kinfolk everybody should have. Recently she gifted me with a pretty birthday cake. "But mine was away back in January," I told her.

"I know, but you didn't have a birthday cake this year, so I made one for you. I put four candles on it. Ten years for each. Didn't you claim to turn 40 since you've been 39 so long?"

I didn't answer, but started eating cake.

The large white house sitting on a nearly mowed lawn off the main road in Scaffold Cane is the home of Clint Dooley. I had come to see him because his granddaughter, Sammy Sutton, said, "Grandpa wants you to come and talk to him for he reads your column."

We sat on the porch and talked of the Red Hill country near Three Links where Clint grew up. He had read where I talked of my dad who once lived in that section of the country as a boy. "I used to ride up and down the roads over there, too," Clint said.

He and wife, Genevieve, had lived there for 51 years with family. Genevieve was taken ill and now stays in a nursing home while Clint at age 77 lives there on the farm alone. A daughter lives nearby.

Out in the yard was an old well 32 feet deep which interested me. Some boards lay across it, held down by a large rock that had come from an Indian graveyard nearby. Clint doesn't use the well since he had county water brought to his home by pipeline. A chestnut tree about 10 years old grew in the yard but I don't know if it had any chestnuts on it.

Clint talked a lot about life in the past and last years where living alone had brought many changes, but he is living each day as it comes.

I wanted to know about the large lake that once lay on this Lincoln land for it had been a scary tale in my youth. "Yes, there was a large lake that covered about 1 1/2 acres on this farm. Folks would come and swim in the lake or walk around it. One night, Mr. Bill Linville, who owned the land, became very sick after he hadn't been well for a few days. The family took him to the hospital where he was expected to die.

I went up to the lake the next morning to see about feeding the stock nearby and looked out over

the field to see the water.

It wasn't there! Nothing met my eye but a large field of wet mud. Only near the middle was a big hole about 12 feet across. Going to the house I told the family that the lake had gone. They were as shocked as all the people who came from miles around to see a lake that had sunk into the earth. The way it was figured was the pressure from underground that drew it down. Then a neighbor, Benny Anglin, who lived in Anglin Hollow several miles below Scaffold Cane, said that his cornfields became flooded even though there was no rain.

This whole event was the cause of much talk for many years to come.

"Did you go over to see the hole?" I asked Clint. "No, I didn't go around but a cow fell over it once."

Mr. Linville did not die that night but passed away later. Some thought it was an omen.

It was a terrible time on Clear Creek last week. A kind of mini-tornado swept up the valley in an afternoon storm with hail so large Cleve Payne's hair stood on end. "I never was so scared in my life," he told John, who had gone out later to see the hail-covered ground.

"You could reach down anywhere and gather up a handful of ice," John said. "Mitchell Abrams called Cleve to say he had window panes broken by the force of the hailstones."

I haven't heard from John Harding yet to see how his clear roofed plastic panels held out.

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

# Happiness is learning to read thru libraries Learn to Read program

For six Rockcastle County men, happiness is being able to read.

After years locked into a world of unfamiliar words and symbols, the six men can now read the label on a can without relying on the picture.

A sign is no longer a mystery. They now know some signs mean no smoking, ladies, men, exit, stairs, bank, stop and hundreds of other informational and directional words most of us learned long ago.

The men are all members of an adult reading program taught by volunteers at the Rockcastle County Library. The teachers are: Bessie Cox, Shirley Martin, Geraldine Robbins, Wileta Owens, Libby Hammons and Betty Lewis.

They give their students one hour once a week, devoting time mostly to reading but with a small amount of writing for good measure if the student wants it. They'll continue in the program until they finish five specially designed books.

The men range from their twenties to their fifties and as Mrs. Owens reported, most of them would not want their names known. It could be embarrassing.

The students were in school years ago, but not long enough to make much headway. They dropped out of school for a variety of reasons, such as to find a job, or to work on the farm. All are or have been married.

There are no women in the local program which seems strange and it can only be speculated that women more likely stay in school longer. In short, there is a higher rate of illiteracy in men than in women.

One of the early founders of the Learn to Read program was Lois Gross of Hazard and Don Amburgey, regional librarian in the Kentucky River Region who helped arrange funding for the program.

Since 1981, Mrs. Gross and Amburgey have pooled their resources. A total of 650 students have been enrolled in the Kentucky River Region that encompasses Letcher, Leslie, Perry,

Knott, Lee, Breathitt, Wolf and Owsley Counties. Since then, other areas have become a part of the reading program, including Rockcastle.

The program, technically, teaches the "Laubach Way to Reading." The five books were designed by a minister, whose congregation could not read, in order to give the adults practical introduction.

When talking with Mrs. Gross, she is always anxious to tell about her successes.

One man, 96, had only one wish—to sign his name before he died. He is still taking weekly reading lessons and ignoring his advanced age.

Another learned to write his wife's name—his long desired gift for her.

Mrs. Gross reported some of her students cry when they begin the program, because they want to read so badly. It takes nerve to come to the classes, and once there, they sometimes cry. Some are very happy, and sing their way into the class.

One 49-year-old man said he felt ashamed when he had to say he couldn't read. After seeing people come to classes, he felt more at ease and enrolled in the program.

"I learned quite a bit," he said. "I'm going to learn a lot more. I don't want to have to ask someone what a sign says, or how to write a check, or what the newspaper says. Reading is a wonderful experience."

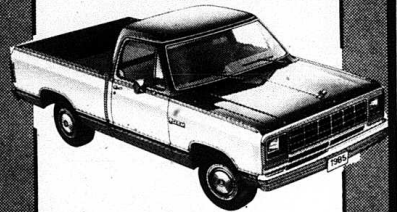

## Grand Jury indicts three

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury has indicted at least three people in their most recent session, and all three indicted are local men.

Ottie Kirby, of Rt. 5, Mt. Vernon, was indicted for wanton endangerment in the first degree. His indictment stemmed from a May 11 incident in which he allegedly pointed a cocked gun at the head and back of Wanda McKinney of Rt. 1, Mt. Vernon and threatened to kill her.

Kirby, who is already under indictment for first degree assault, is scheduled for June 29 arraignment in Circuit Court. He is free on this charge after posting a \$5,000 property bond.

A Clear Creek man, Jeffery Dale King, of Rt. 2, Mt. Vernon, was indicted for assault in the first degree after he allegedly struck Donald R. Hale with a "2x4" causing a skull fracture, broken jaw and teeth and physical injury.

The incident allegedly occurred on April 28. King is free on \$10,000 property bond and is due back in court on June 28 for arraignment.

Hubert Gene Gray of Scaffold Cane was also indicted for first degree assault after he allegedly shot Billy Joe Prewitt of Mt. Vernon on March 3 with a shotgun.

Gray, who filled \$5,000 property bond, will be arraigned on June 28.

## Jury awards Payne for land for 461 by-pass

A Rockcastle Circuit Court jury has awarded Clyde and Myrtle Payne \$48,500 for property needed by the Kentucky Department of Highways for the KY 461 by-pass around Mt. Vernon.

By earlier agreement, the Paynes will also receive \$30,000 to move his business and \$500 for use of a portion of his property during construction of the highway.

Payne rejected the offer made by the department for the property, which includes 5/2 acres, but that amount has not been disclosed.

A commission of three local residents set a price of \$226,500 for the entire property to be taken by the state, but the state appealed that amount as excessive.

The property is at the intersection of new KY 461 and U.S. 150.

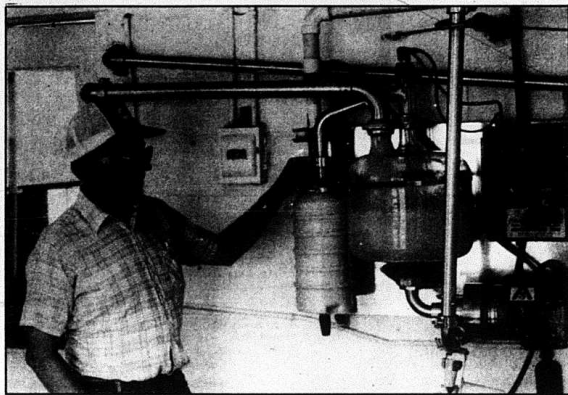

## Lake swimming pondered

Swimming in Lake Linville may become a thing of the past now that cities are no longer immune to liability suits based on negligence.

That possibility, coupled with a lack of money to provide supervision in the swimming area at the lake, may bring an end to the "old swimming hole."

City Attorney Carl Clontz informed the council at its Monday night meeting the council could have "a real problem" if the council "establishes a swimming area open to the public without supervision."

He recited a recent ruling by the Kentucky Supreme Court that held London responsible, and careless, when a city work crew, looking for a water line, dug into a gas line causing a fire that destroyed property.

Clontz concluded a lifeguard at the beach area could be considered supervision, but that it could cost a salary for the lifeguard who would at least get the minimum wage.

Clontz added that failure to provide supervision could cause the city's liability insurance to "go sky high."

The council agreed it did not have the money for a lifeguard.

The discussion of swimming at the lake surfaced when about 20 persons came to the council meeting with a fist full of pamphlets when the council was emphasized when the council was told Blue Cross has informed the city it will raise employee health

complaints about swimming at the lake and inquiring about city policy toward swimming.

Spokesman for the group, Ray Mullins, said he was ticketed for standing in the lake ankle deep holding his small child in an area of the lake not designated for swimming.

Mullins told the council the beach area is filthy, the swimming area knee deep in mud and scattered with broken glass. He asked the council to clean it up, get a lifeguard and place garbage cans and see that they were used.

Mayor Roland Mullins recited the city ordinance designating a certain area for swimming and providing a fine up to \$50 for violation. The mayor told the group the ordinance was passed after six drownings occurred at the lake, and it would take at least 60 days to change the ordinance.

"We felt we needed to make it safer for the public so we set aside a definite swimming area and prohibited swimming in other areas," the mayor said.

He restated that the city does not have the money to hire a full-time guard at the beach.

When the discussion finally ended, Mayor Mullins asked the Recreation Committee to meet at the lake with representatives of the group Thursday (today) and try to work something out, based on any future problems the city might have.

The city's financial status was insurance rates considerably. The new rate for a family policy will now be \$218.91 a month, up from

\$182.23, or a yearly increase for the city of \$5,199. The city's annual health insurance bill will now be \$31,392.

"That throws our budget into a tailspin," the mayor lamented. "We only get \$44,000 from property taxes, so it is easy to see our problem."

He asked councilmen and city (Cont. to A-5)

## Board hires Perkins, Larkey for coaching positions at RCHS

The waiting is over and Rockcastle County High School has two new head coaches for the 1985-86 school year.

At last Thursday's school board meeting the local board voted unanimously to hire John Thomas Larkey as the new head football coach at RCHS.

According to School Superintendent Charles Parsons, Larkey comes from Laurel County where he was head coach for four years in the early 1970's. Parsons said that while at Laurel County Larkey compiled three winning seasons out of four, and a 500 season.

The superintendent said it was his understanding that Larkey would move his family to Rockcastle when he took over as coach. Parsons said the former Laurel County teacher is married and has two children, a small child and a 15-year-old son.

The board voted to pay him \$3,000 a year to coach, besides his teaching salary. He will teach Social Studies at the high school.

Parsons also announced last Tuesday that the selection committee had made their choice on a new head basketball coach, although he will not be hired until the July meeting.

David Perkins, a nine-year veteran of head coaching will get the job, according to Parsons, who

said the committee wrapped up their interviews Monday night. The last applicant interviewed was Berea coach Tony Cox.

Parsons said that Perkins, who is 30 years old, is leaving the Jackson city schools after coaching there for nine years.

Perkins played college basketball at Cumberland College and at Murray State, according to Parsons, who said the selection committee was very impressed with Perkins' overall record.

Perkins, who will move to the county with his wife, is a native of Monticello and will be paid \$3,000 a year extra to coach basketball. He will teach health at the high school.

Although the board has taken no action, all indications are that Brodhead Elementary School coach, Gary Scott, will be Perkins' assistant.

In other business, Superintendent Parsons told the board that five teachers and finance officer, Lloyd Shotts, intended to retire from the school system, effective June 30.

The five teachers retiring are Mrs. Mary Saylor, Mrs. Laura Ruth Durham, Mrs. Juanita Norris, Mrs. Alvania Falin and Mrs. Elizabeth Baker.

The board gave Parsons authority to transfer Mrs. Barbara Hiatt to Rockcastle County High (Cont. to A-5)

## Berea youth drowns Saturday

A Berea youth drowned in the Rockcastle River Saturday while on an outing with his church group.

According to Rockcastle Coroner Bill Dowell, Jeff Watkins, 15, of Rt. 3, Dogwood Drive, Berea, drowned at approximately 1:30 Saturday after he fell out of a canoe and into the river.

Dowell said that Watkins was a non-swimmer but a life jacket was in the canoe at the time of the accident.

The local coroner said that it was his understanding that Watkins originally fell into water which was not over his head, but the youth never surfaced again after falling into the river.

Watkins was with a party of 10 people from the Liberty Avenue Baptist Church in Berea, who had rented canoes from a London

based canoe livery to make a trip down what is commonly called "the upper half of the river," according to a dispatcher at the London State Police post.

Dowell said the tragic accident occurred near the Old 90 bridge, approximately 1 1/2 miles from where Eagle Creek dumps into the river.

Dowell said Watkins' body was found by two members of the Somerset-Pulaski County Rescue Squad, Paul Commer and Craig Richardson, on the Rockcastle side of the river around 2 p.m. Monday after a two-day search of the river. Dowell said Watkins' body was about 1/4 mile down the river from where the accident occurred.

Members of the Rockcastle County, Southeastern Kentucky, Somerset-Pulaski, Laurel and Berea Rescue Squads joined in the

search for Watkins.

Watkins was the first fatality claimed by the river thus far in 1985 in Rockcastle County.

Watkins was a native of Berea, a student at Madison Central High School in Richmond, where he was a member of the band. A former Cub Scout, Watkins was a member of the Liberty Avenue Baptist Church in Berea.

He is survived by his parents, James and Mary Watkins; one sister, Bethany Carol Watkins, at home; maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Isaacs, of Rt. 3, Berea; and paternal grandmother, Mrs. Helen Watkins.

Services were held Wednesday at 1 p.m. at the Liberty Avenue Baptist Church by Rev. John Reichard. Burial was in the Isaacs family cemetery in Rockcastle County.

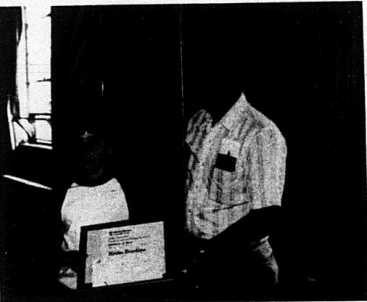

# Building a future for our graduates

This spring, hundreds of Fifth District high school and college seniors will be participating in commencement exercises, including those right in your own county.

While education continues to be an area of concern to all of us, we can look ahead to a brighter future for these graduates, thanks to the overall economic growth our nation has created over the past year.

Just recently, Kentucky's unemployment rate fell to 7.6 percent, the lowest rate since October of 1981. Yes, the unemployment rate in some of our coal counties is much higher, but even those rates are down from past months. What is most encouraging is that all the rates have been dropping as Kentucky's economy begins to pick up. And that bodes well for our high school and college graduates who are now entering the job market.

On a national scale, we are sending similar improvements. Key interest rates have fallen significantly in recent weeks—still too high, but low enough to help our housing industry increase building of new homes and to allow Americans to buy more cars and other items on credit.

These graduates also will enter a world where the United States continues at peace. We are standing tall around the world once more and are working on numerous fronts to expand democracy and to protect liberty.

### Final sign-up date for County 1985 ACP funds

The Rockcastle County ASCS Office has announced the second and final sign-up period for ACP practices as June 1 through July 15, according to James E. Brown, Chairman of the Rockcastle County ASCS Committee.

Mr. Brown states practices available to the county farmers include grass seedings, cover crops, water conservation and forestry practices. A more detailed listing of these practices available is available in the county office.

One program available to farmers in this county with stipulations is the SL-8, Cover Crop program. This program is made available to farmers who have not received cost share for this practice in the past. Cost share levels may vary with the maximum amount of cost share at the 40% level. Cover crops may be used for pasture but none of the growth may be harvested for hay or seed. The life span for cover crops is the date of completion through March 1, 1986.

Grass seeding establishments and re-seedings must first have a current soil sample in the County Extension Office before signing an ACP-245 form. Request for Cost Sharing. Soil samples are considered current if made within one year of the time the practice is requested. Seeding practices have a life span of 5 years following the year of completion.

Water conservation practices are to be supervised by the Soil Conservationists, David Stipes. If you have questions, you may contact the SCS office or phone 256-2541. These practices have a life span of 10 years following the year of completion.

Forestry practices are to be supervised by the Kentucky Division of Forestry. Arrangements for these practices may be made through the Rockcastle County ASCS Office since the Kentucky Division of Forestry for this area is located in Pineville. These practices also have a life span of 10 years following the year of completion.

All requests must be filed and approved by the ASC Committee prior to the starting of work pertaining to the practice.

Participants receiving approvals of ACP-245's are urged to carefully read the request form and do the work according to the instructions contained therein. Special attention should be given to the extent approved block as this could differ from the extent requested.

Participation in ASCS programs administered is open to all eligible farmers regardless of race, color, age, sex, religion, handicap or national origin. Remember, July 15, 1985 is the deadline!

But our local economy continues to be the key to these graduates' futures. 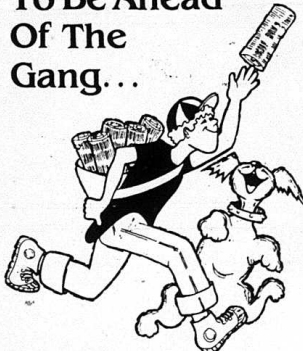

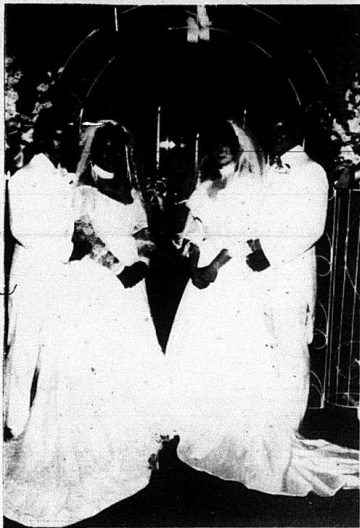

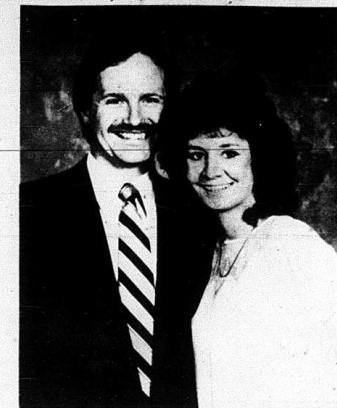

employees to meet with representatives of the insurance company, and to contact other companies, to try to reduce costs without reducing benefits.

He also asked Councilman Joe Martin to discuss the city's electric bill with Kentucky Utilities to see if the city's \$48,865 annual electric bill can be reduced.

No one offered much hope that either the insurance or electric bills could be changed or reduced.

It took the council only about 30 seconds to bring up and pass a so-called police department "nepotism ordinance" that drew some heat at a recent meeting.

Nepotism came up in a letter to the council from Mayor Mullins setting up rules and regulations governing the hiring of future policemen by the council, including preventing hiring of relatives of councilmen.

The vote was unanimous and the guidelines were accepted.

A bid of \$2,470 to audit the city books was approved by the council, the only bid received. Doing the auditing will be Griffin, Greer and Co., of Mt. Vernon.

The council also voted to make a \$25 contribution to the Rockcastle Council for the Arts.

### PERFECTLY PLEASING PRESERVES

An old-fashioned tradition that is experiencing a new surge in popularity is "putting up" homemade preserves. Sprayed on freshly baked biscuits or served alongside grilled chops or roasted meats, preserves take you back to the quality cooking your grandma used to serve. These distinctive recipes have been developed to suit today's smaller households, busier lifestyles and sophisticated tastes.

#### Pointers for Fruit Preserving:

**1. Choose and Clean Fruits Carefully.** For the best-tasting preserves, choose the freshest fruit that is ripe but firm. National peak seasons for some fruits are: apples, October to March; nectarines, July to August; peaches, June to August; raspberries, June to July; strawberries, April to June. Ask your grocer for other seasonal peaks. Avoid bruised or blemished fruit. Remove small bruises. Fruits should always be thoroughly washed before cutting or cooking.

**2. Avoid Fruit Discoloration.** Once cut, it is necessary to prevent darkening of peaches, nectarines, apples and pears by dipping them in lemon juice or salt water.

**3. Utensils—What Works Best?** For freezer jams, any small jar with a tight-fitting lid will work. For preserves calling for processing in water bath, a standard home canning jar with a threaded neck and self-sealing lid is necessary. All jars and lids should be washed and sterilized for 15 minutes in boiling water before use.

**4. Headspace is Important.** Leave the correct amount of "headspace" or airspace between the mixture and the top of the jar. Headspace is about 1/2 inch for fruits and 1/4 inch for jams and other preserves. This allows for expansion during cooling or freezing.

**5. Water Bath is Recommended Processing Method for Fruit Preserves.** To complete a water bath, pack hot food in sterilized jars; clean jar rim and seal; set jar on rack in canner with boiling water 1 to 2 inches above jar lids; leave space between jars for even heating; once water boils again, set timer according to recipe; remove jars and cool.

**6. Test for Seal.** As jars cool, a pop indicates a seal. Some jars take over 12 hours, but to make sure, follow the jar manufacturer's directions for testing the seal.

#### PEACH FREEZER JAM (Makes about 4 cups)

- 2 cups pared, crushed fresh peaches (about 2 pounds)
- 3 1/4 cups sugar
- 1 (3 fluid ounce) pouch liquid fruit pectin (about 7 tablespoons)
- 3 tablespoons lemon juice

In large bowl, combine peaches and sugar; mix well. Let stand 10 minutes. In small bowl, combine pectin and lemon juice; pour over peaches. Stir thoroughly 3 minutes (a few sugar crystals will remain). Spoon into glass or plastic containers; cover. Let stand at room temperature 24 hours. Store in freezer.  
Tip: Small amounts can be refrigerated; covered, 2 to 3 weeks.

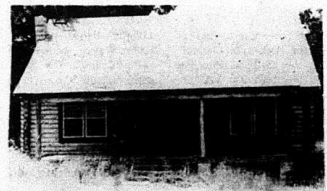

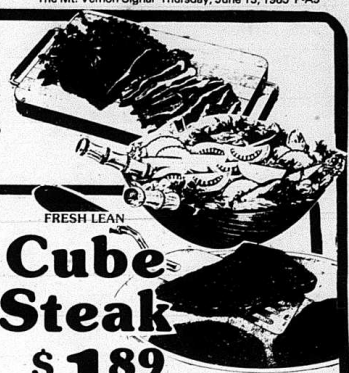

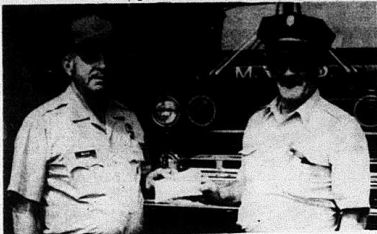

**"The Spirit Speaketh Expressly"**

Those of us who believe the Bible to be the inspired Word of God recognize what it means when the Spirit speaks expressly. The Holy Spirit is he whom Jesus referred to as the "Spirit of Truth" (John 14:17). It is He whom the Father was to send to guide the apostles "into all truth" (John 16:13). He revealed the mind of God who "cannot lie" (Titus 1:2). Therefore, we know and appreciate the fact that when the Spirit speaks expressly, He speaks truth. We can put our complete trust and confidence in what He says.

"Now the Spirit speaketh expressly, that in the later times some shall depart from the faith, giving heed to seducing spirits and doctrines of devils; speaking lies in hypocrisy; having their conscience seared with a hot iron, forbidding to marry and commanding to abstain from meats, which God hath created to be received with thanksgiving to them which believe and know the truth" (I Tim. 4:1-3).

"Some shall depart from the faith," spoke the Spirit expressly. Just as it is impossible to depart from a city in which one has never been, so it is impossible to depart from the faith if one was never "in" the faith. Who are they that are IN THE FAITH? Christians! They are the ones who are instructed to "stand fast in the faith" (I Cor. 16:13). It is never said of a sinner that he is "in the faith." One cannot be in the Devil's kingdom and be in the faith at the same time. Those who give heed to "doctrines of devils" have departed from the faith. So speaks the Spirit expressly.

Let no one deceive you into thinking that a Christian can't depart from the faith and be lost. One who "speaks lies in hypocrisy," embraces "doctrines of devils," gives heed to "seducing spirits" and has a conscience so seared as to be beyond feeling is certainly not saved! The Spirit speaks expressly that it is not only POSSIBLE for those once in the faith to depart from it, it is CERTAIN for some.

The Spirit speaks expressly

that some who depart from the faith will "speak lies in hypocrisy." Hypocrisy is pretention. Hence, they pretend to be speaking truth while actually speaking lies. Such are those of whom the apostle Paul warned the Ephesian elders: "Of your own selves (from among their own ranks) shall men arise, speaking perverse things, to draw away disciples after them." (Acts 20:29-30). "Be ware of false prophets, which come to you in sheep's clothing, but inwardly they are ravening wolves," said Jesus (Matt. 7:15). Remember that they are hypocrites, so they do not advertise their wickedness. An outward appearance of goodness is no guarantee that the piety is genuine. "Try the spirits whether they be of God" (I John 4:1).

The Spirit speaks expressly that some will "forbid to marry and command to abstain from meats." We can know assuredly that those who so forbid and command are not in the faith, such are "doctrines of devils" and are thus not to be heeded. The Spirit says, rather than ABSTAIN from meats, receive them with thanksgiving-God created them for that purpose.

If you have ever been commanded to abstain from meats by a religious leader, you can be sure the commandment did not come from one who is in the faith. Neither does the forbidding of certain ones to marry, come from those in the faith. Many of these traditions of men, though vain, began with those who departed from the faith, have been carried on for centuries, and are still in evidence today.

A familiar TV commercial wants us to know that when a certain stockbroker speaks, people listen. It is our prayer that when the "Spirit speaketh expressly," ALL will listen.

program will include nutrition education, free meal and snack, hiking and crafts.

Youth wishing to register should come to the county extension office, second floor of the courthouse. Deadline for registration is June 14.

All children will be served the same meal at no separate charge regardless of race, color, national origin, age, sex, or handicap and there will be discrimination in the food service. The Summer Food Service Program is being sponsored by the Kentucky Department of Education and the USDA, Washington, D. C.

**Veterans' Administration**

Following are representative questions answered daily by VA counselors. Full information is available at any VA office.

Q-I have a VA Government Life Insurance policy and also receive VA disability compensation. I often worry about forgetting to pay my premiums. To avoid this possibility can my premiums be deducted from my compensation payments?

A-Yes. Deduction of premiums from your compensation check can be established by completing an Insurance Deduction Authorization and mailing it to the VA Insurance Center. You can obtain this form from your nearest VA office.

Q-My brother is having some personal problems. His wife says he often has nightmares about Vietnam. What can the VA do to help?

A-The VA has a network of Vet Centers throughout the country staffed by counselors who have been specially trained to help Vietnam veterans. Vet Centers are located in most larger metropolitan areas. To find the one nearest you, call a VA facility in your state.

Q-My husband is a World War I veteran who does not receive any VA benefits. Is he eligible for VA outpatient treatment?

A-Yes. A World War I veteran may receive VA outpatient treatment for any disability even though he is not receiving VA benefits.

Q-Will the VA furnish a headstone or marker when a veteran's remains are donated to science?

A-Yes. A memorial headstone or marker will be furnished when requested, at the expense of the United States, to commemorate any veteran whose remains were donated to science; were cremated and the ashes scattered without interment of any portion of the ashes; whose remains have not been recovered or identified; or whose remains were buried at sea, whether by the veteran's choice or otherwise. Placement of the memorial marker must be in a National Cemetery, in a state veterans' cemetery or, by the applicant, in any local or private cemetery.

Q-I would like to know who is the beneficiary on my father's NSLI insurance policy. Who may I write to for this information?

A-The VA Regional Office and Insurance Center with jurisdiction of the policy (either Philadelphia, Penn. 19102 or St. Paul, Minn. 55111) can provide this information, normally only to the policyholder.

Q-I receive service-connected disability compensation and have a rating of 30 percent. I just got married. Can I receive additional funds for my wife?

A-Yes. Veterans whose service-connected disabilities are rated at 30 percent or more are entitled to additional allowances for dependents.

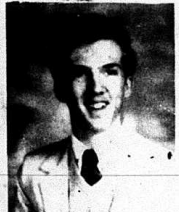

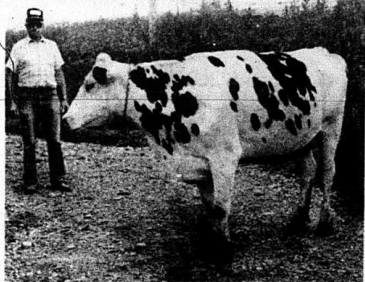

"To stay in business we must fill our milk tanks with less cows in the milk line."</p> <p>Anytime you have a large number of people wanting a product, they will insist it be as cheap as possible, he continued. Milk prices have remained the same for years, however, equipment, seed, fertilizer and labor have increased.</p> <p>Dairying is an industry that touches each family 365 days a year. But over the years the industry has changed. As you visit the dairy section of any grocery store, the diversity of the industry is apparent with traditional products from milk and cheese to specialty products, such as yogurt.</p> <p>Dairy farms also show this diversity in breed of cattle, crops produced, management and ownership.</p> <p>The Parsons farm, located near Brothead, is surely an example of diversity.</p> <p>Parsons farms about 150 acres of tillable land. His crops include 30 acres of small grains cut for silage and double cropped with corn for silage. Forty eight acres have recently been set aside for alfalfa. Three-and-a-half acres are used for tobacco production, with the remaining land used for pasture.</p> <p>All of the feed produced along with purchased supplements are used to feed the near 100 head herd of Holsteins. An average of 60 cows will make up the milk herd; however, a large number of replacement heifers must be raised.</p> <p>Parsons noted that for a successful farm, breeding to proven artificial insemination bulls is important. He started using artificial insemination 10 to 12 years ago with technicians coming to the farm. During the past four to five years he has purchased the equipment and does it himself.</p> <p>In examining his records, he is quick to point out that artificial insemination is important and being put to use in his replacement heifers.</p> <p>Fifty three of the lactating cows are in their second lactation or younger. By culling the low producers and bringing in young superior producing cows, he has raised his rolling herd average nearly 2,000 pounds per cow.</p> <p>The artificial insemination program is also part of his plan to move toward a registered herd. He points out how long this has taken and that it has allowed him to have the National Holstein Association of America to classify his herd, probably the first herd locally to get this service. This will enable the use of computer mating to select bulls which will enhance specific dairy characteristics.</p> <p>Dairy herd improvement records have also been an important management tool. Local technician, Billy Cameron, visits the Parsons farm each month to weigh and sample milk from each cow. Farm records such as breeding, calving, dry date, and many others are recorded for computer analysis.</p> <p>From this, Parsons receives management sheets which help him keep up with the large number of cattle. Since he is a vocational agriculture teacher and spends much of his time with teaching, the records have been even more valuable. Through his breeding, management, and use of the records, his rolling herd average is nearing 15,000 pounds per cow per year over the past 12 months.</p> <p>Parsons points out that he could not do all this by himself. James Brown is herdman and responsible for milking and feeding. Glen Roberts is relief milker and takes care of most of the crops. J. B.
