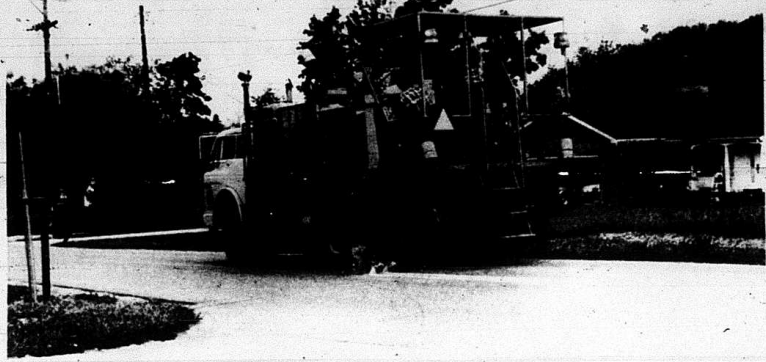
UK player banned

UK players will be apparently available during the summer months however. According to sports information director Brad Davis, who between April and mid-March arranged 53 engagements, graduated Bret Bearup and Troy McKinley are available for speaking functions.

Time for a change?

An important change I would like to see at the University of Kentucky—"promote" current director of athletics Cliff Hagan to vice president of something or other and hire Joe B. Hall to head the athletics department.

UK football and basketball are apparently making lots of money for the school, but like it or not, Kentucky has an image problem in its athletics department which I believe is affecting Kentucky's ability to recruit, particularly in the state where UK should be strongest, and especially in its foremost basketball hotbed, Jefferson County.

It seems from here as if prep coaches in Jefferson County feel towards UK much the way the state's prep football coaches came to view Fran Curci, with contempt because of what they perceived as a lack of genuine interest.

In recent years UK has gone well beyond Commonwealth borders to do its recruiting:

Result? Except for Winston Bennett, UK has been virtually shut out in the state's largest metro area.

Most recent examples: Two seasons ago Louisville signed Herbert Crook and UK got Todd Ziegler. Last season Crook

was named to the All-Metro freshmen team. Ziegler—despite salutatory praise from Hall in preseason—averaged less than 30 seconds playing time at UK.

Last season the city's best, Tony Kimbro and Keith Williams of Seneca, were wrapped up for Louisville early.

Next year, by most accounts 7-0 Felton Spencer of Eastern High is locked up for U of L.

Meanwhile UK officials, led by Hagan, continue to "play games" with Louisville, refusing, for example to reschedule next season's UK-U of L game at Rupp Arena (Nov. 30) until a more suitable date in December so that Louisville can participate in the Great Lakes Shootout.

It is common practice for a school to make such a change to accommodate another. "If it was any other school, Kentucky would-

n't have any problem with making the change." Denny Crum has said.

It is outright arrogance and the University of Kentucky could benefit from a change in its athletic administration, a new face.

'Homer' referees?

A basketball fan from Greensburg wrote last week with this: "Someone did a study (recently) which showed that the home team in the Southeastern Conference" shoots 45 percent more free throws (than the visiting team) if that's true it is a shame for such talent to be subjected to that kind of abuse.

"I have noticed for a long

time that the home team appears to get the breaks (calls) more often."

I was not able to get hold of home floor foul shooting statistics, however a review of SEC team schedules reveals that home teams won 111 of 145 home court games last season, 76.5 percent, led by Alabama 13:1 at home, Georgia 12:1 and LSU 13:2.

Footnote: Incidentally, SEC teams compiled an 81.31 record against nonconference opponents last season, 72.3 percent. Georgia posted the two most notable nonleague victories—a 75-68 over time victory over national champion Villanova, and 70-69 win over ACC champion Georgia Tech.

At least three residents taken by "asphalt scam"

Residents of Rockcastle County are warned about an asphalt and painting fraud that has cost at least three residents several hundred dollars.

County Attorney James H. Lambert reported there have been at least three occurrences of the consumer fraud in the past several days.

According to Lambert, two persons have been defrauded by being overcharged for blacktop placed in their driveways. One paid \$3,800 to the contractor.

When collecting the money for the job the men are said to

gather around the person in an intimidating manner. They do not threaten, but the threat is implied, Lambert stated.

He explained that usually two or more men go to residences and tell the property owners they have some blacktop left from a previous job and need to install it before it ruins. They tell the person they cannot give a price until they see how much they will use. When the bill is submitted, it is excessive.

The other scam involves the painting of a barn, Lambert related. Using the same approach, this time with left-over paint, they

actually use a mixture of paint and diesel fuel for the job, or white-wash. Again, the bill is excessive.

Police believe the group is operating out of a central Kentucky location, possibly Nicholasville or Lexington.

Attorney Lambert said an investigation of these fraudulent practices is now underway in Rockcastle County. He said any one who suspects that he or she is being defrauded is requested to call the County Attorney's office, 256-5127, or the Rockcastle sheriff, 256-2031.

Information may also be

reported to Kentucky State Police Detective Ernie Boggs who is investigating the scam.

The people of Rockcastle County are encouraged to be very

careful in dealing with anyone they do not know in this kind of business," Attorney Lambert stated, "or whose reputation for fair business practice is not well

known." Attorney Lambert said there is a possibility that others have been defrauded, but often times the property owner is too embarrassed to report the fraud.

State's traffic death toll exceeds previous years' total

The state's traffic death toll has exceeded the previous years' total for the first time in two years, announced State Police

Commissioner Morgan T. Elkins. The 1985 total of traffic fatalities rose to 183 deaths compared to 182 for the same

period of April, 1984. Kentucky's traffic fatalities had been in a downward trend since 1982. The 1984 fatality count set a record for the lowest count in 23 years.

No longer a need to delay giving of booster shots

The Kentucky Department for Health Services has notified local and district health departments that there is no longer any need to delay giving booster shots of the diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis or DTP vaccine.

Health Services Commissioner Carlos Hernandez, M.D., said the advice was given after the U.S. Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta withdrew the recommendation on delaying the booster doses of DTP vaccine earlier this week. "The concerns of a nationwide shortage of DTP vaccine have lessened since a second company resumed distribution of the product," Hernandez said. "We expect to receive additional doses of vaccine shortly. Therefore it is no longer necessary for physicians and local health departments to delay the booster shots."

In December 1984 the Centers for Disease Control and the state Department for Health Services advised physicians to delay the fourth and fifth shots in the five-dose DTP series because of a projected nationwide vaccine shortage. The delay recommendation only related to DTP booster shots usually given to children 18 months old and again between ages four and six.

"We did not have a vaccine

shortage in Kentucky, although such a situation might have occurred if we had continued the normal DTP booster immunizations all along," Hernandez said. "We currently have an ample supply of several thousand doses of DTP vaccine on hand. With a resupply order, expected this month, we are advising our local health departments to resume normal DTP vaccinations and to call back any children who failed to receive the fourth or fifth DTP doses since December and are still under age seven.

Approximately 165,000 children, newborn infants through age six, are immunized with DTP vaccine each year in Kentucky.

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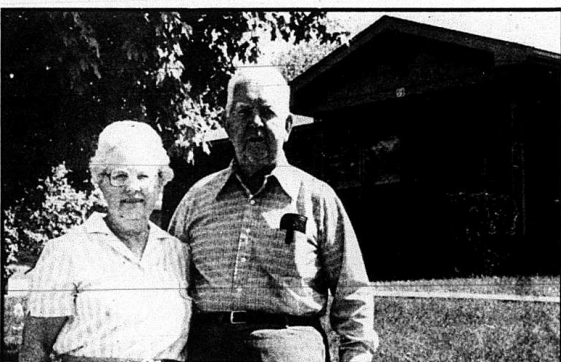

plate is issued the first time. Reissue of the plate the following year costs only one dollar. There is a one-plate limit.
To receive authorization for a hunting and fishing license, the veteran must contact the regional Veterans Administration representative requesting proof of eligibility. It must then be sent to Hugh Crump, director, Division of Law Enforcement, Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, 100601.

A card will be mailed certifying the exemption. A record is kept by the department in case of loss of the card.

Voting machine places announced

There is no way you can connect your signature to the candidate's counter when you vote. Now when I vote for Joe, can I make John the recipient of that vote? Somehow, somehow this myth was born.

Bales explained further that many of the custodians use rubber bands to direct them to the area of the machines where they are working. By leaving these rubber bands on the machines, it was and is believed this is an attempt to fix and redirect the voter's vote. The machine is built like an archery range: (1) on the left is the candidate's name; (2) behind the name is a removable metal plate inserted with the name in front of the counter, and when the machine is activated, the metal strip may not be removed without locking the machine against any further voting; (3) behind the metal plate is a three (3) digital counter—all zeros are showing in the morning when the Election

Officers open the machine—they and they alone activate the machine to allow the voting to start; (4) the candidate's lever is like an arrow—it goes completely through the machine, through the name, through the metal insert, through the counters, and out the back. It can mechanically turn only one space when the candidate's lever is activated. Attempting to mechanically change this would result in jamming both candidates' levers. If you vote for Joe, only Joe can receive credit, with/or without rubber bands.

"Setting the machine is like the Linotype. It will work only if you set it correctly. If the machine is not set and serviced correctly, it will only fail to work, but it cannot be set to change the voter's direction. It can only be damaged so as not to record the results. Even this attempt should have been discovered by the Election Officers and the County Board of Elections upon their inspection of the machine."

Protecting Our Environment

Our Resource Protection Program—Weakness By Reagan Administration?

A new book on the Reagan Administration's environmental record concludes that despite some well-publicized setbacks and high level resignations, the Administration's campaign to weaken environmental and resource protection programs is still largely intact.

"A Season of Spoils" was written by Matthew Lash, senior attorney at the Natural Resources Defense Council and a former federal prosecutor, along with Katherine Gillman and David Sheridan. The 386-page book, based on extensive research and more than 400 interviews, documents what it considers the damage the Administration has inflicted on environmental protection in America. The book tells the inside story of the rise and fall of Alne Gorusch Burford at EPA and of Interior Secretary James Watt's campaign against existing wilderness resource preservation programs.

A copy of the book was given to President Reagan on May 25, 1984

during the beginning months of 1985. According to Elkins, However, during the pleasant weather the fatality rate has been inching up. More drivers are on the road and speed-related accidents have increased.

The Kentucky State Police is asking citizens to help reduce traffic fatalities. "Police alone cannot prevent accidents and injury," said Elkins, "because the safety attitude of the individual driver is a most important factor."

Morgan stresses drivers and passengers should buckle up safety belts and place children in child safety seats. Last year 98% of fatal accident victims were not protected by safety belts and 766 people died. Of this number, 285 were either totally or partially thrown from their vehicle, killing 208 victims. Only two escaped uninjured.
