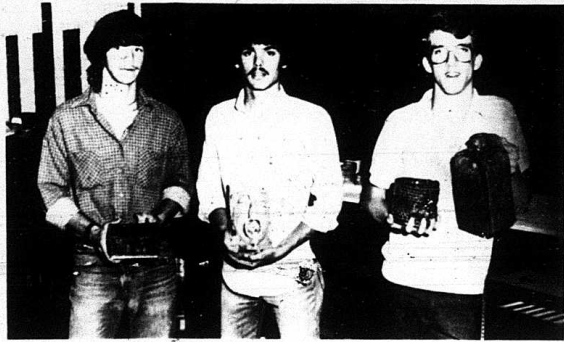

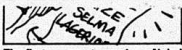

## Selection committee narrows choices

By the time the Rockcastle County Board of Education meets in regular session June 6, it is hoped they will have two selections for the head coaching jobs at the Rockcastle County High School.

School Superintendent Charles Parsons said last week that a total of 18 men had applied for the basketball job and six men had asked to have the chance to guide the football team.

Parsons said that he was hoping that a decision on a coach could be reached by the selection committee for the June meeting.

Rockcastle Transportation Director Richard Bray, a member of the selection committee, said Tuesday that a total of 12 applicants would be interviewed for the basketball job this week and that the other six probably would not be interviewed because their resumes did not look promising.

Bray went on to say that all six applicants for the football job had been interviewed and that a tentative decision had been made.

The transportation director would not say who the selection committee had picked, but the rumor is that Hazard football coach Don Smith has been chosen. Smith led Hazard to the State AA playoffs last year, where he was defeated by Somerset.

Smith is a twenty-year veteran of high school coaching and has spent the last two years at Hazard.

Rockcastle County High School assistant principal, Charles "Tuck" Baker said Wednesday that it was his understanding that Smith had been offered the job and the selection committee was awaiting his acceptance.

No mention has been made as to a choice for the basketball position.

## Points of interest in county recited

Proclaiming Kentucky Tourism Week should be helpful to Rockcastle businesses and tourism, according to Mable Reppert, a spokeswoman and member of the Rockcastle Tourist Association.

Mrs. Reppert said the local chapter will focus attention on the importance of tourism to the county—the jobs and tax revenue generated and general revenue generated throughout the community.

Copper Creek—named for copperhead snakes prevalent in the area.

# Brodhead council changes plans for city hall remodeling

The old adage that "the best laid plans of mice and men oft go awry," applied to the Brodhead City Council when it met in special session Tuesday night.

The council met to open bids on remodeling the city hall/fire department building to make room for a new county fire truck due in June, to be housed at Brodhead, and operated by the Brodhead Volunteer Fire Department.

At the last meeting, the council approved advertising for bids on the project which called for moving the city hall offices and council chambers to the second floor and turning the first floor offices into a bay for the truck.

Two bids were received and opened by the council. J. C. Newland was low bidder at \$11,227.70. The second bid was \$11,788.84 from Built-Well (Lawson Whitt).

At that point the best laid plans went awry, when Councilman Johnny Wilcop informed the council and Mayor Ronnie Cash he was "getting flack" from his constituents questioning the advisability of spending \$12,000 in "city" tax money to remodel the city hall to house a "county" fire truck.

"I think we need to look at other alternatives," Wilcop said. "We might save the city money by looking at all angles. We want to come up with the best plan."

He had an alternative ready. Attach a bay to house the truck to the east side of the building (maybe long enough for two trucks or storage), upgrade the present offices and let the tenants stay in the apartments with an increase in rent to offset losses from the rent.

Forgotten at that point were the bids and previous plans as the council aired the pros and cons of a new bay.

Councilman D. A. Robbins told the council all the pros and cons should have been worked out before the bids were taken. He wondered aloud if the new proposed 18 by 30-foot bay, or an 18 by 60-foot bay, wouldn't cost

\$20,000 or more, rather than \$12,000.

Someone else then countered. If the city and county insurance rates change, due to increased fire protection, wouldn't this help offset the cost?

Lawson Whitt, who had bid on the other project, told the council many people other than those in the city would benefit, and reminded the councilmen that many of these people who live in the county do business in Brodhead.

He said the county truck could also be used as a standby should something happen to the present city truck.

Councilman Robbins agreed he'd rather have a new truck at Brodhead than not to have one.

"We'd never get enough money ahead to pay \$50,000 for

another truck," he stated.

Councilman Wilcop repeated again it seemed to him it would be cheaper to build the new bay and keep the tenants on the second floor letting the rent money offset

# Voters decide who will run the county Tuesday

Voters will go to the polls Tuesday to nominate party candidates for the November general election whom they hope will run Rockcastle County and spend their tax money for the next four years.

Generally, the primary campaign has been classified as "quiet," unlike years ago when candidates sought to find the worst and tell the worst about their opponents.

On at least one election in memory there was a shooting. On many others there were countless fights reported.

"It's been very quiet," one candidate said. "And I'm glad. I don't think people care about digging up things about their opponents like they used to do."

There will be a record number of candidates in the May primary ballot to choose from with at least seven Republican races with more than seven candidates and five races with 10 or more. One race, jailer, has 14 Republican candidates.

Of the total of 102 candidates, only seven are Democrats and only two of those are on the May primary ballot. Robert Payne and Doug Bishop, who oppose each other for magistrate of District 3.

Two candidates will have no opposition in either the May primary or the November general election. They are Coroner Billy Dowell and County Surveyor Charles A. Mullins.

As a reminder, polls are open from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. at the following locations:

District 1—North Mt. Vernon is in the city hall; North Brodhead in the old city jail.

### Co. Attorney's efforts helped recover money

Dear Editor:

A few weeks ago, four men came to my home and told me that they had some backstop left over which would ruin it if it was not used immediately. They persuaded me to allow them to install the backstop on my driveway. When

the work was completed, they forcefully presented me with a bill for \$3,800. Because I was at home alone, with impaired vision, I felt I had no choice but to pay these men the amount they demanded. My check was cashed immediately at the Bank of Mt. Vernon.

Shortly after this occurred, I contacted County Attorney James H. Lambert. Jim and I were classmates at Mt. Vernon High School and we have been friends for many years. I told Jim I felt I had been defrauded. He immediately contacted a man in Frankfort who at first denied any knowledge of the fraud which had been committed. The next day, however, one of the same men who had defrauded me earlier came to my house and left \$1,500 in cash. I again contacted Jim Lambert and he notified the people in Frankfort that civil or criminal proceedings would be brought against them unless a proper refund was made to me. In response to this, I received an additional \$1,100 refund.

Due solely to the efforts of Jim Lambert, I was able to recover \$2,600 of my money. This means that the backstop job on my driveway cost me \$1,200. I have since learned that this is the amount it should have cost to begin with. I want to publicly express my appreciation for Jim Lambert's efforts on my behalf. But for him, these recalls would have gotten away with the scam they attempted.

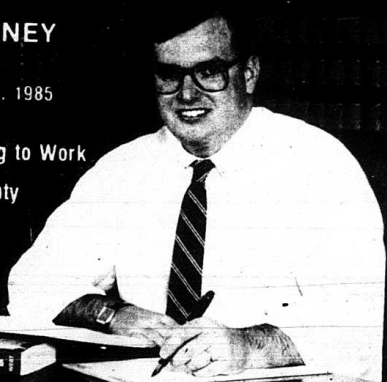

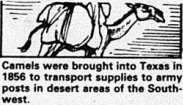

## "Nepotism" charge is unfair...

Dear Editor:

I'm wondering how many

Rockcastle Countians read the mayor's "letter" last week. Of those who read it, how many understood it? If you were able to wade through the haze of big words and references, you'd know that the point is that the mayor said Officer Howard was recommended by the city council for Chief of Police because of "nepotism" (favoritism shown to relatives, Webster's).

That may be so; however, let's look at the qualifications for the job. Of the officers that will remain on the police force after June 1, only Officer Howard has any formal training in law enforcement. The Mt. Vernon Police Department receives state money for training and employing qualified officers. To qualify for these funds, the department is required to have only trained officers as full-time employees. Recent investigations at City Hall forced Mr. Mullins to cut Officer DeBorde's hours to 39 per week to meet the state's regulations. Officer Grey is on leave and Officer Thompson is currently enrolled at Eastern Kentucky University's College of Law Enforcement.

I feel obligated to let people know why I wasn't at the council meeting that night. Since the vote of the council carries no-weight in the decision, I felt I could make better use of my time by going to church. Remember, too, that the other councilmen were unanimously in favor of the only obvious choice for Chief. Also, I sensed that the mayor would resist any recommendation other than Officer DeBorde. I didn't want to bring my "nepotism" to that meeting. I have heard about angry words directed at a member of the council after that meeting and I know I made the right decision.

Mr. Mullins called for changes in guidelines for selection of councilmen to avoid "nepotism." A majority vote elected me and Mr. Tolle after our relatives became police officers, and I was elected again after my son was appointed Chief. I believe the needed change is one that prevents one man from being able to overturn the decision of 6 men who were elected by the people that such decisions are made for.

I know such disagreements among civic leaders is upsetting to everyone. Take heart. In the 4 years that I've been on the city council, it has been my opinion that most councilmen are sincerely interested in doing the most good for the most people. We live here, we are in Mt. Vernon from day to day and our concerns are the same as yours because we are here with you.

You folks are doing a good job in choosing people to represent you and I hope you continue to do so. I only hope that you will always be aware of what's going on and the impact it has on you.

Dear Editor:

It is a pleasure to know you have a good forum column in your paper. When my wife and I moved from Laurel County to Indiana in 1948, following our children, we intended to come back to our native Kentucky mountains soon, but seems we are stuck up here. I try to read the Rockcastle County news, and I also am able to get considerable news from Berea where I used to go to school and where I still have dear friends, and correspond with some.

Now to the forum letters: I liked the letter of David Ott very much. I knew some of the Laurel County Otts who lived in what they called the Swtas Colony. In fact, Riney Ott and his sons ran a sawmill at two different places on my timberlands in the Kentucky mountains. They were all honest and sincere people.

But the letter that disturbs me is from the man that writes about the beast with 7 heads and 10 horns that is mentioned in the 17th and 18th chapters of Revelations. I would like to refute his abusive diatribe. My wife and I are not Catholic but Methodists, but we have many friends and relatives that are Catholic, and we contribute to Catholic missions as well as Protestant missions. To give you an idea of our ages, we were married Aug. 21, 1914 by Rev. Hugh H. Atkins, Methodist Episcopal Church, Tazewell, Tenn. Our

reasons for going from our Kentucky homes to Tennessee was that my wife to be, Sally Cooper, was then only 14, and Kentucky had a different marriage requirement about age. The good Lord has blessed us in so many ways; with a very large family, today scattered all over the U. S. as well as Kentucky, and some 40 descendants in old Mexico, and some in Peru in South America. In raising our family we always taught them tolerance and respect for all Christian religions and they feel as we do.

Now in rebuttal to Mr. Mullins' letter to your forum, I beg to say a few words, but not in rebuke. I'm aware that in many of the Kentucky mountain counties Catholics are as scarce as hens' teeth, and preachers tell their people that Catholics have forked hooves and horns. They are just repeating what they were told by some Catholic haters early in life perhaps. I'm reminded of the poem by John G. Saxe that was in the old McGuffey school books, "The Blind Men and the Elephant." "It was six men of Indostan—To learning much inclined. Who went to see the elephant. (Though all of them were blind): That each by observation, Might satisfy his mind." They all made the examination and none of the six agreed upon what he was like. (It is too long to print here.) But the conclusion: "And so these men of Indostan, Disputed loud and long, Each in his own opinion, Exceeding stiff and strong; Though each was partly in the right, And all were in the wrong." I'm a believer in the philosophy that says: There is a destiny that makes us all winners: None goes by his way alone; all that we send into the lives of others comes back into our own. I want to tell you that Catholics do not canvass for membership. If you ever become a Catholic, it will be strictly a voluntary act.

Many years ago the Catholic Bishop of Covington, Kentucky, Francis W. Howard, used to come down to Hazard most every fall and take a trek on horseback with his friend, Hon. Bailey P. Wootton, as they took about a 3-day trip back through remote regions of Perry and Leslie counties. They were good friends and each respected the other's religious affiliations, but the one was a Catholic and the other was Protestant. At that time I lived about a fourth mile inside Harlan County near the Leslie line, and I was the Postmaster there for over 23

years. Preachers of all religions would come and spend the night and sometimes longer, and we charged none of them a penny. We were only too glad to be of assistance to them. We always believed most any religion was better than none.

On an occasion once when in Frankfort, I went up to the Office of the then Attorney General, Hon. Bailey P. Wootton, and in the conversations about old times, he spoke about Catholic Bishop Howard, and he remarked, "I admire Catholics because they live their religion, while most Protestants just talk about it."

One of the most cherished books in my library is the one Mrs. Wootton wrote, titled "They Have Topped the Mountain" by Clara Wootton, which she later sent to me, published by Blue Grass Press, 422 Swing St., Frankfort, KY. (Copyright 1960).

Please remember the Catholic Church was not in existence when Jesus Christ brought the charge of the Jews slaying righteous men from Abel to Zacharias, in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke. (Read it.) Through these verses Jesus tells us the identity of the "Woman of scarlet" in chapters 17 and 18 in Revelations. Christ charged the Jewish Talmudic System with the death of every righteous man from Abel to Zacharias and history continues to expose their blood record. Apostle Paul lays the death of Christ at the door of the Jews in 1 Thess.

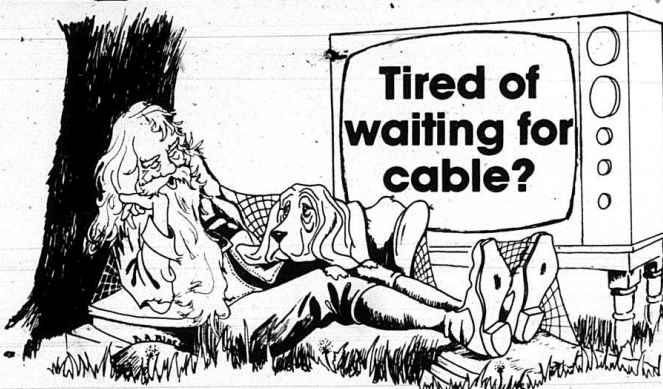

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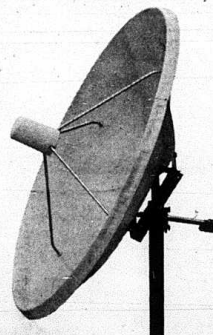

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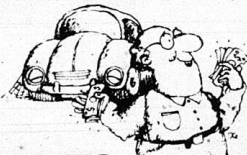

Blue Springs--boils up at the edge of a cliff. No one has reached its bottom. Forms part of Dry Fork and Skeggs Creek.

Boone Spring--located on Boone Trace at Cove Branch, a historical marker located there.

Saltpetre Cave--discovered in 1798 and was a source of gun powder for War of 1812. Mexican War and part of the Civil War. Open for public tours; can seat 2,500 people.

Daniel Boone National Forest--Rockcastle County contains 11,372 acres of the national forest. The purchase of the land was made for protection of streams, production of timber crops, wild-life and recreation. Many animals, wild flowers and plants still exist that were here during the Boone Exploration.

Rockcastle River--40 miles of fishable water; a wild river area used for canoe racing and shooting the rapids.

Lake Linville--400 acres used as Mt. Vernon water supply and located at Renfro Valley. Dam crossed by I-75 and built by state Highway Department in 1968.

Dix River--named for Indian chief named Captain Dick, who gave permission to Long Rifle Hunters to come in, kill what game they wanted and leave.

Old Tan Yard--treatment of leather making tan bark, largest industry in Mt. Vernon when Mt. Vernon was established. Located near Spout Springs in Mt. Vernon.

Tobacco Manufacturing Plant--located at Brodhead and later Mt. Vernon from 1870 to 1916, by Richard Douglas and Dick Martin; produced twist and plug tobacco.

Mt. Vernon Lime Kiln--operated by Kruger family; Kruger manufactured burned lime 1912 to

1916 Pine Hill lime kiln manufactured burned and hydrated lime.

Renfro Valley Barn Dance--located on Renfro Creek north of Mt. Vernon; originated in 1939 by John Lair, oldest radio broadcast on the air, the Sunday Morning Gatherin'.

Wildcat Mountain--on Oct. 21, 1861, 7,500 Confederates led by General Zollicoffer attacked the camp of General Schoepf who had 5,000 Union soldiers entrenched on Rockcastle Hill; wounded 42 and killed 21 of the Confederate troops. The Union lost 4 and 20 were wounded. Trenches and gun placement still visible.

Scaffold Cane Church--second oldest church in Kentucky, established in 1792.

Buckeye Christian Church--located 1 1/2 miles east of Renfro Valley; one of the first churches in Rockcastle County.

### INSPECTION PERIOD for the Property Tax Assessment Roll

The Rockcastle County property tax roll will be opened for inspection from May 28 through June 9, 1984. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the tax roll.

This is the January 1, 1984 assessment on which state, county and school taxes for 1984 will be due about September 15, 1984.

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse and may be inspected between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Any person who wishes to appeal an assessment must file a written letter or petition with the county clerk within the above period of time. The letter of petition must state the reasons for appeal, identify the property in question, and state the taxpayer's estimate of actual fair cash value. (KRS 133.120)

Dwight Mink, who along with his brother, Deauz, searched the area for nearly two days after someone reported an explosion. The plane was found by Dwight about 10 a.m. Monday.

Reverend Robinson, a native of London, had been pastor of the West Side Pentecostal Church in Hamilton for 12 years and had been to London for several days conducting a revival at the East London Pentecostal Church. His wife had not accompanied him and

his sons and daughter on the trip to London. Daughter Diane had accompanied them, but decided at the last minute to drive back to Hamlet with a friend.

In her book, Mrs. Vaughn tells of the moment when told about finding the plane.

"I was stoking Diane's hair when Bobby Mills, a friend, hung up the phone and walked through the doorway. His countenance relayed the message even before he spoke. With great difficulty he said, 'Nancy, they have found the

plane and there are no survivors. My world crashed around me."

In the months that followed, Mrs. Vaughn and Diane struggled to adjust their lives to the loss of their loved ones.

"It was the grace of God that saw us through our crisis," Mrs. Vaughn said. "We can now talk about the accident and its impact on our lives and the lives of our friends and our church."

On the cover of the book she says, "No longer do I search for answers or seek to place blame. I know there was a divine reason for the plane crash, although I don't know the reason."

And further: "I have found the rainbow in the cloud. The colors of splendor comfort me! The Son has shown himself through my sorrow. I can see the rainbow, or half of it at least. The arch I see from earth's perspective assures

me God had a reason for allowing my three men to die at the foot of a mountain."

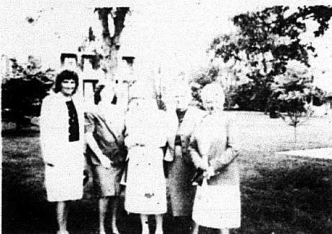
"What is most comforting to me is the fact that Pearl, Terry and Ricky actually know that reason. They see the rainbow complete. Where they are it circles the throne."

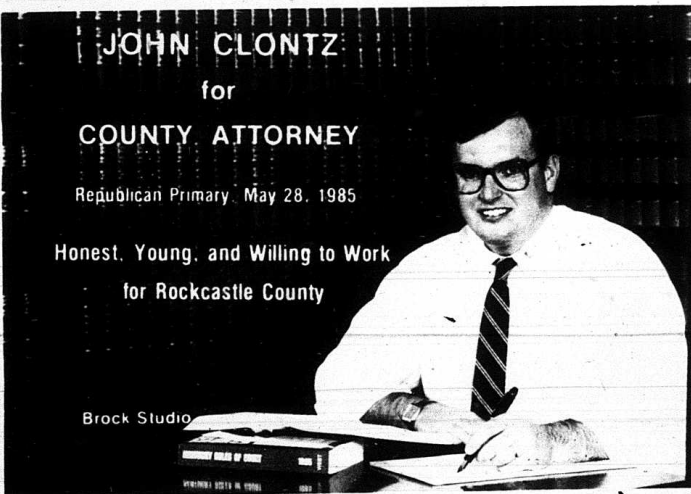

## May is Bluegill finest hour on Kentucky lakes

The bluegill is one of the most popular and widely distributed panfish in Kentucky. He's found all throughout the state—in small streams, sluggish backwater areas along big rivers, and farm ponds, as well as huge manmade lakes.

But often times this scrappy gamester doesn't get the respect

he's due. And it's a shame too, because what the bluegill lacks in size and glamour, he certainly makes up for at the dinner table. The bluegill's flesh is firm and sweet. He's one of the best-tasting fish found in Kentucky, ranking right up there with crappie and sauger.

Bluegill feed mostly on insects, larvae, fish eggs, scuds, mollusks, worms and the fry of fishes; they have gluttonous appetites which they never seem to satisfy. Bluegills are continuously on the move, except during the spawn, when they become fiercely territorial.

If you want to catch a mess of bluegill, the next few weeks offer some of the best fishing of the year because bluegill prefer shallow water throughout the spring and early summer. Spawning occurs usually in May, when water temperatures reach into the 70's. Bluegill nests are saucer-shaped, and clustered in colonies.

Adult bluegill are beautiful fish. Their coloration is variable, but generally they are olive green with emerald, copper, green and bluish reflections on their sides, dark above the lateral line. Their lower sides and belly are whitish to yellow. Sometimes big "hawg" bluegill have bright red underbellies. The bluegill's geographic range extends from northeastern Mexico to Florida, north to the Great Lakes; its scientific name is "Lepomis macrochirus."

Extreme hot or cold weather tends to make bluegill very selective in their food choices, especially the larger fish. In summer the biggest bluegill go deep and are usually taken in 15 to

30 feet of water by drift fishing stairstep points, steep rock walls, deepwater holes, rock shelves, beside boat houses, or in brush-piles and flooded treetops. Some of Kentucky's top bluegill waters are Taylorsville Lake, Shanty Hollow Lake, Kentucky Lake, Corinth Lake, Herrington Lake, Elmer Davis Lake, Laurel River Lake, Lake Malone, Green Lake and Green River Lake.

It probably would be difficult to land a bluegill on light tackle if they grew as big as bass do. The current Kentucky state record bluegill was caught by Phil M. Conyers of Madisonville, and weighed four pounds, three ounces. The monster bluegill was caught on a spinning rod and reel, and plastic worm while bass fishing in a stripmine lake.

Some deepwater bluegill anglers use specialized gear, rods tipped with piano wire, and jig the bottom because that technique imitates the natural action of benthic organisms. The best live bait for bluegill are crickets, red worms, bits of nightcrawlers, meal worms, horseweed worms, bag worms, catalpa worms, grasshoppers and wax worms.

The angler forever searching for the one bait which will entice big bluegill consistently has on occasion even tried maggots, wasp larvae, crayfish tails or tiny bits of saltwater shrimp baited on jigs.

The ideal tackle for bluegill is ultralight spinning gear, four pound test monofilament, and hooks of size 8, 10, and 12.  
Marbou jigs, 1/16 ounce curly tails, sinking flies, size 16 dry flies, and 1/16 ounce spinners, are excellent artificial lure choices.

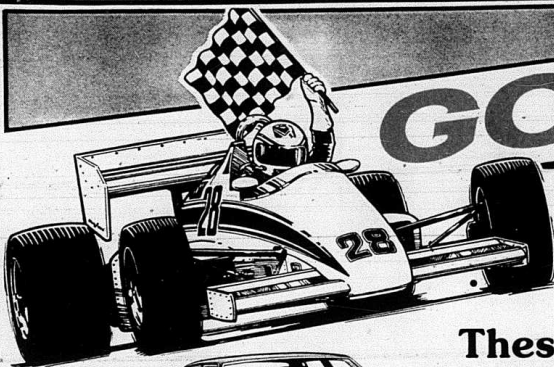

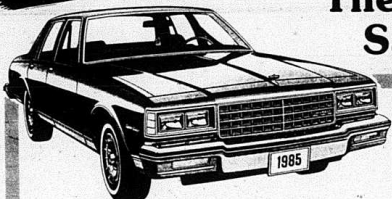

## Much needed rain benefits farmer's crops

Recent rains across the Commonwealth may have been crucial to Kentucky farmers as soil moisture content was reported 54 percent short as of May 13.

Before the rains, pasture grasses, hay crops and especially newly seeded legumes and grasses were showing the effects of the dry weather.

"The rains were all the more crucial because average temperatures were closer to those of early June rather than early May," said Agriculture Commissioner David E. Boswell.

Corn planting is advancing rapidly here in Kentucky, with 66 percent of the acreage planted. This is compared with 20 percent

year ago and 50 percent average.

"Many farmers have finished planting, and the crop has emerged to a satisfactory stand," Boswell said.


More than half of the planted corn crop has emerged. Several cases of armyworms were reported, but most emerged corn has a good stand.

Farmers have begun setting tobacco, and, as of May 12, nearly 3 percent had been set. Plants are large, and setting is underway earlier than usual.

Approximately 25 percent of the plants in beds are four inches tall or larger, with another 45 percent from two to four inches

## Price barrier blocks burley trade with oversea countrys

"We like your great American burley. But we cannot afford your prices."

This is the oft-repeated story that U.S. tobacco trade representatives are hearing on their rounds overseas. It is just another of the many problems facing burley growers, as efforts are pushed to save the 45-year-old program of tobacco price supports and production control.


The price-resistance problem as a barrier against U.S. tobacco was brought home to burley leaders most recently, at the May meeting of the Burley Tobacco

Growers Cooperative Association, at Lexington.

A three member team is on a market development trip in Europe, after visiting the Northwest Africa countries of Morocco, Tunisia and Algeria, a region of 50 million people. One of the team members is Ben Reeves, vice president and managing director of the Burley and Dark Leaf Tobacco Expert Association. Reeves reported on his trip in a letter to the Lexington-based Burley Association.

In his contact with government officials and tobacco industry leaders, Reeves reported "high praise for the quality of American

# Fishing Report

Cool weekend temperatures and scattered showers in the east kept many fishermen off the lakes this weekend. However, those who made the effort were often rewarded with good stringers of fish during the May 18-19 period covered by this report. The lake-by-lake rundown, as reported by conservation officers and creel clerks, is as follows:

**KENTUCKY:** Creel clerk Don Fortenberry reported heavy fishing activity for crappie, although stringers were light. Some bass were being caught crapping. Plastic worms in weeds and brush. Catfishing was very good for those fishing night crawlers in deep water off rocky ledges. The lake was clear, stable at summer pool and 72 degrees.

**BARKLEY:** Creel clerk Norman Brantley reported catfishing was picking up around rocky points and rip-rap. Bluegill were being caught in the back of traps. The lake was clear, stable at summer pool and 72 degrees.

**BARREN:** Conservation officer Donald Depp reported black bass being caught on topwater lures and plastic worms off points early in the morning and late in the evening; bluegill were being picked up in 10 feet of water off steep bluffs; crappie were best at night under lights. The lake was

clear to murky, rising, 12 1/2 feet below summer pool and 74 degrees.

**NOLIN:** Moderate fishing activity for black bass was reported by creel clerk James Shipp who said that most anglers were casting plastic worms and spinners into shallow banks and points; bluegill were being caught off rocky banks in 8-10 feet of water. The lake was clear to murky, rising, five feet below summer pool and 74 degrees.

**ROUGH RIVER:** Officer Harold Belt reported that fishing activity was very slow with only a few bluegill and an occasional crappie being caught. The lake was clear, rising, six feet below summer pool and 70 degrees.

**TAYLORSVILLE:** Officer Joe Bland reported that bass were being caught on spinner baits and plastic worms in shallow water and around points; bluegill were being picked up in brushy cover. Tail-water activity was very slow for crappie and bluegill. The lake was clear, stable at summer pool and 76 degrees.

**HERRINGTON:** Moderate to heavy fishing activity was reported by officer Charles Goode and creel clerk Bill Pinkston. Most anglers were catching bass on top water lures and plastic worms along shallow points and banks and in

# Report to Kentucky

## TOBACCO AGREEMENT IS GOOD NEWS FOR FARMERS

A major hurdle was crossed for Kentucky agriculture in the recent agreement by tobacco companies on legislative wording which addresses their antitrust concerns in the proposed tobacco plan.

I was pleased that Philip Morris, Inc. and Brown and Williamson agreed to the wording which I submitted to them. Before this agreement, Philip Morris was insisting that they have a special antitrust exemption from Congress before agreeing to other parts of the plan.

After weeks of negotiations over this issue, we can now move forward with talks toward a tobacco plan that will reduce surplus tobacco stocks, with the companies agreeing to purchase those stocks. The plan we are developing would also adjust price supports to provide for the continued competitiveness of U.S. tobacco.

The agreement we reached in no way gives antitrust immunity. But it does clear up many gray areas by calling for the mechanics of the buyout plan to occur under the watchful eye of the Secretary of Agriculture.

This development was good news for all Kentucky farmers, not just those who grow tobacco. I have been very concerned that the dead end we faced with tobacco antitrust concerns would overshadow the fact that Kentucky has a huge stake in agriculture: With work toward the tobacco plan no longer being held up, we can now also concentrate on the 1985 Farm Bill which affects all of Kentucky's other important crops.

Kentucky is a diverse agricultural state. We rank 12th nationally in corn and 13th in soybean production, as well as 11th in dairy. The 1985 Farm Bill, now being finalized in the Senate Agriculture Committee, will set the policies for farming over the next four years.

I favor a farm program that provides for market flexibility. However, government cannot and must not completely abandon the farming sector as some seem to intend. Because of the barriers to free trade in the world marketplace, and due to the vulnerability of crops to flood and drought, the government must provide some protection. If farmers cannot count on the government to help protect their livelihood, there is no incentive for them to take the risks necessary to stay in agriculture.

This important farm legislation should put agriculture back on a sound financial basis. And it must give our farmers the ability to compete in the world marketplace. I plan to devote my efforts to ensuring that Kentucky's farmers get the best shake possible in this important farm legislation.

tobacco and its importance as a component of American-type cigarettes, which they said has growing acceptance. But they were intimidated by the price they had to pay for American leaf.

"They are using considerable amounts of Brazilian, Zimbabwe and Java tobacco. We were shown sheds in which were stored hundreds of bales of burley from Brazil, and a dark, short-leaved tobacco from Java."

Throughout the region the U. S. team heard about Java tobacco. Asked what special qualities that leaf had, the reply was "It is cheap, and it will burn."

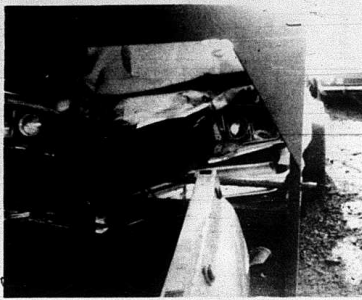
Reeves was accompanied by Frank B. Snodgrass, retired executive-secretary of the Burley and Dark Leaf group, and Kirk Wayne, president of Tobacco Associates.

Meanwhile, work goes along slowly on legislative plans at

Washington to revise and save the tobacco price-support program. John M. Berry and Larry E. Forgy, Jr., attorneys for the Burley Association, are involved in all phases of work on the plan, as is Joe McDaniel, president.

One of the main concerns is to have the drought-damaged 1983 crop of pooled tobacco exempted from the no-net-cost program, either through disaster relief or

administrative action by Commodity Cred Corp. The Burley Association holds that either of these steps would be feasible, and would result in C. C. taking over the '83 crop as collateral, and paying off the loan. With the '83 crop of 210 million pounds of pooled tobacco taken over, the Burley Association might in time be able to dispose of the '82 and '84 crop holdings, now amounting to 225 million pounds.

## Ky. farmers asked to participate in survey

Farmers across Kentucky will be asked to participate in a nationwide survey during late May and early June to develop estimates of the 1985 crop acreages and mid-year livestock numbers for the Commonwealth. Staff members from the Ken-

tucky Crop and Livestock Reporting Service will interview a cross section of the Commonwealth's farmers. Other farmers will receive a questionnaire through the mail.

"The information this survey seeks will be very useful to farmers across the Commonwealth," said state Agriculture Commissioner David E. Boswell. "Our farmers need accurate, current information on livestock and acreage in order to make plans

for their own operations. This survey can be very valuable in developing accurate estimates for all producers to use if those farmers participating will make every effort to respond."

The Kentucky crop and livestock survey results will be incorporated in reports of national and some state estimates published by the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Crop Reporting Board. A report on 1985 crop

tall.

The burley crop was also in need of rain.

Soybean planting has advanced to 6 percent, as compared with none at this time last year and 6 percent for the five-year average.

Approximately 75 percent of the wheat has headed. Conditions as of May 1 placed the Kentucky wheat crop at 13.6 million bushels, with an average yield of 40 bushels per acre.

Wheat looks very good in some areas, but rust is bad in a number of other areas.

Farmers have cut approximately 35 percent of the first

alfalfa hay crop. Yields have been fair to good, but fell somewhat short where lack of moisture has been a problem.

Strawberry picking has begun, and most areas have a good crop. Apples appear to be putting on a fair set. Peaches are a complete loss in many areas, but a small number of fortunate growers

will have a few peaches.

"Overall, Kentucky's crop prospects are still looking very good, especially after the recent rains. If the weather continues to be favorable, we can expect an excellent crop year," Boswell concluded.

night on night crawlers; white bass were good in the lower end of the lake. The lake was clear, stable, five feet below summer pool and 72 degrees.

**GREEN RIVER:** Officer Buddy Loy reported bluegill fishermen having best success in brushy areas and off points; bass were being caught on plastic worms early in the morning and late in the evening. Some bluegill and catfish were being caught in the tailwaters. The lake was clear to murky, rising slowly, one foot below summer pool and 75 degrees.

**CUMBERLAND:** Excellent stringers of white bass were being caught according to officer Fred York, with most being caught in 20-30 feet of water off points and rock walls in the main lake at night. Night fishermen were also picking up an occasional walleye, rainbow trout and crappie. Trout were also being caught in the tailwaters. 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

**Bird dogging.**  
Is the University of Louisville basketball program under investigation by the NCAA?  
Bob Gibbons, prep basketball talent scout, posed the question and also aimed some criticism U of L's way in his May 9 newsletter.  
"Are the rumors accurate that the NCAA is currently investigating Louisville's recruiting?" Gibbons writes.  
Of course not, countered

Louisville assistant Jerry Jones Friday morning. "There's nothing to that," Jones said. "Coach (Bob) Dotson and (Wade) Houston talked to him (Gibbons) about that in Dallas and he told them he had heard it somewhere.  
"But we're not under any investigation that I know of," Jones added. "We run a good program here and the NCAA is welcome to come in here anytime and investigate."

It is standard procedure of course for the NCAA to conduct interviews with all high school signees from the top 100 each year, to ask if any player received illegal offers and if so, from whom.  
Second, however, is the matter of Cedric Henderson. When Georgia signed the 6-8 player last spring after he had verbally committed to U of L, an NCAA investigation team went to Athens to review the shady circumstances surrounding Henderson's change of heart.  
Later, at the SEC tournament in Birmingham, a Georgia assistant coach hinted that if the NCAA punished the Bulldog program then Louisville would be implicated as well for unsavory recruiting tactics involving Henderson.  
The jury is still out on that one.

It is curious however, that in the wake of the University of Louisville's best basketball recruiting success ever, such a volley of criticism has come down on the Cardinal basketball program.  
First, there was criticism for coach Denny Crum because of his casual reaction to speculation that he will "dump" two players from the scholarship rolls and reduce the current 17 man roster to the 15-man limit. Crum would do so to make room for six new freshmen.  
The Cardinal coach said the "situation would work itself out."

Because "stricter summer training goals for current team members had been established some would probably not achieve them and therefore have their scholarships revoked."  
Nothing new there really. Only last week over-the-limit North Carolina State was ready to drop little used 6-1 guard George McClain and released 6-8 freshman-to-be Eric Duncan from a letter of intent to sign with UNC-Charlotte.  
Crum hinted too that one or more players might flunk out of school. The names of Barry Sumpter and Robbie Valentine have been mentioned most frequently. On two occasions that I am familiar with Crum and Jones have expressed displeasure with

Valentine.  
And Crum has suggested that Chris West might transfer.  
So, Louisville's roster problem might indeed "work itself out" and with a bonus. Vacancies enough in time for next year's prime recruiting targets, 7-0 Felton Spencer and 6-4 Rex Chapman.  
Gibbons, who would seem to have no vested interest one way or the other in Louisville's basketball future, nevertheless, got off a double blast at the Cards in his newsletter, grouching that Louisville is "stockpiling" talent.  
Gibbons - rates Louisville's 1985 recruiting crop best in the country. "However, it's extremely difficult for us to pay homage to those who grossly over-recruit. Furthermore, the following questions now loom about Louisville's recruiting:  
1. Is it good recruiting to sign two more players than you have scholarships for? (Which two players will be forced to give up their scholarships?)  
2. How do you justify signing five forwards (enough for 2 1/2 teams) in one recruiting class? They already have five forwards on scholarship.  
Then Gibbons asks if U of L is under investigation and concludes: "Again, on paper, the Cardinals are 'flying high' as this year's premier recruiters, but, does the end justify the means?"  
Gibbons also proposes to the NCAA rules committee what he might nickname "the Cardinal Rule."  
"How about this as a new rule: Whenever a school signs 'more' players than the 15-scholarship limit, all of their signees are released from their national letters (obligation) and are free to sign with other schools if they desire. Think that might make some folks a little less greedy? Probably not."


Chapman decided to take the Kentucky Wesleyan job.  
Former UK coach Joe B. Hall told a friend recently that UK needs to sign Rex Chapman and that he (Hall) would have made every effort to hire Wayne Chapman as an assistant.  
Parting shot  
A wire service story last week about Eddie Sutton reported the University of Kentucky's new basketball coach is busy settling into his office at Memorial Coliseum at UK. On the flip side, the Sutton family has not purchased a home in Lexington yet, but
