Thacker wins again; Houk, Hasty, Hale, Lambert, Kirby, score Primary victories

Hubert Thacker, a veteran of county political wars, eased by his nearest opponent, Clarence Carter, in Tuesday's primary election to win the Republican nomination for county judge/executive.

He will face incumbent Democrat County Judge/Executive Bob Jasper in the November general election. If Thacker wins, it will be the third time he has served in that office.

Thacker defeated Carter, 1,078 to 992 votes. Leonard (Roge) Hammond was third with 645 votes.

Thacker and Carter were in a seaway battle during the counting of the first seven precincts. When Roundstone precinct came in with a big Thacker majority, Thacker supporters knew their candidate was going to easily carry his area of the county. Carter made inroads when North Mt. Vernon reported, but West Brodhead offset his

majority in Mt. Vernon.

With only Conway remaining, the handwriting was on the wall. Conway was sure to be Thacker territory, and it was.

Thacker never stopped campaigning since he lost to Frank DeBorde four years ago. It was often said, he shook hands with everyone in the county at least three times during the campaign.

He never failed to remind voters he believed he was responsible for all the good things that had

happened in the county during his two terms.

Another veteran of political battles, Billy Kirby, who had also been out of office the past four years, showed he still has a big political clout when he defeated Harlan (Buck) Farthing 1,218 to 771 votes in the jailer's race.

Third place in the jailer's race was Delno McClure with 671 votes.

During his campaign, Kirby always reminded voters his term as jailer was one of the best ever for the county. Voters obviously believed him. He took an early lead and never looked back.

But as is sometimes said, "It's not over till it's over," and it's not over for Kirby who will face Democrat Ovie Cromer in November.

What was predicted to be a close sheriff's race was exactly that. But in the final count it was Clarence (Ike) Hasty who had the most votes. Hasty defeated incumbent sheriff William Taylor 1,015 votes to 931. Hasty has, no opponent in November.

Hasty ran his campaign on the premise he knew the county better than his opponents, and knew what the voters wanted. But it took well into the counting before he could be sure they had heard him.

The only big surprise in the sheriff's race was the showing of third place candidate, Shirley Smith, who very nearly caught the front runners with 896 votes and with very little personal campaigning.

Showing vote-getting power was E. (Elmer) Hale, incumbent property valuation administrator. He handily defeated Cleo (Ike) Hurd 945 votes to 733. Hale has no November opponent.

In another race that was expected to be close, that of county clerk turned out to be a runaway for Norma Houk, who led the entire Republican ticket, defeating incumbent deputy county clerk David Bales. 2,226 votes to 1,307. Paul Abney received 777 votes. Mrs. Houk has no November opponent.

In the hotly contested county attorney's race, incumbent James H. Lambert narrowly defeated his challenger, John Clontz. 1,872 votes to 1,734. Lambert has no opposition in November.

It was a nip-and-tuck race for the two candidates who made their campaign the liveliest of the

election. It went down to the wire. But two precincts, East Livingston and Conway area proved to be one of Lambert's strongest precincts and his voting precinct.

There'll be new faces and new ideas on the Rockcastle Fiscal Court come January. All magistrates were either defeated or did not run for re-election. Two magistrates, Donald Rowe in the first district and Joe Clark in the fifth, were candidates for county judge/executive.

In the first district, Glen Ellison won easily over his nearest opponent, Tommy Mullins, 238 votes to 142. William Swinney received 103 votes. Ellison will

face Democrat Tom Wallin in the November election.

In the second district, Jack Bradley, Mt. Vernon hair stylist, defeated Thomas Denney, 334 votes to 207. Darrell Whitaker was third with 193 votes.

In the third district, incumbent magistrate D. G. (Alex) Albright was defeated by J. R. (Boone) Cromer, 251 votes to 202. In third place with 116 votes was Raymond Brown.

Cromer will face Democrat Doug Bishop in November. Bishop defeated Robert Payne 125 to 21 votes.

In the fourth district, Amos Burdette was an easy winner over

Local woman killed in Sunday shooting

A Rockcastle County woman is dead, the result of a shooting incident and a local man has been charged with assault in the first degree.

Justina Lear, 25, of Mt. Vernon, died Monday morning at the University of Kentucky Albert B. Chandler Medical Center, according to Gilbert Acciaro, Jr., public affairs officer for the Kentucky State Police in London.

Although no warrant has been issued as yet, Acciaro said that one for murder would be issued.

Charged in connection with the incident was Johnny Hampton Renner, 39, also of Mt. Vernon. Hampton is presently being held in the Rockcastle County Jail under a \$50,000 cash bond.

ently shot Ms. Lear once in the head with a pistol sometime around 11 p.m. Sunday at the home of Brenda Morgan on Fairground Hill.

The shooting reportedly occurred after Ms. Lear and Renner had been in an argument, according to police, who said that Renner fled the scene of the shooting but turned himself in at the county jail sometime Monday.

Police said that Ms. Lear was taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital by Otis Kirby, where she was treated and transferred to U.K.

Ms. Lear was born on September 8, 1959 in Madison County, the daughter of Wayne Lear of Brodhead and Ms. Betty Harding

Police commission prepares to set personnel standards

A Police Advisory Commission has been set up to seek information on how to establish standard operating procedures for the Mt. Vernon Police Department and to eliminate what Mayor Roland Mullins calls "nepotism."

The new commission, composed of five members and three consultants, is the idea of Mayor Mullins, who earlier outlined his requirements for hiring police personnel.

The commission is composed of Tom Welsh, chairman; Jess Tom Pike, Ralph Sigmon, Paul Blevins and Robert Robinson.

Three consultants are Carl Baker, Walter Shepherd and Clyde Barnett.

One other member, T. J. Parsons, was named, but it is unclear whether he will serve since he lives outside the city limits.

Each councilman chose a representative to the commission.

In his charge to the commission, Mayor Mullins said the members "have been invited because members of the city council view you as having something special to offer citizens of Mt. Vernon."

"The product of this first meeting and those to follow will

provide a foundation on which the Mt. Vernon Police Department can build," he added. "Fighting crime, thus becomes everybody's business."

He asked the commission to meet at least one time every two weeks, to invite experts to discuss various topics, and to gather written materials.

He noted, if the task takes longer than the prescribed May 23 to July 1, the time could be extended.

Contacted for information and guidance will be the Kentucky State Police, Eastern Kentucky University Law Enforcement School, and police and officials in other communities.

The commission will look at those things the mayor called point of "concern." They include: traffic control, officers necessary per 1,000 population; property protection; departmental evaluations; individual officer evaluation; evaluation of the chief of police; controlling illegal trafficking; dealing with drunk driving and drunkenness; the department and public relations; equipment and its procurement, use and maintenance; reports to the council and mayor; evidence; arrest activities, and discipline of officers.

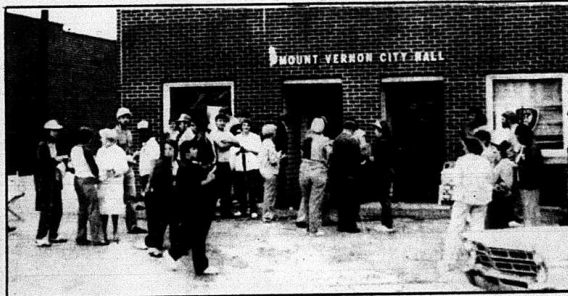
The commission is presumably the first of its kind for the city

police department which had over its share of problems and controversy for a considerable time.

At the moment, the city does not have a new police chief that has been officially chosen. Chief Ronnie Hurd resigned recently, effective June 1.

In his letter of resignation, Chief Hurd wrote that "personal

hardship brought on to myself, and family because of the job, have forced me to take action."

He wrote, it was difficult to perform effectively under the current circumstances, and added, it seemed unlikely the situation would change.

Hurd's father, Pete Hurd, is on the city council and is a candidate for mayor in the November general election. In a letter to the editor of the Signal, he called a charge of nepotism, recently included in a statement by Mayor Mullins, unfair.

Hurd said he and Ernie Tolle were elected to office after their relatives became police officers.

Police officer Joe Howard is Tolle's brother-in-law, and has the most seniority of any of the officers.

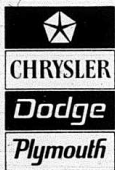

Education director visits Rockcastle

Ms. Joanne Brooks, Director of the Division of Compensatory Education, Kentucky Department of Education, visited Rockcastle County on May 14.

Ms. Brooks heads the division which includes the departments of: (1) Chapter 1, (2) Dropout Prevention, and (3) State Remediation Program.

Upon the invitation of Bige Towery, local Chapter 1 Coordinator, Ms. Brooks scheduled the visit to review the Chapter 1 components of the district and to speak to the administrators and teachers of related programs.

The Chapter 1 Program is designed to serve the remedial needs of students in the areas of mathematics and reading. This year the Chapter 1 Program is serving students in grades 1-9.

Ms. Brooks discussed the new State Remediation Program, which will begin serving students in grades 1 and 2 during the 1985-86 school term. This Remediation Program is part of legislation passed by the 1984 General Assembly.

10% mortgage rate offered in 26 eastern Ky. counties

Beginning June 3, 1985, 39 lenders in 26 eastern and central Kentucky counties will make available a total of \$16.5 million of 30 year single family mortgage loans at a fixed interest of 10%. The program, called the Combined Counties of Kentucky, is coordinated and financed by the Mountain Association for Community Economic Development (MACED), a Berea-based non-profit economic development corporation.

In addition to the low interest rate on the mortgages, affordability will be further enhanced by the 30 year term on the loans, which reduces the monthly payments, and by the minimum down payment required of only 5%. To

further reduce costs to the borrowers, financing provided by MACED will enable the program to keep closing fees to a maximum of 2 3/4%.

Borrowers with incomes of \$40,000 or less (adjusted gross family income) will qualify for a loan under the program. In addition, one half of the available funds have been set aside until August 1 for borrowers with incomes below 80% of the median family income in the county. A

family with an income of \$12,200 would be able to afford a \$30,000 home. Applications will be taken on a first come, first served basis by participating lenders.

The mortgages can be made for new or existing homes, but there are purchase price limitations which have been set by Federal law. The purchase price limits for houses in all counties, except Laurel, are \$87,840 for new houses and \$68,280 existing houses. (Cont to B2)

Registration for kindergarten and first grade will be conducted at each of the elementary schools from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. on June 6.

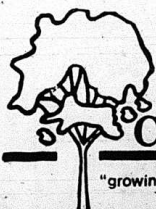

The Lord's Army

The Lord's army is unique in many ways. It is made up entirely of volunteers who have answered His call to serve. He has never "drafted" one single person, though it is His will that all be His soldiers. All who are not in His army are fighting against him; there is no mutual territory. "He that is not with me is against me" (Matt. 12:30).

The very word "army" suggests arms. We know that arms or weapons are used for two purposes - to fight and to defend. "Fight the good fight of faith..." (I Tim. 6:12). "I am set for the defense of the gospel" (Phil. 1:17). "The weapons of our warfare are not carnal, but mighty through God to the pulling down of the strongholds" (2 Cor. 10:4).

Both the defensive armor and the offensive weapons of the Lord's soldiers are described in Eph. 6:13-17. They are to be protected by the "breastplate of righteousness," the shield of faith, and the helmet of salvation. They are to advance upon the enemy having their "loins girded about with truth," their "feet shod with the preparation of the gospel of peace," carrying - as it were - "the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God."

The Lord's soldiers must know who their enemies are and constantly be on guard against them. As we saw in Matt. 12:30, His enemies are all who are not in His army, but they are not always easily recognized. Some are disguised as "apostles of Christ" and even Satan himself poses as "an angel of light" (2 Cor. 11:13-14). No wonder, then, His soldiers are admonished to "be sober, be vigilant," because this "roaring lion," dressed

in the "uniform" of an angel, "walketh about, seeking whom he may devour." Jesus' soldiers recognize their enemies by their fruits; not by what they seem to be (Matt. 7:16).

Be it known to all foes of the Lord's army - you're fighting a losing battle; you CANNOT WIN! Oh yes, you'll capture some of His soldiers and they'll join forces with you. Some will defect of their own accord. They become vulnerable when they lay aside any part of their armor or are not proficient in the use of the "two-edged sword." You have, by far, the larger army, but not the stronger. Therefore, all the Lord's enemies will eventually be put "under his feet." "The last enemy that shall be destroyed is death" (I Cor. 15:25-28).

Why not enlist in the Lord's army? The terms of induction are simple: Hear His call and obey it. Believe in Him with all your heart (Mark 16:16). Repent of your sins (Luke 13:3), confess His name before me (Rom. 10:9-10; Matt. 10:32), and be baptized for the remission of your sins (Acts 2:38). Then put on the whole armor of God and learn to effectively use the weapon He supplies. "Be steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord" (I Cor. 15:58). YOU CANNOT LOSE!

Don Connor ('75), Kyle Macy ('80), Billy Ray Lickert ('61), Dicky Boal and Jim Mackert ('84), Cotton Nash ('64), John Crigger, Adrian Smith and Vernon Hatton ('58), Lou Tsioropoulos ('54), Mike Pratt ('70), Mike Casey ('71), Louie Dampier ('67) and Allen Feldhaus ('62).

"I had one of these last year in Covington and we had 45 players going back five decades," Hale said. "And we raised \$5,000 for the K-Men's Association."

Hale indicated that profits from the games will go to form an endowment fund. "The money will be used to help former UK athletes who need help from time to time," he said. "It includes former athletes not just in basketball, but football, baseball, track and others."

Hale was asked if more recent ex-Wildcats will participate in future exhibitions? And, are any excursions planned for communities in central and western Kentucky?

"Coach (Joe B.) Hall has told me that he will try and help get Sam Bowie and Mel Turpin, people like that," Hale said. "And yes, we very much would like to get together and play in the central and western sections of the state."

Sutton support

New Kentucky coach Eddie Sutton is an enthusiastic supporter of such exhibitions and involving ex-Kentucky players in matters to do with UK basketball.

"Sutton wants to have a former players' association, get them more involved," a UK spokesperson said last week. "When he was at Arkansas he had former players like Sidney Mc- mrie come in when they could."

One project Sutton favors is an airplane charter for ex-UK players to accompany the current Kentucky team on one of its SEC road trips.

One of the major failings of

UK's basketball program, it seems to me, has been the failure to acknowledge and involve ex-Kentucky basketball players. Maybe that's about to change.

Slap on the wrist

The University of Georgia's athletic department perpetrated a "great escape" last week, it seems to me, after reviewing NCAA sanctions against Bulldog basketball and football.

These matters are always more gray than black or white to me. The NCAA is more restrictive than a CIA mole in Tashkent when it comes to punishing those who pay its bills.

But a court order forced revelation of the violations and basketball coach Hugh Durham ought to light a victory cigar.

The NCAA, demonstrating that it learned nothing from the Tulane University debacle two months ago, missed an opportunity to do more than pay lip service to those sports factories it is built with governing.

If it wanted to make some real news, win some friends among the sanctioning power brokers in my profession, and have a positive impact on an industry beset by corruption and all but out-in-the-open cheating, the NCAA could have recommended:

First, pay back all monies realized from the basketball team's appearance in the 1985 NCAA tournament. Not 90 percent (\$254,880), but all of it.

Second, suggest the University of Georgia buy up its contract with coach Durham and his assistant coaches.

That's right. Fire the lot of them. The coaches are well paid professionals who know the rules of ethics and NCAA. They are responsible then for upholding them, even if it meant Cedric Henderson enrolled at Louisville, Carson-Newman or Marietta Middle School.

Presumably, at some point a college or university president (besides Eaton Kelly at Tulane) is going to come down from the mount and have the courage to say "enough is enough" to the Pentagon-powerful athletic departments.

This reduce the school's number of basketball scholarships by one for every three (counts) violations of NCAA rules. In Georgia's case, three. From 15 to 12, automatically.

Again, the message would be clear and coaches at other schools could make a clear decision when going to recruit. "Is this high school star worth cheating (losing one or more scholarships) to get?"

Fourth, put "no" on two years probation with "no" television revenue. None.

Some directors of athletics have speculated recently that such "sanctions would be the ruination of their departments. So be it. Starting from scratch would not be a bad idea for some and it would send a clear message to other NCAA members as well.

And so, yes, Georgia is the latest to get off with a wrist slap from the NCAA. It is laughable, a veritable comedy, the way college athletics is governed today. Cheating and speculating on who is doing how much has become as popular as the sport itself. The suspense involves who will get to the courthouse first to apply for immunity.

Dirty Tricks

As reported in this column a week ago, details on Georgia's NCAA rules violations were followed quickly by some finger-pointing at the University of Louisville.

UK documents submitted to the NCAA allege that U of L's basketball program through a Cardinal booster in Atlanta tampered with Henderson after the player was signed and delivered for the Bulldogs.

Naturally, Louisville coach Denny Crum denies all and who knows, a Bulldog recruiter who knowingly breaks NCAA rules is certainly capable of fabricating stories about alleged violations by another school. On the other hand, anyone who knows something about the ins and outs of college recruiting and is aware of its unwritten codes (you don't say bad things about how I do my job and I will do likewise), can visualize a scenario like the one described in UK's document.

This incident reminds me of the recruitment of Derrick Hord who signed with Kentucky in 1979. A month or so before Hord signed with UK, I visited his hometown—Bristol, Tenn.—and interviewed his coach, Bobby Chambers, and Hord's mother. I also learned that local alumni of Tennessee, Kentucky, Duke, North Carolina and Virginia all were trying to help their school land Hord.

By February the player had made it clear that he would attend UK, but the coaches—Joe Dean, Jr. was the recruiter—wanted him to wait to formally announce his choice.

Why? First, because it could compromise UK's recruiting other prospects. Second, verbal commit-

program, which made \$30 million in loans to finance 760 homes.

The mortgage revenue bond program is a project of the Eastern Kentucky Bankers Consortium for Mortgage Lending. The consortium is coordinated by MACED and consists of 94 banks in a 46 county region.

The consortium was originally formed in June, 1982. Its purpose is to promote the availability of more affordable mortgage loans by increasing the capacity of its member banks to use tools to facilitate the making of low rate, long term and low down payment financing. In an earlier initiative, the consortium has worked closely with the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation (commonly called Freddie Mac), a Federal agency which provides mortgage loans made by banks and other lenders. As a result, the number of consortium banks which are approved to do business with Freddie Mac has more than tripled, from six to 23. The consortium has also achieved success in its initiative to reform the Federal Housing Administration (FHA) insurance program by opening up the possibility for small, rural banks to use the FHA's new simplified processing procedures.

UK recognized, as in the case with Georgia whisking Henderson, and before him, Vern Fleming, away from Louisville, North Carolina might make an 11th hour run at persuading Hord to change his mind. So, Dean quietly "babysat" his prize until the NCAA signing date.

And, although Carolina and Duke — with the help of local boosters — reportedly made concerted last-minute recruiting efforts to change Hord's mind, Dean managed to hold onto his man.

In the Henderson debacle—as happened with Fleming—somebody seems to have slipped up in the babysitting stage of the process and Georgia recruiters got in and changed the kid's mind—for how much money or other inducements.

If any, we won't ever know. But UG is hinting that U of L continued to recruit Henderson on

the sly. And in fact, it is true that the player surfaced in Louisville during the summer and, to some extent, took part in a Cardinal summer basketball camp.

It is curious (perhaps) that since the Henderson flap got into NCAA investigator hands, Beasley has departed Athens to become head coach at Northeast Louisiana State.

There has been speculation that Beasley's departure was part of a Georgia agreement with the NCAA in its decision on how hard to come down on Bulldogs.

What will happen to Louisville in light of Georgia's allegations? Nothing. Beyond a few harsh words and continued hard feelings between the two roundball programs, business will go on as usual. In fact, a friend of mine said Thursday, Georgia feels like their one up on Louisville right now.

One up? "Georgia got Fleming and Henderson away from UL," he said.
