front pages chronicles 'man's failures and the sports section chronicles his successes."

Of course Douglas's assessment is more idyllic than substance these days since greed, drugs, dishonesty and cynicism have tarnished the toy images we of the ball card collecting era long held dear.

But there are still lots of wonderful images in sports too. Following are some that I believe Justice Douglas had in mind.

The expression on Sam Bowie's face after Kentucky had beaten Illinois in the NCAA Midwest finals in 1983, earning a trip to the Final Four.

Seeing Pete Rose get his 3,000 hit at Riverfront Stadium, May 5, 1978.

The excitement etched on Paul Andrews' face as he tried to comprehend and answer reporters' questions following a mid-

court shot that won the 1982 Boys State High School Basketball Tournament at Rupp Arena.

Seeing, as if it were yesterday, the climax of the 1960 World Series - Pittsburgh's Bill Mazeroski as he ran around the bases after hitting a last of the ninth inning home run that beat the Yankees 10-9 in Game 7 at old Forbes Field. It was Oct. 13 and I was playing hooky.

Jerry Claiborne's expression an instant after Wisconsin's Bob Kozba fumbled the snap from center during a 25-yard field goal chip shot clinching a 20-19 victory in the Hall of Fame Bowl.

Seeing Angel Cordero drive Spend A Buck to a wire to wire victory in the 1985 Kentucky Derby.

Remembering just as vividly Secretariat, under Ron Turcotte, run away from the field in the Belmont Stakes in 1973 and into Triple Crown history.

**Readers write**

**Tim Justice of Pikeville writes:** "I wanted to comment on a couple of the letters you had in your column (recently). They commented on how they hoped Coach (Eddie) Sutton would create dynasty in the same way that John Wooden did at UCLA. Now I am one of these young Kentucky fans (I'm 19) that is, unfortunately, not old enough to remember Coach (Adolph) Rupp and all his wonderful achievements. But I was raised up proper. That is, to believe that next to God and family, UK basketball is top priority. And I too have been afflicted by this contagious disease that all UK fans are stricken with - leaving one in a state of mind that he believes UK should win 10 championships in a row while never losing over 2 in a season (and those had better be close)."

"But when I sit back and think about those expectations it sometimes strikes me just how spoiled we UK fans are. Out of 256 Division I teams, I would wager that in the past 14 'horrible' years that we've gone through, we're still in the top 20 for total victories, winning percentage, and number of championships (not just NCAA). We win more games than most colleges dream of."

"I am going to be brash enough to say that the past 14 years were not horrible. Indeed, I would even call them respectable. We played the toughest teams in the country year in and year out. It's hard to build a dynasty against Louisville, Indiana, and North Carolina."

"It's hard to build a dynasty period. There are simply too many good players in the country today. Pick up a list of next year's potential recruits. There are the top 100 (probably pro potential) and then hundreds more... potential. I sometimes think UK fans expect to have the entire top 100 on our bench. But we can't! Only 15, and only 5 on the floor at a time. And we have to face the fact that everyone doesn't 'want' to come to UK anymore. And for everyone who does, there's going to be a player of equal stature on the other team."

"Maybe I'm just not old enough to remember the days when we never lost. Maybe some of the older fans will say, 'That boy just isn't true blue.' Or maybe I just think too much. In

any case, I hope we fans don't expect too much of Coach Sutton in his first year. I think the man can be a great coach and bring a championship or two to the state. I also hope we fans don't lose our heads and choke him before he has a chance."

**Comment I:** In 14 "horrible" years under Coach Joe B. Hall, Kentucky won 20 or more games 11 times, including one 30-win season and two 29-victory campaigns. The Wildcats won or shared eight SEC titles, one SEC tournament and an NCAA championship and advanced to the Final Four three times.

**Comment II:** About the nation's all-time Top 20 colleges in terms of victories, according to the NCAA figures through the 1984-85 season, Kentucky ranks first in college basketball, with 1,376 victories with North Carolina second at 1,343. Not including victories from last season, here are the rest of the Top 10:

3. St. John's, 1,277; 4. Kansas, 1,270; 5. Oregon State, 1,256; 6. Pennsylvania, 1,239; 7. Notre Dame, 1,199; 8. Washington, 1,185; 9. Temple, 1,180; 10. Duke, 1,176.

**Footnote:** Not including figures from last season Western Kentucky ranks 13th with 1,115 wins.

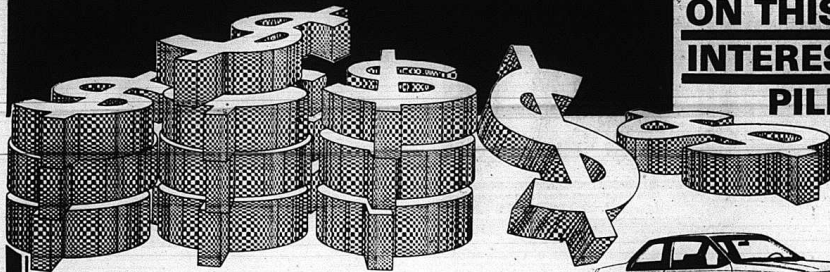

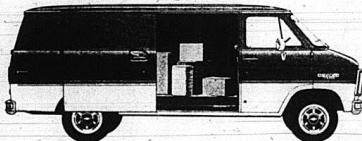

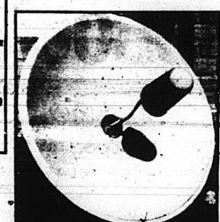

### KENTUCKY TOMATOES

The tomato is one of the most popular and versatile members of the fruit and vegetable group of the basic food groups. In



Kentucky tomatoes are in season from July until October.

The nutrition of the tomato is just as good as the flavor and aroma. The tomato has several nutrition pluses: It is low in calories and rich in vitamins C and A. It is also a source of potassium and iron. The tomato is naturally low in sodium and free of fat and cholesterol, making it a healthy addition to almost any diet.

### Canned Tomatoes

Use only firm, ripe, perfect tomatoes. Do not use over-ripe tomatoes because they may not have enough acid for safe processing. They can be satisfactorily frozen for use in soups, casseroles, and other cooked dishes.

To loosen skins, dip tomatoes into boiling water for about 1/2 minute, then dip quickly into cold water. Cut out stem ends and peel tomatoes.

Hot Pack: Cut peeled tomatoes into quarters. Bring to boil; stir to keep tomatoes from sticking. Pack boiling hot tomatoes to 1/2 inch of top. Add 1/2 teaspoon salt and 2 teaspoons bottled lemon juice to pints. 1 teaspoon salt and 4 teaspoons bottled lemon juice to quarts. Wipe jar rims clean. Adjust jar lids. Process in boiling water bath (212 degrees F), 35 minutes for pint jars and 45 minutes for quart jars.

As soon as you remove jars from canner, complete seals if necessary.

### Tomato Juice

Use ripe, juicy, perfect tomatoes. Wash, remove stem ends, cut into pieces. Simmer until softened, stirring often. Put through strainer. Reheat at once just to boiling.

Fill jars with boiling hot juice to 1/2 inch of top. Add 1/2 teaspoon salt and 2 teaspoons bottled lemon juice to pints; add a teaspoon salt and 4 teaspoons of bottled lemon juice to quarts. Wipe jar rims clean. Adjust jar lids. Process in boiling water bath (212 degrees F), 35 minutes for pint jars and 35 minutes for quart jars.

### Chili Sauce

- 1 gallon tomatoes (after peeled and cut up)
- 1 quart onions, chopped
- 3 cups brown sugar
- 4 tablespoons salt
- 3 teaspoons pepper
- 1 tablespoon mustard seed
- 1 teaspoon celery seed
- 1 teaspoon allspice
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon whole cloves
- 1 quart vinegar

Combine tomatoes, onions, sugar and spices. Cook until thick. Add vinegar and cook until very thick. Pack in hot jars and adjust lids. Process 15 minutes in boiling-water bath. Makes 5 1/2 pints. (Salt is for flavoring only and may be omitted for low-sodium diets.)

### Tomato Sauce

- 10 pounds tomatoes; peeled, cored and chopped
- 3 medium onions, finely chopped
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 1/2 teaspoons oregano
- 2 bay leaves
- 1 tablespoon salt
- 1 teaspoon black pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon crushed red pepper
- 1 teaspoon sugar

Cook chopped onion and garlic in small amount of water in a large saucepan until tender. Add remaining ingredients and simmer about 2 hours, stirring occasionally. Press mixture through food mill; discard seeds. Cook pulp over medium-high heat until it thickens. Stir frequently to prevent sticking. Pour, hot, into hot jars, leaving 1/2 inch headspace. Adjust lids. Process half pints 30 minutes in boiling water bath, makes about 5 half-pints.

## Berea Montessori pre-school to open

The first Montessori pre-school in this area will be opened this September in Berea. The non-profit, non-denominational school will be called "The Berea Christian Montessori School, Inc." and the probable location will be Union Church, on the corner of Prospect Street and Scaffold "Cane" Road.

The school will offer three programs for two-and-a-half to four-and-a-half year-old children. The program choices will be full-day and half-day instruction on Monday through Friday and a special program of three hours per day on Monday through Wednesday afternoons. Full-day schooling will be fitted to the parents' needs. A nap and a lunch time will be included in the full-day schedule.

Dr. Maria Montessori who developed the Montessori method of instruction, was the first woman to graduate from the University of Rome Medical School. In 1907 she was invited to organize a school for preschool children in a reconstructed slum area of San Lorenzo, Italy. Soon the reading and mathematical accomplishments of her preschool students were proclaimed internationally through reporters who visited her school. Later she traveled all over the world founding schools and lecturing about her discoveries. She has written approximately 15 volumes and numerous articles about education.

Dr. Montessori felt that the goal of early education should be to cultivate a child's own natural desire to learn. This objective is approached in two ways: first, by allowing each child to experience the excitement of learning by his own choice rather than by being forced; and second, by helping him to perfect all his natural tools for learning, such as the skill of perception (understanding what is seen, heard and felt), the power of concentration, and a sense of organization. The Montessori materials have this dual long-range purpose in addition to their immediate purpose of giving specific information to the child.

In "The Absorbent Mind," Dr. Montessori wrote, "The most important period of life is... from birth to the age of six... At no other age has the child greater need of intelligent help." Recent psychological research studies have confirmed Dr. Montessori's theory. Dr. Benjamin S. Bloom of the University of Chicago wrote in "Stability and Change in Human Characteristics," "From conception to age four, the individual develops 50% of his mature intelligence. From ages four to eight he develops another 20%... This would suggest the very rapid growth of intelligence in the early years and the possible great influence of the early environment on this development."

The head teacher for the Berea Christian Montessori School will be Mrs. Lucile Hunting, Mrs.

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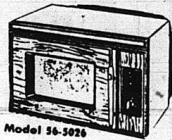
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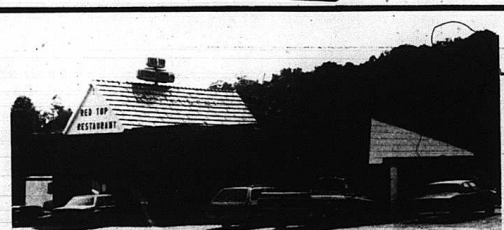
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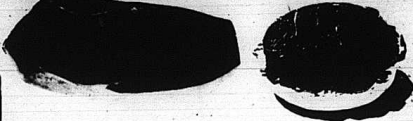

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**HOW TO SAVE A CHILD'S LIFE...**



The bright yellow school bus, laden with children going to or from school, is a familiar sight on Kentucky highways.

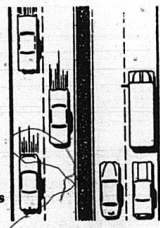
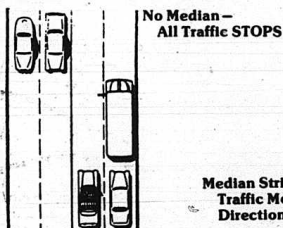
It travels in the early morning, at midday, during afternoon rush hours, and, all too often, after dark. Whenever it travels, however, you, the motorist, must exercise special caution to protect the lives of its young passengers. A bus loading or unloading children will display a STOP sign and flashing red lights.

If you meet a school bus loading or unloading children on a highway that is not divided by a median, you must stop—no matter which direction you are going—and wait until the bus moves on. On a divided highway, you must stop only if you are going in the same direction as the school bus; if you are across the median going in the opposite direction, you may proceed with caution. A painted area in the middle of the road is not a median and cars going in both directions must stop.

The STOP sign that swings out from the side of the school bus places the safety responsibility square on your shoulders. So be careful—the child you save may be your own.

Kentucky Revised Statute 189.370 States:

"Whenever any school bus or church bus used in the transportation of children is stopped upon a highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging passengers, the operator of a vehicle approaching from any direction shall bring his vehicle to a complete stop and shall not start up or attempt to pass until the bus has completed receiving or discharging passengers and has been put into motion; provided, that this stop requirement shall not apply to vehicles approaching in the opposite direction from a church or school bus which is stopped upon a highway where multi-lane roadways providing for opposite directions of travel are separated by a raised, depressed, mountable or non-mountable median."

# Great Saltpetre Cave auction

Ownership of one of the nation's most historic caverns will change hands at the end of the month when the Great Saltpetre Cave near Renfro Valley is sold at absolute auction.

Owned by the promoter of the famed Renfro Valley Barn Dance, John Lair, the cave has a place in Kentucky history on several counts.

During the early 1800's, it housed the largest saltpetre industry in the eastern part of the state, producing saltpetre for powder-mills in Pittsburgh, Philadelphia and New Orleans. The gunpowder was used by the American armed forces in the War of 1812 and the war with Mexico.

Since the time of the early settlement, the cave has served as a sort of community center. Early religious services of the "camp meeting" type were held in its huge torch-lit chambers. In more recent times, it has served as a showcase for country music performers, many of whom were regulars in Lair's Renfro Valley broadcasts. It has long been a favorite Sunday gathering place for local residents, since temperatures inside the cave remain ideal year-round.

The cave is unique in many aspects and it has been called the most perfectly developed natural underground theater in existence. Natural rock formations provide a stage and numerous dressing areas, making it a perfect setting for stage shows and exhibitions. A 50-foot dome provides acoustics that compare with those of the Mormon Tabernacle in Salt Lake City.

In recent years it has been widely promoted as a tourist attraction. It contains an array of interesting sights which derive

from its unusual physical features or tie in with the history of the state.

Auctioneer Sam Ford of Mt. Vernon, who is in charge of the auction, calls it a "truly unique investment opportunity, with a wide range of possibilities."

Included for sale with the cave is the 400-acre tract of woodland which surrounds it. The

estate is traversed by Crooked Creek, which, with water from nine underground springs, is one of the very few Kentucky streams cold enough for trout fishing.

The absolute auction will be held Aug. 31 at 1:30 p.m. at the cave. The property may be viewed anytime between now and sale date.

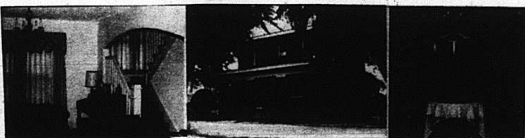

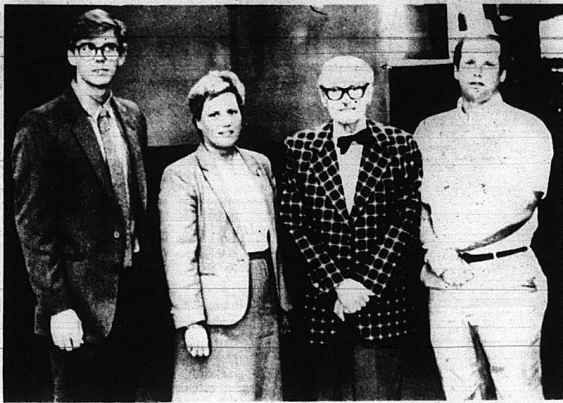

many state requirements for a full-service jail. At any time the Department of Corrections could close the facility down.

The county has paid Nu-Way Security a total of \$13,000, and the work that has been done by the contractor has been minimal, according to Judge Jasper, who said the contract calls for such things as: a self-contained emergency power exit system; wiring in the jail area other than conduit; replacement of various doors and locks; bullet-proof windows; changes in the kitchen area, including a vent to the roof; lamps and fixtures; intercommunication system; two water closets and a key cabinet.

Once the work is completed, the county will be reimbursed by the state, but until the contract has been completed, no money will be paid.  
The work was to have been completed by June.

"Jean is the cook in the family. I just eat," Joe said.  
Although his baggy-picking son, Terry, and Joe team up to flail away on the razzle-dazzle instruments, jokes are important to the performance. A few standards:

"I was comin' in and passed this woman and she looked at me and said to her companion, 'I'll bet that's never been married.' She called me a fat. If she's out there called me a fat. I want to tell her that has been married so many times that wedding bells sound like an alarm clock."

Another: "I had a good corn crop this year. I'll probably get 30 gallons to the acre."

And another: "I was fishing and something hit my shoe and here was this snake with a big frog in its mouth. I picked it up, took the frog out and poured beer down that snake and threw it out in the

water. A few minutes later, I felt something hit my shoe and I looked down and here was that durned snake with another frog in its mouth."

Yet another: "My grandson stayed all night with us and we had to sleep together. We undressed and he knelt down on his side of the bed with his arms on the bed. I thought it was sweet, so I did the same thing on my side. After about a minute or so I said, 'Well what do we say?' He said, 'I don't know what to say, but granny is going to kill you in the morning. The pot's on this side of the bed.'"

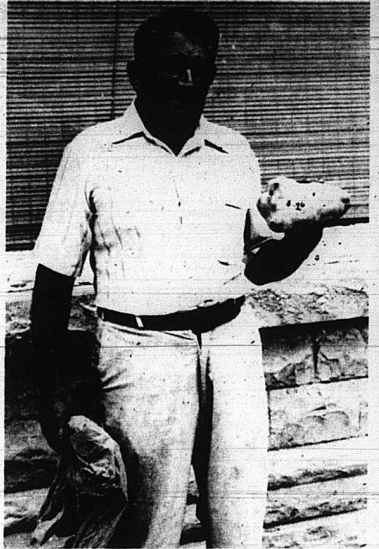

### The beginning of the Church of Christ

When Peter was discussing the conversion of the household of Cornelius, he said, "The Holy Spirit fell on them, even as on us at the BEGINNING" (Acts 11:15). There can be no doubt that the time referred to by Peter was the Day of Pentecost (Acts 2). Before His death, Jesus had promised to build His church (Matt. 16:18). People were added to that church on and after the day of Pentecost (Acts 2:41, 47). It was indeed a most memorable occasion.

The place was Jerusalem. Acts 2 begins by stating that the apostles were "all together in one place." They were in the city of Jerusalem (Acts 1:5; 2:12, 14). On the occasion of His ascension Jesus had instructed them to "tarry in Jerusalem" until they should receive the promise of the Father, the coming of the Holy Spirit (Lk. 24:49 and Acts 1:4-5). They were at the right place, therefore, to fulfill the prophecy of Isa. 2:2-4, where God's prophet had declared: "for out of Zion shall go forth the law, and the word of the Lord from Jerusalem." The apostles were to begin work under the worldwide commission, and that work did begin in Jerusalem (Matt. 28:19-20; Acts 1:8).

The audience consisted of "devout men, out of every nation under heaven" (Acts 2:5), both Jews and proselytes (2:10). These people were deeply religious, with several common characteristics. They shared a common faith in one God, Jehovah, the Creator of heaven and earth. They all believed the Old Testament scriptures and looked for the coming of the Messiah. They all had a genuine interest in spiritual matters.

The preachers were all of the apostles (Acts 2:5). Peter

stood up with the eleven and proclaimed Christ (2:14). He was a common man with a common background—a fisherman from Galilee. But he had sat at the Master's feet for three years, and on this occasion was speaking "as the Holy Spirit gave him utterance" (Acts 2:4; John 14:26; 16:13).

The sermon consisted of Peter's explaining that what was taking place was in fulfillment of Joel's prophecy (Joel 2:28ff). Then he went directly in the point: he accused the Jews of murdering the Christ (2:22-23). His arguments can be summarized under three headings: (1) David prophesied of His resurrection (2:24-31); (2) the apostles were eyewitnesses of His resurrection (2:32) and (3) their testimony is confirmed by the miraculous demonstration of the Spirit (2:33). At the conclusion of his sermon, Peter urged all to "know assuredly" that Jesus is both "Lord and Christ" (2:36). Men were "pricked in their hearts" (2:37)

and wanted to know what to do to be saved. Peter told them to "repent and be baptized" for the remission of sins (Acts 2:38). 3,000 of them obeyed and were added to the church of Christ on that occasion (2:47).

This is the church that Jesus built. The ONE spoken of in the New Testament. Why not become a member of it? "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins; and you shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit."

# Rockets down Fleming-Neon Friday in season opener 21-14

The Rockcastle County Rockets opened their 1985 season with a win that averaged a season opening loss a year ago.

Last Friday night the Rockets downed the Fleming-Neon Pirates at home 21-14.

The Rockets fell behind twice in the game, at 7-0 and 14-7, but never gave up.

Fleming-Neon took the lead in the first quarter after a Rockcastle fumble gave them the ball on the 30-yard line. Two plays later, the Pirates completed a pass in the end zone to take the early lead.

Rockcastle scored in the first quarter when senior Charles Bullens took the ball in from the 2 yard line after the Rockets made an impressive drive down the field, which consumed most of the clock.

Freshman Rodney Kirby, the Rockets' starting tailback, had three fumbles in the first half-fumbles that were recovered by Fleming-Neon. The last of Kirby's fumbles came late in the second quarter and set up the Pirates' second and final touchdown of the game.

With a 14-7 lead at halftime, the Pirates kicked off to the Rockets to start the second half.

The Rockets, who start only seven seniors and the rest underclassmen, took the ball on their first possession of the half and scored.

The drive was sustained by two pass plays, both to end, Devin Ford.

The senior caught a 15-yarder inside the Fleming-Neon's 30 yard line and, after two successful running plays, Ford caught a 10-yard pass in the end

zone for the touchdown.

Sophomore quarterback Chris Larkey, who was 4 for 8 in the passing department, threw for a total of 50 yards and one touchdown. He also threw for two extra points when he hit senior Charles Bullens in the end zone after the Rockets faked an extra point attempt. The two-point conversion gave the Rockets a 15-14 lead—a lead that would last.

The Rockets, who have already equalled their 1984 win total under first year coach John Thomas Larkey, played excellent defense in the second half to keep Fleming-Neon from ever threatening again.

The Rockets, however, threatened and scored again when Bullens picked up his second touchdown of the young season early in the fourth quarter on a 4-yard run.

Senior placekicker Troy Taylor missed the extra point to make the score 21-14. He earlier added the extra point on the Rockets' first score.

With only 29 men, and the majority of them underclassmen, Head Coach Larkey was quite pleased with the Rockets' performance. "I'm hoping for a 500 season and I will feel like we've accomplished our goals if our boys don't give up," he said. The Rockets did not give up Friday night and it paid off for them. A year ago the Rockets lost to Fleming-Neon 6-0.

Leading the team in rushing Friday night was senior fullback Jeff Bullock. Bullock picked up 43 yards on nine carries. Freshman Rodney Kirby, who started after the three fumbles and played a fine second half, had 37 yards on

12 carries and Charles Bullens added 36 yards on 13 carries.

The Rockets gained a total of 179 yards on offense during the rain-soaked game. The leading tackler for the Rockets was sophomore Pete Harrison, who, according to Rockets assistant Tony Saylor, probably had the best defensive game.

Senior Lonnie Thomas also had a fine game on defense, picking up two solo tackles and six assists.

Jeff Bullock had three tackles and two assists, including one sack which cost the Pirates 10 yards.

Senior Bill David Gregory had three solo tackles, one which saved a touchdown and two assists.

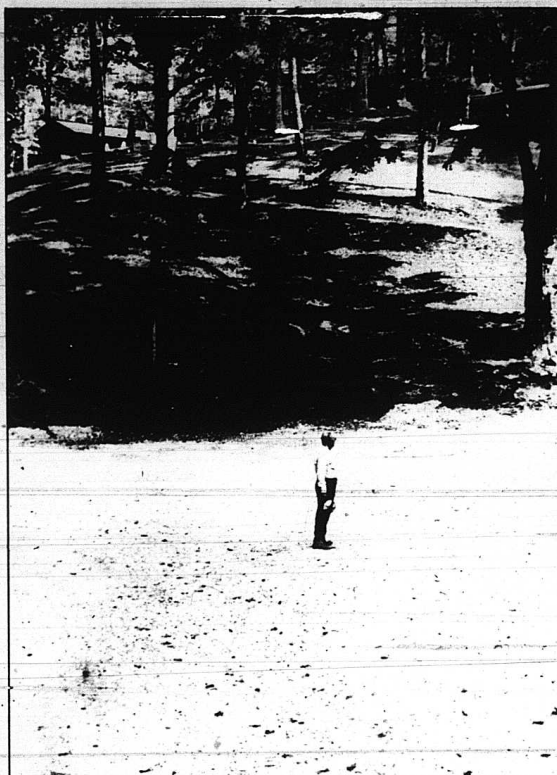
Devin Ford also picked up three tackles and one assist, while senior Mark McClure had one solo to his credit.
