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

A survey of water drainage patterns to determine their effect on, and potential hazards to. Livingston city water is under way, according to Mayor Bro Billy Medley. David Leo, a geology-student at Eastern Kentucky University, is making the survey for the city, which is the sponsor. It is expected to be completed in about two-months.

"What we want to do is map out the area where our water mostly comes from as a protective measure." he continued. "If we should have a chemical spill of some kind as far away as the interstate and as near as the railroad, we could go to a map and see if our water would be contaminated from the spill."

Although the major did not say, the survey could also be used to determine if trash and garbage dumped along roadways or the river bank would contaminate the water.

He said the city is furnishing Leo with living quarters, gasoline and groceries until he finishes the survey. The city will also help him with some other costs and gratuities.

Rockcastle River survey to determine future use

A study to determine if a section of the Rockcastle River. bordering on three counties should have increased protection under the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act of 1968 is to begin shortly.

According to Charles Crail, public affairs officer of the Daniel Boone National Forest, a team of specialists from the Forest will study a 24-mile section of the Rockcastle River south from a point beginning at the KY 80 bridge.

The section borders on Rockcastle, Laurel and Pulaski counties.

The specialists are to determine if the section should receive special federal protection, meaning whether they classify that section as "wild and secnic" or "recreational."

A 17-mile part of the 24 mile.

A 17-mile part of the 24-mile A 17-mile part of the 24-mile section beginning at the bridge is already designated by the state as wild and scenic, so a federal designation would "tighten" pro-tection and add another seven miles downstream, according to

Classification of the section of Classification of the section of the river would protect the river, and 2.000 feet of its banks on either side, from development for recreation or other usage.

The first report on the eligibility study is expected about Octo-

ber, officials reported.

A public hearing to receive comment and to explain issues connected with the study will be held at 7 p.m. June 27 at the Laurel County Courthouse in London. Forest Service officials will be on hand to answer questions and explain further the new classification.

When completed, probably sometime in 1996, the study will go to forest officials in Atlanta. Ga tobe reviewed and then to the National Forest Service in Washington, D. C. It will then be returned to local officials for further reviewe before being sent to Congress for action.

Cooks upset because pay was not received

Although school might be out Although school might be out for the summer, some employees of the Rockcastle County school system are upset about something that took place during the last two weeks of the 1984-85 school year. Those employees are cooks, and their gripe is that they were shortchanged by the Board of Education.

A spokesperson for some of the cooks, who asked to remain anonymous, said last week that she and some of her co-workers were highly upset because they did not get paid for 180 working days, which is specified in their contracts, because of the nine calamity days granted the local school system by the State Board of Education. of Education.
The cooks said that while they

were not paid for the nine days they didn't work, every other employee in the school system

She went on to say that she and the other 27 cooks in the school system actually worked the last nine days of school for

last nine days of school for nothing codes in the local system worked only 171 days of the 1984-85 school year, but a copy of a contract made between the cooks and School Superintendent Charles Parsons and Board Chairman Rudolph Burdette calls for the cooks to work the number of days required in the school calendar by the state (180) and to be paid \$3.94 per hour.

required in the school calendar by the state (180) and to be paid \$3.94 per fourite school was called off during the 1984-85 school year a total of 28 times, the cooks were paid at the end of each month just as if they were actually working. The spokesperson said that most of the cooks were not aware they were not oping to get paid for the nine calamity days until about two weeks before school was out and they received their ninth check. The cooks said the check they received had been cut by four days. She said their tenth check, which is for one-fourth of a month, did not come at all.

She said the cooks were told by Food Service Director E. J. Smith they had already been paid. The amount of money in question is \$7.500 or about \$270 per cook. The local woman sid what upset her the most was the school system got paid.

Rockcastle County School

Superintendent Parsons said Wednesday the local board would have paid the cooks if the state had said it was legal.

But Parsons said the state had said board sattorner Garage.

But Parsons said the state board's attorney, Gary Bale, wrote him (Parsons) a letter stating that it "would not" be legal for the school system to pay the cooks because they were paid by the hour and they had not actually worked the nine days in question. The superintendent went on to say that while all other employees in the system were paid for the nine days, they all had contracts calling for a specific splary and they are not paid by the hour.

Whosever, the board's attorney, Carl Clontz, wore Parsons a letter on June 4 in which he told Parsons that, in his opinion, the board could legally pay the cooks. He said in the letter to the superintendent the contract between the cooks and the board of education was "ambiguous" because neither party anticipated the calamity days when the contract was signed. "Parsons said he understood."



In addition to the dairy, the Sowders' crops include 30 acres of alfalfa, 16 acres of corn silage which is double cropped with wheat. The remainder is used for tobacco, peppers and pasture. Their son, Billy, also uses part of the farm for a small herd of Simmental cattle.

Simmental cattle. Junior explains that he started milking in 1954 by hand and
sold milk in cans. By 1956, he
purchased the farm they now have
and milked for the past 28 years.
Times have changed though:
milking equipment has speeded
up the job of milking about 32
cows.

Southern Bell milk haulers now pick up milk every other day from the large refrigerated storage tank. Feeding cattle silage is mechanized with facilities which include a large express eith utils.

Tank. Feeding cattle slage is mechanized with facilities which include a large oncrete silo with feed bunks. Corryhas been planted using no-till for the past 15 years, and alfalfa has become an important part of the ration. Junior indicates that dairymen are a special breide. Milking starts at 4 a.m. and again at 3 p.m. About 2 hours at each milking are required, seven days week. Not notly does he work as herdsman, but he is also veteramarian, mechanic and produces crops as well as harvesting them. Managing a dairy farm requires special abilities in many fields. When asked how he feels about young men who want to get started in dairying, he said: "I don't know. It will be hard for them to handle the dead load." them to handle the dead load." Amay consumers don't realize the huge investment farmers have in land, equipment, facilities and cattle. In many cases, this may run from \$100.000 and up.

Dairy farmers have a price support program which is sponsored by check-offs from their

milk. On July 1, the check-off will be raised to \$1 per 100 pounds. As noted last week, the milk price has not been keeping track with other equipment, feed, and crop pro-duction cost.

However, farmers take pride nowever, farmers take pride in their ability to be competitive and produce a quality product. Junior is known throughout the county for being able to establish

top producing alfalfa fields. Four varieties are being grown side by side to compare yields on his farm. Rockeastle County has 42 dairy farms with approximately 1,900 cows. The dairy industry creates a gross income of nearly \$3 million, approximately 19 percent of the total farm income. Tofacco leads the way with 50 percent of gross farm income and beef trails

with 18 percent. Crops such as corn, peppers and hay make up the remainder.
