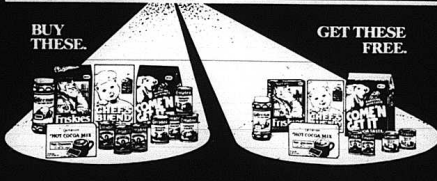

Health Focus

Your Child's Health

Reye's syndrome is a dread and poorly understood condition which occurs rarely in young children after they have had an influenza-like illness or chickenpox. Rarely, it may happen without these preceding illnesses.

It consists of prolonged vomiting and mental changes of confusion and eventually coma. Many cases are fatal, though with early recognition and treatment this is changing.

The cause of this unusual condition is not known. However, some studies have noted that the children who came down with Reye's syndrome had often been given aspirin for viral illness which preceded it. This statistical association has led the Surgeon General to warn against the use of aspirin in chicken pox or influenza in children. This ruling has led to all sorts of publications and legal proceedings by aspirin manufacturers.

More studies are being done and hopefully someone will find

both the cause and the cure for Reye's syndrome soon. However, for now, the advice is: Do Not give your child aspirin for flu-like illnesses or chickenpox. There is no advantage of aspirin over aspirin-free products in these situations except a small difference in price. Additionally, aspirin may upset the stomach more. Any brand of aspirin-free product, including generics are fine if you need to relieve fever or discomfort. Aspirin is still better if you are treating the pain of a sprain or minor injury. It has some mild anti-inflammatory effect. For viral illnesses, though, use aspirin-free products and be safe.

October is month for immunization

The month of October has been designated as Immunization Action Month. This resulted from the finding that many young

children were not being properly immunized.

A child is considered fully immunized if he or she has had five DPT shots, four doses of Oral Polio vaccine, one measles immunization, and one rubella vaccination at the prescribed times. The DPT contains vaccine for diphtheria, pertussis (whooping cough), and tetanus. Immunization against

mumps is also recommended and is often given in a product combining mumps, measles and Rubella vaccines.

The recommended schedule for immunization of children begins at two months with a DPT shot and an oral polio vaccine. Vaccines are then given at prescribed times until the child's immunization process is complete

Sometimes immunizations are neglected because of the difficulty in getting to the doctor's office or because of a lack of money. However, our local health department gives immunizations free of charge on the first and third Fridays of each month.

For more information, contact your doctor, pharmacist, or health department. Your child's well-being may depend on proper immunization.

Committee named for garbage

Four county residents have been named to a citizens coordinating/advisory committee to help study and recommend a garbage collection and disposal plan for the county that is now being drawn up.

Named to the committee are Lucille Carolotis, Tommy Harold Mink, Harold Ballinger and Marguerite Poynter Robinson.

Others on the committee are county magistrates, the county judge/executive, mayors of the three cities in the county, and magistrates and county judge candidates in the general election.

A countywide solid waste disposal plan must be approved by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court by Dec. 31 as mandated by the state.

The court recently awarded a contract to the Cumberland Valley Area Development District (CVADD) to formulate a plan to present to both the court and the state for approval.

According to Gatliff Craig, executive director of CVADD, a plan is now under preparation at CVADD, but will not be completed until sometime in November when a public hearing will be held.

Currently, county garbage is brought to three locations and taken to a Laurel County landfill by a private company. Mt. Vernon garbage is collected on a separate contract.

Federal suit filed by local social workers

A \$600,000 lawsuit has been filed in federal court in London by three former Cabinet for Human Resources employees from Rockcastle County against their two supervisors.

The former workers for the Office of Social Services charge that their supervisors "constructively discharged" them by making their working conditions so intolerable they had to quit their jobs.

In their suit, Joyce Lark, Shirley Wallin and Rosalind Philbeck say that from August of 1983

Cox resigns

Rockcastle Countians are presently without the services of a full-time assistant Commonwealth Attorney.

Jerry Cox, law partner in the local firm of Clontz and Cox, resigned his post effective Sept. 30.

Cox had worked as assistant Commonwealth Attorney for a year, a term which was agreed upon by Commonwealth Attorney Benny Ham and he at the time he accepted the position.

Cox said Monday that he had resigned mainly due to economics.

"When you work for the Commonwealth Attorney's office, you cannot represent any defendants in criminal cases," he said. "That would not be so bad if you were working in a firm as the only lawyer, but when you have to have other partners who can't involve themselves either, the benefits just don't add up."

Cox said the fact that one of his partners, John Clontz, lost the County Attorney's race in May also had a lot to do with his decision.

Ham reportedly asked local attorney Joe Lambert to take Cox's position, but he declined because he would have to give up his position as Master Commissioner.

Ham was unavailable for comment this week and has not appointed anyone to take Cox's place.

to July of 1984 their supervisor in the Mt. Vernon office and the agency district manager in London conspired to harass and intimidate them.

They say that supervisor Mike Bryant and district manager Jim Wood "willfully, intentionally and maliciously" violated their constitutional rights under the First and Fourteenth amendments.

The case will be tried January 27 in U. S. District Court before federal judge Gene Siler.

Wallin and Lark, who worked as support services aides, allege in the suit that the harassment included job suspensions after they were charged with falsifying travel vouchers.

They say that when they were cleared of the allegations and ordered reinstated, they didn't receive their back pay for a year because Bryant refused to sign the vouchers.

The same charges were reinstated two years after them after they were cleared the first time, they say. According to state records, the women were cleared of the charges all three times.

Philbeck, a secretary, says she was ordered by Bryant to investigate the charges that the other two falsified vouchers,

though there is an agency that investigates such charges.

She says she was given a written reprimand when she objected to investigating Lark and Wallin; however, Philbeck said she did give in and conduct the investigation.

The three women say that they were subjected to such harassment as being forbidden to be in a room with a closed door, to talk with other workers in the office, to receive personal phone calls at work, and they say they were required to take personal leave when they were out of the office on business purposes.

Philbeck also charges that her desk was moved into the employees' break room where she had no access to the telephone or files, which prevented her from performing her duties as office secretary.

The women say that they were vindicated in hearings before the Kentucky State Personnel Board, but the alleged harassment continued when they went back to work.

All three women left their jobs in 1984.

They seek \$100,000 compensatory damages each for the loss

of their jobs, reinstatement, and back pay dating from their separation date.

They also ask for \$100,000 punitive damages each, and an injunction forbidding the defendants from further harassment.

Daniel Egbers, a state attorney, is handling the suit for Wood and Bryant.

There is a light at the end of the tunnel for the Mt. Vernon City Council which finally has an apparent "reasonable" bid on the rehabilitation of the city sewer plant.

There was only one bid of \$1.9 million at the first opening of bids on the project several weeks ago, but that bid was turned down by the council as excessive.

Now with that bid of \$1.6 million from Titus Construction of Dayton, Ohio, the council approved the bid if it can get additional grant money from the government to make up the difference between its original \$900,000 grant money and the new

Private water supply 90% contaminated

Ninety percent of the private wells and springs in Rockcastle County are contaminated with bacteria, according to a water quality study, made in 21 counties in southeastern Kentucky by the Mountain Association for Community Economic Development (MACED).

"Be careful what you drink and where it comes from," a spokesman for the Berea based association said this week.

Rockcastle wells and springs are the most contaminated in the entire study area which includes the counties of Jackson, Bell, Breathitt, Clay, Floyd, Harlan, Johnson, Knott, Knox, Laurel, Lee, Leslie, Letcher, Magoffin, Martin, Perry, Pike, Owsley, Whitley and Wolfe.

The study was made between January 1980 and June 1984.

Jeanne Hibberd, an associate research assistant who was involved in the study, said there were 4,221 reported cases of gastro enteritis, a form of diarrhea, in Rockcastle during the study period, and called the figure "an extremely high incidence, probably the highest number of cases reported by a county during that reporting period of January 1980 and June 1984."

"We are not sure why the problem was so pronounced in Rockcastle, but gastro enteritis is a diarrhea, and diarrhea is often associated with drinking water," Ms. Hibberd explained.

She said in Kentucky the average annual incidence of gastro enteritis is 185 cases for 100,000 population. In Rockcastle, the annual average incidence would be 6,700 for 100,000 population, if the population were 100,000.

Hepatitis A, another water related disease, also showed up in Rockcastle. The state average is 14 cases per 100,000 population and 22 cases per 100,000 in the 21 county study area. In Rockcastle, the annual average would be 24 cases per 100,000 if there were 100,000 population. The actual number of cases on hepatitis A in Rockcastle during the study period was 15. However, the reason may be a matter of reporting by doctors to the health department.

The study did show in Rockcastle that 43 percent of the population rely on a private water supply. In neighboring Jackson, 61 percent rely on private water supplies, but only 50 percent of the wells are contaminated with bacteria. Jackson was not over the state average for cases of gastro enteritis and hepatitis A.

The report by MACED said the problem has been made worse by the state's failure to take corrective action on what is believed to be the principal causes of contamination in the study area.

Those causes include poorly operated and regulated public and private sewage disposal systems, inadequate regulation of run off water from coal mines, oil and gas wells, and rapid population and industrial growth.

Public water sources and sewage disposal systems were not included in the report. Those figures will be included in another report from MACED in about a month.

Ms. Hibberd said the study was released to focus public attention on the problem of water quality contamination in rural areas and to spur legislative action to correct the problem.

The study concluded that the

\$1.2 million that is necessary. The city's share would be in the range of \$400,000.

Mayor Roland Mullins, who along with the council has worked on the sewer project plans for several years, said the city is not alone in its problem with skyrocketing project costs. Other cities have found costs running well ahead of estimates, but in most cases the grant money has been increased to meet the needs. He hopes that will be the case for Mt. Vernon.

He said work would start on the sewer plant only after approval of the additional money.

The sewer project would increase sewage treatment at the

plant from 200,000 gallons a day to 600,000 gallons a day.

Bids on sewer lines going to Fairground Hill, Cox Lane and a section of Owens Subdivision were opened at the meeting.

Apparent low bidder was Karish Construction Co. of Mt. Vernon at \$670,019, represented at the meeting by David King and Clifford Collins. Other bids were Sharp Construction of Winchester at \$675,531, and Smith Construction of Lawrenceburg at \$704,177.

The council delayed awarding the bid until engineers can check all bids and alternatives.

The mayor said he hoped work on the project could get

Manufacturing plant to expand

Rockcastle Manufacturing has been in business in Rockcastle County since August of 1978. They are the biggest employer in Rockcastle County, next to the school system and they are expanding.

Presently the local sewing factory, as it is most commonly referred to, employs 171 people. Plant manager Steve Bates, who has been at Rockcastle Manufacturing for approximately one year, says that his company plans to add an additional 20 to 25 jobs once their expansion project is completed.

Bates says that 8,000 square feet is being added to the present structure, which is located in the Rockcastle Industrial Park, to accommodate the additional machinery and workers. The project is slated to be finished by the middle of December.

Presently Rockcastle Manufacturing produces about 20,000 pairs of pants a week. Pants which are shipped to Heaston, Cincinnati and Los Angeles for distribution. Bates says that the 20,000 figure is the highest production level the plant has ever achieved. Rockcastle Manufacturing is a division of Cintas Corp. of Cincinnati.



House approves bill which will limit imported clothes

Fifth District Congressman Hal Rogers said passage by the House of legislation to restrict imported clothing and textiles is "wonderful news" for textile workers in the Fifth District.

The legislation, known as the "Textile and Apparel Trade Enforcement Act," is designed to enforce limits on textile and clothing imports into the United States. These imports, Rogers said, have exceeded agreed-upon limits and cost American textile workers thousands of jobs.

In debate on the issue, Rogers told the House that cheap imported textiles have flooded the U.S. market unfairly, and that the U.S. must "fight back."

"This textile bill does two things," said Rogers. "It corrects the trade inequities we have, allowing our domestic manufacturers to compete fairly. And it preserves jobs."

Students to participate in ACT assessment program

As the new school year begins, more than one million high school juniors and seniors across the nation are preparing to participate in the ACT Assessment Program.

The ACT Assessment, which consists of four academic tests that measure educational development and a detailed questionnaire that collects information relevant to educational and career planning, is recommended or required by more than 2,700 postsecondary institutions and scholarship programs.

School guidance counselors recommend that students participate in the ACT Assessment Program early in the senior year, so their results will be available in time for use in planning for postsecondary education and careers.

Students can obtain registration packets that contain all the information necessary to register and prepare for the Assessment from their high school guidance offices. The basic registration fee for the Assessment is \$10. Late registration will be accepted for an additional \$10 late handling fee. For 1985-86, ACT has established this test date schedule.

Following are the test dates, registration deadlines and late registration deadlines.

Dec. 14, 1985; Nov. 15, 1985, and Dec. 3, 1985.

Feb. 8, 1986; Jan. 10, 1986 and Jan. 23, 1986.

April 12, 1986; March 14, 1986, and April 1, 1986.

June 14, 1986; May 16, 1986, and June 3, 1986.

It takes about three hours to complete the four ACT examinations in English, math, social studies, and natural sciences. A

sample copy of a full-length test is available in every high school. Students who would like to have copies of additional tests may obtain them at cost from ACT.

The ACT Assessment also includes a two-part questionnaire that students complete at home when they register. The questionnaire focuses on the student's interests, academic and non-academic accomplishments, and vocational and educational plans and needs.

Colleges use information from the ACT Assessment Program for academic advising, admissions counseling, course selection and placement, student services, and institutional research. ACT Assessment reports are sent to students, their high school counselors, and only those institutions and agencies specifically designated by the student.

The ACT Assessment Program is a major service of The American College Testing Program, which has national headquarters in Iowa City, Iowa.

Council having liability insurance problems getting

under way before winter.

A third project, extension of water services at the city water plant, needs an engineer. Two firms made proposals to the council. They are Crawford &

Crawford, Engineers Inc. and Associates of Burnside, and Chris- & Wallace, architects and engineers of Lexington. The council took the proposals under advisement.

A bid for insurance on city owned buildings, plus liability on city vehicles, and workmen's compensation was made by Singleton Insurance of Mt. Vernon which currently has the policy. The annual premium is \$13,317. The city will accept the buildings, vehicle and vehicle liability bid, but delayed a decision on workmen's compensation until a check is made with the Kentucky Municipal League on the cost of League insurance that could possibly save the city about \$2,000.

The council was not so lucky on its general liability insurance. Donnie Singleton told the council he had not found an insurance company that was interested in providing this type of insurance longer, but he would keep trying.

In recent months, the courts have ruled that municipalities are no longer immune to suits, and one-by-one insurance companies have stopped providing liability insurance.

Without this insurance, the city, mayor and council can be sued for damages, except damage caused by fire and police. Some city officials have said it could reach a point where no one would want to serve in city offices from fear of being sued.

In recent times, juries have been inclined to award large amounts of money in suits against municipalities. If the money is not available to pay the award, then taxes can be raised to pay it. Some time ago, Krpox County parked its road graders because it could not get liability insurance.

"One official from another area reportedly said recently: 'If we can't get insurance against these outlandish awards, then include me out of this council. I want no part of it under those conditions. It could ruin me financially.'"

The city's present liability insurance expires Nov. 1.

Most officials agree the problem will eventually have to be resolved by the Kentucky Legislature.

Floyd Owens, project director for downtown revitalization, reported activities of his group. He said Cumberland Production Credit Association has agreed to give a strip of land bordering on Spout Springs to the city if the city will pay survey and deed costs. The council agreed.

A request from Owens for three "speed breakers" in front of Town Hill Apartments was approved by the council.

state's "fragmented approach" to regulating water quality, a lack of specific laws to protect private water supplies, and failure of the State Division of Water to accept responsibility for testing and protecting private water supplies have contributed to the problem of poor water quality.

"There just isn't anyone trying to deal with the problem that we know of," Ms. Hibberd

stated. She added that the Division of Water is testing private wells and springs in the late 1970s following a reorganization that took testing from the Cabinet for Human Resources and switched it to a newly formed Division of Water.

The MACED report may nudge the state into putting the testing back on the shoulders of the Human Resources Cabinet, she concluded.

Recommendations made by the report include: "Increased testing of ground water and the aquifers, or underground channels, through which it moves.

"Better health monitoring to determine the link between poor water quality and health problems.

"A public education program on the dangers of water contamination, and production of a free information package instructing homeowners about how to ensure that their water supplies are pure.

"Improvements in public sewage disposal systems and better enforcement of sewage-disposal regulations.

"Better enforcement of state coal mining and oil and gas drilling regulations to ensure that contaminants generated by both industries do not enter private water supplies.

"Establishment of a state program to test private wells free of charge, as well as a program to provide well improvements or new wells to homeowners whose water source is contaminated.

Based on similar attempts to improve water quality in other states, the report estimated that it would cost \$622,000 to implement the program in Kentucky.

The cost would go to just in excess of \$900,000 if the state spent \$300,000 that the association estimated would be necessary to subsidize a \$2 million bond issue to allow low-income homeowners to obtain well-improvement loans at five percent interest rates. A pilot ground water testing and well-improvement program in the 21 county study area would cost \$191,000, the report estimated.

Those estimates did not include the cost of hiring additional enforcement personnel in the Division of Water and the Department of Surface Mining Reclamation and Enforcement, Ms. Hibberd said.
