Factory building sold to local improvement council

The bond issue is not to exceed \$1.1 million which includes

the loan on the present building and the modification; estimated at about \$250,000. There is no

about \$250,000. There is no obligation to the county. The building is owned by Kentucky Highlands Investment Corporation of London, which through a series of transfers, will divest itself of the building in order to receive the funding hange. Financing of the project will be through a bonding intermediary, probably a Louisville bank, and will result in a lower interest rate on the property and expansion costs.

costs.
It will also allow Rockcastle Manufacturing, a uniform manufacturer, to lower its lease payments from \$3.97 a square foot to

ments from \$3.97 a square foot to \$3.35 a square foot. To refinance the total project. Kentucky Highlands needed an alerter of credit to the bonding intermediary, and that organization is Rockesstle Improvement Council.

Medicaid changes explained...

Dear Editor

In the past few weeks the Medicaid program reduction for nursing homes in the state has been the center of attention. Many, nursing home residents are fearful now of losing their bed, or not being cared for properly.

I would like to point out several facts to your readers that they may not be aware of but may relieve some fears.

I. At this time 41% of the Medicaid budget is being used by 4% of the Medicaid population. This being paid to the nursing home industry.

home industry.

2. The resident on Medicaid only receives \$25 per month to purchase clothing, shoes, cigarettes, and other personal articles. Nursing homes were allowed to charge for laundry for the resident

on top of what they were paid-by the state. Nursing homes charged \$6 to \$15 per month and what was left was all the resident had to purchase clothing, etc., As or Jouy, the residents are not allowed to be charged for this service.

3. There are standards for the operation and services for nursing homes in Kentucky. There are minimum standards which must be met to assure the quality of care for the residents. Failure to comply with these regulations may bring substantial fines.

4. There is in the state of Kentucky an Adult Protective Services Act. which makes it against the law to abuse or neglect by means of physical pain, injury,

by means of physical pain, injury, or mental injury. The caretaker who willfully does this may be charged with a felony or a

charged with a felony or a misdemeanor.

5. Also the nursing home resideat has minimum rights in the nursing home. They may not be discharged except for medical reasons, his own welfare, or that of other residents, or for non-payment, in certain conditions. A nursing home that accepts the state Medicaid program may not charge over the payments that the state makes.

If a nursing home resident is

If a nursing home resident is not receiving proper care or is being abused or neglected either physically or mentally, please call and report the program to the proper authorities. There are several agersies to report suspected problems.

3. TRUTH IS ETERNAL.



WHAT TO DO WITH EGGPLANT EAT IT--OF COURSE!

Although eggplant is found and eaten all around the world, there are many people here in Kentucky who have never tasted it

and don't know how to prepare it. Calorie counters should find it particularly attractive. Eggplant is low in calories, unless you fry it, and it can be prepared in

iow in catories, unless you try it.

and it can be prepared in numerous ways.

On the other hand, it isn't particularly nutritious either, having just one percent protein, three percent carbohydrate and no fat. It is mostly water, but it does have a fair amount of potassium.

Eggplant is a member of the potato family. It is a large, heavy-egetable that is usually pear-shaped and dark purple.

In the market eggplants should be firm with a clear satiny purple color. They should not be bought by size or weight because larger ones have more seeds. The yaging tender plants have a better flavor. Cutting an eggplant in half or in slices and soaking it in water

for an hour before cooking will reduce the bitterness present in

Eggplant can be served as a cold account or used as a vegetable accompaniment to almost any

CORNBREAD EGGPLANT CASSEROLE

1 to 2 eggplants (about 4 pounds) 1 large onion, peeled and chopped-2 tablespoons margarine 1 to 1½ cups crumbled cornbread 1 can (2 oz.) chopped pimento, well drained

3 eggs, beaten

Peel and chop eggplants. Cook in just enough boiling water to cover until very soft. Drain well, Place in a bowl and mash until Place in a bowl and mash until smooth-Saute onion in margarine until soft. Add to eggplant along with remaining ingredients. Blend well- and pour mixture into a greased one-quart casserole dish. Bake in a preheated 350 degree oven until firm (about 30 minutes).




