Claiborne attends game

Rockets lose to powerful Clay County 40-6, Friday

The Rockcastle County Rockets fell to 1 and 2 last Friday night when they were trounced by the visiting Clay County Tigers 40-6.

Clay County, who upped their record to 3 and 0, were just too much for the Rockets. They had too many players, too much size and too good a quarterback.

In fact, their quarterback, Shawn Pennington, a senior, is so good that Kentucky Coach Jerry Claiborne made a trip to our fair county Friday night to take a look at Pennington.

When asked if that was the only reason Claiborne was making the unusual trip to Rockcastle, the coach said, "That is the main reason I'm here."

The UK leader got his eye full as Pennington, picked as one of the premiere quarterbacks in the state, picked apart the Rockets' secondary like a well-oiled machine. The 6'3" signal caller for the Tigers threw for nearly 200 yards on the night. If Tiger receivers missed a pass, it was their own fault 99.9 percent of the time.

Clay County was not only

featuring a strong offense--their defense was well-tuned also. The strongest defense the Rockets have faced all year, Clay County gave but few first downs, much less allowing touchdowns.

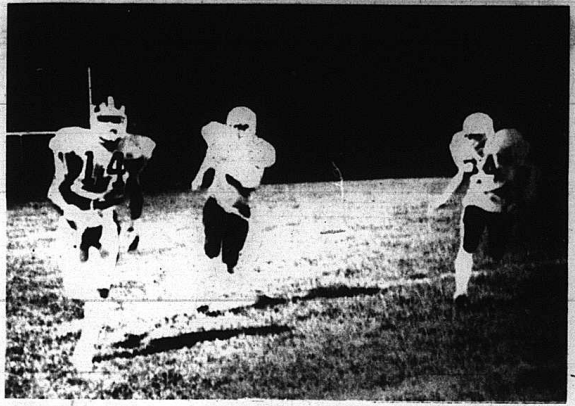
The Rockets' 19-man roster, not including freshmen, just could not match up to Clay County, who

started all but four seniors on both defense and offense.

Rockcastle's only score came in the third quarter when sophomore quarterback Chris Larkey took the ball in the end zone from the one-yard line.

Campgrounds will remain open beyond regular closing date

Two large campgrounds on the Daniel Boone National Forest will remain open beyond the regular closing date to permit campers to enjoy the ideal weather which usually occurs in October and to observe the changing colors in tree leaves.

The Holly Bay campground, on Laurel River Lake on the London Ranger District, will be operated from Sept. 9 to Oct. 13 by the owners of the Holly Bay marina which is adjacent to it. They have volunteered to take care of clean-up and maintenance work

in the campground. The Forest Service will provide a volunteer campground host to provide assistance to visitors to the campground. The Volunteers in the National Forests Act passed by Congress in 1982 permits individuals to serve as volunteers without compensation. Starting Sept. 9, the Forest Service will reduce user fees and the campground will operate on a self-pay basis under which campers register, put the fee in an envelope, and deposit it in a container at the campground's

entrance station. These rates will apply:

\$6.00, single family unit with electricity and water hookups; \$10, double family unit with electricity and water hookups; \$3, single family unit--tent only, no electric or water hookups; \$5, double family unit--tent only, no electric or water hookups.

The number of camping loops to be opened will depend on the number of users.

Dove season opens

The dove season in Kentucky opened with an increase in the number of birds harvested as compared to 1984, according to information received from Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources regional law enforcement supervisors in an informal telephone survey.

Over Labor Day weekend, Sept. 1-2, conservation officers checked 5,248 hunters in 79 of Kentucky's 120 counties, who had bagged a total of 21,983 doves. Four hundred fifty seven hunters checked by conservation officers had bagged their daily limit of 12 doves. The informal telephone survey is conducted annually as a means of subjectively comparing hunter success on opening weekend and estimating the availability of birds.

The number of doves harvested per hunter during the opening weekend of the 1985 season (4.18) was higher than the three year average of 3.61 doves per hunter, and considerably more than the 1984 success ratio of 2.90 doves per hunter. During three days of hunting on the opening weekend of the 1984 season, the 4,764 hunters checked had harvested 14,146 doves. In 1983, 5,587 opening weekend hunters bagged 21,079 doves (667 limits checked) for a hunters success ratio of 3.77.

An increase in the number of birds available in 1985 was noted in the first, third, fourth, and sixth law enforcement districts. A slight decrease was noted in the second district, with the fifth, eighth, and ninth districts reporting population levels that were unchanged

from last year.

In the first district of far western Kentucky, an above average harvest was reported on opening day at the Ballard County Wildlife Management Area where 527 hunters took 4,165 doves. A total of 78 limits were checked and the hunter success ratio was 7.90 birds per hunter. Public hunting at Ballard continues through Oct. 14.

Statewide, dove season continues through Oct. 31; the second

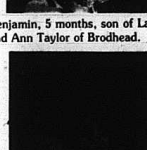

The bag limit is 12 doves per day. After two or more days of shooting, a possession limit of 24 doves applies to the transportation of game. A possession limit does not allow a double bag limit in the field.

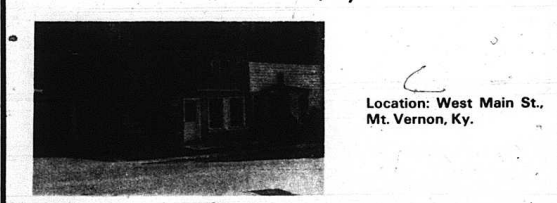

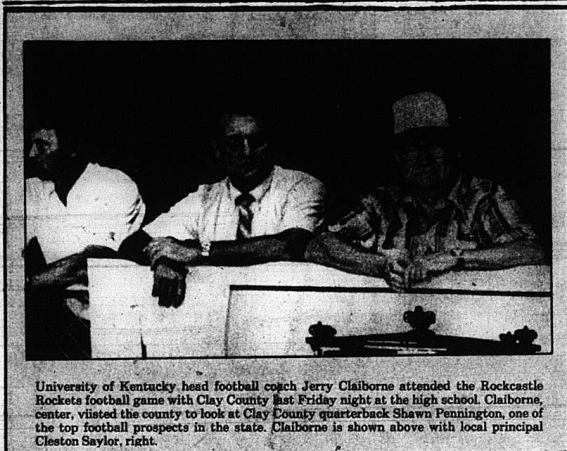

State Supreme Court upholds lower court ruling in Taylor case

The Kentucky Supreme Court has upheld a Rockcastle Circuit Court decision in a recent murder case.

John Harvey Taylor, who was found guilty of murder in Rockcastle County in March 1984, did not get his case overturned by the Supreme Court when they heard the case on Sept. 5.

Taylor was convicted of the murder of Bentley Furman on Aug. 10, 1985 at Taylor's home on Gaultley Branch.

A Rockcastle jury recommended a life sentence for Taylor and Rockcastle Circuit Judge Dan Venters followed that recommendation on April 11, 1985 when he sentenced Taylor.

In the opinion handed down by the Supreme Court and Chief Justice Robert F. Stephens, Taylor is guilty because . . .

"Bentley Furman was shot six times at a range of 18 inches to two feet while sitting on a couch in the living room of Taylor's home on August 10, 1983.

Ambulance attendants summoned to the scene within minutes after the shooting found Furman dead and Taylor sitting nearby, holding a .25 caliber pistol from which the shots had been fired.

Taylor told the attendants that he had killed Furman and offered three or four reasons for the shooting, including marijuana, money and the fact that Furman had patted Taylor's wife.

According to the opinion, Taylor told both the law enforcement officers who first arrived at the scene and the Kentucky State Police detective who transported him to jail that he had killed Furman after Furman had made offensive remarks and gestures when his wife walked into the living room.

Taylor stated to the witnesses that he had been sitting next to Furman on the couch when he picked up the pistol from the coffee table and emptied six shots into Furman's head and body.

Both men had been drinking for several hours.

According to the opinion, Taylor, during his trial, testified that Furman had insulted his wife and had struck him a hard blow to the ear.

Taylor testified that he then reached for the pistol and had no

memory of any event after that time.

He attributed the murder loss to the blow on the ear.

In upholding the lower court ruling, the Supreme Court said the proof that Taylor acted intentional.

General election nears

Closer and closer, someone noticed this week, meaning the Nov. 5 general election is not all that far away.

In fact, drawing for position on the November ballot will be held at 2 p.m. Friday in the office of Rockcastle County Clerk Irene Bales.

If a candidate is unable to attend and draw, he can send someone to do it for him. Mrs. Bales said.

Counting those who are unopposed in the mayor's races, there are 32 candidates. Most of the candidates are on the Mt. Vernon city ballot where there are two mayoral candidates and nine council candidates seeking six seats.

At Livingston, there is not a full slate. Only three candidates announced for the four council seats. That vacant seat could be filled in a write-in vote in November, or through appointment.

Had curfew for 30 years

Livingston changes curfew from midnight to 10 p.m.

"Loafers" in Livingston will have to go home earlier beginning Friday.

The city wants them off the street by 10 p.m.

The Livingston City Council has voted to change its 30-year-old curfew ordinance from midnight to 10 p.m., and has directed policeman Charles Lovell to enforce it.

The council changed the time from midnight to 10 p.m. because of increased vandalism in the city. On Sept. 4, someone opened a fire hydrant and "just about" drained the city's 72,000-gallon storage tank, according to Mayor Billy Medley.

"We thought this was pretty bad," the mayor said. "If there had been a fire, we would not have had enough water to fight it. We just can't have that."

Bro. Medley also reported in recent weeks "the boys" have been ganging up on the main street late at night. Windows in Livingston Elementary School were broken. There were beer cans and trash littering the street, loud talking and boisterous activity.

"It's one or two who do these things and spill it for everyone," Scott D. McQueen, 21, of Rt. 3, Mt. Vernon, was indicted for murder following the shooting death of his father-in-law on Aug. 3.

Grand Jury indicts two

The most recent session of the Rockcastle county Grand Jury has resulted in the indictment of two local men.

McQueen, who originally was jailed under \$100,000 cash bond, is presently free on bond after his attorney, William D. Gregory, filed a motion to have his bond reduced. He has filed a \$20,000 property bond and is awaiting a Sept. 13 arraignment in Circuit Court before Circuit Judge Dan Venters.

McQueen is accused of killing Harold Ballard, 43, of Rt. 3, Berea, during a domestic dispute at McQueen's home in the Copper Creek section of Rockcastle County.

An indictment for theft by unlawful taking was also handed down against a Broodhead man.

Timmy York, 20, of Castle Village Apartments in Broodhead, was indicted for allegedly stealing a 1975 Gremlin which belonged to Karen Cash Vafamand, also of Broodhead.

York, who was convicted of a Jan. 17, 1985 break-in at the Dan-Delta in Broodhead, is presently free on a \$5,000 bond awaiting an arraignment hearing on Sept. 13 in Circuit Court.

York was also indicted for being a second degree persistent felony offender. If found guilty of the theft by unlawful taking charge, the imposed sentence would be doubled.

Initially, the ordinance set the time at an early 9 p.m. It also set the age to be off the street at 18 years old, and it had a misdemeanor penalty of not less than \$10 and more than \$25, or confined to the city jail (no longer operated) no less than two days and no more than 15, or both, for each offense.

City Clerk Charlene Cole said as far as she knew, during the time the curfew was enforced, anyone who was told to get off the street after the curfew hour usually did. "The ordinance has apparently helped in the past," Mrs. Cole said. "This council is not trying to stop people who have a reason to be on the streets, who live along the street, or are coming home from a ballgame, church, and work. It's the loafers that have been causing the trouble and that's why the council decided to change the time again." The mayor agreed.

The mayor said "the boys" were on good behavior for awhile, and the city policeman Lovell had very little trouble. Then it started with broken windows at the school.

The mayor, who has been in office less than a year and was appointed when Mayor Bobby Wilson resigned, said as far as he

Ordinance bans relatives from city employment

An ordinance that prohibits close, blood relatives from employment by the city had a first reading at a meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night.

It is the first nepotism ordinance ever passed by the city, and very few other cities for that matter.

Mayor Roland Mullins called the ordinance a milestone and it is something the city has been needing for a long time.

"I recommended the ordinance because I felt it would result in better city government in general," the mayor stated.

The ordinance sets the relationship for employment of family members no closer than first cousins and includes husband and wife, and any other close relatives that could "suggest an impropriety."

Although the council did not aim the ordinance at any one department, since it applies to all including relatives of the mayor and councilmen, the most likely department that would feel the effect would be police.

The nepotism idea first surfaced officially several weeks ago when a Police Commission was appointed by the council to study various ways to upgrade hiring practices and to get other ideas on ways to improve the city.

know there had been no complaints from city residents, about the curfew. He noted there was one complaint from a "young fellow" but he couldn't remember any others.

He said he did not recall anyone ever threatening to take the curfew ordinance to court to test its constitutionality.

"I would have thought when it was passed back then, the council's attorney would have checked with the Kentucky Attorney General to see if it was constitutional. I wasn't here at the time."

Livingston is not the only city to bring up the curfew again. At Mt. Vernon, a City Police Commission recently suggested a curfew, but to date no action has been taken on the question. However, it has received considerable statewide media attention.

On at least two occasions a curfew has been discussed by the Mt. Vernon council. On July 18, 1972, the council voted the Kentucky Attorney General asking for a ruling on the legality of a curfew ordinance. But subsequent minutes of council meetings do not show that there was a response from the attorney general.

In the 1950's, the council toyed with the idea of a curfew, but about 30 angry boys came to city hall during a council meeting and rocked the front of the building. The curfew was not enacted as far as can be found in council records.

The curfew at Mt. Vernon will likely come up again, but just when has not been indicated. It is but one of several suggestions for city "improvement" made by the Police Commission.

Commission. After all the points are studied and discussed by the council during the next one or two meetings, the council will choose those it wants to put into effect and discard the others.

It was also announced at the meeting that a public hearing will be held on an application for an Economic Development Grant to continue the renovation at the city water plant and add facilities. The meeting will be held at 7 p.m. Sept. 23 at the city hall.

Estimated to cost about \$168,000, the project includes a possible 800,000-gallon storage tank that would increase the city's water storage capacity to 1,700,000 gallons. The city currently has storage for 900,000 gallons.

The project is another of several items in the city's five year water plan, part of which has already been completed.

The council set the 1986 motor vehicle tax rate at 15.5 cents per \$100 property valuation. The rate is the same as 1985.

The council also gave second reading to an ordinance prohibiting swimming and wading in Lake Linville. There is a \$50 fine included in the ordinance.

Approved by the council was a request by Ore York to pay her water bill on a yearly basis since her bill is always the minimum amount.

The council agreed, and directed that a record be kept monthly. If any money is owed at the end of the year, Mrs. York is to be billed for the amount.

Community meetings a major success

Congressman Hal Rogers

When the Founding Fathers put together our government over 200 years ago, they were careful to call members of Congress "representatives." Representatives are supposed to serve their constituents by being a mirror of those citizens' thoughts and concerns on important legislative issues. It is a word carefully chosen by those who drafted our Constitution, and it is an obligation I take very seriously.

That is why again this past few weeks, I held my annual Community Meetings tour of the Fifth District. In nine days, I held meetings in every one of the 27 counties in my district. The turnouts were large and enthusiastic, and here are some of the things we discussed most often:

TRADE CONCERNS: Far and away, the biggest issue raised was the concern about our mounting trade deficit with other nations. The imbalance in our trade this year is running at an all-time high, and could reach \$175 billion this year.

This trade deficit is like watching yourself bleed to death. We have seen the impacts of this deficit in our state, with plant lay-offs and the huge increase in imported tobacco which has helped cause so many problems for our tobacco program. Now, we are seeing a potential threat from imported coal.

It is obvious that Congress has its work cut out for it in dealing with trade problems. Part of our problem is the high value of the U.S. dollar, which can only be solved by cutting our federal

spending deficit. But we must also deal with unfair trade practices by other nations, particularly those who subsidize their exports to the U.S. We also need to increase our industrial competitiveness and get our own house in order. It is apparent that trade issues are a major concern for the Fifth District, and I will continue to work to try and solve them.

IMMIGRATION: At many of the meetings, concerns were ex-

pressed about the growing problem of illegal immigrants. I agree it is a major problem, and I will be looking again at several bills now before the Congress which can hopefully deal with the problem. In particular, I favor legislation which would penalize employers who hire illegal aliens. If we deny jobs to these people, the incentive is reduced to enter our country illegally.

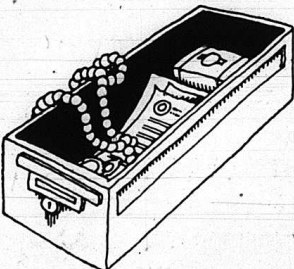

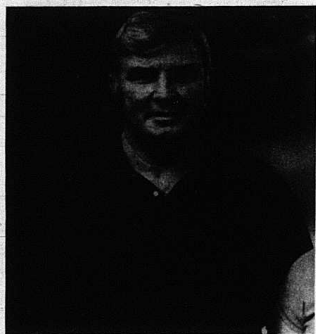

RICE IN FAMILY MEALS

Rice, like other cereals, is a good source of food energy and can be used in all family meals—breakfast, lunch, and dinner. White rice contains a small amount of good quality protein, and some minerals and vitamins. When white rice is used, it should be served with foods that supply the nutritive value rice lacks.

With eggs, meat, fish, poultry, milk, or cheese to supply good quality proteins and vitamins and minerals.

With vegetables, especially green and yellow kinds, to provide vitamins and minerals.

With fruit—fresh, frozen, or dried, raw or cooked—for vitamins and minerals.

The following cooking instructions and recipes from the Human Nutrition Research Division of the Agricultural Research Service show the variety of ways in which rice can be cooked and used in family meals.

Baked Rice & Cheese

3 cups cooked rice
2 cups shredded cheese

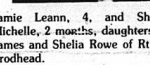

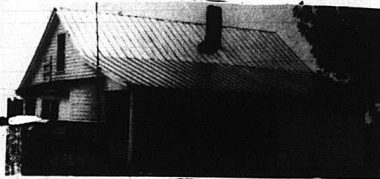

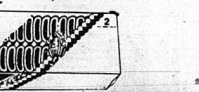

I also spoke about and encouraged the expansion of agriculture diversity. With our farm income down, we need to expand the kinds of crops we grow along with tobacco, so that we can increase income. The marketing study which I secured funds will enable USDA and the University of Kentucky to help in increasing our agricultural diversification.

The beauty of our democracy is that it is truly a government of the people, by the people and for the people. I pledge to continue to hold these meetings every year and to solicit your thoughts and suggestions throughout the year. To the hundreds of you who attended our meetings and gave me your very candid opinions about the issues, I say a special thank you.

Being your "representative" is a great honor, but is also a great responsibility.

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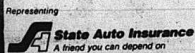

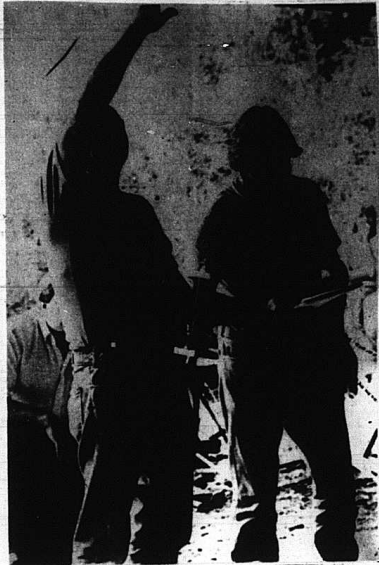

Cardinal basketball officials chortled happily throughout the summer as Louisville's summer basketball leagues helped not only season its talented players, but also got more exposure for UofL's program from the media. Fans in Jefferson County were excited.

Why not a summer league in Lexington?

A UK assistant coach bristled at the idea saying he would not run it and besides, "one of our good players might get hurt."

Now WHAS has sent a message that its future will be with UofL.

What's happening here is reflective, it seems to me, of how influential Louisville football coach Howard Schnellenberger is with big money movers and shakers in Jefferson County where, apparently most of the active movers and shakers are these days.

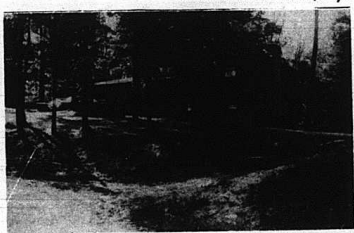
