Do you ever wonder what your doctor or pharmacist means when they mention brand name

and generic drugs?

A brand name drug carries a A brand name drug carries a trademark that only one drug manufacturer is allowed to use. This manufacturer must spend large amounts of money on research and advertising. So the brand name drug is given a patent and is sold at a higher price will its generic equivalent.

this patent runs out, the generic drug can then be marketed. A generic drug is one that is sold under its chemical or official name. This name is different from

the brand name.

Many people have miscoricep-tions about generic drugs and substitution. Some are afraid they will get a weaker strength or a different drug if a substitution is different drug if a substitution is made. However, in Kentucky, there are strict guidelines pharmacists must use in making a substitution. Pharmacists can only make a legal substitution when the genetic drug has been deemed therapeutically equivalent to the brand name drug by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration. This means the drug must have the quantity and dosage as the brand name drugs. All drugs, brand name or generic-name, must the same FDA' standards the same FDA standards for Safety, strength, parity, and efficiences. The FDA publishes a list of drugs that have been provided in the safety of the safety

law, must dispense the cheapest brand in stock on drugs approved for generic substitution unless you or your doctor request otherwise. Pharmacies are not required to stock generics, but most do.

If you have any onestions about generic drugs and their substitutions, don't hesitate to ask your doctor or pharmacist.





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
