out by the state are technical, but basically they indicate "surface aerators will not give a complete mix of the activated sludge in the aeration basins."

Another design problem is a pump that is too large to serve as a return sludge pump.

A third problem enumerated indicates the chlorine contact basin does not have baffling to distribute and mix the chlorine equally for proper disinfection.

The state inspectors, while working with the plant's operating staff, reports the staff is "knowledgeable and capable of doing a good job." The inspector earlier had reported the staff not fully aware of the operation of the wastewater plant. Some instruction apparently remedied that problem.

In the area of plant maintenance, the inspector said a low operational budget had forced maintenance to be minimal, but maintenance is now "good" because of rehabilitation work through money allocated to the

city in a Community Development Block Grant.

It was noted in the report that the present minimum sewer bill at Brodhead is \$5.85 a month, or 75 percent of the minimum water bill.

"It is not uncommon to find small communities that are well operated to charge 100 to 150 percent of their minimum water bill which would be between \$10 and \$15 a month," the report stated. It did not suggest the city raise its sewer rate.

A check shows how some of the plant's problems have come about.

Between May 13, 1985 and June 19, 1985, the plant exceeded its 150,000 gallons a day capacity on 16 days. For example, on May 25, the plant handled 322,000 gallons of wastewater, and on June 8, a total of 290,000 gallons. On all the days when capacity was exceeded, it was during or soon after a heavy rain period.

Noting the overflow, this report said "this infiltration/inflow is a problem that limits the performance of the wastewater treatment plant. It cuts down hydraulic detention time (reducing time needed for treatment) and

causes the wash out of solids to the stream." (Dix River)

No final decision on changes at the plant was made by the council Monday night, pending further discussions with the state.

\$100 on bank shares (up 10 cents over 1984); 45 cents per \$100 on tangible property subject to full local rate, and three cents an acre on forest land with the money to be used for forest fire protection.

"If you were a resident and wanted to oppose one of these department tax rates, how would you go about it?" one magistrate asked.

Apparently, notification of tax hearings are advertised, and petitions bearing several names can be handed the boards if a resident wishes to oppose a rate. Those hearings have already been held for 1985 taxes.

Two members of the board said they did not know who chooses taxing board members and how long they serve. The court was told the boards have always been there, and have "only as a courtesy" sent the tax rate to the fiscal court for approval.

Members of the various boards can use respective members as terms expire and send the names along to the County Judge/Executive for approval. The judge is given more than one choice when names are submitted.

In other action, the court delayed a discussion of the sheriff's yearly tax settlement until 1 p.m. Monday when the court convenes in a special session.

Approximately 400 boys will use one restroom with four urinals and five commodes. The restroom situation at Mt. Vernon is so bad that lower grades take turns going to the restroom during class hours. One teacher at Mt. Vernon said it is a constant stream of students using the restroom from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. with as many as three classes waiting in the hall at one time.

Kindergarten children start the lunch line off at 10:30 in the morning and it will run until after 1 p.m. because the cafeteria is so small.

Mt. Vernon has by far the most elementary students in the county, and only 100 more students will be enrolled at RCHS.







Rockcastle man shot to death in family dispute

A Rockcastle County man was shot to death after a family dispute near Copper Creek on Sweetwater Road last Saturday afternoon. Harold Ballard, 43, of Rt. 3, Berea, in the Conway section of the county, was killed by his son-in-law, Scott McQueen, 21, of Rt. 3, Mt. Vernon, according to police reports, which were the incident occurring around 5:30 p.m.

Rockcastle County Coroner Billy Dowell pronounced Ballard dead at the scene and Deputy Sheriff Jim Durham and State Trooper Gary Lane found Ballard's body lying along the side of the roadway. Dowell said an autopsy was conducted Monday and that Ballard died from multiple gunshot wounds from a 22 caliber rifle. One of the shots entered the chest and the other entered the back, according to Dowell.

According to police, Ballard apparently went to McQueen's home looking for his wife who was at the residence. After an apparent argument, Ballard reportedly fired some shots at the trailer with a shotgun.

Police said that after Ballard had fired his shots, McQueen fired back.

McQueen is presently being held in the Rockcastle County Jail in lieu of \$100,000 cash bond. The case was waived to the Grand Jury Wednesday.

Hasty is Rockcastle County Sheriff-elect and will take office on Jan. 1. He is continuing his contract with the city of Mt. Vernon, at least temporarily.

The county has been mandated by the state to come up with a plan for future garbage collection. The Cumberland Valley Area Development District is under contract to produce a plan for garbage collection in the county and have it approved by the state and court by Dec. 31.

Monday, August 19, students will not attend school as this is a Professional Day for teachers only. Students will return to school for a



Additional charge filed by Hamm

School opening is just around the corner and the Rockcastle County Board of Education began gearing up for its start during Tuesday night's regular session.

Opening bids, hiring coaches, aides, lunchroom employees, bus drivers, some new teachers, transferring some old teachers, hiring substitute teachers and hearing a request for money took up much of the board's 2 1/2 hour meeting. The hiring of John Hale as principal at Mt. Vernon Elementary School was also briefly discussed because another applicant for the job, Mrs. Sue Hamm, has filed additional sex discrimination charges against the board and Superintendent Charles B. Parsons.

Mrs. Hamm had filed other charges during the 1984-85 school year, and Parsons said she was filing this charge because it was his understanding that she (Mrs. Hamm) felt she was more qualified for the Mt. Vernon job than Mr. Hale.

In her new charge Mrs. Hamm noted her 20 years of experience in the education field and her 15 years as a guidance counselor.

Parsons said Tuesday night that answers had been filed in connection with Mrs. Hamm's other charges and he and the board had 20 days to answer these additional charges.

The superintendent said nothing has come up in court concerning the case as of yet.

In other business the board voted to . . . employ Doris Towery, RN, as Health Coordinator, at 3% salary increase for 185 days.

. . . approve Adult Education Program for 1985-86, Verla Scott, teacher, Barbara Fain, clerk, and Bige Towery, supervisor.

. . . employ school secretaries for 1985-86 for 9.75 months with 3% salary increase. Livingston, Vonie Mink; Mt. Vernon, Jerri Nunley; Brodhead, Carol Riddle; Roundstone, Renee Burdette; and at RCHS Brenda Merritt will replace Barbara Fain.

. . . employ Tony Saylor to teach Business Math at RCHS and also to hire him as assistant football coach.

. . . approve tax rate for 1985-86. Property tax, 15.1 per \$100

Only minor increases indicated

Fiscal court approves 1985 county tax rate

A 1985 tax rate of 8.4 cents per \$100 assessed real estate value was set by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at a meeting Tuesday.

The court set the personal property tax rate at 8.2 cents per \$100 assessment.

The 1985 county tax rates remain the same as 1984.

Unlike other years when the fiscal court approved the tax rates for other governmental units in the county, this year the rate is set by individual "taxing boards." The court was told by the Kentucky Department of Finance in Frankfort.

That news apparently caught the magistrates by surprise. In the past, the court had received the tax rates from the other departments (health, library, agriculture, soil conservation) and approved or rejected the rate.

The court still approves its own tax rate.

Under the new rules, the tax rate set by the taxing boards goes to the county clerk who passes it along to Property Valuation Administrator Elmer Hale.

"We didn't know this," said Magistrate Joe Clark. "I just hope everyone knows we are not raising their taxes; the taxing boards are doing it."

Three other departments

have set their rate for 1985. The Rockcastle County Library set its rate at 1.1 cents per \$100 assessed value for both real estate and personal property.

The Agriculture Department (county extension agent) set its rate at 2.4 cents per \$100, up from 1.6 last year.

The Health Department set its tax rate at 3.2 cents per \$100 "across the board," meaning for both real and personal property. Last year the department rate was 2.7 cents per \$100 for real estate and 3.2 cents on personal property.

The tax rate for the Rockcastle Soil Conservation District remains the same as in 1984 at 0.020 cents per \$100 which will raise \$2,560. The district first asked for 0.060 cents that would have raised \$7,680, but the district's taxing board rejected the increase.

The school rate is set by the Board of Education, and that rate was not discussed by the court. Last year the school rate was 15 cents per \$100 for both real estate and tangibles.

The State also notified the court of its 1985 tax rate. It is 22 cents per \$100 for real property; 15 cents per \$100 on tangible property; 25 cents per \$100 on intangible property; 95 cents per

Sewer plant problem aired by Brodhead City Council

The City of Brodhead, scolded by the state for allowing too much untreated sewage to overflow into the Dry River, is apparently making some headway in its efforts to correct the problem.

The Brodhead City Council was informed in a letter from the Enforcement Branch of the Kentucky Division of Water at its meeting Monday night that the design problems are remedied in a systematic and timely fashion. The wastewater treatment plant will be able to function normally and give 85 to 90 percent removal efficiency.

The cost to the city for necessary equipment for a remedy has not finally been determined, depending on the remedial meth-

od used, but it is likely to be between \$4,300 and \$8,600.

The city has been warned on previous occasions that a problem existed with its sewer plant that was built in 1970.

At one time, the state strongly urged the city to remedy its treatment plant or face a complete shutdown of the system until the problems were corrected. /Subsequent letters and inspections seemed to indicate major remodeling would likely have to be done. One early cost estimate was in the \$100,000 range.

But in its recent letters to the city, the state seemed to be more lenient because city "repair efforts" appeared to be "paying off."

Could mean extra money for local district

Collins' education package has construction plan

The \$287.7 million education package recently approved by the General Assembly may actually bring in extra money for the Rockcastle County because the package has a formula for school construction, something the local school district is in need of.

During the September 1984 meeting of the Rockcastle County Board of Education, the school Board voted unanimously to reject the state's plan for a new building at Mt. Vernon Elementary.

At that time, School Superintendent Charles B. Parsons told board members that plans had placed the school district in non-compliance because of the condition of Mt. Vernon school.

However, local board Chairman Richard Burdette, whose district covers most of the Mt. Vernon area, said at that time he would accept a new building at

Mt. Vernon because, in his opinion, the building was as structurally sound as any new building. He said he would allow the school built on land and remodelled.

But after a "Signal" poll a few weeks after the September board meeting, Parsons and Burdette were quoted in the newspaper as reconsidering their positions on the matter.

Parsons went as far as to say that "as it stands now with the state department, it's a new building." However, his comments came only three weeks before two hotly-contested board races in which two incumbent board members were retiring.

Since that time, nothing what soever has come up about a new building at Mt. Vernon. Noting, Bob Spillman, the State Department of Education's Assistant Superintendent for Local Services, said Monday the new Collins formula is completed.

"One thing you must remember is the school system has to spend their money first," Spillman said.

He explained that if the local school board voted to accept the additional 10-cent tax on local property, it would generate \$149,000 in revenue for Rockcastle County.

But he went on to say that in excess of 90 percent must also be collected before the school district qualifies for any additional money from the state.

"Our figures indicate that Rockcastle County could come up with \$1,675,700 for new construction. They have new building needs (Mt. Vernon Elementary) of \$3.7 million," Spillman said.

The associate superintendent said the \$149,000 would be used to pay interest on bonds at almost \$13 million, figured at around 11 percent. The rest of the \$135,000 would be used for

money already on hand. Spillman said that in his office indicated Rockcastle had about \$385,000 on hand that could be used for construction.

"That would still leave them about \$2.1 million of what they need," Spillman said.

The governor's education package calls for about \$100 million to be set aside for new construction across the state. But, there is a need for \$800 million in new construction. "This means that Rockcastle County would receive about one-third of what they need, or \$794,000," Spillman said.

"Gov. Collins' package is not a cure-all solution unless the General Assembly does something each biennial, then this package will not do any good," Spillman said.

He went on to say that each time the Legislature meets for the next three years, they will have to specify additional money for school

construction needs across the state so that districts such as Rockcastle County can finish their projects and not put themselves in a financial hardship.

"I think it would be safe to say that Rockcastle could go ahead with a new school and not put themselves in a financial pinch, that is if they collected the extra revenues from the added tax and if the Legislature helps them out under the road," he said.

"I don't know Rockcastle's situation," Spillman said. "But I do know that money would be available if the district did everything they were asked to do by the state."

As present time approximately 830 students are enrolled at Mt. Vernon Elementary for the 1985-86 school year. When they go to classes on Aug. 16, they will attend the only school in the county without air conditioning.



The Effects of Alcohol

The news media screams on the dangers of heart disease, cancer and mental illness. They warn of the symptoms and of the ways we can avoid contracting these diseases. Yet they remain quiet as a tomb concerning the cause of the disease that ranks fourth in America today: the use of alcoholic beverages. In fact, not only do they fail to warn against it, their commercials promote it!

Following are some alarming effects of alcohol in the U.S.: 55% of the 60,000 annual highway deaths are alcohol related, and another 20,000 fatalities are due to alcohol related accidents.

There are some 11 million drinkers in our country. 57% of boys and 43% of girls aged 15-20 are drinkers and 39% of all high-school seniors are problem drinkers. About two out of three adults in America are drinkers and one out of 20 over age 18 is an alcoholic. This is a national disgrace!

Loss of 10 billion dollars yearly is attributed to work time lost through alcohol problems of employees in business, industry, government and the military.

Over \$42 billion annual cost to the nation is attributed to problem drinking, while only \$9.2 billion is received from taxes collected from its sale.

The F.B.I. stated that 60% of all major crimes is the result of use of alcoholic beverages.

More divorces are granted because of drinking than any other single cause.

More children are deprived of normal, happy home lives because of drinking than any other cause. Over 50% of child abuse is attributed to alcohol. There are more outlets in America for alcohol than there are schools and churches combined.

In spite of these staggering statistics, pushers of alcoholic beverages have little or no restraint whatsoever to keep them from advertising their venom in nearly every magazine, on every stretch of open highway and in our own living rooms. Did not the prophet say, "Woe unto him that giveth his neighbor drink, that putteth thy bottle to him, and maketh him

drunken also, that thou mayest look on their nakedness?" (Hab. 2:15)

So-called "social drinking" is just plain old-fashioned drinking of hard beverages: wine, beer or whiskey. God has something to say about those who socialize with drinkers of strong drink, even as Jesus wept and gnashing of teeth for those who "drunken" (Matt. 24:48-51).

Peter warned Christians of banquetings (1 Pet. 4:3) which means drinking, carousing, drinking by sips, drinking together—social drinking. The American Medical Association says that "blood alcohol of 1/10 of 1% can be accepted as prima facie evidence of alcohol intoxication," recognizing that many individuals are under the influence in the 5/100 of 1% range. Those who try to justify "a little" social drinking in the face of the facts would have to agree that it is just about as safe as stepping off a cliff "a little." Biblically, it would be as justified as stealing "a little," living "a little," and committing adultery "a little."


The fact that the general population is complacent about the alcoholic blitz horror is alarming enough, but the worst calamity is that many preachers are not speaking out against social drinking and Sister Cocktail and Brother Social Drinker, now occupying many in many churches. We need to join with Paul in condemning the "works of the flesh" (Gal. 5:19-21).

Beverage alcohol—whether wine, beer, or whiskey—is a curse on any nation. It enslaves millions and promotes crime and violence. There can be no doubt that drinking is one of the most complex threats to human welfare that man has ever known.



Mt. Vernon Television Cable recently sold to Wilcop Cable

Johnny Wilcop, owner of Wilcop Cable Television in Brodhead and Crab Orchard, has purchased Mt. Vernon Cable Television. It was confirmed this week by Wayne Stewart, who has owned the Mt. Vernon cable for 29 years.

The sale price was reported to be \$550,000. Wilcop took control Aug. 1.

Wilcop is in Myrtle Beach until about Aug. 18 and was unavailable for comment.

Stewart said as far as he knew Wilcop will continue to operate the company much as it has been in the past, but possible changes could be made as time goes by.

Stewart said three other cable companies out of the county bid on the property, but he was glad someone local was the final purchaser.

Stewart and James Taylor founded the cable company in 1966 with a station wagon, a pickup truck and five customers. He remembered the customers as Dr. George Griffith, Rockcastle Farm Service, which Stewart owns, Carl Baker, Edna Cummins and Byron Baker.

Stewart bought Taylor's share of the company in 1977. He also purchased a cable system that

serves Lake Linville area in 1984. That company was owned by Burke & Son of Brodhead and had 32 customers.

Today Mt. Vernon Cable Television has a total of 920 customers who pay a monthly fee of \$8.75. Stewart said he did not know if Wilcop planned to raise the fee. The rate in Brodhead is \$10 a month.

There are two towers and two satellites used by the company, all located on Town Hill in Mt. Vernon.

Stewart said Wilcop will continue to use the present location at Rockcastle Farm Ser-

vice as a headquarters in Mt. Vernon.

He said he did not know if Wilcop plans to change any of the present channels in use in Mt. Vernon, since that would be a decision that Wilcop will make.

The company has had only one major "disaster" since it was founded. The tornadoes of April 1974 destroyed the towers and 16 1/2 miles of cable.

"It was a bad time for us," Stewart said. "Everything was flattened. But we worked hard and continually until everything was replaced and service resumed."

For the next 21 years Mrs. Staton worked as a secretary. "I always loved my jobs, but for the management and I knew that the only way the best way was to return to school, plus, it was a life-time ambition," she says.

Although the decision to return to college was a tough one, she said it was one of the best she has ever made.

Prior to quitting her job and becoming a full-time ECU student, Mrs. Staton enrolled in an algebra class "I might as well if I could really do it." A short time later, she had earned enough credits, when added to those from Berea College, to enroll at ECU.

The road to her degree wasn't easy. With one daughter enrolled at ECU and another in high school, the family's budget was tight. But financial aid in the form of a North Carolina Tuition Scholarship, a National Government

Student Loan and a Pell Grant enabled her to attend school.

Her interest in LSS grew out of her work in her parents' business, Brown's Vacation Farm in Kentucky.

That, combined with her business knowledge, made her a natural for the LSS program at ECU.

Mrs. Staton's younger daughter, Renee, was surprised when her mother announced her intention to return to college. "I thought, 'Oh, she's just saying that. I didn't really believe her. And even when she was about halfway through, I thought she'd quit again, and go back to work. But now, I'm really proud of her. I can't believe she's done it,'" Renee says.

There were grounds for Renee's suspicions. Mrs. Staton had always been a hard-driving career woman as well as several part-time jobs—all at the same time.

To the contrary, her older daughter, Michelle Staton Briley, who will be a graduate from ECU next May, believed things would go as they did. "I thought she would finish, she's full of determination. Once she knows she wants something, she will try her best to get it. She has always stressed to us how important college is," Michelle said.

"There were times that I knew that I should have quit and gone back to work," said Mrs. Staton. "But I kept thinking, 'There has to be a way if I'll work out.' Before I knew it another semester had gone by, then another. The whole two years went by so rapidly, it seems as if I just soared."

According to Mrs. Staton, her husband, Charles, didn't know what to think until just now. "I think he's rather astounded."

And what is on the horizon for this, as she calls herself, older, non-traditional student? "I feel my first obligation is to Renee. She's starting college this fall at

Berea and I want to make sure that she has her education," she said. After that, Mrs. Staton plans to begin work on her master's degree.

The ultimate for Mrs. Staton would be a doctorate, enabling her to teach.

"I love working with students," she said. "The kids in LSS treated me so wonderfully — the whole way through. I had to wonder how the kids in class were going to look at me. They included me, they made me feel one of them. Being an older student, I found myself in the counseling position a lot of times — but I loved it."

In addition to her studies, she was a member of the LSS Society and the ECU Ambassadors. She also appeared in two productions by the East Carolina Playhouse and is a member of Sigma Lambda Sigma, an honorary fraternity for LSS.

Mrs. Staton does have one other project in mind. "I'd like to write a book, maybe just a pamphlet called 'It Can Be Done,' because I've heard so many people my age say, 'Well, I would like to—but, Nobody can tell me now that it can't be done. If you want to do it, it can be done.'"
