





The men are all members of an adult reading program taught by volunteers at the Rockcastle County Library. The teachers are Egefraice Cox, Shiriley Martin, Geraldine Robbins, Wiletta Ow-ens, Libby Hammons and Betty Lewis.





Final sign-up date for County 1985 ACP funds

The Reckcastle County ASCS Office has amounced the second and final sign-up period for ACP practices as June 1 through July 15, according to June 1 through July 15, according to June 1 the Rockcastle Coun-ty ASC Committee. Mr. Brown states practices available to the county farmers include grass seedings, cover crops, water conservation and forestry practices. A more detailed listing of these practices available is available in the county office. One program available to farmers in this county with stipulations is the SL-8, Cover trop program. This program is made available to farmers who have not received cost share for this practice in the prior year. Cost share levels and vary with the maximum amount of cost share at he 40% isvel. Cover crops may be used for pasture but none of the sporkt may be harvested for hay used for pasture but none of the growth may be harvested for hay or seed. The life span for cover crops is the date of completion through March 1. 1986.

trrougn March 1, 1980. Grass seedings must first have a current soil sample in the County Extension Office before signing an ACP-245 form. Request for Cost Sharing. Soil samples are consid-ered current if made within one year of the time the practice is requested. Seeding practices have a life span of 5 years following the year of completion.

Water conservation practices Water conservation practices are to be supervised by the Soil Conservationist, David Stipes. If you have questions, you may contact the SCS office or phone 256/2541. These practices have a life span of 10 years following the year of completion.

Forestry practices are to be rvised by the Kentucky Divissuprised by the Kentucky Divis-ion of Forestry, Arrangements for these practices may be made through the Rockcastle County ASCS Office since the Kentucky Division of Forestry for this area is located in Pineville. These pract-ices also have a life span of 10 years following the year of comple-tion. cum

All requests must be filed and approved by the ASC Committee prior to the starting of work pertaining to the practice.

Participants receiving approv-als of ACP-245's are urged to carefully read the request form and do the work according to the instructions contained therein. Special attention should be given to the extent approved block as this could differ from the extent requested.

Participation in ASCS pro-grams administered is open to all eligible farmers regardless of race, color, age, sex, religion, handicap or national origin. Remember, July 15, 1985 is the deadline!



National peak beasons for some fruits are: apples. October to March; nectar-ines. Russell Parsons, dairyman, teacher puts in a lot of hours at his two jobs

Dairying can be tough, but with determination and up-to-date dairying procedures, it can be a profitable business, concludes Russell Parsons, dairyman, and teacher, who has made his own dairy business a profitable one. During this June Dairy Month, Parsons comes to mind as an example of a dairyman who has remained "tough" in carrying out dairying as a business, and it is fitting" that he be reconcized as

remained "fough" in carrying out dairying as a business, and it is fitting that he be recognized as one of the county's top dairymen. His view of the dairy situation is that it will continue to be tough in years to come. "We must get tough and stay tough to survive." he stated "To stay in business we must fill our milk tanks with less cows in the milk line." Anytime you have a large number of people wanting a product, they will insist it be as cheap as possible, he continued Milk prices have remained the same for years, however, equip-ment, seed, family dös days a user. But over the years the industry has changed. As you visit the dairy section of any grocery store, the diversity of the industry tore, days the traditional prod-ucts from milk and cheese to specially products, such as yougs ucts from milk and cheese to specialty products, such as youg-

Dairy farms also show this diversity in breed of cattle, crops

produced, management and own-ership. The Parsons farm, located near Brodhead, is surely an example of diversity. Parsons farms about 150 acres of tillable land. His crops include 30 acres of small grains cut for sliage and double cropped with for for slage. Forty eight acres have recently been set aside for lafafa. Three-and-a-balf acres are used for tobacco production, with the remaining land used for pasture. All of the feed produced along with purchased supplements are

pasture. All of the feed produced along with purchased supplements are used to feed the near 100 head herd of Holsteins. An average of 60 cows will make up the milk herd: however, a large number of col cows will make up the milk herd: however, a large number of replacement helfers must be raised. Parsons noted that for a successful farm, breeding to pro-own artificial insemination bulls is important. He started using arti-ficial insemination 10 to 12 years ago with technicians coming to the farm. During the past four to five equipment and does it himself. In examining his records, he is quick to point out that artificial insemination is important and

insemination is important and being put to use in his replace-ment heifers.

ment heifers. Fifty three of the lactating cows are in their second lactation or younger. By culling the low producers and bringing in young superior producing cows, he has raised his rolling herd average nearly 2,000 pounds per cow. The artificial insemination

program is also part of his plan to move toward a registered herd. He points out how long this has taken and that it has allowed him to have the National Holstein Association of America to classify his herd, probably the first herd locally to get this service. This will enable the use of computer maining to get this service. Dairy herd improvement rec-ords have also been an important management tool. Local techni-cian. From this, Parsons receives management sheets which help him keep up with the large number of cattle. Since he is a vocational agriculture teacher and vocational agriculture teacher and spends much of his time with teaching, the records have been even more valuable. Through his breeding, management, and use of the records, his rolling herd average is nearing 15,000 pounds per cow per year over the past 12 months.

months. Parsons points out that he could not do all this by himself. James Brown is herdsman and responsible for milking and feed-ing. Gien Roberts is relief milker and takes care of most of the crops. J. B. Stevens is also a relief milker and assits with the crops. 


