### 4-H HAS SUMMER JOB OPPORTUNITIES

College students, job teachers, or other individuals interested in finding summer employment may have to look no further than the Kentucky 4-H program. Summer jobs are available at the five Kentucky summer 4-H camps located at Carlisle, London, Rush, Jabez, and Dawson Springs.

Positions are available for camp managers, emergency medical technicians, food manager supervisors, cooks, nature instructors, recreation instructors, crafts instructors, and lifeguards. With the exception of the cooks, all other camp staff will be expected to live at the camp. Housing will be available for married camp managers, but not for married staff members.

Persons applying for camp positions must be at least 18 years of age. Emergency Medical Technicians must have state certification. Lifeguards must be Red

Cross certified in either Advanced Life Saving or Water Safety Instructor.

Camping, counseling or administrative/personnel experience is desired. Communication skills and the ability to work with youth and adults are required.

# Your child's health

Rewards and punishment... carrot and stick... praise and scolding; how do we get kids to do what they should? If they don't mind as toddlers, will they as teenagers? Our five and seven year olds still respond to knowing

when Mommy or Daddy's voice has reached that certain pitch and they say, "If you don't do... by the time I count to three... That works (so far) in a limited way in stopping bad behavior, but how to enhance good? My wife has been trying a system of immediate payment of pennies for doing chores, etc. along with instant fines for bad behavior. As the kids have learned more of the value of money it has worked better. Examples: a nickel for bringing in a log of firewood; a nickel fine for hitting your sister with a penny for answering the phone; pay a penny for not hanging up your towel; two cents for setting the table, three cents for sweeping, five cents fine for a tantrum, etc.

## The medicine Chest

Many studies about drugs have been conducted, and some of the most unique are those examining the driving impairment due to marijuana use. Simple functions like reaction time (how it does not involve complexities) are minimal, if affected by marijuana, but other components are significantly affected. The ability to maintain a vehicle's position on a road is affected to a much greater extent than reaction time. Since marijuana appears to interfere with concentration, this task, as well as any other task requiring continuous attention, would show great impairment under the influence of marijuana.

Various aspects of perception have also been studied. Glare recovery time, the time required for the eyes to adapt to darkness after being exposed to bright light, has been found to be increased as much as eight percent while "high." Signal detection is also affected by marijuana use. This may affect the driver's response to a child running into the street, etc.

Some studies have used driving simulators and actual traffic driving and have also found significant marijuana-induced impairment. One study found that "high" drivers were less capable of handling wind gusts; of handling curves, of maintaining following distances, and of responding to emergency situations. Also this degree of impairment would cause an accident under actual highway conditions.

Another study showed impairment in response to road signs and in ability to make proper turns. One study used a flight simulator and ten experienced pilots, all of whom had had some experience with marijuana. They were asked to perform various routine maneuvers without visual flight clues. Although these were routine tasks, the pilots' performance deteriorated when marijuana was used. They had difficulty maintaining altitude and direction. They often forgot where they were in the flight sequence. The majority showed impaired performance up to four hours after smoking marijuana.

These studies prove that marijuana can be detrimental to the health of not only the user, but also, many times, innocent victims.

## Tips are taxable income

If you're a wage earner in a service occupation, a nice tip brings a smile to your face. But tips also bring some special tax responsibilities too, according to the Internal Revenue Service. Tips are income and that means they have to be reported when you file your tax return.

A simple tax rule to remember is that if you receive less than \$20 in tips while working for one employer during one month, you do not have to report the tips to your employer. Just keep a daily record of your tips and report the total with your other wages when you file your tax return.

However, if you receive \$20 or more in tips while working for any one employer during a month, then you are required to report the amount of tips to your employer. The report must be given to your employer by the 10th day of the following month. Some employers may require you to report your tips more than once a month.

Your employer is responsible for withholding Social Security or railroad retirement tax as well as income tax on your reported tips. Owners of certain large food and beverage establishments where tipping is customary are required to annually file a calendar year information return with the IRS, listing the establishment's allocable gross receipts from food or beverage operations, allocable charge receipts on which there were charged tips, tips shown on charge receipts, and total tips reported by employees. Also this annual report must show the amount of tips allocated when the total reported by the employees is less than the applicable percentage of the food and beverage establishment's total sales. Tip allocations are made only to employees who receive tips directly from customers unless there is an agreement that they be allocated among all tipped employees. Employers should withhold taxes only on the tips reported by employees, not on the allocated amount.

When you get your Form W-2, Wage and Tax Statement, for the year from your employer, the tip income you have reported will be included in the salary amount. And, if you work for an establishment covered under the reporting requirements previously mentioned, your employer may include as a separate entry on your Form W-2 any amount of tips allocable to you. The information returns filed by the employers will be used to determine whether employees have been accurately reporting tip income.

To help tip earners with recordkeeping, the IRS has free forms available for keeping track of daily tips and also for monthly reporting of tip income to employers. Call or write the IRS and ask for Publication 1244, IRS can also send you a free guide about tip income. It's Publication 531, "Reporting Income From Tips." You may write to the IRS Form Distribution Center at P.O. Box 6900, Florence, Ky. 41042, or you may obtain the Publication by calling the IRS toll free number 1-800-424-1040.

### IRS Publication 910 Contains Helpful Tax Information

Taxpayers interested in year-round tax tips as well as a thorough guide to filing season tax information can obtain a copy of the free IRS Publication 910, "Taxpayer's Guide to Information, Assistance and Publications," the Internal Revenue Service says. Publication 910 is available by writing the IRS Forms Center, P.O. Box 6900, Florence, Ky. 41042, or by calling the IRS toll free number 1-800-424-1040. The publication also may be obtained at local IRS offices.

Contained in Publication 910 are descriptions of IRS services available to help taxpayers prepare their tax returns or to receive assistance with their returns. The booklet offers information to assist taxpayers who have questions concerning their accounts and the status of refunds they expect. It details the assistance offered to taxpayers by the Problem Resolution Office, as well. This office assists taxpayers who have problems with the IRS that have not been resolved through normal assistance channels.

Of particular interest to taxpayers, the guide includes an explanation of how the taxpayer can inspect tax returns of exempt organizations and exemption applications. In addition, the publication lists the telephone numbers for both Tele-Tax, the recorded telephone tax information and automated refund information service; and for the IRS toll-free telephone lines, which enable a taxpayer to call and speak to an IRS officer for tax assistance.

Other items of interest in the publication are explanations on collection of taxes, examination of returns, and how to file an amended return. Further, the guide describes many of the free publications that are most often requested by taxpayers and includes a handy order blank.

# Questionnaire

Dear Friend,

The 1986 session of the Kentucky Legislature has now convened. Many ideas will soon become law.

## Brush fires burn 18 acres in Rockcastle

Steve Bullen, Forest Ranger with the Kentucky Division of Forestry, said Tuesday that there have been eight brush fires in the county since the first of the year, burning over 18 acres.

"We've been lucky," Bullen said, "and it's mainly been due to the Mt. Vernon and Brodhead Fire Departments." Bullen went on to say that the two departments have been quick to respond to the brush fire calls, usually within "10 to 15 minutes." He said the departments have also made several runs to small fires in the county which kept them from becoming big fires.

Most of the eight fires can be attributed to people burning garbage and letting it get out of control or cigarettes being thrown down carelessly. Bullen said there was one fire near a fire near Madison County and one which was caused by a transformer blowing and shooting sparks out.

The largest of the fires occurred near Brodhead and burned over 10 acres. Bullen cautioned that it is still a critical time due to a lack of ground moisture and windy weather and that no burning should be done until some precipitation falls. Some landowners have been fined for illegal burning (letting fires out of control). Bullen said, and the incendiary fire is still under investigation.

Bullen has been called to help out in Whitley County, where quite a few fires have been caused by arsonists. In addition to assisting with brush fires, the Mt. Vernon Fire Department was called out last Wednesday to a fuel oil stove fire in Mt. Vernon, and a trailer was destroyed by fire at Flat Gap about 1:30 a.m. Monday.

## City Council raises Northern water rate

The Northern Rockcastle Water District, reportedly strapped for money to meet operations and maintenance expenses, received another financial jolt Monday night.

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted to double the price the district pays the city for water, increasing its current 42 cents a 1,000 gallons to 84 cents, matching the rate already paid by the Western Rockcastle Water District and the City of Brodhead.

The rate will be effective Feb. 1 when the contract between the city and the district expires.

The increase will be tentative, pending an audit review. Currently, the water bill for the Northern District averages about \$1,100 a month. Brodhead's bill is about \$2,100 a month, and the Western District about \$3,200 a month. The amount fluctuates from month to month.

No mention was made by the council of any further increases in water rates in the Western District, Brodhead, and Mt. Vernon. Livingston has its own water system.

In a recent report, a survey by the Mountain Association for Community Development (MACED), a Berea based regional development group, found that the Northern District was placed in "systems that were able to meet

their ordinary operation and maintenance expenses and service their debts. But most of the systems (in the groups surveyed) were not able to contribute to capital replacement costs covering their depreciation expenses." It also found the district has a water loss rate of 32 percent.

That survey by MACED was made in 1983. Incidentally, at Mt. Vernon, the city plans a \$290,000 improvement project and has hired Crawford & Crawford, engineers, of Burnside, to oversee the project which includes a rebuilt filter; installing another chlorinator; rebuilding the filter table; flow controllers and restore plant to automatic control; construct a 766,000-gallon concrete ground-water storage tank, and install a 12-inch water line from city hall to tank site on Ky. 1249.

## Citizens committee named to get views on sewer rates

Faced with a possible loss of about \$1.1 million in grant money to expand and upgrade the city sewer plant, the Mt. Vernon City Council has called on a citizens committee to consider all financial options and give its views to the council.

The committee met with the council for the first time Monday night and the consensus, as expected, was that a sewer rate increase seems to be the only alternative.

How much of an increase was left to further discussion by the council, committee and engineers for the project.

As reported earlier, the city needs an additional \$264,000 to come up with the 25 percent (\$494,102) it needs to get the

\$1,137,643 grant. The low bid for the project came from Titus Construction of Dayton, Ohio, at \$1,621,745.

Mayor Roland Mullins told the committee the city has "resisted" and "danced around" a rate increase for 10 to 12 years.

"There seems to be no other way out," the mayor stated. "Government money is drying up, so the city can't risk losing this grant money."

He said the city is operating the sewer plant as it always has, but in recent times the state has made the guidelines more stringent. The state now demands effluent coming out of the plant be treated to insure against pollution of Town Branch which runs into Renfro Creek and the Rockcastle River.

## Truck Plaza under way

A diesel discount service station for trucks, named Daniel Boone Truck Plaza, is under construction on the site of the former Valley Drive-In Theater at Renfro Valley.

Owned by Derby City Oil Co. of Louisville, which has a plaza on I-71, the plaza is to be operated by owner, Ron Jones, a native of Williamsburg.

The plaza will have a 24-hour full service restaurant that will seat over 100, mostly catering to truckers. It will have eight pump lines that can service 45 trucks in line, and with a fuel dispensing rate of 34 gallons a minute.

In addition to the restaurant, the two-story building will have offices on the second floor. The first floor has 2,276 square feet of space.

Jones said he will hire 51 employees at the plaza. He added

there will be no repair work or gasoline. The diesel distributor is Sun Oil (Sunoco).

"This is strictly a quick stop operation," Jones stated. "We are not in competition with other restaurants or service stations."

He said he hoped to open the plaza as soon as possible. He said he has a 20-year lease on the property owned by Bill Norton of Mt. Vernon and Bud Hughes and family of Jackson County.

General contractor for the project is Jimmy Dooly of Con-way. Frank Mason is in charge of mechanical work.

Jones, who is the nephew of retired Kentucky Supreme Court Justice Pless Jones of Williamsburg, is 43, and retired from the Army. He is married, with a son who is a red-shirted quarterback at the University of Notre Dame; and a daughter in Purdue

University.

The Valley Drive-In has been closed for several years. The site has 7 1/2 acres.

The new plaza is the first major business to be constructed on the north side of the Renfro Valley Interchange of I-75 in several years.

Jones said the plaza will be well lit at night, and he will not allow solicitation of any kind.

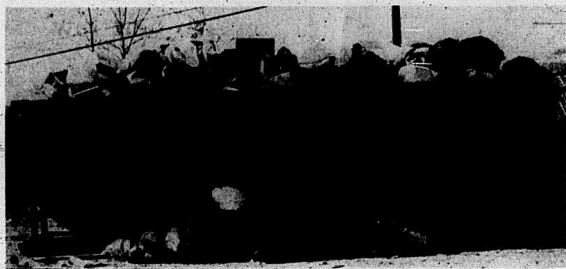

The sewer plant project has been in the mills since 1976 when the state first cast a lengthy look at the city facility. Since that time the cost of the project has skyrocketed.

The city has not had a sewer rate increase since 1965. Currently, the Mt. Vernon sewer rate is half the water bill. At Brodhead, the rate is 75 percent of the water bill. At Crab Orchard, the sewer rate is \$10.87 for the first 1,000 gallons of water used and \$1.87 a thousand over the first 1,000 gallons. At Lancaster, the sewer rate is 100 percent of the water bill.

"We are going to make every

effort to keep the cost down as much as possible," the mayor declared. "If any members of the committee has ideas how this can be done, they are certainly welcome, or anyone else."

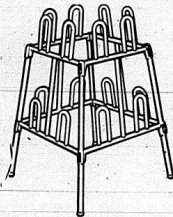

FAST FOODS AND BREAKFAST

The fast pace of our American

this most recent round of grants. Funds are distributed twice each year, in July and in December, with a total of over \$1.8 million going to agencies and artists during July 1985-June 1986. This money includes Kentucky's share from the National Endowment for the Arts as well as funds allotted by the Kentucky Legislature.

The Kentucky Arts Council, a 16-member citizen's board with a staff in the Kentucky Department of the Arts, receives grant applications and dispenses the funds. Arts Department Commissioner, Crit Luallen explains that the primary goal of the Department is to expand the audience for the arts, encourage interest in the arts, help create new programs and works of art, and support major art resources.

lifestyle leads many of us to consume a lot of "fast foods."

Those foods are relatively low in cost and served quickly and conveniently and they can be part of a nutritious diet if eaten in moderation and chosen wisely.

However, when it comes to breakfast choices available, most of the fast food offerings are not so nutritious.

Many fast food breakfast items are noted for their high fat content. According to the USDA Dietary Guidelines for Americans we should decrease our total calorie content from fat from the current 40 percent to 30 percent. The American Institute for Cancer Research agrees with that recommendation.

The average woman consuming about 2,000 calories a day needs to reduce her fat intake by almost 22 grams a day to meet this 30 percent recommendation, and the average man consuming 2,700 calories a day needs to cut out 30 grams of fat each day.

What does this have to do with a fast food breakfast?

A lot, if you look at the fat content of some typical:

A croissant sandwich with sausage has 30 grams of fat and 450 calories. Hotcakes and sausage with syrup and butter also has 30 grams of fat and 700 calories. French toast isn't much better with 20 grams and 400 calories while home fries has 22 grams and 360 calories.

A typical breakfast of scrambled eggs, sausage, English muffin, butter and hashed browns will

have 44 grams of fat and 700 calories.

It's obvious that many fast food breakfast items are high in fat and calories. But you can make a

difference by making good choices and requesting special preparation.

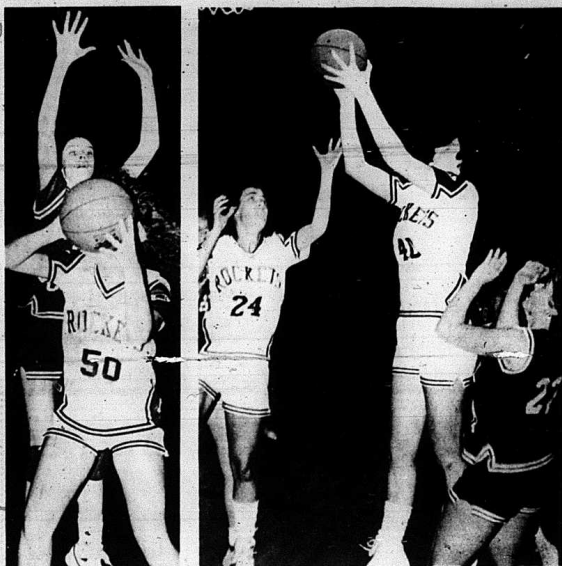
