A simple tax rule to remember is that if you receive less than
20 in tips while working for one
employer during one month, you
on of have to report the tips to
you're mployer. Just keep a daily
record of your tips and report
the total with your other wages when
you file your tax return.

However, if you receive 20 or
more in tips while working for any
one employer during a month,
then you are required to report the
amount of tips to your employer.
The report must be given to youremployer by the 10th day of the
following nameth. Some employ
may require you to report your tips
more than once a month.

Your employer is responsible
or withholding Social Security or

may require you to report your tips, more than once a month, some than once a month of the property of the pro

When you get your Form W-2. "Wage and Tax Statement, for the year from your employer, the tip income you have reported will be included in the salary amount. And, if you work for an establishment covered under the recogning recoursements previously establishment covered under the reporting requirements previously mentioned, your employer may include as a separate entry on your Form W-2 any amount of tips allocable to you. The information returns filed by the employers will be used to determine whether employees have been accurately reporting tip income.

To help tip earners with recordkeeping, the IRS has free forms available for keeping track of daily tips and also for monthly-reporting of tip income to employ-ers. Most of the eight fires can be Most of the eight frees can be attributed to people burning garbage and letting it get out of centrol or cigarettes being thrown down carelessly. Bullen said there was one 'figer-hau, fire near Madison County and one which was caused by a stransformer blowing and shooting sparks out. The largest of the fires occurred near Brodhead and burned over 10 acres.

Bullen cautioned that it is still a critical time due to a lack of

a critical time due to a lack of ground moisture and windy wea-ther and that no burning should be done until some precipitation falls. Some landowners have been fined for illegal burning (letting fires out of control). Bullen said, and the indendiary fire is still under

Bullen has been called to help out in -Whitley County, where quite a few fires have been caused by arsonists.

The Northern Rockcastle Water District, reportedly strapped for impney to meet operations 3 md maintenance expenses, received another financial jolf Monday night.

The Mr. Vernon City Council worded to double the price the district pays the city for water increasing its current 42 cents, matching the rate already paid by the Western Rockcastle Water District and the City of Brodhead.

Western Rockcastle Water District and the City of Brodhead. The rate will be effective Feb. 1 when the contract between the city and the district expires. The increase will be tentative.

The increase will be tentative, pending an audit review. Currently, the water bill for the Northern District averages about \$1.100 a month. Brodhead's bill is about \$2.100 a month, and the Western District about \$3.200 a month.

No mention was made by the council of any further increases in water rates in the Westerh District. Brodhead, and Mt. Vernon. Livingston Jas its own water

Citizens committee named. to get views on sewer rates

"There' Seems to be no other way out." the mayor stated. "Government money is drying up, so the city can't risk losing this grant money."

Do a majority of Kentuckians support a seat belt law?

In a statewide survey. Kentuckians expressed support of seat belt legislation by nearly a three-one margin (69 percent versus 24 percent). Not only do they favor a seat belt law. 77 percent said they want it strictly enforced. Isn't a seat belt law a violation of personal rights?

Trivings a motor vehicle—survivinge not a right, and like all privileges it comes with certain responsibilities. We. must obey stops signs and speed limits, have profig safety equipment and adhered to other rules of the road designed for driver and passenger safety.

safety. How many lives would we save if Kentucky adopted a seat belt law?
If everyone in Kentucky wore seat belts, the annual highway death toll would be reduced by more than 300 lives.

What impact would this law have on Kentucky's court system? Since the law being proposed right now cites non-compliance as

right now cites non-compliance as a non-moving violation, fines would be mailed in: there would be no court appearance. So, the only impact would be a slight increase in administrative and bookkeeping costs-offset by the fines collected.

If the 'taw is changed to require a court appearance, we can look at other states for some indication of how the courts are

affected.
In New York, the ratio of speeding violations to seat belt citations is 14 to 1. Should that ratio hold true for Kentucky, there would be fewer than 7.000 court appearances for non-compliances state, there would

be only 128 each week.
Will this seat belt law affect
pickup trucks?
As the pre-filed bill currently
reads, a seat belt law would apply
to passenger vehicles under one
fon. This would affect most

appearances for non-compliance. For the entire state, there would

pickups but trucks over one ton and recreational vehicles would be exempt.

Don't geat belts trap people in their card when they catch fire or ounder water.

On the contrary. Wearing a sea belt can help prevent you from being knocked unconscious; allowing you to escape from the car if such a situation should develop. But the chances of that are slim. Only one-half of one percent of all injury-causing accidents involve fire or submersion.
