State says Rockcastle had 350 accidents last year

Total traffic accidents in 1984 took a slight jump in Rockcastle County over 1983, but the number killed was down, according to a traffic accident report from the Kentucky State Police.

In 1984, in Rockcastle, there was a total of 350 traffic accidents compared to 327 in 1983. Broken down, there were 4 fatal accidents in which 4 were killed. There were 140 injured in 83 non-fatal accidents.

In 1983, there was a total of 5 fatal accidents in which 7 were killed. There were 132 injured in 78 non-fatal accidents.

In 1984 in Rockcastle, there were 263 property damage accidents compared to 244 in 1983.

In surrounding counties, total accidents were up in all counties except Garrard which had 317 in 1983 and 257 in 1984.

In the other counties, Laurel had a total of 1,291 accidents in 1983 and 1,403 in 1984. Lincoln had 395 in 1983 and 410 in 1984. Madison had 2,447 in 1983 and 2,551 in 1984. Pulaski had 1,403 in 1983 and 1,436 in 1984. Jackson had 160 in 1983 and 172 in 1984.

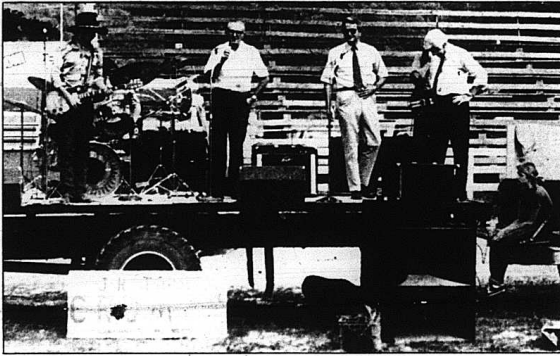
The increase probably was caused by an increase in speed over previous years. Most officers agree, drivers are driving faster than in the past two or three years.

Those killed in accidents in surrounding counties, showed Garrard with 4, Jackson with 3, Laurel with 7, Lincoln with 4, Madison with 21, and Pulaski with 9 compared to 16 in 1983.

Counties in the state with the most fatal accidents were Jefferson with 79, Fayette with 27, Hardin with 25, Madison with 21 and Pike with 15.

In a letter accompanying the report, Gov. Martha Layne Collins said "the importance of traffic safety cannot be overemphasized. My administration will continue to make every effort to reduce road hazards and improve overall safety, on the highways."

Government tells county to comply with handicap needs

The federal government once again has stepped into local problems, giving the county a year to comply with provisions of the handicapped discrimination regulations.

At a special meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court Friday, Andy Meadors, public administrative specialist for the Cumberland Valley Area Development District (CVADD), acting for the Office of Revenue Sharing (ORS), told the court a complaint on handicapped facilities that was made earlier is still not been remedied, and the court must come up with specific plans and dates for remedial action.

The ORS listed nine points it wanted action on and the court, with a little room to maneuver, agreed, since the ORS has control indirectly over county revenue sharing funds.

The court unanimously voted to comply with a "transition plan for implementing a compliance agreement," and handed the implementation to County Judge/Executive Bob Jasper.

The most expensive of the items listed will be planning, design and construction of a rear entrance ramp to the second floor (ground level) of the courthouse.

Also to be relocated is the handicapped parking space. It will be located in the parking lot behind the courthouse. Another expensive item will be changes in the bathrooms (men and women) on the first floor to make them usable and accessible to the handicapped.

One item had already been completed—the ramp at the front entrance to the courthouse.

The ORS instructed the court to "make a good-faith effort to implement the plan," make changes no later than Aug. 26, 1986,

and fully comply with provisions of the handicapped discrimination regulation.

The court was instructed to publish a concise summary of the signed agreement in the local newspaper (Signal) for one month (four times).

The first report to ORS is due within 90 days, and the second no later than Aug. 16, 1986.

Meadors declined to name the person who complained about the lack of handicapped facilities, but suggested the person is from Danville, is not a public official, and seemingly goes from town to town checking on handicapped facilities.

Meadors said he is due to visit with officials in McKee, London, Pineville and Harlan to discuss handicapped problems at those city halls.

Local manufacturing plant wants \$175,000 loan from Mt. Vernon

In order to retain and create jobs in the area, the Mt. Vernon City Council agreed at a public hearing Monday night to lend a helping hand to Rockcastle Manufacturing Co. to the tune of \$175,000, if possible.

The public hearing was called to discuss various city projects, including "the city's five-year plan for expansion and upgrading its water system, and specifically, to apply for a Kentucky Community Development Block Grant for \$200,000 to extend and improve water service to the industrial park."

Included in the project would be additional lines, tanks and filtration system.

The council had a visitor with another project on his mind. Ray Moncrief, president of Kentucky Highlands Investment Corp. of London, owner of Rockcastle Manufacturing's building, asked the council to loan the company \$2,000 a month toward its \$250,000 project to expand the plant from 22,000 to 30,000 square feet, increase production and create more jobs, perhaps 60.

Moncrief said the current square-foot lease rate is nearly \$4.00 and the company would like to reduce it considerably. One figure mentioned by Moncrief recently was from \$3.97 a square foot to \$3.35. The company now pays \$9,802 a month rent. With the additional space, rent would be \$10,900.

He reminded the council that the company has a modern plant in Powell County where the square foot rate is \$1.75, claiming that amount is an incentive for any company to expand and remain in a county. He also reminded the council the company has made its previous loans during a time of very high interest rates.

Mayor Roland Mullins and the council agreed the city is interested in helping all it can and (Cont. to A12)

suggested instead, every month, the city council try to include a lump sum of \$175,000 in its community block grant when it applies for its water improvement grant and loan it to the company at a reduced interest rate. The mayor said the terms could be negotiated. He also said the company could possibly get some grant money for its expansion program that would not have to be repaid. Moncrief replied that something could be worked out along those lines.

The mayor added, if the city could not obtain the community block grant, then the council could reconsider the \$2,000 a month.

"We just have to give it a try," the mayor said. "But there is no assurance that the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) will go along with it. We want to keep and create as many new jobs as possible, so we'll try first with the \$175,000 grant."

A similar type loan was made to Mt. Vernon Plastics by the council about two years ago when the company borrowed \$2,000 a month plus interest on a pay-back loan of about \$210,000. The company has repaid a total of \$46,345 on a regular monthly basis.

On the matter of creating new jobs, the mayor confirmed another company may move into the industrial park that would bring initially about 30 jobs. The mayor declined to name the interested (Cont. to A12)

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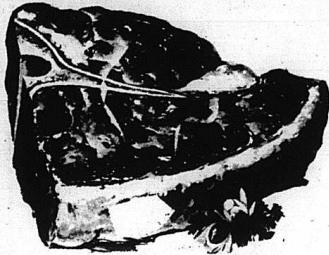

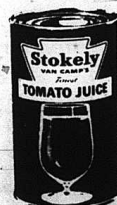

Rockcastle takes 26-0 win Friday

Nice win, men. 26-7 is a great improvement over a week ago.

The Rockcastle Rockets won their second game of the year last Friday night when they downed visiting Lynn Camp by a wide margin.

Playing the best half of football this year, the Rockets relied on a 20-point second half to stop a three-game losing streak and up their record to 2 and 3. Head Coach Tom Larkey said Wednesday he was very pleased with his team's performance and he had high hopes for a victory this Friday night against Wayne County.

The Rockets got off to an early lead last week when sophomore quarterback Chris Larkey hit senior Troy Taylor with a pass that resulted in a touchdown and a 6-0 lead in the first quarter. Larkey had another good passing game, completing 5 of 10 attempts for 58 yards.

Lynn Camp, however, took the ball in the second quarter, and with about three minutes to go in the half, scored their first and only touchdown of the game. They also tacked on the extra point to give them a 7-6 lead at the half.

The second half would belong to the Rockets. Following the lead of the Rockets' defense, which gave up only 8 yards rushing and 17 passing, the offense scored

three times in the half and added on a 2-point conversion. Freshman tailback Rodney Kirby scored twice in the third

Traffic accidents

(Cont. from Front) report were of interest.

Motor vehicle accidents in Kentucky in 1984 cost more than \$625 million. Of that figure, estimated cost of property damage by accidents totaled \$116 million.

Contributing factors and conditions causing accidents in Kentucky showed 53 percent were caused by a slippery surface; 33 percent, driver inattention; 27 percent, defective brakes; 19 percent, failure to yield; 17 percent, obstructed view; 13 percent, tire failure; 10 percent, unsafe speed, and surprisingly, 7 percent, alcohol.

Teenagers were a decided factor, but not a remarkable one, in accidents. The percent of total accidents by teenage drivers showed they were responsible for 14 percent of all accidents, 13

percent for all property damage; 15 percent for all non-fatal accidents, 12 percent for all fatal accidents, and the highest, 16 percent for alcohol related accidents.

In 1984, most fatal accidents in Kentucky occurred on Labor Day with 14, following in order by Thanksgiving with 12, New Year's Eve with 9, Memorial Day and Christmas with 8 each; and the Fourth of July with 4.

A total of 8,639 accidents in Kentucky in 1984 were alcohol related, and 189 of those involved were killed and 5,951 injured.

Forty-three percent of all accidents occurred during the

daylight hours, but 51 percent of the fatalities occurred at night.

A total of 51.5 percent of all fatal accidents occurred on week-ends. June 1984 recorded the highest number of fatal accidents when 82 were killed.

In 1984, surface types on which most accidents occurred showed 91.6 percent were on asphalt and accounted for 90.2 percent of the fatalities. Only 2.1 percent occurred on gravel and 7.6 percent on concrete surface.

Eighty-five percent of the drivers involved in fatal accidents had valid driver's license and 11 percent did not.

company until "they bring in the papers to be signed."

"I don't think we should get hopes up for a new factory and something go wrong and it falls through," the mayor stated. "I think we will know within the next 10 days."

The council left no doubt it believes a new factory will be an incentive for a grant to add water facilities at the park and to help Rockcastle Manufacturing make its improvements.

Along another line, apparently the plans submitted to the Rockcastle Fiscal Court in September by Kentucky Highlands have come to naught.

At that time Kentucky Highlands asked the court to approve

issuance of composite industrial revenue bonds through the Rockcastle Improvement Council to purchase and modify the Rockcastle Manufacturing building.

The court agreed since there was no financial obligation involved to the county.

"Apparently that method did not work out for them," one person at the public hearing said. "So they are taking this route. It's

all very complicated, but apparently bonds are not the best way to go at this particular time."

If the council had needed public input to help move the block grant along, the council would have had to find another way. No one showed up except the council and those directly involved in the grant hearing.

Jane Cannon of Evansville, Ind., writes: "In reply to your story on UofL, what else is new? Sounds like more dirty pool to me! Poor little Denny (Crum) got WHAS.

Wow! Didn't or don't they know TV is the thing now?"

And man, all over the states you can watch because there's a little thing called a satellite and you can "see" (UK) games. Who needs WHAS? UK reaction

Bernie Vanderhilde of the University of Kentucky information office said last week that UK had no say in WHAS's decision.

"I received two different versions of why they were making the change," Vanderhilde said. "WHAS told us that UL was going to pick up an option in the contract (with UK) if it was ever interrupted. They said that UL would sue them if they didn't agree to their wishes."

"But the folks at UofL didn't think a law suit was the thing as

much as it was that the Louisville station was going more toward the Louisville school."

Vanderhilde added that UK officials were shocked, dumbfounded, by the development.

"It's kind of ironic really that a few years ago when the FCC (Federal Communications Commission) was talking about doing away with clear channel radio stations thousands upon thousands of our fans wrote them to keep WHAS a clear channel station. It's ironic now that WHAS is doing this."

"First of all players in the state of Kentucky are our No. 1 priority," Schnellenberger replied. "We divide the state up into nine areas, one for each of our coaches. And I would say right now that our position with coaches in the state is about 1,000 times better than it has been in the past."

•When Tito Herford told a Dallas reporter last month that he intended to sign with the University of Kentucky, UK officials knew they could not make direct contact with the 7-0 center. But, according to an insider at UK, a Kentucky assistant coach managed to "float" an enticement through channels to Herford.

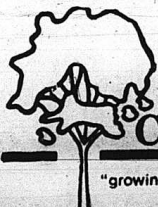
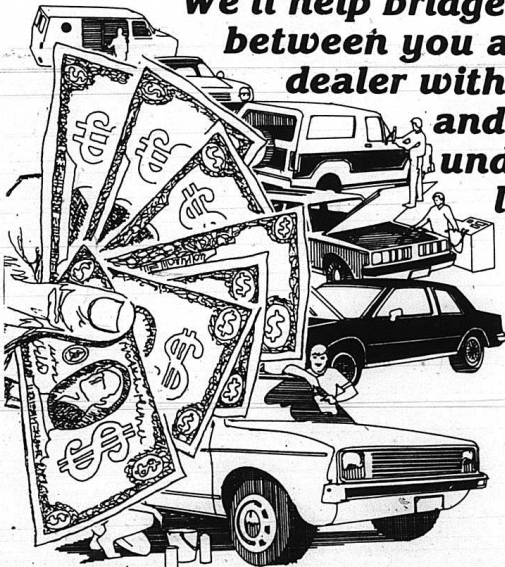

Fall fire hazard season is Oct. 1 - Dec. 15

The official Fall Fire Hazard Season begins Oct. 1 and runs through Dec. 15. According to officials with the Kentucky Division of Forestry, the danger of forest fires during this period is tremendously greater than during summer months. For this reason, it is against the law to burn anything within 150 feet of any woods or brushland before 4:30 p.m. during Fire Season. Other laws require that the burning area be carefully cleared around "before" lighting the fire, and that someone be with the fire at all times until it is completely

extinguished. One common material burned in the autumn is fallen leaves. Forestry officials encourage people to dispose of leaves by methods other than by burning. Other possible methods, depending on the amount of leaves, would include composting, shredding with a mulching type mower, or simply scattering the leaves among other leaves in the woods. If a person must burn leaves or other materials, the Division of Forestry urges that a few safety measures be followed—First, be sure to know and obey the Fire

Laws and check to be sure that the burning does not violate Air Pollution laws or local ordinances. Next, do not burn when it is extremely dry or when there is any wind, and wait as late in the day as possible. If a large amount of material is to be burned, do not try to burn it all at once. Instead, burn only small amounts at a time so the fire is manageable and can be quickly extinguished if necessary. Finally, be sure to have enough water, tools, and people on hand to control the fire. By knowing and obeying a few simple Fire Laws, people can

avoid having to go to court for violating these laws and possibly paying a heavy fine. In addition, by obeying the laws and following a few simple safety measures, people can avoid causing a wildfire which will damage our natural resources and possibly threaten other property or even lives. 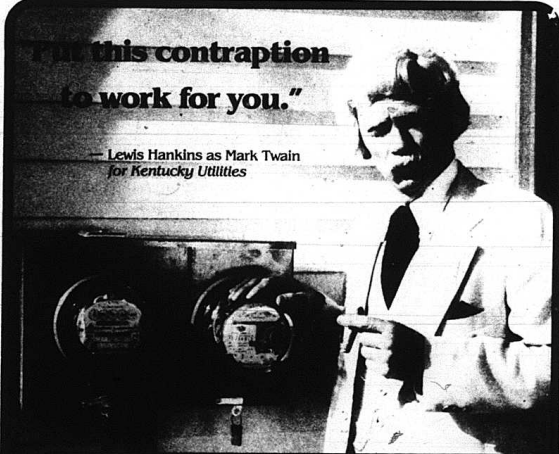


