



The budget will soundly fund elementary, secondary and higher education in Kentucky. There is strong funding for health and welfare, economic development, and law enforcement in the budget bill, also.

bill also There are several other viral programs we hope to include in the budget, either on the House floor by way of amendment or in House Senate conference com-

mittees: We will seek expanded funding to address the surgical waiting list for handicapped children and to provide pediatric surgery for babies and young children. State dollars will be sought to fund computerized fingerprint capabilities for the State Police, which should seriously complicate.
