The next 25 laps he was able to outrun the hard-charging national champions, Kenny Brightbill and Paul Schaffer, to take the checkered flag, the trophy and the honors. Charlie Vacca

In an interview last week one of college basketball's premier referees Charlie Vacca talked about working his first ever Final Four last spring and recalled a much discussed confrontation with Coach John Thompson at halftime of the semi-final game between Georgetown and St. John's.

Thompson accosted Vacca at the scorer's table at halftime and "chewed his ears off" for a call he had made. Then he tossed the basketball at the officials as they left the floor. Why didn't Vacca call a technical on Thompson?

"I made a mistake," he said. "I'm thinking when you get to this level, the national semi-finals the easiest thing to do was walk away from the situation. People told me afterwards that I should have T'd him for his actions at the table. And in retrospect I agree with that. It probably cost me (being assigned) the championship game."

What Vacca said next is dedicated to "infallible" type fans who scream at basketball officials at high school and college games.

"There isn't a day that passes that I don't think about the play (that precipitated the clash with Thompson). You know, 50 percent saying I should have called the technical and 50 percent saying I shouldn't. But we're only human. Referees don't have time to think about those things. You make a decision and it's gone."

A New York native, Vacca played basketball under the legendary Frank McGuire at South Carolina. Now he's a coach.

Tagged Cave Run Bass worth money

There are 500 bass swimming around in Cave Run Lake worth \$5.00 each. These fish have been tagged as part of the ongoing black bass management plan for the lake. The department of Fish and Wildlife Resources is offering the \$5.00 reward for returning the tags. Largemouth bass over 15 inches were tagged, as were Kentucky (spotted) bass eight inches long or longer. A study of the tag returns will help biologists assess the impact of the new regulation at Cave Run which places a 15-inch minimum limit on largemouth bass and removes the size limit from Kentucky bass. Envelopes for returning the tags are available from area docks and sporting goods stores.

Another phase of the bass management plan for Cave Run got underway with the recent stocking of 20,000 smallmouth bass in the lake. Biologists expect that in a few years smallmouth bass will become an important part of the total bass fishery at Cave Run. There is also a 15-inch size limit on these fish.

Deputy Jailer Jeff Abney said the alarm went off at the jail and Deputy Jailer Clint McCowan alerted Chief Howard.

Contract for Ky. 461 by-pass could be awarded in August

It's still in the "if" stage, but it's possible work will begin on the KY 461 bypass around Mt. Vernon in August.

If legalities on land acquisition appears stabilized, bid letting will likely be held in August. If not then, it could be as late as September, officials say.

Leroy Brown, District 8 Chief engineer, said both August and September dates are "tentative," but construction contracts could be let if all the planning pieces fall into place.

At the same time, bids could be let on a section of highway between KY 80 and Buck Creek.

"If a lot of bid is awarded, we could get a begun before winter," Brown stated. "Then work could be done on rock cuts during the winter as was done on the section now under construction between U.S. 150 and Wadd."

He said he did not know what area of the bypass would get first construction. It could be either east, near U.S. 150 or near Red Top Restaurant, where the rock cut has to be leveled.

Only one section of land along the bypass remains to be settled. That land is 6 1/2 acres belonging to Benton and Theresa Bullock. A trial date for that section has been set for 9 a.m. Friday in Rockcastle Circuit Court.

County budget gets approval

A county budget of \$814,258 for 1985-86 was approved by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at a special meeting Friday morning.

The budget is \$50,000 less than the \$864,258 previously announced because the principal on temporary loans had not been figured into the final total.

The principal was \$25,000 for the general fund and \$25,000 for the county road fund which had been borrowed pending tax receipts.

The budget as it now stands is as follows:

General fund appropriations for the new budget total \$273,438. Road Fund appropriations are \$366,545. Revenue sharing fund outlay is \$86,450. Local Government Economic Assistance funds total \$19,500, and the jail appropriation is \$114,525.

Estimated county income is the same as appropriations, \$814,258.

A breakdown of each fund is

A commission set a price on that acreage at \$34,500, but the state seeks to reduce that amount. That amount was posted by the State Highway Department for right-of-entry.

Brown also said no definite plans have been submitted on the section of highway that is between U.S. 25 and the KY 461 junction at Red Top Restaurant and the off ramp of I-75. Speculation is that there will be an added lane up the hill between the two

points to accommodate slow moving vehicles.

The length of the bypass will be 3.8 miles.

Work is progressing on the U.S. 150/Wadd section. The cost of that section is \$2,645,912.

The design of another section of KY 461 is expected to be approved soon. That section extends from just over a mile north of Buck Creek to the Rockcastle County line, a distance of 3.52 miles.

Work at the beach was in response to an earlier request by several residents that the area was filthy and needed upgrading.

A petition bearing 245 names asking the council to permit swimming anywhere around the lake, plus an expressed willingness to pay \$50 cents a day to swim, was presented to the council by Gary Mullins.

Found guilty of murder

Jury gives Jones 20 year sentence

A Rockcastle County woman has been convicted of murder by a local Circuit Court jury.

Lisa Lopez Jones, 22, of Mt. Vernon, was found guilty in the shooting death of Johnny Keith Falin, 34, of Mt. Vernon, on January 30, 1984.

An eight woman, four man jury recommended a sentence of 20 years for Jones, the lightest sentence a jury could recommend for a guilty verdict.

The trial, which began last Tuesday morning with jury selection, ended Wednesday evening at around 5 p.m. after the jury deliberated for more than two hours.

The jury came back into the courtroom at around 4 p.m., hung 11-1. They did not say how the 11 vote stood, and Circuit Judge Dan Venter didn't ask. He did, however, send the jurors back in and tell them to discuss the case further.

USE OF MICROWAVE OVEN IN FOOD PRESERVATION (Part I)

Microwaving Jellies & Jams

Jams and jellies cooked by microwave ovens retain their fresh flavor and color. Since microwave energy heats from all sides and not just from the bottom, sugar mixtures do not scorch and need very little stirring. Just as with range-top cooking, they boil up high, so be sure to use a large casserole with a cover. Fruit juices do not evaporate in microwaving and you will need to use fruit pectin to thicken jelly or jam. General recommendations:

1. Use high power for all recipes.
2. Whenever pectin is added, add gradually, stirring very well.
3. Use pot holders since sugar mixtures get very hot.
4. Avoid steam burns by lifting lid away from you when removing.
5. Pour jelly into hot sterilized jars or glasses. Wipe off rim, then seal with hot sterilized lids or paraffin. Sterilize in a pot of boiling water on the surface unit of the range. Melt paraffin in a double boiler on the surface unit.
6. For jam or preserves, fill and seal jars and process in boiling water bath canner for 10 minutes in U.K. or USDA "Jelly" leaflets.

GRAPE JELLY (frozen juice)

- 1 can (6 oz.) frozen grape juice concentrate, defrosted
- 1 package (1 3/4 oz.) powdered fruit pectin
- 2 cups hot tap water
- 3 1/2 cups sugar

In 3-quart casserole, blend together well the grape juice and pectin. Stir in water. Cover. Microwave at high 8 minutes, stirring well after 4 minutes until bubbles form around edge of dish. Add sugar, mixing well. Cover. Microwave at high 8 minutes, stirring well after 4 minutes, until mixture boils. Then, time for 1 minute of boiling. Stir and skim off foam with metal spoon. Ladle into prepared glasses. Seal. Yield: about 4 cups.

APPLE JELLY

- 2 1/2 cups bottled unsweetened apple juice
- 3 1/2 cups sugar
- 1/2 bottle (6 oz.) liquid fruit pectin

In 3-quart casserole stir together apple juice and sugar. Cover. Microwave at high 12-14 minutes, stirring after 6 minutes until boiling.

Stir in pectin, mixing thoroughly. Cover. Microwave at high 4 to 6 minutes more, until mixture returns to boil. Then, time for 1 minute of boiling. Stir and skim off foam, if necessary. Ladle into prepared glasses. Seal. Yield: about 3 cups.

STRAWBERRY JAM (frozen berries)

- 3 packages (10 oz. each) strawberries in plastic pouch
- 2 tablespoons water
- 1/2 box (2 1/2 tablespoons) powdered fruit pectin
- 3 cups sugar

Remove fruit from pouches and place in 3 quart casserole. Crush the fruit. Add water and pectin, stirring well. Cover. Microwave at high 8 to 10 minutes or until mixture is at a full rolling boil. Stir. Add sugar to boiling mixture and stir well. Microwave at high 8 to 10 minutes, uncovered, stirring after 5 minutes, until mixture reaches a full rolling boil. Then, time for 1 minute of boiling. Skim off foam and stir jam about 5 minutes before ladling into prepared jars. Seal. Process in boiling water bath canner for 10 minutes or store in the refrigerator. Yield: about 4 1/2 cups.

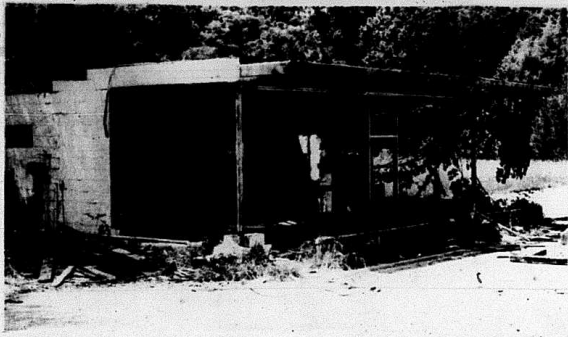

Mayor Roland Mullins told the petitioners the city leases the boat dock-beach area to Hale and any liability would be his rather than the city as it has been in the past.

The council agreed it could not afford a lifeguard, leaving that question along with charging for swimming up to Hale.

The mayor said Hale should have insurance covering liability as did past operators of the boat dock.

After considerable discussion, the council decided to continue its employee health insurance with Blue Cross-Blue Shield through the Kentucky Municipal League, even though it will cost the city an additional \$5,199 a year.

On July 1, insurance rates for the city's 12 employees on a family plan jumps from \$182.83 per employee per month to \$218.94. The single (unmarried) employee rate goes from \$70.28 a month to \$82.98. The city has no single employees under the city plan.

The insurance has no deductible and maintains the same coverage.

Before finally approving the insurance, Mayor Mullins told city department heads to check with

their employees to determine if any of them could take "single" coverage, if their spouse had similar coverage. They will also check to see if employees would be willing to pay half the difference of the increase?

For example, under the family plan the increase is \$36.11 per month. Half would be \$18.05.

Martha Livesay told the council she has three water meters next to her house, two of which belong to her neighbors. She asked that they be moved to the neighbors' property. The council agreed if the city has no easement for the meters and water lines.

AT&T Begins Separate Billing For Leased Telephones

Beginning in July, nearly 500,000 telephone customers in Kentucky will receive separate

bills from AT&T for all leased telephones at their homes and businesses.

The charges are not new. They are simply separated from the old telephone bill, mailed in a separate envelope and paid directly to AT&T.

Previously all equipment charges for leased telephones and business communications equipment were included in monthly bills from South Central Bell.

With the restructuring of the Bell System in January 1984, ownership of leased telephone equipment transferred to AT&T Information Systems. As a result, AT&T will send its own bills to customers who lease telephones. South Central Bell will continue to bill for local and AT&T long distance service.

The new bill is easy to read and understand. A bill insert explaining the new format will be included with the first AT&T bill.

Customers simply have to make their checks payable to AT&T and mail them in the return envelopes provided. There is no need to call AT&T or South Central Bell if equipment changes are not needed.

Persons wanting to obtain new telephones or make changes should call the AT&T office number listed on the bill, not South Central Bell.

Most residential customers will receive a bill from AT&T quarterly. The average business customer or residential customer with a multi-line telephone will be billed monthly.

The total national billing conversion involves the transfer of more than 60 million customer accounts, 120 million telephones and 200 million records all contained in 26 different billing systems, 87 revenue accounting offices and 52 billing data centers.

According to AT&T, the conversion is the most massive records conversion and data processing endeavor in the history of American business.

And it's all being done while AT&T Information Systems goes about its normal business of leasing, selling, installing and maintaining telephone and information management equipment.

A salute to the dairy farm families of Rockcastle

Coffeys turn dairying into a full-time family business

Retirement never fully happens as long as you are on a farm. This is the opinion of William Lewis Coffey, who is semi-retired, and along with his son, Lewis, are a dairy team that farms about 250 acres in the Brindle Ridge community.

Their crops include 30 acres of corn grown for silage. "I used to grow ear corn as well as the past year or so, I can buy it cheaper than I can grow it," Lewis said.

Thirty acres are grown in alfalfa and 70 acres are mixed grass hay. Three acres of tobacco as well as 2 acres of peppers help provide supplemental income. The remaining acreage is in pasture and forest land.

The herd consists of 44 Holstein cows with approximately 32 in the milk line at any one time. To keep this number up, 34 replacements are coming on. Milking is taken care of by Ray McGuire. However, Lewis serves as relief man on the weekends.

As members of Dairymen Incorporated, their milk is processed at the modern plant located in London.

How does a dairyman make it these days?
"I don't know if they have a

large debt load. We are in good shape, but we haven't made any major equipment purchases in several years," the younger Lewis declared. "Dad enjoys being the mechanic and keeps our equipment ready to go."

Their management has also allowed for both families to make their living from the farm without any outside employment.

Not only do the local dairy

farms such as the Coffeys provide income to their families, but also add to the local economy.

One group of businesses which work closely with local dairies are the feed mills. Mt. Vernon Produce mixes the Coffeys' ration, however, several other mills are serving farmers.

Near Broddhead, there is Albright's Feed and Supply. In Broddhead, there is Con Agri, as

well as Broddhead Mills. At Willailla, there is Willailla Feed and Supply, and from Danville, Burkmann Mill.

These businesses provide a large amount of feed and supplies to keep the 42 local dairies going as they produce nearly three million dollars in farm income.

As the June Dairy Month Salute is concluded, thanks go to each dairy farm family.

June is Dairy Month

Rockcastle County's (DHI) Dairy Herd Improvement Association consists of four official and one cover sampler herd. During June Dairy Month's Salute, top herds should be recognized.

For Overall Herd Production, Russell Parsons' herd leads the way with a rolling herd average of 14,900 pounds per cow. Top cow with projected mature equivalent (305 day milk) also goes to the Parsons farm for cow number 25 with a production of 20,276 pounds.

Top individual production for the month goes to the Jimmy and Charlie Cummins dairy with 146 cows producing 79 pounds on test day. The Cummins dairy also had the highest average per cow on test day with a production of 46.8 pounds per cow.

The other herds include: Bill Norton's top cow for the month produced 70.5 pounds on test day. Top projected ME was

cow number 48 with 16,008 pounds.

Layne Lee Dairy's top cow on test day produced 70 pounds and top projected ME cow was 16,992 pounds, according to Barry Hurst.

Henry Hayes' top cow produced 59 pounds on test day and top projected ME cow was 16,848 pounds.

Charlie Cash of Brodhead Honored

Block presents five area men with Heroism award recently

Five local men affiliated with the Pine Knot Job Corps Center in McCreary County have received a special honor award for heroism from U.S. Secretary of Agriculture John Block.

The five—Brenton Hale of Somerset, David Baugh of Burnside, Ed Strunk of Wiborg, Charlie Cash of Brodhead and Ronnie Vaught of Eubank—also met with Fifth District Congressman Harold Rogers, who congratulated them for their outstanding achievement.

"These five men are truly deserving of this award," Rogers said. "I know the entire Fifth District is proud of their actions in helping save a life."

In June of 1984, the five were returning from lunch along U.S. Highway 27 near Whitley City when they came upon an accident.

A car driven by Eula Garland of McCreary County had crashed, with Ms. Garland receiving a serious head wound. The five then helped call for a doctor and ambulance, administered first aid at the crash site, and helped direct traffic until medical authorities arrived on the scene. Their quick work has been credited with helping Ms. Garland alive, and preventing her from going into shock following the accident.

Later, the men were chosen for a special award from the U.S.

Forest Service, which is an agency of the Department of Agriculture. All five made the trip to Washington, D. C. to receive the award from Secretary Block. The men are either employed at or teach at the Pine Knot Civilian Conservation Center, a Forest Service program in McCreary County.

In addition to meeting personally with them, Congressman Rogers placed special remarks honoring the five men into the Congressional Record, applauding

their heroism and willingness to give assistance to a person needing emergency treatment.

"Lily May" receives \$5,000 Heritage Fellowship Award

Lily May Ledford, one of the original Coon Creek girls who were among the first performers on the Renfro Valley Bandstand, is the recipient of a Heritage Fellowship Award from the National Endowment for the Arts.

The \$5,000 award is for "extraordinary accomplishment" in the folk arts.

She was among 11 artists throughout the nation to receive the prestigious award from the independent federal agency that uses government money to underwrite a variety of artistic projects. "The achievements of each of these extraordinary artists have made a special contribution to nurturing a traditional art form that enriches our lives and stimulates our creative spirit," the award noted.

Lily May Ledford, whose married name is Lily May Pennington, is an Appalachian musician and singer from Lexington, formerly of Berea.

She is a claw-hammer banjo virtuoso who inspired Pete Seeger's playing and pioneered the role of women in country music.

In the early 1940's, she and the Coon Creek Girls were invited to perform at the White House for President and Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt.

As recently as a year ago, she performed at the Bandstand at Renfro and visited with friends in the area.

Lily May, 68, is now hospitalized in Lexington and was reported by her son, J. P. Pennington, who is lead singer and chief lyricist for Exile, one of the nation's premiere country bands, to be too ill for an interview.

Pennington related his mother's musical talents had always

been a strong influence on him, even though they play entirely different styles of music.

"My mother's enthusiasm rubbed off on me," he said. "My mother had 12 brothers and sisters and everybody played, and there was hardly a time there wasn't music in the house when I was growing up."

For a time, Lily May performed with her two sisters, Rose, who is now deceased, and Minnie, often called Black-eyed Susie. They were regular performers at Renfro for several years. Minnie

now lives in Marathon, Fla. Charles K. Wolfe wrote in his book, "Kentucky Country," that when the Coon Creek Girls came along in 1937, women were into country music, but their picking and singing at that time was romantic, western or sentimental and sweet.

"But when the Coon Creek Girls burst on the scene, ears perked up and heads turned. Here were no sentimental parlor songs about mother and no Tin Pan Alley odes to prairie sweethearts."

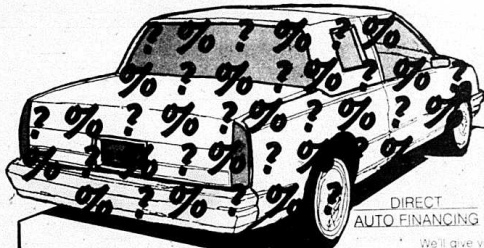

and I talked to Jan Stephens. He very proudly brought out his son, Jeff Stephens, who attends Eastern Kentucky University and I saw right at away, Wildie has a glamour boy and he's bound to take it after his mother. He attends college in his spare time, the rest of it is spent running girls.

Ballard, another long ago man who held an office in Rockcastle. It must be the Clear Creek springs (Cont. to B3)

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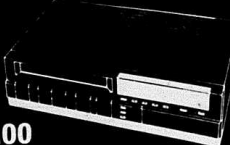
