County budget estimated at \$832,383

A county budget for 1985-86 of \$832,383 that is about the same as the 1994-85 budget, had a first reading during the monthly meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court Tuesday.

The budget figures were estimated in May, and some changes could have occurred since that time.

that time.

General fund appropriations for the new budget total \$273,438.
Road Fund appropriations are \$366,545. Revenue sharing fund outlay is \$86,450. Local Government Economic Assistance funds total \$19,500, and the jail approp-riation is \$114,525.

Estimated county income is the same as appropriations, \$832,383.

A breakdown of each fund is

as follows:

State warns court on illegal dumps

The Kentucky Enforcement Branch of the Division of Waste Management has warned Rock-castle County officials to shape up its garbage disposal operation or face legal action that could mean a

In a letter dated May 10 that only surfaced at a Called meeting of the Rockastle Fiscal Court last Wednesday, the day after the primary election, the manager of the Enforcement Branch summoned county officials and Clarace (Jib) Hasty to Frankfort or a garbage compliance conference. In addition to Hasty, County Judge/Executive Bob Jasper and local attorney Carl Clontz, who was hired by the Fiscal Court at the Wednesday meeting, attended In a letter dated May 10 that

the votarisation from the conference that turned out to be a clean-it-up-or-else demand. Magistrates did not attend.

The // Kentucky General Assembly has mandated that open dumps be closed by July 15 or violators can be fined up to \$1,000 for each violation.

The letter stated the Division of Waste Management has determined upon reviewing information collected through inspections in response to complaints that Rock-castle County is in violation of Kentucky Solid Waste Laws and Regulations, and added that the county has "established, maintains, operates, and permits the operates, and permits the use of open dumps on county road right of ways" in violation of right-of-ways' in Kentucky Statutes

The letter pointed out that the county has "established and maintains unpermitted solid waste disposal facilities and open

dumps" at a roadside dump on Skaggs Creek Road on county right-of-way, and at a solid waste collection area just north of Pine

Collection are just with a transparent collection are just agent, the solid waste collection firm operated by Clarence Hasty, the county has established open dumps on the Clarence Hasty, the county has established open dumps on the Clarence Hasty farm, the Lambert-Turner property at Pine Hill, and the Carlos Lawrence property off Sand Springs Road.

"The failure to properly manage garbage presents a public nuisance," a threat to the health and safety of the public and potential for environmental damage," the letter continued.

Just what action can be taken Just what action can be taken by the fiscal court at this point in time is uncertain. None of the magistrates will be oay the court come Jan 1, and under those circumstances, it appears doubtful they would want to commit themselves to any long range decision on garbage. The state could ask Rock-castle Circuit Court for an injunction to force a decision from the magistrates, but that legal avenue is admittedly a long, tedious and argumentation to

argumentative one.







"There is a definite need of repair to the air conditioning system, the heat, and the roof. Chief among these needs is the repair to the roof. After the repair to the roof, the cellings need to be repaired and any asbestos fiber should be either replaced or sealer applied to them so they do not present a health hazard. There could be a good enamel paint applied as a sealer.


All areas of the courthouse, rooms, storage, etc., are in need of a good coat of enamel paint.


