Love is Serving

It has been said that the three easiest words to utter in the English language are: "I love you." These simple words span the gulfs of loneliness, grief, pain, and bring lasting joy to the hearts of young and old alike. How would be thrilling to know how many lives have been welded together by this beautiful expression.

Love includes more than a feeling—more than a statement; it necessitates involvement. Jesus said, "If ye love me, keep my commandments." (John 14:15). Thus it is the action prompted by love which is best understood. Love should be expressed by raising the concept higher than bumper stickers reading: "Honk if you love Jesus." Love is best shown by hearts that care and hands that serve (2 Cor. 8:24). Christians are to be:

EXAMPLES IN LOVE BY SERVING CHRIST. Our love for Him is not a shallow emotion, but a love that is not self-centered but is an active obedience to His will (1 John 5:3). Love's service to Christ is pleasant service, like the mother who works hard, but happily, for her family. Love's service swallows pride and forgives (Luke 17:4). Love's service attends the assemblies regardless of other attractions (2 Tim. 3:4; Heb. 10:25). Love's service sacrifices regardless of whether or not we have all the material things we want (2 Cor. 8:2). Our love for Christ is either more or less than our love for these things. Which is it for you? We sing: "More love to Thee, O Christ," but do we really mean it as we sing?

EXAMPLES IN LOVE BY SERVING OUR NEIGHBOR. When we became Christians we accepted Christ's standard to love our neighbor as ourselves (Matt. 22:39). In daily life it means, "Do for others what you want them to do for you" (Matt. 7:12). Were you lost in a trackless forest, would you want someone to bring you to safety? If you were trapped in a burning house, would you want someone to rescue you? Should I be lost in sin with eternal punishment before me, I would want you to help me to be saved. Just as I would want you to help me, I

must seek to assist you in the same manner. There is a tremendous need for examples in leading others to Christ—examples that can inspire and fill others with the urgency of saving lost souls.

The example of the good Samaritan in Luke 10:30-37 best illustrates love for one's neighbor. This Samaritan invested his time, energy and money without expectation of personal gain to take care of his neighbor. If it is difficult to understand why a total stranger would go to such extremes of expense and personal inconvenience to help another with no thought for personal gain, the answer is love for that neighbor. Jesus said, "Go, and do thou likewise" (Luke 10:37).

EXAMPLES IN LOVE BY SERVING OUR BROTHER. Brethren who say they love the Lord but hate one another are poor examples to others. Peter said that love is to be "unfeigned" and "fervent" (1 Peter 1:22). True disciples of Jesus have love one for the other and Jesus said, "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples" (John 13:35). The world will soon note our brotherly love, or the lack of it. Some profess to love their brethren but "knock" them at every opportunity.

True love in serving our brother will prompt us to clothe and feed him when he is in need (Jas. 2:14-16); seek his restoration if he falls (Gal. 6:1; Jas. 5:19-20); and will result in God's people being "knit together in unity" (Col. 2:2).

No decade has presented more opportunities for demonstrating love for Christ, for our neighbor, and for our brethren than this one. Christians can blaze the trail by the right kind of examples. Some talk of a "love-out"; we really need a "love-out", turning our feelings of love into examples of true Christianity.

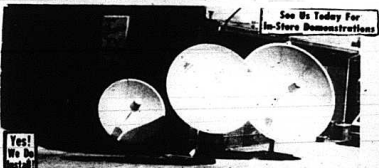

A total of 23 traffic accidents were investigated. Of these 18 were property damage only accidents; 5 were personal injury accidents. There were no fatal

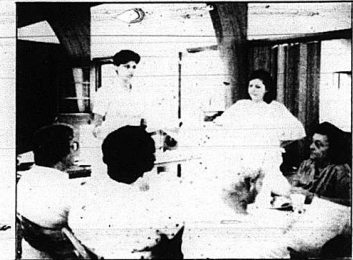
accidents; 9 persons were injured. 11 criminal investigations were made resulting in 1 criminal arrest.

is lost for good."

The bill calls for a sharp roll-back of support prices, a 50-50 sharing of no-net-cost assessments by manufacturers and farmers, buy-out of existing pool stocks, and a special formula for future production levels.

Under the proposal the drought-damaged 1983 crop held by the Burley Association would be taken over by the Commodity Credit Corporation and disposed of. Any stocks unsold within two years after the loans are called would be sold at sharp discounts.

Vernon, once in the head with a pistol. Ms. Lear died later at the University of Kentucky Medical Center in Lexington.

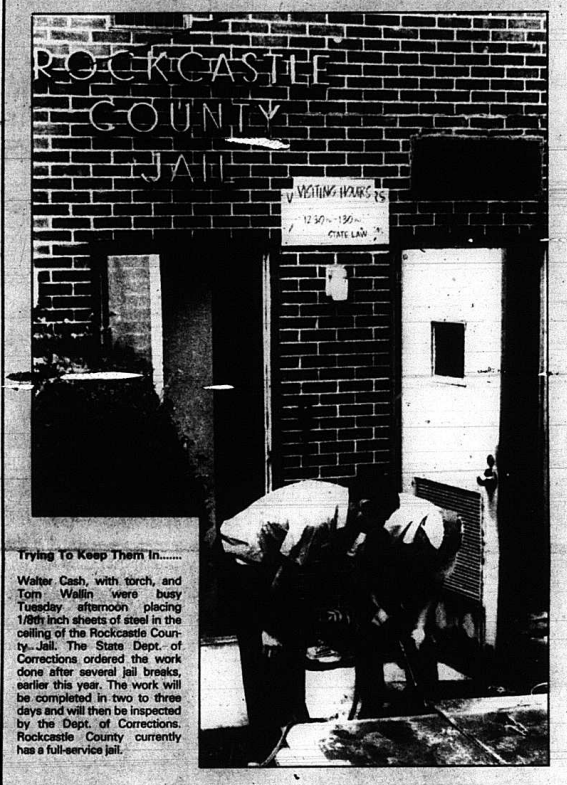
Renner, who is presently free on \$50,000 property bond, is scheduled for an August 9 arraignment before Circuit Judge Dan Venters.

Local authorities confiscate 'weed'

It has become a thriving business in Rockcastle County, said Sheriff William Taylor. The subject is marijuana, and Taylor said there might be some growing on your farm and you don't even know it.

Taylor and Kentucky State Troopers Nick Hensley, Shane Mahane and William Stewart did something Tuesday morning to curtail the growth of at least three crops in the county.

One crop was growing in the area of the sewer plant on Town Branch near the sewer plant. While only 15 plants were found and destroyed at that location, Taylor said this was the second straight year that some of the crop was found in that particular location.

The big haul on Tuesday was at Sand Hill where the sheriff reported finding two different patches with a total of 800 plants growing. "Someone had been taking very good care of those patches," Taylor said. He went on to say that the 800 plants were valued at over \$650,000 and that whoever was raising the crop, which is located about 3 1/2 miles from Livingston, had the fields booby-trapped.

"We located the patches when we noticed several dog walks leading off Sand Hill Road just past the church," he said. All 800 plants were cut off and destroyed.

Taylor and State Police Detective Ernie Boggs also located and destroyed seven plants in the Sand Springs area just off Pine Branch Road about six miles from Mt. Vernon last week.

According to the sheriff, marijuana can be found almost every day that he attempts to find some.

This was the single most

valuable crop destroyed so far this season. Taylor and Deputy Sheriff Jim Durham located 746 plants on Hi-Dri Road in May, but Taylor said his office was just scratching the surface.

"We are going to keep looking, but without the aid of a helicopter, it is almost impossible to find the weed growing in the many wooded areas in the county," he said.

Legislature approves Collins tax package

The special session of the General Assembly has approved Gov. Martha Lane Collins' nearly \$300 million education improvement plan and sent it to the governor for her signature, which she is expected to sign before the week is out.

The bill was approved in the House 79-15. State Rep. Danny Ford voted "no" on the package. In the Senate, Sen. John Rogers voted "no."

To support the education package, both the House and Senate voted to approve a \$218 million business tax. Both Ford and Rogers voted "no" on the business tax.

Police Commission proposes motel tax, midnight curfew in Mt. Vernon

Fifteen recommendations aimed at establishing guidelines for the Mt. Vernon Police Department have been submitted to the Mt. Vernon City Council.

The council will study the recommendations and either accept or reject them by October.

Mayor Roland Mullins and the council thanked the commission which met last Thursday for the last time.

"The commission has worked hard and has come up with some good ideas," the mayor said. "We'll study the proposals and go over them at the August and September council meetings. By October we should know which ones to put into effect."

Three of the proposals only indirectly affect the day by day operation of the department.

The commission proposed extending the city limits north and south to I-75, and recommended a five percent motel-hotel tax to be used to help finance the police department that is expected to have a sharp reduction in funds when revenue sharing is ended by the federal government.

The five percent tax would be added to room rent and paid by the customer, not the motel. Cities that now have the tax include Berea, Richmond, London and Corbin. The commission also proposed a midnight curfew with the exception of people at work or traveling to and from work. Also approved by the commis-

sion was a resolution to eliminate parking meters and establish a two hour parking limit and a \$5 overtime parking ticket. Other recommendations include:

- establish a police headquarters at city hall open 24 hours a day with a dispatcher;
- enforce parking signs and eliminate double parking;
- recommend two policemen on duty at night (9 p.m. to 3 a.m.) with one on patrol and the other on foot keeping radio communications at all times, and two police on duty during daylight hours;
- police forbidden to leave the city limits during their tour-of-duty;
- a minimum of nine policemen on the force including the

And, it's virtually assured that before very long there will be a federal tax increase to help bring the federal budget deficit under control.

Rogers says funds approved

Fifth District Congressman Harold Rogers said two programs "of vital interest to every county in my district" were given a major boost by the U.S. House of Representatives.

Rogers said funds to continue the Appalachian Regional Commission, totalling some \$134 million, were approved, along with continuing funds for the Economic Development Administration. E.D.A. would receive \$180 million for direct assistance to cities and counties, and \$150 million for loan guarantees.

"There is not a single county in our district which has not

benefited from one or both of these programs," said Rogers. "With the help of A.R.C. and E.D.A., we have built new hospitals and roads, improved our downtown areas, added new water systems and sewage treatment plants, and much more. We need these funds to continue, and I was pleased to hear and support their continuation in my work in the House Appropriations Committee."

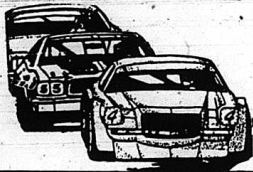

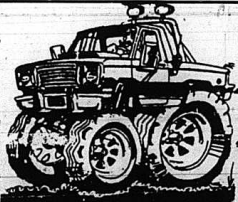

requires school districts to raise their tax rates to 25 cents per \$100 assessment in order to receive additional funding. Presently, 43 districts out of the state's 180 are below the 25 cent level, including Rockcastle.

The 15 cent rate is the minimum set by the state for school districts to be eligible for funding - under the equalization program, which distributes funds from richer school districts to the poorer school districts.

State Rep. Danny Ford, along with other Republicans in the General Assembly, did not like an amendment that changed the wording in the education tax bill from "may" to "shall" by 25 cents per hundred to "shall" be 25 cents per hundred.

If the word had remained "may," then the tax increase would have been subject to recall and would have allowed voters to vote for or against the tax increase. It was not to be. The "shall" votes prevailed.

Rockcastle Property Valuation Administrator Elmer Hale said the new tax rate would "hurt" most taxpayers with the big property assessments. The more property they have, the more they pay.

"Some businesses in the county could see as much as \$800 more on their tax bill," Hale stated. "It could be a hardship for a lot of people. However, the older homeowners will not be hurt as much because of their homeostead exemption."

Currently, \$16,399.40 in county property is listed on exemption.

A few other figures are of interest. In 1984, Rockcastle County's property assessment was \$127,380,359. In 1985, it will be \$128,574,405.

The assessment for the city of Mt. Vernon in 1984 was \$25,289,700. At Brodhead, it was \$9,035,548. At Livingston it was \$1,068,369.

From those amounts, and if all taxes were collected, Mt. Vernon received from all taxes

(real estate, vehicle, inventory) about \$1,091. Brodhead received \$26,145 and Livingston, only \$4,658. Mt. Vernon actually collected about \$44,000, or 87 percent, which is considered good.

The county got \$94,100 in tax money, if the county collected all taxes due.

The total tax rate for Rockcastle in 1984 was \$5.10 per \$1,000 assessment. How much that figure will actually change in 1985 remains to be seen.

Tax bills and the amount billed comes from the state, not from the local tax office. The only influence on taxes locally is in the assessment.

Both Houses approved a measure calling for planning for a new prison and to find a site. The medium security facility will have 500 beds and will cost about \$40 million.

Rep. Ford voted for the new prison planning.

In other action, the legislature exempted police officers and fire fighters from being required to live in the county in which they work. It voted to lift the three cent cap on salaries paid to university personnel. It set aside \$8.3 million to aid abused and neglected children, and set up foster-care review boards in every judicial district.

The assembly will meet in regular session in January at which time the 5-cent per gallon increase in the state gasoline tax is expected to be on the agenda. That measure failed by a lopsided vote in the special session.

The commission also suggested that in hiring police personnel in the future, the city council will conduct interviews of applicants and recommend to the mayor their selection. The mayor will still have the option of accepting or rejecting the applicant as he does now.

Chairman of the commission, Tom Welch, told the council some of the suggestions could be

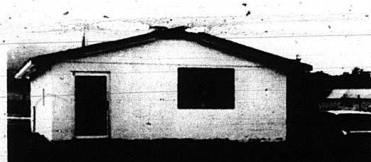

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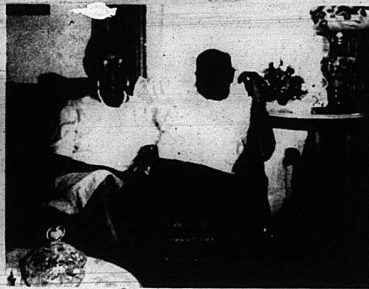

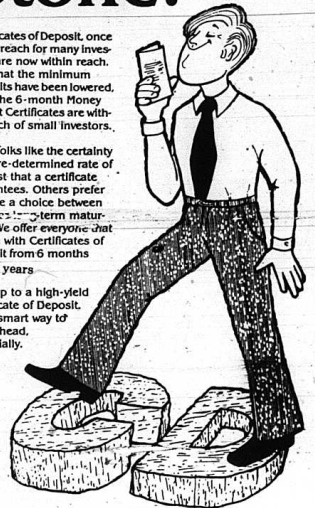

market the year round, but they are at their best from early summer through December. The tart, crisp apple is a perfect snack or dessert, and when it is eaten raw, it makes a pleasing, low-calorie morsel.

A medium-sized apple, about two and one-half inches in diameter, has only about 75 calories. In addition, apples provide bulk in the diet for the proper function of the body's digestive and regulatory systems. The apple is low in sodium and fairly high in potassium, making it an excellent natural snack.

When you buy apples, look for firm, crisp, well-colored fruit. Avoid those with shriveled skins, bruises, worm holes and decayed spots. Handle them gently—because rough handling causes bruises, blemishes or other defects.

To store apples, keep the perfect ones for later use. Use those with bruises or skin blemishes as soon as possible to avoid decayed spots. Apples that are slightly under-ripe should be stored in a cool place at 60 to 70 degrees to ripen.

Once ripe, apples will keep best stored in the home refrigerator for a week or longer.

Apples need some moisture and can be stored in the fruit or vegetable drawer or in ventilated plastic bags.

More than 2,500 apple varieties are found in the U.S., but Lodi, Red Delicious, Rome, Winesap, McIntosh, Jonathan, Cortland and Golden Delicious are the varieties most easily available and popular in Kentucky. The Lodi and Red Delicious are found in early and mid-summer while the season for the other varieties is in late summer and fall.

Some favorite Kentucky recipes for apples follow:

FRESH APPLE COOKIES

1 1/2 cups sifted flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
3/4 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 cup butter or margarine
1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
1 egg
1 cup all bran breakfast cereal
1/4 cup milk

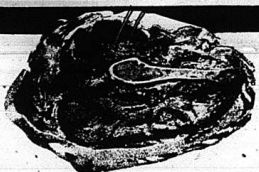

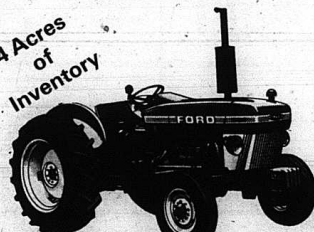

Burley Reform Act introduced

After many months of negotiations between farm groups, manufacturers and the USDA, the Tobacco Reform Act of 1985 is in the hands of Congress.

Introduced on July 10, the measure designed to save the tobacco program is already the subject of hearings before the Senate Agriculture Committee—the beginnings of a lengthy legislative process.

If enacted it will bring about drastic revisions immediately in both burley and flue-cured production and marketing, but its backers claim it would save the tobacco program. If further changes are needed, they argue, the act can be amended later.

Answering questions that have been raised by some critics of some features of the bill, Attorney Larry Forgy points out that "though it is not a perfect program, it is infinitely better than the alternative—the loss of the program with its resulting marketing chaos that will crush small farmers."

Forgy who has represented the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association in the negotiations, along with chief counsel John M. Berry, Sr. and Joe McDaniel, burley co-op president, is attending the Senate committee hearings in Washington.

Last week at the July meeting of the Burley Association board of directors, he warned that the tobacco program is "in serious danger of being legislated out of existence, or of becoming so burdensome to farmers that they will be forced to vote it out in the statutory referendum scheduled for February 1986."

"It is neither a perfect plan nor a painless plan for tobacco producers," Forgy added. "It is, however, in the opinion of those of us who have worked on it the best we could achieve under the circumstances."

"If this legislation does not work, the law can be amended later. But if the program dies, that is final. A corpse cannot be healed. If we lose this program, it
