meet acceptable standards of performance in academic, mental and physical areas. They must successfully pass appropriate written and practical tests in such areas as Criminal Law, Firearms, Defensive Driving, Accident and Criminal Investigations, First Aid, Social Services, Management of Human Conflict and others. The

graduating officers will now be eligible to receive a salary supplement under the Kentucky police pay incentive program.

Each graduate was awarded a Certificate of Completion, and achievement awards were presented to individuals who distinguished themselves in particular areas.

## Forest fire season results given by Forestry Dept.

The Kentucky Division of Forestry recently completed the final results of this spring's Forest Fire Season. In Rockcastle County, the Division of Forestry took action on 25 fires which burned a total of 1,148 acres. Most of the fires in the Southeastern District, which includes Rockcastle County, were due to arson (43%) or careless burning of trash or other debris (26%). Other major causes of fires this spring include smoking (7%) and children playing with fire (8%).

A total of 96 cases were prosecuted in the 10 county Southeastern District for violation of Forest Fire Laws. Most of these were for burning before 4:30 p.m. or for burning without taking reasonable precautions. However, 8 arson cases were prosecuted in Knox and Whitley Counties, and one arson case is pending in Whitley County. Forest arson is a felony with a possible penalty of a fine up to \$10,000 or up to 5 years in prison or both.

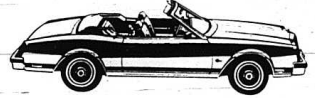

## Dates changed for IRS special enrollment exam

The dates for the IRS Special Enrollment Examination have been changed to October 10 and 11. Previous information had listed the dates for the test as October 7 and 8. Interested candidates should note the changed days for their own planning purposes.

This year applications must be postmarked no later than July 31 for individuals who wish to take the 1985 Internal Revenue Service Special Enrollment Examination, the IRS has announced. No extensions of time to file for the examination will be granted. The examination is scheduled to take two days: Thursday and Friday, October 10 and 11. It is given annually in each IRS district to individuals who wish to apply for enrollment to practice before the IRS.

The application fee is \$50 for those taking all four parts of the examination, and \$40 for prior

## Named to Dean's List

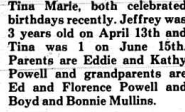
Six Rockcastle County residents have been named to the Dean's List at Berea College for the recently completed spring term.

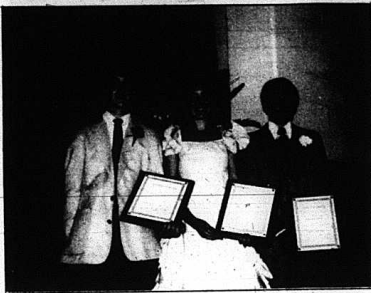

## Highway award appealed by Clyde Payne

An award of \$48,500 by a Rockcastle Circuit Court jury for land to be used for the KY 461 bypass around Mt. Vernon has been appealed to the Kentucky Court of Appeals by Clyde and Myrtle Payne.

Notice of the appeal was filed Tuesday by the Paynes' attorney. The appeal followed an appeal on June 28 in Rockcastle Circuit Court for a new trial which was rejected by Circuit Judge Daniel J. Venters.

A check for \$49,000 was given the Rockcastle Circuit Clerk Denver Miller by the Kentucky Department of Highways to cover the jury award for the 5 1/2 acres.

In an earlier agreement, the Paynes were to receive \$30,000 to move their business, located at the intersection of U. S. 150 and new KY 461, and \$500 for use of part of the Paynes' property by the highway department during construction of the bypass.

A commission of three local persons' earlier set a \$226,500 price for the property, but the state appealed the offer as excessive which resulted in the court trial.

## Broadhead council approves city budget for 1985-86

An estimated appropriation of \$85,530 to run the City of Broadhead for the 1985-86 fiscal year was approved in a budget ordinance by the Broadhead City Council Monday night.

The new budget shows estimated income at \$110,007. The new budget is \$20,057 more than the 1984-85 budget.

In the Water Department, the new budget shows estimated expenditures at \$118,210 with income of \$130,736.

A breakdown of various expenditures are: \$2,500 in the city rent account; \$8,500 in the municipal aid road, fund for street blacktopping and gravel; \$2,000 in the coal and mineral severance aid account; \$44,000 in the city's regular account, and \$29,500 in the revenue sharing account.

The \$44,000 in the city's regular account will be spent as follows: police salary, \$10,200; gasoline and maintenance for police, \$4,250; gasoline for Fire Department, \$475; park care, \$375; street cleaning, \$1,200; utilities, \$5,675; FICA, \$5,450; legal services, \$300; dispatch service, \$300; telephone, \$1,600; tax commission, \$1,500; clerk, \$15,000; general expenses such as office supplies, insurance, printing, mailing, \$10,000.

Appropriations in the Revenue Sharing Fund are: sidewalks (building and repair), \$10,000; street blacktopping and repairs, \$15,000; Fire Department, \$1,500, and Police Department, \$2,000.

Estimated appropriations in the Water Department include: Operation, \$95,000; bond and interest account, \$21,600, and interest on Profit property at Citizen's Bank, \$1,610.

## Court warned of deadline for garbage disposal plan

Time waits for no one, not even the Rockcastle Fiscal Court, which was warned at its meeting Tuesday the deadline for a plan for garbage disposal is Dec. 31 and planning must get under way as soon as possible.

Heeding the warning, the court hired the Cumberland Valley Area Development District (CVADD) to prepare a plan for the court to consider.

In actual money, the plan will cost the court an estimated \$7,500. A grant will pay the remaining cost estimated about \$5,000. It was emphasized the money is for a plan only, nothing else.

Gov. G. G. Ewing of the CVADD reminded the court a plan must be submitted to the state by the Dec. 31 deadline, and said it is imperative the court begin at once. He also suggested County Judge/Executive Bob Jasper appoint a committee of residents from various areas of the county to make suggestions and recommendations to the CVADD, and especially the engineers who will be charged with drawing up the plan.

The court was also reminded that any disposal plan must have the approval of the state which could reject a plan if it did not comply with state regulations.

Craig told the court it has no alternative, no way out, and can do nothing but get the planning under way.

Failure to have a plan could cost the county a fine of up to \$1,000 a day.

He said it was possible the state could extend the deadline if the court showed good faith by getting the plan under contract.

"Time is passing, and each day brings the deadline closer," Craig said. "A decision must be made. It was mandated by the (Kentucky) Legislature. You have to get it done."

He added the plan chosen by the engineers will be the one that is most feasible and economical for

the county. He would not speculate on what he thought was best for the county, leaving that to the engineers who will work on the plan.

It was a gloomy court that heard the news. The court has wrestled with garbage disposal for at least two years.

First, the court chose a landfill near Pine Hill, approved it, then withdrew approval after protests by Livingston residents who said the landfill would contaminate their city water supply.

Although it has not been officially stated, the Pine Hill landfill is apparently no longer "in

## Hale new principal; Parkerson is Director of Pupil Personnel

When the 1985-86 school year gets under way in August, there will be some familiar faces in new places.

The Rockcastle County Board of Education voted unanimously Tuesday night to hire Livingston Elementary school teacher Johnny Hale as the new principal at Mt. Vernon Elementary.

Following the recommendation of School Superintendent Charles B. Parsons, the board hired Hale to replace Buford Parkerson. Parkerson is the school system's new Pupil Personnel Director, replacing Garlan Cummins, who is the school district's new Finance Officer. Cummins replaced Lloyd Shuttles, who retired effective June 30. Cummins will also serve as the board's treasurer.

Another change at the central office is the secretary. Mrs. Barbara Fain, who has been secretary at the high school for the past several years, was hired by the board for the central office. Her pay will be \$10,000 annually, and she will replace Mrs. Naomi Mink, who is retiring Aug. 1.

In recommending Hale for the principal's job at Mt. Vernon, Superintendent Parsons told the board there had been three applicants for the job: Hale, Mrs. Sue Hamm and Mark McKinney. Parsons said that he felt Hale would do a good job at Mt. Vernon because of his fine record at Livingston where he was a teacher for several years. Mrs. Hamm, a guidance counselor for two of the four county grade schools, filed sex discrimination charges against the board with the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission in March of this year. In her charges she alleged that she had applied for principal and assistant principal jobs in the school system and had always been passed over by the superintendent and the board because she was a woman.

McKinney, who has taught in the school system for years, is the assistant principal at Mt. Vernon Elementary.

Another Livingston teacher, Mrs. Vicki Arnold, who is librarian at the school, was present at the meeting Tuesday night with her father, Mr. Vernon postmaster, James O. Smith, to inquire about a job placement made by the superintendent and the board

during June's meeting.

The question concerned the placement of Mrs. Sharon Lovell at Mt. Vernon as librarian to replace Mrs. Barbara Hiatt, who was transferred to RCHS.

Mrs. Arnold, as well as her father, questioned the board as to why she (Mrs. Arnold) didn't get the job. Mrs. Arnold said she wanted to know about the board's hiring policies because it was her understanding that Mrs. Lovell was not qualified for the Mt. Vernon job at the time of her hiring.

She also made it clear to the board that she had been teaching in the system for approximately 10 years and that she would like to have had the Mt. Vernon job because she was duly qualified. After the short discussion on the matter, the board took no action.

In other business the board voted to:

—approve 3% raise for classified employees for 1985-86 to include aides, cooks, bus drivers and extra service portion of administrators salaries. The raise was 5% last year.

—employ Mrs. Helen Jackson, Richmond, as special education teacher.

—officially employ David Perkins as head basketball coach at RCHS with \$3,000 annual increment.

—employ John Thomas Larkey (football coach) as substitute bus driver in order to approve him to

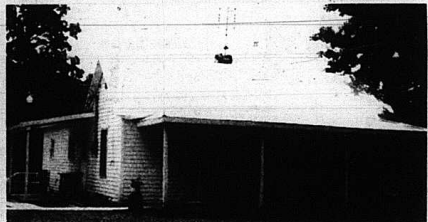

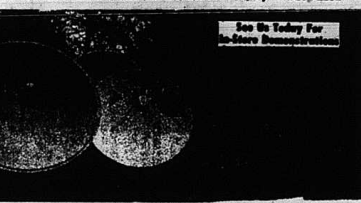

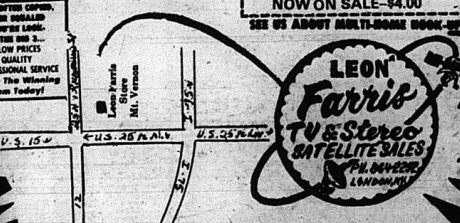

USE OF MICROWAVE OVEN IN FOOD PRESERVATION (Part 2)

Drying Parsley

Materials needed: fresh parsley, measuring cup, paper towels.

1. Wash-and-pat dry desired quantity of fresh parsley.

2. Remove leaves from stems and place in measuring cup to determine quantity.

3. Cover-bottom of microwave oven with two layers of paper towels. Sprinkle parsley in a single layer evenly on towels. Cover with another paper towel.

4. Cook on full power until dry and brittle. The time will vary according to quantity: 1 cup, 3 1/2 to 4 minutes; 2 cups, 5 1/2 to 6 minutes; 3 cups, 7 1/2 to 8 minutes.

Drying Apples

2 cups peeled, thinly sliced apples 1/4 cup water

Paper towels

Treat thinly sliced apples in ascorbic acid according to manufacturer's directions. Place two layers of paper towels in bottom of microwave oven. Place one layer of towels over apples. Place 1/4 cup of water in back of microwave. Dry at 1/2 power, checking every 10 minutes. Turn apples over after 15 minutes.

Blanching Vegetables

For those who like to freeze small quantities of fresh vegetables while they are in season, highest in quality and lowest in price, the microwave oven is a great help. It's especially useful to

home gardeners since vegetable crops do not ripen uniformly. You can pick vegetables as they reach the peak of flavor, even if you have only a few servings.

(See chart below.)  
1. Prepare vegetables (wash, peel, slice or dice) as you would for regular cooking. Measure 1 quart of vegetables into the recommended casserole. Add water as given in the chart. DO NOT ADD SALT. Cover the casserole.

2. Set power at high. Microwave for half the minimum time and stir. Recover the casserole and microwave for second half of minimum time. Stir again.

3. Check for doneness. Vegetables should have an evenly bright color throughout. If all the

vegetables are not evenly bright, recover the casserole and cook to maximum time. Drain vegetables.

4. Plunge vegetables into ice water immediately to prevent further cooking. Spread them on paper towels and blot with additional towels.

5. Package in freezer containers or boil-in-bag pouches. Label packages with type of vegetable, amount, and date. Freeze.

6. To loose-pack vegetables in large containers or bags, spread individual pieces on a cookie sheet. Place in freezer until vegetables are frozen; place loose pieces in containers. Seal, label and freeze.

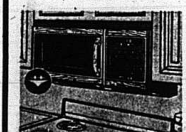

## Traffic problems reason for new 461

"Where's everybody going?" was the question asked by a man standing on the corner of Main and Richmond Streets in Mt. Vernon Saturday with a look of puzzlement and wonder on his face.

The traffic was backed up in all directions. He was obviously a stranger in town.

"They're trying to go this way and that way and getting nowhere," he said and added with a shrug, "It sure is a busy corner."

Busy it was, and busy it is, for most of the time. But Saturday! That was a weekend, and it was the Saturday before the 4th of July, which only added to the congestion. Attached to a boat to the back of some sort of vehicle and that means even more of a slow down.

That congestion was the major reason for the Kentucky Department of Highways to decide to do something about KY 461—to expedite the weekend migration that some folks refer to as the Ohio Navy heading for Lake Cumberland.

How long has it been since a new 461 was first proposed—five, six, 10 years ago? But now, the "light at the end of the road" around Mt. Vernon appears in sight, dimly. Or so we're told.

Highway officials at least hope to get the bypass around Mt. Vernon under way before winter, perhaps by September. That's tentative. But for the highway department, "hope springs eternal."

The same officials readily admit traffic congestion won't be over overnight. It will be awhile, like maybe five years before it's smooth sailing down Somerset way.

"I just hope they start construction around 150 and not around 25," one resident commented. "It will be a total calamity around the cut at Red Top Restaurant if they start there. I guess it will be easier to go down to Burr to get on I-75, or to get back on U.S. 25."

Leroy Brown, chief engineer for District 8, has already left the starting point up to the contractor who can begin work anywhere he wants. Incidentally, those items that are in the way of construction, such as electric and telephone poles and water lines, are about all moved out of the way of the bulldozers.

Although the cost of gasoline is expected to keep rising, traffic coming off I-75 at Mt. Vernon is also expected to increase as time goes by.

Mt. Vernon is not only going to be the northern entrance to Lake Cumberland as it is now, it will also be the "Gateway to the Big South Fork," and if predictions are only half right, having a bypass around downtown will undoubtedly relieve much of the expected congestion.

Of course there'll be some loss of business along the present route when the bypass is completed, but in the long run, benefits may outweigh the losses, which is a sometimes expressed opinion.

"No one wants to lose business," one businessman said, "but with no bypass, there could be a time when you couldn't get into town to do business at all."

Speaking of the Big South Fork: What is it, and where is it, and why all the hull-a-baloo? The official name, for those who don't know, is the Big South Fork National River and Recreational Area, BSFDA for short.

It is a mammoth 123,000-acre "river and forest wonderland" sitting astride the Kentucky and Tennessee state line. Much of the park area is in McCreary County, where tourism already accounts for nearly 10 million dollars annually and supports nearly 600 jobs.

"The Park," as it's already being called, and surrounding area is experiencing some economic growth, seeing an increasing number of visitors.

For business people in that area, that's good and that's bad. It's good to have a lot of visitors, but it's bad if there is little for them to do except look at the scenery, which is undoubtedly

spectacular.

This writer took a quick trip through McCreary County and down Tennessee way in the spring.

Admittedly, the scenery, especially the river gorge, is an amazing work of nature. Part of that river, we were told, was the backdrop for a Hollywood movie called "Deliverance."

There is also a Big South Fork Scenic Railway, a train ride for about seven miles, beginning at Stearns and running to the river gorge. It has done rather well financially and is expected to have about 20,000 riders before the season is over.

Over in Tennessee, there's a new community called Historic Rugby with all the old time things that seem to attract tourists. There was also a spring festival this year with about 3,500 on hand to celebrate. But with only about 400

hotel/motel rooms available in the area, finding accommodations is not always easy.

"And, after your train ride, your browsing at Historic Rugby, and your look at the scenery, there isn't a lot to do or see, if you're the type that likes the Gatlinburg/Smoky Mountains atmosphere as compared to the rugged undeveloped outdoors.

For those outdoor types, there is hiking, canoeing and kayaking to enjoy, but not much else. Already some of the promoters in the area are experiencing an overload of visitors, many of whom look and then go on.

"We just don't have the accommodations and things to do we'd like to have," said Marc Beaubien, manager of the train tour. "We need to convince developers to come here. We have a great potential."

He said he hoped there would

be more development quickly, before visitors go back home and give a negative assessment of the area.

When all the pros and cons of "the park" are added up and compared, it's a good bet the Big South Fork may be a really big south tourist attraction. All those expected tourists are making their way down 461 to the lake and Big South Fork apparently was the added incentive for Gov. Martha Layne Collins to spend the many millions to rebuild KY 461 between Mt. Vernon and KY 80.

As one highway official said: "There is too much traffic off I-75 at Mt. Vernon to let it stay on a two-lane road through the center

of town with all the curves and turns needed to get to 461. It has to be changed, and change is on the way."

## Replacing bridge

One county highway project has been added to those already announced by the Kentucky Department of Highways.

To be replaced is a bridge over Skaggs Creek on KY 1152. A spokesman for the department said the bridge is only added to the state program and will not be constructed for a considerable time.

The bridge is among 750 projects costing more than \$2 billion that is a six-year road plan unveiled Tuesday by the Collins administration.

The spokesman said no mention of KY 461 was made because that money has already been set aside.

He also reported Boone Fork Bridge east of Brodhead on the Brodhead-Conway road is to be replaced but the design of the bridge and approaches remains to be done.

Best estimate is that the bridge will not be constructed before 1987.

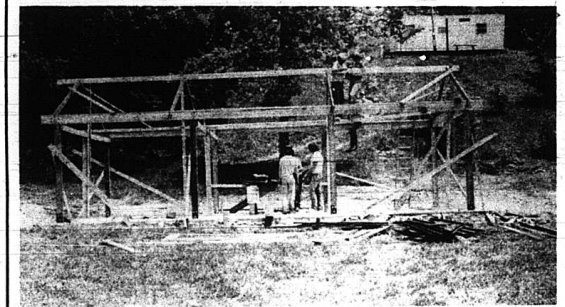

For that reason, it was suggested that elected magistrates who have no opposition in the November election attend meetings on garbage in order to be informed when they take over their duties.

"It wouldn't be a bad idea if all the candidates attended the meetings," Craig said. "And the public could also attend and have input into the process."

When asked if the court could contract or franchise the garbage collection as it is doing now, Craig told the court the state would have to approve that method, and it might not be the best one for the county. He said to wait for the plan.

Magistrate Donald Rowe, who apparently is fed up with the whole garbage problem, suggested the court hire 100 goats to eat the garbage, and sell the tin that's left over.

In other action, the court voted to borrow \$50,000 from pay bills left over from the 1984-85

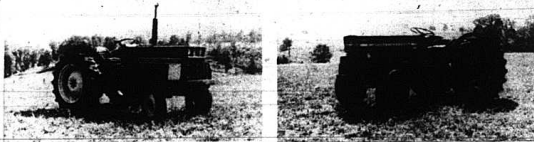

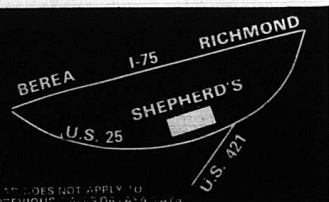


