4-H VEGETABLE FIELD DAY

Eleven Rockcastle youth captured the majority of the awards at last week's Area 4-H Vegetable Field Day in Somerset. The contest consists of five separate categories.

Seed identification is the easiest category for the 4-H'ers to prepare for. They learn to identify 18 different vegetable seeds by attaching the seeds to a card and labeling them. The difficult part can be when the seeds have been treated with a chemical which changes the color.

Another category is Vegetable Identification. Most of these are not the everyday vegetables seen in local gardens. This year's contest included a parsnip, ruta-

same vegetable in order of best to worst condition, quality, uniformity, true-to-typeness, and size are factors 4-H'ers must consider when ranking the vegetable exhibits.

The remaining two categories provide valuable information in maintaining a vegetable garden. 4-H'ers learn to identify 25 insects common to vegetables and what to use to control them in the Insect Identification category. In the Vegetable Disease category, 4-H'ers learn to identify 25 vegetable diseases and how to treat them.

First, second and third place are recognized and receive ribbons in each category. Ties in scoring allow more than one participant to receive first, second or third. The overall top junior and top senior also receive roses. In addition, the top five juniors and top five seniors from the Area Vegetable Field Day go to compete at the State Fair Contest.

\$653 dishonored checks, \$85 state penalties, and \$60 bank charges. We recommend the Sheriff deposit personal funds of \$4,574 to the official tax bank account to eliminate this deficit.

6) The Sheriff's County Revenue Bond Should be Increased

The Sheriff is currently bonded for \$60,000 on his county revenue bond. This amount is not adequate to cover the amount of taxes collected, and as a result, the county is not protected from possible loss. We recommend the Sheriff increase his county revenue bond to \$145,000 which would approximately equal the largest one month's taxes owed in a normal tax year for the county, special districts, and school.

7) The Sheriff Should Pay Interest to School Board

Under the provisions of KRS 134.140(3)(b) which became effective March 9, 1982, the Sheriff is required to remit interest earned on deposits of school funds minus a 4 percent commission to the appropriate school board. From October 1983 to December 1984, the Sheriff received \$1,725 in interest. From deposits for all taxing districts. On a prorated basis, we have calculated the amount due the county school board to be \$265. We recommend this amount be paid to the school board, and in the future, all income earned on deposits of school funds less the 4 percent commission be paid to the school board.

We are confident the above findings and recommendations will be useful to you in managing the operations of the county in a manner consistent with effective accounting and compliance controls.



Sports in Kentucky

Remember Peter Finch starring in the movie Network a few years ago. And the line he made famous?

"I'm mad as hell & I'm not going to take it anymore."

Yes. Tuesday, Aug. 6, 1985 is an historic date for Americans and not because 200 or so overpaid, over indulged, over exposed, spoiled and whining athletes walked out on America's baseball fans into the real world either.

This date, in history, as Tuesday evening's television networks tried very hard to remind us, was recounted because of a bomb that killed more than 250,000 human beings 40 years ago. And TV did its job refusing our attention on the stupendous consequences of what could happen to our earth. It tried to tell us how this could happen again unless we try harder to understand other human beings and care more for one another.

But something kept getting in the way of the news, features and commentary about Hiroshima; its people, our people, the people of the earth. Something kept getting in the way and it made me angry. News about a baseball strike in the USSR for its propaganda mills.

A baseball strike on Aug. 6, 1985 will be an historic date all right, for those whose lives are inexorably linked to its dynamism. Joe Caragiola, Billy Martin, Tom Lasorda. But who are these men? And how will the things they do affect our lives? Silly thought isn't it?

A baseball strike indeed. Put alongside the events of 40 years ago, a big league baseball walkout seems absurd, too ridiculous to discuss. Think of it—on the 40th anniversary of how so many people were killed by a bomb, a man named Donald Fehr stepped in front of a clutch of microphones to mesmerize the national media.

But who was this young man? Not a scientist to tell us about the threat of nuclear winter, not an evangelist to tell us to love each other, trust each other, be diplomat to make new proposals on getting countries together to make treaties, get weapons under control.

Fehr, the most recognized man on TV last week, was spokesman for a collection of grown men who play a kid's game. A man representing the players who were squabbling over money for hitting a white ball, throwing it, chasing it. And the media filled its TV screens and sports pages with negotiation briefings over it.

Forgive me, but I find it difficult to care one whit if Reggie Jackson and Pete Rose, at age 65, receives a retirement pension of \$40,000 or \$60,000? I cannot help thinking that you and I are more concerned about our children being around for 65 years, to see a sun rise, listen to a fish splash in a river, hear someone say "I care about you."

Forgive me, but I cannot help feeling terribly angry about this baseball strike business even though it lasted only a day. And yet, perhaps there is some redeeming quality to be gotten from it, a lesson to apply, some worthwhile linkage between Aug. 6, 1985 and that fateful Tuesday 40 years ago that left an indelible mark on us.

Perhaps the same resolve which Americans apply to the idea "never again" will we resort to using such a weapon as the atomic bomb. We can use the same determination to the memberships of what is called our country.

National Pastime. Professional baseball.

Maybe someone of stature will stand up and say, "Enough!"

And then a little man somewhere in the land who is busy raising a family, making a living, and who loves the game of baseball, will stand and say, very quietly, "Never again will I buy a ticket to a dumb, stupid, insignificant Major League baseball game until these greedy people pledge (in writing) to Americans saying: "You will remember who you are; who you are responsible to, and where you fit into the grand scheme."

A statement. Something we can understand and identify with. Something that can take away this feeling of frustration I have. A feeling many of you have too.

Something like, "I'm mad as hell & I'm not going to take it anymore."

Fishing Report

Despite hot weather and bright sunshine which continued to keep many anglers off the water, some good catches of bass, catfish, rockfish/white bass hybrids and walleye were reported as surface water temperatures declined slightly for the second week in a row. Fishermen who concentrated their efforts earlier in the morning late in the afternoon or at night seem to have done the best during the August 3-4 period covered by this report.

The lake raked random, as reported by conservation officers or creel clerks at each lake, is as follows:

KENTUCKY: Officer Gerald Alexander reported light fishing activity with sauger being taken by trolling deep running crankbaits over ledges off the old river channel in 20 feet of water. Catfish were being taken on cut bait off shallow flats in the lake, with some real good catches of blues averaging 2-3 pounds reported below the dam. Clear, stable 1 1/2 feet below summer pool and 84 degrees.

BARKLEY: Light fishing activity was reported by creel clerk Norman Brantley. Bass were hitting plastic worms and crankbaits in 4-12 feet of water off

gradually sloping points. Catfish were being caught on live minnows and cut bait in 10-30 feet of water over the old river channel and at the mouths of creeks. Clear, stable, 1 1/2 feet below summer pool and 85 degrees.

BARREN RIVER: Officer Don Depp reported light fishing activity with bass being caught by casting plastic worms and jig and rind combinations early and late, and at night. White bass were being caught in scattered jumps late in the afternoon and by trolling. During daylight hours the top fish continued to be bluegill, taken on crickets off rock bluffs. Murky to clear, on a steady rise, 3 1/2 feet below summer pool and 86 degrees.

NOLIN: Light fishing activity was reported by officer Sammie Renfro. Bass were being caught at night on crankbaits over rocky points. Bluegill were located in 6-8 feet of water on crickets and worms, and a few walleye were being caught by trolling deep running crankbaits over points and steep rock walls. Clear, rising, one foot below summer pool and 84 degrees.



ROUGH RIVER: Officer Harold Belt reported light fishing activity with crappie being caught by drift fishing minnows in 12-14 feet of water over stump beds and brush. Bass were best on plastic worms and crankbaits at night off points. Clear, stable at summer pool and 82 degrees.

TAYLORSVILLE: Creel clerk John Morgan reported light fishing activity. Bluegill were being caught on worms and crickets in 6-8 feet of water and bass on crankbaits 10-15 feet deep along the edges of submerged treelines. Clear, stable at summer pool and 86 degrees.

HERRINGTON: Light fishing activity was reported by creel clerk Bill Pinkston. Bass were being caught on plastic worms and spinnerbaits at night off deep and medium depth banks. In the jumps, white bass and rockfish/white bass hybrids were being taken on plunker and fly combinations. Clear, falling slowly, 3 feet below summer pool and 83 degrees.

GREEN RIVER: Officer Bud de Lov reported light fishing activity. Bluegill were being taken by drift fishing worms and crickets over submerged brush and stumps in 5-8 feet of water. Crappie were being caught on minnows 15-18 feet deep over submerged cover. Clear, stable at summer pool and 81 degrees.

CUMBERLAND: Light to moderate fishing activity was reported by officer Fred York. Kentucky bass and a few smallmouth were being taken on small crayfish off points. Rockfish and walleye continue to be caught by trolling deep running crankbaits across points and steep rock walls of the main lake. Crappie were being caught 25-30 feet deep over submerged cover in embayment headwaters. In the tailwaters, trout were hitting on cheese and salmon eggs. Clear, falling slowly, 14 feet below summer pool and 82 degrees.

DALE HOLLOW: Officer Marvin Edwards reported light fishing activity. Bass were best at night on plastic worms fished over deep banks and weed beds. Crappie were taken over submerged cover in 20 feet of water. Clear, falling slowly, one foot below summer pool and 83 degrees.

LAUREL: Officer Ken Mobley reported light to moderate fishing activity with anglers catching rainbow trout at night 25-30 feet deep on corn and worms off steep rock walls. Bass were being caught off points on plastic worms at night in about 6 feet of water. Clear, falling slowly, 7 feet below summer pool and 82 degrees.

CAVE RUN: Creel clerk Tim Sloan and officer Mike Gilliam reported light to moderate fishing activity with bass being caught at night on surface lures and early and late on plastic worms off rock banks. 

Candidates for city, county offices look toward election

For those who thought the election was over and done with—it's not.

At least 30 candidates will be on the general election ballot Nov. 5, including county candidates and mayors and councilmen in Mt. Vernon, Brodhead and Livingston.

Councilmen candidates have until the close of business Aug. 22 to file petitions with County Clerk Irene Bates for council seats. A minimum of 20 names of qualified voters who live within the various cities must be on a petition. City elections are non-partisan.

There could be a "new" election this year if all those who say they are "thinking about it" run as "write-in" candidates. Only one person had, as of Tuesday, announced as a write-in candidate. He is Dewey "Doe" Stewart who will oppose Donald Bullock, who was the Republican nominee in the May primary for Fifth District magistrate.

In county offices, incumbent County Judge/Executive Bob Jasper (Democrat) is opposed by former County Judge Hubert Thacker, Republican, for the county judge/ executive seat. In the city, Republican Billy Kirby is opposed by Democrat Ovie Cromer.

In the First District magistrate race, Republican Glen Ellison is opposed by Democrat Tom Walling.

In the Third District magistrate race, Republican J. R. (Boone) Cromer is opposed by Democrat Doug Bishop.

In the First District constable race, Republican Charles Holbrook is opposed by Democrat Wayne Bullock.

In the Third District constable race, Republican Randall Stevens is opposed by Democrat Johnny Taylor.

At Mt. Vernon, incumbent mayor Roland Mullins is opposed by incumbent councilman Pete Hurd for the mayor's seat.

As of Tuesday, petitions for Mt. Vernon's six seats have been filed by Billy Ray Doan and John Hedge, Jr. At least six other persons are passing a petition—Oscar Bullock, Tom Welch and Jerry Pensol, and incumbent councilmen Les Harris, Joe Mc-

tin and Jackie Renner. Incumbent councilman Ernie Tolle and Richard Mullins, Jr. will not seek re-election.

At Brodhead, incumbent councilman Billy B. Bussell is unopposed for the mayor's seat now held by Ronnie Cash. Cash reported he will file a petition for councilman along with incumbent councilmen, D. A. Robbins, Johnny Wilcox and Eddie Cash. All four seats on the council will be filled.

At Livingston, incumbent mayor Bro. Billy Medley, is unopposed in his re-election bid for mayor.

Only one incumbent Livingston councilman had filed as of Tuesday for another term on the four-member council. He is Todd Mink. According to Mayor Medley, incumbent councilman Earl Baker is circulating a petition. He said, incumbent councilman Curt and councilwoman Linda Durham have not decided if they will seek re-election.

Deposit box at Brodhead to be drilled

With the contents a mystery, and no key available, the Brodhead City Council plans to drill open its safety deposit box at the Citizen's Bank in Brodhead, "any day now."

The city has had the box at the bank since about 1970 and regularly pays the \$7 annual fee. Apparently, the present council was unaware it owned one.

"We have no idea what's in there," said Brodhead Mayor Ronnie Cash at the city council's recent meeting. "But we have to find out. We can't find the key, so we'll have to drill it."

The first public indication the city owned the box was when it was casually mentioned by the mayor at the meeting.

"We think it could contain deeds, car titles, sewer bonds, or most anything the city wanted to put in it," the mayor related. "We believe it was rented to be used for papers when the sewer system was being installed about 1970. "We're going to find out one day this week, or so we plan."

Livingston asks for bids on new water line

Bids are being accepted by the Livingston City Council to extend a water line up Gauley Branch to serve about 25 additional households, according to Livingston Mayor Billy Medley.

The line is expected to be about a mile long and is estimated to cost about \$10,000, with about half of the amount paid by the city, and "hopefully" the remainder coming from a grant or some other financing now being initiated by the Cumberland Valley Development District.

Mayor Medley said the city hopes to have the line installed and households connected "before winter."

He said city employees will do some of the work, and materials will be purchased as conservatively as possible.

Sheriff settles tax claims; overpays all county districts

Two checks totaling \$4,266.07 were accepted, by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court as the sheriff's tax settlement for the years 1982 through 1984 at a special meeting of the court Tuesday.

The settlement amount was made after publication of the "Report of the Auditor of Public Accounts, Audit Examination of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court" by Mary Ann Tobin, State Auditor of Public Accounts, Frankfort.

In the audit, the state claimed Sheriff William Taylor owed \$4,574. The sheriff paid \$4,000 for the past years and \$266.07 remaining to be paid in 1984 to the county.

Following payment, Sheriff Taylor told the court and state field representative Al Howell, of the Kentucky Department of Finance who attended the meeting, that his audit made by accountant, Dwight Griffin, showed he (sheriff) had overpaid all county taxing districts, literally dropping a financial bombshell on the Rockcastle County Library which had a tax overpayment of \$5,834.62.

That amount started the court, but it was only the beginning. Also overpaid in tax money was the \$266.07 he paid the county at the meeting; \$173.76 he overpaid the Agriculture taxing district (county agent); \$388.55 overpaid the Health Department taxing district; \$734.13 overpaid the school district; and six cents overpaid the Soil Conservation District. It all totaled \$7,347.19.

The court and Howell agreed the \$7,347.19 is the sheriff's money, so the court directed County Attorney James H. Lamb to return the money to Howell and tell them to return the money. Howell suggested the districts borrow the money from the bank if they didn't have it.

That's up-front money belonging to the sheriff and should be returned to him," the state field representative concluded.

The court had one piece of good news from Howell. He reported the county will receive about \$78,781 as its share of the truck license fees. The court had expected about \$68,000. Howell also said the county will receive six more revenue sharing checks before revenue sharing is discontinued, if it is.

In the audit of county affairs, State Auditor Tobin listed

seven areas of "non-compliance" by the court in prior years.

They are: "The budget was overexpended; there were deficit balances in several funds; an administrative code had not been adopted by the fiscal court; the sheriff owed the county \$3,347 from the 1983 tax collections and \$1,050 for advertising costs; the sheriff's tax account had a deficit balance; sheriff's county revenue bond was too low."

Also, the audit reported in the past county "did not obtain bids on all purchases over \$7,500 as required by KRS 424.260," but "this non-compliance has been corrected and is not commented on in the current year audit findings."

For city of Mt. Vernon

Council told 6 month delay develops on sewer plant

A six-month hitch has developed in the proposed plan to upgrade and expand the Mt. Vernon sewer plant.

Engineers for the project, Richard Moore of Schimpeler-Corradino Associates of Louisville, told the council at its regular meeting Monday night bids on the plant work, estimated at \$1.2 million, will be opened at 7 p.m. Aug. 27 at city hall, but it will take the state about 90 days to check and evaluate the bids before approving them.

In that case, Moore said, the project could not get started until about Dec. 1.

Moore had probable lost work days because of winter weather delays and a more realistic starting date in March, the council agreed with Moore and moved the mandatory completion date from six months to one year.

Usually a contractor can be held financially responsible if he fails to make a completion date deadline, in which case, most contractors figure in that possible monetary loss and "hide it" in the bid.

"We had hoped to get the project well under way before winter," Mayor Roland Mullins said. "But since the engineers seem to think it would cost us less to extend the completion date from six months to a year, we don't have much of an alternative."

Tobin said, "Our comments are intended to be constructive. The purpose of each is to point out areas for improvement. The absence of extensive comments of a complimentary nature does not imply the county's accounting and compliance procedures are deficient and unsound."

The audit report and comments were included in a cover letter attached to the audit. The state directed the letter be published in its entirety as a paid advertisement. It will be found on Page 19 of this issue of the Signal. The letter was written prior to the sheriff's tax settlement with the court and state.

Garbage update

Collection of garbage in containers at Pine Hill, Green Hill and Brodhead is being done by Laurel Garbage Collection of East Bernstadt and not by Helton Sanitation of Gray, as previously reported.

The county contracted with the East Bernstadt firm after Clarence "Jib" Hays gave up the county contract. Laurel Garbage takes the waste to Lily Landfill.

'South Pacific' opened at local high school Saturday

Once again the Rockcastle Council for the Arts is providing for something in which the whole community can take pride. This time it is the production of the classic musical story of World War II, SOUTH PACIFIC.

Allen Pensold shows once more his natural abilities for casting and for bringing out the very best performances from those whom he directs. To the notice in this business, that is "show business" (which so very recently, came to most here), the selection of the popular play, SOUTH PACIFIC might have seemed a bit ambitious. But, Pensold, who has spent more than 12 years of studying and working in the theater, had faith when he reached for this gutsy, sad, funny play with the numerous, now familiar songs. I am sure anyone who saw one of the first two performances (last Saturday night and Sunday afternoon) feels that his faith in local talent was justified. The play was a huge success.

Local audiences have had several previous opportunities to see and hear main characters Patti Towery, Mike Bryant, Jack Lewis and Lewis Tagliaboschi perform excellently on stage, but this play seems to show us even more depth

and range of ability in these characters. I lowered one person in the audience say she thought it was Mike's best performance ever and few sat dry eyed through Patti's emotional appeal to Emil deBeque to return to her un-barned.

Many of the lighter moments of the play were provided by Lewis. "Taq" who seems to know instinctively exactly how to kiss his lips and how to gesture to get the audience tickled. His courage in dressing in coconut shells and a grass skirt is probably second only to Jack Lewis's courage in having his long curls cut short right before the play so he could play more convincingly the role of Lt. Joseph Cable.

Least, but not last, the audience was charmed by the two young children of the Frenchman de Beque, played by Scarlett Dailey and Matt Bryant. The play opens with and ends with their delightful rendition of a French action song.

Judy Woods' outstanding performance as "Bloody Mary" cannot go without mention. This mother of three (and sister of "Taq") proved she is not the only member of the family who has talent and also proved that having a family is no excuse for refusing a challenge. Judy, who said she

had not been in stage since her high school days, had two children in the play also ("Stewpot", Scott Cramer and native child, Margi Woods).

The character of Capt. George Bracker, played by David Phillips of London, one of two "imports" in the play, came alive as he strode on and off stage in an array of Hawaiian shirts and a white safari hat with a voice and body language to convince us he was a military commander who deserved the nickname "Ironbilly".

The very military and very handsome Comm. William Harbison (Craig White) won special approval of young female cast members as well as the audience.

Natalie Pybgs looked beautiful on-stage and very "foreign" as she silently portrayed the shy, non-English speaking daughter of Bloody Mary, who falls in love with the ill-fated Lt. Cable.

Talent and hard work go into the musical accompaniment for a production like this and sometimes it is overlooked. Becky Hedrick did an outstanding job as pianist for the show.

A show could not go on without support from a good stage manager (Shelly Parkerson) and supporting characters. These actors and actresses also did a fine

job in their roles as navy nurses, seamen and native children.

Bullen attends Police Academy

Steve Bullen, Kentucky Division of Forestry County Ranger for Rockcastle County, recently completed 46 hours of training at the Kentucky State Police Academy in Frankfort. Bullen enforces Kentucky's forest fire prevention laws regulating outdoor burning in Rockcastle County. These laws prohibit fire at any time or near the woods without taking all reasonable precautions to prevent its spread. They require all outdoor fires be attended till extinguished. One law in effect during spring and fall prohibits any burning within 150 feet of the woods except between 4:30 p.m. and midnight.

State Police training for forest rangers includes arson investigation, surveillance techniques, defensive tactics, laws of arrest and courtroom testimony. Don Hamm, Director for the Division of Forestry, said law enforcement is the division's main tool for preventing

the more destructive fires that burn the privately owned woodlands of Kentucky. He said this past spring 1,578 fires burned 40,000 acres in the state. Six hundred and thirty-eight citations were issued statewide for outdoor burning violations and five arrests were made for suspected arson.

The State Police have been very helpful to our rangers and we look forward to further instruction at their academy," he said.

Social Security--Past and Present

August of this year marks the 50th anniversary of the enactment of the Social Security Act. President Franklin Roosevelt, referred to the legislation as the "cornerstone in a structure which is being built but is by no means complete." The events of the past 50 years confirm this description.

An important feature of Social Security is its ability to adapt to society's changing needs. Circumstances today are very different from what they were 50 years ago, but the program is just as responsive now as it was then.

In 1930, 5.4 percent of the population was age 65 or older, compared with 11 percent today. By the year 2030, 55 million Americans—18 percent of the population—will be at least 65.

The average life expectancy of 65 for men is 13 years, and 17 years for women. Men and women now 75 can expect to live another 9 and 12 years, respectively. In Rockcastle County there are 938 women over 62 receiving benefits compared with 779 men.

The longer lifespan enjoyed by Americans has been accompanied by lower birthrates. Today, women have an average of 1.7 children, compared with 3.7 in the

late 1950's. If this trend continues, it is estimated that by 2035, there will be only two workers paying Social Security taxes for each person getting benefits.

As these and other changes over the past half-century took place, the Social Security Act was amended to keep up to date with the times. The first significant amendments, enacted in 1939 even before the first monthly benefits were paid in 1940, provided benefits to certain dependents and survivors of insured workers. In the 1950's, Social Security coverage was extended to include most types of jobs, as well as self-employment.

Disability insurance was added in the late 1950's, and Medicare was enacted in 1965. There were also changes in eligibility requirements, and automatic cost-of-living benefit in-

creases were first paid in 1975. Most recently, the Social Security Amendments of 1983 greatly strengthened program financing. This flexibility to cope with and solve emerging problems has been matched by a stability that has kept the program true to its basic principles.

Social Security has lifted millions of people out of poverty and has enabled beneficiaries to live their lives in modest comfort. In 1985 over 2500 beneficiaries in Rockcastle County will receive over \$6.5 million in retirement disability and survivors benefits. In Kentucky over 600,000 will receive over \$2.6 billion over the same period.

Social Security is as relevant in the 1980's and beyond as it was when it was first enacted. Social Security: Partnership with Tomorrow!



Baesler visits Mullins in Mt. Vernon

Lexington Mayor Scotty Baesler was in Mt. Vernon last Friday morning to meet with Mayor Roland Mullins and discuss the state and community's role in providing post-secondary education on a wider and more varied scale.

Baesler also asked Mullins to serve with a coalition of several Kentucky elected officials and university presidents including Baesler and Dr. A. D. Albright.

According to Baesler, the main thrust of the coalition will be to formulate, within the next few months, a legislative program pertaining to post-secondary education and its ability to train potential workers for the job requirements of the 90's.

Baesler said that shifts in employment, already set in motion, will be dramatic in the next ten years. It is generally believed that more and more the shifts will move to advanced technology or technology-based industries and businesses. This means that a much heavier focus will come upon a sound secondary education emphasizing basic skills, among them mathematics, sciences and communications.

This movement, Baesler said, means a much more serious focus upon post-secondary education ranging from one- to two-year technical programs to four-year and graduate professional and technical programs covering several disciplines.

Baesler feels Kentucky specifically needs a nation class state-wide university that can provide research and services throughout the Commonwealth, oftentimes in conjunction with institutions located in other areas of the state.

The coalition will meet soon, to discuss interest in and the feasibility of this approach to the coming needs through a legislative package and then proceed with the development of the agenda.

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

When the Forest Service intends to construct the road through a contract, award of the timber sale will not be made unless either a satisfactory construction bid is received, or if Forest Service fails to receive such a bid within 120 days of opening timber sale bids, bidder agrees to perform road construction. **1x3**

A certified check, bank draft,

cashier's check, bank money order or cash, irrevocable letter of credit or bid bond in the amount of \$1,900.00 payable to Forest Service-USA, must be deposited with each bid. The high bidder whose bid is accepted must within 30 days from receipt of written notification furnish a cash deposit or provide effective purchaser credit in the amount of 10 percent of total bid value rounded up to the next \$100.00. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Before bids are submitted, full information concerning the timber, the sample contract, the conditions of sale, and submission of bids should be obtained from the Forest Supervisor, Winchester, KY, or the District Ranger, Berea, Kentucky. **1x3**

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals. Foster children may also be eligible for these meals. Families with foster children should contact the school for information regarding benefits. Additional forms are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be verified (checked) time with each school district required to verify a sample annually. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. An application for free or reduced price benefits cannot be approved unless it contains complete documentation of eligibility information including names of all household members, social security numbers of all adult household members or an indication that a household member does not possess one, total current household income and the amount and source of income received by each household member and the signature of an adult household member. Households currently receiving food stamps may submit their Food Stamp Program case number instead of income information. Households receiving meal benefits are required to report increases of income of \$50 per month or \$600 a year or a decrease in the household size.

If a household's income decreases or if household size increases during the school year, the household should contact the school to file a new application since such changes may make the children of the household eligible for meal benefits if the income is within the income guidelines.

Under the provisions of the policy, a school official will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the determination, he/she may contact either orally or in writing the following official:

Members of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court

We have examined the statement of assets, liabilities, and fund balances arising from cash transactions of Rockcastle County as of June 30, 1984, and the related statement of cash receipts, cash disbursements, and changes in fund balances for the year then ended. We also examined the Sheriff's settlement - 1983 taxes for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1984. Our examination was made in accordance with the Standards for Audit of Governmental Organizations, Programs, Activities, and Functions, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, and accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As recommended by the State Local Finance Officer, pursuant to Kentucky Revised Statute (KRS) 66.210, the accompanying financial statements are prepared on a cash basis. Consequently, certain revenues and the related assets are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when a liability is incurred. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements are not intended to present financial position and results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly the assets, liabilities, and fund balances arising from cash transactions of Rockcastle County at June 30, 1984, and its cash receipts and disbursements, and the Sheriff's 1983 taxes charged, collected, and distributed during the year then ended, in conformity with the accounting system described above, applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

We also conducted tests of compliance with state and federal laws and regulations including federal revenue sharing requirements enumerated in the Commentary on the Audit Requirements of the 1980 Amendments to the State and Local Fiscal Assistance Act issued by the Office of Revenue Sharing. Unless otherwise noted below, the tested items were in compliance with applicable state and federal laws and regulations. During our examination, nothing came to our attention to cause us to believe that the "untested" items were not in compliance.

We did not conduct a study and evaluation of internal accounting control as we considered that the audit could be performed more efficiently by expanding substantive audit tests. Therefore, we placed very little reliance on the internal accounting control system.

FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Our comments are intended to be constructive. The purpose of each is to point out areas for improvement. The absence of extensive comments of a complimentary nature does not imply the county's accounting and compliance procedures are deficient or un sound. Accordingly, we offer the accompanying comments and recommendations:

Prior Year

In the prior year audit report, we reported several areas of non-compliance. Those that have not been corrected are commented on in the current year audit findings. The noncorrected findings are as follows:

- 1) The budget was overexpended.
- 2) There were deficit balances in several funds.
- 3) An administrative code had not been adopted by the fiscal court.
- 4) The Sheriff owed the county \$3,347 from the 1982 tax collections and \$1,050 for advertising costs.
- 5) The Sheriff's tax account had a deficit balance.
- 6) The Sheriff's county revenue bond was too low.

We also reported the county did not obtain bids on all purchases over \$7,500 as required by KRS 424.260. This noncompliance has been corrected and is not commented on in the current year audit findings.

Current Year

- 1) **The County Should not Overexpend the Budget**
The Road and Bridge Fund and Revenue Sharing Fund budgets were overexpended by \$1,099 and \$24, respectively. KRS 68-220 prohibits expenditure in excess of the budget. We recommend compliance with this statute.
- 2) **County Funds Should not Have Deficit Balances**
The Revenue Sharing Fund and Jail Fund had deficit fund balances as of June 30, 1984. Expenditures in excess of revenues available are prohibited by KRS 68-110(1). We recommend compliance with this statute.
- 3) **The Fiscal Court Should Adopt an Administrative Code**
The fiscal court had not adopted an administrative code as required by KRS 68.005. Without the administrative code, there is no instrument that provides the guidelines for the every day operation of the county. We recommend the administrative code be adopted.
- 4) **The Sheriff Should Settle 1982 and 1983 Taxes**
In the prior year audit report, we reported the Sheriff owing 1982 taxes to taxing districts and being due refunds from taxing districts. Most of these underpayments and overpayments have not been settled. These are listed in the recapitulation below.

Also, as reflected in the Sheriff's 1983 tax settlement in this report, the Sheriff owes additional taxes to taxing districts. These underpayments are also listed in the recapitulation below:

We recommend the Sheriff settle the above taxes.

Current Year (Continued)

- 5) **The Sheriff Should Deposit Personal Funds to Eliminate Deficit**

As of June 30, 1984, the Sheriff's tax account had a deficit balance of \$4,574. The largest part of this deficit was attributed to the prior year deficit of \$2,081 less \$1,730 in commissions not transferred to the fee account plus \$3,031 unreported receipts.
