



On Tuesday July 9 we boarded our bus and traveled the Natchez Trace Parkway to Vicksurg (Historic Civil War City) where we had lunch and then crossed over the mightly Mississippi River into the state of Louisiana for a shifter while, then back across the five shad back across the fives and headed toward Natchez, Mississippi and much Civil War History. We had some on the bus that were so full of hot air they blew two of our tires out and had to take time to get them fixed. After getting our tires fixed we toured two Antebellum Mansions. The first was Magnolia Hall (built in 1858) by Thomas Henderson, planter and merchant. It is one of three most outstanding examples of Greek Revival Architecture in the town of Natchez. Magnolia Hall was the last great in the completed before the Civil War and was damaged by the Union Gumbat Essex during the conflict.

After going to our motel rooms
and freshening up, we boarded
our bus and tor an evening

banks of the Mississippi River and
a beautiful sunset. Everything was
as were before the Civil War days,
tin cups and tin plates to drink and tin cups and tin plates to drink and eat out of, with waiters wearing a big black hat and a big red feather stuck in it. Most everyone said it was the best catfish they had ever eaten, and I believe it the eaten, and I believe it the way they ate and ate. They also served chicken. The tour left Natchez Wed-nesday, July 10 we traveled on Natchez Trace Parkway to Jack-Natchez Trace Parkway to Jack-son, Mississippi. After a mid-morning break we again boarded our bus for Livingston, Alabama and Steve Brown, Area Aquacul-turist, Alabama Cooperative Ex-tension Service and Mr. Thed Spree, Owner of Catfish Farm where we were to visit after lunch at the Sumter Chateau Restaurant.

Mr. Spree directed us to his farm, where we visited several of his lakes and hatching operations, Mr. Spree owns about 270 cares in his farm operation where he hatches catfish from eggs on up to 1½ lb. size. It takes Mr. and Mrs. Spree and from 4 to 8 others to run the fish operation at different innes. When fish are first hatched they must be fed every 2 hours around the clock, and also security must be run every few hours day and night to check oxygen content. They use different aerators to keep water movement and oxygen content up to safe intention they water movement and oxygen content to the safe of the safe

the risk can be very bad if my doesn't go just right and could lose several thousands of dollars in just a few hours.




