He let his gaze go to the horizon of dark blue hills to the south along the skyline of Rockcastle and then back to me as he added, "I would go back and live out my days there if I could."

Bill and I were sitting in the living room of Daisy's, his wife, and his home on the edge of Berea.

I had come to talk to one of the hill country's successful boys. It was in 1911 that Bill Finnell, as a boy with the family, was brought to Rockcastle's Loman Hill by his father, Ott Finnell, from Madison County. He grew up there helping

his father farm and work in a sawmill. Bill would play with the boys on Clear Creek and grew up as a gentlemanly person, a trait which he carried a lifetime.

The cliffs, woods, hill streams and big rocks installed in Bill a great love for the hill country.

But ambitious for the future, Bill saw he couldn't make it there on the hills. He left Clear Creek to enter school at Berea College.

That was the starting point that earned Bill the title of a business and civic leader of Berea in the following years. He made good and received awards for bringing industry to the community of Berea.

Bill Finnell retired from work but always his thoughts were of the peaceful hills where his early life was spent. So drawn was he to the homeplace with its huge log house home, that Bill bought, and has kept, the property after his parents passed away. He came often from Berea to linger on the land and looked forward to his last days being on it whenever he could.

But Bill was marked to the death when a foe which he fought until May 14, 1985, when at 81 years of age, he crossed the bar and put out on the unknown seas.

My last time to see this boyhood friend was in the hospital where in spite of the pain he was suffering, Bill clasped my hand in

farewell and gave me his always friendly smile.

My thoughts were with this man as I left the hospital and I said to myself, "There goes about the last of his kind of man-gentlemanly."

Now I hear, and it came straight by the grapevine, that there are a nice bunch of Signal readers out on the Big Hill road near Christmas Ridge who are having a great time sharing the Mt. Vernon Signal just as they would share their favorite recipes. Naomi Hall deserves "honorable mention" since the paper comes to her. 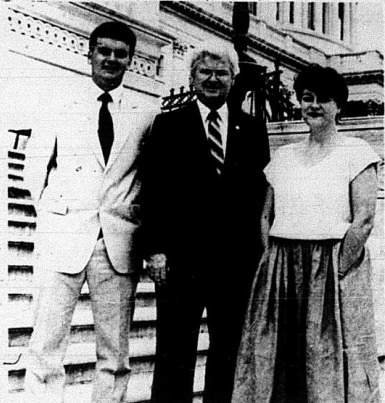

- 1 medium onion, finely chopped (approx. ½ cup)
- 1 medium green pepper, chopped (approx. ¾ cup)
- 2 cups (8 ounces) shredded Cheddar cheese

- ¼ cup corn meal
- 2 eggs; beaten
- ¾ cup milk
- ½ teaspoon salt
- ¼ teaspoon pepper

To Prepare Vegetables: Cut corn from cob; scrape cob to remove pulp. Peel and seed tomato before chopping. Peel onion; chop. Seed green pepper; chop. In large bowl, combine corn, tomato, onion, green pepper, cheese and corn meal; let stand 30 minutes. Add milk, salt, pepper to beaten eggs; mix well. Pour vegetable mixture into a buttered, shallow 2-quart baking dish. Pour egg mixture over top. Bake in preheated 325 degree F oven for 35 to 40 minutes or until set.

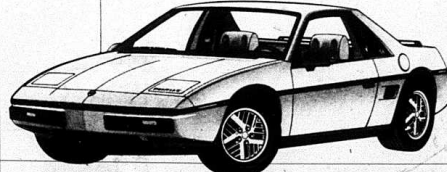

Livingston tests area water drain patterns

A survey of water drainage patterns to determine their effect on, and potential hazards to, Livingston city water is under way, according to Mayor Bro. Billy Medley.

David Leo, a geology student at Eastern Kentucky University, is making the survey for the city, which is the sponsor. It is expected to be completed in about two months.

The survey is also in conjunction with a thesis Leo is doing at the university.

Blue dye will be put into streams, springs, sinkholes and surface water runoff to see if the dye surfaces at or near the Boils, an underground water source that surfaces in Roundstone Creek near the old depot site. The Boils is the source for city water.

The water is not being tested for purity, the mayor emphasized. "We just want to watch for the blue dye."

"What we want to do is map out the area where our water mostly comes from as a protective measure," he continued. "If we should have a chemical spill of some kind as far away as the interstate and as near as the railroad, we could go to a map and see if our water would be contaminated from the spill."

Although the mayor did not say, the survey could also be used to determine if trash and garbage dumped along roadways or the river bank would contaminate the water.

He said the city is furnishing Leo with living quarters, gasoline and groceries until he finishes the survey. The city will also help him with some other costs and gratuities.

Mayor Medley said the city is fortunate to have the student available this summer to do the survey. Waiting for the state to get into the type of survey might take a long time, he added.

"If the state does get into this type of survey, usually the larger towns get the funds first and the smaller towns last," he stated. "I think with the help of area residents in finding springs and sinkholes we will come up with a good survey. We hope residents will tell us about them."

The mayor also reported the city has a new police officer. He is Charles (Bud) Lovell of Livingston who in the past has been a police officer in Livingston.

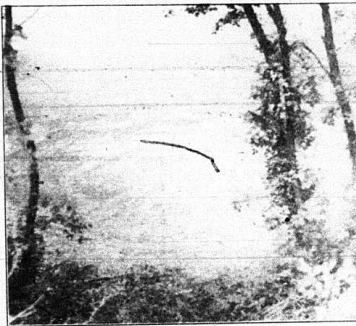
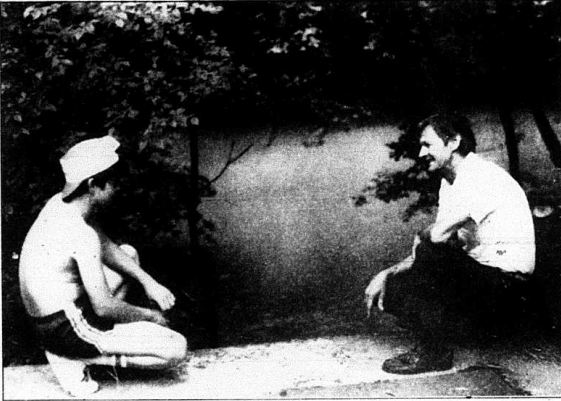
Two exposed after rabid cow dies Sunday

Rockcastle Health Department officials have confirmed the death of a calf, owned by Miller Debord on Poplar Grove Road, was caused by rabies.

Mrs. Debord reported Wednesday Kentucky Health Department pathologists in Lexington confirmed the rabies diagnosis and had advised her husband and Kenneth Parsons to take the prescribed five rabies shots. Beth had contact with the calf. They were not bitten, but may have been contaminated by saliva.

Mrs. Debord said the 325-pound steer bawled continually Saturday night. Veterinarian Bill Adams was called and diagnosed the rabies. The calf died Sunday night.

She said other animals could have been exposed to the calf, including other cows, a dog and a cat. Milk from rabid cows is not contaminated, according to Steve Midkiff, Rockcastle County Health Inspector.

Rockcastle River survey to determine future use

A study to determine if a section of the Rockcastle River bordering on three counties should have increased protection under the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act of 1968 is to begin shortly.

According to Charles Crail, public affairs officer of the Daniel Boone National Forest, a team of specialists from the Forest will study a 24-mile section of the Rockcastle River south from a point beginning at the KY 80 bridge.

The section borders on Rockcastle, Laurel and Pulaski counties.

The specialists are to determine if the section should receive special federal protection, meaning whether they classify that section as "wild and scenic" or "recreational."

A 17-mile part of the 24-mile section beginning at the bridge is already designated by the state as wild and scenic, so a federal designation would "tighten" protection and add another seven miles downstream, according to Crail.

Classification of the section of the river would protect the river, and 2,000 feet of its banks on either side from development for recreation or other usage.

The first report on the eligibility study is expected about October.

ber, officials reported.

A public hearing to receive comment and to explain issues connected with the study will be held at 7 p.m. June 27 at the Laurel County Courthouse in London. Forest Service officials will be on hand to answer questions and explain further the new classification.

When completed, probably sometime in 1986, the study will go to forest officials in Atlanta, Ga. to be reviewed and then to the National Forest Service in Washington, D. C. It will then be returned to local officials for further review before being sent to Congress for action.

Crail stressed he did not know the timetable for completing the new wild river designation for the stream.

He also pointed out he did not know what riverbank land use restrictions would be set if the section if designated wild and scenic.

Generally, when a state and federal agency brings up a plan of some kind, it is usually just a formality and after a decision has already been made.

Said one local observer, "What they want is the public to say it is a good idea. They have already decided what they are going to do. I don't think it would have much of an effect on the river north of the bridge. The section that could be affected is the rapids area where canoeing is done. But we haven't been told yet."

The Rockcastle River is one of eight rivers in the state (six in the Daniel Boone National Forest) protected under the wild rivers act.

Some residents confided that they had been expecting a change in the status of the river for some time, particularly since coal mining and oil well operations have been increasing.

There are oil wells operating within the eastern area of Pulaski County. Crail said he did not believe a change in classification

would force them out of business since the owner had agreed to comply with state regulations.

State says not legal

Cooks upset because pay was not received

Although school might be out for the summer, some employees of the Rockcastle County school system are upset about something that took place during the last two weeks of the 1984-85 school year.

Those employees are cooks, and their gripe is that they were shortchanged by the Board of Education.

A spokesperson for some of the cooks, who asked to remain anonymous, said last week that she and some of her co-workers were highly upset because they did not get paid for 180 working days, which is specified in their contracts, because of the nine calamity days that the local school system by the State Board of Education.

The cooks said that while they were not paid for the nine days they didn't work, every other employee in the school system was.

She went on to say that she and the other 27 cooks in the school system actually worked the last nine days of school for nothing.

Cooks in the local system worked only 171 days of the 1984-85 school year, but a copy of a contract made between the cooks and School Superintendent Charles Parsons and Board Chairman Rudolph Burdette calls for the cooks to work the number of days required in the school calendar by the state (180) and be paid \$3.94 per hour.

While school was called off during the 1984-85 school year a total of 28 times, the cooks were paid at the end of each month just as if they were actually working.

The spokesperson said that most of the cooks were not aware they were not going to get paid for the nine calamity days until about two weeks before school was out and they received their ninth check. The cook said the check they received had been cut by four days. She said their tenth check, which is for one-fourth of a month, did not come at all.

She said the cooks were told by Food Service Director E. J. Smith they had already been paid.

The amount of money in question is \$7,500 or about \$270 per cook. The local woman said what upset her the most was that everyone else working for the school system got paid.

Rockcastle County School

Superintendent Parsons said Wednesday the local board would have paid the cooks if the state had said it was legal.

But Parsons said the state board's attorney, Gary Bale, wrote him (Parsons) a letter stating that it "would not" be legal for the school system to pay the cooks because they were paid by the hour and they had not actually worked the nine days in question.

The superintendent went on to say that while all other employees in the system were paid for the nine days, they all had contracts calling for a specific salary and they are not paid by the hour.

However, the board's attorney, Carl Clontz, wrote Parsons a letter on June 4 in which he told Parsons that, in his opinion, the board could legally pay the cooks.

He said in the letter to the superintendent the contract between the cooks and the board of education was "ambiguous" because neither party anticipated the calamity days when the contract was signed.

Parsons said he understood that Madison County paid their cooks but that they (the Madison County cooks) had a contract with the school board calling for a specific salary.

Jackson County School Superintendent John Smith said Wednesday that Jackson County would have to pay their cooks also. He said the cooks had a contract calling for a specific salary and they would be paid.

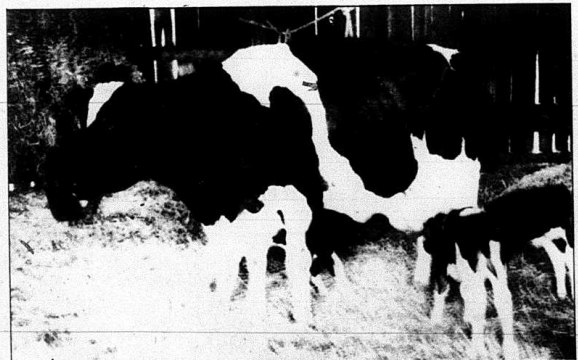

Managing a dairy farm requires special abilities in many "fields," according to Edward and Bernice Sowder, a husband and wife team that has one of Rockcastle County's successful dairy and farming operations.

Operating a 109-acre farm in the Spiro section of the county, the Sowders farm many fields, but their dairy operation is one of the best in the county and is in focus during this June Dairy Month.

On July 26, the Sowders, along with two neighboring farms, will host the annual "Farm Field Day." The public is invited and urged to attend.

In addition to the dairy, the Sowders' crops include 30 acres of alfalfa, 16 acres of corn silage which is double cropped with wheat. The remainder is used for tobacco, peppers and pasture. Their son, Billy, also uses part of the farm for a small herd of Simmental cattle.

Junior explains that he started milking in 1954 by hand and sold milk in cans. By 1956, he purchased the farm they now have and milked for the past 28 years. Times have changed though; milking equipment has speeded up the job of milking about 32 cows.

Southern Bell milk haulers now pick up milk every other day from the large refrigerated storage tank. Feeding cattle silage is mechanized with facilities which include a large concrete silo with feed bunks. Cory has been planted using no-till for the past 15 years, and alfalfa has become an important part of the ration.

Junior indicates that dairymen are a special breed. Milking starts at 4 a.m. and again at 3 p.m. About 2 hours of each milking are required, seven days a week. Not only does he work as herdsman, but he is also veterinarian, mechanic and produces crops as well as harvesting them. Managing a dairy farm requires special abilities in many fields.

When asked how he feels about young men who want to get started in dairying, he said: "I don't know. It will be hard for them to handle the dead load."

Many consumers don't realize the huge investment farmers have in land, equipment, facilities and cattle. In many cases, this may run from \$100,000 and up.

Dairy farmers have a price support program which is sponsored by check-offs from their

with 18 percent. Crops such as corn, peppers and hay make up the remainder.

Rockcastle County has 42 dairy farms with approximately 1,900 cows. The dairy industry creates a gross income of nearly \$3 million, approximately 19 percent of the total farm income. Tobacco leads the way with 50 percent of gross farm income and beef trails

top producing alfalfa fields. Four varieties are being grown side by side to compare yields on his farm.

State says county should not hire additional counsel

A state agency has given the Rockcastle Fiscal Court a little "slap on the wrist" for hiring a private attorney to represent the county at a recent landfill hearing in Frankfort.

In a letter to the court, Al Howell, State Local Finance Supervisor of the Division of County and Municipal Accounting, called hiring the attorney, Carl Clontz, to attend the meeting and represent the county "arbitrary."

"One of the motions passed by your court was to hire a private attorney to represent Rockcastle County.... I did not believe that was proper so I checked with the Attorney General's office," Howell wrote.

"I was informed that if your county attorney was physically and mentally able, and if there was no conflict of interest, paying outside legal fees is highly questionable as being arbitrary," he continued.

"It is also recommended by

the Attorney General's office that your county attorney inform your fiscal court by letter that he (county attorney) is physically and mentally able and there was no conflict of interest in this case and he would be representing Rockcastle County at that time.

County Judge Executive Bob Jasper said this week that at the time the landfill initially became an issue, Attorney James H. Lambert was unable to attend because of a death in the family. Later, when the Kentucky Enforcement Branch of the Division of Waste Management called the court to Frankfort, the magistrates felt Attorney Clontz should attend since he had been in on the landfill issue from the beginning and would know better what had gone on before.

Clontz was also hired earlier this year to represent the county in a suit filed against the county by local attorney William D. Gregory.

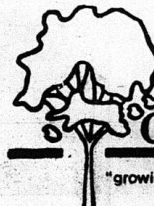
