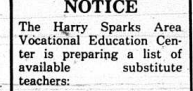

Factory building sold to local improvement council

The Rockcastle Improvement Council will soon own a new building, at least on paper.

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court approved issuance of composite industrial revenue bonds through the Rockcastle Improvement Council to "acquire and modify the existing Rockcastle Manufacturing Co. building" at a meeting of the court Tuesday.

The bond issue is not to exceed \$1.1 million which includes the loan on the present building and the modification, estimated at about \$250,000. There is no obligation to the county.

The building is owned by Kentucky Highlands Investment Corporation of London, which through a series of transfers, will divest itself of the building in order to receive the funding change.

Financing of the project will be through a bonding intermediary, probably a Louisville bank, and will result in a lower interest rate on the property and expansion costs.

It will also allow Rockcastle Manufacturing a uniform manufacturer, to lower its lease payments from \$3.97 a square foot to \$3.35 a square foot.

To refinance the total project, Kentucky Highlands needed an agent that could legally issue a letter of credit to the bonding intermediary, and that organization is Rockcastle Improvement Council.

The court was told by Roy Moncrief, president of Kentucky Highlands, the new financial arrangement will allow expansion at the factory, and in turn, add new jobs and give more security to present employees.

During the meeting, an unhappy Tom Denny made a motion, seconded by Donald Rowe, to

Marijuana confiscated

Somebody is unhappy because their fall crop has been harvested early and the price they got for their product was quite a bit lower than they had hoped for.

The Rockcastle County sheriff's department and State Police Detective Ernie Boggs destroyed a total of 77 marijuana plants last Wednesday which they found in the Chestnut Ridge area of Rockcastle County.

According to Sheriff William Taylor, the plants were found in

repair several roads in his district. Joe Clark, the only other magistrate attending, abstained.

Denny also made a motion to eliminate \$800 for "bolts" from the monthly bills, but the motion died from a lack of a second. Judge Jasper said the bill included more than bolts. It is for various tools and other products

1985 school budget in excess of \$5 million

School business is big business, at least in Rockcastle County.

Tuesday night during the local board's regular monthly meeting, board members approved the 1985-86 budget, which will exceed \$5 million.

Of the \$5 million, approximately \$4 million will be paid out in salaries for school personnel. This figure does not include the salaries paid to bus drivers, custodians, cooks, secretaries and maintenance personnel.

Although by far the biggest

generator of income in Rockcastle County, the \$5 million spent on education does not even compare to the \$88 million budget in Fayette County.

If all goes well, the local board expects to have a balance in their bank account of almost \$290,000, a figure School Superintendent Charles B. Parsons says has been lower each year for the past several years.

One other note of public interest is the fact that the local school district expects to receive \$55,000 in interest from money invested

Brodhead firemen take on job of building fire station

After several stops and starts, there is going to be a new fire department building at Brodhead.

Approval to go ahead and build the building to house the city's three fire trucks and a county truck to be delivered soon, was made at a meeting of the Brodhead City Council Tuesday night.

The members of the fire department, and friends will do all the work on the building, using materials and services contributed from other sources. Most of the materials and equipment have already been pledged. Fire Chief Brian Bussell told the council.

The council agreed to help in any way it could, since the city will own the building, but left it up to

the fire department to raise most of the money to offset the cost. The council agreed to maintain the building and pay for utilities when it is occupied.

Expected to cost about \$18,000, the money will be raised by the fire department membership, hopefully through contributions from the public. Some may come from the city council.

The building will be two stories with 2,000 square feet on each floor, and located on the city owned lot adjacent to the present fire department city hall building.

The first floor will house the fire trucks and equipment. The second floor, which will remain unfinished for the time being, will have a large meeting room, rest rooms and storage rooms. There is

Livingston homecoming is successful

Hundreds of folks came home to the homecoming held Friday through Sunday at Livingston, and apparently they were glad they did.

It was a time for making new acquaintances and reuniting with old friends. It was also a time for fun and frolic.

There was a parade with floats, pretty girls, fire trucks, clowns, soldiers, horses and vintage autos, to name a few that were on hand to participate.

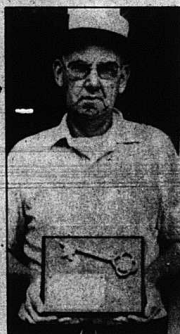
There were also serious moments as those present reflected on the past and spoke with optimism for the future.

More than 1,500 persons, give or take a few, gathered along the parade route through the downtown area Saturday morning under a misty sky, applauding and whistling as about 30 units marched along led by an Army color guard from Fort Knox followed by the Scouts.

For a time during the three days, it appeared rain might dampen the homecoming. On Friday night a rainstorm passed the area sending those outside scurrying into Livingston Elementary School where they promptly forgot the weather listening to gospel singing.

During Saturday's serious moments, State Rep. Danny Ford, R-Mt. Vernon, told those gathered he was there to honor and remember Pfc. David Monroe Smith, the county's only Congressional Medal of Honor recipient who died 35 years ago Sunday in Korea, and reminding them that Pfc. Smith "sacrificed his life for the lives of others."

"David Smith's act of gallantry and bravery, far beyond the call of duty, cost him his life," Rep. Ford stated. "His actions were symbolic. I feel, of one of the traits that has made this country such a great nation—the willingness to act when we know we must; to do

City council purchases new backhoe

One piece of maintenance equipment was purchased by the Mt. Vernon City Council at a special meeting last Thursday, but bidding on a second piece was postponed.

The city purchased a John Deere backhoe from Bullock Sales and Service, London, for \$22,700, then added \$750 for an extended two-year warranty.

The total price was \$31,950. The city traded its old backhoe and received trade-in value of \$8,500.

Of the four bids, second highest was \$23,600 for a Massey Ferguson backhoe from Siler

Equipment of Williamsburg.

The bids were all for comparable equipment based on a Case backhoe \$80 E.

The council was expected to receive bids on a new street sweeper, but postponed the bid for 90 days at the suggestion of Mayor Roland Mullins who said the council should get the thoughts of city residents before purchasing the sweeper.

Mayor Mullins reported a second sewer project, to furnish sewer service to areas on Fairground Hill, part of Owens Subdivision and Cox Lane, should

be bid in about 30 days "hopefully."

The total project was initially estimated at \$750,000. Considerable work has been done and paid for, including installation of bathrooms. Remaining is the installation of lines estimated at between \$300,000 and \$400,000 that will complete the project.

Another part of the total sewer project, to upgrade and add to the city sewer plant, remains to be bid a second time. An earlier bid on the project, estimated at

Medicaid changes explained...

Dear Editor:

In the past few weeks the Medicaid program reduction for nursing homes in the state has been the center of attention. Many nursing home residents are fearful of losing their bed, or not being cared for properly.

I would like to point out several facts to our readers that they may not be aware of but may relieve some fears.

1. At this time 41% of the Medicaid budget is being used by 4% of the Medicaid population. This being paid to the nursing home industry.
2. The resident on Medicaid only receives \$25 per month to purchase clothing, shoes, cigarettes, and other personal articles. Nursing homes were allowed to charge for laundry for the resident

on top of what they were paid-by the state. Nursing homes charged \$5 to \$15 per month and what was left was all the resident had to purchase clothing, etc. as or any the residents are not allowed to be charged for this service.

3. There are standards for the operation of services for nursing homes in Kentucky. There are minimum standards which must be met to assure the quality of care for the residents. Failure to comply with these regulations may bring substantial fines.

4. There is in the state of Kentucky an Adult Protective Services Act, which makes it against the law to abuse or neglect by means of physical pain, injury, or mental injury. The caretaker who willfully does this may be charged with a felony or a misdemeanor.

5. Also the nursing home resident has minimum rights in the nursing home. They may not be discharged except for mental reasons, his will, or that of other residents, or for non-payment, in certain conditions. A nursing home that accepts the state Medicaid program may not charge over the payments that the state makes.

If a nursing home resident is not receiving proper care or is being abused or neglected either physically or mentally, please call and report the program to the proper authorities. There are several agencies to report suspected problems.

What is Truth?

In John 18:38, when Pilate was interrogating Jesus, he asked, "What is truth?" No question is of greater magnitude than this because our eternal destiny is contingent upon the precise answer and application of truth (Eph. 1:13). A fatal error is evident—Pilate didn't wait for an answer! Christ could have readily supplied the answer by saying, "I am the way, the truth, and the life" (John 14:6), and "ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free" (John 8:32).

"What is truth?" The Bible supplies the full answer, and reveals the characteristics of a true life. Consider:

1. TRUTH IS CONSISTENT. There are no contradictions in truth. Men have written books about what they think to exist because men either lack total comprehension or are dishonest. Rightly divided, every verse in the Bible harmonizes perfectly (2 Tim. 2:15). When differences arise in religion, one or both parties are in error. Error is inconsistent; truth is consistent.
2. TRUTH IS NARROW. Every kind of truth is narrow. Mathematically, two plus two equals exactly four. Error is broad; many combinations of numbers do not equal four. Scientifically water freezes at 32 degrees F and boils at 212 degrees F. All sincerity will not broaden this narrow truth. Religious truth is an exception. "Narrow is the way which leadeth unto life, and few there be that find it" (Matt. 7:13-14). A puzzling question is why this narrowness is recognized in all areas except religion. We are fooling ourselves if we think this changes the truth.

3. TRUTH IS ETERNAL. Truth never evolves into error and then is relegated into oblivion. However, error can be recognized and changed—to truth. For example, man previously thought the earth was flat, but we now know better and accept the truth that it is round. Religious truth never changes because "the word of the Lord endureth forever" (1 Pet. 1:25). The law has changed from Moses to Christ, but truth remains immutable (Col. 2:14). Human efforts are futile in attempts to alter or negate truth. Since truth is immutable, and men of the first century walked in truth (3 John 3:4), divergent practices are in error.

4. THERE IS NO SUBSTITUTE FOR TRUTH. Nothing else is just as good as truth—nothing else ever comes close! (See John 8:32; Acts 20:32; John 1:17; 1 Pet. 1:22). Therefore, "Buy the truth and sell it not" (Prov. 23:23).

Our obligation to truth is: (1) To know it (John 8:32); (2) believe it (2 Thess. 2:12); (3) love it (2 Thess. 2:10); (4) obey it (Matt. 7:21-23; Mk. 16:16); (5) preach it (2 Tim. 2:2); (6) defend it (Jude 3; Phil. 1:17).

Pilate's question, "What is truth?" is answered. Now we ask YOU a question...WHAT ARE YOU GOING TO DO WITH THE TRUTH?

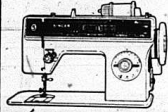

WHAT TO DO WITH EGGPLANT EAT IT-OF COURSE!

Although eggplant is found and eaten all around the world, there are many people here in Kentucky who have never tasted it and don't know how to prepare it.

Calorie counters should find it particularly attractive. Eggplant is low in calories, unless you fry it, and it can be prepared in numerous ways.

On the other hand, it isn't particularly nutritious either, having just one percent protein, three percent carbohydrate and no fat. It is mostly water, but it does have a fair amount of potassium.

Eggplant is a member of the potato family. It is a large, heavy vegetable that is usually pear-shaped and dark purple.

In the market eggplants should be firm with a clear satiny purple color. They should not be bought by size or weight because larger ones have more seeds. The young tender plants have a better flavor. Cutting an eggplant in half or in slices and soaking it in water.

for an hour before cooking will reduce the bitterness present in some.

Eggplant can be served as a cold salad, stuffed as a casserole or used as a vegetable accompaniment to almost any meal.

CORN BREAD EGGPLANT CASSEROLE

- 1 to 2 eggplants (about 4 pounds)
- 1 large onion, peeled and chopped
- 2 tablespoons margarine
- 1 to 1 1/2 cups crumbled cornbread
- 1 can (2 oz.) chopped pimento, well drained
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Peel and chop eggplants. Cook in just enough boiling water to cover until very soft. Drain well. Place in a bowl and mash until smooth. Saute onion in margarine until soft. Add to eggplant along with remaining ingredients. Blend well and pour mixture into a greased one-quart casserole dish. Bake in a preheated 350 degree oven until firm (about 30 minutes). Serves 6 to 8.



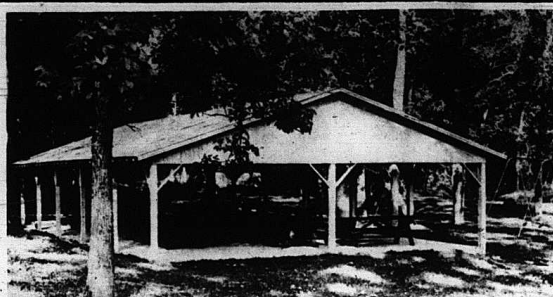

A NEW YEAR IN 4-H
