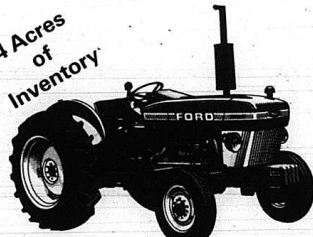

### Cromer named campaign chairperson

Jeff Cromer has been named as chairperson of the annual Fall "I Did It For CF" fund-raising campaign in Mt. Vernon benefiting the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

The announcement was made by Robert Montague, President of the Kentucky/West Virginia Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, who noted that funds raised from the event will support research and treatment programs of the CF Foundation.

"Our principal goal is to fund research that will lead us to a control or cure for cystic fibrosis, the number one genetic killer of children and young adults in the United States. Every day, every five hours, a child is born with cystic fibrosis. And every day, every eight hours, a young person dies with CF," said Montague.

The Kentucky/West Virginia Chapter is one of 60 Cystic Fibrosis Foundation Chapters throughout the country. In addition to its mission of research, the Foundation also support a network of 127 centers nationally. Two of the centers are located in Kentucky and

one in West Virginia, which specialize in the diagnosis and medical care of CF patients.

Cystic Fibrosis is a chronic, degenerative disease which affects the lungs and digestive system. It results when a defective gene is transmitted by both parents.

"We are grateful for the commitment and support of Mr. Cromer said Montague. "Together, as a team of volunteers working on similar fund-raising events, we can make a strong impact on the fight to conquer cystic fibrosis."

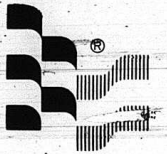

## Livingston man killed in motorcycle accident

A Livingston man was killed instantly Wednesday night when his motorcycle struck a parked dump truck near Livingston.

Samuel F. (Sammy) Clements, 22, was riding his Honda motorcycle about 10 p.m. on KY 490 about one-half mile east of Livingston when the accident occurred.

Rockcastle County Coroner Billy Dowell, who pronounced Clements dead at the scene, said Clements died of massive head and chest injuries. Dowell also said Clements was not wearing a helmet at the time of the accident. The truck involved was owned by Carpenter Trucking Co.

Mr. Clements was born November 12, 1962 in Salina, Kansas, the son of Franklin D. Clements of Dora, Alabama and Mae Shehan Carroll of Livingston. Survivors, besides his parents, are his brother, Samuel F. (Cont. to A-8)

## Respiratory therapist dies Friday

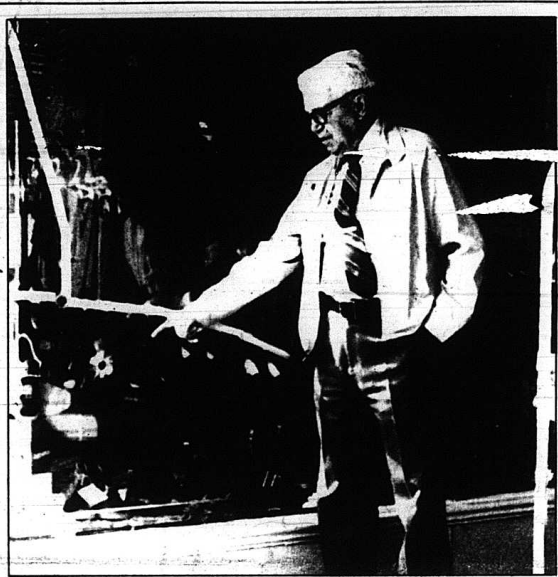
A Somerset man, who had been employed at the Rockcastle County Hospital for the past several years, died early Saturday morning from injuries sustained in a motorcycle accident.

Police said that Jimmy Marcum, 30, lost control of his motorcycle on KY 39 and struck a utility pole guy wire. The accident occurred about one-half mile north of Somerset at approximately 9:30 a.m.

According to police reports, Marcum was fatally injured when his motorcycle went off the pavement on a curve and hit the wire.

He was taken to the Lake Cumberland Medical Center in Somerset then put on a helicopter to be transferred to the University of Ky. Medical Center in Lexington. He died at 1 a.m. while the helicopter was in the air, police said.

## Ford turns thumbs down on Collins' education package

Stressing he is not opposed to education, State Rep. Danny Ford said today he voted against the Collins Administration's \$276 million education package because of a hefty increase in property taxes.

He pointed out that, under the package that passed the House 83-15 with two abstentions, it will mean a 66 percent increase for property owners in Rockcastle County.

In the 1980 session of the General Assembly, the House mandated a school district could

not raise property taxes more than four percent without a vote of the people.

"We're getting taxes raised on property with no vote of the people needed," he said.

On the House floor, he told proponents of the legislation not to "crum it down our throats," but they didn't listen.

"There is over \$200 million in surplus funds that could be used to support the education package," Ford said. "That is enough to pay for the governor's program of educational improvement. We don't need more taxes."

Rep. Ford did vote "yes" to fund the education package, because new money raised by the bill is not specifically earmarked for education, and because "There are enough funds in the state to support the package without raising taxes."

Of the 15 who voted against the package, most indicated a controversial property tax amendment was the cause. That amendment states that all school districts "shall" impose a minimum property tax of 25 cents per \$100 of assess value of the property.

## Lambert big spender in Primary election

Candidates spent from \$50 to \$12,032.40 during the recent county election, according to financial reports on file in the county clerk's office.

Incumbent County Attorney James H. Lambert was the big spender during the election, spending \$12,032.40 on his successful re-election campaign. His opponent, local attorney John Clontz, spent \$5,332.40 in his bid to unseat the incumbent.

The most money spent on one campaign this year more than doubled the most spent on one office four years ago.

In 1981, now state representative Danny Ford spent the largest amount, putting a total of \$5,979.59 into his race which encompassed two counties. Also, in 1981, Lambert was the big spender then too, on a county election, spending \$5,220.09 -- less than half of what he spent in 1985.

The only contribution Lambert showed receiving on his financial report was from his

father, former County Attorney James W. Lambert, who donated \$3,000 to his son's campaign.

Lambert won his second term in May by a margin of 138 votes over Clontz.

In the ten man race for the Republican nomination for County Judge Executive, 5th District Magistrate Joe Clark, who finished fourth in the race, was the big spender, dropping a total of \$3,606.94 into his election effort. Winner of the nomination, Hubert Thacker, spent a total of \$3,600 on his campaign, in his effort to become a third term county judge.

Clarence Carter, who lost to Thacker by a total of 86 votes, was third in spending with \$3,303.52.

In the race for Property Valuation Administrator, incumbent Elmer Hale, who won easily over his opponent, Cleith Thacker, spent \$865.81 while Thacker's spending totaled \$1,399.00.

Norma Houk, who handily won the county clerk's seat, spent the most on her election effort, but

## State comes down on county for garbage

Once again the state has come down hard on garbage disposal practices in Rockcastle County, reminding the county that time has run out for closing open dumps that are scattered around the county.

Based on inspections, officials for the Department for Environmental Protection and Division of Waste Management, said the results of the county's solid waste management practices are "cosmetic, at best and constitute a policy to establish open dumps in violation of Kentucky Statutes, at worst."

The division commended the county government for its attempt to address the solid waste problem, but said the county "contracted with Clarence Hasty to allow the establishment of open dumps on public and private property in Rockcastle County which is prohibited."

The division had set a July 15 deadline for the county to submit to the division a brief outline and schedule for closing of dumps.

Said the department:

"Since the dumps spill over onto private property or have been established by the county on private property, the cleanups must best be jointly performed by the county, Mr. Clarence Hasty, and the property owners through a cost or labor share. The Division of Waste Management will hold the county responsible for the completion of these cleanups whether or not the property owner contributes to the cleanup. As was acknowledged in the May 30, 1985, meeting, other open dumps exist in Rockcastle County and any dumps on county right-of-ways or which the county has established on private property are the county's responsibility to clean up."

## Hundreds gathered for Old Joe Clark Festival

They came to hear songs like "Foggy Mountain Breakdown," "Muddy Bottom" and "Rocky Top, Tennessee."

They were lovers of bluegrass music and they clapped and whooped and whistled and stomped as more than a dozen well-known bluegrass bands picked and strummed their way through the first annual Old Joe Clark Bluegrass Festival Friday through Sunday at Renfro Valley.

"Cripple Creek" and "Black Mountain Rag" were the hot numbers, and so was the weather as about 5,000 fans of bluegrass bands like the Osborne Brothers and the Lewis Family, sat in open sunshine fanning and drinking pop, seemingly unaware of the hundred mark on the field.

"The heat kept some away, I'm sure," said Terry Clark who spent nearly a week with the Clark Family on the grounds preparing for the three-day musical event. "But it could have been worse, we could have had three days of rain. As in all open air events, it is difficult to choose perfect weather. No doubt rain would have damp-

ed the fun and frolicking, though fans will tell you weather seldom alters the true bluegrass music lover.

One couple sat through 20 hours of music and gave away 20 "hats" late on Sunday.

"We'd like to stay for another session of Mac Wiseman," she said as she gathered up folding chair, pillow and a pop cooler, staples for the festival. "But we have to be back in Dayton (Ohio) early tomorrow. We liked the festival. We enjoyed Renfro Valley. We'll come back again, next time to see the bandstand."

Another couple came just for the Saturday night session. "We're from Augusta, Ga. and we heard the Lewis Family was here and stopped over," he said. "It's awful hot, but we still liked it. We have had through hot weather and rainy weather many times before to hear bluegrass music."

"Mrs. Old Joe Clark" (Jean, to most folks who watch the congregation, recalled the woman laughingly asked for a "cold dog." "I told her, it wouldn't matter. It will be a hot dog before you get back to your seat."

Senior citizens attending got

break. A large tent was erected, but it turned out to be first come, first served as time by. Some folks brought umbrellas. Many sat on quilts on the ground.

For those who didn't attend, they missed some of the best bluegrass bands in the land. In addition to Mac Wiseman and the Lewis Family, there were the Osbornes, Outdoor Plumbings, Moore Brothers, Low Gap, Cummins Sisters, Robert White and the Candy Mountain Express, Larry Sparks and the Lonesome Ramblers, Country Rhoads, John Cosby and the Bluegrass Drifters and of course, Old Joe Clark and Terry.

Not everyone came for the festival. The Bandstand and Jamboree have their fans. On Friday night there was the weekly Renfro Gospel Sing that drew a large crowd. Saturday night there were two shows in each barn that were nearly sold out.

On the local scene, there was not a motel room left Saturday night. Many stayed in London and Berea. Restaurants did especially well despite the hundreds who came in motor homes and campers and brought their own food and drink.

Not many local people attended

the festival. Maybe bluegrass music is not their cup of tea. Maybe it was too hot. Maybe they didn't like crowds. Maybe it was because it wasn't in Lexington in Rupp Arena. However, one employee stretched

the point when he said, "There's 9,999 here tonight and one from Rockcastle County."

He was wrong, there were eight. So much for local interest in bluegrass music.

Whatever the final result of the festival, nothing deterred Terry Clark. He was looking ahead when he said, "We're already thinking

# Rogers says funds OK'd for Agricultural project

By Congressman Hal Rogers

Fifth District Congressman Harold Rogers said a House Appropriations subcommittee has approved \$150,000 for a three year project, which is designed to help Kentucky develop supplemental crops.

Rogers said his Agriculture Subcommittee has approved the funds for the University of Kentucky to develop an efficient production and marketing system for Kentucky fruits and vegetables, as part of the 1986 Ag Appropriations bill.

"This project will include market research, developing a plan to produce, store and handle the crops, and developing a marketing system for the crops which are grown," said Rogers.

Rogers said the project is needed in Kentucky because of the size and makeup of Kentucky farms.

"With a flat demand for tobacco and declining tobacco

income, our farmers need supplemental sources of farm income," Rogers said. "Fruits and vegetables are particularly suited to Kentucky because our farms are small, but we need this kind of research and marketing expertise to get a program like this going."

Under the proposal which Rogers drafted and the subcommittee approved, the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the University of Kentucky's Ag Extension Service and Experiment Station would work jointly on the research. U.S.D.A. would provide funding at the rate of \$150,000 a year over the three-year period.

"Supplemental crops offer Kentucky farmers a real chance to add to their farm income," Rogers added. "This program, called 'Project: Agriculture Diversity,' will give us the opportunity to increase farm income and diversify our crop bases."

The legislation now goes to the full Appropriations Committee for further action.

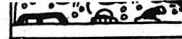

## Agri-Business tour head south for six state tour of Al, Miss, La, Ga., Tn, Ky.

Agri-Business people from Rockcastle, Lincoln, Pulaski and Casey counties headed a wonderful four day tour of the south, being in six states, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, and Tennessee. Our first stop was in Iuka, Mississippi in Tishomingo county, a Tennessee River and the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway. Connecting the Tennessee River with the Gulf of Mexico. It will benefit Kentucky in a shorter distance to ship our coal and grain to market. The waterway cost about 2 billion dollars to construct, is 234 miles long, more than 308 million cubic yards of soil were removed from the waterway path, more than the Panama or Suez Canals. We spent the first night in Tupelo, Mississippi.

On Tuesday July 9 we boarded our bus and traveled the Natchez Trace Parkway to Vicksburg (Historic Civil War City) where we had lunch and then crossed over the mighty Mississippi River into the state of Louisiana for a short while, then back across the river and headed toward Natchez, Mississippi on the banks of the Mississippi, and much Civil War History. We had some on the bus that were so full of hot air they blew two of our tires out and had to take time to get them fixed. After getting our tires fixed we toured two Antebellum Mansions. The first was Magnolia Hall (built in 1858) by Thomas Henderson, planter and merchant. It is one of three most outstanding examples of Greek Revival Architecture in the town of Natchez. Magnolia Hall was the last great mansion to be completed before the Civil War and was damaged by the Union Gunboat Essex during the conflict.

The next Antebellum mansion we toured was Stanton Hall (built by William Stanton a plantation owner and dealer in cotton. After going to our motel rooms and freshening up, we boarded our bus and for an evening dined at the Cock of the Walk Catfish Fillet under the hill on the banks of the Mississippi River and a beautiful sunset. Everything was as we were before the Civil War days, in cups and tin plates to drink and eat out of, with waters wearing a big black hat and a big red feather stuck in it. Most everyone said it was the best catfish they had ever eaten, and I believe it is the way they ate and ate. They also served chicken.

The tour left Natchez, Wednesday, July 10 we traveled on Natchez Trace Parkway to Jackson, Mississippi. After a mid-morning break we again boarded our bus for Livingston, Alabama and Steve Brown, Area Aquaculturist, Alabama Cooperative Extension Service and Mr. Thed Spree, Owner of Catfish Farm where we were to visit after lunch at the Sumter Chateau Restaurant.

Mr. Spree directed us to his farm, where we visited several of his lakes and hatching operations. Mr. Spree owns about 270 acres in this farm operation where he hatches catfish from eggs on up to 1 3/4 lb. size. It takes Mr. and Mrs. Spree and from 4 to 8 others to run the fish operation at different times. When fish are first hatched they must be fed every 2 hours around the clock, and also security must be run every few hours day and night to check oxygen content. They use different aerators to keep water movement and oxygen content up to safe content. They Market several million fish per year from fingerlings to 1 3/4 lbs. in most of eastern and central U.S. They make some money but

the risk can be very bad. If it doesn't go just right and could lose several thousands of dollars in a few hours.

There may be some farmers interested in this area that has suitable lakes on their farm for some extra money, tobacco looking rather dark at the present time. After showing us their fish farm the Spree's took us to their beautiful home for refreshments and southern hospitality. We traveled on to Birmingham and our motel for the night.

Thursday, July 11 and the last day of our tour with mixed emotions on having to part company with so many close friends, like years ago when school ended. We stopped in Knoxville, for lunch and the ladies did some shopping at a large mall (with what little money they had left, and their husbands frowned when they asked them for more money). Then boarded the bus for Mt. Vernon, and many happy smiling faces to greet us back home again. Everyone even the new members of our tour expressed having an enjoyable time and the group begin making plans for another

Eighty-five Rockcastle Countians enjoyed a fun-filled week at Felner 4-H Camp in London last week. This was the largest group ever to attend camp from Rockcastle County and along with Letcher County made up the majority of the 264 youth present at camp last week. Other counties camping were: McCreary, Jackson and Leslie.

This year, campers did not have to completely forget about their television sets while they were at camp. The camp theme, "Battle of the Network Stars," divided our campers into networks instead of tribes. The networks were able to choose their own call

letters and then compete all week to earn points to be the top network.

On Wednesday night, WKYT-TV representative, Bill Bryant, presented a special program to the campers, about what goes on "behind the scenes" of a television news program. He taped some footage of the campers and camp director for possible use on a later news spot.

One of the special classes at camp which tied into the overall theme was the video production class. Troy Taylor along with Greg Tillery, a Jackson County teen, taught three classes daily, showing campers how to use the camera as they taped camp activities. 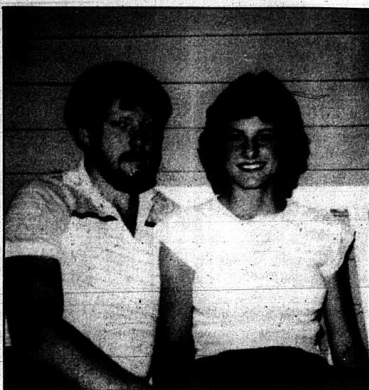

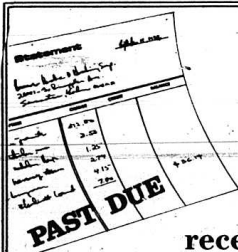

The department agreed that the waste management problem is complex and will not be quickly resolved, but "Rockcastle has a number of actions which it may take" and should consider them closely. They are:

The county could establish a mandatory collection ordinance requiring that each household and business or other entity be required to use the services of a public or private waste collection service. The county might wish to consider provisions for limited subsidies in rural areas and for those at a financial disadvantage.

The county could establish private or public convenience which are manned garbage collection points where waste may be dumped into large dumpsters. These centers may operate on a "tipping fee" basis or be partially or totally subsidized by the county. The waste from these convenient centers would then be transported in large containers to a properly permitted residential landfill.

The county may wish to hire a solid waste coordinator whose duties would include enforcement of littering laws and any other waste related ordinances passed by the fiscal court. This position could be part-time in a county as small as Rockcastle County.

An aggressive education program to promote recycling and proper waste disposal could be developed in Rockcastle County to help break the old habit of dumping trash down the next hollow. The Division of Waste Management and Cumberland

Valley ADD could provide Rockcastle County with further information about successful programs and available resources for education.

Rockcastle County could establish a recycling program which would help to reduce the volume of waste sent to resources. Programs to serve for education about proper waste management. Successful programs have been developed by nonprofit and private for profit recycling centers in rural communities like Rockcastle County and this division will be glad to refer county officials to such models.

The county could establish a transfer station and truck consolidated waste loads to E.R. Hopper, Jackson County, or Tri-County residential landfills.

The state said the most expensive option available to Rockcastle County to address its waste management problems would be to continue development of the residential landfill for which it recently sought a permit. Given the relatively limited budget, county operation of the residential landfill might do more to create a new set of problems than solve old ones.

not by much. Mrs. Houk spent \$3,101.78, now deputy clerk David Bales' \$3,073.74. Paul Atney, the third place finisher spent \$1,779.25 on his campaign.

Former Deputy Sheriff Clarence "Jib" Hasty, won the county Sheriff's seat did not spend a lot of money doing it. According to his report, Hasty spent only \$466 on his campaign while incumbent Sheriff William E. Taylor spent \$1,489.20. Third place finisher, Shirley Smith, spe it \$600.64.

In the race for Jailer, Earl Cummins, who finished a distant fourth, spent the most money, dropping a total of \$2,670.90. Winner of the office, Billy Kirby, was second in spending at \$1,574 while second place finisher Harlan "Buck" Tarling spent \$1,526.27. Delno McClure, who finished third, spent \$301.

Only one candidate for county-wide office, John C. Bullock, has not filed some type of campaign report with the clerk's office. Bullock was a candidate for Jailer.

A total of \$126,528.65 was spent on this year's primary election.

Rockcastle's property tax rate is now 15 cents per \$100.

The amendment changed the wording of the provision from "may" impose to "shall" impose which the 15 legislators did not like. The amendment passed.

As it now stands, 42 districts would be required to raise their tax rate to the 25 cents to receive more equalization funds, which are distributed to poorer districts to help make their programs more comparable to those of richer districts.

Failure of a district to raise the rate would have their state equalization money allocated at the 19% level. They would not be allowed to participate in new school building fund which is in the education package.

Ford told the legislators the districts would raise their rates anyway in order to participate more fully in the equalization program without the General Assembly dictating to them.

Ford voted "no" on the business tax that was to help fund the education bill, but it passed with one amendment, 67-31. Ford said he felt the tax would have created a hardship for both businesses and farmers because of depreciation schedules.

The education package is now awaiting action in the Senate.

Ford also voted "no" to raise to current gasoline tax by five cents a gallon. It is now 12 cents a gallon. The gas tax was voted down by a big 24 vote margin, 60-36.

Rep. Ford said he supposed the gas tax was about as fair as any tax, but charged the administration took \$47 million from the Transportation Fund and put it into the General Fund when it should have been kept in the Transportation Fund.

"If I stayed in the Transportation Fund, roads in Kentucky wouldn't be in the shape they are in today," he related. "We need better management in the highway department. When we get that, then I can see being for necessary taxes to keep us on our feet."

Rep. Ford cast a "yes" vote for a bill allocating \$8.3 million to help abate and neglected children.

Among items included under

the bill are 183 social workers and 62 support staff members that will be hired for a nine-month period, along with the opening of a girls' residential home in Maysville with a staff of 40.

Needless to say, Rep. Ford has been unhappy with most of the legislation so far passed by the General Assembly in its special session.

"I've been very disappointed," he said. "This has been the hardest and most difficult session we've had since I have been in the legislature, and we still have more time to go.

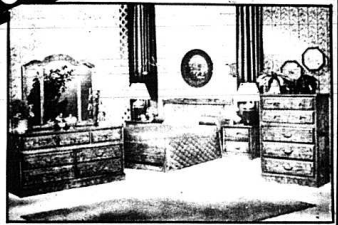

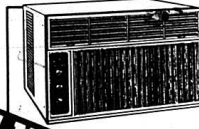

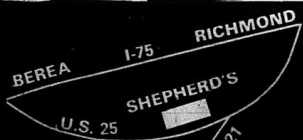

#### PICKLES AND SALT

"Cut down on salt!" is advice heard frequently from nutritionists and physicians.

Using less salt in cooking and using the salt shaker sparingly at mealtimes are two ways to cut down on salt.

But some foods, such as pickles especially, are very high in salt content.

Consumers interested in making low-salt pickles at home should

remember that neither salt substitutes (potassium chloride) nor lite salt (magnesium sodium and potassium chloride) should be used to replace salt in regular pickle making.

These products will not serve the same function as the regular salt called for in a recipe. Salt provides a crisp texture and acts as a preservative in pickles. Large amounts of potassium can leave a bitter aftertaste in pickles.

Recipes that specifically call for salt substitutes take these factors into account and are safe, providing vinegar is used in adequate amounts and the pickles are heat processed. The following recipe is a suitable example.

#### Low Sodium Pickles

3 pounds pickling cucumbers  
3 cloves garlic

- 6 heads dill
- 3 cups vinegar
- 3 cups water
- 3 teaspoons salt substitute\*

Wash cucumbers and pack in jars. Place 1-2 cloves garlic and 1 head dill in each jar. Heat vinegar, water, and salt substitute to boiling. Pour mixture over cucumbers. Fasten screw bands. Process 15 minutes in boiling water bath. Allow five days to ripen. Note: The lack of salt in this pickle recipe may produce a product that is less desirable in taste and texture than conventional recipes.

Pickles made with vegetables such as cauliflower, beets or carrots are not generally crisp in texture and therefore salt can be omitted. Consumers who do not want to can pickles can make a batch and keep in the refrigerator. Plan to use within a month, however.

#### HORTICULTURE FIELD DAY

The University of Kentucky Horticulture Field Day will be July 23 from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the UK South Farm at the corner of Nicholasville and Higbee Mill roads.

This year is the 100th anniversary of the Agriculture Experiment Station at UK and in recognition of this field day will feature comparisons between vegetable varieties that were recommended 100 years ago and those that are recommended today.

Vegetable plots also will include studies on the benefits of row covers in speeding up crop maturity; numerous variety trials, research on cucumber beetle control, reduced tillage sweet corn, and the effects of trickle irrigation, black plastic mulch, raised beds and plant density on bell pepper yields and much more.

Fruit plots will demonstrate the effects of soil fumigation of strawberries, fertilization and mulching of thornless blackberries, and integrated pest management of apples. Demonstration plots of overbearing strawberry varieties and grape varieties also will be part of the fruit portion of the program.

Several commercial exhibitors will be present to visit with as well as horticulturists, agricultural engineers, plant pathologists, agricultural economists, and entomologists from UK.

Just a reminder that the Rockcastle County Farm Field Day will be Friday, July 26th from 5 - 7 p.m. Reservations should be in the Extension Office by Friday, July 19th. Call 256-2403.

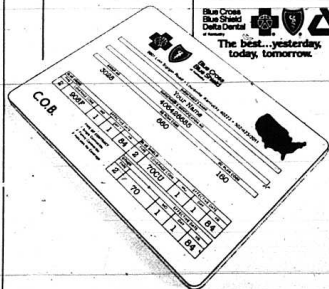

## Lily May Ledford, country music pioneer, dead at 68

Lily May Ledford, who picked, fiddled and sang her way to fame with the Coon Creek Girls on the Renfro Valley Barn dance, died Sunday in Lexington after an illness of over a year. She was 68.

One of the original Coon Creek Girls, she came to Renfro

Valley when John Lair opened the barn dance in 1939 and stayed for over 15 years.

In the early years she played

with sister, Rosie, now deceased, Evelyn "Daisy" Lange and Esther "Violet" Koehler. But in subse-

quent years she performed with Rosie and another sister, Minnie, whose stage name was Black-Eyed Susie.

John Lair once said of her, "The best thing about Lily May is her naturalness. She is the real thing. She has old-time songs that she got from her parents and is a great all-around musician."

Her career highlight was when she performed with the Coon Creek Girls before President Franklin D. Roosevelt and his guests, King George VI and Queen Elizabeth, in the White House in 1939. She also performed with Sunshine Sue in the Old Dominion Barn dance on Broadway in 1955.

Last month, she was awarded a National Endowment for the Arts Heritage Fellowship and \$5,000 for her contribution to the traditional arts field. Reportedly, because of her serious illness, she did not know she was the recipient of the prestigious award.

She was born March 17, 1917 in Powell County's Red River George area. She was one of 14 children of a tenant farm family. She went on to fame as a musician after winning a talent contest at Mt. Vernon High School judged by John Lair in 1936. She was Berea College's Artist in Residence in 1939 and 1940.

She is survived by a son James (J.P.) Pennington of Lexington who is a member of the country-western band, Eddie and another musician son, Robert G. Pennington of Berea. A daughter, Barbara Ann Greenleaf of Nicholasville, also survives as well as two brothers, Thomas Gaylen Ledford of Stanton and Henry Kermit Ledford of Verona, Ohio, her sister, Minnie Jennings of Marathon, Fla., and four grandchildren.

Services were held Wednesday in Berea Baptist Church. Burial was in Berea Cemetery. Wray Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.
