Grand jury report

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury report for Sept. 27, 1985 was released this week by Circuit Court Clerk Denver Miller.

The report is a carbon copy of the May 24, 1985 grand jury report, and included the same items that the jury said had not been remedied.

The report follows:
"The Grand Jury observed the following item/items which are in need of repair/maintenance.

There is a definite need of repair to the air conditioning system, the heat, and the roof. Chief among these needs is the repair to the roof. After the repair to the roof, the ceilings need to be repaired and any asbestos fiber should be either replaced or sealed applied to them so they do not present a health hazard. There could be a good enamel paint applied as a sealer.

All areas of the courthouses, rooms, restrooms, etc. are in need of a good coat of enamel paint.

All the restrooms need to be scrubbed with an abrasive cleanser, painted, light fixtures repaired, and plumbing fixtures repaired. The paint on the restrooms should be a light colored enamel which may be scrubbed.

The lights in the courthouse need repair on the whole and bulbs replaced. All light baffles need to be washed and the dust removed. Any light fixtures that lack covers need to be replaced. Any light fixtures which are not secured flush with the ceiling should be secured.

Need were some essential lighting such as emergency exit lights which are not functioning

and need to be replaced and cleaned.

The floors need to be stripped and waxed. The majority of the air filters or all we could see, need to be replaced and the heat units show a need of cleaning. The heat units show some evidence of burnt ash which results from a filter system which is not corrected.

Some air conditioning ducts show a need to be insulated to prevent sweating, thus causing damage to the ceiling.

The County Extension Office supply room needs an exhaust for the removal of fumes from the reproduction machines which are considered toxic.

All the heat control units which are not functioning need to be repaired.

The halls are in need of painting and some of the end caps are missing, thus creating a dangerous situation of hazard.

The Sheriff's office needs some work on wall plugs and repair to the ceiling and walls.

Denver Miller's office was in the best condition, but was a result of his own cleaning. The jail needs to be painted and extra security measures taken to prevent escape from confinement.

In summary, the entire court house has dust and shows a lack of maintenance.

Perhaps a schedule of main tenance with a person, to be responsible with certain duties to be performed weekly.

people along the way. At the Livingston Dairy Freeze drive-in where he was interviewed, a patron had bought his supper. He walked on to Mt. Vernon where someone else put him up for the night in Best Western Motel.

He said he got the idea for the walk when he met a Society official in New England who had raised about \$10,000 in a walk. That led to his decision to walk from coast-to-coast. He did not know how much he had raised in his walk, but hopefully a fair amount.

As he left the Livingston drive-in headed toward Mt. Vernon, he waved to the several persons who were along the street. His bagpipes were folded and his heavy load was on his back. He had a contented smile as he went on his way.

oven drying, or trust the whole job to the oven. Some people even dry foods inside a car parked in the sun, keeping windows open for ventilation.

To sun dry, place loaded trays on a roof or other high surface, away from pets and small children, and away from traffic exhaust

and dust. Bring the trays in at night. If it's not too humid, 3 to 5 days of sunshine should do the job.

Oven Drying
This takes anywhere from 4 to 12 hours, and you need to keep a close eye on the apples. Preheat oven to 140 or 150 degrees Fahrenheit. If your thermostat can't be set that low, set it as low as possible. Then check it with a thermometer so that you can turn the oven off if it gets too hot.

Put in the trays of food—no more than 4 to 6 pounds of prepared apples at a time. Drop the door slightly open. It's good to keep air circulating with an electric fan, if possible. Stir and turn the foods every half hour or so and shift position of trays.

Doneness Test
To test, let apple slices cool first. They should feel tough and leathery and shouldn't be sticky.

Pasteurize and Package
Heat-treat trays of sun-dried apples in a 175-degree oven for 15 minutes before packaging. This helps protect them from insects during storage.

Spread dried apples out to cool on a clean cloth. Don't package them until they are completely cool. Use dry, scalded, insect-proof storage containers. Large glass jars and metal cans with tight lids are good. It's handy to fill up small (pint-size) plastic bags with the dried fruit first, then put these in the jars or cans.

Store them in a cool, dark, dry place, if possible. If the weather stays humid, check the apples from time to time. If you find moisture, reheat for 15 minutes, cool and repackage. If you have extra room in your freezer, you could store your containers of dried apples there. Other fruits that can be dried include grapes,

peaches, pears, persimmons, and plums. For more information, ask for "Home Drying of Fruits & Vegetable" from the County Extension Office by calling 256-2403.

However, Carmichael Caldwell's two interceptions Saturday might have signaled the emergence of an effective pass defender. Certainly Maurice Douglass has been a disappointment.

"I told Caldwell last Thursday at practice that I thought he was showing some improvement,"

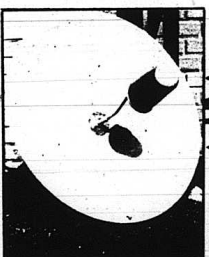

Gunmen rob Convenient

There are some people who always want something for nothing, and at least two such people did just that last week in Brodhead.

The Convenient Food Mart in Brodhead was robbed last Friday night around 9:30, according to Rockcastle County Sheriff William Taylor.

The local sheriff said two men, both in their twenties, walked into the grocery store carrying handguns and told the cashier on duty they wanted all of the money in the cash registers.

No one was in the store at the time of the robbery except for employees, according to Taylor, who said it was his understanding that about \$600 was taken by the gunmen.

Taylor said that two men who escaped from the Pullaski County Jail in early September were suspected of the robbery, along with a Rockcastle County man who escaped from a Pineville work camp in late August.

"A 1978 Plymouth Duster" was used in the robbery at Convenient, then dumped in Lake Linville," the sheriff said.

"These guys are pretty smart. They know that when moisture gets to anything, you can't get any prints or evidence.

That is why they dumped the car in the lake," he said.

One thing that did not help matters Friday night was the fact that no state trooper was on duty at the time of the robbery. State Police were called to the scene, including local Detective Ernie Boggs, who is in charge of the investigation.

Taylor said the Plymouth was found on the lake road by Virgil Abney around 11:30 p.m. after Abney noticed the flashers on the car blinking. The car was completely submerged in the water.

The sheriff also reported another stolen vehicle Wednesday night in Mt. Vernon. A 1978 silver Camaro was taken from Stanley Auto Sales and ended up in the same place as the Plymouth Duster, according to Taylor, who

added that police think both crimes are connected.

It is believed by police that the Camaro was used in a break-in at the Lincoln County Courthouse in Stanford Wednesday night. Taylor said the sheriff's office was broken into and several handguns were taken.

The Camaro was found in the lake just off Rose Hill Road Thursday evening by Jimmy Whitaker and Buck Hoskins.

Mt. Vernon City Police Chief Joe Howard said that whoever dumped the car in the lake took a boat from Oma Whitaker and rowed across the lake. The boat

Newcomb convicted of Ernest Singleton murder

A Rockcastle County man has been found guilty of first degree manslaughter in connection with an April 29, 1984 shooting incident.

Farley Newcomb of Livingston was found guilty by an eight men-four women jury of the shooting death of Ernest Humphrey Singleton at Gauley Branch, approximately 1 1/4 miles south of Livingston.

Singleton, who was pronounced dead at the scene by Rockcastle County Coroner Bill

Dowell, died of a single gunshot wound to the chest, which caused internal hemorrhaging.

According to police reports, the incident occurred after the two men met in the roadway at around 5 a.m. that Sunday morning.

Police said an argument ensued, and Newcomb apparently shot Singleton while he was sitting on the driver's side of his pickup truck.

Both men had passengers in their vehicles, but neither were

Mounting medical bills for jail inmates shocks county

Faced with mounting medical bills for prisoners in the Rockcastle County Jail, the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at its meeting Tuesday toyed with the idea of turning the jail over to the Commonwealth of Kentucky as a last resort.

Over the past 60 days the county has received medical bills for inmates totaling \$8,133, an amount the court called unbelievable.

"This kind of expense can wreck the county," a concerned Magistrate Joe Clark stated. "Something has to be done. We can't continue to pay these bills for hangovers. A lot of these people in jail are there for being drunk."

With taxpayers having to foot the bill, the court discussed a resolution to turn the jail over to the state, but did not take action, apparently leaving that action until the November meeting.

"I don't think it will do much good," Magistrate Clark conceded, "but it should help serve notice to the State Legislature that something has to be done to help these small counties bear this expense. Several counties have already turned their jail over to the

state by resolution."

Currently, according to records kept by County Treasurer Floyd Owens, the county jail fund is \$550.55 in the red for September. There was \$3,831.60 carried over from August funds and the jail received \$6,296.81 during September for a total of \$10,128.41. Bills paid totaled \$10,678.96, leaving the county jail fund \$550.55 in the red for September.

But it was the amazing \$8,166 medical expenses for jail inmates that startled the magistrates. When prisoners go to jail for any cause, and they claim illness, treatment is mandatory. Some prisoners require a security guard while at the hospital. The state pays the county only the amount over \$2,500 that a prisoner incurs, according to county officials, leaving the county to pay most of the cost of hospitalization and security guards. The county hires Trico Security of Richmond at \$5.75 an hour to guard hospitalized prisoners where guarding is required.

In addition to the \$10,678.96 the county paid out in September, it has remaining accounts payable of \$9,465.80, of which the \$8,133.53 is for prisoner medical service.

According to the records revealed at the court meeting, the county has paid \$4,081 for medical services for Ulysses Fletcher whose home is in Indiana but was formerly of Rockcastle County. His bills include \$1,089.19 for a hospital security guard; \$584 owed to Dr. Orson Arvin; \$9 to Dr. Wilbur Heinz, and \$2,399.42 for his stay in the Rockcastle County Hospital. He is serving a sentence for public drunkenness and concealed weapon, a jail official said. The county has paid \$1,054 for medical services for Ellis Hines. Included are Rockcastle County Hospital, \$681.51; University of Kentucky Hospital, \$62.64; UK Medical services, \$81; Rock

Twenty miles a day

Walking across America for Cancer

Daniel Smith is carrying a heavy load for the American Cancer Society—70 pounds to be exact.

The 23-year-old native of Watipetosa, Wis. is walking across the United States seeking funds for cancer research, carrying a 70-pound backpack and Scottish bagpipes on which he plays wailing Scottish tunes for those who ask.

Dressed in Scottish kilts, the tall, blond man was walking through Rockcastle County last Wednesday, stopping along the way to talk to the curious and interested.

Averaging about 20 miles a day, Smith estimated he had walked about 1,500 miles since he began his trip at Quoddy Head State Park in Maine, the eastern most point in the United States. During the walk he has worn out three pairs of shoes.

He also estimated it will be late spring or summer of next year before he finally reaches California. He plans to stop at his home in Wisconsin some time this month for a visit.

He admitted the weather doesn't always cooperate. Neither do dogs, cats, snakes, traffic, boys on bikes, joggers and other obstacles that suddenly appear in his path.

"I have problems once in awhile, but none that have been very serious," he said. "When I do, I just go on and try not to let them bother me."

Smith left Maine April 1 during a snowstorm. He walked through New England, along the Eastern Seaboard to Asheville, N. C., where he turned north into Tennessee and Kentucky.

From Mt. Vernon, he planned to go to Lexington, Cincinnati,

"For the most part, people are friendly," he related. "They buy food for me and sometimes open their homes for me to stay. I always suggest they mail a contribution to the American Cancer Society, 1169 Eastern

Parkway, Louisville, Ky. 40217. If they insist, I take the donation, I stop at the first post office and mail it to the Society."

But the only expense money for food or other items comes from

Contracts awarded for bridge, road construction

The state Transportation Cabinet has awarded contracts for bridge replacement and road construction projects in Rockcastle County.

Elmo Greer & Sons, Inc. of London received a \$5,513,297 contract for construction of 2.5 miles of the Mt. Vernon Bypass from U.S. 150 to U.S. 25. The project is being funded with 75% federal funds and 25% matching state funds.

"This bypass will help alleviate traffic congestion for motorists traveling through Mt. Vernon to Lake Cumberland," said Governor Martha Layne Collins.

Rankin & Gaffney Contracting of Lancaster received a \$699,953 contract to replace two bridges on U.S. 150, the Broadhead-Mt. Vernon Road. The company will replace the bridge and approaches at Negro Creek, located 0.4 mile west of KY 1250, and the bridge and approaches at Little Negro Creek, located 0.7 mile west of KY 1250. These two projects are being funded with 80% federal funds and 20% matching state funds.

The projects are part of the state's six-year construction plan for Rockcastle County.

DRYING APPLES IN KENTUCKY

Fall and winter cooking apples such as Winesap, McIntosh, Jonathan, and Cortland are best for drying. Wash, peel, core and trim out blemishes. Cut into slices or rings about 1/8 inch thick. To prevent some darkening, put apples into a solution of 4 tablespoons salt and 2 tablespoons vinegar in 1 gallon of water for 20 minutes.

Spread slices one layer deep on drying trays. You can make drying trays from slats or from wood slats attached to a frame. Some people just use cookie sheets, but they're not as satisfactory. Cover your drying trays with clean cheesecloth, or other thin

cloth that will let air circulate. Spread apple slices on the trays. If you're going to sun dry, place another layer of cheesecloth over the food to help keep out dust and insects.

Sun-Drying
Successful drying depends on heat, low humidity, and good air circulation. Because of the humidity, you may need to use a combination of sun drying and (Cont. to 16)

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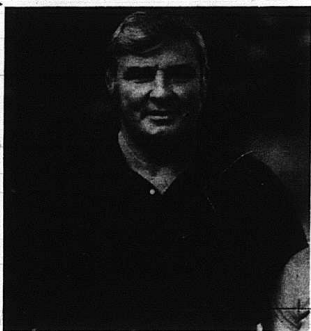

A win is always nice, but a homecoming win is especially sweet. The Rockets did just that Friday night when they downed visiting Wayne County by a score of 35-14.

The win enabled first-year head coach Tom Larkley to up his team's record to 3 and 3.

As they did a week ago, the Rockets fell behind early when Wayne County scored a touchdown with three minutes to go in the first quarter. Their extra point

attempt failed, and the Rockets found themselves in a hole 6-0.

After a dismal first quarter on offense, the Rockets regrouped and took their next possession in for an early second quarter score.

The score came when senior tailback Troy Taylor took the ball in from the T-yard line. The touchdown was set up by some good running on Taylor's part and a key interference penalty on the Rockets' J2-yard line. The penalty came on fourth down and gave the Rockets a first down and the chance to score. Senior Mike

Hamilton added the extra point, and the Rockets led 7-6.

The Rockets made the second quarter their quarter as they would score two more times before the half ended.

Their second score of the game came when Taylor took the ball untouched into the end zone from the 5-yard line. The touchdown was set up by some fine running by the Rockets corps of backs and especially Taylor, who had 113 yards on 15 carries for the night to lead the offense. Hamilton's extra point attempt was called no good by the officials and the Rockets led 13-6.

The third score of the quarter for the Rockets came when sophomore quarterback Chris Larkley hit senior end Bill David Gregory with a 9 yard pass in the end zone. Larkley, who had his best night of the year, passing with 95 yards through the air, scored the extra two points when he took the snap from the center, faked an extra point kick and raced in for the conversion.

The Rockets took a 21-7 lead into the locker room at halftime and would add two more scores in the third quarter before they were finished losing points.

The Rockets took the ball on their first possession of the second half and would score their fourth touchdown of the game. Senior tailback Taylor scored his third touchdown of the night on a 4-yard run. Mike Hamilton kicked the extra point, and the Rockets had a 28-7 lead.

The touchdown was set up by a 30-yard pass from Larkley to senior Devin Ford, whom the Rockets were facing a third down and 25.

The Rockets scored again late in the third quarter when Larkley took the ball into the end zone from the 1-yard line. Hamilton added the extra point for the third time of the game, and the Rockets led 35-7.

The only other score of the night came when Rocketstar punter Adam Coleman and punterrapper Pete Harrison combined for a fumble on the 5-yard line with one minute to play. Wayne County took the ball in for the score and added two extra points for the final score of 35-14.

Coch Larkley had great praise for both his offensive and defensive lines including Doug Cox, Mike Hamilton, Gerald Rowe, Greg Rowe, Michael Whitehead, Jeff Bullock, Mike Kelly and Mark McClure. He said his linebacking corps also turned in another fine performance. The coach noted that he had watched the leading tackler on the team, Lonnie Thomas, to middle linebacker for Friday's game.

"All of our linebackers have done a good job for us this year, especially Thomas and Pete Harrison," Larkley said. Thomas and Harrison led the team in tackles.

The first-year coach also had praise for senior Charles Bullen who plays both offensive and defensive for the Rockets.

Freshman tailback Rodney Kirby had a fine game with 59 yards rushing. Larkley said his offense had their best game of the year and noted that it would take another similar effort this Thursday night when the Rockets play Bell County at Pineville. Game time is set for 8 p.m.

The game has been moved up from Friday to Thursday because there is no school in the local system on this Friday.

Your child's health

Parents often consult their doctors about a child's speech development. It is difficult to decide at times when a problem really exists for there is a normal variation from child to child when they begin to talk. When a problem does exist, it is often due to hearing problems and ear infections as we have discussed before.

Following are some general guidelines for when to be worried. As with other chronic problems, it is better to deal with them before the child starts school.

1. The child does not begin speaking two word combinations by age two years.
2. His or her speech cannot be understood by age three years.
3. Their initial consonants are left out by age three.
4. They do not speak in sentences by age four.
5. They substitute many

6. They consistently leave off word endings by the age of five.
 7. They use incorrect sentence structure after the age of five.
 8. The child becomes upset and embarrassed by his speech.
 9. They are unable to speak fluently after age 4 1/2 years.
 10. They substitute, distort or omit any sound after age seven.
 11. They speak too loudly and with monotone or poor voice quality.
 12. Their voice has too much nasal resonance.
 13. They use abnormal rhythm, speed and inflection in the voice after the age of five.

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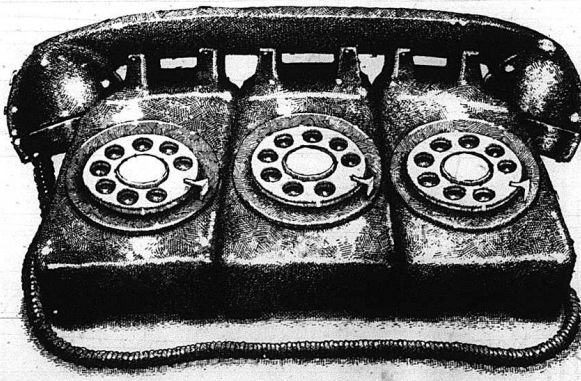

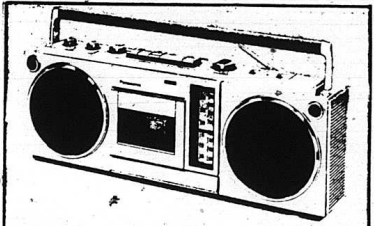

Things By Which One is Saved

A prominent doctrine today is that one is saved by faith only, but "what saith the Scriptures?" If one could be saved at the point of faith, without other acts of obedience, it would be salvation by a dead faith, for James wrote that faith without works is dead, and that one cannot be justified by faith only (James 2:18-24).

The word of God teaches that man, in addition to faith, is saved by love (John 3:16); God (1 Tim. 4:10); the Holy Spirit (1 Cor. 6:11); Jesus Christ (Matt. 1:21); the blood of Christ (Rom. 5:8-9); the gospel of Christ (Rom. 1:16-17); grace (Titus 2:11-12); repentance (Acts 2:38); confession (Rom. 10:9-10); and baptism (1 Peter 3:21). It follows just as certain as night follows day, that if one is saved by faith alone, then repentance, grace, love, baptism, etc. are not necessary. Perhaps those who advocate faith only would balk at this and say that repentance is necessary, but that baptism isn't. It is strange logic when they can insert what they want and leave out what they don't want in religion.

"I'll take a little of this, and a little of that, and just leave off what I don't like."

Brother James (inspired of God) said that faith must show itself by works (James 2:18). "What someone asks, "What about John 3:16? Jesus said,

"whoever believeth on him should not perish?" This statement teaches that one must have faith (believe), but does not teach faith alone. I might say, "Good health is dependent upon eating nutritious food." Would anyone understand that I mean good food alone, without air, water, etc.?

Did you know that the Bible actually gives examples of some who believed but were not saved? Devils believe and tremble (James 2:19). Some chief rulers among the Jews believed Him (John 12:42-43). King Agrippa believed what Paul preached, but would not put his faith to work (Acts 26:27). These could be called "negative believers."

We conclude that one who thinks he is saved by faith only has a dead faith, a dead justification, a dead sanctification, a dead hope, and he will have a dead glorification. Repentance is FAITH WILLING, confession is FAITH SPEAKING; baptism is FAITH OBEYING; and righteousness is FAITH LIVING.
