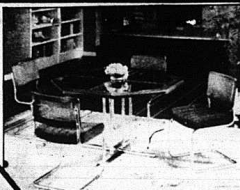

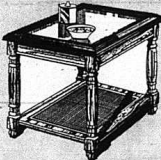

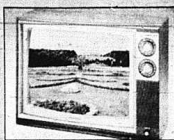

Why you should be a Christian

The apostle Paul never lost an opportunity to tell others why he was a Christian. At least twice in Acts, he describes the circumstances of his conversion (Acts 22: 26). He told it to the rich and poor; to the great and small; to the king and the jailor. Paul was not ashamed of the gospel (Rom. 1:16), and neither am I. Here are some reasons why you need to be a Christian. We're speaking, of course, to those who are not Christians.

First, because you are a sinner and need pardon. When one is made aware of the enormity of his sins, he wants to be free. Conviction comes first and then conversion! The only way to be free from the shackles of sin is to come to Christ. The Lord receives all who will come in simple trust and obedient faith. He will abundantly pardon. We are acquitted of sin and its guilt by the blood of Christ (1 Pet. 1:18-19, 22, 23; 1 John 1:7). A Christian is one who has been pardoned of his sins, and who has a present advocate on his behalf.

Second, because you can have true peace of mind. Being a Christian is the only adequate and satisfying solution to long, even infidels often express this longing in death. Peace of mind cannot be satisfied in unbelief. It cannot be obtained in pleasure which is temporary and leaves scars and a burned-out spirit. Peace of mind does not come with wealth. Some of the saddest people on earth are rich in monetary wealth. The fact is the soul of man cannot be nourished with materialism. Jesus Christ is the only answer. He is the "Bread of Life," thus relieving our hunger. He is the "Water of Life," relieving our thirst. He is the solution to every problem, and the answer to every question. Through Him comes the "peace of God" (Phil. 4:7), for "He is our peace" (Eph. 2:14).

Third, because you need divine help in your life every day. We need help in overcoming temptations (1 Cor. 10:13). Christ is our strength, therefore, we are more than conquerors through Him. In times of catastrophe, the Christian may lean upon the everlasting arms of God. What an advantage the Christian has!

Fourth, because of appreciation for God's goodness. The Christian life is a life of gratitude. Some seldom look up to see from whence their blessings flow. We were kidnapped by sin and Satan. Our Father loved us so much that He sent His greatest gift—Jesus Christ (John 3:16). Christ paid the ransom. How we ought to appreciate this love. It is an insult to God to reject His Son.

Fifth, you need to be a Christian so you can go to heaven when you die. The Bible describes hell as a place of total darkness, unquenchable fire, and eternal separation from God. Surely, everyone wants to avoid this. Then be a Christian. Heaven is a place of eternal fellowship with God and His Son. It will be a reunion with all the redeemed of all ages. There our spirit shall rest in peace.

After considering these five reasons honestly, can you afford not to be a Christian? Read the book of Acts and see that becoming a Christian involves faith in Christ, repentance of sins, confessions of faith, and baptism for the remission of sins (Acts 2:38; 8:12; 37:39). Be a Christian today!

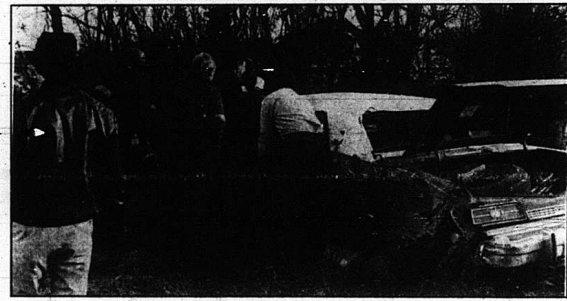

Sewer rate increase could be in store for Mt. Vernon

The overhaul of the Mt. Vernon sewer plant, estimated at \$1.6 million, is going to call for an increase in sewer rates for residents.

When the planning for expansion needed at the plant began in 1976, it was estimated by engineers at about \$1.2 million.

When the project was finally bid on Aug. 27, 1985, the only bid received was for \$1.9 million, far more than the city could afford. The bid was rejected.

A second bid was made on Oct. 1, 1985 for \$1.6 million by Titus Construction Co. of Dayton, Ohio. The Titus bid was one of seven.

Large overruns after bids have confronted, several cities in the past including Lexington, \$190,000; Alton, \$290,000; Radcliff, \$2,350,000; Center Town,

Brake failure claimed

2 hurt in freak accident

Brake failure was apparently the cause of a runaway Pepsi-Cola truck which struck a car and wound up upside down in the side of a Stewart Fertilizer building last Thursday morning.

The driver of the truck, Virgil M. Maxey, 35, of Rt. 5, London, is listed in serious condition in the surgical intensive care unit at St. Joseph Hospital in Lexington. Mattie Howard, 28, of Mt. Vernon, was admitted to the Rockcastle County Hospital where her condition was listed as satisfactory Tuesday.

Maxey was traveling west on U.S. 25 when his brakes apparent-

ly failed. A Super Test employee told City Police that the truck went by the station at a high rate of speed with something dragging under the truck which "looked like a drive shaft."

Other witnesses said that Maxey approached the intersection of U.S. 25 and Hwy. 150 blowing his horn and waving his arms, but Mrs. Howard, not seeing the truck, had already turned right onto 150, and her left rear fender was struck by the front bumper of the truck as Maxey attempted to go, between Mrs. Howard and a car sitting in the eastbound lane of 150. Mrs.

Howard's car wound up in the parking area adjacent to Bishop's Tire Center.

After striking the car, Maxey apparently lost control of the truck and went over an embankment and came to rest upside down in the side of a Stewart Fertilizer building.

According to the accident report filed by Mt. Vernon City Policeman Joe Howard, the drive shaft of the truck was intact, so it is not known at this time what caused the brake failure.

General Assembly opens with budget in spotlight

The 1986 session of the Kentucky General Assembly was officially convened at noon EST Tuesday in the Senate and House chambers of the Capitol with Sen. Rogers and Rep. Ford in attendance.

Lt. Gov. Steve Beshear, president of the Senate, and House Speaker Don Blanford, D-Philpot, presided over the chambers as they will nearly every day between now and April 15, when by law, the legislature must complete its business.

The Legislative Research Commission adopted a calendar for the session calling for 58 legislative days between Jan. 7 and April 15. The state constitution permits up to 60 legislative days, which means lawmakers could add two days to the session if extra time is needed.

The budget, as usual, figures to get the lion's share of attention during the session. Gov. Martha

Lucas Collins is required by law to submit her biennial budget to the legislature within the first 10 days of the session. The tenth legislative day falls on Jan. 21.

The last day for the introduction of new House bills will be March 6, while the Senate may introduce new measures until March 10. Concurrence days to work out differences in House and Senate bills are March 31 and April 1 with the Legislature scheduled to recess for 10 "veto days" on April 2.

The General Assembly will return to Frankfort to consider action on any gubernatorial vetoes on April 14-15.

Rogers and Ford encourage their constituents to use two toll-free telephone lines which have been established to help citizens keep track of the legislative process.

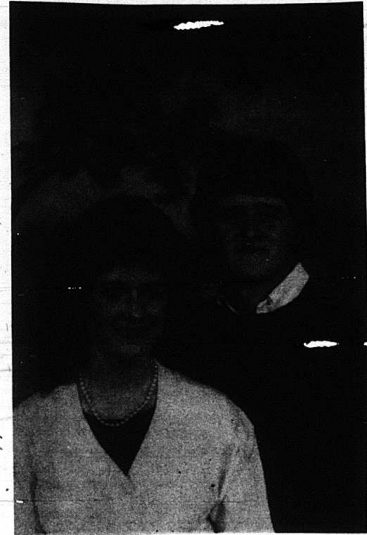

You Must File Return to Get Income Tax Refund

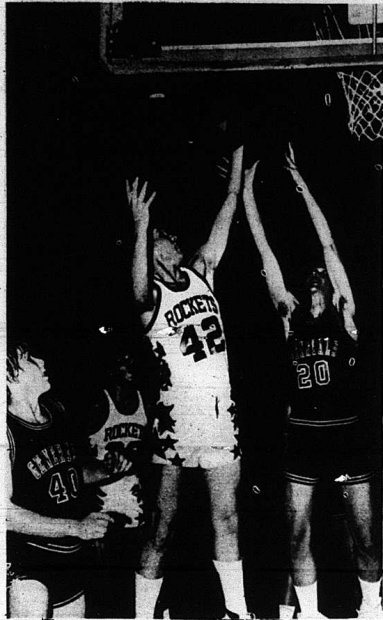
Many low-income earners such as students, retirees, and part-time employees are entitled to receive a full refund of the federal income taxes withheld during the year, but they must file a return to get it.

Check your W-2, Wage and Tax Statement, to see if any federal income tax was withheld. If you were withheld and you have no tax liability, filing a return is the only way to recover the money that was withheld.

If you expect to have no tax liability again in 1986 and your income will be below the amount required to file a return, you can avoid having to file a tax return to recover your tax withheld by giving your employer a new form W-4, Employee's Withholding Allowance Certificate, claiming exemption from withholding. You may claim exemption from withholding only if you had no income tax liability in 1985 and you expect to have no income tax liability in 1986. However, if you are eligible for the Earned Income Credit, you must still file a tax return.

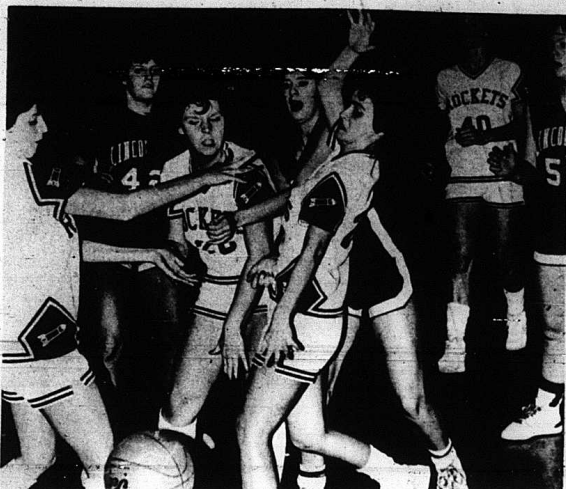
Saturday, the girls traveled to Madison Central and lost 47-42 to a bigger and more tenacious team.

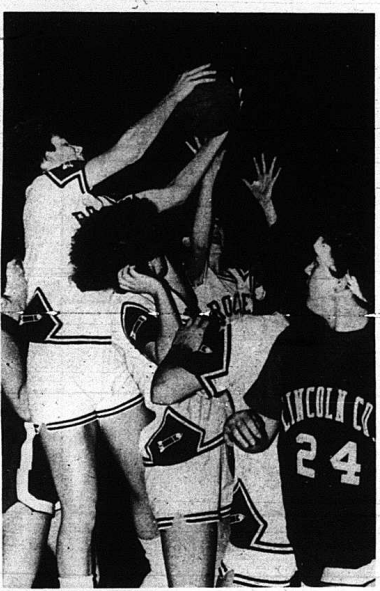
