John Harvey Taylor, who was found guilty of murder in Rockcas-tic County in March 1984, did not get his case overturned by the Supreme Court when they heard the case on Sept. 5. Taylor was convicted of the murder of Bentley Furman on Aug. 10, 1983 at Taylor's home on Gauley Branch. A Rockcastle jury recom-mended a life sentence for Taylor and Rockcastle Circuit Judge Dan Venters followed that recom-

is guilty because "Bentley Furman was shot six times at a range of 18 inches to two feet while sitting on a couch in the living room of Taylor's home on August 10, 1983. Ambulance attendants sum-moned to the scene within minutes after the shooting found Furman dead and Taylor sitting nearby, holding a. 25 calibre pistol from which the shots had been fired. Taylor told the attendants that he had killed Furman and offered three or four reasons for the shooting, including margluana, money and the fact that Furman had patted Taylor's wife. According to the opinion, Taylor told both the law enforce

Taylor told both the law enforce-ment officers who first arrived at the scene and later be Kentucky State Police defective who trans-ported him to jall that hebad killed Furman after Furman had made offensive transks and gestures when his wife walked into the butter result.

Taylor stated to the witnesses that he had been sitting next to Furman on the couch when ba-picked up the pistol from the coffee table and emptied six shots into Furman's had and body. Both men had been drinking for several hours. According to the opinion, Taylor, during his trial, testified that Furman had insulted his wife and had struck him a hard blow to the ser. Taylor testified that he then

Ordinance bans relatives from city employment

An ordinance that prohibits -close, blood relatives from em-ployment by the city had a first reading at a meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday nigh

It is the first nepotism ordi-nance ever passed by the city, and very few other cities for that

very lew other cities for finat matter. Mayor Roland Mullins called the ordinance amlestone and it is something the city has been needing for along time. "I recommended the ord-nance because flet it would result in better city government in general," the mayor stated. The ordinance set the rela-tionship for employment of family members no closer, than first cousins and includes husband and wife, and any other close relatives that could "suggest an impropri-ety." ety.

Although the council did not Although the council did not aim the ordinapce at any one department, since it applies to all including relatives of the mayor and councilmen, the most likely department that would feel the effect would be police. The nepotism idea first sur-faced officially several weeks ago when a Police Commission-was appointed by the council to study various ways to upgrade hiring practices and to get other ideas on ways to improve the city.

Prior to approving the ordi-nance unanimously, the council went over several other points that were brought up by the Police

about ides a Estimated to cost about \$168.000, the project includes a possible 800.000 gallon storage tank that would increase the city's water storage capacity to 1,700.000 gallons. The city cur-rently, has storage for 900.000 callons

rently, has storage for 900.000 galloris. The project is another of several steps in the city's five year water plan, part of which has already been completed. The council set the 1996 motor vehicle tax rate at 16.5 cents per \$100 roperty valuation. The rate is the same as 1985. The council also gave second reading to an ordinance prohibit-ing swimming and wading in Lake Linville. There is a \$50 fine included in the ordinance. Approved by the council was a request by Oxa York to pay her water bill on a yearly basis since ber bill is always the minimum amount.

For Louisville it is one more victory and enroad onto UK's traditional turf. And it is leaving UK officialdom and fans frustrated

Two years ago UofL got legislative approval for a basket-ball series with Kentucky over the objections of director of athletics Cliff Hagan and then coach Joe B. Hall who said, "we have nothing to win; everything to lose." From UK's perspective, Ha-
