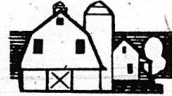

CONTROLLING WHITE GRUBS IN LAWNS

White grubs are a major pest to lawn grasses in Kentucky and are causing problems again this year. According to University of Kentucky Extension entomologist with the College of Agriculture, now is the time for treatment of white grubs in your lawn.

The white, C-shaped, chubby worms with brown heads are causing extensive damage to some lawns. Grubs eat the roots of grasses causing a problem in the plant's absorbance of deeper soil moisture in the late summer months. As a result, large patches of dead grass five to 20 feet in diameter develop in grub-infested areas. Sod on these patches is not anchored well to the soil and can be rolled back to expose the grubs. If the damage is allowed to develop to this stage, it is usually, too late to save the turf. As yet, the grubs have not reached a size to have caused noticeable injury to the lawn, but the situation will change quickly. If your lawn had a grub problem last year, there is more of a chance that it will be reinfested this year.

White grubs are the larval stage of several kinds of beetles such as masked chafers. May beetles, green June beetles and Japanese beetles. If these adult beetles are numerous in your neighborhood in June and July, you can expect a high infestation of white grubs later on.

To determine the amount of white grub infestation in your lawn, sample six or seven areas, cutting a square, flat piece of sod and inspecting the roots closely for grubs. Be careful to catch all the grubs because many are small in the early stages of infestation. A sample count of seven grubs per square foot may indicate a need for insecticide treatment. Be sure to tamp the sod sample back into place and water it well to prevent permanent damage to the lawn.

Treatments are more apt to be effective before large numbers of grubs infest the lawn. If treatments are made later in the season, the grubs are harder to kill. Noticeable lawn damage may

need more water.

There are three insecticides that are registered for control of white grubs—trichlorfon (sold under the trade name of Dylax and Proxol), chlorpyrifus (sold under the trade name of Dorsban), and diazinon (trade names: Diazinon and Spectricide). Diazinon has given the most consistent satisfactory results in Kentucky tests.

Milky spore disease is effective only against the white grubs of Japanese beetles. The most prevalent white grub in Kentucky lawns are the grubs of masked chafers, even in areas where adult Japanese beetles are a problem. Entomologists warn that it is not worthwhile to use milky spore disease spores unless you are sure the grubs are Japanese beetle grubs.

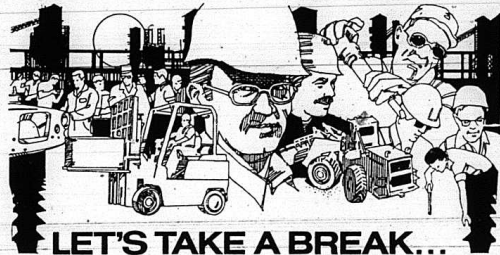

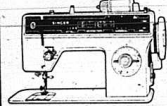

this is the first time this has ever happened to me on a major project. Only one bid, and it was advertised statewide in the Courier-Journal. I think you had better get your act together and come up with something. That's what you're paid to do. This council has spent many hours on this project. Yes indeed, we are disappointed.

Moore repeated: "We can't make them bid."

It was then decided to consult with the state, re-evaluate the project, and advertise for bids in Sunday's Courier-Journal. Bids would be opened in 30 days.

The much needed sewer project would increase sewage treatment at the plant from 200,000 gallons a day to 600,000 gallons a day, and upgrade the facilities.

Speculation by some of those attending the meeting was that the one bidder did not want the contract, but threw out that figure in case the council accepted it.

Most agreed, it is a busy time for contractors and many are at work with considerable capital tied up in the projects they have under construction. However, seven contractors had asked for plans and specifications.

The mayor remained optimistic after the meeting: "We may get several bids the next time," he said. "It will be 30 days later and some contractors may decide to bid and bid a lower figure. You never know."

He added, if the city needs more grant money, it is still possible the federal government could approve additional funding. "I believe they would," he concluded.

It was indeed a one-bid night for the council. There was only one bid to supply blacktop for street repairs in the city.

The bid was from Allen Company of Winchester at \$25.40 a ton for limestone surface.

The council was told the \$25.40 figure was \$4 less than last year. The council quickly voted to accept the bid, the only happy news the council heard during the entire meeting.

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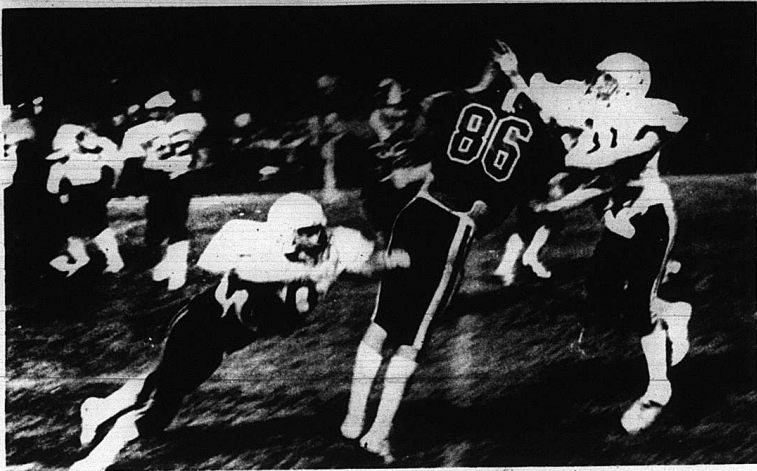

The backcourt? Richard Madison at "big" guard and Ed Davender running the show with experienced Roger Harden and James Blackmon in backup roles.

Future? "What a show. Perhaps a Final Four performance." If Eddie Sutton lands 6-10, Terry Mills from Michigan for next season, and if Rex Chapman chooses Kentucky, then I can foresee a scenario whereby Kenny Walker would go to the way of Kyle Macy.

By December 1986 UK fans would be saying "Kenny who?" Whatever. At this point it is no more than speculation. Just so many if's.

But Tito Horford could make it most interesting.

And, if all the pieces fall into place Coach Eddie Sutton could run for Pope as in Pope Eddie (Final IV).

UK football

To get a handle on the 1985 University of Kentucky football team the best place to begin is with an offensive lineman.

As injured sophomore running back Mark Higgs said last week, "I want to come back this year because our offensive line is supposed to be one of the best ever here."

Meet Ken Pietrowiak, a 6-2, 235-pound block of a fellow who will be Kentucky's center this autumn. A native of Grafton, Wis., he is team captain and a five year man who only last Friday was accepted to UK's graduate school, to work on his master's degree in business administration.

Full up a chair on some straight talk from UK's gray beard captain.

"Coach Claiborne's system

has put into us a sense of pride.

We have come to believe in ourselves and I think it's meant a major difference." Pietrowiak says.

The difference has been a turning point. A dream realized by every college football player who pulled on cleats, to play in a bowl game.

"The first year we went under Coach Claiborne in 1983 we weren't that good a football team," Pietrowiak said. "We just played together and we played hard. But last year we were a pretty good football team that got a lot of breaks and we ended up having a great season."

The future? "I think that coach Claiborne has just pushed us to where we are now. Our being picked eighth (in the SEC), we just don't seem to me as good as we are. If you finish that matters and we feel good about the season."

Kentucky is coming off a 9-3 season, national ranking, and a victory in the Hall of Fame Bowl. Moreover, it is program on the move up in college football and Pietrowiak recognizes it.

What about UK's OL Club, then?

"We lost Bob Shurtliff off our line, everybody else is back," Pietrowiak said. "I've been strong at tackle with Bruce Bozick (6-4, 276 Sr.), Vernon Johnson (6-4, 259 Sr.), Tom Richey (6-4, 262 Sr.), and Sammy Rotella (6-4, 259 Jr.) is coming along. At guard we've got Jimmy Reichwein (6-2, 256 Sr.), Brad Myers (6-2, 263 Sr.), Dermont Dawson (6-2, 254 So.) and Joe Prince (6-4, 271 Jr.)."

And Pietrowiak went on, "I feel like we've got the best quarterback in the Southeastern Conference behind us. If we can give Billy (Ransdell) time to do what he has to do, well. But that's the thing, giving him time."

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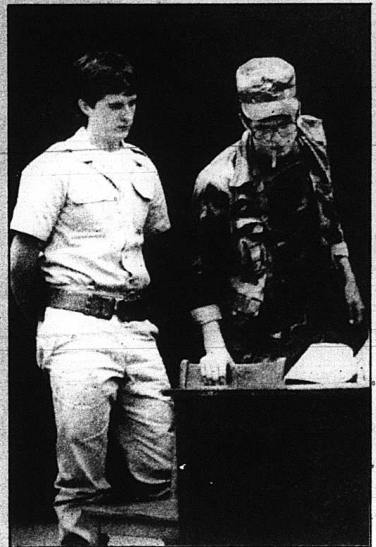

Social Security Administration is actively trying to collect debts owed to them by U.S. citizens

The Social Security Administration is actively engaged in a continuing effort to collect all debts owed it. Bob Anderson, Social Security manager in Richmond, said recently.

A debt to Social Security usually arises when a person receiving retirement, survivor, or disability benefits or supplemental security income (SSI) payments gets more money than is authorized by law.

These debts, or overpayments, generally are caused by the person's failure to report an event that has an effect on the amount of

the benefit that is due. These overpayments can amount to many thousands of dollars, Anderson said.

Social Security must take action to recover all overpayments. A person is first asked to repay the entire amount of the overpayment.

If this is not possible, arrangements can be made to make the repayment over a period of time; either by withholding a portion of the benefit check or by making monthly installments.

People can avoid overpayments if they promptly report any

happening that could affect the amount of money they are due.

For people who receive Social Security retirement, survivors, or disability benefits, there is a complete list of events to be reported in the "Rights and Responsibilities" booklet they received in the mail. For people who get SSI payments, there is a list of events to be reported in the booklet, "What You Have to Know About SSI," which they received.

Danny McKinney of Rt. 1, Brodhead has been selected as one of 15 young Kentucky farmers to receive a \$10,000 Agricultural Leadership Development Fellowship co-sponsored by the University of Kentucky and the Phillip Morris Tobacco Company.

The fellowship enables Danny to participate in a series of 11 three-day seminars at UK and other locations to study various aspects of the agricultural industry. He will also travel to Richmond, Va. and Washington, D.C. to meet with congressional delegations and to attend U.S. Department of Agriculture briefings on farm legislation, and he will take a two-week tour of another burley tobacco producing country.

UK reports that "this program is specifically tailored for individuals who desire to be on a cutting edge" of decisions to influence agriculture in the next decade and beyond. A comprehensive exposure to community, state, national and international issues will provide participants a broad

knowledge base from which to: 1) view agriculture in relationship to the rest of the economy; 2) analyze and make agricultural policy decisions; and 3) function as a better informed, more articulate and more valuable community and state leader.

Mt. Vernon, London and Annville. He is actively involved in many community organizations and events. He is president of the Wilderness Trail Area 4-H Council, a member of the Rockcastle County 4-H Council, Beef Cattle Association, Brodhead PTA and Rockcastle County Council for the Arts.
