

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

Mt. Vernon proposes 1985-86 budget

A general fund budget of \$131,093 for 1985-86 was proposed at a meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night.

The proposed budget is \$17,752 less than the 1984-85 revised budget of \$148,875, or about 12 percent less.

The reduced amount reflects anticipated cuts in revenue sharing. In 1984-85 the city got \$36,514 in revenue sharing, but expects only about \$18,000 in 1985-86, if the federal government follows through on its phasing out of revenue sharing.

In the Water and Sewer Department, the 1985-86 budget anticipates income and expenses at \$351,602. The 1984-85 revised Water and Sewer Department income was \$347,537 with expenses of \$330,125, leaving the department with a surplus this year of \$17,412.

Mayor Roland Mullins said it was "a good year" for the city, and added the Water and Sewer Department is in "better shape" than any he knows about.

The major semi-personnel expenditures are to remain at the current level, with salary increases based on five percent.

He revealed cash on hand in all funds currently totals \$338,597 most of which is earmarked for specific items and not available for general expenditures.

Construction and renovation of the sewage plant is expected to begin in June, the mayor reported. (Cont. to A-6)

No arrests made in murder case

No arrests have been made following a May 4 murder in Rockcastle County.

"According to state police, Virgil Lee, 73, of Brodhead, was murdered sometime on May 4.

Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell said that an autopsy on May 7 revealed that Lee died from three blows to the head with a railroad spike.

Lee's body was found on May 6 by Coit Brock. He was last seen alive on May 3.

Police think that robbery was the motive for the murder.

Over 9,000 registered in May's Primary


A total of 9,108 persons are eligible to cast ballots in the May 28 primary election, according to statistics released Wednesday by Deputy County Clerk David Bales, compared to 8,241 at the 1984 general election.

Of the 9,108, a total of 1,862 are Democrats and 7,192 are Republicans. Fifty four persons have no party preference.

Of the total now registered, 4,459 are women and 4,649 are men.

In the 1984 general election, a total of 8,241 were registered to vote with 6,260 Republicans and 1,930 Democrats.

In the May 1981 county election, there were 8,124 registered to vote with a 66 percent turn-out at the polls.

Candidates have spent over \$42,000.00 on Primary election

In local races for county-wide offices in this May's Primary election, candidates have spent anywhere from no money at all to \$2,529.72, as of April 24, according to the campaign financial records on file in the county clerk's office.

April 24 was the date that candidates seeking county-wide office must file the first of three financial reports showing exactly how much they have spent thus far in the primary election.

The money has been spent in a variety of ways, such as newspaper advertising, radio spots, printing, campaign work, gas, etc.

Kentucky Law KRS 121.180 through 121.200 says that financial reports must be filed 32 days prior to the election, 12 days before the election, and a post election report on or 12 days after the election.

Penalties for not complying with the law include voiding the election and a fine of \$1,000 and/or one year in jail.

Any candidate running for an office other than a county-wide one does not have to account for their spending, according to County Clerk Irene Bales.

The spending reports are open for public inspection and include such things as names and addresses of campaign workers and contributors, as well as how much money has been contributed to the individual's campaign.

As of the April 24 filing deadline, candidates for county-wide office had spent a total of \$42,494.68, with the biggest spender so far being local lawyer John Clontz. Clontz has spent \$2,529.72 in his efforts to win the county attorney's seat.

His opponent, incumbent County Attorney James H. Lambert, is not far behind in the spending, dropping a total of \$1,988.99 on his campaign through April 24.

Probably the most talked about, because it is the top county seat, is the race for county judge/executive. Candidates have spent a total of \$7,925.83 on the race for this office.

The big spender in the judge's race thus far has been

Clarence Carter with \$1,759.33 in expenditures, second is Henry L. Abney who has spent \$1,272.20. Spending for the rest of the candidates for judge is as follows: Hubert Thacker, \$996.85; Joe Clark, \$964.10; Jackie Renner, \$852.85; Paul Kirby, \$690.75; Leonard Hammond, \$590; Donald Clark, \$363.50; Donald Rowe, \$390; and Floyd Miller, \$46.50.

Incumbent County Judge/Executive Bob Jasper is unopposed in the May Democratic Primary and does not have to file any spending reports until the November General Election.

In the two-man race for Property Valuation Administrator, incumbent H. E. "Elmer" Hale has been out-spent by his opponent. (Cont. to A-17)

Mayor sets guidelines for future city policemen

A final decision on a new police chief for Mt. Vernon will have to wait until a special meeting May 30, even though the council was of a mind to select a new chief at a called meeting Tuesday night.

Ronnie Hurd, present chief, resigned last month effective June 1.

Councilmen at the regular meeting Monday night called on Mayor Roland Mullins to recommend a chief, but the mayor declined, amid protests.

Under legislation passed by the Kentucky Legislature, the mayor recommends a police chief to a city council.

At the Monday meeting, the name of Police Officer Joe Howard, who has seniority on the force, was the apparent choice of the councilmen, and he was reportedly the choice again Tues-

day night during an executive session of the council.

Mayor Mullins said at the Monday meeting, the suggestion that he name a chief came as a surprise and he had not had an opportunity to discuss the matter with officer Howard. He promised the council he would have a statement at the Tuesday called meeting, after he had had an opportunity to consider the matter.

The council actually had no alternative but to agree to the delay. The law was on the mayor's side.

The department has been troubled with controversy for a considerable time. To prevent similar problems in the future, the mayor presented the council with a statement setting guidelines. It was approved on a motion by Les Harris, seconded by Richard Mullins. Jr. Voting yes. (Cont. to A-18)

Hale's contract will run until Dec. 31, 1986.

The council agreed several weeks of the season have already passed with money lost to the operator. They concluded letting a contract for a boat dock to expire on May 1 is not financially practical, so the council set future contracts to run from Jan. 1 to Dec. 31.


Hale will pay \$700 for the remainder of this year and the \$1,400 through 1986.

What About Juvenile Crime?

In addition to advising the fiscal court and prosecuting cases in District Court, the County Attorney has the responsibility of writing arrest warrants, search warrants and handling preliminary hearings in felony cases. The County Attorney's office is responsible for handling serious cases despite statements to the contrary by my opponent.

The County Attorney is the **ONLY** person with authority to prosecute juveniles in juvenile court. Many juvenile cases involve serious crimes such as stealing, storehouse breaking and receiving stolen property. Juvenile offenders present a very serious problem in Rockcastle County because many people feel nothing can be done with them. subsequently, the anticipated \$300,000 local share will be needed during the 1985-86 fiscal year.

He said anticipated cash on hand in restricted accounts can be transferred to cover that expenditure in the amount of \$150,000.

When there is construction and renovation projects, it often times calls for what governmental units and utilities like to term rate adjustments; in this case meaning sewer rates in Mt. Vernon will be raised during 1986. Just how much of a jump in rates has yet to be determined.

A breakdown of income in the general fund budget shows the following:

Property tax, \$44,900; franchise, \$29,200; parking meters, \$3,000; court revenue, \$11,500; privilege licenses, \$3,622; miscellaneous, \$1,000; municipal aid (streets), \$15,719; boat dock lease, \$1,000; revenue sharing, \$18,000; economic assistance, \$3,152.

Expenditures from the general fund will include: Police salaries, \$51,100; city

attorney, \$630; treasurer, \$525; city clerk, \$2,484; fringe benefits, \$4,609; health insurance, \$14,989; dispatcher, \$1,400; street cleaning (municipal aid), \$5,470; administrative costs, \$2,400; city police car, \$3,152; fire department, \$1,500; police operations, \$5,300; utilities, \$13,200; telephone, \$3,319; office supplies, \$643; postage, \$200; printing, \$1,322; insurance, \$7,153; city hall maintenance, \$500; street improvement (municipal aid), \$6,000; sidewalks (municipal aid), \$3,500; Rockcastle Senior Citizens organization, \$500; Cumberland River Mental Health/Mental Retardation Board, \$597; Cumberland Valley Area Development District, \$600.

In the Water and Sewer Department income sources are as follows for 1985-86:

Sewer service, \$60,180; sale of water, \$270,176; interest, \$6,000; penalties and miscellaneous, \$3,000; and water and sewer connections and deposits, \$12,246.



Treasurer, \$630; city attorney, \$1,200; clerk, \$9,040; personal fringe benefits and other, \$85,638; health insurance, \$13,453; supplies, equipment and other operating costs, \$101,546; insurance, \$2,916; utilities, \$35,655; depreciation, \$40,000 of

which about half is the new sewer plant depreciation; debt service, bonds, \$55,706; laboratory work, \$2,818; legal and audit, \$3,000.
The council set their salaries as the same as last year, \$25 a month. The mayor also stayed the same, \$50 a month.
In other action, the council will make an effort to collect past due taxes and asked City Clerk

Kaye Rader and City Attorney Carl Clontz to begin the collecting process.







A one-day consultative and diagnostic heart clinic will be held in the Madison County Health Department, Richmond, on Wednesday, June 26.





The borers, which lay their eggs in May or June, are protected from insecticides once beneath the bark. Spraying dogwood trees around Memorial Day will leave a residue on the bark which will kill borers as they hatch their eggs and try to bore into trees.

Lindane is suggested for control of the small, day-flying borers. The borers, colored black, blue with yellow bands, somewhat resemble wasps.

Early signs of borer attack are off-color foliage, wilting of terminal shoots and dieback of the crown. Infestations sites are often marked by scars or callous formation, suckering, or large areas of cracked or loose bark.

I have been asked by several citizens how I am going to handle and respond to the calls that come into the Sheriff's office and here is my answer to them.

So, when you call, we will be there for your protection until the matter is settled and you feel safe in your home or business.

I feel this is the duty of the Sheriff's Dept. and that is a part of what you pay taxes for. Of course, we will have a 24-hour-a-day Sheriff's Dept. But, it seems that most of the crimes happen at night. You may remember there is an old song entitled "Snakes Crawl at Night." Well, it is also true that thieves crawl at night. If you elect me your sheriff of Rockcastle County, your Sheriff's patrol will be working and patrolling your community at night for the protection of your safety and property with reliable, level-headed sheriffs. I won't be satisfied or quit until every citizen of this county can feel safe to go to sleep in your own home at night. My Sheriff's Patrol will catch and arrest those "THIEVES and lawbreakers that crawl at night" in Rockcastle County. Most of you know, as the lecture draws near, some opponents get desperate and try to run untrue rumors. A man told me last week that one of my opponents told him that I was pulling off and not running. Well, of course, that is just pure untrue hogwash because the Baker for Sheriff Campaign is alive and well and running hard.

problem brought a question: Should there be a landfill, have garbage hauled to another county, or some other method?

Rowe: Contract with, and haul garbage to, another county.

Thacker: Appoint a committee, choose the most economical way and go from there.

Donald Clark: A landfill can be a problem. Should be a lot of

research before a decision is made.

Carter: The present court must come up with a garbage plan by the end of the year. If not the county could be fined \$1,000 a day. He does not think the court will allow that to happen and will solve the problem before the end of the year.

Renner: He agreed with Carter. But the decision must be a safe and sound one.

Kirby: Court must come up with a plan. No landfill, if the court

can get out of it by using some other method.

Joe Clark: Garbage is going out of the county now. He favors that method. No landfill. Best method, he believes, is to get an incinerator and burn the garbage.

On the question of economic development—(industry), all the candidates were for more industry and would try to bring industry to the county. Their differences were in the way to accomplish it.

The "new taxes" question got a unanimous, resounding "NO" from the candidates.

On the question of obtaining bonds for various programs, the candidates generally agreed if it should be needed, to go through proper channels and hold proper hearings.

When asked what the county's greatest asset is, Kirby said "its people working together," and the others agreed.

One question was an "ifly" one. If more money is needed, would you be willing to cut your salary?

All agreed they would, if they could, but they can't. The judge's salary is set by the state.

Rowe got the loudest applause and laughter to the salary question when he replied: "I'll take every penny of my salary because I'll earn mine."

On a question by a member of the audience on polluting rivers, streams and roads, the candidates had a variety of ways to solve the problem, one of which was to use inmates in the jail to clean it all up.

When asked what, as judge, he'd do with law enforcement, he'd do as he'd expect. Law enforcement of the county is in the hands of the sheriff, not the county judge, exec-

utive. The county judge no longer sits on criminal cases of any sort. That is done by district and circuit judges. Most of the candidates agreed that the people should elect a sheriff that they think will get the job done.

Who won? A quick survey following the forum drew an expected response: My candidate, of course.

Clendith Thacker. Thacker has spent a total of \$367, and Hale has spent \$263.81.

In the race for the county clerk's office, the only woman on this year's ballot, Norma Houk, has out-spent both of her opponents. Houk has spent a total of \$2,135.13, while David Ables has spent \$928.32 and Paul Bane's expenditures total \$860.33.

In the race for the county's top law official, the ten candidates for sheriff have spent a total of \$3,704.20, with the big spender being LeRoy Malcombe, who has spent \$1,180. Incumbent Sheriff William F. Lador is second on the list with expenditures totaling \$631.70.

The other eight candidates and their expenses are: Ed Jackson, \$553.51; R. A. "Pill" Baker, \$223.85; Shirley Smith, \$294.09; Junior Gray, \$462.90; Clarence "Jib" Hasty, \$199; Robert Earl Newcomb, \$169; Harold Price, \$230; and Charles "Dick" Arley, \$24.

In the race which has attracted the most candidates, Earl Cummins is by far the big spender in his effort for jailer. Cummins has spent a total of \$1,841.25, and Leo Hayes is second with expenditures totaling

\$1,066. The rest of the candidates for the jailer's seat have spent about the same: Delno McClure, \$280; Roy "Schooner" Lucas, \$265.75; Carter Renner, \$33.50; Billy Kirby, \$363; Ricky Ray Kirby, \$252; Ralph Stanley Mullins, \$110; and Harlan "Buck" Farthing, \$0.

**Women Preachers--
Again No. 1**

Mr. Charles Hurst, Pastor of the Mt. Vernon Church of the Nazarene, has taken issue with my article, "Women Preachers," in the Mt. Vernon Signal, April 11. I would like to review his answer to my article. (Please read both articles.)

First, I want to thank Mr. Hurst for his compliment that I give my chapter and verse for what I teach. This is the only acceptable way to settle religious differences, for Peter said, "If any man speak, let him speak as the oracles of God" (1 Pet. 4:11).

Secondly, he falsely accuses me and my colleagues of not quoting the last part of Acts 2:38, "...and we shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." I don't recall ever having left off this part of the verse, for I believe the last part as well as the first part. Mr. Hurst is the one who does not believe ALL of Acts 2:38. He leaves off the first part, "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins." The Nazarene church does not teach that water baptism is necessary for remissions of past sins. Ieter, writing by inspiration of the Holy Spirit, says that it is further, he believes that the "gift of the Holy Ghost" of Acts 2:38 is the baptismal measure given to all Christians. While it is certainly true that the "Gift of the Holy Ghost" (involuntary-non-miraculous) is given to all who "repent and are baptized," none receive it today in its baptismal measure. The baptism of the Holy Spirit was a promise to the apostles, not to all Christians (Lk. 24:49; Acts 1:2, 4:8, 26, 2:1-4). Miracles were given during the infancy of the church until revelation was completed after which miracles ceased (1 Cor. 13:8-10; Jas. 1:25). Those baptized in the Holy Spirit could heal all manner of diseases and raise the dead. Do you know of anyone who can do this today? No! Miracles have ceased because their purposes have been served.

Mr. Hurst mentions an alleged division that took place at the Providence Church of Christ a "few years back," reported to him by three different people. I know of no such division and until I have some evidence to the contrary, I will assume that this is mere gossip. However, even had such a division occurred, what would that have to do with women preachers?

One critic chastises us for taking the Lord's supper every first day of the week (Acts 20:7). The apostles were guided by the Holy Spirit, and their example is our guide (Phil. 4:9). Luke wrote the book of Acts by inspiration and he said that "the disciples came together upon the first day of the week (Sunday) to break bread," which references the Lord's supper (1 Cor. 10:16; 11:23-26). Mr. Hurst insinuates that they did not do what they came together to do on Sunday, but took the Lord's supper on Monday. Between verses 7 and 11, Fortschell fell from a window and was killed. Paul went down and raised him from the dead, then "came up again," broke the bread and ate, then

departed verse 11 says that Paul ate a meal in preparation for a journey after being up all night doing the work of the Lord. The text shows that the disciples (including Paul, of course) took the Lord's supper on the first day of the week (Acts 20:7) and that Paul ate a common meal in preparation for his journey (Acts 20:11). This is as far as we dare go with this passage. It does authorize the time of observance of the Lord's supper—Upon the first day of the week.

I am amazed that anyone, especially a preacher, would say that the collection taken up in 1 Cor. 16:1-3 "has nothing to do with the local church," as Mr. Hurst avers. Surely he knows that this letter was written to the local church at Corinth (1 Cor. 1:2) and the Paul had also given the same order to the local churches of Galatia (1 Cor. 16:1). It was to be used for the work of the church, in this case the relieving of needy saints. Does the Nazarene church take up a collection on Sunday? If so, where is the authority to do so if you don't believe 1 Cor. 16:1-3 is given to local churches? But again I ask, what has that to do with women preachers?


Mr. Hurst further suggests that I pervert the Scriptures when I teach that the church should not use instruments of music in worship today. Have you ever stopped to think just how much the New Testament says about instrumental music in worship? From the way some religious bodies use them, one would get the idea that they are mentioned on every page, but please read every passage in the New Testament that has anything to do with music (Matt. 26:30; Acts 16:25; Rom. 15:9; 1 Cor. 14:15; Eph. 5:19; Col. 3:16; Heb. 2:12; Jas. 5:13). The conclusion is simple: the New Testament says absolutely NOTHING about instrumental music in worship. It is thus a doctrine of men that renders worship vain (Matt. 15:9). If Mr. Hurst believes that instruments of music are authorized in worship today, why didn't he just give us the scripture? I fully understand that musical instruments were used in Old Testament worship (2 Cor. 9:26-29). Under that law Israel was also commanded to keep the Sabbath, offer animal sacrifices, circumcise, and many other things not authorized under the New Testament law of Christ. Paul said that the law was nailed to the cross (Col. 2:14), and that those seeking to be justified by it had "fallen from grace" (Gal. 5:4). We are warned of Christ not to add to or take from his word (Rev. 2:18, 19; Gal. 1:8, 9).

I am assuming that Mr. Hurst is an honest and sincere person, but in these matters I believe he is wrong. When one who is honestly mistaken hears the truth, he will either stop being mistaken, or cease being honest! (More later on women preachers.)

were Ernie Tolle, Jackie Renner and Joe Martin. Councilman Pete Hurd, former of Police Chief Ronnie Hurd, did not attend the meeting.

The mayor's statement is as follows:

"I am interested in serving the citizens to the best of my ability, my training and acting from 20 plus years of administrative experience. I make the following statements/recommendations:

- (1) hiring any current officer as police chief without substantial discussion is saying that we accept business as usual;
- (2) this is the first opportunity since becoming mayor that I have had to impact the police department in light of the current legislation which requires the mayor to recommend the chief;
- (3) politics are coloring the current selection process as demonstrated by the council alignment without mayoral discussion to name the chief.

(4) criticism leveled at the police department, council and mayor during the rash of break-ins a few months ago has been addressed by re-scheduling only and has not been dealt with through policy and procedure.

(5) the police department has been fraught with nepotism during the past few years, making meaningful supervision impossible. Examples include: (a) father council member with son chief; (b) brother-in-law council member with two brothers-in-law officers.

The current council recommendation allows for the continuation of nepotism; therefore, I suggest that:

- (1) the chief be named at the May 30, 1985 meeting;
- (2) that each councilman submit a listing of three citizens from which the mayor will choose five to serve as an advisory commission to develop evaluation standards for the department.

This advisory commission will work with the Kentucky State Police, Eastern Kentucky University Law Enforcement School, and surrounding communities. Their report will be presented to the mayor and council on July 1, 1985. (a) this review and report will give light to departmental problems outside the realm of politics and/or nepotism; (b) objective criteria will be available as a result of the report on which to judge performance.

- (3) based on the acting commission's report, and should the entire council be settled on one officer, I will recommend that officer.
- (4) the evaluation criteria developed by the acting commission will become part of departmental policy, after recommendation and council adoption.
- (5) an ordinance will be drawn in June 1985 prohibiting any councilman from serving after 1985 who has relatives employed by the City—extending to blood relatives and in-laws

at the first cousin level." Signed, Roland Mullins, mayor, Mt. Vernon.

The council will meet in another called session to choose the chief at 7 p.m. May 30. The public is invited to attend. Hired as a part time policeman to patrol Lake Linville during the summer, and for various other duties, was Wayne Denny, a former policeman at Brodhead, Livingston and a former dispatcher at the Rockcastle County Jail.

Denny, 40, is the father of three children and has also worked in construction and farmed.







In return, students at MVES provide clerical help in stamping coupons for Druther's.



Letters and things....

Fans from around the state write from time to time. This week, a sampling.

Tammy Jagers writes from Sweden, Ky., in Edmonson County...to say she believes with Eddie Sutton coaching Kenny Walker, Kentucky will be a top contender for another NCAA championship next season. "Since UK signed only one player (Irving Thomas) will those scholarships go to next year?"

Answer: Yes. The NCAA allows a college team 15 players on basketball scholarship for any one season. Bret Bearup and Troy McKinley graduated from last season's 13-man roster and those graduating next season will be Roger Harden, LeRoy Byrd and Kenny Walker. Having signed only Thomas, UK will have six openings, barring transfers. But, according to UK sports information director Brad Davis, "I don't know if coach Sutton will use them all or not."

Comment: According to prep talent scout Dave Bones, two of those high on UK's shopping rank among America's top 10 seniors-to-be: Terry Mills, a 6-10 center from Romulus, Mich. ranks No. 2 (behind only a player from Virginia Beach), and 6-4 Rex Chapman of Owensboro is No. 10.

Question: Is coach Sutton

going to raffle off tickets [to UK games]?

Answer: Yes, during his weekly radio show.

Comment: That ought to hype its audience ratings. Ralph Paxton writes from Central City in Muhlenberg County...to say he believes Kentucky's new head coach will be an improvement in three respects: "No. 1. Bench coaching. Joe B.'s actions unfortunately speak for themselves. No. 2. Motivating. Kentucky needs to be ready to play even when it is heavily favored: Maybe Sutton will even break the Knoxville jinx. No. 3. Personality. Sutton seems to be a pretty colorful man. Joe B. tried, but it just didn't come natural for him. Maybe a perm would have loosened Joe B. up some."

Paxton added: "As for a vote of confidence, Sutton would surely like to know that I have yet to run into anybody who is unhappy about [UK] hiring him."

And Paxton had a question about the UK St. John's game in the NCAA West Regional: "Did Chris Mullin ever comment as to why he got upset and got (himself) a technical against the Cats?"

Answer: Not to my knowledge. However, it looked to me as if, at that point in the game, Mullin was frustrated (and angry)

with Winston Bennett's style of defense.

Tom Marshall writes from Mt. Sterling in Montgomery County...to say, "I was overjoyed when UK kept Leonard Hamilton, a first class act," and to add, "I feel Sutton will help James Blakmon... Sutton is known as the troublemaker's coach. Blakmon just had a few troubles but work out. I wonder what changes will be made in playing time. I hope to see (Cedric) Jenkins play more. He has a lot of potential."

Marshall says he is glad Chip Rupp chose not to sign with the University of Kentucky because "it would have caused him a lot of trouble."

Comment: Rupp signed with Vandy. A good choice, Chip getting an opportunity to work with C. M. Newton who played for Uncle Adolph. Marshall continues: "Ed Davender has as much potential as (Notre Dame's) David Rivers. Good height, good jumping ability and an abundance of quickness. And he's a good ball handler and good shooter."

"Can you tell me how I can get in touch with coach Sutton?" Answer: Write to coach Sutton at his office in Memorial Coliseum, University of Kentucky in Lexington.

A fan from Williamsburg, in Whitley County, a lady who asked that her name not be used, wrote to take issue with my view that Tulane University did the right thing in cancelling its basketball program. To make her point, the lady quoted (quads!) Joe Dean who reasoned that Tulane made a mistake dropping basketball, "that's like saying the dog's got fleas so we'll kill the dog to get rid

of the fleas."

Comment: From the seriousness and number of NCAA rules violations, Tulane's basketball program would have been faced with long term probation by the NCAA in any case. However, I believe TU president Eamon Kelly showed some vision and sent a message: Sports at the college level, its cheaters and money changers are eclipsing the intent of the college experience. We've had enough! We're not going to take it anymore!

Verna Jean Mikat of Elizabethton in Hardin County wrote to complain that I write "too much" about the University of Kentucky and suggests I stop raving about "how perfect Joe B. Hall is and how wonderful Rupp Arena is".

Some questions I've not been asked, but will answer anyway....

1. Who is the college team to watch next season?

Answer: Two of them. North Carolina State and Louisville.

2. Who are the (freshmen-to-be) "players to watch" next season?

Answers: Walker Lambiotte, 6-7 NC State is a dandy. Others: 6-7 Roy Marble of Iowa, Kevin Walls of Louisville, Jeff Lobo of North Carolina and yes, Irving Thomas at Kentucky.

Thank you (all) for writing. I encourage everyone to drop me a line with points of view and/or questions.

Sutton remarks

In a press release from UK's basketball office received last week, coach Eddie Sutton addressed a number of topics UK fans will find interesting. Following are excerpts from a few of them.

On playing Louisville: "That game should be played. I have great respect for Denny (Crum). It's a healthy situation with mutual respect. You get beat by Louisville, you get beat. I have no problems playing Louisville. If we play in the next 20 years it would be pretty even."

Pressure: "Anyone who sits on the bench in Rupp Arena

doesn't have an easy task. People keep telling me Kentucky is different, but I find that hard to believe. I've had pressure during my career, and I intend to coach the same way I have for the last 27 years."

Academics: "Ninety-two percent of my players at Arkansas graduated. Not all will play in the NBA. It's very important to me that they leave with degrees and a strong sense of values."

Illegal recruiting: "You could cut out 90 percent of the nickel-and-dime cheating by allowing (players) to have \$50 or \$100 a month. Maybe give them a couple of plane tickets to go home at Christmas, go home in the spring."

Home court advantage: (Sutton told a story of a visit to Madrid, Spain, where he and a rival coach saw a bullfight.) "You've got to know the bull has no chance in those things. The guy I was with said, 'That bull has a better chance than I do in Barnhill Arena (Arkansas' home court). You can do a psych job on coaches. I hope they feel that way here.'"

His new job's high visibility: "I'll probably feel like a state park. Everybody will want a piece of me. When I lose, I'll feel I let everyone down."

On officiating: (During an NCAA tourney first round game in Salt Lake City this spring Sutton became so miffed with the officials he left the bench and went back to sit with Brigham Young.) "Ladell Anderson who was evaluating the referees." "I said, 'Ladell, this isn't right. We're getting some phantom calls.' He was kinda like a father. He patted me on the hand and said, 'I know. It's horrible.' I just went back there to be with him a few minutes and then went back to the bench. You never know. I just may end up on the front row at Rupp some night. But I won't throw any chairs."

When second team All-State basketballer Lianne Basket signed with Middle Tennessee State last week, she became the first female athlete in Fort Knox High School history to sign an athletic scholarship. But Beck could have made it on her own. She has a 4.0 grade

point average.

Kentucky sports lost a good friend last week when Joe Knight passed away. Knight was a sports personality at WAVE-TV in Louisville. He was 59 and is survived by his wife Norma and three daughters.

Lexington Bryan Station may be on the way back to basketball prominence. "We're just a guard away from having a club that can

compete with anybody." Defendant Ed Allin said last week.

What about the much touted son of Kentucky coach Eddie Sutton. 16-year-old Sean who has been labeled a can't miss college prospect at guard?

"We won't get him at Bryan Station," Allin chuckled. "He'll wind up on the south side of town, probably Tates Creek."

to and by it. The graves are within fifty feet of the road. Anyone living in the neighborhood of the old Scaffold Cane school can tell her how to get there. I thank you, Sarah, for your kind words about my father, O. M. Payne, of Clear Creek, who has passed on.

From Richmond, Ind. I hear from Eli Chasteen's kinfolk, Nelson and Vergie Chasteen, who say

they have been reading the Signal for over two years and keep up with the family folk. So you know, Vergie, when they have young chickens in the pen to eat, or bring a piece of "side meat" out of the smokehouse to get some gravy for new onions and lettuce that I'll let you know in here. You and Nelson should see the hills of Rockcastle now, all green with new life.

I must tell the Chasteens and Hayse Morris of Oklahoma who write me for plumbgunny seeds that my offer was good for a stamped, self-addressed envelope to be sent me to mail you the seeds. Being a poor woman, I can't afford to mail them without a stamp—no charge for the seeds, just get them growing in the country for their many uses.

Hayse Morris says his first seeds that I sent him did not come up after a daughter planted them in her green house. That could be the trouble. These good, old fashioned plants are not used to new-fangled, modern ways of being under glass. Just put them in good soil out-under the sun and let God take hold. Hayse. So send me the stamped envelope and I'll rush you some more. I make the same offer to others.

From far-away Nampa, Idaho, I hear from Lottie and Edd Sarafin, who tell me there are quite a few Kentuckians out in those parts but they haven't forgotten this state. Lottie asks for plumbgunny seed saying she had never heard of them. So she asked some of the other folks out there from Kentucky what they were and was told plumbgunny was a jam made out of plums! Hurry and get started, Lottie, so those things will come out on the vine and show what they can do.

Lottie asks of folks here on the Flat Gap Road, where she once lived, that she would like to have the box number of Willie and Flossie Cane on Route 3 in order to contact the Canes since there are two Mill Creek roads. Could someone let them know to send me their address and I'll print in this column?

She says tobacco is nearly forbidden in Idaho. I don't know if the use or the raising of it is meant by Lottie. I told Sam Broadus of Berea Farm Store that these folks had asked of him and he said they

were very fine people who did business in the store where he worked. He was very glad to know of them.

col. map reading, nuclear, biological, and chemical warfare defense training, and first-aid training.

Following this he was assigned to Aberdeen Proving Grounds, Maryland, where he



The County Attorney is not involved in a vast majority of the cases in District Court. The reason for this is many people voluntarily plead guilty and pay a fine (example - almost every traffic ticket, except tickets for drunk or reckless driving, is disposed of by mailing the fine to the District Court). The conviction rate that truly reflects what happened in District Court in 1984 is the number of convictions in cases when people pled not guilty and asked for a jury trial. **these cases were handled by the county attorney.** Here is what the Rockcastle County District Court records show:

(The record for 1985 is even worse. Only 1 trial has been attempted and it resulted in a mistrial after an improper question by the County Attorney.)

When cases go unprosecuted, witnesses get tired of coming to court, police officers lose interest and the cases get so old the judge dismisses them. **Rockcastle County can have effective law enforcement -- but it requires a lot of hard work by the County Attorney. I WILL DO THAT.**
