The mortgage revenue bond program is a project of the Eastern Kentucky Bankers Consortium for Mortgage Lending. The consoit-ium is coordinated by MACED and consists of 94 banks in a 46 county

consists of 94 banks in a 46 county region. The consortium was originally formed in June. 1982. Its purpose is to promote the availability of more affordable mortgage loans by increasing the capacity of its member banks to use tools to facilitate the making of low rate, long term and low down payment financing. In an earlier initiative, the consortium has worked closely with the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation (commonly called Freddie Mac), a Federal agency which provides mortgage loans made by banks and other lenders. As a result, the number of consortium banks which are approved to do business with Freddie Mac has more than tripled, from six to 23. The consortium has also achieved success in its initiative to reform the Federal Housing Administration (FHA) insurance program by opening up the possibility for small, rural banks to use the FHA's new simplified processing procedures.
