Beef With Pepper

- 1 pound beef top round steak
- 2 teaspoons cornstarch
- 2 tablespoons cooking oil
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 2 cups sliced green peppers, seeded
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

Partially freeze beef, slice thinly across the grain into bite-size strips. In a small bowl, mix cornstarch, salt and pepper. Blend in soy sauce and 1/4 cup water. Preheat large skillet over high heat; add cooking oil. Stir-fry garlic in hot oil for 30 seconds. Add pepper. Stir-fry about 1 minute, and remove from skillet. Add oil if necessary. Add about 1/2 of beef, stir-fry two to three minutes until browned. Remove beef, stir-fry remaining beef two to three minutes. Return all beef to skillet. Stir soy mixture and stir into beef. Cook until mixture is thickened and bubbly, stirring constantly. Stir in pepper; cover and cook one minute. Serve at once. Yield: 4 servings.

Quick-Stuffed Green Peppers

- 3 large green peppers
- 1/4 cup onion, chopped
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1 tablespoon prepared horseradish
- 2 cans, 16 ounces each, corned-beef hash
- 1 cup water

Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. Cut peppers in half and remove the seeds. Cook for 10 minutes in enough boiling water to cover peppers. Drain. Cook onion in the fat just until tender. Stir in the horseradish. Mix with the hash. Fill pepper halves with hash mixture.

Place peppers in baking dish. Pour in 1 cup water and bake for 30 minutes. Yield 6 servings. 1/2 pepper each. About 330 calories per serving.

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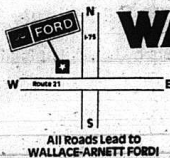

Just keeps rolling along

Rockcastle River survey begins on pleasant note

It meanders through Rockcastle County, snaking along, sometimes slowly and serenely, sometimes angry and rough. It's always been that way as long as anyone can remember.

It is the Rockcastle River, and once in awhile it gets the attention of someone somewhere for some reason or other as it did recently.

Since much of it is in the Daniel Boone National Forest, and a feeder river for Lake Cumberland, its welfare is watched closely and its future always of interest to many.

We in Rockcastle know it for its moods. In the spring it rushes headlong toward Lake Cumberland as if preparing the lake for summer tourists. In the middle of summer, the river creeps along so low in dry weather it almost disappears, leaving behind only the deep, green pools.

Some say the pools linger especially for the fish and the fisherman, who park along the banks at their favorite fishing holes, one such at the "big bend" northeast of Livingston that old timers say has no bottom.

Residents who have lived along the river...claim it is the purest in the world. You can safely

drink the water. Others doubt the "purest-in-the-world" title, but agree it has the best of river water: "I wouldn't want to drink it unless I was mighty thirsty," said a former resident who lived along the river. "But I think most of the time you could drink the water cause it runs over a whole lot of pebbles and sand. That purifies it."

Water resource experts concede the river is reasonably clean and that the reason is the lack of

development along the river. The river and its tributaries do not pass through large industrial towns. Houses are scarce.

However, the water watchers warn that development along the tributaries could eventually pose a problem and change the status of the river. For example, Indian Creek flows through McKee and on to the Rockcastle Conaway, Roundstone, Wildie and Renfro

Less than a year after moving into a "new" Fort Sequoyah, Carlos Carlotts has sold the facility.

The sale price, according to a report in the London Sentinel-Echo was \$250,000. The new facility is in Laurel County, on the I-75 KY 909 interchange.

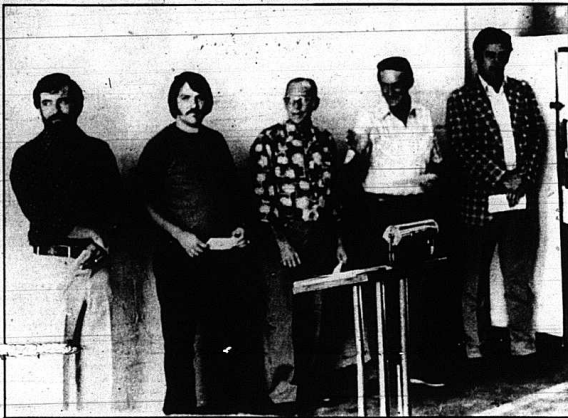
The new owner is Big John Bowling, Laurel County jailer and former owner of Laurel Lodge Restaurant and Motel on old U.S. 25, who sold that facility Apr. 25 to Ernie Tackett of London, owner of a chain of McDonald Restaurants

in eastern Kentucky. Carlotts, who did not sell the "old" Fort Sequoyah on the Rockcastle River in Rockcastle County, said he and his wife, Lucille, have no immediate plans for the future. They have been operating a tourist attraction for 36 years and planned to "take it easy."

Carlotts did not sell a tract of land across I-75 opposite the new facility.

Bowling recently brought in 12 mobile home-type units that

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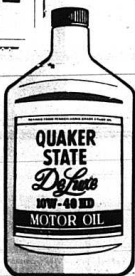

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Final sign-up period for ACP Practices is July 15, ASC Chairman says

The Rockcastle County ASCS Office has announced the second and final sign-up period for ACP practices as June 1 through July 15, according to James E. Brown, Chairman of the Rockcastle County ASC Committee.

Mr. Brown states practices available to the county farmers include grass seedlings, cover crops, water conservation and forestry practices. A more detailed listing of these practices available is available in the county office.

One program available to farmers in this county with stipulations is the SL-8, Cover Crop program. This program is made available to farmers who have not received cost share for this practice in the prior year. Cost share levels may vary with the maximum amount of cost share at the 40% level. Cover crops may be used for pasture but none of the growth may be harvested for hay or feed. The life span for cover crops is the date of completion through March 1, 1986.

Grass seeding establishments and seedlings must first have a current soil sample in the County Extension Office before signing an ACP-245 form. Request for Cost Sharing. Soil samples are considered current if made within one year of the time the practice is requested. Seeding practices have a life span of five years following the

year of completion. Water conservation practices are to be supervised by the Soil Conservationist, David Stipes. If you have questions, you may contact the SCS office or phone 256-2541. These practices have a life span of 10 years following the year of completion.

Forestry practices are to be supervised by the Kentucky Division of Forestry. Arrangements for these practices may be made through the Rockcastle County ASCS Office since the Kentucky Division of Forestry for this area is located in Pineville. These practices also have a life span of 10 years following the year of completion.

All requests must be filed and approved by the ASC Committee prior to the starting of work pertaining to the practice.

Participants receiving approval of ACP-245's are urged to carefully read the request form and do the work according to the instructions contained therein. Special attention should be given to the extent appurtenant block as this could differ from the extent requested.

Participation in ASCS programs administered is open to all eligible farmers regardless of race, color, age, sex, religion, handicap or marital origin.

Remember, July 15, 1985 is the deadline!

Rockcastle River survey

Valley are in the drainage pattern collected by Roundstone Creek that enters the Rockcastle at Livingston.

That drainage pattern has caused concern at Livingston in recent months where Bro. Billy Medley, the mayor, keeps a watchful eye on what comes down Roundstone Creek. The "boils," an artesian spring that bubbles up beside Roundstone in the downtown area, is the source of Livingston's city water.

Recently, while visiting at the boils, the mayor stressed the need to keep the water clean. He schooled other residents who were outraged when the county proposed a solid waste landfill near Pine Hill that was well within the Roundstone drainage pattern. That proposal now seems to be shelved indefinitely.

Officials of the Daniel Boone National Forest are the most recent close observers of the river. They have authorized a study of a 13.5 mile section of the river between Ky. 80 and the Narrows to determine if the section meets the criteria for a designation under the federal Wild and Scenic Rivers Act of 1968. The entire section between the Narrows and the U. S. 25 bridge at Fort Sequoyah is already under the state rivers act.

Within the federal act, rivers are designated wild, scenic and/or recreational, any of which would place restrictions of one sort or another on development. "Wild" would prohibit any type of development along the banks. "Scenic" would limit development to roads and possibly residential. "Recreational" would allow some recreational development, but not an unlimited amount. Like all federal regulations, the determination is made through a complicated formula.

"It will take quite awhile to get a determination on what is best the section," said John Yancy, district forester at London. "After a study to see if the river meets the criteria for a federal designation, a second study must be made on feasibility. These studies take some time."

People who are familiar with the river believe when the final study is completed, the section will be designated "recreational."

A public hearing to get public input on the designation was held last week in London. Yancy said there were 32 persons who attended and that three items seemed to be of most interest. They were: Compensation for land to be given up, which is 60 percent privately owned; what effect a federal designation would have on the state designation, and the use of the land under any of the designations. The study is expected to address these subjects.

"It was a good meeting," Yancy said. "It was very pleasant. There was no controversy. Those who attended were there to learn."

No one would predict if, or when, the river between Fort Sequoyah and Lameroy would come up for review by state or federal authorities. Perhaps it will, eventually.

"I don't think many people would have a real interest in the river's designation between Fort Sequoyah and Lameroy," one participant at the meeting commented. "For them, it's wild and scenic now. A designation would be in name only. That section does not

lend itself to recreational, residential, or commercial growth, unless it became a lake."

At one time, the whole length of the river from the Narrows to Lameroy, and past, was on the way to becoming a lake. About 1966, the Army Corps of Engineers proposed a dam at the Narrows that would have backed water 14 feet deep at Lameroy, and just under the bridge at Fort Sequoyah.

At two hearings in Somerset.

Rockcastle residents seemed to favor the dam, while Somerset people, generally, opposed it, claiming they wanted nothing to interfere with the free flow of the river into Lake Cumberland. The Corps gave in. Somerset won. No dam.

After the Corps rejected the dam, the state began its study that resulted in the wild and scenic designation from the Narrows to Fort Sequoyah.

will be developed into a motel. A restaurant will be opened in the "Old Mill" part of the facility already renamed the Old Mill Motel and Restaurant.

Bowling still has a contract with the U.S. Bureau of Prisons Community Program to run a halfway house for selected prisoners. He operated a halfway house on the Laurel Lodge premises for about five months where he faced strong opposition from area residents, including Tackett, who is building a large home about a mile from Laurel Lodge.

Carlofts reported he had a verbal agreement with Bowling that the new Fort Sequoyah will not be used as a halfway house, but he was not sure if it was in writing. He noted that Fort Sequoyah is too valuable on the I-75 interchange to be used as a halfway house, and Bowling agreed.

After Bowling sold Laurel Lodge, it was leased back to Bowling, and Bowling sub-leased it to Roger Leatherwood, who has since closed it. Tackett said he was not aware it had been closed, or that the restaurant equipment had been moved to Fort Sequoyah.

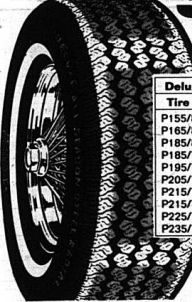

Dayton Ohio woman dies in single car accident

A Dayton, Ohio woman became the third person to die this year of a 1977 Suburban County Highway last Saturday afternoon.

Betty Lapenna, 57, of 7590 Glenhurst Dr., Dayton, was killed at approximately 3:25 p.m. Saturday, according to Kentucky State Trooper Jack Lawless.

Lawless said that Mrs. Lapenna died after she was thrown out of the 1977 Suburban which was driven by her husband, Joseph Lapenna, 58, also of Dayton.

The accident occurred 11.6 miles north of Mt. Vernon on I-75, near the Madison County line, according to Lawless, who said that Mrs. Lapenna was pronounced dead at the scene.

Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell, who was called to the scene, said Mrs. Lapenna died from multiple head injuries.

Lawless said the Lapennas were traveling with two sons, John, 26, and Kenneth, 24, and were apparently on a vacation trip.

The trooper said the Lapennas were pulling a 28-foot Marathon trailer when it started to sway. He said Joseph Lapenna told him he "could not regain control" of the Suburban and the trailer and that both of them struck the guard rail and overturned. Both Joseph and Betty Lapenna were thrown from the vehicle.

Joseph Lapenna and his two sons were transported to Berea Hospital with Class II injuries by the Rockcastle and Madison County ambulance services.

Local man indicted for attempted rape

An alleged attempted rape of two 15-year-old girls has resulted in the indictment of a Crab Orchard man.

Marvin Hopkins, approximately 30 years old, of Rt. 1, Crab Orchard, was indicted during the May term of the Rockcastle County Grand Jury for an incident that reportedly occurred near Bowling Ridge on May 13.

Hopkins, who has been charged with two counts of criminal attempt to commit first degree rape, has been released on \$30,000 property bond and is scheduled for an August arraignment before Circuit Judge Dan Venters.

The two teenagers involved included a Brodhead girl and a Garrard County girl.

The June term of the Rockcastle Grand Jury has also resulted in the indictment of two local men for cultivating marijuana for the purpose of resale.

Bill Vanwinkle and Tony Dammrell, both of Rt. 3, Berea, in the Flat Gap area of Rockcastle County, were indicted after an investigation by Kentucky State Police.

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Council changes swim law

Livingston man files suit against troopers

A Rockcastle County man has filed a civil suit against four Kentucky State Troopers, including three troopers assigned to Rockcastle County.

Gary Griffin of Livingston has filed suit in Circuit Court asking for a jury trial in connection with two incidents involving the four troopers.

The incidents reportedly occurred on March 27 and April 23 of this year and involved troopers Joe Schenkenfelder, Gary Lane, Jimmy Phelps and Detective Ernie Boggs.

Griffin, who is being represented by local attorney Carl R. Clontz, states in his suit that:

1) On March 27, 1985, the defendants, Gary T. Lane and Joe Schenkenfelder, arrested Griffin and caused him to be imprisoned in the Rockcastle County Jail.

2) Arrest was made without any reasonable grounds to believe Griffin was committing any offense, including the offense with which he was charged: operating a motor vehicle while his drivers license was suspended. The charge was later dismissed.

3) On April 23, 1985, Ernie Boggs and Jimmy Phelps unlawfully and unconstitutionally conducted a warrantless search of Griffin's residence, seized personal property belonging to Griffin and unlawfully arrested him and caused him to be imprisoned in the Rockcastle County Jail.

4) The defendants, Lane, Schenkenfelder, Boggs and Phelps, are officers of the Kentucky State Police and their actions set forth herein were done under color of state law and deprived Griffin, without due process, of liberty and property rights secured by the Constitution and laws of the United States. These rights are secured by the Fourth, Fifth and Fourteenth Amendments to the Constitution of the United States and Griffin is entitled to exemplary damages.

5) The foregoing acts of the troopers constitute false arrest and false imprisonment.

6) The troopers' actions and violations of Griffin's rights were willful and malicious and Griffin is entitled to exemplary damages.

7) As a result of the action of the troopers, Griffin suffered physical and mental pain and anguish.

8) He has incurred attorney fees which are recoverable from defendants.

9) The damages sought by Griffin are in excess of the minimum jurisdictional limits of the Rockcastle Circuit Court, and Griffin demands a jury trial.

County to get gas tax money

If and when the state adds a five cent tax to a gallon of gasoline or diesel fuel that will be used for roads, Rockcastle County would receive \$315,760 through a formula worked out by the Collins Administration.

The amount does not include money that would go to municipalities.

The General Assembly will take up the motor fuel tax increase during the special session that got under way Monday.

The increase would add \$43.2 million out of each \$100 million raised by the tax that would go to the counties and cities.

Half the money would be retained by the state and small amounts used for administration and an emergency fund.

The remainder is divided under a complicated formula for the rural secondary program; the county road aid program and the municipal road aid program.

City council begins search for new fire station site

Because of possible insurance rating problems, a new fire station at another location other than at City Hall will be the next major project for the city, the Mt. Vernon City Council agreed Monday night.

In a unanimous vote, the council authorized Mayor Roland Mullins to begin the process of raising funds for a new fire house to be located on the south side of the railroad tracks in or near downtown Mt. Vernon.

A location on the south side would prevent a delay in answering a fire call if a train is on the track blocking the crossing, something insurance companies demand.

One possible location for a new station that was not ruled out was the city parking lot across Main Street opposite the courthouse.

The council also did not rule out the possibility of a fire station on both sides of the tracks, using the present station in city hall for one truck to serve the north side of Mt. Vernon and a new building, or location, to house another truck on the south side.

The mayor said it could be possible to move the station to the south side of the railroad tracks and use the present fire station for offices, or some other yet undetermined use.

The present facility is so full of trucks and equipment that firemen have a problem moving around, and the present building cannot be expanded because of a lack of land.

Assistant Chief Buddy Cox attended the meeting. Buddy Cox told the council the city's fire insurance rating (Class 6) could be upped (Class 7) if some changes are not made, meaning residents would have to pay a much higher insurance rate.

He reported Harlan and Cumberland had a similar problem and solved it by adding a second fire station.

At the previous council meeting, the council approved a \$7,000 budget item to be used to build a second floor room for firemen to meet and for an office, and to repair the roof.

With a new fire station "in the mill," the council decided to spend \$7,000 and add \$3,000 for a new \$10,000 street sweeper. The vote was unanimous.

Circuit Judge Dan Venters attended the meeting to clarify the city's crackdown on parking tickets given to jurors who park around the courthouse.

The council earlier told Police Chief Joe Howard to meet with Circuit Clerk Clerk Denver Miller and ask him not to tell jurors to write "jury duty" on parking tickets, a practice the council would not honor.

Judge Venters told the council Mt. Vernon was the only city he knew of that did not honor juror parking.

Mayor Mullins said it was difficult for police to determine if a motorist was actually on jury duty or using that as an excuse to avoid paying a ticket.

can then take the ticket to Clerk Miller who will certify in writing on the ticket that the person was actually on jury duty. The juror then could take the ticket to City Hall where it would be voided.

Prior to the council meeting, city employees, their families and friends gathered in the fire station to honor water department employees.

The department was one of two voted as having the purest and cleanest water and most outstanding operation in eastern Kentucky by the Eastern Kentucky Water Operators Association.

A plaque was presented to Water Superintendent Matt Powell recognizing the accomplishment.

The association visited 31 water plants before making a decision. The mayor told those present the decision by the association was based on house-keeping, personnel, and water quality.

He also reported the city pumped 112,257,990 gallons of water in 1984, and expects to pump over 214 million gallons in 1985.

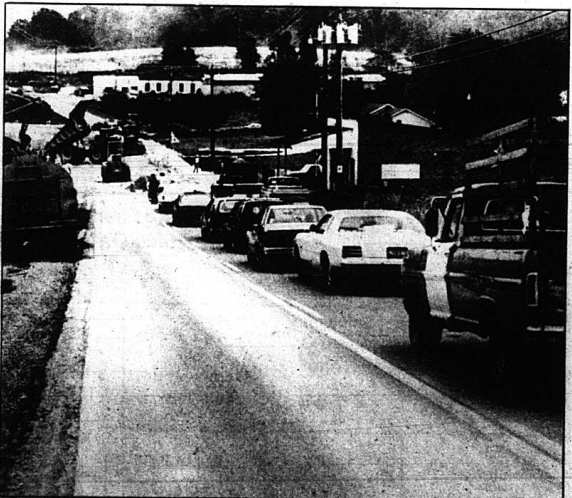
He said the cost of water in surrounding cities ranged from a high of \$6.25 for 2,000 gallons at London and Laurel County to a low of \$4.50 for 2,000 gallons at Mt. Vernon.

The council accepted a low bid of \$9,180 from Owens Chevrolet of Stanford for a Chevrolet auto to be used for a city copier.

The next regularly scheduled meeting of the council will be August 10.

Social Security at Fifty

Social Security reaches a major milestone on Aug. 14. It was just 50 years ago that the Social Security Act was signed into law. It set into motion a major institution that is just as much a part of America for people who have grown up since the depression as public education or the post office. Just about everyone is affected by Social Security. Over 9 out of 10 workers pay into the program. And well over 36 million people—more than one in seven persons—receive monthly disability, survivors, and retirement benefits.

About \$1.54 trillion in retirement and survivors payments were made from 1940 through June 1985, and about \$191 billion is disability benefits were paid from 1957 through June. The current value of just the survivor

protection under Social Security is worth nearly as much as the face value of all private life insurance in force.

Under a pay-as-you-go system, Social Security taxes from today's workers finance benefits for current beneficiaries. Using Social Security as a mechanism, it's a way for one generation to care for another.

The impact of Social Security on the lives of our citizens has been nothing short of revolutionary. Benefits provide a modest base of income for most retirees who are able to live more dependent lives. Millions of children can count on benefits should a parent die or start getting retirement or disability checks. And four out of five workers are insured for disability benefits and can get payments if they are unable to work for at least 12 months.

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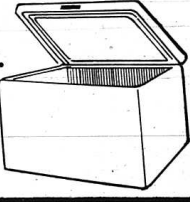
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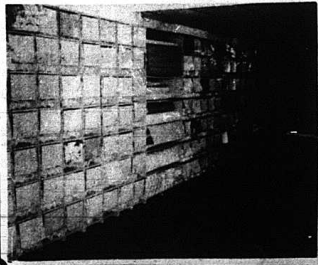
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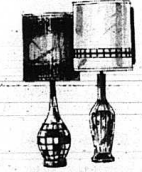


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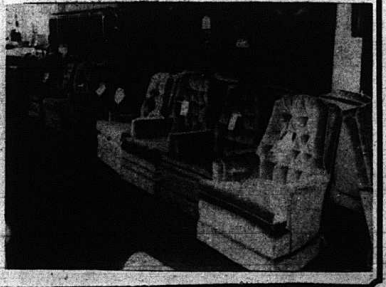
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Iowa 4-H'ers visit Kentucky

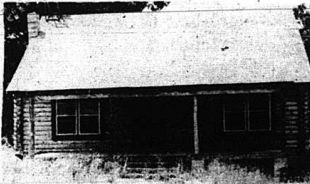

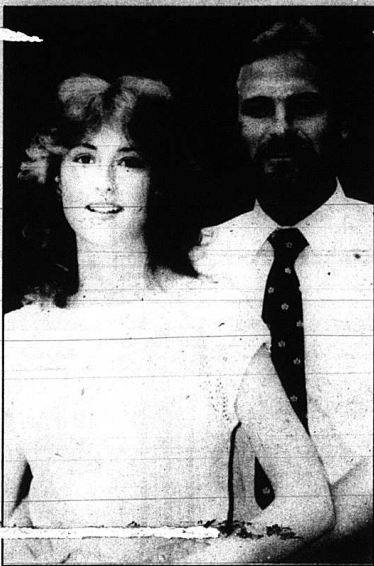

BELL PEPPERS GOOD FOR SUMMER DISHES

Even though the weather outside is hot and sticky, you can keep cool inside by making quick delicious dishes with bell peppers.

Most of the peppers you will find are the sweet green peppers. They are available on the market year round although more prevalent May through October.

Although usually sold while still green, bell peppers will turn bright red if allowed to mature fully. Look for well-shaped, firm, unblemished vegetables that have a bright color. 


